Radio Circles the Globe To Bring You The ARMY HOUR

HIS is The Army Hour! A military operation of the United States Army! Thrilling are the words-more nerve tingling is the thought, that here we are in this country, fighting our enemies with everything which we have, and that includes a solid hour of wireless wizardry!

"This is The Army Hour!", announces a firm, omnipotent voice. And directly, from the four corners of the earth, are brought pick-ups so startling in their scope and revelation that the listener is left filled with our for acd with listener is left filled with awe for radio and with admiration for a government which employs radio's resources as a weapon, both of domestic morale-building and Axis undermining.

Cairo comes in; the program shifts to West Point, where cadets are parading; Bill Stern is picked up as he roars along in an army bomber "somewhere in the East"; Los Angeles comes in and the world hears Brig. General James H. Doolittle tell of his exploits over Tokyo, followed seconds later by the hero's son, at school in the mid-west, asking Dad to take him along next time.

General MacArthur talks from Australia; Chungking is cut in for a report; a camp cook down in the south tells how the army, is fed.

It's Mother's Day and men in the armed forces send in their messages from north, south, east, and west. Finally comes a voice which says simply: "Hello, Mother. This is Joe. I've been in a lot of fights, but this one is the biggest yet." That's Private Joe Louis, speaking on The Army Hour and bringing tears to many eyes as Mr. and Mrs. Citizen realize the drama behind radio as a "military operation."

When General Brerton and General Wavell spoke from New Delhi, India, a special twoway circuit from New York to India, via London, was arranged. However, both the War Department and NBC advised their contacts in India that if they did not hear New York, they should start at such and such a minute and second. At the time of the broadcast, NBC engineers literally screamed their lungs out and it was not until 30 seconds before New Delhi was scheduled to start that New York was heard there. Everything went off without a hitch.

The Army Hour owes much of its success to the generous cooperation of foreign broadcast ing organizations and radio engineers, who have arranged for transmissions often at inconvenient times. To pick up Moscow, Radiocenter, a special transmitter was used by the Soviet Broadcasting organization. BBC has made many elaborate technical setups from points within the British Isles. The U. S. Army Signal Corps strung miles of landlines on temporary poles in Puerto Rico, so as to make possible a special air raid demonstration from a field there. The Chinese government has opened its station at Chungking at 6 a. m. to accommodate Army

-and because radio listeners know that it is live, the program packs an extra wallop.

To a person listening in at home or in the car, it seems almost as if a magic carpet is whisking him hither and yon.

But to a radio engineer, there is no magic behind the foreign pick-ups. What there is, is a tremendous amount of careful planning and technical detail, set in motion when the War Department and NBC send out duplicate instructions to their representatives at points intended for broadcasts where final arrangements are worked out. No details are spared in these preliminary wires of instructions, which are very frequently two and three pages long and which tell the pick-up points explicitly what to do. Almost every possible emergency is foreseen. For instance, most of the points are in locations where it is possible for them to get a "go-ahead" from New York, but if there is ever a possibility of this cue circuit failing, detailed advice is given that particular point in regard to starting on a time basis.

This situation has occurred several times.

Hour listeners, and the Canadlan Broadcasting Corporation has likewise made available personnel and equipment for pick-ups originating in the Dominion.

One of the best jobs done by way of West Coast pick-up is credited to Joy Storm of Hollywood's Radio City Special Events department. Joy came in from Long Beach to describe the take-off of a bombing plane being delivered to the RAF.

Joy went through a series of headaches and lost many pounds worrying when two days before the show came and absolutely nothing was ready. There were phone calls and huddles. "Then late Saturday night," says Joy, the script came through on the teletype wire, busting all our engineering and technical plans. It involved

not only interviews, but an actual plane taking off and landing, dismissal orders from control tower, and talk back and forth between pilot and control tower. By this time I'm into Sunday morning with four new grey hairs. On the day of the broadcast, we have a special telephone line set up so New York can advise us of any last minute changes. Fortunately there weren't any ... New York had specified plenty of plane noise during the show.

"When we went on the air; we had six bombers continuously diving at the control tower, another plane was idling near a mike on the field, and at a given point in the show, we caught the take-off of a bomber directly 'on mike', just as its wheels were getting loose of the ground.

