Reception We Got Touring the Camps!

By Bob Hope

(Bob Hope, Frances Langford, Jerry Colonna, and Tony Romano flew 16,000 miles in September to entertain U.S. soldiers in Alaska and the Aleutians, They put in one tough week in Alaska, flying in treacherous weather and putting on shows almost 24 hours a day. They came back to the U.S. to open Hope's NBC broadcast series from Seat-He September 22, and took off again next morning for the Aleutians. Here is Hope's own account of the trip.)

E flew from Seattle to Fairbanks in a Pan-American transport. We landed there at Ladd Field. Jerry Colonna was along, and Frances Langford, and Tony Romano, the fellow that plays a guitar. We stopped for gas at a little auxiliary airport. That was quite an experience.

It was just a little place surrounded by trees. A soldier would come out and take a look at us. Then he'd give us the double - t a k e like he couldn't believe his eyes. He'd yell, "Hey Joe, come here, it's Bob Hope." Joe would run out from behind a tree, look for himself and then wave back. "Hey Pete," he'd yell. "Come here, it's Bob Hope." Pretty soon soldiers would come pouring out of the trees. We were going to be there for an hour, so we got up on a tree stump and put on a show.

From Fairbanks we went to Nome in an army bomber. Our pilot was a swell kid named Marvin J. Seltzer,— Lieutenant Marvin Seltzer,—a really great flyer. (You should know how I felt when I found out where he was from. Pomona, California! After you've been kidding Pomona on your radio programs all your life, how would you like to get in the hands of a pilot from Pomona and fly over that mess of mountains in Alaska?) He did a great job of flying, that boy. When we got through I gave him a gold watch from Jerry, Frances, Tony, and myself and wrote on the back of it, "Thanks for my life." I'm not kidding about that either. You should have been with us one night over Anchorage. That day we flew to a couple of small camps and at 10 o'clock that night we started back for Anchorage. They had some sort of a celebration there that night and we wanted to get back and join the fun. Well, everything was swell when we started back, but we ran into a terrific sleet storm. We were flying blind for what seemed like hours. Jerry and I had been kidding this sort of thing before we started from Seattle. We had a story in our routine which got terrific laughs. It was about the parachute jumper, who was told by his officer that a station wagon would pick him up below. After finding th at neither of his 'chutes w ould open, he said, "It would be just like 'em not to have the station wagon there either." Well, here we were. I looked at Colonna and he looked at me, made a "well, what can we do about it" gesture with his hands and stroked his moustache in that funny way.

We felt the plane getting ready for a circling glide to lose altitude. This, I said, means we're at Anchorage. Brother, did that feel great! In the next moment we were hit by a draft that took us clear back to 13,000 feet. Anchorage is surrounded by big mountains and the winds there cause a terrific draft. Well, there we were right back in the storm again, and we couldn't see a thing. To make things worse, the radio went out. I heard the pilot yell to the crew chief and he went over and got Frances Langford and began *putting a Mae West life jacket and a parachute on her. "In case you land on water," he was shouting to her, "just push those buttons and the jacket will inflate." Brother, that was it. I looked at Frances to see how she felt about it. After all, I talked her into coming on this trip and that's all I could think of. I got so cold all of a sudden I began shaking all over. But Frances just looked at me and grinned. She was taking it big (boy, what a girl!) I pointed to her rip cord and said, "Do you think you're strong enough to pull that string?" She nodded her head, still smiling. There we were, rehearsing for a crash, and she was still smiling.

The crew chief began putting 'chutes on all of us. I looked at Romano and he was as white as a sheet. I looked at Colonna. He was still stroking his moustache. He turned to me and said, "I'll bet that station wagon won't be there either." I kept thinking if they'd ever find us after we bailed out. Why did I ever talk Frances into making the trip?

All of a sudden we saw a powerful circle of lights piercing the sky right through the clouds. After seeing those lights I won't even take a look at a Hollywood premiere again. They came right up through the fog and everything, and brother, were they welcome! What happened was that the boys at Anchorage got worried about us, so they set the lights around the airfield in a circle and shot them up. We just used the lights for a beacon and came in and landed. When we got down we found they even had crash wagons out waiting for us below. Somebody said, "Let's go get a drink." I said, "As soon as I change my linen." They asked Frances how she felt. "I was hoping we'd jump," she said.

