#### Shooting War

Through last fortnight American minds went soberly over aired utterances of the President in warnings to Nazi belligerents that American vessels would shoot and shoot first if attacked in waters deemed within defensive limits of the United States. Tongues wagged, citizens became partisans pro and con, seriously wondered what would be consequences of a "shooting war."

As if in answer to the question that this week, perhaps above all others, weighed heaviest on American minds, NBC announced that on September 28 at 11 a. m. (KECA) the program "Wake Up, America" would have as subject for its winter debut:

#### "What Would Be Economic Consequences to the United States of a Shooting War?"

Speakers were to be one un-named opponent to Robert LaFollette, one-time Wisconsin governor, pro-American and articulate isolationist, with famed writer Lowell Thomas to act as a moderator on an hour-long program. To LaFollette and opponent were to be allotted 3 minutes each in debate, plus questions each would ask the other with 1 minute to answer, plus questions from studio audience, plus questions from residents of some city also to be named, questions that would be phoned to nearest telegraph offices, there teletyped, sent direct to speakers' plat-form raised in living room of Thomas' home at Pauling, New York.

"Barring a miracle, we are now in a shooting war."

Thus did Fred G. Clark, general chair-man of American Economic Foundation, program auspicer, say last week what the President nearly two weeks before had virtually said.

Guess was that LaFollette would unlimber oratorical technique coupled with instinct for factual prophesy, would hammer at building a picture of a war-impoverished America staggering through blant realities of post-war depressions. Guess, too, was that his un-named counter-debater would stress possibility that a shooting war would assure all that LaFollette might insist would be lost in war's event.

By week's end publicity on the forthcoming debate had ribboned editorial offices throughout land, from these offices was publicity rephrased, sent out to citi-zens to whom the war issue was stormpounding their national consciousness.

Unconcerned, however, was American Economic Foundation on what way debate would turn. Interested only was the Foundation in "reflecting, not moulding public opinion," said Chairman Clark, who said also: "The Foundation is purely an educational organization, has no opin-

ions on anything except this: that the American way of living is world's best."

For all citizens the program indicated a focal point of attention on the eleventh hour of the Sunday morning in which, in the East, those to debate would meet in a Pauling, New York home, there to say what they believed of best interest to Americans listening.

#### KECA, 11 a.m. $\star \star$ Frequency Modulation

Still limited to but a fraction of American cities is FM (Frequency Modulation) whose first western airing month ago from KILJ of the Mutual Don Lee network, startled auditors with fidelity of tones, lack of static interference, wails and whines of even best of AM (amplitude modulation) sets.

By last week observers in industry were able to report that more FM receiving sets had been sold in past three months than in similar preceding period since frequency modulation first was publicized.

Thus encouraged by up-hiking sales observers observed: availability of lowpriced FM receivers will give the same stimulus to frequency modulation that famous "Baby Grand" sets of 1930 provided for standard broadcasting. If such should be case, important benefits were predicted to accrue to public, FM broadcasters, radio dealers, and radio set makers.

Low-priced FM receivers are now available for people to enjoy this different and improved kind of radio reception. By reason of expanding market and growing listening audience, present FM broadcasters were encouraged to increase

power, to provide better program service.

New groups are being induced to apply for licenses to begin FM broadcasting. At present, 15 FM stations are already broadcasting, permits for the construction of 38 additional stations have been granted by the Federal Communications Commission, and applications for 56 more FM broadcasting licenses are now pend-ing before the F. C. C. in Washington.

FM is not new, is not complicated, notwithstanding mystery, consciously or unconsciously thrown around it. Basic principles incorporated in FM were subject of patents issued in 1905,

The public has been led to believe that it is necessary to pay at least \$150 for a set capable of receiving FM, but such is not necessarily the case. The primary question is, how much does one want in his FM set? FM-is no different from AM in that the power and sensitivity of receiving sets are determined in considerable part by the number of tubes they contain and the elaborateness of their construction. The prospective purchaser should determine his particular needs as regards antennas, distance from the broadcasting stations he wishes to hear, proximity to sources of electrical interference, and power output desired, and then decide how expensive and ela-borate an FM set he should purchase.

