Program Changes This Week

Editor's Note: As rapidly as they are furnished by Loz Editors of principal broadcasting networks and major western independents, complete program and time changes will be noted, week to week, in this section. Readers are informed, nowever, that even noted changes may not hold true, because of broadcasting problems, and nearly overwheiming pressure of world affairs, to which the Radie industry, in interests of public service, sacrifices time, moasey and, in some cases, programs, that ideals of public service shall be maintained. "NP" means "New Program."



West

GOOD MUSIC: Most networks realize fundamental importance of an old saw "Music hath powers . . ." Know that radio listeners do not live by Gracie Allen, Portland Hoffa, Bernie, Pearce, Bob Hope, Walter Winchell, et al, alone. They know, too, that outstanding music has cultural and spiritual values in such degree that all contribute to some 82 programs weekly for edification of Southern California music lovers.

^{*} For most radio listeners good music is an emotional feast of unalloyed bliss circumventing pressures and irritations that rise from daily problems of modern living.

To develop a daily interlude of good music in form and variety to please exacting listener demands is a driving and expensive task, whether such is arranged with help of living musicians or the work of the living abstracted from whirling acetate discs.

Perhaps with most followers of music is Los Angeles Station KFAC, whose nightly recorded (Monday through Saturday) evening concerts at 8 o'clock are aired with ceremonies befitting major productions with live talent.

Last week through KFAC's music library trolled a Radio Life-man, there saw blocs of rooms with ceiling-high shelves, record loaded. There, too, he "learned that to start a KFAC evening concert was no simple matter of changing needles and starting a turntable. On air from 8 to 10 p. m. Evening Concert requires services of eight persons. Music must be timed, programs rehearsed for

smooth presentation, notes and continuity prepared . . and then the commentator, supervisor of all preliminaries, presents the concert. Hours are spent to present flawlessly a symphony or opera of one or two hours duration.

Radio Life recommends.

ABANDONED BEDS AND LOVES: Looking somewhat like a frustrated John Barrymore could be conceived to look, John J. Anthony, (Good Will Hour, KFSD-KECA, Sundays, 7 p. m. for Ironized Yeast) once a week brings to his microphone an amazing number of uninhibited individuals who are nothing loath to trot out their soiled marital linen and neuroses for thorough "air-washings."

Lacking nothing in confidence. Anthony, who is secretive about his education and air-antecedent history, unblushingly admits he is the peer of all Radio's "libidic" soothsayers, believes that orthodox psychologists, psychiatrists and other delvers in the sound and the fury of the repressed libido, are less wise than he.

In the main those who pass Anthony's microphone are simple souls, wives whose husbands have tired of marital routines, repressed Doras who husky-throat bovine accounts of erotic difficulties. A few are short on cash, leap out into air's sponsor-charted spaces with dull hope of miracles of sympathy. A lesser few suckle on vengeance, for grievances, fancied or real. All seem influenced by neurotic burdens that make possible a rationalization of public display.

For these, in the main, Anthony reduces trouble and its solution to a simple sob-brother formula: Life is beautiful Up in Air

and love is earnest, and love will conquer-most of which is encased between covers of any confessional magazine.

Like most contemporary pontiffs of the air in his line Anthony through his Good Will Hour stirs the sluggish depths of uninteresting incidents in lives of uninteresting people. Despite the salutary title of the program its appeal to radio audiences of mature intellects is on the funny side. Looking like no academician at all Anthony ridicules the American educational system, while refusing to divulge alma maters, three of whom, he claims, have had their halls graced by his frequently ungrammatical presence.

Like most self-won arbiters of the problems of a minor and slowly vanishing section of mentally inert Americans, Anthony's qualifications for advice giving in intimate matters seem as obscure to intelligent listeners as his "clients'" woes are real to them—and for which advice his sponsors pungle up an estimated \$3000 weekly.

RADIO WRITING: The main difference between the successful and the nonsuccessful writer is the gap in writing minds that exists between pure creation, from fact or fancy, and exercise of the critical faculty.

Last week there was increasing evidence that many more Americans than in decades past were trying their hands at the writing game. Manuscripts were piling up in unwonted numbers on editorial desks of nation's magazines, newspapers, publishers and syndicates.

