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## IMPROVED COMPONENTS.

"What brand of transformer or condenser do you recommend for this purpose?"

That is a question we are frequently asked, both personally and by mail, and one which it is against our policy to answer in any other way than to refer the inquirer to the advertising columns of this paper. A little reflection upon broadcasting as it is to-day—or perhaps we should say the wireless industry as a whole—will show that in most cases the question is entirely unnecessary.

Wireless, of course, like any other established industry, has passed through a number of stages, but ever on the upward trend. It has been the happy hunting ground of the junk manufacturer, the cheap-jack dealer, and the get-rich-quicks. The quality of the broadcasting of three or four years ago would not be tolerated at the present day.

Improvements in the microphone, in the modulation system, and the studio rapidly lifted the quality of transmission from the mediocre stage to its present high standard, and it was not long before the manufacturer realised that purity of reception rested not only with the excellence of the broadcasting itself, but also with the quality of the parts used in the receivers.

A comparison of the accessories turned out to-day and those marketed a short three years ago shows that every conceivable piece of apparatus sold to-day is as nearly perfect as the manufacturer can possibly make it. This is noticeable not only in British and American made articles, but also in the parts turned

out by the Australian concerns which are turning their attention to wireless.

Mass production methods, competition, and a universal public demand for better reception have resulted in the adoption of improved machinery, higher engineering standards, better materials, and a consequent supply of wireless apparatus more reasonably priced but far more efficient than was the case when broadcasting was a mere novelty.

Take, for instance, the straight line frequency condenser. Its advantage is that stations separated by equal frequencies may be tuned-in at equal increased or decreased degrees on the dial. Those stations whose tuning was dangerously close on the older type of condenser may not be separated by quite a number of degrees with perfect ease.

Losses due to the imperfect insulation of valve sockets made of inferior material have been almost entirely cut out by the use of such materials as high grade bakelite, radion, porcelain, and pyrex glass. The old type of transformer, with its loose laminations, poor curve, inferior wire, and poor insulation, has given way to the wonderfully efficient instrument manufactured to-day.

And so we could go on over the whole range of apparatus comprising modern receivers, and tell the same story. There is no room on the market for inferior goods; in the main, what is offered to the public represents the best that engineering skill and up-to-date methods can produce.

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# Adding a Stage of Radio to the "All Australian" Receiver

Many very excellent reports have been received from both country and city readers concerning the results obtained with the "All Australian" Receiver, described in "Wireless Weekly" dated February 19th, 1926. The addition of a stage of radio as described in this issue will, we feel sure, be very helpful to country readers who wish to improve their daylight range, and also to city readers who desire to increase the selectivity of the ordinary three circuit tuner for Interstate reception. Many broadcast listeners have the incorrect idea of radio frequency amplification in thinking that it will increase the volume of local stations. It does not. It does, however, increase the range and selectivity of the receiver.

That well known saying about killing two birds with one stone can be applied to this article, since we are going to describe the construction of a tuned radio frequency unit, which may be added to any suitable receiver, and also show the details necessary for building the complete four-valve receiver.

Readers who understand circuit diagrams will readily recognise the similarity of the completed hook-up with that of the Browning-Drake Receiver, with the exception that the first valve is not neutralised and plug-in coils are used in lieu of the ordinary type of Regenaformer. The receiver is equally efficient on all wavelengths, which makes it particularly suitable for Australian conditions.

Those readers who are now using the receiver described in "Wireless Weekly" dated February 19th, or who wish to add this unit to any other hook-up, will need the following materials:

- 1 Radion panel—8 x 6 x 3/16 inches.
- 1 Baseboard—8 x 5 x  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches.
- 1 2-coil holder.
- 1 .0005 or .001 condenser.
- 1 Potentiometer (300 ohms).
- 1 Rheostat (to control valves used).
- 1 Valve holder.
- 1 Valve.
- 4 Terminals.
- 5 Lengths of busbar wire.

Honeycomb or Spiderweb coils: 1/25, 2/50, 2/75, 1/100, 2/150, and 1/200.

#### Method and Order of Construction.





Fig. 1.—Back Panel of R.F. Unit.

Drill and mount the panel components in the position corresponding to the back of panel view, Fig. 1. Next mount the valve holder on the baseboard, after which the baseboard and panel should be secured together and the wiring carried out in the numerical order shown.

