Sirs: The "Songsmith Melodies" program was conceived after a long experience in the music business and a knowledge that Southern California abounds in talent in every department of entertainment. Much of the material received at my studio was suitable for big time, the regular flow permitted a fine selection of numbers for weekly broadcast.

With an unheralded start on a secondary station at my own expense, the idea has already shown unlimited possibilities. One of the most gratifying results at the very beginning was the enthusiasm registered by excellent radio artists-more than a score came to me as soon as the news reached them. Out of the list who offered their services I selected eight artists, each possessing an ability to portray his or her type from blues to clasical, from baritone to lyric soprano. These eight include Kathleen Cassady, Jane Winterley, Lou Davis, Kartha Kay, Don Erdman, Barbara Lyman, Ken Cameron and Peggy Goodwin. My staff includes two pianists and combinations for duets and trios.

My clients contribute most of the song material, some of which is acceptable upon receipt and some consisting solely of lyrics or melody. Perfection of all manuscripts used is accomplished by my staff and myself in sincere cooperation on the amateur compositions. It is a real job and that is why comment from your source is so acceptable.

The ever increasing circle of listeners is known through our policy of inviting votes by mail or post card. Each composer urges all friends to listen and vote, then listen again to learn the winner. This forms the basis of appeal to a sponsor and the effort of the entire staff is bent in that direction. Any advertiser should visualize the possibilities of increased sales, especially when the audience proves a willingness to go out of their way to cast a vote. Imagine a voting medium secured only in a package of frequent use.

Art Baker

O^N an afternoon in September, 1938, at approximately 3 o'clock, Pacific time, a man sat before a microphone. Before him were a few notes. With a nod from the control room, the announcer walked up to the microphone, and said, "Ladies and Gentlemen—your Ambassador of Good Will." The man took a deep breath. In a voice now known to thousands, he said: "Thank you for inviting me in." Art Baker's "Notebook" was underway. A few days later, fan mail started coming in. A new program "bull's-eyed." Chief characteristics of Art Baker are sincerity and being himself.

Known to radio followers as Art Baker, "the Gentleman from Indiana," he makes his home in Glendale, Calif., is proud of his town. His roots have sunk deep in the city of his choice. Through the worldrenowned "Forest Lawn Memorial Park," where he lectured daily before the "Last Supper window," he made his initial step into radio as master of ceremonies on a broadcast sponsored by them. Today? Well, listen in for yourself. I think you'll agree that he is definitely "on the air." On Monday nights, his "Pull Over Neighbor" show takes the contestants on



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mythical trips with Polly Penn motor oil. It is statewide and at present is broadcast from the famous Ambassador hotel on Wilshire boulevard. The most fun on the program is during the singing class. At least it's fun from the audience standpoint.

He has had the honor of being chosen announcer for the "Pot of Gold," "Hedda Hopper's Hollywood News" and many others. However, his Notebook program is one of the best known to WESTERN listeners. In this, he combines poems and stories and good sense. His advertising is not hard to hear for he doesn't go in for high pressure. In fact, he takes only sponsors that he, himself, believes in—and in this way, he is genuinely sincere.

Because of his versatility, he has been chosen song leader for many city and statewide Rotary conventions. Recently he was narrator for the civic motion picture "Glendale on Parade." He is at home on any stage, and the audience, no matter how sedate it may be, responds to his enthusiasm as a duck does to water.

His family? They are All American. Mrs. Baker is wife, mother and secretary. His son is a graduate of Stanford university. His eldest daughter was recently married, and his two younger daughters —Jean and Diane—are already quite. grown up. He says he must get his abundant energy from his mother, who, until recently when she came to Glendale to live, was a prominent resident of Mishawaka, Ind. All of them are excited over his climb in radio.

For his leisure, he rather favors bowling, and a copy of **O**. Henry sets him at ease. He says that he always enjoys good music, oldies preferred. Aside from the swingsters,—don't we all?

He is the kind of person you would "like to know" and if I don't miss my guess, he will be known throughout the country in less than a year.

Barbour Conscripts

Are you a married or single man with dependents wondering what exemptions are provided for you under the terms of the Conscription act?

This week worried male citizens were getting answers clarifying their particular problem by listening to NBC's One Man's Family.

Sunday, Carlton E. Morse, author of the famous family saga, will conduct weekly discussions of a draft measure unprecedented in America's history.

No dry, long-winded speeches dressed in legal terminology will be made. Members of the Barbour family will talk about the draft, how it will affect them in simple, every-day English, and thus affect millions of coastal families.

The draft, Morse feels, is something every family in America is talking about, will be talking about until actual registration of all men between the ages of 21 and 35 begins Oct. 16. Because the Barbour family of radio typifies the American family group, Morse feels they are as vitally concerned as any other family. In their radio characters, the Barbours are.

Three of the Barbour men are subject to registration, although the fact that each has dependents may exempt them from actual draft for military service. The three, Cliff and Jack Barbour and Capt. Nickey Lacey, husband of Claudia. Their exemptions formed basis of Morse's first draft week ago, will form basis for discussions on each consecutive Sunday, until the Barbours go to polling places to register on Oct. 16.

Kay Kyser, the old professor of the NBC College of Musical Knowledge, is a big man now. He conducts one of the most popular radio programs in America. He is being starred in his second picture in a year, RKO's "You'll Find Out." Movie stars feel honored to go on his Wednesday broadcasts. Next night (Sept. 25) for example, Pete Lorre, Boris Karloff, and Bela Lugosi are coming over to give the college its first "bogey man night." There isn't a dance hall in the world that wouldn't be honored to book Kay and his band, even for a night. So, with all that, it's hard to realize that there was a time in Kay's career when he was a man so little that he couldn't even get name booking. There was the time, for example, when Kyser and his band of boys from the south got their first booking north of the Mason-Dixon line. It was in a town in Pennsylvania. When the boys arrived the town was plastered with banners advertising a sensational band named "The Pennsylvanians." A worried Kyser

called on the manager, "What's the matter?" he asked, "weren't we supposed to play here?"

