



Just as looks are worth a fortune in pictures, so is a voice worth a fortune fortune in radio. Take that of Bill Thompson, for example. Bill has created the roles of Wallace Wimple, Old Timer, Nick DePopolus and Horatio K. Boomer on the Fibber McGee and Molly program.

It's a story that goes back 24 years when Thompson was only five. He was campaigning the length and breadth of the land selling Liberty Bonds during World War I. He did such a thorough job that he sold \$2,000,000 worth, but he lost his voice.

This was tragedy to the young actor. It took two years of throat exercises to regain the use of his vocal chords. When Thompson grew up, his first major assignment was on the Fibber McGee and Molly pro-gram. In experimenting with vocal characterizations for the show, Thompson discovered that his voice was double-jointed—he could jump from bass to tenor with no effort. This led to two of his first vocal characteri-zations, high-pitched Nick DePopolus and the radio announcer with the cracking voice. His wide voice range made him a valuable member of the cast and he became a permanent citizen of Wistful Vista. The odd pitch of Thompson's voice is attributed to his loss of voice as a child.

Having an ambidextrous voice, al-though it has meant financial success to Thompson also has its drawbacks, Thompson has discovered that on overcast days when the atmosphere is damp, he is apt to lose his voice without warning.

War Shows to H'wood?

There was a strong possibility as Radio Life went to press that a decision would be reached in Washington, D. C. this week whereby Hollywood would be the origination point for all war shows requiring Hollywood talent.

Back in the nation's capital after a series of business sessions with leaders of the Hollywood Victory Committee on the West Coast was W. B. Lewis, former CBS vice-president who is now assistant director of the Office of Facts and Figures and coordinator of Federal Radio. Lewis before planing out of Hollywood for the east last week announced that he was in favor of the shifting of all such war shows to Hollywood.

If Lewis' opinion meets with approval in Washington the new "This Is War" broadcast will probably be brought to the coast immediately. Lewis said that this program alone has a listening audience of 25,000,000. Also up for Hollywood origination will be the new "Hollywood's Victory Hour," official government radio show featuring stars of radio, screen and stage which was originally slated to be aired from Washington. A new Army Hour program will also be considered in the new setup.

Members of the Hollywood Victory Committee for Radio, Screen and Stage signed pledges with Lewis during his sojourn here that they "will fulfill any request made by the committee which will have government sanction, but by the same token, that they will reject any request not approved by the Victory Committee."

Gluskin to the Colors

From a reliable source close to the Bureau of Naval Aviation in Washington Radio Life learned as it went to press that Lud Gluskin, Russian.born * American citizen who is musical director for the western division of the Columbia Broadcasting System in Hollywood, has been appointed a fullcommissioned commander in the U. S. Naval Air Force.

Gluskin, a member of the famed Lafayette Escadrille in World War l and considered one of the country's topnotch navigators by the Navy Department, will probably not leave his musical berth at KNX, Columbia Square, for six or eight months although he is subject to immediate active call should the emergency arise.

Gluskin, famous for his colorful, warmly-directed musical programs over CBS and KNX, is highly regarded in the radio industry as one of its most capable musical directors. He

is currently directing the KNX staff orchestral on Hollywood Showcase and other network shows.

Revise Flagg-Quirt

"Capt. Flagg and Sgt. Quirt," highexplosive radio series on NBC Friday nights, underwent a drastic revision in story plot as of March 13th with a new character, Sgt. Bliss, making his debut on the show.

Producer Mel Williamson said that the change in script and the introduction of a new character is the outcome of requests from U. S. Marine Corps who questioned recently whether the script which calls for the fictional situation of a sergeant bawling out a captain was in good taste. After conterences last week between the sponsor. NBC and representatives of the Marine Corps it was decided that Sgt. Quirt, played by Cinemactor Eill Gargan, would reveal on the March 13th script that he had been ordered to San Francisco for embarkation to foreign battle fields, thus enabling him to be written out of the current dramarings, allowing him to return at occasional intervals.

The new character, that of Sgt. Bliss, with vateran radio actor Fred Shields handling the role, represents a new type of Marine making his debut in the Ccrps for the first time in this war. An expert parachatist, Sgt. Bliss will pcpularize many new wrinkles in this new division of the armed service. KFL, 7 p.m., Fri.