Hot ran comment in radio circles, entertainment journals and radio-involved press generally last week as off from a witness seat of the Congressional inquiry into motion picture war-mongering

stepped James Marion Fidler, gong and bell-tapping air-critic of motion pictures.

Barbing Fidler was "Variety," national show news magazine. Among colorful descriptive verbalisms from Variety: - . . "Fidler's wailing." . . "Fidler wept." . . "Fidler's yowling." . . On stand the radio commentator on motion pictures had hung propaganda's label on a dozen odd films, had suggested that "propaganda" films be made to carry unmistakable designation of their character, either on the film itself or on theatre marquees and advertising.

Embattled has Fidler been with networks, notably with CBS, which recently severed air-relations with the iconoclastic air-critic, sent him, avowedly satisfied, to Mutual's KHJ, Los Angeles for network broadcasts of his gong-and-bell approvals of what to see and not to see.

In main Fidler was over-coals-dragged by hostile anti-inquiry attorneys and others, biggest sneer coming from Wendell Willkie :--- "I haven't time to listen to any one who makes his living purveying gossip. . . . " Sneered Willkie again: . . . "a gossip writer-- one who makes his living by unsupported and unproven statements about other people."

What Willkie did not point out, thought Hollywood defenders of Fidler, was that air laws consider libels, that a libel by air is as dangerous as any in print or by word of mouth, that untrue statements, if libelous, are actionable by those aggrieved.

More important, thought rank and

filers of radio last week, was that the Senate inquiry, directly striking at private enterprise rights to produce a product for public consumption or not, was also opening way for some sort of general air censorship against which Fidler, among others, has been most vociferously defiant, saw in CBS' refusal to permit his critical diatribes on its networks, a further narrowing of the narrowing fissure through which freedom of press, which is freedom of air and pictures, in past has had easy passage for good or had .

#### Riveting by Radio

To radio and its correlated branches has gone deserved credit for improvements and changes in the way of modern life. By means of it doors can be automatically opened, burglar alarms sounded, goods and objects sorted and graded, hostile planes detected, air-raid warnings sounded, besides refinements that have been developed to make listening more pleasant.

Last week, however, Radio invaded national defense not as a medium of reporting or dramatization but as a worker. Into use went radio explosive rivets that hold together aircraft.

Described by Dr. Orestes H. Caldwell, editor of "Radio Today," semi-technical journal, the new defense "worker" designed to speed up warplane production employs a special rivet with a small charge of TNT in its shank. The rivet. specifically adapted for fastening toge-ther metal plates (in noses, wings and sides of planes) is loosely set in multiple groups of 20, which are fired by successions of almost simultaneous radio beams. Rate of installation, reported by Dr. Caldwell, is 15 to 20 per minute as against 2 to 4 by old air-hammer type of rivet setting.

KFSD, 4:15 p.m. Dreamy Mugbuq

Facts about the espionage came to light this week when Miss Hopkins confessed she conspired with Eddie's fra-



ternity brothers in Phi Delta Theta on Northwestern University's campus to keep ear open for gems of Firestone lingo. Her discovery that Edward has a flair with words was made last summer when he was a guest at her home.

Five minutes after his arrival, she found Eddie himself was best possible source of lines for Brywster Boy script she was planning. Unwilling to see this material source dry up when young Firestone moved onto Northwestern campus she persuaded brothers to take notes. She now gets sheaves of choice conversation weekly for use on program.

Trick: Turn over Ocean Park (California) concessions to kids who would pay "Sparkletts" or "Sparkeeta" bottle caps for admission to concessions rides, High Boy, other thrill devices.

Twenty spot announcements were taken on KHJ, began to roll up audience interest. From merchants came calls for coupons (100,000 had been printed to accompany caps). Startled, Craemer ordered 100,000 more printed, by carnival day the press run had topped 900,000 coupons.