The boys in Alaska were wonderful, really wonderful. We were sitting in a small cafe in Anchorage one night when three sailors walked over and started talking to us. They insisted on buying us a drink. We didn't want them to, so we told them if they insisted they'd have to go away. A little while later the waiter brought over a tray with eight champagne cocktails. The sailors paid for them and walked out without waiting to be thanked. Brother, that's really something when they pay for a drink and walk away. Usually, if they buy a drink they do it to stick around and sit at your table. But not those boys. They really meant it.

The boys went for Frances in a big way. She was the first white girl they ever saw on Umniak Island.

That's just 250 miles from Kiska in the Aleutians. They brought Frances souvenirs and gave her all sorts of insignia. They made her a sergeant major at Naknek. What did they give me? They made me nothing and gave me n ot hing. They treated Frances swell. No rough stuff. They just looked at her, nudged each other, and whispered stuff like "Boy, what I could do on a date with her," and all the stuff typical American kids would say anywhere. That's just what they were, real American kids. That trip did Frances a lot of good. You can imagine what it would do to any girl after all the attention she got from those men. She even got prettier on the trip. It does things to a girl to be admired by a lot of men.

We did eight shows for the boys at Nome. That's right on the Bering Sea, you know. We went there from Anchorage after stopping at Galena to play for a few hundred troops. Galena's on the Yukon. I got to spit in the Yukon. We did a show on the back of a truck with the wind at our back so the boys could hear what we said. It was plenty windy, though not as bad as it was at Nome. At Nome it rained hard and the wind was so strong it would blow you right off your feet. That was the toughest place we were in, Nome. It was just a mud pack. The boys slushed around in the mud up to their ankles. You should have seen them brighten up when they saw us. Ju-neau is a good town. Anchorage is OK too. Fairbanks is called the country club of Alaska. But Nome. It's Devil's Island with blubber.

I've been around to a lot of the camps in the United States, east, west, south, and north. I've seen how they live. And boy, compared to those boys in Alaska, the boys here are in velvet. Over in Galena I went to visit a doctor who probably went into the army from a swell practice in a nice big building in Minneapolis or somewhere,—you know, a place with all the modern gadgets and instruments. Well, over in Galena this doctor was doing his stuff in a square tent heated by an old wood stove in the center. He used the stove to sterilize his instruments and an army cot for an operating table.

The food wasn't bad anywhere. At Nome we were served powdered eggs for breakfast—something new for a comedian,—laying a powdered egg. They gave us powdered milk there, too.

At one of the camps I ran into a boy I knew in Hollywood. I won't use his real name, so let's call him Anisetti. His parents were well-to-do and he was in a family chemical business back here. He was a corporal at this camp. So when I got there, I asked for Anisetti. The general had him looked up and he came to the general's house to dinner with us that night. The first thing he did when he walked in was to stoop down and feel the rug, "Boy," he said, "a rug." He was the only guy in the camp who had a floor in his tent, he later told us. He got the boards by stealing them off a plank walk while the boys were busy sing-

ing songs. I'm telling this to show how democratic our generals are. There he was, sitting right next to the general and telling how he stole planks to put a floor in his tent.

Well, was this kid lonesome! He was so glad to see someone from home that when he saw me he ran over, put his arms around me and almost wept for joy. I asked the general later if he could fly to Umniak with us if we dropped him off on the way back in a day. That gen-eral was sure swell. He gave him the permission and Anisetti went along. You should have seen the expression on his face when we landed at Umniak and the general there came to the airport to meet us. I introduced the members of my party, "Mr. Colonna, Miss Langford, Mr. Romano and Corporal Anisetti." And the general walked over with a straight face and said, "How do you do, Corporal Anisetti." A general! Can you beat that? I looked at Anisetti and you should have seen the expression. For months he hadn't spoken to anything higher than a sergeant and here he was talking to a general.

Those generals are really swell, though. They're so human. We were playing one of the camps and you could see that the kids were thinking of their wives and families and sweethearts when Frances came on. One of them just put his head down on his hands and began sobbing. The boy next to him put his shoul-der around him and patted him on the back. I felt someone nudge me. It was the general. "Get that kid," he said. "You don't know what you're doing for them, coming over here. It's just what they need. Anything to break up the routine here. They'll be talking about your visit for months afterward. It will give them something to talk about." "Gen-eral," I said. "you ought to know what those kids are doing for our morale. We've been flopping in the States so we come out here and be-come a big success." A long time afterward, the general still couldn't get that crying kid out of his mind. "I can't get over that kid crying," he kept saying.