Jimmy Declares Himself

Even as a movie star Jimmy Stewart was never surrounded by news photographers as often as he has been since joining the armed forces. But all the picture posing and public appearances which Lieut. Jimmy has been doing in recent weeks and months have come to an end.

At least so Stewart, who is now stationed at the Army air base, Mather Field, near Sacramento, told a Radio Life representative last weekend as he rehearsed a script he'd never seen before for Arch Oboler's "Plays For Americans" series at Radio City.

"I think I've finally convinced my superiors that too much publicity for one of its flyers is injurious rather than good for the cause," declared Jimmy during a lull in the rehearsal of Oboler's original "Letter at Midnight," in which Stewart was handling the leading role.

"And besides I'm much too busy learning to be a competent flyer to keep making these personal appearances from one end of the country to the other," Jimmy added.

All of which means that radio, which has seen and heard a lot of Jimmy in recent months, will probably occupy very little of this Air Corps officer's time from now until Victory if a fellow named Jimmy Stewart has anything to say about it.

Novis' Gesture

Nice gesture of the week in local radio was Donald Novis' request to Producer Ted Bliss of CBS-KNX's Hollywood Showcase program that he be removed from the competition on Mary Astor's show in order to give the youngsters appearing on the program a better chance.

Novis, well on the road back to the place he once held in radio's upper strata, had won the Showcase return engagement award for three successive weeks and gave as the reason for his request that his Showcase appearances had won him a contract to appear nightly at the Biltmore_Bowl with Phil Harris and his orchestra.

The Pasadena pride and joy, singing like the Don Novis of yesteryear, is being considered for a top-line singing role on several network commercials. EFI, 10:15 p.m. Sat.

Newscaster Gets Set

Getting settled in Hollywood the past fortnight (although his strenuous radio schedule gave him little time to eat, sleep and relax) was Harry W. Flannery, former CBS war correspondent in Berlin and latest addition to the KNX news staff.

Alex Dreier, NBC's intrepid war correspondent who says the average German knows his country is licked but will continue to fight furlously out of a fear of ghastly post-war reprisals, airplaned across the nation last week to keep a "date" at St. Catherine's Church in Burlingame, Calif.

Dreier, who left Berlin on the very eve of Germany's declaration of war on the U. S., told friends in New York upon his arrival from Europe that he had to keep a very important "date" on the West Coast on March 12, but little did his broadcasting friends suspect that Dreier had romance/on his mind.

The "date" Dreier kept in the little northern California church was with Joy Leathurby, a childhood sweetheart of his from San Francisco, whom he married before a group of intimate friends.

The war reporter and his bride are now enroute to New York via the Overland Limited for a brief honeymoon before Dreier begins his new radio series in which he will analyze the war news against the background of his own wide experiences in Germany and other European countries overrun by the Nazi hordes.

Benny to Mather

Having notified Warner Bros. flicker factory foremen that he is "not at all satisfied with the script" of his next picture, NBComedian Jack Benny has ordered Rochester to wire together the old Maxwell for a trek to Mather Field, U. S. Army Air base near Sacramento, on Sunday, March 22.

Mather Field, scene of Lieut. James Stewart's air training maneuvers, is one of the few West Coast camps which has not yet been visited by a big-time Hollywood radio personality.

Benny has also announced that during the 1942-43 broadcasting season he will take his show (for which he pays the expenses of line charges, etc.) on a nationwide tour to outof-the-way army posts on a plan similar to the one currently being followed by Kay Kyser's troupe.

That Patriotic Plink

That little-publicized instrument, the banjo, had its no. 1 torch-bearer Eddie Peabody, come to its ald last week as nationwide plans began to take shape for the revival of interest among musicians and the public in the banjo.

Peabody, famous radio personality and now a Lieut. Comdr. in the U. S. Navy, declared from his base near the Great Lakes that "it is an unpatriotic gesture on the part of American or-

Lieut. Comdr. Peabody, long recog-nized as the King of the Banjo and who recently made a coast-to-coast guest appearance on Kate Smith's Hour, claimed that there is a banjo boycott on, and he proposes to do something about it.