"You are going to play here," the manager reassured him.

"Then whats all this about the Pennsylvanians?" Kyser asked.

"Oh, that," laughed the manager. "We had to print signs before we knew what band we were going to have, so we just used the name of Pennsylvanians." Los Angeles Quiz

Heeding successes of nationally broadcast children's quiz programs Los Angeles city and county schools last fortnight ended experiments with a new type of quiz program, brought on air Oct. 3 over KECA at 8 p. m., interesting new offering featured by infant intellectuals from grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 of schools, city and county.

İdea originator is Janies Samuel Lacy, Dayton Heights school principal, who down-earthily calls the program "School Kids Quiz."

Of his program Principal Lacy this

week made following statement to in₇ terested parents:

"There will be no child prodigies on this series. Each boy and girl will be chosen at random from some school in this area (Los Angeles city and county). Questions will be designed not to 'show off' the mental brilliance of the student, but arranged to illustrate learning they have achieved in regular course of study."

Teachers and principals in city and county schools have been passing out application blanks for past two weeks. Participants are chosen from schools by lot, arrangements made for each school to be represented during program's course.

Prizes, valued at \$264, consist of a set of 19-volume World Book encyclopedia for boy and girl winners each week. Other prizes: two-volume sets of New Century dictionary.

Police Warning

Death, twisting the wheels of motors, clutching the hands of the walking aged, grinning behind the irresponsible laughter-making child, claims many a hundred victim annually in cities as great as Los Angeles.

In Los Angeles a traffic-fatality-conscious police department is vociferous and rational in its attack on traffic deaths. By radio and printed medium Los Angeles' police department impinges grim reminders on the harried consciousness of the city's dwellers.

This week the department presented to citizens a terse three-question quiz, gave many a pause and resolve to be careful. Queried the police:

What is a pedestricide?

Answered police: A pedestricide is a kind of suicide which is limited to pedestrians. It means crossing the street in the middle of the block or against the red light, crossing diagonally, or some other kind of jaywalking.

Why does a pedestrian do these things?

Because he thinks it saves time. Does it?

You can answer that one yourself. The Collision Prevention bureau of the 'Los Angeles police department tells us that 288 pedestrians were killed in Los Angeles traffic last year. They tried to save a minute, and lost a lifetime. Did they gain anything?

Concertina

Ivan Ditmars, organist on Jean Hersholt's Wednesday CBS program, "Dr. Christian," has enough material to write a book titled "Decline and Fall of the Concertina Player." Ivan, prior to a "Dr. Christian" broadcast last week, took over job of finding someone to play a concertina for background music. He looked high. He looked low. No concertina player. Lots of oboe players. Lots of violinists. He even found men who could make music on a lyre, and musical saw--but not a concertina. Desperate, Ivan finally solved the problem--he hired an accordion expert, had him replace his accordion

* * * Stamp Troubles

Stamp collecting "DXers" living in remote parts of world, who for years have used NBC's international division as an unofficial clearing house for prize items, are finding their activities curtailed by war.

British censors during past month have been abstracting all stamps enclosed in NBC's fan mail from abroad, substituting therefor little note reading:

During the period censorship is in force, it is not considered desirable that used or unused postage stamps should be enclosed in correspondence addressed to or from neutral countries, and any such items that come to notice are liable to be intercepted and dealt with under Section 3, Part II of the Defense Regulations, 1939, without further notice." Like trickles of fresh water into sluggish pool has been slow but steady stream of music and lyrics submitted by American unknown hopefuls to Broadcast Music Incorporated, music clearing house set up by major networks to take over task of supplying radio music from 1941 on, upon ending of American Society of Composers and Publishers agreements with networks.

Virtually speaking for nation's most important radio broadcasting systems was this week Harrison Holliway, general manager of Earle C. Anthony (motor cars) radio division.

Said Holliway:

"We held out until we made certain that BMI was going to click. We now are convinced that BMI is going to be a new and adequate source of music supply."

Although the present ASCAP contract runs until the end of the year, KFI plans to begin using BMI and Public Domain music exclusively Nov. 1. This is fo routine the music library and prevent confusion when the change-over is effective on the first of the year.

"We are currently using less than 50 per cent ASCAP music," said Holliway, "with no noticeable change in complexion of programs."

Significant, Holliway said, was that Earle C. Anthony was first radio operator to sign with ASCAP, 17 years ago.

KECA, the second Anthony station, signed with BMI approximately five months ago, has been using the new tunes since.

* * * Fighting Air

Everybody loves a fight, particularly when they don't have to weather the blows personally.

On that premise, NBC and Adam Hats have been bringing millions of listeners ringside versions of title bouts. They will continue to do so during the fall and winter when champions in virtually every division will battle to retain their crowns.

Last year a Crosley survey gave NBC's Blue network the highest listener rating ever obtained by a single network for a single program, fixing the listening audience for the Louis-Galento fight at 53.1 per cent.

The ringside duo of Sam Taub and Bill Stern will take to the air with 18 bouts during the fall and winter series. Coming up is the Steve Belloise-Ken Overlin middleweight championship fight on Nov. 1.