On opening day of party youngsters lined up four abreast at park gates at 5 a. m., to exchange caps and coupons for rides on 12 amusement machines. Kids from 26 cities came with gunny sacks, boxes, toy wagons cap-loaded, Par-

One-fourth of all persons stopped by Hal Hodge on Hollywood Boulevard are not natives of California, residents of the film sector itself. The one-fourth have come from 45 of the States, from all countries of the earth, have had their origination places green-dotted on two maps, the United States, the world. On the world map appears a green star over Cairo, sign that Hodge had quizzed on his program (Boulevard Quiz, KMPC daily at 4 p. m.) a woman from that far distant city.

script sheets calling for desired sound. Last week Ray "Whataman" Kelly, NBC New York department head, had this poser: "Give effect of 100 clocks ticking at once."

How Kelly solved this air knot:

He took 5 clocks, set them ticking to accompaniment of 5 records, each of 1 clock ticking. A record of this gave him sound of 10 clocks. He made a recording of 2 of these clock records for sound of 20, took 2 records of 20 clocks, 1 record of 10 clocks, played them together, got 50 clocks. He played two 50 clock records together to make a record of 100 clocks.

#### Radio Censorship

To radio does censorship bring its most stringent, suspicious and restrictive taboos, a fact little known to average listener who, perhaps, does not know either that of all entertainment locales the spoken stage is the most free in expression, motion pictures second in freedom.

Conformation to motion picture and stage censorship is "a cinch compared to job radio writers have in obeying sundry radio rulings" said Radio Writer Harry Kronman (Hollywood Premiere) this week.

Because radio enters the home, networks and program sponsors have felt stringent regulation necessary.

Kronman examples of radio consorshipe

In "Flying Blind" which he adapted for radio he had to skirt around mention of foreign agents and espionage which was the core of movie, because such things can't be mentioned these days in a radio play.

In "Wild Geese Calling," a drunken mob scene had to be toned down to appear a case of bad temper, since extreme drunkenness is taboo on radio.

The movie, "The Flame of New Orleans" made no attempt to hide the leading character's reputation, whereas on the radio, no hint of indiscretions was permitted.

The whole moral aspect of "Blossoms in the Dust" was the protection and care of illegitimate children, yet Kronman was forced to refer to them merely as "waifs" in his adaptation.

Illisit love is another taboo, that has had to be white-washed a number of times, one example being the adaptation of "Billy the Kid," in which the affair between Billy and his girl could be referred to merely as a romance.

#### \* \* Nervous Reminder

During a rehearsal the other day, the sudden sounding of a siren in the studio so unnerved Helen Mack (Marge in Myrt and Marge) that she lost her place in the script. She wasn't the only one, Arthur Elmer who plays the columnist in the drama also flunked his lines. It reminded him too much of London air raids.

6 HEROES of that bolsterous, lusty, woman contesting, hard-bitten series, "Captain Flagg and Sergeant Quirt," Victor McLaglen, son of

an English bishop, home-runawayer to war and World War I Provost Marshal of Bagdad, and Edmund Lowe, the San Jose high school boy and graduate from Santa Clara University, will be together for the first time on radio.

The pugnacious, wise-cracking principals of "What Price Glory," and "This Cock-eyed World," motion picture gems of rough and ready action spun from the imaginative minds of Laurence Stallings and Maxwell Anderson, when they air-appear will be a re-creation from the pen of John P. Medbury, author, actor and newspaperman. Medbury knows the types McLaglen and Lowe have stood for in the past, intends they shall remain the same, slightly streamlined for modern air-digestion but faithfully reproduced down to the last "Sez you," by Lowe as Sergeant Quirt, "Sez me," by slower thinking Captain Flagg. Medbury knows them because he was a war-time sailor in Uncle Sam's Navy. He knows "Leathernecks" (Marineswhich McLaglen and Lowe will re-enact) with all the fervor the battlewagon "gob" knows these sapling-straight policemen of the seas.

