

At a time when every second wishy-washy pop group claims it plays Rhythm and Blues, it's pleasant to find a The Wild Cherries is such a group.

Ever since the Fat Black-Pussy-Cat opened as a discotheque towards the end of '64, The Wild Cherries have been providing the Melbourne discotheque scene with a wayout R & B sound.

way-out K & B sound.
The group's lead guitarist, Malcolm Magee, has been a well-known figure in the blues world for about the last three years and is regarded by many as one of our two best blues guitarists.

The rest of the group comprises Les Gilbert (bass), ohn Bastow (lead singer) and Keith Barber (drums). The main influences on the group's style are Howling Wolf, John Hooker and Louisianna Red.

The Wild Cherries are laying the emphasis on "insane" (Mal Magee's word) improvisation and only work out arrangements for the beginning and the end of their numbers, leaving the rest to the way the group is swinging.

This record seems to be the fullfilment (or full-This record seems to be the fullfilment (or full-puzziement of the recent trend towards experiment and new sounds in the blues, folk and pop fields. Folkies (or noce-folkies) like Dylan are playing electric guitars, pop-singers are singing "protest" songs and people like John Hammond are using electric guitars and amplified harps in the blues field (although some very enlightened bods have been doing this for years). The group comprises John Anderson (electric bass). Jimy Leary (electric population of the protection of the protection of the pro-tantaneous). Tulk Kupferberg (tamborine, maracus). Pete Stampfel (guitar, fiddle, harmonica) and Steve Weber electric guitar). The collective biographies of the group (electric guitar). The collective biographies of the group reads somewhat like a Ginsberg poem and, indeed, such reads somewhat like a clustery power and, indeed, such is the case for one member of the group at least. Tuli Kipferberg was the celebrated character in "How!" who jumped off Brooklyn Bridge and lived — disappearing into Chintown for not even one free bowl of soup.

The sound emitted by the Fags is difficult to describe, it seems mainly a mixture of R & B, bluegrass and assorted hallucinatory drugs. The Swinburne Stomp (words by A. C. Swinburne, music by Ed Sanders is without doubt the strangest sound I have ever heard, try

We weren't exactly elegant. We wore We werent exactly elegant. We wore violet-colored jackets and ties. Our trou-sers were crow-black and very tight, as were our shirts. Our shoes were light gray, made of imitation crocodile skin. They had long pointed toes and we called them "winkle-pickers." In case they weren't conspicuous enough, we wore them with high Cuban heels and massive buckles.

ngn Cuban heets and massive buckles. No one in the tough Indra Club near Hamburg's famous Recperbahn—the wick-deets street in Europe—had seen anything quies like us. Anything, that is, like John Lennon, Paul McCarnney, George Harriwn, Stuart Sutcliffe, and me, Pete Best, newly recruited drummer to a group musicians who, after I had been sarked musicians who, after I had been sarked two years later, were to go on to conquer the world and become the greatest attrac-tion in the history of international show

We were the Beatles.

It was August, 1960, and we had arrived in Hamburg, West Germany, to work eight hours a night, seven days a week, at the Indra Club for a fee of fifteen pounds a week each. For impover-ished starry-eyed teenagers, this was a

We were all grammar-school boys from Liverpool, England, with two features in common. We were all wild, very wild, and we lived mainly for the wild music which had grown up in the 1950's under

Talk to the Beatles now and they will claim no more than "We are rock and roll musicians." In 1960 they said exactly the same thing.

I had met the Beatles first in 1959 when I had met the Beates first in 1999 when I was 18 and in the Sixth (top) form at Liverpool Collegiate School. Fate took me one night to the Low hands Cellar Club where George Harrison was plaving guitar with a local group. I became friendly with him and when, in August 1959, my roother said she might open a cellar club in our home, I thought we might do well with ... heat group called the Quarreymen, in which the tousle-haired George Harrison

was now playing. The founds of the Quarreymen was John Lennon-even then a way-out character with short sight and an acid tongue. He was very witty and had a name for writing off-beat poetry and painting ab-struse things which no one else rould understand.

His particular friend was Paul McCart ney, in those days a baby-faced 17, pale and thin, although he had been, on his own admission, a "fat schoolbos." He had long black shining hair which, when he brushed it back, revealed a high, intelli-

Every weekend these Quarreymen piaved in our club during the late, hot summer. In the previous year, 1958, they had been a skiffle group before tempo-rarily splitting up, but now they were rock 'n rollers. I though they were pretty good and so d'd my mother, though the didn't always appreciate the noise we made.

However, the club did well with selling soft drinks and snacks and also through the coffers of the juke box which blasted out American discs.

WATCH NEXT WEEK FOR THE BEATLES 1961 STORY - BY PETE We all had a great time for four months until John Lennon and his Quarreymen decided they would try to make a few shillings a night elsewhere.