Sam Taub, who has been keeping tabs on the boxing gentry since the days of Terry McGovern and Bob Fitzsimmons, estimates he. has announced over 7000 bouts, from preliminaries to championship events.

His blow-by-blow narrating, plus Bill Stern's colorful between-rounds chatter, has built up a tremendous radio audience since Adam Hats, three years ago, bought exclusive broadcasting privileges for fights staged by Promoter Mike Jacobs and the Twentieth Century Sporting club.

Since sponsoring fights, Adam Hats corporation has grown from 275 stores and agencies in metropolitan New York to over 4000 in the United States, Canada and Mexico. Prior to expanding its business to South America, the hat chain has short-waved the fights south of the equator, with Eli "Buck" Canel doing the description in Spanish.

On the subject of the fights to be aired during the ensuing season, Promoter Mike Jacobs has this to say:

"The Twentieth Century Sporting club, in cooperation with Madison Square Garden and Adam Hats, looks forward to a season of outstanding fight attractions, and is exceedingly happy to make them available to millions of fans through the medium of the National Broadcasting company. We are confident that those boxing enthusiasts who are unable to attend the battle will find themselves expertly represented at the ringside through the blow-by-blow accounts of Bill Stern, Sam Taub and Eli Canel."

Believe It, or Not!



"Believe It or Not," but Bob Ripley who broadcasts his programs of the unnaual over CBS every Friday, flunked geography several times in grammar and high school. He's made up for it since. Today Ripley is a fellow of the Royai Geographic Society and Royai Societies of England, as well as the American Geographical and National Geographic Societies of this country. Just to complete the record, he has journeyed over 585,000 miles through 201 countries and is a member of the Adventurers, Explorers, Friars, Lotos, Circumnavigators and New York Athletic Clubs. But he still doesn't like geography.

National Defense

President Roosevelt last week asked Wythe Williams, KHJ-Mutual-Don Lee broadcasting system news analyst, to submit a design for a radio program publicizing national defense.

Of the program's nature Williams said, "The proposed show will be an official radio program consisting of interpretations by well-known news commentators on the national defense reports of different government departments."

The noted foreign correspondent said program would be a half-hour long, probably would be heard Sunday nights. Plan is to rotate broadcasts on three networks, each broadcasting company devoting a half-hour every third week.

Said Williams further: "A complete design for the show will be in the president's hands by the end of this week or beginning of next. I have been conferring with government officials concerning the program for about a month. I saw President Roosevelt at Hyde Park three weeks ago and again in Washington last fortnight."

Plan contemplates a round-table with several commentators. Each news analyst will explain and interpret separate government reports on national defense prepared by a department of the administration.

None Had Franklin

Last week Radio Life staff workers were first mildly interested, then amazed and finally downright "consternated."

Letters had been coming in on one theme, directed to Gag of Week editor. Separated from other communications these letters piled up respectable total of 84 in two days. But, more than amazed were staff workers at expression of reader-listeners' choice of a funny gag for the week.

The gag: On "Take It Or Leave It" program.

Question: How many children has President Roosevelt had?

Contestant answering: "His wife had five but he didn't have any."

Scouting for reasons for letter response to this obvious biological logic, Radio Life reporters at end week confessed themselves stumped, started after reader-listeners, finally came up with consensus of reasons why 84 persons wrote a gag letter on the Roosevelt child query.

Consensus: It was not the trick question that amused them. It was the blushing candor of the contestant recalling to an embarrassed Quiz conductor the exclusive biological function that is womanhood's.

Responses also worried editors, for reason selection of broadcast and tour ticket winners became 84-fold difficult.

* * * Let's Pretend

More than difficult ordinarily is to pran and produce a program which has for parents the same holding appeal as it has for children.

During past season from KNX (CBS) "Let's Pretend" directed by Nila Mack, hurdled this difficulty neatly by acting out fairy stories for children but done so agreeably and nearly professionally that it had, many guessed, as many elders as youngsters ear-tuned.

Shift in programs as result of switch of western broadcast times has put "Let's Pretend" in status of dubiety. Having come from KNX at 9:30 a. m. during past season, program now may not be heard in west at all, for reason: KNX will have a 10 to 10:30 program called "Saturday Morning Party" variety gettogether of talented children, and hesitates to run in such close proximity two children's programs. Last week network officials, ears to ground, were trying to decide western problem—to air or not to air "Let's Pretend."

Texaco's Star Shrine Fred Allen's Dad was Blacksmith-But He's Jeweler of Jokes

FRED ALLEN, star of Columbia net-work's 1940 "Texaco Star Theater," (Wednesdays, 9 p. m., KNX) will tell you with pride that his grandfather was a New England blacksmith.

He doesn't remember whether the paternal ancestor worked under a spreading tree, like Longfellow's hero. "It's safe, though, to bet that if there

had been any radio comedians in those days, the chestnuts would have been over his head," Mr. Allen ventures.

That's the way the Fred Allen mind works. Even in the most casual conversation-and with the same desd-pan expression.

On his most recent arrival at New York municipal airport after a transcontinental trip from Hollywood, he was greeted by a throng of photographers. It was: Can we have a picture for the press? Can we have a picture for the trade papers? Can we have a story for this? An interview for such-and-such?

Fred good-naturedly smiled, frowned, stood up, sat down, posed with pretty girls, brandished Indian spears.

Finally a CBS man held a Columbia microphone up to Fred for another picture . . .

"Isn't there somebody here from Sears-Roebuck?" demanded Fred.

You can't hold the guy down.

Now, taking a pun-poking pixie disposition such as Allen's and adding the mastery of wit that comes from years of trial and error—one sooner or later real-izes why the star of the "Texaco Star Theater" has been hailed as America's leading humorist.

