COMMUNIST BILL OF RIGHTS: In general terms, the American Bill of Rights, integral part of the United States' constitution, restrains the central government from enacting laws abridging or restricting certain rights held inalienable in theory through more than a century and a half of the republic's life.

Most often quoted parts of the bill are those respecting rights of free assembly and speech, the non-abridgment of socially recognized religions. To free Americans, these clauses are as life itself, for from them stem the energetic social enthusiasms, serious and profound, that bulwark the slow advancement of democratic attainment.

During past fortnight, to the nearly incredulous amazement of millions of citizens, a major American newspaper chain seized upon resolutions condemning as radical CBS' "Free Company" which had been passed by a California section of far-flung American Legion, war veterans' organization. Thus was raised for thoughtful Westerners, other citizens elsewhere in the land, the question:

"Is the bill of rights a communist document by nature of its wording, its accepted meaning?"

While many shrugged shoulders, dismissed the incident as one in which sincerely nation-concerned veterans had been "taken in" by an indirect attempt to outsmart one Orson Welles, author of "Citizen Kane," life story of a newspaper publisher, others were thoughtfully angry.

These latter saw in the attack an attack on the constitution itself, made the more astonishing by the fact that it rose from veterans whose patriotism is to be considered unimpeachable, was lent verbal flame and fury by the press chain.

Radio Life, seeking facts, learned: Members of the "Free Company," at one of whose membership the resolutions were aimed, are these Americans:

James Boyd, North Carolina, author and chairman of the Free Company, a first lieutenant of the American Expeditionary Forces in France, veteran of St. Mihiel, Meuse-Argonne and Argonne campaigns, author of "Drums" and now a \$1.00 per year man with the United States department of justice; 2) Robert E. Sherwood, New York born member of the famed Black Watch regiment of Canada, author of Pulitzer prize winning anti-Communist war play "There Shall Be No Night," and of "Waterloo Bridge"; and, among other distinguished citizens, Sherwood Anderson, S. V. Brent, Paul Green, Ernest Hemingway, author of "Farewell to Arms," pungent lecturer on democracy; Archibald McLeish, congressional librarian; Elmer Rice, William Saroyan, Orson Welles (against whose CBS broadcast, "His Honor, the Mayor," most of veterans' ire was expended).

Other facts: Chairman Boyd was requested by the department of justice to prepare a broadcast series to revitalize Americans' interest in democratic life. Thus was CBS placed in uncomfortable

hole, unable to comment on the attack, waited for federal action, if any, on it. Salient fact learned: The Free Company series has been zealous and informative in acquainting the citizenship with full significances of the bill of rights, strove hard to appraise America in sober and constructive terms, will, a CBS official said, continue to inform and appraise.

Apparent objective of the amazing flood of invective was Orson Welles' "His Honor, the Mayor" broadcast, story of a mayor in a small and typical American community, defending the right of free assembly to a group of citizens accused by others as "radicals."

Pleaded Orson Welles' mayor in substance: "Listen, boys, I know them and I know you. As long as they want to meet and talk, that's their right—as long as they don't preach violence." To this substantially-reported, essentially democratic, script wording did the storm come.

By last week, what seemed at first to be a major national home and corner discussion topic, had slopped harmlessly into two items of amusement:

1) A Legion official, taking his patriotism "big," had named Orson Welles as the principal in two radical air plays, one: "The Mole on Lincoln's Cheek"; the other, "His Honor, the Mayor," of which Welles had appeared in one-the last named.

2) That Orson Welles had again turned

his penchant for gaining publicity to account. His "Citizen Kane," strange story of a newspaper chain publisher, bade fair to pack Los Angeles' El Capitan theater, night of May 5, date scheduled for its opening.

BOULEVARD QUIZZER: Average radio entertainers consider it a sizable task to go before microphones, put over well prepared scripts, alone or with other radio artists. Tough is the job of interviewing or quizzing non-professionals before mikes, even though carefully selected before program starts. When these are selected and interviewed on the spot, without preliminary information a b o ut them, it is toughest of all.