Learning that among manuscripts flooding editorial desks were an increased

number dealing with television (for which, it has become apparent, a demand will ensue) Radio Life this week interviewed Joe Ainley, Knickerbocker Playhouse director, (KFI-NBC, Saturdays at 8:80 p. m.). From Director Joe Ainley came following succinct paragraphs of advice to radio writers:

1) Don't start out with an idea that you can't finish.

2) Avoid mob scenes at the microphone, they merely confuse the listener. And, if possible, avoid having more than four characters at the microphone at once.

3) Don't let the principal characters change personality from one act to the next—unless, of course, you happen to be dealing with schizophrenia.

4) Avoid scenes where the action depends for its effectiveness on being seen. In other words, a sunrise may be swell stuff in Technicolor, but it's awfully hard to do on the mike.

5) Stay away from impossible sound effects. The sound effects men are versatile lads indeed, but there's a limit to genius—such as the problem of figuring out what kind of noise a pterodactyl would make.

6) Don't let the show move too slowly. Or, if you must have a low pitch scene, contrast it immediately with a high pitch scene. Don't waste lines. Make every line contribute to the plot or to one of the essential characterizations in the play.

7) Don't start out with a comedy and finish it up as a melodrama. If you do run into this two headed situation, you might tear the script apart in the middle and write a comedy ending for the last half—thus winding up with two scripts where one bloomed before.

8) Don't let the hero or heroine be stuffed shirts. They can be noble, but they must be interestingly human, and they shouldn't be like the script people used last week.

9) Avoid writing a "super-dooper" —a script in which there are so many different situations that even the cast has a difficult time keeping itself unscrambled, let alone the audience.

- Asked what one would ordinarily find in a good script, Ainley stated that he wouldn't know the answer, that one can generally tell that kind of writing by what isn't in it.

National

MUSICAL STEELMAKERS: With a shrill and familiar blast a mill whistle heralds the opening of the "Musical Steelmakers" program on KHJ and the Don Lee network every Sunday at 2 p. m., PST.

Long a contender that employees of big corporations have worthwhile talents, John L. Grimes, advertising director of the Wheeling Steel company, has developed one of the outstanding programs on the airlanes with amateur talent.

Only legitimately employed personnel (or their relatives) of Wheeling Steel company appear on the program, whose talent is selected from 10,000 employees of Wheeling Steel, talent later to parade wares from stage of Capitol theater in Wheeling, West Virginia. Typical is air case-history of Tommy Whitley, orchestra leader in development of "Musical Steelmakers." Formerly a laborer in Wheeling Steel coal mine, Whitley, son of pay office employee in Yorkville works played his saxophone with original Steelmakers band back in 1936. Conceived by Advertising Manager

Conceived by Advertising Manager Grimes who wanted a program that would build company goodwill, provide an outlet for employees' talent, as well as advertise products, "Musical Steelmakers" was first heard over station WWVA, Wheeling. Expanding, improving steadily, the series moved to a four-station Mutual hookup in 1938. A year later it was brought to a coast-to-coast audience.

Since all members work in mill or office, rehearsing is done at night. The cast gathers on Monday nights with the production staff and listens to a recording of the program of the day before.

Each person considers himself free to criticize the work of other performers. The system works. From 18-year-old prima donna of the program, Dorothy Ann Crowe: "We all know that all anyone in the group cares about is the success of the program. So we take the criticism in the spirit in which it is meant. We give it out the same way. It has been a big help to all of us." After the dress rehearsal preceding each program, the cast also gets together and holds a similar session.

Dorothy Ann Crowe, Ardenne White, the Steele Sisters trio, Regina Colbert, the Singing Millmen quartet and friendly, affable Old Timer are familiar to Musical Steelmakers fans, as regulars on the weekly programs.

John Wincholl, known otherwise as "Old Timer" is 60 years old, has two girls and a son, married. Special Auditor for Wheeling Steel, he made his radio debut through hobby, amateur theatricals. While producing and acting in one-act plays, he was induced to take the character of Old Timer, has been a leading member of the cast since.

Clever harmonizers, the Singing Millmen, William Griffiths, Walter Schane, Frank Nalepa, and William Stevenson, are all employees in mills of Wheeling Steel corporation, whose mills spume smoke and noise in Benwood, Yorkville and Steubenville.

"THE RAMPARTS WE WATCH" by last fortnight were extended in a thin line of khaki clad, erstwhile civilians from Maine to Florida and west to California as National defense activities rolled with ever increasing speed toward that day when the United States could relax against a multiples-millioned Army, Navy and Marine corps, with defense armament bristling from coast to coast like porcupine quills.