We landed at another location one night at seven. A lieutenant came out to meet us and he just stood there and looked at us as if he didn't believe his eyes. He was a swell looking young fellow. He looked like he might have been an all-American football player back home, clean-cut and well built. Finally, he said, "Well, we'd like a bit to eat and then do something for the boys." Well, we sat down to eat and the boys just all sat around and looked at us. All through the meal, they just sat and stared. We did a show for them and then the lieutenant came over and said, "Do you suppose you could do another one in a little while?"

Other Cities Breast "Take It or Leave It" with \$64 Answers, but Program Here Hits Perplexing Low

OS ANGELES can't "take it"—at least not the braincontorting puzzlers which Emcee Phil Baker propounds on the famous Sunday night melee, "Take It or Leave It." The show ar-

"Take It or Leave It." The show ar-Tived in Hollywood from New York on Oct. 11 for a brief stand at CBS-KNX. The first program displayed average responses, but on Sunday night, Oct. 18, the quiz hit an alltime low.

Not one single contestant approached the \$64 question.

So that Angelenos won't feel too complexed, we should qualify our "all-time low" statement. This was the only time, when money was won on the program, that any of the contestants failed to make the \$64 grade. Usually 75 per cent of them try for the top quizzer and about 20 per cent of them win the \$64.

It may be that local aspirants for "Take It or Leave It" honors are too smart to attempt scaling heights for \$64. Whether or not the \$32 poser is the big stickler is a much-debated point, but when three people on the program lead right up to it and then take their money just to be on the safe side, it looks as if the \$32 query was under suspicion.

Whether or not you're a contestant, "Take It or Leave It" is a jolly broadcast to watch. Preliminary to air time, Bruce Dodge stirs door stubs around in big fish bowls to draw numbers for contestants. There are three receptacles: one labeled "Men," one "Women," and one "Servicemen."

When Phil Baker emerges briskly onto the stage just before air-time, he's apt to pull two or three neat gags, like looking down at his feet and spying what seems to be a most intriguing "something." He picks it up and the "something" turns out to be a wad of bills tightly circled with a rubber band. Phil's gag is to drop the bills like worthless trash, and to stand admiring the stout rubber band which held them, exclaiming rapturously: "Just to think; It has two-way stretch!"

Phil has his set of questions on a stand near the microphone. For each question he has an alternate, prepared in case the answer is shouted from the audience or one contestant goes down on a \$2 query and someone else wants to try the same category. Phil also has well in mind and also on paper his smart cracks for each category. He¹drinks coffee during pauses on the show, pouring it from a nearby thermos.

Perhaps the person most vitally concerned with the contestants' answers is a young lady named Edith Oliver. She gets worked up because she's the one who has compiled the questions ever since the quiz show started two and a half years ago.

Edith says there are only 35 categories into which questions may be marshalled, so it keeps her on the run to think up new ways to embellish the 35 categories. Every week she emerges with 18 or 20 categories for the show. Seven are customarily used, so Edith puts on her thinking cap to make immediate replacements.

Her job isn't finished when she Mas figured out a \$1, \$2, \$4, \$8, \$16, \$32, and \$64 question for each category and arranged them so that they become more difficult as the rewards increase.

Edith has to know the answers, too. Of course, people expect that a Phi Beta Kappa from Smith will know all the answers. At least, a lot of college girls pretend that they

do. But Edith's an unassuming sort who would rather be right than too proud to ask. So she spends infinite time checking her information. In New York, regular stand of the program, she calls New York University, or Columbia, the Museum of Natural History, or some other special authority in the field of the category she's working on.

To Edith, it's not an unfamiliar experience to call up some research department, and nicely stating her radio connection and her current wants, receive the answer: "Yes, I know who you are. YOU WERE VERY UNFAIR TO T HAT CONTESTANT LAST SUNDAY NIGHT!"

Edith likes that, because it means that people are following the show heart and soul.

She found a difference between New York and Los Angeles.

"In New York," Edith stated, "it is always toughest to get contestants to take questions on fiction, quotations, literature, or front page news. We've had no such difficulty in Hollywood. Last Sunday night, three of these categories were chosen.

"As a general rule," she continued, "men's first choice is sports. Then come politics, scientific categories, questions about a u to s or 'planes. Women, on the other hand, stick true to form, maintaining a preference for details. Women choose, and answer correctly, questions de a ling with particularized events. "For example," says Edith, "a man will remember that Napoleon lost the Battle of Waterloo, but a woman will recall what Napoleon had to eat for dinner the night before he lost the battle."