To Hal Hodge in his Hollywood Boulevard Quiz program from KMPC, such assignments are all in day's work. Each day he and sound engineen "set up shop" on a different spot in Hollywood's shopping center, never knowing whom he is to find in front of him, to be interviewed, quizzed. Armed with mike, a fist full of tickets to Hollywood first-run motion pictures, which he awards as prizes for the correct answers to his quiz programs, Hodge has became a contemporary Hollywood figure. Questions asked are usually about Hollywood, about radio or motion pictures.

An amazing variety of folk stop be-



fore the Hollywood Boulevard Quiz mike. They come from an amazing variety of places, reflect the cosmopolitan character of Hollywood boulevard. Most just happen by. Hodge has quizzed people from New York, Illinois, Kansas, Canada, France, Hungary and Holland, in addition to visitors from Santa Barbara, Pasadena, Santa Monica, Redondo, Huntington Park and San Fernando valley towns.

Celebrities of screen, stage or radio occasionally are lured to the microphone. For them Hodge reserves the hard quiz questions of folks "in the business."

THE HEIDT TRUMPETEERS: Flattering to Horace Heidt, radio orchestra conductor, is the work of Helen Hayes Hemphill, director of a voluntary Heidt fan organization, national in scope and publishing an occasional journal called "The Heidt Trumpeter."

Last week Radio Life interviewed Miss Hemphill, learned in her words:

"We print the 'Heidt Trumpeter' every

Busy housewife is Helen Hayes Hemphill, who said further:

"It is flattering to Horace and the Musical Knights that we now have over 500 officially sanctioned members throughout the country, with leaders in 20 key cities. (Majorettes, if girls, and Majors if they are men). There are members in Hawaii, Mexico, Canada and British Columbia, with prospects in New Zealand and Australia."

Philosophical is Mrs. Hemphill in these words:

"I believe everyone should have a hobby and a sense of humor. Without these we're sunk. One can easily fit a hobby into housework. It requires merely a reasonable organization of time and effort. Fortunately, I've usually been able to express myself on subjects that interest me and it was possible for me to learn much about service. As a past president of P.-T.A., I recall our "Service Is the Price You Pay for the Space You Occupy."

"Many belittle fan clubs, confusing door-hanger-on-ers with the type of person who works constructively and officially for the progress of his or her favorite. We try to inject sincerity, a sane, coherent plan into our work. MYSTERIOUS BARITONE: Many a Los Angeles motorist, up early and rolling along Hollywood traffic arteries probably has heard a sonorous baritone from depths of a maroon coupe singing with ribald intentness:

"There are strange things done 'neath . the midnight sun

By the men who toil for gold . . . The Northern trails have their secret tales

That would make your blood run cold . . . "

In all probability the mysterious baritone is one Bob Garred, CBS newscaster, who thus strenuously of a morning tunes up his radio voice for the day.

A few weeks ago Garred decided to get his voice in early-morning trim by singing from the moment he got up, until he reached his KNX studio at 6:45 to rehearse a 7:30 a. m. news broadcast.

Ordinarily Garred likes rollicking ballads. They loosen up vocal chords faster. He likes to put his head out the car window on a sunny morning and bellow: "Tough as a steak was Yukon Jake

Hard boiled as a picnic egg . . . "

During inclement weather Garred's repertoire takes on somber hues. Southland motorists have reported hearing "Hamlet's Soliloquy," Verdi's "Requiem," Grey's "Elegy in a Country Church Yard," and "She Was Only a Coal Miner's Daughter" as early as 6 a. m.

TELEPHONE HOUR RESEARCH: The Telephone Hour program, Monday evenings, 4 p. m., KFI, was first large commercial program to maintain a skilled staff of story hunters to spend full time digging up unknown fasts about well known musical selections.