Nos. 1 and 2 link the aerial and earth terminals with the top and bottom connections of the first coil holder, respectively. No. 3 links the lower connection of the second coil holder with the moving plate connection of the variable condenser. No. 4 is a short link soldered from No. 3 to No. 2.

No. 7 joins together the two left-hand terminals of the rheostat and potentiometer. No. 8 is another connection taken from the fixed plate connection of variable condenser to the G terminal of valve. No. 9 is the link shown

the Browning Drake Receiver, with the added advantage that its wavelength range is considerably increased. Interference to neighbouring receivers, although not entirely eliminated, is considerably reduced by adding this unit.

The following materials are necessary to make up the complete four-valve receiver in one unit:—

1 Panel—24 x 9 x 3/16 inches.




Fig. 2.—Circuit Diagram.

between the left-hand F terminal of valve holder and the right-hand terminal of potentiometer. The final connection, No. 11, links the P of valve holder to the aerial terminal of detecting unit.

The battery connections are made as shown, common "A" and "B" batteries being used for the H.F. unit, detector and amplifier valves.

#### Warning.

Where this unit is added to any receiver which has the lower connections of existing primary and secondary joined together, as is the case with the "All Australian" Receiver, the link which joins the two coils together must be broken or portions of the "B" battery will be short circuited. See Fig. 2. In other words, it is not possible to add this amplifier to any receiver which has no separate primary coil. From this, readers will readily see that it cannot be added to the single circuit regenerative receiver, better known as the P.I., unless a separate coil is added, by replacing the two coil holder with a 3-coil one, or by adding an extra coupling plug.

We have refrained from publishing a coil table for use with this receiver, as many readers are undoubtedly in possession of various sized variable condensers, which they can efficiently use in this unit or the completed receiver. Any sized variable condenser is suitable as long as it will cover the desired tuning range, together with the coils you have. Describing the circuit it will be readily seen that the primary or aerial coil of the H.F. unit is aperiodic, the grid or secondary coil is tuned; likewise the primary circuit of the H.F. transformer (which is made up by the three coil holder) is also aperiodic. The secondary is again tuned, and regeneration is obtained by feeding back energy in the well known tickler coil fashion. In operation, this receiver is quite as sensitive as

Fig. 4 shows the popular back of panel view, showing wiring. We hasten to explain to readers who do not understand the circuit diagrams that, if they copy wire for wire, the unit or complete receiver will operate satisfactorily immediately it is completed.

#### Method of Tuning.

Assuming that two .0005 variable condensers are used for tuning, the following coils will be required in all the lower wave stations: Two coil




Fig. 3.—Circuit of R.F.

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


Fig. 4.—Back Panel Wiring.

holder, primary 25, secondary 50. Three coil holder, primary 35 or 50, secondary 50, tickler 50 or 75. For 2FC: 2 coil holder, primary 100, secondary 150. Three coil holder, primary 150, secondary 150, tickler 200. All coils except the tickler should be closely coupled together for preliminary tuning. Carefully rotate the two condensers together until the station is heard. If the same size condenser

and coils are used for both secondaries, almost identical settings will be obtained on both dials. Careful adjustment of the potentiometer and radio frequency rheostat are the only other critical controls. The receiver is very stable as long as the tickler coil is not too large. Reports on the reception obtained with this Receiver will be very much appreciated.

#### SAR ON A CRYSTAL SET.

Doubt has been expressed in many quarters with regard to the ability of Melbourne crystal set users to hear transmission from the SAR studio. There is, however, no reason for this doubt, inasmuch as, provided the set is properly constructed, there is no reason for any failure in the reception of this station on any crystal set. As mentioned before, the first essential is that the set must be accurately constructed; the second essential is that care should be exercised in the installation of the aerial. This should on no account exceed 80 ft. in all, including the height of the pole and the length of the aerial wire. For sets used within easy reach of the two stations at Essendon and Braybrook a length of 60 ft. is usually sufficient, but for city and other aerials the 80 ft. before mentioned is quite adequate; indeed, longer aerials rather militate against good reception. The prevailing idea that it is impossible to receive transmission from SAR against a higher power station is also due to the fact that the mani-

pulation of the dial is so little understood. It must be remembered that the higher power station occupies the greater portion of the dial, and it is only by careful tuning, or "feeling" for the right spot, that success is to be obtained. Therefore, it is necessary to go slow on the dial, and not swing it around at random. Listeners who are looking for SAR will be amply rewarded by attention to the above hints, and will be able to receive in comfort the admittedly good programmes now being broadcasted by this station.