Peabody points an accusing finger at radio orchestra leaders, who, he says, have arbitrarily decided that the instrument is too harsh.

"Orchestra leaders are just too lazy to look farther than the tips of their noses to find banjo players," says Peabody, who broadcasts regularly on the National Barn Dance program.

"When properly played, the banjo is a thoroughly dependable instru-ment capable of doing anything from 'Shortenin' Bread' to Bach. There is no other instrument with the happy tonal quality of the banjo."

"And what's more important in these times," declared the banjo master, "the banjo has that patriotic plink!"

Elsa's Circus Clowns

Movie theatres have been guilty of some strange things such as bank nite, bingo, etc., in "selling" pictures to the public but not until a pub-licity release came out of New York on Elsa Maxwell's broadcast this week did Radio Life realize that some radio sponsors were going berserk, too.

Press release read as follows:

Latest stunt in getting studio audiences into a receptive mood is that being used for the Elsa Maxwell Party Line programs over the BLUE Network Friday nights. The sponsor has hired a group of ex-circus clowns and magicians to go through their routines for at least half an hour before the broadcast. As a result, when America's No. 1 party giver faces the microphone she already has an appreciative audience in the studio.

Bing Crosby, the NBCrooner who like Red Skelton, George Burns, Gracie Allen and others, has been soft-pedaling publicity on his non-broadcast army

camp appearances, revealed through his brother, Larry, early this week that royalties from his latest record-ings of "Silent Night" will be used to pay ex penses of a series of camp shows.

A goodly sum of money will go to-ward this camp show tour inas-much as Bing's royalties from his "Silent Night" records which sold to the tune of 300,000 copies last season amount to

more than \$8,000. Bing, who has made it a habit over a period of years to earmark royalties from his recordings of religious songs for humanitarian projects, is person-ally putting together his camp shows which will feature John Scott Trotter's

orchestra among other headline radio performers.

Crosby, who staged his first camp appearance at Inglewood several weeks ago in such secrecy that even the soldiers didn't know what the entertainment was until Bing bounced out onto the stage, told Radio Life that he would concentrate his appearances at camps which do not ordinarily see radio broadcasts. Although the scheduled guest ap-pearance of Doug (Wrong Way) Cor-rigan failed to jell due to the Irisher's delayed return hop from Newfound-land where he had helped fly an array of new bombers, Hank McCune bobbed up with a "scoop" on his "It Happened in the Service" quarterhour last Thursday over KFI-NBC airlanes from Hollywood.

McCune's "scoop," a last-minute en-try on the Service program when Corrigan wired his inability to be present, concerned one of the better human interest stories to get an airing since the declaration of war.

Staff Sgt. John W. Westervelt, said to be the oldest man in the U.S. Army (he's 73), announced his engagement over the air to a 55-year-old grandmother, Mrs. Leota Harrison of Kala-mazoo, Mich.

The sergeant, now serving with the Air Force Ferry Command at Long Beach, was all hepped up about the forthcoming nuptials.

San Quentin On the Air Reveals the Roles Inmates Are Playing in U. S. Victory Effort

ROM within the walls of the world's largest penal institution, San Quentin Prison, each Sunday evening the radio waves carry to the outside world a thrilling story of patriotism.

It is the spirit of the men of San Quentin,

4,000 men, incarcerated in the California State prison a few miles across the bey from San Francisco, have submerged their personal tragedies in order to turn their thoughts and talents to aid their fellow men.

These are the men, inmates forgotten and shunned by a warring world outside, whose desire to contribute something worthwhile to an America geared for Victory is born of a love of country no mistake can obliterate.

This is the spirit that is sweeping into millions of homes where radio dials are tuned every Sunday at 7 p. m. to stations of the Don Lee Mutual Broadcasting System and KHJ. For at that hour one of the ether's newest and most unusual broadcasts, "San Quentin On the Air," emanates from a

(

makeshift stage in the prison mess hall.

Featuring an all-inmate cast, the newly-inaugurated program is the first radio broadcast ever to originate behind the walls of a California prison.