Research for one program requires nearly a week. Sometimes, when the story behind a musical selection is particularly elusive, it may take two weeks to track down. These story hunters have varied sources for material. In New York public library newspaper clippings date back to the middle 1800's and often unusual stories are found there. Other sources are the publisher and the composer himself, or someone who knew him. On one occasion an aria was to be used that mentioned a birl called the "Mysoli." The Audubon Society, Smithsonian Institute, Brazilian chamber of commerce, Museum of Natural History and other institutions were checked. Result: No such bird was known.

Rumored it was that Robert Schumann used a mysterious invention to strengthen fingers. Telephone Hour researchers couldn't find it at the patent office. Another time they discovered the composer of "Song of the Bayou," Rube Bloom, had never been farther south than Brooklyn, New York.

The American Historical Irish Society cooperates when material is needed about Irish songs. In gathering material for a Welsh number, contacts were made with practically every Welshman in New York City.

Intrepid tracker-downers, the researchists have learned that Negro spirituals are the most difficult to get goods on. There are no stories back of their origin. In doing research on Paganini's "Perpetual Motion," the researchers invaded government patent offices to find phoney inventions on perpetual motion. They have gone as far as to hire translators to go over old scripts and papers concerning a piece of music, selected for broadcast.

AIR'S PROPERTY MAN: Radio's only property man is one Jack Farnell, of Truth or Consequences, a program that owes much of its interest to "props" gathered each week by Farnell so that con-

testants can fulfill "consequences" for incorrect answers to questions.

Ridiculous as it may seem to radio listeners, time and money is spent to obtain materials of divers sorts for use on the program. It is Farnell's job to provide.

Of his job, Farnell said last week:

"Nothing surprises me any more: I wouldn't take it big if Ralph Edwards, my boss, told me to get the Niagara Falls for a 'consequence' for Saturday night's program. I've obtained practically everything else."

A consequence called for a person to sell a refrigerator to an Eskimo. Farnell tried booking agents, found no Eskimo. The World's Fair had closed. All the Eskimos had gone back to Alaska. His search finally led him to New York's 71st street and Amsterdam avenue. There he found an Eskimo woman. Because she was expecting a child, she hadn't left town with the rest of her tribe. Farnell persuaded her to go on the show. He had as much trouble trying to get an Indian so one of the contestants could sell New York back to the Indians. It took five days to locate one. His name was Chief Blue Tooth.

One consequence called for a woman to give backseat driving instructions. Farnell had to comb all the junk yards for three days to locate a jaloppy which would put the one used in "Grapes of Wrath" to shame. The car cost only \$10, but cost \$35 to haul to the theater.

Most embarrassing prop searches are those in quest of women's clothes. Frequently the consequences call for men to dress their wives or sell women's "unmentionables" to women. Farnell, at first, used to stutter all over the store trying to tell the sales girl just what he wanted. Now, however, the tables are turned. "The girls now become embarrassed when I strut up to the counter and rattle off just what I want with the exact measurements and correct sales expressions," says Farnell. "One thing about this racket, you learn fast."

With a bang-up job of arrangement, Artie Shaw's clarinet sets the stage for a balancing act between the saxophones, brass and violins, the latter of which are in particularly good taste. The tutti of the full band and subsequent arrangement is undoubtedly an example of the reason for a great deal of Artie Shaw's popularity.

Reverse: Marinela-Rumba. For Saxons with Latin leanings. Played by Saxons with saxophones and clarinets and other wind instruments. The accents are handled by the trumpets, but the grace note thumpings heard in the background are definitely of Latin origin.

In an interview a few weeks ago, Michael certainly handed us girls a gentle but effective pasting. "Frankly, Irene," he said, "I'm crazy about women but I distrust them."

Makers of Musical Steel

Brawny Steel Mill • Workers Make Music That Made Wheeling

BY DAY Wheeling, West Virginia, upspouts columns of smoke from dozens of steel hives, high-funneling the upper blue skies that look down upon a state whose roots are firm in colonial soil.

By night flames stab and flood against the down-hanging dark, run across night's black curtain like a kaleidoscope's colors.