Dismal has been the gap between the new soldiers and the girls, kinsmen, and parents they left behind them when, scant three months ago, first draft numbers were drawn from the historic lottery bowl in Washington.

Chief complaint of those left behind had been: What are the boys doing and what is being done to them?

To answer this and other questions edged on the lips of Americans with sons in the services, NBC on Dec. 20, at 5 p. m. with help of a mobile broadcast unit, will earry first of a 13 weeks series of life fn Army camps.

From New Jersey's infantry training camp at Fort Dix the NBC mobile relay station will begin a three-month swing around the country's principal military establishments to promote understanding of purposes behind the nation's defense program. The War department, commanders of corps areas and local post commanders will cooperate.

Complete will be the picture of life in Uncle Sam's revitalized army. Interspersed with entertainment by talent in

camps will be talks by cook, k. p., quartermaster, corporal and commandant—the bugler, the mechanic, the medical officer by anyone who can hold radio's mirror to

activity at air base, infantry training

camp and artillery center. No distinction will be made in the broadcasts between officers and men of the regular army, the federalized National Guard and men who have enlisted under the Selective Service act.

George Hicks, special events announcer, and Lester O'Keefe, program director, both of NBC New York, will assist officers and men to put on shows.

International

FORMULA FOR WAR: Through the last fortnight in press, pictures and, significantly, over radio, war drum pounders, chief among which is a committee whose most active matured spermatozoon is William Allen White, Emporia, Kansas, vendor of patriotic guff, were beating their drums in a rhythm disquieting to many. The drum beating was dominated by a single theme: The United States should enter the European war to save England and thereby save themselves.

Chief air proponent last fortnight of the theory of U. S. entrance into conflict was 44-year-old Marylander Warren Irvin, National Broadcasting company war reporter. Warren had just returned from European battle zones with what distinction attaches to fact he had seen both phases of Europe's shell and bomb racked internecine warfare.

Perhaps soon to be listened to by western listeners as the latest "authority" to pop with chromatic verbalisms on American ears Reporter Warren Irvin by last week had divested himself of following observations:

1) To save its own hide the United States should enter the war.

"This is our war," he averred. "In Berlin's Foreign offices people say: 'You are next'."

2) The British can never hope to win military victory without United States assistance.

"English people are better clothed and fed better than Germans," he was reported to have said in eastern interviews. "In consequence their morale is better, almost twice as high as in Germany."

3) The possibility is scant of a revolt in Germany until Nazis encounter military defeat, a lusty possibility with German forces scattered over German conquered, militarized areas.

Orally conning conditions in Germany and Italy, major British belligerents, Re-

porter Irwin reported food and general economic conditions "extremely bad" for Italy, whilst in Germany "morale is about 45 per cent (on a figurative thermometric scale) in contrast to an English 85 per cent.

In common with other war drum thumpers Irwin opined U. S. entry into war was necessary to protect U. S. interests.

In sharp disagreement with NBC reporter Irwin were United States naval officials who last week were quietly interviewed by a Radio Life staffman at San Diego Naval Training station. Those interviewed coincided opinions with realistic estimates. These estimates reduced to two for Radio Life readers to mull over were in this:

No power or combination of powers on earth today could successfully assault or make embarrassing gains on the United States, now, with a defense program well going, the most potent offensive assembly in the world.

Thus, reduced to only two terms of debate was probable entry of United States into war: 1) To help England, sorely beset cousin, for reasons of purest sympathy and kinship, or 2) to protect American commercial parities in whatever strange New World would come to being if Great Britain were defeated, such protection to be expressed in terms of immediate aid, thus insuring ultimate victory for U. S., for England.

GRAND OLE OP'RY:

Here Is Background and Data of an Interesting Program

GRAND OLE OPRY: Dr. Walter Damrosch and a mule trip 30 miles into the hills of Arkansas were both instrumental in the birth of the Grand Ole Opry radio program (Saturdays, 7:30 p. m., NBC-KFI) which celebrates its 15th anniversary this month.

The mule trip was taken by a young reporter, George D. Hay, in search of a inoonshine story. Instead, he attended a barn dance and returned with a human interest story of earth and fascination of the Ozark hills.