"After any show I always feel a letdown, and I didn't know how our insert had gone over until I got a wire from Art Feldman, Special Events man in New York. It said: "War Department thought Long Beach, far and away, best pick-up of all on The Army Hour."

That was Joy Storm's contribution. He did an important job, but he was only one of a dozen special events men standing by for an Army Hour pick-up—just one of the hundreds of men who, every Sunday at 12:30 p.m., give their best efforts to put over this gigantic, powerful, thrillpacked "military operation of the United States Army COLONEL J. H. WEIKERT, Capt. Donald Thurman, and Cadet Vincente Lim give Army Hour listeners an account of flight training at the U. S. Military Academy field. Lim is son of Brig.-General V. P. Lim, first Filipino graduate of West Point and the one who commanded troops on Bataan.

For Miss McCambridge h as the rare quality of quickly analyzing the part she is to play, and approaching each role with the analytical approach which makes for freshness of characterization.

She, with Lurene Tuttle here on the coast, and Ann Shepherd in New York, are part of a small select company of ingenues who are of radio and who can, in the true sense of the word, be called actresses.

Kay Returns

Kay Kyser returned to Hollywood a week ago Sunday after a four and a half months' trip during which he visited some 35 army camps, travelled 25,000 miles with his aggregation, played war bond appearances on his "bond wagon" to more than a million people, and sold more than \$10,000,000 worth of bonds.

No wonder he was tired to death and had lost so much weight (20 pounds) that his clothes hung on him.

What Kay and his entertainers did, the records they broke, make a story in themselves. But that's not the story your Radio Life reporter uncovered when she interviewed the "Professor" Wednesday afternoon as he rehearsed his "College of Musical Knowledge" at Radio City's Studio B.

We didn't know Kay Kyser before he left on his trip, but those who heard him talking to us and did know him before, said he has come back to Hollywood a different man—that they had never seen or heard anything like the intensity or arousement Kay displayed.

For a solid hour he talked, spiritedly, with great emotion, of what he had seen in the camps and in civilian life during his gruelling trip. He talked of people's indifference to the war, their pettiness in avoiding sacrifice, their selfishness in political bickering, their refusal to think. With these he contrasted the spirit of our armed forces.

To us, the most important thing Kay said concerned radio and other entertainers. He believes that here is one bunch of people who have the confidence of Mr. and Mrs. America; he believes that when a Kate Smith speaks, Mr. and Mrs. America take heed; he believes that it is up to the nation's radio entertainers to make the American people aware—to make them think.

Thus, the war has thrust upon the stars of the airlanes the most important and significant job that these people have yet been called upon to perform.

"Nothing is more important now than winning this war," Kay Kyser exclaimed earnestly. "Nothing — not even love, or family, or time or your work! We radio folks certainly have our job cut out for us!" **EFT**, 7 p.m.

Protests of enthusiastic listeners lauding the American spirit of the show, decrying its passing, are answered by the Morris Stamping and Manufacturing Company which, in cooperation with the United States Treasury Department, will sponsor "United We Sing" each Sunday, beginning August 9, for a half-hour.

The sponsors will also have as guests each week, representatives from other defense industries as guest singers or orchestral entertainers.

Congratulations to a discriminating sponsor and a quality-wise network for keeping a worthwhile job of morale building on the air! It takes singing together as well as working together to keep up America's spirit these days.

Radio and Opera

Radio listeners and their sponsors may well be classified as human respirators for the dying arts of America, if the Texas Company's announcement of its new NBC contract for presenting the Metropolitan Opera is any indicator of which way the wind is blowing. Radio listeners have proven they enjoy the taste of the richer dishes of the arts—a little point of appetite that may be significant to future radio programs and fields not yet touched by radio.

With the signing of the new Texas contract, the Met will be heard over 170 stations of the Blue network in 16 operas, beginning Saturday, Nov. 28 and running until Saturday, March 13, 1943, opening the third season of the Texas Company's sponsorship and, as in 1941, having an increase in stations and listening audience over the previous year.

That contract could mean that microphones replacing high hats and loud speakers nosing out box seats are turning the dying gasps of opera to good, healthy breathing. For it is not long ago, near enough in fact to make tenors and sopranos shudder at the memory, that there were fearsome whispers of a possibility that a great musical tradition might be broken due to lack of support.

