

Now that the cold weather is settling in, some of our more sensationalistic newspapers have decided that a "teenage scandal" is just the tonic for winter boredom.


The discos have become their target, and there are 'no holds barred" in their attacks.

The disco scene was born The disco scene was born out of the Paristan CAFE atmosphere, and the first "discotheques" we re just what the word means—places where people could relax and enjoy themselves to a background of good recorded sounds. The idea spread, caught on like a rag-ing fire in the States. Superh electronic sound systems provided a fresh, exciting backdrop for dancing - and disco-goers could hear the world's best singers and bands, without travelling the world to hear them.

When discos hit Australia. they added extra dimensions to the sound by adding spots for the talented entertainers who had already become known here on record. Since then, Australia has produced many different kinds of discotheque, catering to varying age groups, musical interests and styles of life. Some are licensed, some are not. One thing is certain: discos have an important and central place in the leisure hours of our generation.

There has, in the past, been trouble with some discos. But these were not the established discotheques. they were shoddy places de-signed to make a "quick killing". A detective stated at the time, "I believe young people need an outlet but I don't think these places have a healthy atmosphere." He added that lights in such

places were so dim that it was not easy to see what went on inside. And he added, "I am not attacking the long established clubs establishments which attract undesirables."
At that time, people tried to link discos and fighting and bashings. Yet the fact was that undestrables were more often to the were more often.

— they were more often roaming the streets in packs, or driving in groups. In fact, when discos made sure fact, when discos made sure that such elements were not admitted, some people com-plained that keeping these types out of discos was what caused the trouble. The claims that discos represent "fire hazards", "health risks", etc., are ridi-

culous. Health Authorities keep a close watch over all places of public entertain-ment, and they have given the discos a clean bill.

Following the latest attacks on discos, we spoke to Sgt. Hope of the Swan Hill police force. He has been long associated with the interests of young people. Speaking favourably of discos and dances, he said "There is no argument. Properly supervised places of entertainment for young people are absolutely essen-

Meeting the arguments of less well-informed oldies, he recalled the old adage: "The devil finds work for idle hands.

What happens to pop music in a decade when psychedelic happenings, freak-outs and Technicolor Dreams have hatched a new wave of turned-on sound merchants? Maybe more to the point, what happens to the people who make the music and those who swing to it?

The American west coast scene has the answer - or the beginnings of an answer. At any rate, the West Coast is where the questions are being asked most urgently.

For the Mommas' and Poppas' are right, when they sing: Cali-fornia dreamin' is becoming a reality. The now-famous hippies of San Francisco are making reality look and sound like an

If English audiences prove as receptive to the Young charm, his next Australian concert will be a Stadium welcome home for an international star.


