May I put this correspondent straight? In his short-sighted analysis, he forgets the investment in radios, and repairs, also the fact that the listener is the consumer and the



No Stopping

JOE E. BROWN

EAVERNOUS-MOUTHED Joe E. Brown has been a collector ever since he was a kid. Twenty years ago, however, he started amassing what is today one of the most fascinating of souvenir aggregations.

Out in West Los Angeles where Brown's beautiful estate nestles on a tree-swept slope, the comedian has devoted all the wall space of his second story den to displaying his treasures. One entire wall is regimented with rows of framed-alike pictures of celebrities. A special niche

holds row upon row of baseballs; while the spacious west side of the room has recessed, glass-enclosed cabinets protecting more than 100 special items.

Here one may see the boxing trunks worn by Gene Tunney when he won the championship from Dempsey in Philadelphia on Sept. 23, 1926; a horse shoe made by Bob Fitzsimmons five days before he fought James Corbett at Carson City, Nevada, in 1897; the uniform worn by Dizzy Dean in the World Series, 1934; the uniform worn by Ty Cobb in his last game in 1925; autographed footballs from Rose Bowl games; the bat used by Babe Ruth in 1931, a record year

with 60 home runs; an autographed copy of Henry Ford's life story.

But in the past few years, Collector Brown has added new items to his display of treasures. These articles are especially significant because Brown gathered them during his recent and remarkable entertainment tour of the South Pacific. For the most part the things were given him by American soldiers. They were things the lads had been saving for a long while, but presented to the comic as tokens of appreciation for the enjoyment he had brought to the men.

Among the articles are a Japanese flag; a Government Issue Marine knife from New Caledonia with the terse note: "Got 2 Nips"; General Ed Sebree's helmet; a metal ring made from the only Zero shot down at Midway; an identification bracelet from a Zero shot down at Guadalcanal; a box of Japanese cigarettes; Jap money, taken from a dead soldier, and Japanese invasion money; a Japanese officer's sword; one of the shells from Capt. Wheel's plane; one of the first clips used in North Africa presented to Brown in New Guinea.

"Perhaps this list, although by no means comprehensive, suggests the sweep of Brown's trip. It covered 600,000 miles and absorbed three and a half months' time. During this time he played 277 shows to American fighting men throughout the entire South Pacific. How close was Brown to the Japs?

"So close that I took this money off a dead one," he stated.

Brown talked freely about his trip—as freely as censorship allows. But one did not dare broach the reason for it, nor did one need to ask, remembering the tragic death of Brown's eldest son, Capt. Don Brown, early this year. The famous laugh-master's entertainment tour for his country's fighting men was his own personal memorial to the fine son whose chance to fight had crashed with his plane.

A shame it is that jealous, small-spirited persons see in Brown's tour a publicity stunt. If his motives were such, Brown could have gained his end without risking his neck in skies clouded with combat planes, in jungles dense with mosquitoes, or standing a cloudburst to do his show.

"Five times," he recalled, "it rained cats and dogs but the show went on just the same." We pointed to a picture of him, in shorts, doing a routine on a platform made of boards atop oil drums.

"That was fancy," he grinned. "Sometimes there wasn't any stage. Just the ground."

Sometimes, too, the "stage" was the hushed aisle between hospital beds.

BILLIE BURKE *Sugar Coats a Pill*

Makes Rationing Easier to Swallow by Disguising It With Saccharine Nonsense

RATIONING may be a bitter pill for housewives to swallow, but not when Billie Burke disguises it. Remember when you were a child, how you used to down ill-tasting doses in a spoonful of apple sauce? In her program, "Fashions in Rations," Miss Burke prescribes potent sedatives and curatives for an ailing kitchen. Her apple sauce is marvelous!

At the start of her program one recent morning, Miss Burke came fluttering to the microphone.

"Good morning, Mr. Smith. Good morning everybody. Oh, I wonder if you'll excuse me a minute. I have to make a phone call."

"Why surely, Miss Burke. Go right ahead," urged Announcer Smith.

"Thank you so much," replied Miss Burke. "Hello, operator? I'd like the fire department, please. No, the fire department. Fire. Fire. That's right. It's a beautiful morning, isn't it? Oh, hello. This is Miss Billie Burke speaking. I've just started a new Victory Garden and I've put in some tomato plants—"

Voice: "Where's the fire, lady?"

Miss Burke: "Some of these plants are very expensive and—"

Voice: "Look here, lady, you want the seed store."