Let's take a run out to dignified Flintridge, a dove's coo northwest of effete Pasadena, California, and call on Victor, the 6-foot 210-pound assembly of efficient physique that has carried him through a lifetime of adventure and into more strange places and situations than you imagine any one person could get in and out of in a lifetime.

Is it a surprise to find the hardboiled Captain Flagg ensconced comfortably in a deep chair on the porch of a spacious old English home? He gets up as we roll under the porticos, squaring his shoulders in a

#### tweed jacket, stiffening his muscular legs in their ice-cream pants sheathings.

His voice booms out like a morning gun in salute. The voice doesn't astonish us. What does is the shocking reversal of opinion we go through. We had figured, of course, that our first introduction to him in his native habitat would be to find him throwing a couple of husky handmen through a wall, or felling a balky mule with a sledge-fist, or playing beanbag with a 10-pound weight. He must have caught something of our reaction, for his voice lowered to soft cadences of distant artillery:

"Strikes you a bit odd, ch? I hate to disillusion you, but I appreciate and can brew a cup o' tea with the best, and when the Missus and I go ridingwell," he hung his head in mock shame, "we wear English riding breeches."

As we take we take in the Flintridge estate. It seems to us as Victor starts off by telling how he ran away from home at the outbreak of the Boer War, that the place takes some running. The home is set in the middle of 10 landscaped acres of rolling, velvet lawn and flowered hedges. Through an open large window we look into the living room. Sunlight is coursing the walls on which are hung authentic works of art, along the walls and tastefully spaced about the room priceless antiques. The decor, we note, is soft colored and soothing, a repetition artfully done of the color-ful surroundings of green slopes, sun gold on them, the blue cloud-scudded sky. Victor McLaglen sits down deep in his chair. His voice has a softish rumble. We catch the phrase, "Irish Fusilliers" and our attention comes sharply away from the surroundings. . . .

"And a mad crowd of scrappers they were, too, these Fusilliers. But, why talk about experiences in the Boer War? Now you take 'Mespot.' . . Now there, me lad. we had something all right. The Arabs and the Turks . . . did they

give us what for and plenty!... Fit we finally took 'Mespot' and it was a proud day for me when they made me a captain and one of the provost marshals of that place called Bagdad."

"Sure, and came 1920 and an upside down world. Did I tell you I (Continued on Page 23)

# $\mathsf{K}'$ From The Forgotten Past!

## \$170.000.000 Found For Missing Heirs In 4 Short Years!

HERE'S AN old story about a prosperous cafe owner who collapsed from hunger one day because he was too busy to eat. It has a parallel in the air-histories of James Waters and Alfred Shebel, creators of "Are You A Missing Heir?" which broadcasts from CBS' KNX Tuesday nights at 8:30 o'clock.

Shebel and Waters have located a total of \$170,000,000, have found hundreds of claimants to estates who otherwise would never have received their share of some fond relative's or friend's bequest to them.

Yet, neither Waters nor Shebel, it was discovered the other day, have made their own wills. Somewhat embarrassedly they said "we'll get around to taking care of this matter some day." The two heir locators have been just too busy taking care of the estate problems of others to bother about their own. They are not alone, however; for it's a matter of record that scores of prominents and lesser known have bade farewell to Mother Earth leaving behind them a tangled financial and economic skein. The Dean of Notre Dame law school left an estate of \$100,000 and no will, Strangely enough, one of his principal educative preoccupations was teaching students how to write and draw up wills,

"Seventy per cent of persons who leave estates worth bothering about don't leave wills," Shebel told us. "Why they don't will remain a mystery. Maybe they figured that they had no close relatives and so didn't bother about a last testament."

"Despite this," Waters chimed in, "there are thousands of persons in the United States today who have money due them and know nothing about it."

The program "Are You A Missing

Heir?" is devoted to informing people of financial windfalls. The average recovery of money left unwilled is figured out roughly to be \$7500 per located heir.