## Queries Met By an Early Beginner

The following query has been received from Mr. Thompson, Molony Street, Toowoomba, Queensland.

"I have a Precise Super-Multiformer, of which I have no details regarding circuit. I should very much appreciate assistance through your 'Queries Met' column. Please give the number of turns, etc., to use on the inductances and also advise whether the inductances may be wound on one tube or two separate tubes, and whether the inductances are coupled inductively or otherwise?"

We have pleasure in publishing a circuit diagram which is particularly suitable for most of the super-kits at present on the market. Pay particular attention in every detail, to the design of the oscillator and coupler by-pass condensers, as shown.

The plate and grid coils of the oscillator coupler are wound on one 2½ inch former and consist of two sets of thirty-five turns of No. 24 D.C.C. wire. A space of 3/8 of an inch should be left between the end of the one coil and the beginning of the next. The rotor, which is the pick-up coil, is wound with sixteen turns of the same gauge wire and made to rotate inside the former between the two coils. Once the correct setting of the rotor has been found, it need not be altered. A glance at the circuit diagram shows that the pick-up coil for oscillation is connected in the filament return lead of frequency changer on the first detector. Many super-experts will probably say that this is wrong; but we say without fear of any contradiction whatever, that if this hook-up is copied explicitly, that most of the super's virtues, and few of its usual faults will be found to be present.

"Wireless Weekly" has had extensive experience with every well known super-kit, all of which suit this hook-up very excellently indeed. A jack is used to change from aerial to loop, and an ordinary two coil holder for coupling the receiver

to the outside aerial. Only one stage of audio is necessary, to give loud speaker volume from all A class stations anywhere in Australia. The second stage may, however, be added if desired, but it should be wired to a D.C. jack so that it may be cut out at will.


The potentiometer which is shown wired in the grid return of the intermediate valves must be of good quality in order to get the delicate adjustments so very necessary with any super. The intermediate valves must not oscillate; but in order to get maximum sensitivity it is necessary to get very close to oscillation. This is only made possible by a potentiometer which is very finely vernier. In the course of a few weeks, we hope to be able to give the back of panel views showing the connections of all the most popular Super Heterodyne kits. In the meantime, we feel sure we have dealt with this query quite sufficiently enough to get our Queensland reader out of difficulty.

We trust the advice herewith published will also prove instructive to other readers who have home-constructed Supers, which are not giving them quite the results they expected.

"I have a five-valve commercially built receiver, which is not fitted with a "C" battery. Could you please inform me how I can add one?"

A. Unless you can follow the circuit inside your set we do not advise you to put in the "C" battery yourself. Any recognised dealer will be pleased to do it for you for a very small sum.

If you can follow the circuit, however, remove the receiver from the cabinet and you will find that the two terminals of the audio transformers marked —F are joined to the —A battery connection. Break this connection to the —A and bring the —C battery to the two F terminals of audio transformer. The positive C battery then goes to the —A. This extra refinement is well worth while, as it not only improves the tone of the set, but decreases the drain on the "B" batteries.



## THE STREET SINGER

### AN INTERVIEW WITH MANSFIELD.

Widespread interest has been aroused by the broadcasting by ZFC of Dan Mansfield, the street singer whose remarkable voice has amazing range and quality.

Mansfield, sitting on a seat in the sunshine near the Central Railway Station, shading his troubled eyes, talked quietly to the writer:

"Two newspapers in writing of my street singing, have mentioned that I wear dark glasses. From this a certain section of the public might infer that I adopt them as a ruse to gain sympathy. But I wish to say that I have certificates from

week, but since authorities in such matters credit me with some special gifts of voice and improvisation whatever of the artist, there is in me pleads for fuller opportunities than I now enjoy for self-development.

Here is my past in a nutshell. Twelve years in an orphanage with no memory of either mother or father, and the handicap of sight so defective as to prevent me from learning to read in the ordinary way. I had no opportunity to learn from Braille.


Later, uncongenial surroundings in lodgings among people who cared nothing for music,—where I had no access to piano, and my only musical instrument was a borrowed gramophone for which I saved up for months to buy a single record. Meanwhile, I had to earn my living by house to house canvassing, or singing in doorways during moments stolen from the police.

Considering all this I want to speak for whatever of the artist is in me and for what others say is there; to make up for all lost time, all past handicaps. I want to plead for an entirely new environment,—an environment where music shall be first and last and always before everything, and above all else, where I could have access to a piano at all times. As I am doubtful whether my sight would serve me well enough to acquire the necessary knowledge of music in the ordinary way, I feel that I could develop best, could I gain access to a blind educational institution where I would be among those who are gaining a general education by means of Braille.

