I think a touch of the dry Australian sense of humor went into the naming of "Snowy" Fleet, the drummer. Short and stocky with jet black curly hair, Little Stevie described him as being "the world's only Latin American Liverpudlian", but quickly added that even though he was "swarthy" he was "very handsome". This belated back-handed compliment, I guess, was to save Stevie the embarrassment of a punch "up da front".

"Snowy" is a great friend of Dan of M.P.D. (and Limited). They swapped name tags a long time ago just to prove it.

Before "The Easybeats" formed "Snowy's" favorite pastime was cycling, but this was sacrificed too, in the interests of family unity and goodwill among band members.

The other ex-Dutchman in the group is Dick Diamond.

Fearing that there was something dark and mysterious about the change of names we asked him, WHY?

"Because nobody could pronounce my proper name anyway!" he answered.

Dick is the quiet one (comparatively speaking) whose main hobby apart from music, is photography. He is slightly built, about five feet six high and, according to the gospel as spoken by Little Stevie, weighs about the same as a hefty watermelon. Sometimes I don't think I should believe everything that guy says!

At the other end of the scale from Harry Vanda, we come at last, to Little Stevie himself as the Irish say. At five feet seven, Stevie is just twelve and a half axe handles shorter than Harry.

Included in his other hobbies, Stevie says, is writing. At the moment he is hard at work trying to complete two short "novellas". Both of them are works of humor. The first will be called "65 with the Easybeats" and the second, a book of short stories, "The Easybeats in History", which deals chiefly with the manner in which the Easybeats would have handled various sticky situations in history had they been there.

"Nothing is definite yet about the States tour," says Stevie, "but our manager, Mike Vaughan, is over there at the moment negotiating personal appearance tours, a recording contract and the publication of the Easybeats songs in the U.S.A."

to do much the same thing." "No, I'm afraid I have no idea what shows we will be appearing on over there, but I'm hoping they'll include all the big ones."

When I told them that "The Rolling Stones" had condemned Australian groups' music as being years behind the times, with a similarity of beat that becomes monotonous, they all wanted to reply at once.

None denied that we were a year or so behind England in sound and as much behind America in record production, but they were adamant that it was not entirely the fault of the various groups.

Australian groups as a whole are unwilling to record, or even play, experimental sounds, they explained, be-

cause of the backwardness of most Australian radio stations. Brisbane was the only one they knew well that played what they liked and hoped the fans liked it too. "At least everything gets a trial that way!"

And on the subject of record production, Dick and Harry chimed in. "Whereas American groups do innumerable 'takes' of each recording and then cut it and swap parts about, Australian groups simply do not have the facilities or the money."

"Recording techniques out here are nowhere near as advanced as in England or America, and the artists don't get the same kind of expert help as they do."

"For example, the fellow who produces the Beatles re-

cords, George Martin, has his own orchestra as well, and when it's needed he is able to give advice backed by a sound knowledge of all kinds of music, and even go as far as suggesting new arrangements and additions to what already exists."

Actually The Easybeats are more like the younger set of the Oddfellows Association than a pop group. Two pommies, two Dutchmen and a Scotchman . . . see what I mean?

Either way they're a very personable crew bent only on having a ball. I might add that they have just the right personalities for the job and enjoy doing nothing more.

Built like a扁扁的 surfboard and looking like everybody's idea of a typical Dutchman we have Harry Vanda — lead guitar. Harry insists that his air is naturally that color (the kind of blonde mice girls spend years trying for), and that his eyes are his own too (blue). We didn't argue much about the latter.

The most difficult thing about Harry is his accent which is surely the most obscure on earth. But then what can one expect of a combination of English, Scotch, Dutch and Australian — Gawd! Whadda believe manure! Each word comes out with a different accent. Must be the company he keeps!

Then there was George — George Young, the rhythm guitarist!