Listen closely and you hear the sputter of blast furnaces, the giant rumbles of heavy duty machinery, the spit and the crackle of steel being fabricated under high temperatures.

Here, in Wheeling, men and women, tough muscled and alert, are makers of steel, a powerful sinew in the mighty arm of Uncle Sam as he girds himself for the future.

Wheeling is a city of music—Wagnerian music of conquest and struggle, of labor and sweat. On miles of trackage, oreladen freights clatter, bringing primal metal to the furnaces. Huge buckets lift molten metal away in the glaring heat from the gaseous-burning lips of the furnaces. Steel is being made to accompaniment of sound that is like a Devil's symphony—noisy, raucous—but with a strange persistent melody.

There was a time when the standing joke in some parts of the country was the question, "What is the biggest job in the United States?" the answer being, "Wheeling West Virginia." However, if that were the chief claim to fame that this thriving West Virginia town had, this story would not have been written.

At one time famous as a frontier town, and later, as a nail center and river port, the city of Wheeling has since experienced many varying degrees of fame, including an era in which it was the capital of West Virginia. Then, in 1938, something happened—seemingly an unimportant thing.

A line or two about Wheeling began to appear in metropolitan newspapers, small town dailies, magazines and rural weeklies. People in New York City no longer asked "Where's that?" when they saw a West Virginia auto license plate, and people all over the country began to find that 5 o'clock was a good time to begin their Sunday radio listening.

Wheeling radio station WWVA one day called the advertising manager of Wheeling Steel, offered the company a part in a series of industrial radio pro-

grams. There was to be a little music, a talk—simple stuff.

An idea was born. Why not a regular radio program using amateur talent from the mills, from among relatives of employees? Amazing to the established, sophisticated, radio star, technician, even to some listeners, is that a bunch of steelworkers and members of their families can attract so many radio listeners with their amateur efforts. The boys and girls heard each week are presented for what they are, nothing more. They like to do a good job so they work hard at it.

There are no ringers on the Musical Steelmakers. Dorothy Ann Crowe is a Wheeling girl whose family has lived in Wheeling for generations. She received her early music training from her mother, later studied in a convent academy. She is 18 years old. Dorothy Ann's uncle is



also a member of the Employee Family. He is Walter Schane, one of the Singing Millmen. Walter is a pipe man from a Wheeling steel mill and probably knows more about pipe than diminished chords. He is the baritone of the Singing Millmen Quartet. With him is Frank Nalepa, bass, a yardman and scale repairman at another Wheeling mill. Frank is tough and his hands command the respect of a Dempsey, Top tenor, William Stevenson, is the oldest. He is 50, but he does a day's work every day in the same yards as Nalepa. Bill Griffiths, the lead tenor, catches "black plate" from flying shears and stacks it for the tinning department. Often these fellows come to rehearsal with bandaged heads, smashed fingers, or a limp, but they have been bulwarks of the program from the start. Last summer they were included in Sigmund's Spaeth's "Barbershop Harmony" book, and along with Reinald Werrenrath, John Charles Thomas and other outstanding performers, were names of the Singing Millmen.

Regina Colbert lives with her parents in Wheeling and works in the advertising department of the Wheeling Steel Corporation as a stenographer. She began singing on kiddie programs and was singing in a small nightspot in Wheeling when Wheeling Steel talent scouts discovered her.

Ardenne White, 23, hits the same tonal grooves as Kenny Baker and Dennis Day, yet is scared because agents insist he is ready for "big time." With a college degree in music and dramatics, Ardenne is music librarian in the advertising department of Wheeling Steel.

The "Steele Sisters" are daughters of mill workers, comprise a trio formed when the girls were sophomores in high school. Accepted for a spot on the program in

RADIATION – An Editorial

THE spectacle of an association of veterans and Hearst newspapers attacking, by implications, the United States Department of Justice for conduct subversive to the best interests of the nation must astonish all good-intentioned citizens. For, as you now must know, the "Free Company" series, so vigorously condemned and publicized by citizen Hearst's (not Kane's) press, was brought into being at the request of the Department of Justice.