To put it another way, women lean toward questions with a personal element in them, like first names of people, or famous husband-wife combinations. "Certainly," Edith says, "there have been people who wished they could crawl into a hole after missing a question." Sometimes people become nervous, sometimes they know the answer but just can't get it out. Once, a science teacher went down on a science question he had drilled into his classes every day. Another teacher couldn't give Churchill's first name.

Willkie's Score

In the Service

Sergeant Stafford and a Scotsman, named "Jock," floated five days and five nights on a rubber raft. Attempting to keep up one another's spirits and silence the pangs of hunger, Jock sang songs of his native Scotland, and Graham sang good old Yankee tunes.

Stafford saw his companion's strength ebbing and, cradling his head in his arms, sang the songs Jock loved best "Deep in the Heart of Texas" and "Without a Song."

"Did I ever tell you about my Bonnie . . . the little girl I've got in Edinburgh?" the dying boy asked.

"You'll see her again, Jock Don't think that you won't." Stafford assured him.

"That's what I was fightin' for." Jock whispered, "that's all . . . the hills all covered with mist . . . and the bagpipes ... and my Bonnie ..." And with a long weary sigh, he passed on.

Stafford buried him at sea, and it was two long horrible days and nights before rescuers finally found the lone survivor. Stafford was given leave of absence and came home to Hollywood to be with his father.

Each week "It Happened in the Service" brings heroes of land, sea, and air to the microphone that listeners might hear first-hand reports of the events that headline the news.

Kudos for Clete

Clete Roberts, special events chief of the Blue Network, presented a gentleman on his "Men of the Land, Sea and Air" program that had quite a story to tell. George Pomeroy is the pilot who tests those big B-24 "Liberator" bombers. He has 21,000 hours in the air, a record exceeded by only one man.

After that Mr. Pomeroy's experience with airplanes reads like a history of the industry itself. He flew bi-planes in the last war. He fought with Eddie Rickenbacker's group. He took part in General Billy Mitchell's bombing experiment on those old battleships off the coast of Virginia back in 1921 and helped prove General Mitchell's theory of air supremacy over surface craft. He was one of the first night-time mail flyers... you know the old De Havilands with no radios or de-icers or any of the modern equipment.

When the Japs began to get ideas, Mr. Pomeroy joined the flight test division of the Consolidated Aircraft Company at San Diego.

Clete Roberts is doing a really fine job in presenting such men as Pomeroy on his "Men of the Land, Sea and Air," heard over KECA at 4:45 p. m. Mondays and Fridays.

America's War Song

"Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition," is the best war song to date, according to Charles Dant, Musical Director of NBC. "Because it, more than any song so far, reflects the spirit of the people," he said. "We have had several good war ballads, but ballads don't build morale. Ballads such as "White Cliffs of Dover' and 'He Wears a Pair of Silver Wings' would have been popular without a war.

"Many song writers are patterning their stuff after the vintage of the last war. This is a mistake. Conditions are too different. This is a war of tanks, jeeps, subs, and bombers. Our war songs must eatch the spirit of the new

Gag Technique

Hal Block, who has written gags for most of the famous comedians of the country at one time or another during his 10 years in radio writing, says: "Comedians have entirely different techniques in putting over radio humor."

"Although few pcople realize it," says Block, "George Burns is greatly responsible for the success of Burns and Allen. He sits in on the script writing from the very first until-the final revision. He insists on the authenticity of Gracie's character, and sees that all the jokes exactly fit her brand of foolishness.

"Fred Allen," says Block, "is possibly the greatest wit among comedtans and writes virtually all his own shows. He has a few writers, but they serve mainly to supply ideas and construction. And as for ad libbing—don't believe what they say about air comedians and their inability to ad lib. About ten per cent of Allen's show , is ad libbed."

Hal Block is now a script writer for Columbia Network's "Stage Door Canteen."

 With the exception of the Saturday broadcast on KRKD, all shows are put on "live." The Saturday program is a rebroadcast of the Thursday.one on KFAC.

March of Time

Next Thursday night when you are comfortably ensconced in an easy chair listening to "March of Time's" on the spot reports of world events, you might be interested to know the manner in which Time correspondents all over the globe must interrupt their sleeping and working schedules to bring their eye-witness accounts of the war fronts.