But with the tenderloin of the 400 being turned into hamburgers for the 4,000,000 and more—, business is looking up, thanks to the radio meat-grinder.

Consolidated is said to be considering a big money production with high salaried stars. If any of the deals jell, radio can notch up another significant recoup since war gave many sponsors priority jitters. General Motors led the way with its prestige-building program, "Cheers from the Camps." Next, Ford signed the veteran newsman, Earl Godwin, for a year's newspot seven nights a week on the Blue network. The tie-up was said to involve more than a million dollars.

Other big businesses are inclined to follow suit in keeping their names before the public during the war. It's strictly a goodwill gesture, as these concerns have nothing else to sell but goodwill. Those in the know advance the theory that several large companies which have been receiving adverse publicity on account of their profits from government war contracts are turning to radio as a means of mollifying the public. Whatever the motive, it means bigger and better listening for the dial twisters.

Sticks to His Guns

Harry W. Flannery still believes the war will be over in the final months of 1943.

We wondered about that since he had first made that prediction to Radio Life several months ago. Since then there has been the Jap invasion of the Aleutians, the fall of Burma, the remarkable drive of Nazi Marshal Rommel in Egypt and the amazing Nazi drive against the Russians.

Flannery's opinion was interesting since he was one of the last foreign correspondents to see the Nazi military machine in action. He had come back to the United States less than two months before Pearl Harbor, after having succeeded William L. Shirer as European representa-

tive of the Columbia Broadcasting System. Since then he has written about that period in Europe in one of the nation's current best sellers, "Assignment to Berlin." He is now news analyst for the Columbia Broadcasting System on the West Coast.

"If these recent events haven't given you reason to modify your statement of some months ago," we asked, "why do you continue to feel we can win by the end of 1943? What about the Nazi drive toward the oil of the Caucasus, for instance?"

"Of course," he said, "no one can be certain of anything in this war. So much depends on so many other things. If the Nazis do get the oil of the Caucasus before the winter comes as an ally of the Soviet and before we are able to open a second front, the war may last many, many years. The Nazis already have the food of the Ukraine and the Don. They have occupied a section of the country that produces more wheat than Germany, Poland and Hungary together. They have conquered a region producing three times as much coal as Germany, a high grade anthracite low in ash and nign in heat units. They have a land that produces 9 million tons of

ore a year, an ore that yields 65 per cent iron.

"I said in my book that a German economic expert told me that Germany could not last two more winters economically. That was before the Nazis took the Ukraine and the Don. That situation is already changed."

We interjected a comment. "And they may also get the oil of the Caucasus."

"Yes," Flannery said, "the oil they must have to keep their mechanized war going. And what's more—little has been said about this—they also may get the largest deposits of highgrade manganese in the world on the other side of the Caucasus. There's enough manganese there, necessary for steel, for several mechanized wars.

"But the Germans haven't gained these riches yet. They have almost a thousand miles to go to the richest oil fields at Baku. They are confronted by some of the most formidable mountains in the world and by a fighting Russian army that is still mostly intact. Until the Nazis cross the Caucasus or get around it, there is still reason for hope. That will take at least weeks and before then our monster raids on the Channel Coast and on the industrial regions of Germany may have enabled us to begin the Second Front that will change the whole picture.

"Germany may yet fall sometime next year, and before then when the Japs attack Siberia, we may be getting in the first real air punches against the Japs. In the meantime, we here in the United States must concentrate on the war effort in every way, in the rubber campaign, the collection of grease, scrap iron and every other such material, in the purchase of War Bonds, in the work in our factories. The harder we work and the more sacrifices we make now, the shorter the war will be.

IRONIC TWIST: Some weeks ago, we wrote a little story about one of the Sportsmen Quartet from the **Rudy Vallee** show. It told about **Thurl Ravenscroft**, the basso, who had more than 100 solo hours in the air and tried to enlist in the Air Corps, but was turned down because of a defect in one eye. He was going to be operated on to correct the trouble.

Ravenscroft underwent an expensive and painful operation and was given an O. K. by his doctors. Then he began to prepare for his technical examination, studying furiously. He wound up letter perfect for his exam, but—the strenuous application affected his eye again!