These are the facts: Months ago, Mr. James Boyd, chairman of the "Free Company" (which is composed of leading American writers), was called to Washington by the Department. The Department sought aid with a problem that bothered it: The effectiveness of hostile propaganda is greater here than generally realized. Mr. Boyd, with the help of other patriotic Americans, outlined a proposed series of broadcasts. Approved by the Solicitor-General and by the Attorney-General of the land, the Free Company dedicated its talents to frank appraisal of America, the freedom we wish to retain, the faults we wish to remove.

but to retard, if ever so little, the strong, flowing sweep of us all toward a healthy and lusty expression of a free society, committed to mass welfare, to defense of its right to grow stronger and freer, ever saner in every day relationships, more competent and contented in the development and sharing of the resources of America-our country-not Germany's, Italy's, Russia's, France's or England's-but America, the land of those who can be brave in its honest defense, those who will be free . . .

The Columbia Broadcasting Company added dignified stature by this attack. The Free Company has gained added respect for its courage. The United States Department of Justice gets plaudits for proving wrong those who have said it is a tool of entrenched privilege, whether of gang politicians in America or totalitarianists and imperialists abroad.

N THE plate-like level of the land sliding from the indolent hills, they were gathering rapidly. From where they stood, sheltered by a thin, stumpy growth upthrust from banks of a bend in the Little Big Horn, the two Custer scouts heard their angry shouts. The sound rose like a hive drone into the blazing turquoise skies of Dakota territory.

"Effen we could only draw a bead on ole Sittin' Bull hisself, I guess maybe the Indian wars would be done."

The speaker spat hardily. His spittle raised a tiny dust flurry from the bank. Behind the scouts their intelligent horses, wise in territorial ways of danger, stood quietly, flanks heaving.

"Yeah, boy. Maybe. But we ain't a-pikin' Sittin' Bull out of that jamboree. W'all, I guess maybe this is it. We seen enough, lad. Let's mount and get back to the outfit. Custer'll be hiding us for fair ef en we don't. We been long enough. Shorely this be the place where we have it out"

The other scout nodded assent. They moved back from the river on all fours, reached their horses and, mounting, raced away through the blasting heat of June's 26th day in 1876.

It was to be a day of military tragedy for the westward-pushing young republic of the United States; a tragedy only too familiar to the generations that were to follow, to build stronger on the foundations of men who had gone out to win the west. In that day General George Custer and Lis 7th U. S. Cavalry were to go down fighting under the arrows and guns of feathered warriors assembled from throughout the hostile, table-landed Territories. They were to come, the best of the warrior crop, to make their last great stand against the white man, whose wagons grooved the soil over to the west, whose guns had contested for land possession from Illinois, across the Mississippi, who was even then planting his bearded chin and setting his stern face toward the ranges beyond the flat and badlands. They came at the call of Sitting Bull, wiliest leader of them all. It was he whom daring scouts had heard say in the wigwam councils, say with an astonishingly shrewd primitive statesmanship:

"The white man and his ways are different. He will drive us from the hunting grounds, suhdue our villages, set himself as a king upon us. The Great Spirit must be with us. The time has come to challenge the white man once, now and for always. You will go to your tribes and in the second moon's falling, gather on the Little Big Horn. There we shall trap the white man. There shall he, and many, perish to be a discouragement for the others who would follow."

Drums were beating along the Little Big Horn and signal fires were alight from the low lying ridges as Custer, with his 7th Cavalry, padded slowly across the prairie to keep his rendezvous with fate.

What was to happen within a few short hours of the 26th of June in 1876 was to make history. It was also to go down in history as a legend of the white man, a legend in which was a great truth: "The course of empire shall not be stayed when there are willing hands and guns and men and women of courage to reach out for room to live and to grow."