To appear on the NBC broadcast, Steve Laird in London, for example, has to grope through the blackout and be at the studio at 3:30 a. m. (Friday). Harry Zinder in Cairo must be at the microphone at 5:30 a. m. and Walter Graebner in Moscow must be there at 6:30 a. m. And so it goes on all the far-flung battle fronts—for William Fisher and Theodore White in New Delhi, Robert Sherrod and George Strock in Australia, and more than 300 others throughout the world.

"The next morning about ten our 13th o'clock, day adrift on the turbulent waters of the South Atlantic, (with 13 passen-gers), we learned very forcibly that God answers prayer! Somewhere

in the hazy past of my childhood I recalled the words 'And a little child shall lead them.' Well, little Robin led us out of the darkness of despair that dreary morning for we suddenly sighted a ship on the dim horizon. Almost crazed with joy we immediately speculated as to what kind of a ship it was. The fear that it might be another submarine, or, even an enemy warship soon faded however, as a passenger who possessed our only pair of binoculars, focussed them on the vessel and then turned excitedly to announce that it was only a freighter.

"Approaching us rapidly, in less than ten minutes we distinguished the name, "City of Wellington," on her starboard bow. In another ten minutes we were all on board in the hands of friendly English Captain Walter Hanley, who advised he was headed for Capetown, South Africa. Had he told us he was headed for Iceland, it would have made no difference. For to use a sea-going expression, with us, it was 'any old port in a storm.'

"In five days we were safely deposited at Capetown and placed in the hands of the American Consul. (And boy were we glad to see him!) Our thrilling experience proved the truth of the old saying, 'all's well that ends well,' and our first act ashore was the purchase of a gold watch obtained by collecting nearly a hundred dollars from among us. On the back of the watch we had inscribed these words—"To Captain Walter Hanley and his gallant crew, in deep appre-ciation." Underneath were engraved the names of the thirteen survivors.

"A fitting conclusion to this log is represented in the words of little Robin, who piped 'Mommy, who says that 13 is unlucky?"

Mr. Oboler: (recovering himself) No miss—I thought you said—

Nurse in white: (breaking in) I am looking for Mr. Bond.

Mr. Oboler and Mr. Daniels: (to-gether) He's left.

(Nurse in white stares at them, sniffs the air, empties a sh trays, opens windows, looks at them again and leaves. Mr. Daniels continues his card game. Mr. Oboler walks up and down, starts to lie down on the couch. Nurse in green comes in, smiles, takes a gown from hall tree, both men jump to their feet.)

Nurse in green: You may put this on, Mr. Daniels, and come in for just one minute. It's a beautiful girl.

They both leave as the nurse tries to tie strings of gown.

Mr Oboler shivers—goes and puts the windows down—sinks into a chair—covers his face with his hands. He appears utterly exhausted.

Nurse in white comes in and goes to the hall tree, takes a gown and holds it out to Mr. Oboler.

Nurse in white: (smiling) Don't

Radio's Highest Paid



A NEW voice on the networks is that of Martin Block, former Los Angeles boy. Martin is now the highest paid announcer in ra-

dio. He receives \$4,000 a week for putting just the right amount of honey into his sales talks for "Your Hit Parade," Kay Kyser's "College of Musical Knowledge," "Pepper Young's Family" and his New York "Make Believe Ballroom" program.

Martin's assignments on the Lucky Strike shows were given him last June. Before that, he was not known to a coast-to-coast audience. During the spring he had been praising the Lucky Strike brand of cigarets on his "Ballroom" broadcasts and the president of that company liked the way Block personalized his messages, the way he persuaded without obvious and distasteful high pressure.

Now, when Block does the commercials on "Hit Parade" and Kay Kyser's show, he speaks from a specially built booth constructed to give his voice an intimate resonance. Fabricated of wood, the booth is closed entirely on three sides and is insulated to shut out room echoes.

On the Wednesday night "College of Musical Knowledge" program, Block's voice travels 6,000 miles before it is heard by listeners in the studio where he is broadcasting. Kyser's part of the program originates in Hollywood and Block's commercial plugs travel west by special wire to Hollywood, then back east with the rest of the program.

In addition to being the highest paid announcer in radio, Martin Block is the only announcer allowed to ad lib on a network show. This imparts to his talks a natural, chummy flavor, but one that is never familiar. Notice, if you will the next time you hear him, that he usually addresses his listeners as "ladies and gentlemen," sometimes as "friends," but never as "folks."

