NEWS SCOOPMASTER: "Why is it you are not in Europe covering the war?" This is a question most often fired at

a bespectacled, greying, incipiently-wat-

tled Wythe Williams, Tuesday and Thursday evening commentator from KHJ.

Star analyst of world affairs is Williams, whose "news-beats" are sourced in countless friends in the Europe he had covered as a reporter and in a book, "Dusk of Empire."

Last week mildly nettled by the recurring question, Williams pursed lips, said:

"When I came back from Europe five years ago, a major war was brewing. I knew that there would be stiffer censorship than ever before. I felt little of importance could get through, and there seemed no point in sending back stories handed out by propaganda bureaus."

Williams frankly admits he pays for his "scoops" through relatives of foreign informants. Information also comes from what he terms, "one-timers," people who just send him a friendly letter. Most informants do not realize they are supplying valuable information for his broadcasts. One line may mean nothing to the ordinary person. Checked by Williams, it is often interpreted into a sizeable "news beat."

Most important Williams scoop last year came to him by cable. It stated: "From Petain to Franco to Hitler." Williams got that one easily. France was suing for peace. Petain had asked Franco to ask Hitler how tough would be peace terms. Not on the air that night and considering the story too hot to hold, Williams turned it over to his friend Lowell Thomas for broadcast. Denials were rife on all the broadcasting stations, including Williams'. Three days later the cable was officially confirmed.

Another tip simply said, "Watch the spot Hitler is not talking about," received last February. Checking maps, Williams found one spot not mentioned in Hitler's tirades, Denmark. Early in April Denmark was first place occupied.

DENOUEMENT TO TRAGEDY: Since 1931 the program "Myrt and Marge" has for millions of listeners, mostly sympathetic distaffers, aired the crucial and minor problems rising out of the lives of mother and daughter.

Last week at the time scheduled for the daily (1:15 to 1:30 p. m., KNX) airing, American women turned the radio dial to "Myrt and Marge" as they had done for nearly a decade theretofore. For the first time the program was not heard. The reason: Death had come to Donna Damerel (Marge) in a New Jersey hospital. Dying Donna Damerel gave up life, an eight pound boy. At her death bed was her mother (Myrt) Mrs. Myrtle Vail, with whom Donna had shared airadventures, carried on for nearly a decade a program emotionally shading the life of two women, mother and daughter, out of which had come much that was practical in application to mothers and daughters everywhere.

Program will continue with a new actress to be brought into the role of the late "Marge."

THE STAR SPANGLED BANNER: Epitomizing the spiritual symbolisms and character of America is the national ensign, only banner of the world's nations to have been articulated in song. The song: "The Star Spangled Banner;" the writer: Francis Scott Key; the time: a night during the Civil war; the occasion: shelling of Fort Sumter by the British. Writing in the shell-noisy dark, lighted by flamebursts on the fort's ramparts, Francis Scott Key, patriot, wrote America's anthem in stanzaic simplicity and beauty.

More recently one Israel Baline (Irving Berlin) has written "God Bless America," peddled to Americans at varying prices, attesting shrewd merchandising captivation of masses, psychologically scurrying through current storms of waror-not-to-war controversies.

Fortnight ago "God Bless America" was stripped of its minor importance as a song for Americans to sing. Stripper: Young Senator Rush Holt who, from the rostrum of Los Angeles' Philharmonic auditorium, later from Radio station KMTR Radio News Reel recording of his talk, shouted:

"We need less of this song 'God Bless America' in America, and a great deal more of the Star Spangled Banner."

What only a couple of thousand Americans Philharmonic-packing heard, several hundreds of thousands of west coast Americans heard through facilities of Radio News Reel.

Fortifying what, according to Dr. Gallup's March of Time publicized poll has learned (that 40 per cent of Americans were not "safely" counted as pro-British) Senator Holt in Los Angeles slashed out at Britons for whom memories of Sum-

The schedule for weeks coming includes Mexico, Guatemala, British Honduras, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama, the Panama Canal and Canal Zone, Colombia, Ecuador, and other South American countries.