For Fred has a quadruple course of applied fun psychology to his credit. He was a headliner in vaudeville when twoa-day was tops. He was a Broadway musical comedy and revue star when Broadway was a street of theaters instead of an arcade for soft drink stands and flea circuses.

The Allen antics in the movies are things the fans remember long after the glamor girls have become grandmothers.

And in radio, Wednesday night is the night people postpone bridge games, weddings and walking the dog to listen to their favorite comedian. (Fred, beginning Oct. 2, will be heard over Columbia network from 9 to 10 p. m., PST).

His millions of fans are a tribute to Fred Allen.

But more than anything else they are a tribute to the care and precise treatment he gives his natural wit.

Being funny is not just telling a joke. Fred will tell you it all depends on the audience . . . and there is the earmark of intensive training in that toughest of tough schools-vaudeville.

In show business, he will tell you, "a comedian would make a joke. get his laugh and stand stock still waiting for the chuckle to die. This, of course, was ancient theater.

"In following years, actors learned to turn away from their audience, walk away and play with their cuffs after the laugh started. These were the 'cuff actors.

"Still later came the technique of sustaining the laugh. Comedians learned to 'build' a laugh so that it was divided into several parts—the climax of each part 'topping' the preceding one.

"In the newspapers some time ago was the story of an aviator at a local alrport who went aloft with a seaplane full of passengers.

"Attempting to land, he noticed several people on the field frantically waving to Suddenly he remembered that he him. was flying a seaplane and he quickly headed for water, landing the plane where it belonged. When the motors had stopped he turned to the passengers and chuckled: 'Imagine me doing a darnfool thing like that-trying to land a seaplane on a field?

"And, still chuckling, he opened the door of the plane and stepped out into 30 feet of water."

One of Fred's vaudeville routines was a comedy undertaker act.

"As I made my entrance," he relates, "I would sing, 'The Electric Chair Was Ready, a Prisoner Was to Die.' Nobody will believe it now, but audiences used to laugh at that. Not a big hearty laugh, but an encouraging and fairly audible

smile. As soon as the smile started I would curl up my fingers like claws, whereupon the smile became a chuckle. As soon as I heard the chuckle I would gaze out among them and say, 'You better hold the children 'cause I'll scare the Hell out of them.' Then if I was lucky, the chuckle would become a guffaw. Then I'd go into my dance."

That, good people, was vaudeville.

Movies, Fred tells you, had him completely buffaloed after the show-business school of wowing the public. The first tussle came with director Roy del Ruth in Fred's "Thanks a Million" debut.

Radio audiences seem to be quicker on the uptake, in the matter of catching the siniles, chuckles and guffaws.

"They're quick enough," Fred says, "to recognize a new joke. And when they recognize an old joke in new cloth, they treat him like an old friend—but they give you credit for putting a new suit of clothes on him.

"The best jokes are physical jokes," Fred opincs. "Like the story of the policeman who couldn't spell Lexington avenue when reporting a dead horse. So he dragged the animal over to Third avenue. The joke is just as good when told about an automobile, or about an airplane dropping near Beluchistan.

Fred Allen will explain all these things with a note of modest offhandedness like Rembrandt saying, "Oh, I just used a brush and some paint."

But there is eloquent testimony to establish Fred's standing as America's outstanding master of the mot 'bon.'

When the late Will Rogers was killed in a plane crash, a national syndicate immediately asked Fred Allen to continue the "same type of column." Fred replied that he believed Rogers'

MORT LEWIS, producer and author of "Behind the Mike," evidently is the first person to realize that the public is interested in the mechanics of radio. I have never been able to understand why the background material of brondcasting has thus far been ignored; how a show is put on the air, who its actors really are and how they came to be before a listening audience, what techniques of sound, music and production are, and so forth.

Now, at last, comes a show which aims to tell the listener what goes on behind his radio dial. As should be the case on such a presentation, the program is rapidly paced, well directed, and capably acted. It is casual and informal, and should have an immediate listening following.

Mr. Lewis, of course. has the cooperation of the entire NBC organization in New York and he has done a swell job with his material. But inasmuch as this is the first show of its kind to go on the air, there are many possibilities which he has not touched as yet.

The September 22 show (the second of the series) gave its audience a potpourri of broadcasting, from a man who makes animal noises for a living to a stamp expert who became involved in a spy ring. It told the story of radio's effect on the personal life of two listeners: a man who won the "Pot o' Gold" and a woman who put her family back together again because of a serial show.

But though these spots and the others not mentioned were interesting, presented well, and abetted by an excellent musical background, the real, basic stories of broadcasting were not touched What one heard were tales which anyone might read in fan magazines, or hear on "We, the People." They did not, to my mind, penetrate far enough into the mechanics of the industry.

The listener, I believe, wants to know how a program is rehearsed, how a line must be said in order to be effective, who the persons are who create the roles one hears daily on dramatic programs. In other words, he is interested in the batter and not the frosting of the industrial cake.

And these basic elements of radio can be presented to the listener as powerfully as th froth. They, too, can be dramatized. Continuity can be written for the men and women who are involved which will hold an audience. There is no need of heing dull or heavy. If heaviness is feared, the realistic stories can be used in conjunction with the "human interest" yarns.

For getting such a show on the air, my best Sunday hat is off to Mort Lewis. I believe that he will utilize the tremendous opportunity which NBC has given him, and serve the public a show which is unique in all broadcasting. I shall be much interested in seeing the direction of the future programs; whether he is going to continue to skim the commercial surface or whether he will dig into the unlimited and endlessly fascingting foundations of the industry.