Before music became the most important thing in his life, with a few minor (and mainly female) exceptions, George played a lot of soccer. In fact, at the age of fifteen George won a jersey in the all Scotland amateur soccer team. But when he migrated and took up guitar playing and song-writing that more or less spell "finis" for the soccer.

George and Little Stevie do most of the song-writing and composing, but the whole group can and do write and compose songs to a greater or lesser degree.

But all this was not by way of a complaint. It was merely meant to explain to the public that there are certain disadvantages under which Australian artists struggle, which are not common to all.

Had they had their own way, I think we would have talked music and groups for hours but Col hustled us off for photographs, and so this happy band were cut into the street!

The Cherokees are one pop group who literally crashed onto the pop scene! At an engagement at the Davenport Mardi Gras, Tasmania, in 1963, the Town Hall floor collapsed when hundreds of fans went crazy, rocking and jumping to the beat of the group. Since then the Cherokees have had bigger, but perhaps not so spectacular successes. Not only are they one of the best known and most popular dance bands on the Melbourne scene, but their previous recordings, a single and an LP, "Here come the Cherokees" have sold unexpectedly well, and their new release "The Angels listen in" is sure to hit the charts within the next few weeks.

Who's in the Cherokees? Why! Peter Tindell (bass guitar), who hates walking or any other form of exercise, Doug Trevor (lead guitar), a part-time gold prospector who writes music, the music for the group including the flip of "Angels". Lindsay Morrison (rhythm guitar), who makes up for Peter's lack of interest in sports and exercise, and finally, Barry Windley (drums), whose unquenchable characteristic seems to be his voracious interest in money and women.

The Cherokees were orig-

inally the backing group for Johny Chester, but Barry is the only original member left.

Doug and Lindsay met as workmates in the same department of the public service and Peter, before joining the group full-time, was an engineering draughtsman. The group is now fully occupied with their music, spending three days each week on tour and the remainder playing at such GO places as Odd-Mod, Opus and Stone-henge.

A message for Cherokee fans — starting this Thurs-

day, the boys begin an engagement at The Thumpin Tam and Friday night they will be the unique distinction of being the first pop group to play within the hallowed precincts of Government House — for the twenty-first birthday of the Governor's daughter, Frances Deacon.

Go-Set proudly boasts that it is the first to release the plans The Cherokees have for the future, including their first big mainland interstate tour. In March the boys go to Adelaide and then on to Perth with Ray Brown and the Whispers.



The group's name derives from the eldest member of the group whose real name is Spencer Davis. "Spence" is their lead guitarist, but can also play the harmonica and twelve string guitar when required. He's a sincere sort of bloke, dedicated to his music.

Spencer Davis was born in Swindon, England, on July 17th, 1941. Spence is six foot tall, has green eyes, brown hair, speaks six languages and has an Arts Degree in German.

The drummer is twenty-three-year-old Peter Heek who owns his own bachelor flat. Peter tops Spence in height being six foot three. He learnt to play drums whilst in the Army Corps.

Bass guitarist is twenty-two-year-old Muff Winwood. Muff is the most charity member

of the group at interviews, but when he pursues an unwise or radical argument Spence is quick to offer a knowing smile on the side.

The youngest is lead singer, Stevie Winwood, aged seventeen. Stevie's versatility enables him not only to sing but, when necessary, to play either piano, guitar, bass maracas or organ.



with tony olsson, victoria's leading surf expert

This year at the State titles, Rod Brooks from Torquay emerged as the new champion, just beating Tony. Who has been on top for so many years now, in A.S.A. and S.L.S.A. competition, by half a point, and Ken Bates by one and one half points. This is the first time Rod has won in big competition, and a well deserved win it was too.

He has tried hard for the past three years, and has always been in the top three or four.

In an informal interview after the win, Rod outlined a few of his ideas:

TONY: How does it feel to be State champion?

ROD: Very satisfying. I came second last year in the State titles.

It is good to know that I am going up and not down.

