Can You Top These?

Here Are the Biggest Laugh Fetchers on NBC's Gag Show-Can You Surpass the Experts?

WO men, Joe and Moe, met one day. Joe was suf-fering from a toothache. Joe said: "Gosh, I won-

der what I can do to relieve this pain?"

Moe: "Well, when I have a tooth-ache, or a pain, my wife puts her arms around me and soothes me until I forget all about my ache."

Joe: "That's swell! Is she at home now?" . . .

Do you think this was a funny story? Well, don't be concerned if you didn't-maybe you weren't in a jocular mood. But if you did derive a chuckle from it, you agreed with the large audience which almost cracked the "laughmeter" when the joke was related by Joe Laurie Jr. a few Saturday nights ago on NBC's "Can You Top This?" program. (6:30 p. m.r.

Here's how this new joke-quiz program operates. sisteners are invited to send in their favorite jokes. The best are chosen and no over the air by actor Peter Donak. Then a board of three humorists - veteran story tellers, "Senator" Ed Ford, Joe Laurie Jr., and Harry Hershfield--try to top the joke sent in with one of their own stories in similar vein.

These three men are like the ex-perts in "Information Please," except that they are human encyclopedias of humor rather than plain "walking encyclopedias." Theirs is a competi-tion in the art of story telling.

Their radio program is the out-growth of their meeting regularly at New York's famous Lambs Club, where the trio would spend hours swapping stories. Each man knows hundreds of jokes. None of the three story tellers sees in advance the jokes to be read by Donald. So it behooves each wit to ad lib his topper and to give it a twist so that it is related to the joke sent in by the listener.

The "Laughmeter"

Gauging the audience's reaction to the stories told by the experts is an electrical device called a "laugh-meter." It picks up the roars of the studio listeners and translates the

volume into points ranging from 0 to 1000. A joke striking 550 or 600 has been good for hearty guffaws. One in the 900 bracket is a side-splitter. The prize money received by a person sending in a joke which is read is determined on a fluctuating scale, based on whether his joke is topped by one, two, or no experts.

Here's a sample of a topper as told by Ford:

By mistake, a notice of a gentleman's demise was inserted in the newspaper. Said man was very much alive. He called a friend of his and asked: "Hey, Al, did you see the notice of my death in today's paper?" The voice at the other end of the phone said warily, "Yeah! I did. By the way, where are you speaking from?"

This story registered 825 on a "laughmeter."

Laurie, by the way, grew up in true Broadway tradition. "They call me a pint size comedian," he confides, "and it's never been anything but a build-up in my work. I was a newsboy, a page boy (New York Stock Exchange) exercise boy, and boy! What not! I've played vaudeville, musical comedy, straight drama-was the youngest musical comedy star on Broadway 30 years ago. I made my debut as an entertainer at a fireman's benefit in Greenlaw, Long Island. Got the job by pull; I knew the fellow that sold the firemen their hose! My greatest thrill? When a midget looked up at me!"

However much he may enjoy depreciating himself, Laurie is able to tell the toppers on the show. Recently he scored 850 with this one:

Some men were sitting on the porch of a nut house, and it was a very hot midsummer afternoon. Finally, one of them couldn't stand the heat any longer. He went upstairs, took off his clothes, and filled the tub with water. Then he climbed up on the washbowl and dove off. He broke his nose. Once again he climbed up and dove off. This time he knocked out his teeth. The third and last time he cracked his head open.

"Oh!", he said. "Low tide!"

Scoring 50 points more than this story was the one Laurie related about a woman who went shopping with her little boy. As they were going up in the crowded elevator, a big blonde who was standing in front of the kid turned around and slapped the face of the man standing next to him. She got off on the next floor. So did the man.

"I wonder why she slapped that man?", said the mother.

"I dunno," replied the kid, "but she stepped on my foot and I pinched her."

Confucius Say

Then, one recent night, Laurie was reminded of a story about a woman who had a Chinese house-man who had a habit of entering the room without knocking. One day she admonished him: "Ling, you must always knock on the door before you enter, for some day I may be dressing."