Is Daylight Saved? A Radio Expert Here Presents Both Sides of a Question That Engrosses Many

By VAN C. NEWKIRK

THAT popular tune, "Time on My Hands," may be the familiar refrain of many Californians next summer because daylight saving is Proposition No. 5 on the ballot to be submitted at the

general elections, Tuesday, Nov. 5. The Initiative Act provides daylight saving time as standard time in California between the last Sunday in April and the last Sunday in September annually. It designates daylight saving time as one hour in advance of standard Pacific time.

Radio itself has issued no official statement on the matter, although changing of time in New York each summer throws west coast log schedules into confusion during the changeover periods.

Arguments in favor of Initiative Proposition No. 5 say that daylight saving for more than one-third of the people in the United States has:

- Provided the average citizen with sunlight for his leisure hours.
 Increased general health.
 Created time for amuscments and recreation. Increased business.
- Helped the working man and wo-
- man. Increased industrial efficiency. Reduced industrial and traffic accdents.

California has a maximum of two hours of daylight between 5:30 and sundown

in summer. Daylight saving will augment this to three hours, providing the working Californian with an extra hour of sunlight after he leaves his office, factory or shop.

California needs daylight saving even more than the eastern and northern states that have already adopted it. Summer evenings are an hour shorter here than in northern latitudes. Store, office, and factory workers, leaving their place of employment normally at 5:30, have only two hours of daylight for such favorite outdoor recreations as sports, motoring or gardening. The famed California sunshine is thus, fully available only to the leisured few. Daylight saving would give a fair share of it to the persons whose birthright it is; the working population of the state; the citizens; the taxpayers.

Daylight saving is not an experiment. It has been thoroughly tried out over nearly a quarter of a century. At present, nearly 50 million persons (more than one-third the population of the country) live under daylight saving provisions every summer. Its success in actual practice has led to its steady expansion at the rate of 15 per cent annually the last few years. States that have adopted daylight saving or where it is observed practically by every city and village (New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island), and cities

of Maine, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Illinois, Indiana, Delaware, Georgia, and Idaho-are overwhelmingly in favor of its retention and continuation. Every large city in the east has it. New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit, are among the many large metropolitan centers enjoying the extra hour of sunshine each summer. Ohio and Michigan have adopted daylight saving the year around.

Employers as well as workers favor dalight saving. Shift of the greater part of the working day to the cool hours has made for greater efficiency among workers, better health, less accidents, better returns, increased efficiency.

 $O^{\rm N}$ the other hand, those against Initiative Proposition No. 5 say that daylight saving was submitted to the voters in 1930 and was overwhelmingly defeated in every county, and that the legislature five times voted it down. Those against it state further:

There is no such thing as "daylight saving." There are only 24 hours in each day, and to say that you can add an hour is absurd. All it does is to compel you to get up one hour earlier. Daylight can not be saved like money. If California adopts "daylight saving" it will be out of step with over 97 per cent of the area

in our country. There is no "daylight saving" law west of the Missisippi. Nevada, Washington and Colorado have defeated "daylight saving" recently.

Labor is opposed to "daylight saving" because it forces laboring people to begin an hour earlier in the morning; and it reduces the pay roll of the state.

The farmer is opposed to "daylight saving." It is a blow to his well-being. He and the befored to obey a "daylight saving" law he will find everything is working against him. While the dew is on the grass he must wait until the sun dries his fields before he and his men can begin their daily work. His cows know nothing of "daylight saving" and give milk by nature's laws. Delivery of milk and farm products would be demoralized.

The housewife is opposed to "daylight saving." The feeding schedule of her chilwould become disarranged; she dren would have to send her children to school and church an hour earlier; she would be compelled to labor hardest in the hottest hours of the day; and to put her children

to bed while the sun is still shining. The railroads are opposed to "day-light saving." Railroads never change from standard time.

Restaurants and hotel men are opposed to "daylight saving." The confusion would demoralize any attempt to accommodate tourists arriving on standard time.

Catholic, Protestant and Jewish churches are opposed to "daylight saving" because earlier hours of attendance interferes with both morning and evening services.

The motion picture industry is opposed to "daylight saving" because it collects its revenue from theaters, and statistics show that "daylight saving" reduces the revenue of theaters from 20 per cent to 35 per cent.

California has progressed faster than any other state in the Union without "daylight saving." Then why change?

FIRST and Last—That's where BISQUE stands in the realm of foods. It is the name of a rich, creamy, shellfish soup, and the name of an ice



cream served with nuts, cake, macaroons or marshmallows. Outside of foods, in case you a re interested, it's short for biscuitware, a material used in making dolls and statuettes, and it also does duty as the name of a point in the

game of lawn-tennis.

Under the Good Aspects of Jupiter-That symbol-an R with a tail on itthat doctors use on prescriptions; have you ever wondered what it means? I'll tell you: The tail on the R stands for Jupiter, sort of asking him to make everything turn out all right, while the R itself stands for recipe, the same idea of a recipe as the kind you use in the kitchen. But hold on! We're not through! What's the first word in a recipe, culinary or otherwise? It's "take," isn't it? "TAKE a cupful of this . . ." "TAKE a teaspoon of that . . ." All right then, that's where the word recipe comes from; from the first word. Recipe is Latin for "take."