Later they were to say that there were no supvivors of the massacre on the Little Big Horn. And "they" were to be wrong. For there were to be survivors, all because of a premonition of Custer's on the day he was to die in battle's heat, as a soldier of our land would die for the Cause of the People of the Land.

The concentration of Indian warriors along the Little Big Horn seemed too obvious. Custer, listering to reports of his scouts, suspected ambush, but it was too late to turn back. The gage of battle had been cast. He ordered the 7th Cavalry split into three separate squadrons and these fanmed out, driving out spokelike across the country, to force into action any bands secreted by the resourceful Sitting Bull. With his main body, Custer plodded on toward the Indian assembly. The rest is history and could be told

here again. It is not told, however, because if we were to write anything it would be about one of the two scouts mentioned in the start of this article. It was he who was to survive the red-running slaughter that sweltering day in June, 1876; who was to live to relate actually what happened on that bloody afternoon. Jacob Warner, Custer scout, is 86 now, but on April 27 at 9 p. m. his voice will speak from the shaded precincts of history that has been made in America's past. He will tell over CBS-KNX program, "I Was There," the story of Custer's massacre.

ET us turn to another scene marked LET us turn to another seeme any past upon the pages of the receding past of a nation's life. This scene is closer, is more narrowly and obviously seen.

It is a day in 1912. The west, even though the time is but 28 years removed from us now, is still a sprawling, stillto-be-shaped empire. It is two years before the World war, but even so, men have fresh memories of Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, other hard-talking, gunswinging heroes of the century's turning.

Into Los Angeles came one Jesse Lasky to put up at the small city's leading Hotel Hayward, to ask a question none could answer:

"Where is Hollywood?"

Jesse Lasky was certain, however, that there was a Hollywood. The name of the place had been told him in the thriving east. It was, he had been told, not far from Los Angeles. There was a trail leading out of the city, through palm and orange groves, through forests of pepper trees, up and down valley reaches shining with poppies and poinsettias, teeming with sub-tropical bird and animal life. Lasky found the trail and with a hired buggy and strong horses, drove off into the sunlighted fastnesses along the trail. He drove for nearly a day and came to the end of the trail. At trail's end was a hotel, now famous in historical annals as Hollywood Hotel, now located at intersection of Hollywood's garish Hollywood boulevard and the avenue called Highland that flows out of San Fernando hills and across the now home- and building-packed mesas to the south. "This was Hollywood."

So, perhaps, will Jesse Lasky, on the same program, begin his dramatic recital of 29 years of development of the world's

most glamorous industry-motion pictures.

WE TURN AGAIN-this time much closer in time's perspective. London is being fire-bombed. Nazi aerial "blitz" thunders with shattering force out of revolting heavens, stabbed to the greenish quick with the sword lights of thousands of searchlights, picking out the winged invaders for the sharp staccato retorts of anti-aircraft batteries below. A covey of Spitfires runs across a darkened landing field like a group of frightened sand pipers. But, these are no frightened birds that whine into the light-breaking heavens where death is in a convulsion of orgiastic fervor. These are men of the Royal Air Force going aloft to meet the challengers, men of England, warily but bravely, storming into skies to meet men of Germany in Europe's eternal conquests of nations.

The covey of Spitfires is high aloft now, dipping and turning, diving and zooming. Their guns are blazing in lethal bursts. A Stuka comes screaming past in a tight, earthbound dive. Beneath the Stuka's belly bomb sticks protrude, waiting but the flick of a lever to be released, to go plunging down to add to the destruction of the city. Flames leap like overworked cauldrons of Hades below. Other planes turn and bank, their guns crackling. Here and there, now and again, a burst of light illumines the deadly scene and a plane spins out of control, tracing its course of earthy death by fire spumes from its agonizedly-twisting fuselage.