"Dh, that's all right," said the

Chinese cheerfully. "I no come in when you dressing. Me look through the keyhole first!"

The "laughmeter" hit 550 on that one.

Laurie has been a gag writer for Jolson and Cantor, has had a column in Variety for the last 10 years. He claims he succeeded in vaudeville as a monologist because he brought his parents out on the stage with him—he figured the audience w ould n't throw eggs at an old couple!

"Senator" Ford was the one who dreamed up the program. Harking back to his early days in vaudeville (circa 1905), the "Senator" remarks that he recently reached the highest place a vaudevillian could attempt the Rainbow Room. He played there 13 weeks—and actually got paid.

That makes both him and Laurie graduates cum laude in the school of vaudeville.

This recent gag of Ford's drew an 850 response: A man ordered a house —one of those that come in sections —from a mail order concern. After two months he had it put together and invited a friend to come over and see it.

"Why," his friend exclaimed, "it's upside down!"

"Oh," said the amateur architect, "no wonder I kept falling off the porch!"

Harry Hershfield, third member of the topping trio, is a former cartoonist who now is Manhattan's best known after-dinner speaker. He of-(Please Turn to Page 32)

Presenting the Folks Who Make The Morning Fun

NE chilly morning away back in 1924, a smart group of Los Angeles equestrians decided that every Wednes-day they would arise and face the bleak dawn and take a swift ride through Griffith

Park.

You may wonder just how that affects you . . . but without that small beginning you would now be deprived of some of your most colorful morning radio listening.

But to go back for a moment.

This group of business men de-cided to take a breakfast along with them ... ride awhile, eat, then ride on back. That was tried, but the ride back on a full tummy wasn't so good for the male equilibrium. So the Los Angeles Breakfast Club was formed . . . a club where good fel-lows got together for a brisk ride through the park and then a wonderful ham and egg breakfast.

One morning one of the wits of the club stood up and made a very clever speech . . . it was so popular that the club members decided that they would have to have a program every week. That was back in 1924. But the idea of a "breakfast club" caught on like wild fire. And now over the air we have several gay breakfast club groups.

One group of "breakfasteers" that is universally popular is the Blue network's "Breakfast Club." The program is all ad-libbed . . . a free-forall show in which emcee Don Mc-Neill and his helpers let the quips fall where they may every morning,

Monday through Saturday, over KECA at 8:15 o'clock.

Moving along at a fast pace, despite the absence of director and script, the "Breakfast Club" gets on and off the air in a manner as perfectly timed as the most expertly directed show. The secret of the production's long-standing popularity is believed to be its informality. Like Topsy, the program "jest g rows." From the moment the show is opened with the merry "Good m orn in g everybody, good morning to you" right on through flipping back and forth at one another with gags—like Don McNeill cracking at Singer Jack Baker that every time he took a nickel out of his pocket the Indian head blinked at the light.

"We use gags sent in by listeners," says McNeill, "and, of course we make up our own gags ... sometimes we just talk around without any gags at all. In short, we just say what comes into our minds and the result sometimes, is a lot of spontaneous wisecracking which sounds as though it might have been rehearsed, yet it never is."

The general idea behind the program is that somebody ought to do something to change the old American custom of eating breakfast with a grouch, and the show follows that idea with a cheerful disregard for routine broadcasting practices. A little bit of everything is offered on the show. Comedy, drama, interviews with studio guests, music that runs from symphony to swing, plenty of extemporaneous small chat, and poetry like "You never know when you go to sleep, what, through the walls, will creep."

Among the graduates from the "Breakfast Club" cast are Fibber Mc-Gee and Molly, the Merry Macs, and Gale Page. Its listening family is

world-wide, and the fan mail comes in from odd spots like Quintana Roo or some coast port on the Indian ocean.

Following the old adage of "do what I say," the theme song of the "Breakfast Club" is "Oh how I hate to get up in the morning." And for a group of people who radiate more matutinal cheer than a gross of meadow larks, the cast of the show is as reluctant to get out of the hay in the morning as your Uncle Henry Swilch ... the one who was born lazy.