Food Psychology or Something-I tried this out on a friend of mine the other day and if you have nothing better to do hefore adjourning to the living room after dinner, you may find it amusing during the last few minutes at the table. Reel off some names of foods and have a subject tell you what kind of life or people they suggest to him. The results I got were these: stew, a truck driver; caviar, an aristocrat; hot dogs, baseball fans; steaks, well-fed people; salad, lady trying to reduce; omelet, a late Sunday morning breakfast; soup, winter days; potatoes, a farmer; cheese, midnight snacks. Tele-visually Speaking By JERRY COLEY

FLASH: Dr. Lee DeForest and U. A. Sanabria, two of television's outstanding inventors, have just been appointed to serve on the FCC National Television systems committee. This committee was formed for the purpose of ironing out all controversial claims made by the various manufacturers as to the greater efficiency of their engineers' ideas on picture lines. The committee consists of radio manufacturers, telecasting stations and engineers whose research in the television art will aid towards the perfection of transmitting pictures via the airlanes.

For the past several months radio manufacturers and television transmitting stations have been clamoring for commercialization of television programs. But the FCC has consistently denied its approval because of the fact that everyone concerned with the television industry was at loggerheads, claiming his own system was the best.

After many months of wrangling, it was finally decided to place all systems before a group of experts in their respective fields for their consideration and recommendations. Many things will have to be considered to determine the standard picture line. Too many lines will make it necessary to use extra parts and tubes at the expense of John Q. Public. However, it is expected that a decision will be arrived at not later than Dec. 15 so that commercialization of television may even receive the blessings of the FCC before the end of this year.

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With National Defense in the headlines it may be reported that the Television Torpedo invented by U. A. Sanabria, recently reported in this column, is now being tested by high army flight engineers at Wright field, Dayton, Ohio.

The Television Torpedo is a robot plane which is released from a "mother plane" just as is a bomb from under the fuselage of a bomber. It is controlled by radio from land or ship station, where an operator has pictured before him what is viewed by the television "eye" or iconoscope in the nose of the Television Torpedo. By this means enemy ships and aircraft can be brought into view of the operator at some remote point. He can, in turn, then direct the Torpedo to the enemy object via radio. When the Torpedo hits the objective it explodes and is immediately destroyed.

The fact that the total cost of these Torpedo planes will not be more than \$600 is a feature that the army engineers believe will make this weapon one of the most effective and inexpensive deathdealing devices ever perfected.

Raids Over Britain

How Do People React to the Crash of Bombs in Homes and Streets? A CBS Correspondent Tells

"THIS-IS LONDON-"

These three words flashed across the Atlantic are the signal for millions in this country and Canada to stand by and listen. They are usually uttered by Edward R. Murrow, Columbia Broadcasting System's chief European correspondent, whose forthright broadcasts of war developments in Britain are heard just before dinner and sometimes on the CBS round-up at breakfast time.

Through his calm narration of stern incidents and colorful descriptions of scenes or appealing human interest angles, Murrow has won widespread admiration among radio listeners. His accounts of furious dog-fights in the sky may be followed by neatly-worded sketches of the lighter side of life on the besieged island. Murrow, and also his assistants, will tincture a dramatic account of bombed areas with a facetious remark from a London bobby or caustic comment from a farmer, standing in the doorway of his thatched cottage.

In the few minutes at his disposal, Murrow succeeds in giving well-rounded information. He not only avoids triteness, but also steers clear of the staccato or skeleton style. He tells his story in the same natural tones whether he is standing in the heart of London in the early morning hours during the screaning of an air-raid warning or is describing a cricket-match in the afternoon.

With the help of his colleagues, Murrow has presented several outstanding broadcasts from important points in Britain. There was the recent "London After Dark," in which, among others, J. B. Priestly, the Yorkshire novelist and playwright, and Vincent Sheean, war correspondent and author, played parts.

In "London After Dark," Murrow, as the first speaker in the drama of real life, varied his introduction by saying, "This—is Trafalgar Square—." He was standing on the steps of the church, "St. Martins-in-the-Fields." But read what he had to say:

"A searchlight has just burst into action off in the distance, an immense single beam sweeping the sky above me. We are at the entrance of an air-raid shelter and I must move a cable a bit so people don't trip over it. Straight in front of me is Lord Nelson on top of that big column. There's a yellow searchlight just square behind Nelson's statue. Listen to the traffic. . . A man very casually stops in front of me to light a cigarette and here comes one of the big red busses, with a few lights on the top deck. In this blackness it looks very much like a ship passing in the night. . . I'll just stoop down in the darkness here and see if I can pick up the sound of people's feet. They're the strangest sounds in London these days-or rather nights-just footsteps walking along the pavement that sound like ghosts shod with steel shoes. . . . A taxi draws up in front of me and stops, waiting for the red light to change to green, while the sirens lull. Those searchlights are in action; we've not yet seen any burst of anti-aircraft fire overhead. Of course, this does not necessarily mean that there are planes over London at this moment. You can hear the sirens dying away in the distance now. . . ."

On another occasion recently, after describing one of the most savage German air-raids and telling of the sinking of a 7,000-ton transport with a loss of 120 men, Murrow told of England at play:

"Those who can, go out into the country where sometimes the sun shines. I drove off around Windsor this (Sunday) afternoon. That stretch of the river Thames helow the big castle on the hill was crowded with canoes, punts and small sailing craft. People were swimming and others lying in the meadows. There was a pleasant ground area, crisscrossed with ditches and dotted with ten-foot wooden posts to prevent enemy planes from using it as a landing field. Hundreds of cars lined the river bank and there must have been thousands of bicycles. At Eton (the great English school) a cricket match was being played by boys in white flannels on a field that looked like an enormous putting green.

"In a vacant lot nearby, a squadron of home guards in civilian clothes took turns stabbing bayonets into a sack of straw. They were in their shirt-sleeves and their faces were serious and determined.