Sponsored by the California State Department of Education, the Los Angeles City schools and the Los Angeles office of the United States bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, this series is designed for classroom reception. All junior and senior high schools in Los Angeles are using the program as part of regular courses on Latin America.

Air's Shrinking Violet May Seem Ineffective But He's Paying Out

SEATED across from Arthur Q. Bryan over steaming beakers of coffee in Brittingham's Hollywood restaurant, we realized, somewhat sadly, that air impressions of a character cannot be counted upon to even approximate the reality.

For, certainly, here was reality facing us—some 241 pounds of it, a mid-girth that rocked with Falstaffian glee, or, rather, shook with jelly-like abandon above a series of chins, above which a pair of the bluest and most kindly eves we had seen in a long time, filled with hilarity-prompted moisture.

We had pictured "Waymond W. Wad-cliffe" as a meek little fellow with an occasional mouse-in-the-corner desperation that inspired him to take brave stands against the harsh realities and unthinking cruelties of this tough old world. We saw him timidly handing his transfers to hard-boiled street car conductors, hoping they wouldn't make note of the fact that the time punched was five minutes earlier than the time he had boarded the car. He would be too fearful to engage in an argument about it, even though the fact was that he has waited 15 minutes for the car to come. We had pictured him timidly suggesting to his boarding house keeper that the toast, blackened and crisp, was just a bit overdone, of stepping into the gutter when a big-shouldered bruiser swaggered bypictured him, in short, as the Caspar Milquetoast of radio, given to amazing flights of braggadocio only when there would be none to say him nay too violently.

We had heard him once, quite excitedly, describe his exploits in a prize ring:

"I thwust a wight upper-cwut at him, followed it with a weft hook to the jaw, dwove him into a cwoneh and wocked him dwon to his knees," Heard and felt sorry for him, a sterling athlete with a distressing speech impediment to detract from his sheen as a man of might.

Well, here he was, imbibing coffee lustily, a happy-faced gargantuan of a man on whom honor's halo gleamed; an easy mannered Arthur Q. Bryan who of his character had this to say:

"I see him as a mild little fellow who wouldn't hurt anybody, but who feels in him the surge to great and manly things, but who lacks that moral something or another to put into action his dreams of manly competence.

"He realizes his ambitions by pursuing delusions. He knows that prize-fighters, hull fighters, soldiers and men of affairs are fast moving and husky extroverts. By nature he can't be like them so he projects himself to imagined situations, draws on his imagination to dignify his colorand experience-starved life."

Arthur Q. Bryan doesn't think he looks

like "Waymond Wadeliffe," a thought with which we agreed. Waymond came into being years ago on an eastern station as an incidental program character, and wasn't considered funny, was forgotten by all but Bryan who believed he had something.

Yet, there was a time when Arthur Q. Bryan, at least physically, must have resembled his shrinking alter ego of the air. When he first went on the air in 1923, after being successfully auditioned for singing by Milton Cross, he weighed 135 pounds.

"Those were young and feverish days," Bryan explained. "I had just broken into radio on WEAF, after a strenuous tenure as an insurance clerk. Excitement kept me thin."

"How do you account for your weight now?" we asked.

"Vittles," he said simply, "just plenty of vittles. 1 like to eat. It's one of my hobbies."

He has other hobbies, we learned. One is accumulating symphony recordings. He has more than 1000 of these.

He likes to ice skate but reluctantly confessed that he was not latterly indulging himself in this exercise.

'Not," he hastened to interpose, "because I'm barred—" he patted his moun-tain of a stomach—"but, because I really fall harder than most people." We could understand that.

Ilis principal ambition is to make enough money to retire to a life of music and writing. He refused, with blushing modesty, to admit a romance, did say: "There is a lady!"

He recalled his first broadcast. It was

back in the strident Twenties on the occasion of the first around-the-world airing from the Park Central hotel in New York, Madame Schumann-Heink was the star of the program and he was so flustered by the famed Diva's presence that he forgot to sign the program off, leaving hundreds of thousands throughout the world wondering where all that sound had come from.