Significant items uncovered about the cast include the following:

- 1. Various members use everything from a bucket of water to a toy cannon to get themselves out of bed.
- 2. They admitted, 100 percent, "I'm absolutely no good in the morning until I get that first cuppa' coffee!"
- 3. Their idea of heaven is a place where you can wake up late, have breakfast in bed, and then turn over and go back to sleep again.

Hughes Tags News

More than a year of eventful history-making news has been written since America became a nation at war. Last week John B. Hughes, Mutual-Don Lee news commentator heard over KHJ, made a summary of the ten news stories which he considers the most important (to date) for the year 1942.

1. The Price of a Free World Victory speech by Vice-President Henry Wallace, May 8—the speech of the year that marked the turning point in world thinking. Wallace's speech shows the beginning of more than a United Nations coalition for war —actually a tuthless determination for a successful peace.

2. The Battle of Stalingrad—the battle of the year that marked the beginning of Hitler's defeat.

3. The Battle of the Solomons the United States' turn to the offensive in the war.

4. The United States and British renunciation of extra-territoriality in China—the offensive in political warfare taken by the United Nations.

5. The advent of Henry J. Kaiser's production plan into the battle on the home front. The biggest "running story" on news at home.

6. The Battle of North Africa—the tightening of the ring around Hitler —the turn to the drive for liberation.

7. Wendell Willkie's world trip, and the speech he made at its conclusion, a demonstration of American unity even if the "Old Guard" wouldn't believe it.

8. Appointment of Herbert Lehman as director of Foreign Relief and Rehabilitation—the beginning point of the economic offensive.

9. Evacuation of Japanese from the United States West Coast war zone—our first forceful move in self defense.

10. President Roosevelt's feigned surprise at finding the polls open on November 3 — democracy continues to function.

New Show to See

Radio Life readers who enjoy witnessing broadcasts will now have the opportunity of seeing "Over Here", the b i g g e s t government entertainment now airing under quadruple auspices of the U. S. War, Navy, and Treasury Departments and the Office of War Information.

Moving from New York to Hollywood last week, the main portion of the broadcast with Ronald Colman as emcee now originates over the Blue network from Hollywood's Radio City on Saturdays at 5:30 p.m. This is the Eastern release of the one hour program presenting top ranking luminaries. Tickets are obtainable by contacting the Blue network. For the stay-at-homer, "Over Here" is released by transcription on the West Coast at 9 p.m. the same evening.

It is understood, however, that George Washington Hill, head of the sponsoring cigaret company, is an ardent tunester, so three musical shows simply reflect his own personal tastes. KECA. Traffic Problem

The "Elgin Show," heard on KNX Christmas day, was one whose smoothness belied a "traffic" problem. The large number of starring attractions, some with several performers each and bulky musical instruments, demanded that the traffic problem be simplified to keep the necessarily limited space in the wings and stage of the theater from becoming hopelessly jammed.

UR show, Fibber McGee and Molly, went to the top of the radio survey for the first time a year ago in May. My wife, Marian, (Molly) and I were walk. ing on air. Shortly after, just as we were leaving for the NBC studios for a rehearsal, a special delivery let-ter came for me. It was addressed UR show, Fibber McGee

ter came for me. It was addressed in my brother's handwriting, but the envelope was suspiciously thin. I opened it and out dropped a ten dollar bill. Nothing else-just ten dollars

I thought at first it was a gag-a shallow one to be sure-but nevertheless some sort of joke. And then I remembered.

Seventeen year's ago Marian and I had two youngsters, aged five and one, an unquenchable thirst for show business, and debts a mile high. We had tested our mettle as singers in vaudeville with questionable success -sometimes making as much as \$50 one week and sometimes borrowing \$25 the next. In desperation I had tried such jobs as selling washing machines, vacuum cleaners, and insurance, and peddling Uncle Sam's mail.

It was then, in 1926, we found out about radio. I was visiting my brother in Chicago and together we were listening to a program over station WIBO. I was feeling low and vindictive. "Pshaw," I said. "Marian and I could do a better job than anyone on that program."