"Almost in the shadow of Windsor Castle, there were wheat and oat shocks standing in close order on a carpet of yellow stubble. The yield would not in any way compare with that of Minnesota or Eastern Washington, but it's a good crop anyway. Six small boys were sliding down a straw stack and I wanted to join them. A squadron of Spitfires came curling across the sky and one lone Wellington bomber came glowering on its way. There were a few soldiers in the small villages, but the war seemed far away. At teatime we stopped at an old inn, one built in Queen Elizabeth's day. It was crowded. Tea for two included sandwiches, bread and butter and pastry. It cost about one dollar. Not much more than the charge of a year ago.

"Coming home, the road was crowded, mostly with bicycles, many of them tandem affairs with a small child in the sidecar. Occasionally a staff car roared by, but most of us drove at 30 miles an hour, for you get more mileage out of your gasoline at that speed."

After an expedition into a bombed area, Murrow gave the following impression:

"It is indeed surprising the little damage a homb will do, unless, of course, it scores a direct hit. But I found that one bombed house looks pretty much like another bombed house. It's about the people I'd like to talk, the little people who live in those little houses and have no uniform and get no decoration for bravery. Those men whose only uniform was a tin hat were digging unexploded bombs out of the ground this afternoon. There were two women who gossiped across the narrow strip of tired brown grass separating their two houses. A little man smoking a pipe walked up and looked at a bombed house. Said he, 'One fell there, all right, all right! Those people were calm and courageous. About an hour after the all-clear had sounded, people were sitting in deck chairs on their lawns, reading the newspapers. Girls in light cheap dresses strolled along the streets. There was no bravado, no loud voices, only a quiet acceptance of the situation. To me these people are incredibly brave and calm-they are the unknown heroes of this war."

A policeman showed Murrow a German machine-gun bullet he had just picked up. The policeman said, "I was all of a tremble. Look at my hand. It's still shaking." Murrow said that the Bobby's hand was firm as a rock.

Murrow noted in another talk that the music critic of the London Times said that the "air-raid sirens in B-flat added an obbligato to the Nocturne of Borodin's string quartet at the National Gallery last night. The extraneous disharmony sent the audience to the place prepared below."

Even fashions—women's fashions — do not escape Murrow's attention. He discovered that one of the best known fashion experts in London predicted that women soon will be wearing blue or green or yellow stockings to match the colors of their autumn suits. He adds that feminine attire is expected to be "practical and gay"—there is a McIntosh cape that can be blown up to form a mattress and a pillow combined. Velvet collars and cuffs take the place of fur, and bright imitation jewelry will replace the family jewels now in the bank vault.

"We have already had our breakfast air-raid warning. The doorman of my house remarked, 'Them strangers is over again.' . . . Eric Sevareid (another CBS correspondent), who took a room down in the Thames Estuary Hotel last night, says that he ought not to have been charged for the bed, because he spent most of the night in an air-raid shelter. The routine of living and working in Britain under air-raid conditions is gradually changing. Beds are moved to basements or lower floors. Many office buildings and factories maintain their own watchers and send their employes underground only when planes or gunfire are reported in the immediate vicinity. When there is a lunch-time raid, some restaurants close their doors, but athers carry on as usual.

"A revision of the whole system of air-raid warning probably will be an-

nounced soon. Originally the siren was supposed to be the instruction for everyone, whatever he was doing, to take cover. In the future it will be probably considered more in the nature of an alert signal, warning people to be ready to dive for cover when the guns or planes are heard. A few London shops invite their customers down to the basement shelters, where they display such things as books, games, knitting needles, wool, etc. Business down there in the basement is said to be rather good. . . . I think probably our housemaid expressed today what is perhaps the average reaction to those frequent air-raid alarms in London. She said, 'I don't mind them so much any more; I think I'm getting used to them, but they do make you feel very tired the next day.""

STRUGGLING cartoonist, a smalltime radio comedy team, and a patient and far-sighted sponsor started the Fibber McGee and Molly broadcast.

Fifteen years ago Jim and Marian were considered "washed up" vaudevillians. They entered radio in Chicago on a \$10 dare as a song and piano tean, and managed to make a living on a daytime serial strip. They met Don Quinn, a cartoonist who gagged better than he drew and who wrote a skit called "Smack Out." In this Jim ran a grocery that was always "smack out" of everything but the proprietor's tall stories. The program earned the three of them \$125 a week.

There were deep misgivings around the Jordan home when Louis J. Johnson, Chicago advertising executive representing Johnson's Wax, came along with the Fibber McGee idea in 1935. Fibber was to be a comedian telling wild yarns. They were nervous about the idea, but the salary was \$250 a week-too good to turn down.

Files of the Burlington Liars' club were gathered for the new show's material. Auditions were heard, but the show was After one of them, Quinn com-"fizzle." mented he could make up better lies than that. The task fell to him.

The show went to New York's Rockefeller Center for its debut. Results were terrible. Critics booed; audiences turned their dials. The only optimist was Louis, who was determined to make the show go.

Gradually the format was changed. The lies gradually disappeared. Molly's gusto became the main support of the program. And the broadcast's popularity began to build.

Several characters on the show are as well known as Fibber and Molly. Isabel Randolph plays the part of "Abigail Uppington"- a low-born damsel with high-falutin' ideas. Bill Thompson, as "The Oldtimer," is renowned for his famous topper to Fibber's gags, "That's pretty good, Johnny, but that ain't the way I heerd it." He also does the characters Mr. Depopolis (a restaurateur) and Horation K. Boomer, who acts and sounds like W. C. Fields. Hal Peary is responsible for the lusty laugh of Throckmorton Gildersleeve, Fibber's next door neighbor.