In one of the planes sits RAF Pilot Kennley, his fingers pressing the sensitive triggers of multiple-connected guns. Above him a Stuka noses over, starts its whining flight down. For a fractional instant Kennley sees the face of the (Concluded on Page Nineteen)

(Concluded from Page Seventeen) Stuka's pilot framed behind the glass of the control booth. His fingers press hard. His guns chatter. A row of small period points dots the side of the Stuka, climbs up a little. Lead splatters into the face of the German. The German's face seems to leap into dissolution. The Stuka drops, nose down. Kennley does not see what happens, but, below, fire wardens speed to a spot where instantly a sheet of red has jumped skyward and died suddenly down as a blob of intense light. The Stuka has made its last flight. Kennley and his mates fight on in defense of the largest city in their homeland. Inexorably the German plane waves come on, dropping their deadly bomb-loads. Below, the city seems a doomed lake of fire. Kennley realizes what is going on there below and his mouth tightens in toughhard lines. His guns chatter insistently. Another plane is caught in his fire. Another. Another. An air cannon roars somewhere near him in the amazing concourse of gyrating ships of air. His own ship staggers, falls out of control. Kennley struggles to rise. Pain clutches at him with hungry hands. Blackness floods into his eyes. His ears are torn with the speed of his fall. He drags himself out

of his seat, falls into outer space, his parachute smartly tugging at him, billowing above him in the night. He falls toward his London, racked and beaten and burned.

"As I fell . .

But then again, for us to tell it would be to take from you the opportunity to hear a hero tell it so much better than we could. Kennley will also appear on the program.

Wherever history is made, there were people who saw it made. There are people living who have seen much that made history, but which is merely historical hearsay for the most of us. The CBS program "I Was There" (and I reckon it among the great air shows of today) brings history to life, brings the voices of those who saw and heard what happened. They were there-at Lincoln's and McKinley's assassinations, at Gettysburg, at the Lusitania's sinking, the burning of the lightning-struck Hindenburg at Lakehurst.

They were there . . . and you can be, too, at your radio!

Grapefruit a la Rosa Potage St. Marceau Olives, celery, sweet pickles Chicken saute a la Padre Filauro Timbale of rice Corn on cobs Alligator pear salad Demi tasse Assorted cakes

Recipe for Grapefruit a la Rosa

grapelit.ts cup fresh strawberries cup fresh raspberries 4 thsps. powdered sugar

Peel the grapefruit and put in a salad bowl. Mix the strawberries and the raspberries and the sugar. Strain through a fine colander. Have all very cold. Put the grapefruit in glasses and pour the fresh fruit sauce over it.

Recipe for Chicken a la Padre Filauro

2 spring concrements, 3 lbs. each 3 level tsps. Seasonettes 1-8 lb. butter 2 tbsps. flour cups sherry wine cup thick cream egg yolks 1 can mushrooms

Cut spring chickens in 4 parts each, season with Seasonettes. Put in a saute pan with butter and simmer for 10 minutes or until you get a nice color on the chickens. JUST A PINCH OF SUGAR, OR SUGAR IN A PINCH-Have you ever tried to duplicate the flavor of something you tasted in a restaurant and found that you could get it almost, but not quite? Well, the "not quite" is often due to the fact that you forget to add a pinch of sugar.



You'd be surprised at how many things a pinch of sugar is willing to get along with. French dressing, for instance, or piquant sauces, or broiled or roasted meats, or bread, or vegetables like peas, corn, spinach, carrots, tomatoes. In a pinch, sugar succeeds in emphasizing the flavor of a dish where nothing else will. It makes the food more palatable. Care must be exercised not to use too much however. The sugar should be there, but not exactly tastable.

Wherever you use salt, you needn't hesitate to use a pinch of sugar, and the opposite is also

true. The two seem to complement each other. If you doubt it, just mix a pinch of salt and a pinch of sugar together and taste it. You'll be surprised at the blend.

This Week-Breads!

GIVE US THIS DAY OUR DAILY BREAD-Melchisedek brought out bread to Abram and blessed him. The Greeks once called the Egyptians "artophagi," which means bread eaters. Abraham's wife made bread in the form of hot cakes, and the Romans liked theirs moist and soaked it in milk and honey.