He was a lead tenor with the old Sieberling Singers, knows and has worked with these dignitaries of radio: Graham Mc-Namee, Milton Cross, Basil Rathbone, Norman Brokenshire and others who have marched down through the years with radio.

He is 5 feet, 7 inches tall, is 41 years old and when asked to give a one sentence philosophy of life said:

"If you can live without hurting yourself or your fellow man you'll be doing all right." He thinks Al Pearce, his boss, the best sort of a man with whom to work, thinks that the funniest incident in his life was to be a judge of a Pomona bathing beauty contest, in which the beauties were clad in turkey feathers—thinks this was funny because he is an expert on turkeys but hardly on girls,

He is grateful to "Waymond" because without him he feels it would have been a lot harder to become a success in radio, to realize the ambitions of Arthur Q. Bryan.

"He may be timid," said Arthur Q. Bryan, "but you got to hand it to the little guy. He's building me up. Him-" and he grinned, chins four and eight shaking-"him and vittles."

Russ Music Maker

BEHIND the infectious cultured European voice we heard a familiar Debussy strain and turned up the radio to hear better.

The voice stopped talking and the soft melody of "Homage du Rameau" poured into the room. We listened through, became aware that we were listening to a kind of musicianship that radio could use more of nowadays.

We know very little of Debussy, except that we like his music, and that of some of the things we have heard of his we wish we knew more. While we listened the voice began again.

"Debussy," the pianist said, "is to be considered a modern. He died in 1918 but created a new style in music, perhaps best shown by a comparison of conventional scales and scales as played by him. You will listen, please." We listened. There followed scale play-

We listened. There followed scale playing, with emphasis on the Debussy differences in playing them. Suddenly we realized that perhaps never again would we have to falter and remain quietly embarrassed when somebody asked in that annoying put-you-on-the-spot intonation: "Isn't that Debussy?" We'd know. We had found out how to know by a two-uninute analysis at a keyboard, given by a man in a radio station. We decided to look this chap up, on the theory that if he could, in a few moments, pound musical appreciation into our armored heads, what could he do for others who "just love music, especially the classics." This may not he grammar hut you get the idea.

His name, we learned, is Jacque Rachmilovich, horn in Odessa, Russia. He is a graduate of the Russian Imperial Conservatory of Music, has been in the United States less than four months and, somewhat bug-eyed by what he has seen here, has reduced his answer to the question— "What do you think of America, Mr. Rachmilovich?" to—

"America?" You have here what is almost forgotten in Europe, a level of decency and moral standards that has nothing to do with many bathtubs, automobiles or nice clothing but is something that comes from shared experiences as a people."

He expounded his theories of music and musical training as we sat in the living room of his house in Hollywood foothills. The room was dominated by a great grand piano. He sat at the piano as he talked, sensitive fingers moulding quick tantalizing measures independent of mental processes.

"All individuals want music," he said. "Appreciation of music is not so much to be gained from comparing one kind of music with another, as it is in finding certain ways and means of learning what it was the composers sought to say. We do not read books merely because they have words in them. We read them because they have something that interests us. Thus, by much reading we are able to weigh the case of one writer as against another hy the fluency and logic with which they have developed similar subject material. For instance."

"Listen now." The slender fingers sped on. It was the same melody with a poignant and haunting difference.

Like all Europeans he has an avid curiosity. He knew—when we did not —that 1940 was a record American musical year. He attributes this to radio which has widened the average symphony setting to the size of the land.

He believes the old world is decadent, that civilization and culture repose in America and, as a concert planist who has appeared with leading symphonies of the world, thinks his immediate American mission will be to acquaint Americans with the best of European compositions, and the meanings of them.

For some time to come he will play and explain the classics from KFWB, Thursday evenings at 9 o'clock. You might listen this week.

MORE THAN THEIR TITHES

HE amount the two men dangled before the amazed eyes of Shirley Temple's parents was equally as amazing.

"Her appearance on the air would be for but half an hour. That's more than a thousand dollars per minute."