Instead of reading from a script, Block carries a large-sized loose leaf folder with selling points of each of his sponsor's products put down in outline form. He consults headings of these points as he speaks.

The honeyed voice didn't become

> silken overnight. Before Block settled into the velvet this year, he had fulfilled his first job as office boy to Owen D. Young; had run a mobile, portable radio station on New York City streets until the law makers evoked anti-noise legislation; had returned to his birthplace, Los Angeles, for a brief try with radio; and gone back east again with the "Make Believe Ballroom" idea which he and Al Jarvis had started out here.

On his first "Ballroom" account, Martin turned on the persuasion so effectively that 600 women mailed in a dollar each for a sample of his sponsor's product. Today, sponsors wait patiently to share a 15 minute spot on his program.

Every February 3, Block commemorates his own and his program's birthday anniversary with a party. Originally the get-togethers were held in the studios of the "Ballroom" at WNEW, with every prominent bandleader and singer present in person to drink a toast, nibble a sandwich, and say a few words into the mike. Soon so many record artists began to float into the blowouts that Martin had to shift the scene to the grand ballroom of a large New York hotel. A plug on Block's program is extremely important to an artist.

Take the case of the Hollywood orchestra leader, Spike Jones.

He and his City Slickers recorded a song called "Der Fuehrer's Face." Block plugged the record on his show, offering a platter with every \$50 bond subscribed. Within an hour he had tabbed listeners for \$30,000 in bonds. Now the record has hit a sales high of half a million, Disney has changed his forthcoming animated cartoon feature from "Donald Duck in Nutziland" to "Der Fuehrer's Face," Spike Jones has just signed a movie contract and he is set for the Bob Burns and Gilmore Oil radio shows. Spike is more than grateful to Block.

To cite an example of what a super salesman Martin is, the girl at the information desk at WNEW, New York, wouldn't let a bedraggled Block inside the studios when he went back from Los Angeles and wanted to apply for a job.

You guessed it. She's Mrs. Martin Block now.

PROPHET WITH HONOR

OHN **B**. Hughes is a prophet with honor in his own country. For years he has made the history and conditions of the Orient and the Pacific Coast his specialty. He took the lead in demanding the evacuation of Japanese from vital areas after war was declared. He had slanted his thinking so tirelessly on relationships between this country and the Orient that when the fateful day of December 7 arrived, John B. Hughes was one man who could speak -and with authority-on the situation.

It was natural, then that the Mutual network should focus its attentions on John B. the moment that the news of Pearl Harbor was flashed to the nation. Hughes had already completed his morning broadcast and had returned to his home to indulge in his favorite hobby of furniture making, when KHJ gave him the urgent summons to return to the statior.. With 10 minutes' notice, Hughes tackled a coast-to-coast broadcast, and ad-libbed throughout the day and into night for two and a half hours on the network. Mutual recognized that in him it had a man whose full

value had only begun to be realized.

Hughes knows the Oriental mind and temperament. Couple this knowledge with a study of Japanese history, and one finds in this rising commentator a man who is able to make predictions which come true.

Six months before Pearl Harbor, he told the world: "When the time comes, the Japanese will strike swiftly and surely. There will be no doubt about the war. When they are ready they will start it if they have to fire broadside into our biggest battleship."

More recently, John B. has demonstrated his complete understanding of Pacific Coast problems by suggesting that Mexican labor be brought in to help harvest crops. Fulton Lewis jr. said of this suggestion that it was the most important contribution yet made by anyone for the conduct of the war.

Hughes attended Long Beach high school, did newspaper work, joined a stock company and spent eight years acting, directing, and writing for the theater. This led to writing and producing for radio. The two careers ultimately merged to make him a news commentator.

HEN I was a boy we never had any company at my house, because my whole family is kinda shy. And Papa never was a good mixer, either. I'll never forget the time that Papa was goin' up the mountain road, comin' home one time, and he had a package under his arm. He was goin' up this road, and one of these revenue men (that was back in them days) looked out from behind a tree, and saw Papa with this bundle, and the revenue man says, "Hey!" And Papa looked back and saw him, and started walkin' a little faster, and the revenue man started walkin' after Papa. Papa saw him comin' and he walked faster, and so did the revenue man. So Papa broke into a trot, and the revenue man come trottin' after him; first thing you know they was both runnin' as fast as they could tear, up that mountain road. And do you know that Papa led that man a merry chase for three days through them mountains? Finally, when they was both just plum tuckered out, the revenue man caught up with him, and he says, "Let me see what's in that bundle." And Papa showed it to him, and the man opened it up, and he looked at Papa, and he says, "There ain't no liquor in here; there ain't nothin' but a pair of shoes." And Papa says, "I know it." And the revenue man says, "Well, why didn't you stop when I first hollered at you, three days ago? Why have you been trying to avoid me for three days?" And Papa said, "Well, I just didn't wanta make no new acquaintances."