Some years later Hay was a staff mem-ber of WSM, Nashville, Tennessee. With memory of the "homespun concert" strong he persuaded one Uncle Jimmy Thompson, an old-time fiddler, to present a program. Unwittingly Damrosch contributed the name, Grand Ole Opry. Hay was listening to the Damrosch program, waiting to introduce Uncle Jimmy, and he heard Damrosch say, in speaking of a descriptive number:

"While we do not believe there is a place in the classics for realism, this work so depicts the onrush of the locomotive that I have decided to include it in the program of grand opera."

Inspired, Hay signed on with:

"From here on out, folks, it will be nothing but realism of the realest kind. You've been up in the clouds with grand opera, now get down to earth with us in a shindig of Grand Ole Opry."

The date was Nov. 28, 1925. The shindig lasted 15 years, still is going strong. Response made the Nashville studio overcrowded with volunteer talent, flocking from hills and farms, with listeners who wanted to see as well as hear. The program was moved from the studio to a large hall and, eventually, to the War auditorium, accommodating Memorial 3000 people.

For 14 years, the program was heard only on Station WSM. The past year it has been a feature of the NBC-Red network, sponsored by American Tobacco company.

"Keep it close to the ground" is the slogan of Grand Ole Opry folks. Presented by neighbors, for "just folks" all over the country, the program is some sort of proof that American folk music is very dear to the heart of the listening public. Over and over again come requests for such down-to-earth tunes as "Green Back Dollar," "Bile Them Cabbage Down," "Rabbit in the Pea Patch," and "Brown's Ferry Blues."

George Hay heads the Opry stars in his role of the Solemn Old Judge. Patriarch of the performers is Uncle Dave Macon, 73-year-old dirt farmer who turned professional at the age of 58. He has headlined the show since the early days. Other members of the Grand Ole Opry aristocracy are George Wilkerson and his Fruit Jar Drinkers, a novelty string group of cotton factory hands; De Ford Bailey, a spry little Negro harmonica wizard; the 'Possum Hunters, a farmer-membered string band; Bill Monroe and Blue Grass Boys, vocal and string group; Gulley Jumpers, auto mechanics in another string band; Zeke Clements, the Dixie Yodeler; Sam and Kirk McGhee, banjo and guitar team; the Williams Sisters, school girl song duo; Roy Acuff and the Smoky Mountain Boys, youngest members of the Grand Ole Opry staff. -H. either. Ben Alexander, a good - looking young man, a show business veteran of 26 years at the age of 29, is a shining example. His is a success story that began with "Each Pearl a Tenr" at the corner of Sunset and Vine in Hollywood in 1914. Today, chapters are still being added to

that story with alarming speed, and the locale is still Sunset and Vine. "Each Pearl a Tear" was a silent picture starring Fanny Ward. Ben was 3 years old then, and the movie studio that occupied the present site of NBC needed a Cupid. So Mother Alexander answered the call and brought little Ben to the studios. They stripped him down to his birthday suit over lusty objections, handed him a bow and arrow and strung him up on a wire to dangle before the Kleig lights and cameras. That was the beginning of a movie career that by 1929, when Ben's family made him quit pictures to prepare for college, was earning the 16-year-old star a neat and net, \$1400 a week. That same year Ben's earnings dropped from \$1400 to \$9 a week. The reason was that he didn't want to waste his evenings, so he went to work in a Union Oil company filling station as a petrol jerker and windshield wiper. What's more he managed to have more fun in his new station in life than he did as a screen star. The \$9 he earned were all his. The big dough he earned as a screen star all went into trust funds and investments and Ben never saw it. And if you wonder why we're plugging a Union Oil station, we'll tell you later when we get to Ben's cur-rent affairs. The plug has to do with personal history.

In the interval of time between his debut as Cupid in 1914 and the time he came into the big money at First National in the period of 1927-29, Ben didn't exactly waste his time either. He made picture after picture. In 1921 he played in D. W. Griffith's "Hearts of the World" which took two years to produce. In 1922 he was playing Penrod on the New York stage. In 1924 he made Penrod for the screen. Then came the enrollment in Hollywood high school, the filling station job at nine per, and finally ennui that sent Alexander playing hookey from school and visiting a pal on the set of "All Quiet on the Western Front." After that day Ben never went back to school until years later. Director Milestone offered him the part of Kemmrich. Ben took it, told his mother later that evening. He played picture parts for three years and loved it, and what finally drove him into the arms of a radio microphone were casting directors. They tried to make a villain out of a guy who wanted to be a hero, and handed him bad wolf parts abusing such cuties as Maureen O'Sullivan when he wanted to keep on being Cupid.