Well, the Temples just couldn't see it. And neither could Twentieth Century-Fox.

"No radio," was the flat fiat executives made to the two gentlemen who, for reasons of their own, strictly business, of course, figured that they would be making a reasonable investment if America's Baby Glamor Girl or her guardians could be persuaded to permit her presence on a coast-to-coast hookup.

A week later Shirley Temple did appear on a program and for her coast-tocoast services received exactly \$000000, an amount that scarcely begins to compare with the amount she turned down the week before.

Why?

The difference must have been in the gentlemen. And there was a difference. The first brace were commercially-minded chaps who knew their commercials. With Shirley Temple on a program, there would be enough buildup for their products to make a \$35,000 investment a very small amount, indeed.

The latter gentlemen were one Jean Hersholt, who appears on KNX's weekly series, "Dr. Christian," and one Ralph Morgan, hardly a mystery figure to the average theatre-goer.

What Hersholt and Morgan were selling was a suit of armor, tailored to fit Shirley and anybody else in motion pictures who might some day find himself in a situation where some sort of armor would be the best protection against Fate, which is not always kind to life's little mortals.

The armor is money with which to do for those who may, in the course of their careers, rocket up to fame and opulence and as dizzily rocket down again to sad impoverishments, to illnesses, to any number of impasses out of which they plead for extrication.

And that is why Shirley Temple for money would not go on a commercial coast-to-coaster, but was quite happy to go on one for nothing.

But, not for nothing really.

And thereon hangs a tale of professional responsibilities well and honestly met; a tale that disproves a cliche that corporations have no heart; a tale, in short, of fine men and women and of a radio program they sustain brilliantly because of love—of less-fortunate fellows.

Let Bette Davis, superlatively fine actress, say for all of the great-hearted actors and actresses who take part in Gulf Oil Company's "Screen Guild Theatre" (KNX, 9:30 p. m., Sundays.)

"Just for money? No! For humanity, yes!"

It may be an anomaly that radio should be the means through which the indigent of motion pictures find alleviated many of their problems. In the past, stars, pro-ducers, directors and other film workers have donated one-half of one per cent from salaries to aid in work of the Motion Picture Relief Fund, benefactee of Gulf Oil Company's \$10,000 weekly payment in season to motion picture actors and actresses who take part in the company's radio program. It would seem, offhand, that stars carning annual salaries sometimes many times in excess of even that of the nation's chief executive would be happy to give the Lord's tithe to the cause of those who have come, have seen, have conquered and, adding a phrase to "Veni, vedi, vici"-failed of "ultimate victory." Anomaly or not, the one-half of one per cent was not enough to care for anything save immediate needs of the fund.

Much of the story should deal with kindly Jean Hersholt. Day in and out his great Danish heart expresses concern for the unfortunates of his calling.

"To work for one's own is a good calling for any man," graying Hersholt says simply. He means by that, that each professional group should exercise stewardship over the sorely beset in the group. It is social cooperation to human ends that bespeaks, more stentoriously than trumpet blares, man's will to serve his fellow if given the chance. For Jean Ilersholt daily rise prayers from occupants of 10 beds-in-perpetuity at Los Angeles' Cedars of Lebanon Hospital. The beds were made possible by Hersholt's work in having allocated \$100,000 from the Will Rogers Memorial Fund.

We called on Wilma Bashor, executive secretary for Motion Picture Relief Fund. Miss Bashor, brown-eyed, plump-ish, attractive, sprint - voiced, has been with MPRF since 1931. Graduate of Boston University and University of Southern California, her photographic mind works with the precision of a projection machine in presenting the drama of her

work. She skims hastily over figures to detail interesting dramas of degradation and regeneration, of individual triumphs over conditions. She recalls:

. . . the young man who stood before her desk, his pallid features flushed spottily with constant fever. It is 1932. He. has come close to the end of his mortal tether. His lungs sting with the raging burn of tuberculosis. His story is coughed out from pink-stained lips. He has been a type player, a circus contortionist.