With perhaps the exception of the White House, no address is now so familiar to American households as 79 Wistful Vista, mythical home of

Fibber McGee and Molly. Molly's terse retort to Fibber's jokes, "Tain't funny, McGee," is a byword among radio listeners.

On the air Fibber is always Fibber, but Molly plays many characters-Grandma, frustrated Mrs. Wearybottom, Teeny, a neighboring child, Giggling Gertie, and of course her own role-as Fibber's loving spouse.

Producer Cecil Underwood, who has been part of the Fibber McGee and company four of its five years, is known to the group as "Uncle Cece."

The show is the only one in radio which can undergo complete change of theme eight hours before air time and still come up with a smooth, first-class airing.

The secret, according to Don Quinn, who had driven up while we were eating, lies in the versatility of the cast.

"After the first draft of the script is written," says Quinn, "we have a reading Sunday evening, two days before air time. We go over the lines, kick them around, talk over sugges-tions and ideas.

"Then I go back to work. I try to keep the theme of the program intact, trying at the same time to strengthen the weak spots and delete bad gags.

"Monday morning the cast rehearses the revised script, picks it to pieces for flaws. Sometimes on Tuesday morning rehearsal we decide the show is just no good. So it's thrown out. The show goes on at 6:30.

"This can be done because members of the troupe have such a variety of characters at hand.

"Without adding one person to the cast we can change a script featuring Fibber and Molly, Horatio K. Boomer, an English butler and a society woman to one having such characters as 'The Old Timer,' Teeny, a stuttering brush sales-man, a gangster and a 'Grik' dialeti-cian."

Keynote of Fibber and Molly is humility. On the air, as in private life, they are "home folks." They make no pretense of being important. They follow a simple philosophy of life. Many awards have come to the couple, but none pleased them more than the Iowa State Associa-tion of California's selection of Fibber and Molly as the "homiest" couple on the airwayes.

Though their salary now is four figured they live much as they did in Peoria. The Encino home is a modest eight-room bungalow with green shutters and rooms for the two young Jordans, Jim Jr. and Katherine

Jim Sr.'s main pleasures are a workshop in his back yard (where the automatic gag filer is awaiting completion) and a vegetable patch. With those he is at home and comfortable. It's a rare and important occasion that gets them out to a night club. They do like the ball games and Jim is an avid fight fan.

Meeting place for all the Jordans' friends is the playhouse built by Jim at the rear of the home. There the cast gathers for barbecues and square dances. There, also, come young friends of the Jordans' teen-old children for their parties

Latest addition to the McGee menage is the trailer in which they spent their summer vacation traveling to good fishing spots of the northwest.

"Yes, sir," relates Fibber, "we had a wonderful vacation in that trailer. Two flats a week, a broken axle and two new sets of springs. That's the durndest dray that ever defiled a detour in despair, but stop ine, Molly, so I can tell it when we get on the air."

Yes, Fibber is up to his old standby-alliterations. -----V. L.

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Television

In full color waved Old Glory eleven years ago in the first experimentation of television. Effect was achieved with three cameras, each photographing a primary color.

Eight months ago Dr. Peter C. Goldmark, CBS electronic wizard, managed to make a less clumsy approach to problem of solving color handling simply.

What Goldmark did: He took advantage of a habit of the human eye in following and retaining images. Called by scientists "persistency of vision" this habit was put to work by Dr. Goldmark who used succession of images, each in a different color family, banking on persistency to blend the images and their colors.

Net result of Dr. Goldmark's work was proof that various color images could be transmitted successively, need not be presented simultaneously. He managed proof by shooting through a whirling disc containing three essential color filters, red, green, and blue.

The World on Your Dial By Earl G. De Haven

CENTER of world-wide interest and at-tention this week because of military occupation by Japanese forces is Indo-China, colony of France in the Far East. Somewhat larger in area than France itself, French Indo-China has a population of more than 20 million, chiefly Mongols and Malays. Rice is the principal crop and constitutes 70 per cent of the exports of this colony. In common with most other Asiatic countries, Indo-China is rich in color, romance and mystery. Huge and ornate idol temples and shrines intrigue the traveler and testify to the antiquity of this country's races and civilization.

As far as short-wave broadcasting is concerned, Indo-China has pioneered, the original "Radio Saigon" having been one of the most consistent as well as one of the most popular stations. Radio dealers and set owners alike often relied on the signals of the Saigon station to determine if the receivers were functioning properly on the short-wave bands. Now, as then, "Radio Saigon" serves a great audience of listeners daily with interesting programs of music, news, and special features.

Appropriately enough, as Indo-China occupies the news spotlight, reception has improved from "Radio Saigon." The best received daily program reaches the Pacific coast between 7 and 8 or 8:15 a m. and features records or transcription of popular American dance tunes and melodies for the most part. The station is tuned in on 11.78 Mc. and affords an interesting accompaniment to the day's first meal. A complete news broadcast in English is a regular feature from "Radio Saigon" at 7:45 a. m. The little 5-tube \$12.95 Admiral radio, about which I am so enthused, plays this very distant station "Admirably." Reception was effected right on the breakfast table and WITHOUT OUTSIDE ANTENNA! The Herbert H. Horn Company of 1201 South Olive, Los Angeles, are distributors of this little "DynaMITE of Radio." Dorothy Lamour of "Jungle Princess"

fame, and Bing Crosby, the "Kraft Krooner," are prime favorites in this far-off land, and you may hear "Moonlight and Shadows" or "Sweet Leilani" (transcribed) by these artists almost any morning. Native Oriental music is, of course, heard, too, from "Radio Saigon," but Dorothy and Bing are headliners.