So Ben started hanging around NBC station KFI in Los Angeles. He kept his ears open and his mind absorbent until they gave him a job as a relief announcer. On top of that, NBC's manager, John W. Swallow heard him and gave him an extra job doing a show called Hollywood Boulevardier on the network. To celebrate his first anniversary on the air, NBC gave him a whole half hour program to fill, and fill it he did with such friendly movie folk as Ginger Rogers and Anne Shirley. The N. W. Ayer agency heard that show and bought it lock, stock and barrel for a client who wanted to stage the Kellogg Talent Parade on NBC.

Today the ex-Cupid and ex-filling station attendant is one of radio's singular five-threat men. He announces the commercials and plays straight man to Char-lie McCarthy on Edgar Bergen's pro-grams; he sences Little Ol' Hollywood and bridges the gaps between the acts as narrator; he handles the commercials for Procter and Gamble on Arch Oboler's Everyman's Theater and doubles in some of the parts. And today, the versatile lad who can also sing songs at box socials, fashion shows and 19th holes, was signed by the Union Oil company to handle the mike on its NBC-Red Pacific coast Where and When broadcasts. Thus the cycle is complete. Union Oil lost Ben to pictures as a \$9-a-week gasoline salesman. It got him back today from pictures for basically the same job, less the manual labor, for quite a few times that nine bucks. If there's any moral to the story, it must be that if you stay on Sunset and Vine long enough, anything can and will happen, even to a Cupid.

Pacific coast listeners have heard Miss Allen as Vera Vague on the NBC Signal Carnival for several years. Now, as Barbara Whitney, Jack Benny's glamorous girl friend, her versatility and originality have been given a national outlet. Further to demonstrate her all-around ability, Miss Allen plays Beth Holly in One Man's Fanily, a role that requires great dramatic talent.

When Miss Allen was 18 years old, with several years of dramatic experience to her credit, she was touring the middlewest with a headline act. Jack Benny was master of ceremonies on the same vaudeville program, and he met, and liked the young actress. After renewing his acquaintance with Miss Allen in Hollywood, Benny watched her radio career with interest, and called upon her when the character of Barbara Whitney was introduced into his Sunday program.

Before she stepped from the stage into radio, Miss Allen made a nationwide reputation in such plays as "The Shanghai Gesture," "The Trial of Mary Dugan" and other hits. She played in Henry Duffy's company in Hollywood and San Francisco. Her first radio role was in Carlton E. Morse's "The Witch of Endor." She was heard later in many coast and transcontinental programs, including Hawthorne House, Death Valley Days, Winning the West, and One Man's Family. Proving her versatility, Miss Allen tried a Chinese characterization on one of Morse's NBC dramas, when the Chinese girl originally cast for the role was unable to appear. Her dialect, which she admits was synthetic, was so good that she was retained in the part.

She found the speaker, a nervous woman, highly amusing, and she tried to recreate the character. Born in New York, Miss Allen traveled widely, and she gained her education at Stanford, U.C.L.A., the University of California, and the Sorbonne. As a result, she is a keen student of languages.

Miss Allen's comedy talents have been recognized by motion pictures. Vera Vague has appeared in comedies, and Miss Allen has played in RKO and Republic pictures.

With her husband, Vernon Patterson, and her small daughter, Miss Allen lives in the Hollywood hills. Patterson is a successful writer of boys' books, and little Joan, following in her mother's footsteps, has made several appearances in radio dramas.

ON THE SGOUT TRAIL

(Or: 'Okay Boys, It's Time to Go to Bedlam')

A TTENTION, all persons living in the vicinity of the KECA studios: There is no cause for alarm. The smoke you see pouring from the KECA building is merely the result of the Boy Scouts demonstrating their talents at Indian smoke signalling. We repeat: There is no cause for alarm."

*

RADIO listeners may hear something like that one of these days. It may be necessary on a Wednesday night when 50,000 Boy Scouts of America present their half hour weekly program over KECA.

If you can picture the Orson Welles "Men From Mars" broadcast in triplicate, and if you can picture a tribe of wild Indians doing battle with a tribe of whirling Dervishes in a boiler factory going at full speed, you have a pretty good idea of the Scout program.