There's nothing prosaic about the work done by Waters and Shebel, although the grim specter of the Old Reaper hovers over most of their work in finding out about estates, locating pre-sumptive legal heirs and straightening out the messes negligently bequeathed to harassed attorneys and others by those who fled this Vale of Tears and Laughter. In other words Shebel and Waters

deal with situations, and with very live people who are, or should be, interested in getting their share of rewards left them by the provident Departed.

For example: Somewhere in the world at this hour there is-or we hope there is-a Negro. His name would be Gabe McElroy. In early life his stamping ground was the cotton and cattle sections of Texas. He came from Rusk County in West Texas where his parents had purchased a small piece of land. Gabe left the land of his forebears to go out on the highways of life to glean souls for the Vineyards of the Lord. That was fiftcen years ago. While he was out gleaning old Mother Nature was bleeding wealth out of those pores of hers that covered the land owned by Gabe's parents. The bleeding was oil, and while, in other parts of the world, War is piling up a tremendous harvest in shattered lives as against Gabe's salvaging of lives for his Maker, this bleeding is now estimated to be worth to him \$100,000,000. It's quite likely that if any reader of Radio Life should run into Mr. McElroy and apprise him of his fortune, he would reward the informant handsomely.

People do funny things with the money that comes unexpectedly to them through the good offices of Waters and Shebe!. They also do many fine and commendable things. In short their reactions to sudden wealth, and what they do after getting it, afford many a student of human nature dramatically graphic material.

Among some things people have done: An airplane pilot's wife receiving \$5000 gave this to her husband. He purchased a plane in New York in which both flew home to Sioux Falls, South Dakota. A man who got \$13,000 sailed to Cuba, bought two horses, and remained there playing the races. A 70-year-old man who lived at a cheap hotel was earning 75 cents a day and two meals as drug (Continued on Page 20)

**40-cents-a-day** room even after receiving this legacy. Today like a Good Samaritan, he generously distributes dimes and quarters to his less fortunate friends.

The unimaginative habit people have of taking similar names, perhaps by custom and social necessity, often posesproblems for the heir-collecting Waters and Shebel. A Frank Harmon was sought to claim \$5000 and his story was broadcast. More than 500 persons responded, all claiming they were, without doubt, the very chap the heir seekers sought. Without doubt only one was, but there was a lot of doubtful scrutiny of each plea before the rightful Frank was chosen without doubt.

Occasionally the speed with which an unwilled estate is settled amazes the program creators. At the same time it encourages them to work harder in spreading good tidings that come after the Reaper has swung his inevitable scythe. One evening, for instance, in Seattle a woman listened to news of a \$12,500 estate. She wrote the program describing a Mrs. Jessie Stadstad o Beechurst, New York. Airmailed, th letter by evening had established th Beechurst woman as the heiress.

The program also has uncovered another human trait, this time not one to be commended. There are harpies in human form who listen to the program, note sex, age and address of found heirs and heiresses. Single men and women, no matter what their age, are swamped with letters after their good fortune is told. These letters offer the writer in marriage, ask for favors, suggest moneymaking investments, etc.

"I am a blue-eyed girlie," wrote an admirer to George Ruge, the 70-year-old delivery boy who received \$6500. "Come and live with us, pay the mortgage and we'll all be just one big happy family the rest of our lives," said another letter to Ruge. After Mrs. Jessie Stadstad appeared, having inherited \$12,000, she received two proposals of marriage half an hour after the broadcast. To date no heir has ever paid any attention to these outlandish offers.

Drama often reaches a high level in some cases.

Down a country road one night in Indiana walked one of life's army of lost and un-named and unknown. Somewhere along the road our unknown turned to face the glare of automobile headlights, to raise his thumb in the wellknown gesture of the hitch-hiker. Confused was the driver as the apparition loomed up in the lights. Confused also was "John Doe." His desperate jump aside was matched by the swerving of the wheel. All presumable heirs were informed of the special terms of the will. It stated if the designated heir were not found within three years this estate would then go to the United Church of Toronto.

## Radio Life Consumers' Club

IN ONION THERE IS STRENGTH-Last week we pointed out that Americans like over twenty million dollars worth of onions a year. This week we feel we ought to tell you something more about them and give you a few recipes for fixing them.