They played mainly in the poores juarters of Liverpool, all the time imquarters of Liverpool, all the time im-proving their guitar playing and earning as they learned. Remember that at that time they were purely a guitar group. There was no drummer, though I had Incre was no drummer, though I had a played with them at the Cababa, using an old mare drum my mother had bought me. George was then, as now, lead guitarist. John was already on rhythm and Paul played a sort of second rhythm.

I lost sight of them completely until August, 1960, when out of the blue I had a call. A voice asid, "Petc, this is Paul McCartney. I don't know whether you remember me. I used to play in your Mum's club."

I said I did remember, and Paul went on to explain that they had just finished an engagement in Scotland, backing a rock singer called Johnny Gensle. The group was now called the Silver Beatles, and a club owner named Alan Williams had found them a booking in Hamburg

Did I want to go, Paul asked. If I did Did I want to go, Paul asked. If I did, I would have to audition for the Silver Beatler and Williams in a scruffy cl-b, the Wyvern. I said yes, and that night I got a bus to the Wyvern Club and met John, Paul and George again, plus a new member of the group—a junt-sized I ad called Stuart Sutcliffe. He was an art student who have in believing with Lohe called Stuart Sutcine. He was an art nu-dent who had been in lodgings with John and who had taken up the gutar. I thought he was a nice chap, a bit eccen-tric with a strange detached manner and far-away eyes which he hid behind dark

I sat at the drum kit in the club and did a few numbers with the Silver Beatles. Alan Williams then said, "He's OK, quite good. Do you want him to join "ou?"

"Yeah," said the laconic Silver Beatles "Go home and pack for Hamburg."

The following two nights the other Silver Beatles and I played at Williams' Jacaranda Club in Liverpool. Our fee was twenty-one shillings per man per night.

At the end of the second night, Alan re-

Paid me in more than money by saying.
"You're doing well. You've learned fast.
See you in the morning." The following day the five of us met Alan at his club. He had a small van ready to take us, himself, his wife, and all our instruments and clothes on the land-sea

voyage east, it was a tight squeeze. We headed for the North Sea, to Har-wich and the Hook of Hollandon, the windy edge of Europe. Our spirits were high and the crossing mild. From Holland we passed into Germany, bound for Hamurg's St. Pauli district, a zone of Europe which had become a repository for every human failing and, curiously, a growing center of bear music.

St. Pauli was the most fantastic place 36. Pault was the most fantastic place we had ever seen. It was a blinding blaze of neon signs, and like a thread through the middle was the Reeperbahn, miles of bars, clubs and all-night cafes. In a way, after the dullness of Liverpool's provincial night-life, it was paradise, the living end to five teenagers who oohed and aahed and stared with our mouths open. The Beatles in those days had seen very little of life and even less of the world. They

travel as they were later to become We were five young lads on the thresh old of an adventure.

Our employer in Hamburg was Bruno Koschmeider, a shrewd character who half-smiled a welcome and then outlined half-amiled a wetcome and then outlined our duties. We toc't the news of the long hours with good humor because we didn't care how long we played so long as we enjoyed ourselves.

Willing as we were to rough it, we were shaken up when we saw our rooms. Paul and I shared a terrible one which measured six feet by eight feet and contained two hard and narrow beds. That was all There was nothing on the walls beyond some peeling paint which dropped on our faces as we slept and some rotting pieces of tapestry. The floor was bare except for one small piece of greasy carpeting, there was no co-inet or storage space for our clothing, no running water, and no light either artificial or natural.

John, George and Stuart shared another room which was slightly better than ours in addition to two beds and a couch, there was a neon bulb. You could actually see

These were the accommo Beatles on the first stage of their journey to international fame, a journey which would eventually take them to the finest suites in the most majestic hotels in all the world.

Our first show opened to a rowdy audience of Germans. In Hamburg the police had saled that anyone 18 years of age or under must be home by 10 p.m. By midnight, only the older fans were around. and we realized that we had to be good

play very hard Play hard we did, for eight pounding hours a night with fifteen minutes off every hour We must have looked quite a sight with our long thick hair all over the place, our curious violet and black outfits and those long thin pointed shore. Certainly we made a noise, and the fant

seemed pleased But Koschmeider said there was some thing missing "You must make show," he used to say "Make good show. You must get with it."

So, as we settled in and started to win a following, we decided to make show. At first John was best at this, During cer-At hest John was best at time, soring re-tain numbers he would take off his gustar and run around and around the stage, shouting, jumping, and waving his arms It was startling, but it worked. The audi-ence went mad when the leaping started. and we eventually drew huge crowds into the Indra. The club was packed every night and Koschmeider was making a lot of money because we, the Beatles, were