Beautiful music, stirring martial music, music played in flowing fashion by 17 neatlyattired musicians who comprise the San Quentin Prison orchestra under the baton of inmate Major John A. Hendricks. Lilting voices from the 30 inmates who compose the San Quentin Glee Club pour out with "Marching Along Together" and "Salute to the Flag" under the direction of inmate Jack Reavis.

This musical portion of the halfhour broadcast, personally supervised by Ted P. Stanich, head of the prison music department, is augmented by three soloists, each an inmate, and the master of ceremonies and writer, inmate number 65768 whose name is Rolph Burr, and Warden Clinton T. Duffy.

Under the talented eye of Mel Venter, production manager of San Francisco's KFRC, this aggregation of inmates puts together each week a



show that has won the plaudits of the radio industry for its finesse, as well as the affection of a widespread listening audience because of its human interest.

Only humorous to uch to the program is the theme song, which appropriately enough, is "Time On My Hands," suggested by one of the inmates in the prison orchestra.

Although the program is performed in a serious vein, many a sentenceserver in speaking of "San Quentin On the Air" to another inmate has been heard to poke sly fun at the prison broadcast by referring to it as "Concerto in the Clink" or "Harmonies From the Hoosegow."

One prisoner seeing the broadcast for the first time recently, turned to a fellow inmate with a quip that nearly sent Producer Mel Venter and the entire prison a u dience into hysterics. It was just before airtime one Sunday when the inmate, apparently oblivious to the fact that an "open" microphone was hanging above him to capture applause, chanted:

"This show is lucky, here's one audience that can't walk out!"

So great was the response to the "San Quentin On the Air" broadcast of Feb. 1st which saluted the fighting forces of the United States, that the seventh program on March 8 was devoted to a repeat program of the first coast-to-coast airing.

In this program dedicated to Uncle Sam's armed forces, the highlight of the script was the interview of inmate Pat Pettengill who was identified as the inmate who created the idea of a "Suicide Squad" composed of eight fellow inmates, each possessed with a burning desire to make a contribution to America's victory effort.

Inmate Pettengill explained his idea of offering the lives of members of the "Suicide Squad" to the Navy as "human torpedos" in order that small one-man and two-man submarines could be manned and used to attack

enemy ships as the Japs did at Pearl Harbor.

"My fellow inmates and I felt that this was the least we could do for our country," explained the "Suicide Squad" leader, "and we telegraphed our offer to President Roosevelt.

The spirit of the men of San Quentin is exemplified in the message from inmate announcer 65768 who, in his opening news commentary, tells of the extensive defense program being carried on within the confines of the prison itself:

"Many are the letters we have received from every state in the union, expressing surprise at the great measures the men of San Quentin are going to in order to aid America's mighty war effort. Let me tell you that incarceration has not meant the forfeiture of our right to aid the government's drive to Victory.

"Your country is our country and we take as much pride in the work we are contributing toward the suc-cess of this united effort, as do you on the outside."

The inmate master of ceremonies, a tall, soft-spoken bespectacled man in his early forties then told how the defense roles were being played within the prison; how a group of inmates had formed a production unit for the building of model airplanes to help instruct recruits; how inmates working in the prison tailor shop had increased the Red Cross output of dresses and robes for women and children on relief by cutting more than 2,000 garments during a six-week period; how inmates in every department of the prison were pitching in to help the common cause of victory for America.

In order to turn out professionallike musical numbers and choral ar-rangements the inmates in the or-chestra and in the glee club apply themselves with enthusiasm to long hours of rehearsal, hours aside from

Heard on Short Wave

THROUGH RADIO LIFE'S LISTENING POST

By EARL G. DE HAVEN

This week British Broadcasting Corporation stations, GSW, GSD and others, had something to which they could "point with pride" after such a long period of nothing but what they could "view with alarm." The Royal Air Force, Real Air Fighters, Roared Across France, Ruining Armament Factories, Resuming Aerial Fray with Reich's Axis Fighters, promising to Return Again Frequently.