First, a word about the different kinds of onions and how to identify them: The common everyday variety comes in red,

white or yellow and is round in shape. Bermudas, which are mostly grown in Texas, are round and flat, Sweet Italians are those dark red. thin-skinned ones that everybody likes for their mildness, and the Spanish are globular, yellow giants that grow bigger than big oranges.

OLO HER

Chives are picked green, shoots and all, and so are leeks. Pearl or cocktail onions are hardly bigger than a pea. Finally, Welsh, cibol, or rock onions are those for which

it is hard to find any other name, although Welsh onions more properly resemble the leek and are also used leaves and all.

Onions are generally low in calories, vitamins and minerals, but surprisingly good for you. They help keep the digestive tract clean, they quiet the nerves and serve as a remedy for sleeplessness, in winter they often help resist colds, and, when it comes to looking your best, they also help clear your complexion. And here is a strange thing! While fried or raw onions sometimes make other people keep their distance, when boiled they tend to sweeten your breath if you give them a little time!

You can fix onions in all kinds of ways, of course; sauteed, pickled, stuffed, grilled, deviled, glazed, boiled, fried, French fried, baked, curried, stewed, as a garnish, a relish, a flavoring, or in sauces. We hope you like our own three ideas among the recipes.

EN BATEAU-This means in a boat and it's a fancy way of serving some kinds of food. What you do is get some French rolls, those little breads that taper at both ends. Then you go about your business for a couple of days and let these rolls get hard. When they're hard, you cut off one end to give them a back-side. Then, you grate down the tops till you have a flat, crumby surface, scoop out the insides, leaving a wall against the crust, and then just load your cargo of food into them and bring them to the table.

If you want to go a step farther, however, toast the boats before filling them and leave some of the crumb in the center bottom to stick a breadstick in for a mast. . . . .

LET YOUR CAKE PANS SEASON THEMSELVES-By this we mean don't wash them. To give you a good baking job a pan should merely be wiped clean after using, with absorbent paper or a cloth kept for just that purpose. The first few times you do this you may find it a little hard to get the pans as clean as you like, but after several wipings the job will be easy and you'll find that your cakes will be inclined to stick less and less to the pans when you're baking.

#### **Recipe for Cream of Pea Soup**

1/2 lb. Budget Pack Dry Peas. qt. chicken broth or beef broth qt. table cream 2 tbsps. butter Salt Cayenne pepper

Soak overnight  $\frac{1}{22}$  lb. of Budget Pack Dry Pcas. When ready to cook, drain, put them in a pot with 1 quart of chicken broth and let simmer till peas are done. Season yeal chops with salt and pepper and place in a saute pan with the butter and the onions cut in 4 parts each. Saute until the onions and chops are golden color. Then place the chops on a platter. In the saute pan, put the flour and simmer, then add the stock or broth, and boil for few minutes. Cut the stalk of celery in small squares and parboil in salted water for 10 min-utes. Then drain off the water, and add the celery to the sauce from the chops; boil for 10 minutes. Then add the chops and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove the chops to the platter, and season the sauce well with salt and pepper, and 2 ounces of sweet butter and some minced parsley and pour over the chops-and when you eat them say "Bazooka Bob".

#### Recipe for Rice a la Rosaline

16. Budget Pack Rice 1 qt. milk Some apricot marmalade 1/2 cup cream Lady fingers <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> split vanilla bean <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lb. butter 4 egg yolks 1/2 pint whipping cream

TOMATO SNOW-Now here is something that can make a lovely garnish for many dishes. You simply season some tomato juice with salt, pepper, lemon juice, or anything else you like, then chill it and freeze it to a mush in an ice-cream freezer. Cut onions in thin slices and separate into rings. Dip in milk, then with the broth. Pour the soup over thin slices of bread, placed in a cassewith Parmesan cheese, finishing with the cheese over the top. Bake in oven at 400 degrees until the top gets brown but not burnt.