The staff of life has a longer and more colorful history than perhaps any other food, and we are always finding new ways to lean on it. Several more for your file are included in this week's batch of recipes. We hope you'll like them.

Meanwhile, here's some bread history: The importance of bread

making is indicated by such proper names as Miller, Baxter, Baker and Boulanger. In ancient Rome all the bakers were women, until the Greeks started taking over the business. Grape juice has been used as a leavening agent for bread and so has sea water-for salt-rising bread. Finally, influencing our language, bread gives us bread and butter as indicating our livelihood, "bread winner" for a wage earner, bread line for a more unfortunate side of life, and "breadbasket" as a synonym for stomach.

Chef Milani's Bread Recipes

Recipe for California Nut Bread

- cake compressed yeast cup lukewarm water cup scalded milk tsps. salt 1-3 cun sugar tbsp. shortening tsp. vanilla 5 cups flour 1/2 sup Wheat Nuts
- 1 cup broken walnuts

Dissolve yeast in water and then melt shortening in milk, cool to lukewarm, add wi'h rest of ingredients to yeast. Beat till it can be turned onto board in a mass. Knead lightly until sinooth and let rise until light. Knead in nuts, and mold into louves. Put in 2 greased loaf pans, and let rise until light. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes.

Recipe for Gingerbread a la Bob Franklyn

2	cups flour
2	tsps. ginger
1/4	tsp. soda
	tsps. baking powder
	tsp. salt
1-3	tsp. cinnamon
1-3	eup butter
- 1/2	cup brown sugar
2	eggs
	cup molasses
34	cun huttermilk

% cup buttermilk

Sift flour 3 times and measure. Then mix with baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon and ginger. Cream butter thoroughly, add brown sugar and cream together until fluffy. Add eggs and beat until smooth. Then molasses, and then the milk, then the flour, little by little until all used. Bake in a greased pan 9x5x3 inches at 350 degrees for 50 minutes.

Recipe for Orange Bread

Grated rind of 1 orange and juice of 1 orange

- 1/2 1/2 cup water tsp. salt cup sugar
- Milk
- egg 2 tbsps. oil
- 2 cups whole wheat flour
- 3 tsps. baking powder

Combine orange rind, water, salt and sugar, and boil for 10 minutes. Cool and add orange juice and milk to make 11/2 cups. Combine beaten egg, orange rind mixture and the oil. Sift the flour with baking powder. Stir into first mixture and blend. Pour batter into 9x5x3 inch loaf pan greased, bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 55 minutes.

The actor on the Irene Rich program who almost broke up the broadcast when he mis-read "caught in the draft" to "caught in the graft". . . . Jose Rodriguez' slip in thanking his announcer, Don McNamara, by these words: "Thank you, Don McNAMERICA!" . . . The book by Abe Schechter, director of news and special events for NBC, titled "I Live on Air." It gives a swell inside view of the networks' battle for scoops! . . . The amazing results of a one-announcement offer by Herb Allen on his "World's a Stage" program. So far, 6,000 listeners have written in as a result of the one announcement! . . . 1938, the girls continued to go to school and at the same time attended rehearsals and sang on a nationwide program. Each week they take home a sizeable check.

Leading the lads in the Musical Steel-makers' orchestra is their "start and stop" boss, Tommy Whitley, who once worked in a Wheeling Steel coal mine. Though his son has long since given up the shovel for a baton, Tommy's father is an employee in the mills today, after more than a quarter century. The Musical Steelmakers' orchestra is a crack combination of fine effects, comprising five brass, five reeds, three violins and bass viol, piano, novachord, drums, Spanish and electric guitars and harp.

From "nail center" to "river port," to "one-time state capital," Wheeling has raised its head high in national prominence. Broadcast over 98 stations of the Mutual network, the Wheeling Employee Family broadcast has made the name of Wheeling familiar to most Americans.

Above Wheeling smoke billows into the skies.