We don't mean to imply the boys concentrate on making noise, nor do we intend to give the impression that chaos is the principal factor of the broadcast. It is merely a program of, by and for boys of Scouting age... it is all boy from the opening bugle call to the closing.

Titled, "On the Scouting Trail," the program, to use the word loosely, is presented each Wednesday night at 7 p. m. over KECA. We regret to point out, however, that it will not be heard on Dec. 25, nor Jan. 1. Christmas and New Year's are much more important to a boy than any radio program.

Jimmy Vandiveer, special events supervisor for KFI-KECA is ostensibly in charge of the show, but he admits that statement is open for quite a bit of debate. Helping him are Martin Weinstein, major domo; Clem Glass, the radio Scoutmaster, and something in the neighborhood of 50,000 boys . . . all willing and anxious to see that the program is a success.

It is.

The broadcast is in the nature of a contest. You find that out after you sift awhile, overlooking all the noise and natural exuberance of youth and forgetting the fact that boys will be boys. The contest is open to each of the 1500 Scout units in Southern California.

Four contestants are selected each week, each from a different troop. They don't have the slightest idea what the future holds, but they grit their teeth and hope for the best. They may have to take part in a race where the object is to see who can set up a camp first, complete with fire, cooler, wood, and running water. When they start thinking about the firewood, the KECA janitor picks up a broomhandle and waves it menacingly with an "I-dare-you-to-touch-one-singlestick-of-furniture-in-this-studio" gleam in his eye.

But the race isn't the only feature of the show. The boys are grilled via the quiz route, on all phases of Scouting. They may suddenly have to tie a knee bandage from their kerchief or they may suddenly have to recite the "things to do in case of poison oak."

We were there one time when all four found themselves suddenly in the midst of a pancake cooking party which began with making a fire by rubbing two sticks together right on the stage. The boys had to mix their own batter, grease the pan and flip the flaps. The studio janitor, who had eyed all of this with natural and profound misgivings, later asked us what would happen if he rubbed two Boy Scouts together in the heat of anger.

We said we didn't know but it would be an interesting experiment.

Next on the program, as far as we could make out, comes a two-minute skit featuring two Scouts who manage to place winning contestant and the winning troop.

First prize is a week in Scout camp in the High Sierras with all expenses paid by the radio division of Earle C. Anthony, Inc. One night things were so mixed up the judges named three winners. We understand the KECA auditor, (he pays the bills), barely withstood the blow. His doctor later said the auditor was suffering from nervous shock and that indications definitely refuted the evidence that he had been hit by a cement truck.

It is not difficult to understand, after viewing the program from the comparative safety of a glass-enclosed (three panes of double strength glass) booth, why three winners were chosen. We wonder what they had against the fourth contestant. He looked like a nice little boy to us. (From behind three panes of double strength glass).

When the program first was planned, it was intended as a regular radio troop

themselves in all sorts of imaginary jams such as hanging from cliffs with the sun going down, cutting an artery, wrecking an automobile, losing a horse, or similar situations which no Scout who is on his toes would ever think of. The four contestants are then asked to extricate themselves from the embarrassing moments. Tough part of it is that they are given only 12 seconds in which to do it.

only 12 seconds in which to do it. Final event comes with the "five-second stickers." That's when Vandiveer gets his full measure of revenge. He fires questions at the suffering participants in the hopes of placing them tenderly behind the eight ball.

We heard him ask one bright young lad to sing a couple of common camp songs. The bright young lad popped up quickly with a little opus titled "Pink Pajamas." It had to do with sleeping one night in pink pajamas, another night in blue pajamas and some nights in nothing at all. Vandiveer won't ask anybody else to sing any camp songs. He's heard them all now.

From now oh we're just guessing. We've lost all track of the original scheme of things. But as far as we can tell, the final event comes with the reckoning. The judges, usually Scout executives, add up the scores and name the of Boy Scouts wherein all the ceremony of the usual Scout meeting would be included. The thing is a little out of hand right now, though. The radio troop has become the "Penguin Patrol," an honorary troop whose members are only the outstanding boys from other troops.

the outstanding boys from other troops. When Major Domo Weinstein completes his enthusiastic and certainly creditable plans, the "Penguin Patrol" members will be admitted to theaters, ball games and other places of amusement at half or even third rates. They'll be taken through various manufacturing plants, aircraft factories and to exclusive Scout Camporees in other communities where the ordinary Scout couldn't go.