I was just talkin' to a fella the other day about my Cousin Wafford, what a pitcher he'd-a made. Obscure Dialers Hear Broadcasts, Bob Up to Claim Part in Episodes

HE closing notes of the bugle call faded out over the air. The curtain had rung down on another "Death Valley Days" program. It was a story of the old West—a story of a raid against a band of marauding Apaches by a cavalry troop from a remote United States Army Post. The Indians were routed, their camp abandoned. But in one of the wickiups a soldier found a tiny papoose. He picked her up and carried her back on his horse to the ranch of the sheriff, who adopted her.

The morning after the broadcast, a man appeared at the New York office of the Pacific Coast Borax Company, sponsors of the program. A man in his 70's, with grizzled hair and a weather-seamed face.

"I heard your 'Death Valley Days' program last night," he said rather diffidently. "And I sure got a kick out of it."

The sponsor murmured polite appreciation.

"You see," the man went on—and a faraway look came into his eyes, "I was with that troop of Seventh Cavalry that raided the Apache Camp you told about. It was me who carried the baby on my saddle back to the ranch."

Such things no longer surprise the producers of "Death Valley Days." After 12 years on the air with true stories of the West, they have learned

that practically every broadcast will bring a response from some obscure listener who is in some way or other related to the story.

A few months ago there was a story about a renegade Indian who ran amuck, killed right and left, and then disappeared. His mummified remains were discovered 20 years later in a cave near the Colorado River by two prospectors. The program had hardly signed off when the studio telephone rang. A professor at Columbia University had been listening in and had heard the name of a favorite cousin who had gone West years before and never been heard of again. Could the prospector mentioned possibly be his cousin? It was.

In this case, unfortunately, the cousin was no longer living. But in plenty of other cases "Death Valley Days" has been the happy means of locating long-lost relatives and reuniting them with their families.

Ask old Frank Tilton. Frank lives in Death Valley. He used to drive a 20 Mule Team for the Pacific Coast Borax Company. Frank left home as a young fellow to seek his fortune in the West, drifted about the mining camps of Nevada, and somehow never got around to writing his folks. Years passed. Everyone back home figured he was dead. Then one evening, in a sitting room in Kansas, two cousins listening to the radio heard the name of Frank Tilton on a 'Death Valley Days'' program. They jumped, stared at each other incredulously, and promptly wrote the sponsors of the program. A few weeks

later a beautiful touring car drove up and stopped in front of Frank's modest desert shack. A car with a Kansas license. For the first time in over 50 years Frank knew the joy of being with his own family again. He wouldn't go back with them to live—the pull of the desert was too strong. But he did go back to Kansas for a visit, where he was given a reception which he declares "was bigger and better than Greta Garbo ever had!"

Brings 'em to Life

Yes, somewhere in every "Death Valley Days" audience there's a listener who "belongs" to the story. Not always way off in the blue, either. When the story of Justin Gates was broadcast (he was a pioneer pharmacist who served the goldrush camps with his "travelling drug store") it was found that his daughter lived right in New York City, only a few blocks from the broadcasting studio.

On a recent occasion the program was about a certain eccentric character in early-day San Francisco. "Oofty Goofty," he was called. At the end of the broadcast a very attractive young woman stepped forth from the studio audience and introduced herself as "Oofty Goofty's" nlece! She had come to New York on a vacation and visited "Death Valley Days," having no idea what the subject of the program was to be. "My uncle would have loved it!" she said.

She herself was delighted. And so have all the others been who have listened to the stories of their friends and forebears. Even the son of the notorious "Soapy" Smith—who appeared from oblivion at the announcement that his father's life was to be dramatized on "Death Valley Days"—even "Soapy," Jr. had no fault to find with the program when he heard it.

If the author knows that relatives of a character in a story are still living, she notifies them so they may hear the broadcast. Last spring, in a little town in southern Utah, a group of Mormons gathered to hear the story of a pioneer couple who had come into that country when it was a wilderness. Among the liseners were descendants of those pio-

ers. The session around the radio ened and closed with prayer!

