Scene - Corner Bourke and Exhibition Streets, Mel-

bourne. Time - About 9.00 - m., Sat

urday night.
Four chaps about 18, dressed in tight fitting check shirt and corduroy coat walk down Bourke Street Another group of guys stand on the corner and jeer at them. The first four stop in their tracks and answer back. An all out brawl starts, punching and kicking. crowd congregates to watch but the fight continues. A police car pulls up, four policemen emerge, break up the fight and take the cul-

prits away. A girl dabs her handker-chief on her boy friend's bleeding forehead. "This is stupid. One day you're going to kill someone."

Ever since the Edwardian era, there have always been two divided teenage cults But since the emergence of the pop world, such as in the middle fifties (the gospei time of Elvis Presley) there have been cults such as the Bodgies and pure Jazz followers, followed in the early 'sixties by the 'Rockers and the Jazzers. Now we have

the Mods and the Sharnies Over the past two months fights have been breaking out nearly every week-end between the Sharpies and the Mods

The Mods despise the Sharpies with their maroon jumpers, flagged trousers, eans and short haircuts, be cause, they allege, Sharpies are always trying to start

On the other hand, Sharpies despise the Mods with their wayout dress, long haircuts, etc. Mods, they

say, look too effeminate. Sharpies claim they are also being victimised by dance promoters who refuse them admittance. "Why shouldn't we be allowed to go in and enjoy ourselves? We are even better dressed than most mods anyway!"

But the owners of disco theques and dances claim they are asking for trouble

if they let the Sharpies in Unlike the cults of the Mods and Sharpies are not divided by their taste in music and generally follow the same music trends which are currently played on the

MODS

A Mod's dress can be defined only loosely. They seem to have a more open mind as far as fashions go and adopt various styles, many taken from English pop and fashion magazines and dress more like Australian pop groups. Mods have

virtually followed on from

This also applies in the case of the Rocker dances, which have now turned into Sharpie dances, and the Rockers into Sharpies.

SHARPIES

A Sharpie's dress tends to be more definite, almost a uniform — short hair, teeshirts, flag jeans, maroon jerseys and this style is one of their own making. Their dances have the same art-ists as those of the Mods. but Sharpies only like the band for their music, not their appearance, and these dances are situated in the out-lying suburbs. Subsequently, when discotheques opened in the city, the Mods were the predominate

patrons.

The Sharpies I spoke to claim that there are two di-vided camps in their group. vided camps in their group.
There are the "Apprentice
Sharpies" of the average of
about 15, and the "True
Sharpies" who range to 20.
The "Apprentice Sharpies"

are the ones who hang around the city looking for trouble and starting fights but if the older Sharpies are ridiculed by the Mods, they will retaliate with their fists There is also another group completely separate from them, who start many fights that the Sharpies are blamed for, and they are called "The

Most people I spoke to who came under the classifi-cation of "Mod", agreed they did not like Sharpies because of the way they dr 3sed and they fear that they would become involved in a fight when they came into contact with them. It is not the Mods' fault that Sharpies are barred from their dances, however they would not like to see Sharpies

attend them, they said The Sharpie's view of a Mod is that they are too efferminate and that they have an unnecessary super for attitude. Many view the Mods as "untidity dressed". One Sharpie's views were: "A lot of people think that we are always the ones who pick the lights, but you should hear the uncalled for comments that are shouted out to us from the Mods We object strongly to being refused admittance to the dances." Another one added an interesting point. "There is a dance run by a church in Sunshine where both Sharpies and Mods are allowed in, and never once has there been a fight."

Judging so far. You's and Sharpies may not be alto-gether to blame for the lights and disturbances and, next week, we will be putting forward the views of the owners of dances and discotheques and the authorities, and if there is one, try to find a solution to the prob



SENSUAL SYMBOLISM IN FOLK SONGS

PETER DICKIE

One fascinating thing about folk music is that a little research can unearth such a wealth of information about the songs.

This article is based on a chapter in James Reeves

'The Everlasting Circle" Everyone has probably heard songs which seem to concerned with flowers or nightingales, or plough ing, reaping and sowing, and wondered why they were significant except for their

Verses like these sequite straightforward until you discover the sexual meanings of flowers, gardens, ploughing, so-reaping and mowing. sowing viously symbolism makes it possible to sing about things which could otherwis. be offensive to people. This symbolism was widely un-derstood, but could be equally well ignored if the listener wished.

Using this "Lingua Franca" sexual adventure is described in terms of sport as in "The Keeper'

Songs dealing with various occupations always seemed concerned with them in terms of love-making rather

than as occupations Sailors are not described at sca, but as "brisk" lovers; soldiers are inconstant lovers rather than fighters and tailors seem to have little time for any work at all! Similarly many of the references to music and musical instru-ments are symbolic, es-pecially the fiddle or rather the action of the bow across the strings.

It is likely that the traditional singer closely as-sociated the pleasure gained from flowers and music with sexual pleasure. Also the aggressive male behavior directly associated with male occupations such as ploughing, reaping, sowing and milling, while the more passive female behavior beomes associated with the feminine occupations of flower and rush (for brooms

and bessoms; gathering. Flower symbolism is par ticularly specific, the different flowers standing for the various female qualities. The rose is "wanten pos-session", the violet "modesty", the pink "courtesy" and the lily "purity" while the yellow usually represents a broken heart or repen tence. The withering and dying or seasonal progression of flowers is also seen in comparison with a young woman's development and hundreds of songs have

By evolving this "Lineur Franca" the traditional singer of the pre-industrial era could give artistic expression to sexual feelings without having to be crude or of-fensive in any way. They also developed some powerful metaphors and imagery which have stayed in the