Great plants outside occupied Paris were left a smoking, ruined shambles as a result of the devastating raids. And—echoing the deeds of their comrades at the "home base," the RAF in Libya blasted axis supply depots and destroyed many planes on the ground, according to London's radio reports. B. B. C. also carried news that this resumption of aerial activity was "only the start of an 'around the clock' offensive to be carried out on a daily schedule against industrial cities of Germany and occupied France.".

This week U. S. press carried small news item relative to lone Japanese plane that appeared over Hawaii, dropped four bombs with no result or evidence but four craters to disfigure the top soil on island of Oahu. Quite different was the report from "Radio Tokyo" where U. S. version was completely ignored. Japanese account was this—"A number of our planes carried out a successful raid on military objectives at Pearl Harbor and inflicted considerable damage. Bombs were dropped on U. S. warships in dry-dock for repair as a result of the December 7th Pearl Harbor disaster, causing further heavy damage to them. Again taken by surprise as in the first raid, anti-aircraft guns went into action late,—too late to damage any of our planes, all of which returned safely."

"Radio Tokyo" followed the foregoing item with this—"Due to growing apprehension in the Pacific Coast area as a result of the second Pearl Harbor raid, Culbert L. Olson, Governor of California, has ordered can-

cellation of the Easter Sunrise services at Forest Lawn Memorial Park, Glendale, usually attended by thirty or forty thousand people . . ."

The trans-Pacific radio debate between "Radio Tokyo" and General Electric's KGEI in San Francisco waxed warmer this week—rapidly approaching a "hot" stage. Night after night KGEI, (now largely used as an outlet for our own (U.S.) propaganda), bore down heavily on atrocities and cruelties of Japanese soldiers. In rebuttal, "Radio Tokyo" categorically denied all charges made against them and countered with this: "We should like to call attention of our listeners to the brutality of United States troops in Manila, where defenseless Japanese women and children were mercilessly shot down in the streets as they tried to escape and this on alleged orders of Gen. Douglas MacArthur. This outrage has earned for MacArthur, death before a firing squad when the Battle of Bataan is concluded!"

Fall of Rangoon in the prolonged struggle for Burma, stopped broadcasts of famed XYZ, the lone Burma short wave station. Call signature has always been significant (last three letters of the alphabet), and ironically enough, but most appropriate at this hour, might be taken literally with the expression, the "end of everything." Always difficult to hear, XYZ boasted very few listeners in Pacific Coast states.

"Not a Chip Off the Ole Block — Just a Slice of the Ole Ham" Quips Lionel Barrymore About His Actress Niece

HEN the three Barrymores, Lionel, John, and Diana, appeared on Rudy Vallee's show a week ago Thursday, it marked the first time for such a combination in radio annals. Only the presence of Lionel's and John's sister, Ethel, was needed to make complete the Royal Family's circle.

From a personal angle the most interesting slant about the show was John's appearance with his daughter, Diana. Until the two were Vallee's air-guests a few weeks ago, many listeners did not know that John Barrymore had a daughter.

It is rather hard for the "Great Lover" him self to realize his paternal status. He tells the story that until three years ago he hadn't seen his child since she was 12. In 1939 they were both playing in Chicago—he in "My Dear Children" and she, next door in "Outward Bound."

One afternoon between rehearsal lulls, John was lolling in his dressing room when a very luscious young lady put in an appearance and introduced herself by some nondescript name. Rising to the possibilities of the situation, The Great Profile lost no time in making a play for his visitor.

"What are you doing tonight?", he questioned suavely.

"Nothing," she countered (encouragingly).

"Well," ejaculated Barrymore, (moving along according to schedule). "How about dinner?"

"Oh, d a d d y!", reprimanded Diana, (reveling in the dramatics of the denouement). "Cut it out and be your age."

"Jumping Jupiter," moaned John, smiting hls classic brow (and trying to snap into realization). "I have a daughter!"

Don't get the notion from this, however, that John Barrymore isn't proud to be Diana's father. He is and shows it by the way he treats her and coaches her in her lines, especially Shakespeare. He calls Diana "Chief" or "Kid," and behaves toward her in a pal-ly way, as if she were another man.

The first time Diana and John appeared together on the Vallee show, she was admittedly scared before she went out on the stage to face the microphone.