"A doctor told me my days are numbered," he says falteringly.

"Our own physicians confirmed what he had been told," Miss Bashor said. "It was a case, then, of making his remaining days as comfortable as possible. But we have always tried to reverse the situation in which the individual finds himself. In his case we decided to do all that could be done to save him."

The story went on . . .

The lad is on the desert, where sunshine, warm and vitalizing, streams down upon his naked body, driving life-giving rays deep into him, slowly forcing dread T.B.'s retreat from painful lungs. Fresh air from the desert, the rich nourishment of goat's milk and proper food, regularity in hours, gradually increased exercises combine to add more numbers to the days that were given him to live before the day he talked with Wilma Bashor. Gradually there came a day when the sly insistence of death that he was marked for its own troubled him no longer. He was well. Today? Well, he is married, is in full health, has a business of supplying cacti to the nation's fanciers and has a future to look into. The cacti business he developed while convalescently roaming desert reaches.

This would be one of thousands of cases. We will come to another shortly. First, some facts and figures concerning Gulf Oil Corporation, "Screen Guild Theatre" and the Fund.

The oil company to date has underwritten approximately 73 Screen Guild programs, has paid out to actors and actresses an estimated \$730,000. This amount the actors and actresses have turned over to the Fund, after giving performances that rank with the best in radio. This month the Fund gave full care for 781 troubled families, a total of 1,562 persons; last year maintained 8,095 individuals on budgets that assured full and decent maintenance, re-strengthened hope and increased spirit and vitality with which to cope with the setbacks they had met.

Wilma Bashor considers her work as "socially significant," which is understatement of the most understating kind. She might have said that for once it has been demonstrated how three ordinarily unrelated factors can be related and made to strike a total of human happiness and benefit. These three factors in the case of Screen Guild Theatre have been combined to accomplish what no politically-snarled system of relief-giving could ever do.

First there is a great corporation refuting the oft-heard outcry: Corporationshave no heart. Second, there is the disposition of fine men and women to accept their obligation to their craft and fellow-craftsmen.

These two factors have combined to give decent and self-respecting ald to human beings, giving them a chance to salvage from wrecked spirits and economy the precious bits from which they might again build their competences.

Except for summer suspensions, the program has given the relief fund \$10,000 weekly since its first CBS broadcast in 1938. This accounts for the \$730,000 to date, part of which money will be used for con-

struction of a home for aged and indigent film workers in San Fernando Valley.

Since inception of the series, 197 stars and featured players have donated services, some making two and three appearances. Bette Davis alone has contributed services in excess of \$15,000, judged in value of her appearances on a commercial broadcast.

In the open market the services of these players and stars would have cost \$787,000, but 57 of them could not have heen purchased for radio on an openmarket basis, because film contracts prohibit even guest appearances on air. Not only have the stars given freely

Not only have the stars given ircely of their time, but they have often put aside personal plans to help. Twentyfour hours before he was slated to face the microphones with Myrna Loy, William Powell was ordered a-bed by his physicians. Within an hour James Stewart,

Jimmy Cagney, Cary Grant, Fred Mac-Murray and Clark Gable had offered to substitute. Stewart got the role because he was first to volunteer.

"I was never quite so happy as when I saw my handsome check for services turned over to the Fund, and the mitigation of sufferings of others," Stewa said.

Some stars refuse substitutes. Ann Sothern, for instance, was ill in Good Samaritan hospital when rehearsals were called with Robert Young and Melvyn

The Free Company

THE year is 1776. The young nation is stumbling and bleeding along a torturous way. A ragged Army fights stubbornly to keep alight a spiritual torch of liberty, against which blow the windy ircs of an arrogant king.

The men thrust their tired bodies against a thousand ramparts on a thinly extended line of battle. Wives serve at home, by tallow candle and light of pine knot moulding the bullets and rolling paper cartridges.

Fighting, they were perplexed, these stalwarts of America's borning hours, when the red tide of blood ran riot through eastern mountains and valleys. Perplexed, for there were among them those who talked suavely of hopelessness and pleaded in special terms that Liberty's cause be abandoned.