There is much that I could tell the public—how I always believed that under happier circumstances I felt I might give the world something that was worth the giving, but mine has been, up to the present, a lane that had no turning; whatever gifts I possessed,—whatever of high desire I felt has always been suppressed and utterly submerged by the fight for the common necessities of life.

When Melba's Grand Opera came here about 2 years ago, I could not afford to pay to go in, so used to hang around laneways listening for notes through ventilators or other vents where a fragment of the music might escape. Sometimes when I would be straining to catch a note a noisy tram would rush past, drowning my feast of melody.

Re gramophone records, my first experience sticks in my memory. I used to go around the second-hand shops asking for Melba's records. Came upon one on one occasion for which I paid 3/6. The salesman wouldn't try it over, but guaranteed it to be O.K. As my sight was not

four qualified medical men, stating that I am entitled to the invalid pension through the state of my eyes. The fact that I have always acted honestly with my disadvantages, and, I believe, bring a good deal of intelligence to bear in overcoming my natural handicaps, may still more incline the public to believe that I use many of the professional buskers pretences to gain a living. Let me mention that so far I have not been able to obtain the pension; also that owing to the references to my black goggles I have cast them aside, suffering a good deal of inconvenience thereby.

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**THEATRICAL BROADCAST ON FRIDAY.**



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
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## 3LO's New Announcer

The Director of 3LO, being one of the busiest men in Melbourne, has little time to "listen in," but has in his office a set which is sometimes turned on while he is at work. ## MISS META PELHAM.


A remarkable old lady, Miss Meta Pelham, who has had a long and wonderfully successful stage career, will broadcast for 3LO, Melbourne. This lady, who is well over 70 years old, has been on the stage for 50 years, was married at the age of 16, and has reared a family of good Australians; but is still vigorous and active, and can talk vividly and amusingly on almost any subject.

Miss Pelham's last appearance on the Australian stage was as June O'Hara in "Paddy the next best thing," and before that as the garrulous Grandma in "Tilly of Bloomsbury." Her career began under the auspices of Mrs. Scott-Siddons in 1876, with whom Miss Pelham played in "The Honeymoon," "Our Boys," "Pygmalion and Galatea" and other leading parts. Later Miss Pelham played under J. C. Williamson, Rignold, Brough and Boucicault, etc., nearly always in leading roles. She will be remembered as Maria in "The School for Scandal," Kate in "She Stoops to Conquer," Cordelia in "King Lear," and later in "Confusion," "Sophia," "The Rivals," "Romeo and Juliet," "Hamlet," and "Sweet Lavender." Twenty years ago, Miss Pelham had a hard battle in London before she became known as an actress and supported great artists such as H. B. Irving, Marion Terry, Sir George Alexander and many others.

In broadcasting her programmes, which will consist of readings from Dickens, excerpts from Shakespeare, and other dramatic readings, Miss Pelham will be assisted by her daughter, Miss Lila Pelham, also a well known actress, having appeared with Nellie Stewart, Emilie Polini, etc.

This young artist who features in programmes from 3LO, Melbourne during the next two or three weeks, has a record of song successes which almost rival that of Irving Berlin, the American composer. Certainly, Mr. O'Hagan scores just as high a percentage of successes as his American rivals, and few of the imported numbers have approached the sales figures of "After the Dawn," Mr. O'Hagan's waltz-song hit. In America, this number would have sold by the million, and there is every possibility that it will yet do so as arrangements are being made for its distribution in that country. Mr. O'Hagan has written and composed a musical comedy, which will be produced in Melbourne about the end of the year.

Some vaudeville acts are not entirely suitable for broadcasting purposes, but the incidental music from the Tivoli Theatre has always saved the situation when "dumb" acts, such as acrobatics and juggling have been included in the items broad-

Thinking teaching too dull after soldiering, Mr. Ellis went on the land at Derrinallum, this venture, however, proved unsuccessful. He returned to Melbourne, where he now resides. Mr. Ellis is a most prolific writer, and is becoming well known as a song writer, several of his songs, including "Kookaburra Gay" being published. Mrs. Ellis is a writer of music, and they claim to have the best collection of Australian written songs in the country.

Besides verse and songs, Mr. Ellis writes sentimental verse for ballads and very fine poetry for classical numbers, also doggerel for fox trots.