1 lb. rice (Budget Pack) No. 2% can tomatoes onion, 3 cloves of garlic, sprig of parsley slices Wilson Ol' Fashund Bacon 1b. green peppers 4 eggs Salt and pepper 4 tbsps. butter

#### had done a bit of fighting with me fists? Well, I had that. There was a man named Shock, about 10 years before. . . . "

We go back with him those 10 years, see him as a kid of 20 in Seattle mixing it up, torrid round after torrid round, with Shock, claimant of the light-heavyweight championship. The 19th round ended with both Victor and Shock tottering on rubbery legs, breath whistling through overly labored lungs. In a corner sat Biddy Bishop, Victor's manager. In Bishop's mouth hung remnants of a cigar, in his eyes a waning hope that all was not lost as Shock smacked the tough youngster with a right to his downy chin, sent him reeling, sensebefogged, into the ropes.

"Worst of it all was 'Biddy' had bet his wife's diamond ring on me," Mc-Laglen grinned. "But Shock had done his bit. The blow did not lay me out. I covered up, got out of danger, and Biddy's wife's ring was safe."

Much publicized has been Victor Mc-Laglen, but today, seated there under mountain breeze-cooled portico, we learned that he had one time ambitions to be heavyweight champion of the world. It was an ambition that was to be halted in its youthfully confident stride by Jack Johnson in a six-round exhibition bout in Vancouver.

"Some Almighty power kept me from going down," Victor said softly. "But Johnson washed up my boxing career. I realized I wasn't good enough."

Horizons called to the young McLaglen, recently fled the quiet of an English cleric's home. As Victor tells it:

"Brother Art and myself cooked up a wrestling act for Pantages and began throwing beef-eaters out of rings all over the States. We got a reputation that influenced an Australian promoter to send for us, but after we got down under we got interested in making a fortune in pearling. All we got was thin on this and we drifted around in the Southern archipelago picking up pound notes doing a bit of scrapping in Zanzibar and Port Said and other points."

McLaglen came to movies one night in England. He was watching an exhibition hoxing match when a man who had been appraising him for some time, casually informed him he was just the type needed for a motion picture he was making called "Call of the Road." He offered Victor 30 pounds a week. Victor almost fainted, recovered in time to take the offer, to make money in successive films, to gct married, to follow British films until American competition sent competent English actors scurrying to America. A producer sent for him, but hefore-the compañy started the picture for which he was called, McLaglen was reduced to eating peanuts.

"Peanuts," he sighed reflectively, the solid old English house against which his broad back leaned making

#### his words incongruous, "Peanuts are awfully nourishing. . . . "

Fighting seems to be a doggedly pursuing fate of Victor McLaglen. We asked him if ever he was in a picture hrawl that didn't end according to script. He chuckled.

"Once, when we were doing 'Beloved Brute.' There was a free-for-all in it that was saved till the last. The boys, I guess, were out to take the measure of me—a Britisher. 'Just wade in and fight,' the director said.

"I had to make good. There was the wife and kids. At 'Action' two cowboys came in winging. I belted them across the chops and hard! Oh," he hung his head again. "I shouldn't say this. ... It sounds like bragging."

"Go on," we urged.

"Well, it winds up with me cleaning out the gang, all except a big Negro. When the director called 'Cut' I was a sorry sight. But," he laughed, "I guess I showed 'em something that was all right."

Vie leads a life that would kill the average tea-sipping lightweight. He needs his six feet two or three and an unbreakable physique, for he works harder and gets more done, than you'd imagine.

That Flintridge place must take some running. A dairy it has, an orchard, a place to hang meats, a vegetable garden, a zoo and the house itself. When he's there, he dresses up, entertains nicely. Ilis friends say there isn't a finer host. For relaxation, he sneaks off for a bit of boating. He owns a yacht, usually anchored at Balbea.