KUDOS FOR WILLSON: Although he has conducted for the San Francisco Symphony and for Los Angeles Philharmonic, Meredith Willson has yet to baton in the Hollywood Bowl. It won't be long now, though, for the affable NBC composer will direct "Symphonies Under the Stars" on Tuesday night, August 11. The King's Men, those perfect harmonizers from the Fibber McGee and Molly show, are also appearing that night. John Nesbitt, co-starred with Willson on the Mc Gee summer show, marks an innovation in Bowl history when he puts in his sixpence by doing a commentary on Meredith's original tone poem, "Jervis Bay." Looks like a big night for radio, all around.

ENCORE ON WILLSON: The other night, Meredith toiled over some orchestral arrangements for six solid hours. Weary, unshaven, and dishevelled, he borrowed the housekeeper's jalopy for a quick run for some ice cream. Meredith clattered up to a drive-in and gave his order: "A pint of vanilla, please."

The car-hop took the order, then retreated to a distance from which she could take inventory of the shabby car and its equally down-at-the-heels occupant. As the result of her survey, she came back to Willson and announced apprehensively: "A plnt of vanilla will cost 35 cents. Do you still want it?"

District Attorney's Prophetic Parallels Amaze Listeners

the 1940 Republican

National Convention in Philadelphia, three dele-gates were steadfast in their determination to

nominate Thomas E. Dewey, crusading New York district attorney, for the presidency of the United States. Through ballot after ballot, they refused to consider any other candidate.

Finally, after Wendell L. Willkie had won the nomination, the reason for their faithful support of Dewey came out.

"Too bad our man didn't win," commented one of the trio. "He'd make a wonderful president. You don't often find a man as fearless and capable as he is. Why, I wouldn't think of missing his radio program, every Wed-nesday night!"

The three men had stuck with New York's district attorney throughout the balloting because they thought he was the "Mr. District Attorney" they heard each Wednes-day night on the air over NBC!

Though it is significant that it is probably the only program in radio history that has been in the

running for the United States presidency, even more significant is the job that "Mr. District Attorney" has done in changing the public's thinking habits in regard to law enforce-ment officers. Time was when people were likely to compare criminals with Robin Hood, while the police and prosecutors were likened to the bungling, bribe-grasping Sheriff of Nottingham.

Thanks to Jay Jostyn's capable acting as "Mr. District Attorney," people have come to recognize the district attorney as a prosecutor or then a persecutor and the rather than a persecutor, and the criminal as a vicious, hunted ani-mal, rather than a romantic and somewhat unconventional figure.

Significant, too, is the job that the show has been doing in making the public more aware of their obligations to the country and to themselves in the nation's war effort.

with enemy spies present the Nazi agents as curtly authoritative men with accents a yard wide. Ed Byron, producer of "Mr. District Attorney," expressed his views as to how enemy undercover men ought to be played, at a recent rehearsal.

"A guy doesn't have to trail a yard of pumpernickel behind him to be a Nazi spy!" Byron insisted. "Why, if a fellow came up to you on the street and started talking to you in a Weber and Fields accent, you wouldn't give him the time of day, would you? No, if we're going to be at all realistic about this, we can't have these guys running around with signs on their chests saying 'I am a spy."

It might be well to date that little speech by Byron, and to point out certain circumstances surrounding it. Byron expressed those views on the afternoon of Wednesday, June 17. The script in question concerned the landing of enemy agents from Nazi submarines which surfaced off the eastern coast of the United States.

Ten days later, on Saturday, June 27, the FBI announced that it had rounded up eight spysaboteurs who had been delivered to points off the Atlantic coast by U-boats!

Beating the police to the punch is no novelty for "Mr. District Attorney." A few months back, he cleaned out a phony sanitarium on the eve of a real-life raid on a similar institution. Another time, he cracked down on a band of gasoline hijackers, just a few days before police in an eastern community found out about a gang fooling around with fuel in their own bailiwick.

All of this, of course, comes under the heading of colncidence, but it is indicative of just how close to the ground Byron's ear is. He strives to keep the show timely, and in doing so, he oftens finds that "Mr. District Attorney" is clearing up a case on the air at just about the same time that police are clearing up a similar case in actual life.

Both timely and valuable are the war messages presented on the show. Byron is irked by the fact that it has taken most of us a long time to get over the idea that because Hitler has a moustache like Charlie Chaplin's, he's funny too, and he makes every effort to convince listeners to "Mr. District Attorney" that they are up against a shrewd, resourceful enemy with a large assortment of tricks, both legitimate and dirty, up his sleeve.