TONY: Well, now that you are at the top what do you have in mind for the future?

ROD: Firstly the big rally at Bells at Easter, then, of course, the Australian titles in Queensland. It will be very interesting to see what happens at Bells, as a lot of the top New South Wales surfers will be coming down to compete. This will, therefore, give me a very good idea of what competition there will be in Queensland for the Australian Titles.

TONY: How about the world titles?

ROD: I could only go if I was sponsored.

TONY: What do you think of defeating a great champion?

ROD: Well, I have come close so many times, and once even to a煮out. It has always been my aim to win, and now I feel that I have broken the spell.

TONY: Do you think it was a good contest?

ROD: Yes. The cream of Victoria was competing. The organisation by the A.S.A. was good. The surf could have been a bit better, but it was consistent and fair to everyone.

TONY: How long have you been surfing?

ROD: I have been surfing four years consistently, on a board, and joined Torquay Surf Life Saving Club, got my Bronze Medallion and have competed consistently for two years.

TONY: How old are you? And what do you do for a living?

ROD: I am nineteen years of age and I am an apprentice cabinet maker.

TONY: Would you like to say something about the standard of surfing and your style?

ROD: Yes. The standard has improved immensely

over the past two years, and the top surfers are becoming very proficient. As far as style I prefer a surfer who comes from the front of the board and who is aggressive with out being radical. I personally don't copy any style, but Joey Cabel is the only surfer I would really like to be able to surf like. I have watched different people surf and adapted some ideas to my own style. When I surfed at Anglesea, N.S.W. with Joey after the first world titles (which were held in Manly, May, 1961) I really learnt a lot.

TONY: How did you go in the world titles?

ROD: Well, I didn't go so well, as I had Nat Young in my heat, and he eventually won the title, but I was first junior on points, after the six finalists.

TONY: What is your favorite surfing spot?

ROD: Bells Beach. Popular, yes, but it is definitely the best.

TONY: What is your attitude to other surfers in the water?

ROD: I hate crowds the same as anyone else, and I get niggy with them, but never resent them. Because they are there to enjoy the surf the same as I am. I do like to surf by myself wherever possible, with only

one or two friends in the water with me.

TONY: What type of waves do you like?

ROD: I prefer big waves, most enjoyable ten to fifteen feet. Although I don't like it, I will still ride the surf under or over my preference. I spoke next with Ken Bates who came third in the contest:

TONY: Ken what did you think of the contest?

KEN: I thought it was the best contest held so far in Victoria. The judges were consistent and I was impressed with Rod winning the title. He has had so many placings up to now, I think everyone was pleased, including Terry.

TONY: What do you think about Terry announcing his retirement from active competition last month?

KEN: I think he is silly as he has a lot more in him yet, and he is much too good to retire yet. But if it is as you say, that he wishes to concentrate on business and only ride on a certain type of wave, I can understand this.

TONY: You are originally from Sydney, aren't you Ken?

KEN: Yes, I came down here in September 1964 to work, and have been here ever since. I married a wonderful Melbourne girl, have a very good job here and I cannot

see me going back to Sydney in the near future.

TONY: What clubs are you a member of, and how have you gone in rally in the past?

KEN: I am a foundation member of the Manly Pacific Club in Sydney and I joined the Torquay Surf Club last year. As far as rallies are concerned, I made first place at Torquay in October 1964, third at Bells in November 1964, and third in the South Australia titles.

TONY: What do you think of riding in Victoria?

KEN: By comparison, apart from the top half dozen riders, taken from all three classes, it is fairly low.

TONY: One last thing Ken, any criticism on the judging?

KEN: Yes. Compared to Sydney contests, which I have sorted in, down here we are not told before we go into the water exactly how and what we will be judged on, and if you could get them, five judges would be better than three. I also feel that the judges were a bit lazy in marking so low, but then they were consistent. I, of course, was very happy with the results, though naturally I would have liked to have won.