But, more clearly than guileful phrases of Colonial traitors and saboteurs rang the spiritual cry of the greatest number.

"We have come here seeking peace and competence, to build here a sanctuary to Freedom for all men."

Redoubled was the fury of the assaults in mountain and plain, along the red running rivers of the Colonies. Freedom's fight could not be stayed by those who would deny it life. There would come a time when across hill and dale, over river and plain, up mountain and down, from rockbound coast to sun flooded one —words would be abroad in the land. The words were Liberty and Democracy.

It is 1941 now. Again propagandists are in Liberty's land, from England, Germany, France, Japan, Italy, Spain and Russia, pleading their causes. And how shall America answer?

Part of the answer may be given by the men pictured on this page. It is their intention to broadcast weekly dramatizations of highlights in America's continuing struggle for freedom. The first of these dramatizations will be aired Feb. 23 at 11 a. m. from Los Angeles' station KNX.

Last week these men, all top-flight American writers, made radio news by banding together as "The Free Company" by declaring that foreign propaganda can be made as powerless as arrows shot against armored tanks, and this by the simple expedient of bolstering concepts of what American liberty means. The first drama in the series will be by James Boyd who said:

"Americans don't like to be pushed around, no matter who is trying to do the pushing."

That "no matter who" may make this program as touchy as a bottle of high test nitro. But, stand by! Mayhap, the shades of the Colonists are abroad in the land!

Chef Milani's Sunday Dinner

For Eight Persons

Chicken soup a la Reine Jumbo Olives Celery Gherkins Tender Made ham with sherry wine sauce Jardiniere carrots au beurre Sweet candied potatoes Jellied asparagus salad Brussells sprouts Coffee Pear pie special

Recipe for Tender Made Ham with Sherry Wine Sauce

1 Wilson's Tender Made ham

- 5 tablespoons dry mustard
- 5 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 package whole cloves
- 3 cups sherry wine

Unwrap ham and cut diamond shape on top surface, until the knife touches the solid meat. Then mix well mustard, brown sugar and one-half cup of sherry wine and spread on top of the ham. Insert one clove in each diamond and then put ham in a roasting pan and pour on the bottom of the pan the other two and one-half cups of wine. Put to bake in an oven that has been pre-heated to 400 degrees and bake five minutes to the pound, baste twice with wine sauce while baking.

Recipe for Candied Sweet Potatoes

- 8 medium-sized sweet potatoes
- 1 pound butter
- 1/2 pound brown sugar

Parboil potatoes and then peel them and cut in halves lengthwise. Put butter and brown sugar in a double boiler and let melt on top of fire. Place potatoes in a greased baking sheet pan, and pour the brown sugar and butter mixture over the surface of the potatoes. Half hour before serving dinner, bake potatoes in oven at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until the potatoes form a glace.

Recipe for Signet Pear Pie

2 jars Signet U. S. grade A glass pears

- tablespoons lemon juice cups and 4 tablespoons pastry flour 9
- teaspoon salt
- 2-3 cup shortening or butter

1/4 cup cold water Open jars of Signet pears and drain the syrup, which you can use if you wish to make some gelatine desserts. Cut the pears in slices and sprinkle the lemon juice through the sliced pears. Have the shortening or butter and water very cold, sift and resift the flour and the salt. Mix the flour with shortening or butter in a bowl until the flour looks like small beans, then add the cold water by sprinkling it little by little, tossing with a fork and bringing it up through When the mixture forms a ball, divide in two, and the mixture. place in refrigerator to chill. Roll a sheet of dough, one-eighth of an inch to fit in 9-inch pie tin. Fill with sliced bears, roll the

other sheet and make some slits and cover the pie. Bake for 10 minutes at 450 degrees and then reduce heat to 400 and bake for 30 minutes longer. * * *

This Week-You're in a Stew!

STEW AND STEW MAKE STEW-That's culinary arithmetic for you. We're giving you three of them among our recipes this week, so we have a perfect right to repeat the word stew three times.