As a result the 50,000 Scouts in this area are fighting for the chance to become a "Penguin Patrol" member.

The Scouts, at the behest of the radio station, recently set out to take a listener survey in order to see just who listened to the program. With their usual thoroughness and enthusiasm they began using the telephone but departed from that plan when several callees afterward wrote KECA to confirm the fact that they had won the Pot o' Gold!

The listener survey, quoting from the official report, goes like this:

Rebecca's Ghost 'Pins' Broadcast

SALEM ECHO: The chill, pale hand of Rebecca Bishop, one of 19 persons hanged for witchcraft in Salem, Massachusetts, more than 200 years ago, touched Ted Malone lightly when he visited the House of Seven Gables, fortnight and over ago, to broadcast "American Pilgrimage." (NBC-Blue network).

Seeking mementos of Puritan terror and superstition days which would lend eerie tone to his description of the house where Rebecca lived (later made famous by Nathaniel Hawthorne) Pilgrim Malone got idea of obtaining sad ended Rebecca's death warrant and handful of iron pins which were all the evidence presented at her trial.

Effect-striving Malone had one plan: To tell the creepy tale so effectively all America could hear pins when he dropped them, one by one, in front of his microphone. He wrote the custodian of Rebecca Bishop's gloomy old house, asked her to obtain pins and warrant, and was answered: "Simply impossible" to get them out of a courthouse safe.

Arrived in Salem, Malone called upon the mayor, was informed that key to the safe had been mislaid. Determined Malone went from city father to city father. At midnight he located one Hollis Cameron, assistant county clerk, who thought

it possible to secure the relics. Clerk Cameron appeared at broadcast

time with the piece of yellow parchment, a dozen rusted hand-hammered pins. The clerk insisted only he could be responsible for dropping the latter when the proper time came.

Rehearsal was undertaken, progressed smoothly, Malone exploring the narrow, winding secret stairway, read from Haw-thorne's works, intoned from Rebecca's death sentence, added the sheriff's sepulchral notation:

"I have this day taken Rebecca Bishop to Gallows hill and there hanged her by the neck until she was dead."

The pins tinkled convincingly when Cameron dropped them near the microphone.

The broadcast was something else. Clerk Cameron let the pins fall. They struck the oak boards, tinkled, then, to horror of Malone and volunteer assistants, leaped from the floor and pincushioned them-selves in the perforated head of the microphone. There they hung, quivering malevolently.

Not until the commentator returned to New York and handed the bewitched microphone over to NBC engineers did he learn the metal head had become magnetized, Recebba Bishop getting in a woman's last strange word.

RECIPE FOR CREME PARISIENNE

5 cups of chicken broth 2 cups of chicory herb tablespoons of flour tablespoons of butter 4 slices of bread 2 egg yolks 1 cup of cream Salt and pepper to taste

Boil chicory in chicken broth for 10 minutes and strain. Then melt butter in sauce pan, and cook flour until almost brown. Add chicken broth and beat well until smooth. Then remove from fire. Beat egg yolks and cream and add to the chicken broth, stir, and when well mixed strain and place in double boiler. Cook until water on the bottom of double boiler comes to a boil. Then cut bread in half-inch squares and fry in butter. Serve in soup.

RECIPE FOR CHICKEN SAUTE MADELEINE

2 spring chickens disjointed 1/8 pound of butter 2 tablespoons of flour 1 pint of milk 1 cup of cream 1 cup of mushrooms Salt and pepper

Sprinkle chicken with salt and pepper. Then saute in butter and simmer for 10 minutes. Then sprinkle chicken with flour and simmer for a few more minutes. Add hot milk and let boil for 10 minutes. Braize mushrooms in some butter for 10 minutes. Remove chicken to a hot platter. Bring the sauce to a boll, add oream, and strain over the chicken, Cover with mushrooms and serve.

This Week-Salads!

This week we are giving you some salad recipes for your Consumer's Club Library, so perhaps a little general information about salads will not be amiss.

Salads in the diet have been recognized as health builders for thousands of years. The ancient Romans and Egyptians went in a great deal for them and did not hesitate to use plenty of onion and garlic. Aside from flavorings, however, there are certain requirements that one should keep in mind when preparing a good salad. Two of these are that the main ingredients should be crisp and chilled, and a third is that the completed salad should be pleasing to the eye as well as agreeable to the palate.