'It's not going to do us any good to try to fool the public into believing that we're fighting a bunch of dummies." he insists. "They're shrewd, and tough, and in real life they don't get caught half as fast as we catch them on this show ... and you know the trouble we have!"

Due to this realistic view on the was and the sincere, authentic por-

trayals given by the cast, "Mr. District Attorney" has been able to get across useful sermons to the public, without seeming to preach. Gasoline hljacking, tire bootlegging, and draft dodging have been commented upon. Tying in with the "Loose lips sink ships" campaign, "Mr. District Attorney" solved "The Case of the Whispered Word," in which a young seaman gave his life rather than yield valuable information to his Nazi captor.

In the early days of the war, NBC objected to use of spy stories, on the ground that they might serve to give our nation's enemies ideas as to methods of operation. The network finally accepted a story about Nazis financing their spying by forcing storekeepers with relatives in the conquered countries to buy stolen welfare food stamps from them. But it was on the express understanding that this consent was not to be considered a precedent. Audience mail, which piled in, indicated hearty public approval and paved the way for more, similar stories.

"Mr. District Attorney's" position among the top ten shows on the air indicates that the public wants the sort of straight-from-the-shoulder instruction and entertainment that the program offers. So while "Mr. D. A." missed out on the nomination for the United States presidency, he has taken full advantage of his opportunity to be of real service in the nation's war effort.

Accelerating Dialogue

Victor Borge, Danish comedian on the "Music Hall" program, who ad libbed most of his comedy routines in his European stage days, finds radio's requirements for written scripts in advance somewhat disconcerting, but not half so much as the program's producers. You see, Borge --who learned English only a year ago — speaks the language faster than he reads it. Each rehearsal, as the script gets more familiar, Victor picks up a few seconds, and sometimes he reads it over to himself just before show time. So the producers, worried over how long his script is going to run on the air, get him in a corner at the last minute and in quire anxiously: "Are you reading or talking tonight?"

wants air time, and radio breaks its neck to accommodate. Now that's all well and good. Radio owes plenty to the government and should do everything within reason to assist Uncle Sam in his hour of need. I'm all for it. Radio's been doing a magnificent job villingly and sincerely.

But here's where I figure radio is being gypped: Every other medium of public expression, (the magazines, the press and the newsreels), has men at the battlefront. You see countless pictures in the papers of men in action. You read countless stories by correspondents who are but a step behind the infantry in Egypt, Russia, Australia, Aleutian Islands, and every other theater of war. And when you go to the movies, you occasionally see actual dogfights between R.A.F. and Nazi planes, and you see ships sinking and armies locked in battle.

But do you hear any radio pro-grams being broadcast from the scene of conflict? No. That's where I think radio is being gypped.

Why couldn't the Army and Navy or the Marines or the Air Force de-tail specially trained radio men to make recordings of the sound and the fury? No reason that I can see.

I don't expect programs to come from the battlefields as they would come from the NBC studios in Hollywood. There are too many complica-tions involved in a live program, such as censorship and so forth. But those complications can be extremely and simply modified by making an on-the-spot transcription.

• You know, people these days have become educated to radio. For the

most part, they don't find the drama in newspapers and in many cases the truth. And they don't find the timeliness in magazines. They've just naturally come to look to radio for their news and human interest material. In fact, they look to radio to keep them abreast of the day's events.

Yet all radio gives them now 15 news, not even verified in many cases; a few lousy commentators and one or two good ones, and the same old propaganda that is beginning to wear a little thin around the edges.

Just think for a moment what one walloping good program could do for morale, for the sale of war bonds, for the U.S.O., for Army, Navy and Marine recruiting . . . one thumping good program from the battlefield!

These transcriptions could be made in every corner of the globe where American fighting men are upholding the ideals of democracy. They could be shipped to a head quarters in Washington for editing and censorship and booking on the air. There is no limit to what could be done with such a department of the Office of War Information.

And it would be in keeping with the terrible streamlined methods of modern warfare. Other nations do it. Why can't we?

As I said at the beginning of this remarkable little piece, I'm probably cracking my knuckles against the wrong jaw. But it's fun!