My brother, usually a mild individual who would listen to my problems with only a sympathetic com-ment, put his hand in his pocket and withdrew a greenback.

"Ten dollars says you can't," he said.

It was the first time he had shown lack of confidence in me. Maybe I had been doing too much talking and not enough trying. Why not approach a new field? Why not try radio?

That very night Marian and I drove to the radio station. The manager was there, harrassed and un-happy with a lack of talent. We sang a song for him, Marian accom-panying on the piano. We walked out of the station with a contract. The next day we were sponsored as the "O'Henry Twins."

Marian and I stayed in radio from then on, progressing slowly until 1931 when me met Don Quinn, the writer who has been with us ever since. Then we reached the goal of all radio performers—top of the Crossley rating.

And it took that and seventeen years to convince my brother!

His weekly schedule runs something like this: Monday he plays on the "Major Hoople" show as Tiffany Twiggs, the star boarder; Tuesday, on the Tiffany Twiggs, the star boarder; Tuesday, on the Burns and Allen program, he is the absent-minded Dr. Lewis and/or the Happy Postman; when Point Sublime airs on Wednesday, Mel does one of his favorite characterizations—that of August Moon; Thursday finds him portraying Botsford Twink and Juan on the Abbott and Costello broadcast; Friday, he is Uncle Petle and Rover (the dog) with Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou; and on Sunday he is Floyd, the barber, on the "Great Gildersleeve."

How that man Blanc gets around!

As a high school boy, Mel started in radio at KGW, Portland.

When he was 22, he became musical director of the Orpheum there.

In 1933 (of all times!) he launched his own radio program, writing it, producing it, and doing all the voices. It was a one-man show, with Mrs. Blanc assisting. This experiment really started Mel on his extensive research into voices and dialect.

When he came to Southern California in 1935, it was tough going for awhile.

Then Mel did a take-off on a news reel at KFWB, and soon landed a spot with Joe Penner. From then until now, it has been a steady climb to renown.

His interpretation of animal voices followed after he had established himself as an air dialectician and actor. His first animal part on the air was that of Benny's bear, Carmichael. One of his recent animal parts was that of the turkey on Burns and Allen.

Mel is always trying to figure out new voices and dialects, and finds himself talking to himself as he drives the car. Out of his mutterings a new character is usually born.

He is now so adept at doing his 57 varieties that his wife, and even his own mother sometimes can't believe that Mel has taken such-and-such part on a radio program. Mel is probably as much surprised at himself as they.

actually seeing the performance probably realize the work that goes into the stage version. But what you may not comprehend is the hours and hours of work it takes to bring you these programs via the airwaves.

Painstaking preparation to meet broadcasting requirements goes into making of a perfect performance. Circuit wires, amplifiers, and tubes are checked for proper action. The engineers' task, problem, and re-

sponsibility are to see that the list-eners get the truest tones possible. This is no small job, and in order to do so he must place his microphones very carefully. There can be no ordinary microphone as the average opera star standing close to it would "blast it out." Nine microphones are placed about the auditorium and stage, some hanging 35 feet above the orchestra to pick up the music, and microphones are hidden among the footlights to pick up the voices from the stage.

the job to bring to arm-chair listeners the beautiful arias.

During the broadcast, three engineers are stationed in the master control room, one in a studio, and two at the scene of the performance. In a soundproof booth in the rear of the Metropolitan sit three men . . . the engineer, the production director, and the announcer.

The task assigned to the production man is a very interesting one. He follows the score almost as closely as the director of the orchestra. He then signals the engineer as

to what is coming next, giving the cue for cutting in, or cutting out the various microphones in the opera house. He also checks with the stage manager on the timing of each act, and reports to the announcer in his broadcasting booth on one side of the Grand Tier.

Not only are the operas heard in this country, but also in South America. Another sound proof booth in the rear of the Met houses another announcer and engineer who handle the broadcast for approximately 4,000,000 of our southern friends.

Flannery at 5:30 p. m., Cecil Brown at 5:55, Frazier Hunt at 7:45; NBC-KFI airs Kaltenborn at 5 p. m.; Mutual is proud to present Fulton Lewis at 4 and 9:45 p. m., Gabriel Heatter at 6, and John B. Hughes at 7; Raymond Gram Swing airs over the Blue-KECA at 7; and Earl Godwin airs on the same hookup at 8.