Be that as it may, here are a few things to keep in mind when stewing around:

The meat should be cut in about 2-inch squares. You can saute it first if you like, but at any rate, it should be cooked for quite a while before you put in the vegetables. Then, for the best of flavors, the vegetables should be added according to the time required to cook each one. It doesn't do to have the carrots donc to a puree while the potatoes are still hard.

Seasonings, of course, can either spoil or make a stew, so watch your hand with the salt and pepper and don't be afraid of a bay leaf now and then. A clove or two can do nice things for a stew too; and so can a dash of mace, a little paprika or a touch of vinegar

But that's enough now. We may want to talk about stews again some time. Don't forget, however, that among the vegetables chosen for a stew, a tomato can seldom do any harm.

Chef Milani's 'Stew' Recipes

Recipe for Beef Stew Marseillaise

2	pounds ground beef cup diced flat bacon	"Wilson"
	onions	
1	calf's foot	
2	carrots	
3	tomatoes	
4	cloves garlic	

~prig parsley	
Some mixed herbs	
bay leaf	
cloves	
pint red wine	
cup beef stock	
tablespoon oil

Cut the meat in pieces weighing three ounces each. Put the oil and lard in a saucepan with the bacon, cut in dice, also add sliced vegetables, calves foot, split in half, and the meat. When the meat and vegetables begin to brown, add the wine and stock, the herbs and the seasoning. Bring to a boil, cover the saucepan and let simmer very gently until meat is tender. This dish can be eaten hot or cold. It is delicious when cold, and to serve this way, the stew should be put in a mold, and the liquid drained over it. It will set into a firm jelly if kept in a cool place.

Veal Stew Florentine

2 pounds leg of young veal cup tomato pulp tablespoons white wine 3 cloves garlic

2 sprigs rosemary herb 4 tablespoons olive oil 1 tablespoon Seasonettes

Cut the meat in 2-inch squares, put the oil in a saucepan, and when hot add the sliced garlic. Cook until a light brown and add the meat. Season with Seasonettes. When meat gets slightly brown add the tomato pulp, the wine and the rosemary. Bring to a boil and simmer for one and one-half hours until meat is tender.

Ed. Note: The following are para-graphic reviews of inte issued record-ings, selected as among the less of the week, but criticnily heard. They may be heard and purchased at Mu-sic City. Sunset Boulevard and Vine streets. Hollywood, where one of the world's largest stocks of recordings is available.

Song of the Volga Boatman (Glenn Miller and Orchestra) Blueb'rd: This old Russian folksong as arranged by Glenn Miller is a hodge-podge that results in the incongruous idea of Harlem being somewhere along the Volga, Near Stalin's Georgia, I presume. There are a few effective passages but they, like the whole, are misleading. Near the last few bars of the Russian equivalent of "Pull Men, Pull," one comes to the solid conclusion that the hysteria of Igor Stravinsky was an instrumental force felt by the arranger. Reverse, Chapel in the Valley (Ray Eberle, vocal): Here is sweet music that can be Glenn Miller, the Glenn Miller one remembers at the Glen Island Casino. . . . One remembers.

I Hear a Rhapsody (Benny Goodman, vocal by Helen Forrest) Columbia: He of the clarinet, Mr. Goodman has recorded herewith a good arrangement by Fragos-Baker. In spite of Miss Forrest's vocal rendition, one wishes more of that full orchestra and its effective hesitance. Re-verse, I Left My Heart in Your Hand: This is a swingy tune with a preponderance of sweet saxophones, Miss Forrest being in much more of her element.

Chinese Rhumba (Clyde Lucas and Orchestra; vocal, Lynn Lucas) Columbia: This record is evidently a Chinese rhumba. Just what a Chinese rhumba is, might be imagined but not on these pages. The very idea must be in itself embarrassing to the Chinese and embarrassing to me because it must be embarrassing to everyone. Reverse, She's Way Up Thar: This record opens with a voice saying, "Come on folks, let's have some fun." Outside of the quartet which one hears only occasionally, it still remains an open invitation.