In the state penitentiary in Nevada, a prisoner listened to a "Death Valley Days" program—a story laid in a Nevada mining camp some 30 years before. The prisoner broke down and wept. He was the hero of that story!

Yes . . . somewhere . . . as the bugle call sounds each Thursday night at 8:30 o'clock over the CBS airlanes . . . there is some one who, as he listens to "Death Valley Days," will whisper to himself "of course . . . I remember her."

to Dick Joy. These included the coveted spot on the "New Old Gold Show" with Nelson Eddy and Bob's 7:30 a. m. news broadcast.

Dick has been at CBS-KNX for five years. The other day when he celebrated his anniversary, his wife presented him with a surprise recording of his original broadcast in 1937. "I had forgotten I was that bad," deplored Dick.

Dick's biggest fluff was his first. It happened on the "Sunrise Salute," when Swift was advertising turkeys for the holidays. Birds with red tags on the bottoms of their legs were the de luxe poultry, birds with blue tags were good.

"Just remember," Dick admonished his listeners, "if you want the best turkey you can get, look for the bird with the red bottom—__!"

During the five plus years since then, Joy has had some queer experiences. On "The World Today," he was calling Bucharest, and was using his swankiest pronunciation. "Come in, BoocarEST," he intoned. "Come in BoocarEST." He repeated this four or five times. Nothing happened.

Then Joy reverted: "Come in BUcharest." The station responded at once.

Once Dick was handling the announcing on Harbor Day, when CBS gave a special salute at Wilmington. The second page of his script was picked up by a gust of salty wind and was blown away 20 feet. A boat whistle covered the embarrassing gap while Joy regained his composure and Sterling Tracy tore Page 2 from his own script and passed it on to Joy.

Assigned to announce from Hollywood Bowl one night, Dick was unable to persuade the doorman that he should be admitted. "Dick Joy has already gone in," the official insisted. If a member of the orchestra hadn't chanced along and vouched for Dick, the program would have been minus its announcer. Later Joy learned that someone had crashed the gate by using his name.

That's right. We're going to start talking about fruit cake, already! You know how time flies when you start making preparations for Christmas, so isn't it a good idea to get that fruit cake mude ahead of time? Give yours ample time to ripen.

You'li find your fruit cake making easier if you get your ingredients ready the day before. Of course you may have a little would getting a large variety of candied jruits and the like this year, but here's a trick that will help you out. Slice your candied cherries, candied pineapple, citron, dates, raisins and nut meats into very thin slivers. It will give your cake a more even mixture and make those candied ingredients go farther. Short Ribs of Beel Farmer Style

Sauted Squash

Recipe for Short Ribs of Beef. Farmer Style

3 pounds short ribs 1 onion, chopped 1 mineed clove of garlie 3 pounds diced potatoes Sprig of parsiery 4 pound oleomargarine Seasonettes, salt and pepper 1 cup water

Braize the short ribs until brown in $\frac{1}{24}$ pound metted oleomargarine. Add the onion, garlic and parsley. Season with 1 teaspoon Seasonettes, $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons salt and a dash of pepper. Add one cup of water and let cook for 30 minutes. Put in the potatoes, cover the pot and simmer for $\frac{1}{24}$ hour, or until the meat and potatoes are done. Serve. find your cake is easier to cut this way and the slices will hold their shape.

By the way, cutting or slicing sticky candied fruit is much casier if you frequently dip your scissors or paring knife into a pan of warm water.

Now we come to mixing the cake. All of you have your own time-tried method, so we'll 'just add a few random suggestions and let it go at that.

1. When you find your cake batter is growing heavy with fruit, thin it out with a little cider or perhaps wine.

2. When you are putting in your spices dont' forget the cloves.

3. Let your batter stand over night before baking, so that all the flavors of your spices and fruits have a chance to blend. We take it for granted you use double acting baking powder. That means the second action will not take place until your cake is in the oven.

4. Be sure you have a strong spoon and a stronger arm!

Sourdough:

One of the ingredients that has gone into the making of America is sourdough. It has been the staff of life for all of the great doings on this Continent for well over a century now. The Klondike Gold rush was built on it. And the lumber men of the Northwest would never have felled a tree if they hadn't been well fed on sourdough. Why, the old lumbermen claim you could use it for anything from "mending the traces of a harness to making a cast for a broken leg."