Harry W. Flannery

He Was There

HEN you hear the voice of Harry W. Flannery, news commentator on CBS-KNX, describing a bomb attack somewhere

in Europe, don't be surprised at the ring of authority in his tone. For Flannery has been there when the bombs were going boom!

Flannery was Columbia Broadcasting System's Berlin correspondent when things were toughest in the Nazi capi-tal. Spled upon by the gestapo at all times, he still managed to supply America with verbal accounts of the history-making events during pre-Pearl Harbor days. Many were the bombs that fell on Berlin while Flannery was there-destructive eggs dropped by the RAF, and some of them missing Harry by mere yards. Yet he never stopped silently cheering on the British in their efforts.

Flannery is no booted, swag-gering war correspondent. He is a quiet person, husky withal, who believes that a thorough knowledge of the subject under consideration is of more value than all the bluffing ability in the world. Yet he knows how to bluff when a bluff is necessary to get a story through-as was shown in many experiences with the Nazi Foreign Office and its censorship bureau

In preparation for his daily airings, Flannery sometimes reads and makes notes for ten straight hours. He doesn't skip a paragraph in the huge tele-typed news report that rolls into the CBS newsroom in Hollywood every day. In addi-tion, he reads the local papers, the leading newspapers of New York, Chicago and London, the news magazines and all books on current events. His encyclo-pedia is as well worn as a bride's handbook on baking biscuits. He has one of the lar. gest biographical files in the country. In his spare time he listens to the broadcast analyses of other radio commentators.

His chief hobby is photography - sometimes an embarrassing one during his stay in Germany, but he did manage to bring back some highly in-German planes in Crete and demolished tanks in the Balkans.

PREPARED FOR RADIO LIFE'S CONSUMERS' CLUB BY CHEF MILANI

Happy New Year, friends! May this year bring to you the fruits of happiness, and to all of us the joys of victory and peace! This is our New Year's wish!

And now in the face of rationing and shortages, we're going to talk about food—the food of "ye g u d e olde days." But don't worry, "ye gude olde day" goes clear back almost 600 years so there won't be any tempting references to those times of the twentieth century when you could eat a stack of steak swimming in butter sauce—oops, we weren't going to talk about that.

Well, as we were saying, in the "gude olde days" in England (where New Year's was a necessary part of the year's holidays as far back as any landlord of a manor could remember) feasting was considered the best way to celebrate this day. So when it came around each year, ye olde landlord and his family and bosom buddies got together and drank wassail. In case any of you should wonder what that means (ever notice how it keeps turning up in greeting cards and carols) we can give you the explanation.

Wassail means "Wass hael." Get it? No? Well, maybe we should go into this a little deeper. That was just the way they said "Health to you" or "Here's mud in your eye" in those days. Everybody drank everybody else's wassail. That was the custom.

Incidentally, what they drank was a special ale or sherry that had been boiled "till a fine froth was obtained." Then twelve apples were tossed in, and if that wasn't enough, they also threw in an orange stuck with cloves.

Chef's Famous Dollar Dinner for 4 Chicken Noodle Soup Baked Mackerel-Lemon Sauce Baked Potatoes Shoestring Beet Salad Bread and Margarine Colfee Jello Recipe for Baked Mackerel with Lemon Sauce

After cleaning and washing four pounds of mackerel, place it in a shallow baking pan. Season with two teaspoons Seasonettes. Add four tablespoons oil and one fourth cup of water. Bake for 45 minutes at 300 degrees. When done, place in platter and serve with lemon sauce. You can tip them off to the ancient and honored c us to m of bringing along some food just to make sure of the welcome. That ought to have the makings of a swell pot-luck feast. What do you think?

And why not have a wassail bowl? You can serve hot punch, hot spiced cider, or mulled wine. That orange stuck with cloves will add to the delicious flavors of your wassail bowl. It's guaranteed by six centuries of tradition.