But to get back to garlic; if you mix your salad in a wooden bowl, try greasing the bowl with oil, then drying with a cloth. and then rubbing garlic all over the inside. A wooden bowl can be thoroughly seasoned for salads in this way, and need not be washed afterwards, but merely wiped clean and set aside exclusively for salads.

HERB SUGGESTIONS-A little something extra aside from regular vegetables often gives a salad a delightful epicurean touch, and for this purpose you might try using a little parsley, chives, mustard greens or mint. If you want to make it more mysterious, however, you can use bits of peppergrass, basil, burnet, sorrel, anise, tarragon or dill, or even some lemon balm, rue, rosemary,

or nasturtium leaves. Some of these herb touches, of course, can be applied to the dressing instead of the salad proper, if you wish. * *

POURING PEANUT OIL ON SALAD WINE-You need not limit yourself to olive oil, by the way, when you dress a salad. Some of the other oils are just as nice and I especially recommend that you try peanut oil sometime. Two tablespoons of peanut oil, one-quarter cup of muscatel wine, one tablespoon of honey, onequarter teaspoon of celery salt, and half a lemon, make an unusually agreeable salad dressing, but be sure to mix them thoroughly just before using. Peanuts, as a health food, are a good source of vitamins A, B and G, and stand high in calories.

Chef Milani's Salad Suggestions

SLICED OR CHOPPED EGG SALAD

8 hard boiled eggs. Chopped or sliced. 1/2 cup of minced green peppers. 1 cup of thousand island dressing Green salad

For each serving make a bath of salad greens, shredded very fine. Top with equal part of sliced or chopped eggs, and cover with thousand island dressing.

CHICKEN SALAD

- 2 cups of diced salted chicken meat
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 2 cups of hearts of celery sliced very fine
- 1 cup of mayonnaise
- 1 bunch of dandelion green salad
- Black olives
- Pimiento

Mix chicken meat, pecans and celery, then add mayonnaise. Make a bed of dandelion salad, for each service and place a cup of the chicken mixture on it, place two olives on side of plate and a thin strip of pimiento over the top.

SARDINE SALAD

- 12 sardines
- 1 teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce
- 2 drops of tobasco sauce
- 1 large cucumber
- French dressing
- Escarole green salad

Remove skin, head and tail of sardines. Rub to a paste, add seasonings. Then form sardines into small balls and chill. Arrange green escarole salad in individual servings. Peel cucumber, slice in halfinch thick sections, and chill. Place two slices of cucumber on each plate and place sardine ball on each slice. Serve with French dressing.

The Editor and the Readers

THIS week there seems to be more to write about. We went down to San Diego to the Naval Training station with Gracie Allen, George Burns, Joe Alvin and Hal Bock, the NBC people we have mentioned in Radio Life before. The occasion was a broadcast in behalf of navy publicity, but it turned out to be much more than just that, at least for us, A great many of our readers may have thought we were indulging, somewhat ostentationsly, in flag waving at times. Even the Chief, whom we have come to know as a pretty decent sort of person took us to task about that, fortifying himself (if he needed to) by letters from many of you who wrote that flag waving and patriotic ballyhoo could be more properly left to the professional patriots, most of whom, we think, are that way because of profit involved. It has been estimated that it costs nearly a thousand dollars to kill a man. This, of course, doesn't include the expense of getting him into tip-top physical condition where he can be killed with all the ceremony so dear to those who hawk the somewhat stilted line "The Flower of Our Country."

Nevertheless, despite the Chief and many of you who may prepare to flay us for saying so, we have always believed that radio is everything. We mean, that

it touches every phase of our existence. whatever happens to and of human beings ultimately finds expression through radio. And Americanism is something that radio expresses, in the sense that it lends itself in interpretation of affairs that are serious aspects of modern society.

What interested us most, however, was meeting Lieutenant Arthur "Tex" Anders, the naval officer who distinguished himself three years ago (Dec. 12) on the "Panay." We had a long talk with this slight built, soft voiced man upon whose left breast was the ribbon of the Distinguished Service Medal. Lieutenant Anders and the thousands of young, fresh-eyed Americans who are in training for the naval forces, afloat and ashore. We thought after talking with Lieutenant Anders: Here was a man who defined his country and his duty to it in no terms of flag waving or patriotic rabble rousing.