Few places there are in this world, few things that Victor McLaglen has not seen and done. Blustering through rugged, brawling pictures, he revealed the artistry of genius in the picture "The Informer," revealing story of the Irish battle for Independence. Few ports have not had his feet tread them stalwartly and purposefully. Few streets of the world have not had his squareshouldered, strong-bodied frame weaving along them with that characteristic truculent outhrust of jaw and swing of shoulders.

In Los Angeles the manly characteristics that brought him through two wars, strenuous adventures in earth's strange places, are exemplified in the McLaglen Lighthorse Cavalry. The Lighthorse are a swanky lot in their colorful uniforms, but most of them are men, many times removed from effete dilletantism.

When McLaglen established his clubhouse and sports center on Riverside drive in Los Angeles, few realized this world adventurer was providing an outlet for exuberant energy that had possessed him from boyhood; that in kindness of heart, he surrounded himself with others who thrill to joy of physical competition, who did not themselves possess the means to ride sports hobbies. Likewise, he looked upon the sports center as a business investment, from which some day he might expect to obtain a substantial monetary return.

The story of McLaglen's sports center

is still being written. Situated on a large tract of land that parallels the Los Angeles river, edging rolling hills and plateaux of Hollywood, it embraces a clubhouse, gymnasium, parade ground, rugby and soccer field, wrestling and boxing rings.

In this center came to being McLaglen's Lighthorse. Originated to bring men together for riding, jumping and cavalry routine, it is strictly an American organization, open to all classes, creeds and colors, for though Vic was born an Englishman he has been an American citizen since 1933. In its ranks are enrolled former soldiers of fortune, ex-collegiate athletic stars, former cowboys now chained to more prosaic tasks, and the rank and file of red-blooded men who yearn to escape the strait-jacket of ordinary husiness life. Their main objective is organized recreation, to promote good sportsmanship—a fetish of McLaglen's.

Another development is Victor Mc-Laglen Kids' Club; nearly 100 Los Angeles youngsters use the sports center as a recreation park and for club meetings. Cooperating with parents, Vic makes it possible for them to have a summer camp and playground on Catalina Island. The idea is to provide hobbies and interests for children whose home surroundings would otherwise prohibit them from such opportunities.

#### And about children. . . .

His children are the pride of his life —Daughter Sheila, and son Andrew, who's even taller than his dad and beats him regularly on the tennis court, although Andy can't quite come out tops at any other sport of skill or brawn when his father's his opponent. Sheila, who has shown great enthusiasm and much talent for home economics lately, is at a girls' school in the east; Andy after attending the University of Virginia, is now working in a local airplane factory.

"It's wanting things hard enough that makes a man willing to fight for them," Vic sometimes says. "I've wanted a lot of things that hard that ranch, and to be an American (he's proud of his citizenship)—and I decided early in life that the only way to get 'em was to battle, with my chin out. The blows are harder that way—but if you're bound to get there, you're at least a chin ahead of the other guy."

A sound philosophy, obviously-because the big guy seems to have won everything he wants.

this strange will, tried to prove that William Wright was obviously insane when he drew up his will. To bolster their case they told the presiding judge strange tales concerning Plumber Wright. They said he always kept a pistol on the table during his meals; that he coaxed little boys and girls into believing that moth balls were candy; that he threatened to water his father's corpse when his mother suggested watering the lilies around the bier. Finally three alleged "Miss Babes" gathered in court along with a cousin of the dead man. The judge refused to accept the assertions of lunacy attributed to Plumber Wright, He suggested all claimants would receive much more money if they split the estate instead of fighting about it. In the final settlement, the church took 40 per cent, the relatives 121/2 per cent, and each of the three "Miss Babes," who seemed to be the missing persons, split the other  $47\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

Simplified, the time change problem is this: New York's listeners have been hearing NBC's One Man's Family, for instance, at \$:30 p. m., New York Time. When they set their clocks back, they will still hear. One Man's Family at 8:30 p. m. We, however, who have been hearing the show at 4:30 p. m., will hear it at 5:30 p. m.

Not a few programs, however, are independent. They will ignore the mass one-hour change, and either retain their present time or move to new hours, new days or new networks,