Miss Burke: "No, I don't. I was coming to that in a minute. My neighbor's house is on fire, and I don't want your firemen to run all over my Victory Garden."

Despite Miss Burke's screwy comments and fantastic maneuvers, these home economists succeed in nailing worthwhile pointers.

Agnes, White, one expert for the program's sponsor, Servel, always offers valuable tips.

"Over-cooking of foods destroys flavor and causes shrinkage," says Miss White.

"Why, of course!" exclaims Miss Burke. "Just the way sweaters shrink when you wash them in too hot water!"

"Preserve vitamins when you cook vegetables. Don't stir air into them

Haley Signed

Jack Haley, dark-haired, smooth-faced comedian, has been chosen as Joan Davis' running mate on what was formerly known as the "Rudy Vallee Show." Vallee gave up his weekly program as future Coast Guard assignments would make broadcasting impossible.

The show should be able to carry along smoothly. Joan will run the store, and presence of Haley will enable scripters to continue her in a man-hunting role.

Last October, Radio Life did a story on the Vallee show, pointing out that the program was assuming a much more complicated character. Instead of relying solely on the star, Vallee, the show was also being built around other characters like Joan Davis, Shirley Mitchell, and Verna Felton.

Said Radio Life at the time: "Some listeners have accepted the plot's thickening as a natural incident. Others have wondered whether there is some connection with the change and Rudy Vallee's enlistment in the Coast Guard. They ask the question: Although Vallee is donating his radio salary of approximately \$10,000 a month to Coast Guard relief, will the singing star be able to continue his radio program if war's exigencies intervene? If Vallee should suddenly be summoned elsewhere, and unable to continue his broadcasts, who would fill the breach? Some advance the idea that Miss Davis is sufficiently established as an air comedienne to carry the stellar spot herself. Others feel that a male lead is essential. . . . Regardless, everyone is more or less unanimous in thinking that it is clever, and smart showmanship to promote a thickening of the plot on Vallee's airer."

That it was smart is proven now when Vallee steps out and Miss Davis continues to carry on without a breach. That the diversification and enlargement of the cast was also **smart showmanship** is proved by the fact that the show rose from a Crossley of about 15 to among the 10 top shows after the change was made, and ended up when Vallee left in sixth place of all the half-hour programs.

Hope Abroad

As forecast several weeks ago in

Radio Life, Bob Hope has arrived in England to entertain overseas troops during a 10-week period. He is "vacationing" from his NBC show.

Accompanying the comic are his warbler, Frances Langford, and guitar-playing Tony Romano. Both traveled with Hope on his Alaskan entertainment trip last summer.

Frances appeared on Radio Life's cover a few months ago, when we nominated her "No. 1 Girl of World War II." Although many other young ladies are devoting time, money, and effort to entertaining the boys, we feel that in her particular field, la Langford stands alone. In flying to Alaska, where, as she expressed it to us, "the ceiling was often one inch," Frances displayed fine courage. Her present jaunt shows more of the same.

Hope is due to resume his Tuesday broadcasts on Sept. 21. Stan Kenton, now batoning at the Palladium, will be Hope's bandman in place of much-quipped-at Skinnay Ennis, now an Army bandleader at Santa Anita.

It's Preston Foster

In the emcee of Columbia's new "Silver Theater" probably you have recognized a familiar voice. But, just in case you didn't know, it's Preston Foster of the screen. The newly returned series had its initial airing on the Fourth of July, with film star Kay Francis playing the lead in an original play. Currently engaged in work on "Guadalcanal Diary," Foster will be permanent host and narrator on the "Silver Theater" dramas, a job formerly held by Conrad Nagel.

Were We Glad!

Just read about the elevator strike in the RCA Building in New York. Are we glad that broadcasting stations in Hollywood don't boast more than five floors!

Seems that the strike halted 280 elevators and stranded some 25,000 office workers and clients of the building. Among them was an advertising agency executive, Myron Kirk. Stuck on the 32nd floor, he calmly started descending the 32 flights.

Reaching the lobby, an exhausted and foot-sore Kirk forthwith bumped into the Blue's director of news and feature events, George Johnston. Sensing a hot news story, Johnston promptly invited Kirk to climb back

up to the eighth floor and guest on a special events program.

Between gasps, Kirk gave a step by step account of his "ups and downs." Signing off, he was resigned to staying in the building all night rather than walk down eight flights.

But by that time the strike had ended. In state Kirk rode down in an elevator.

Script Complications

CBS continuity acceptance department called Goodman Ace of "Easy Aces" one wilting morning recently, objecting to a line in a script he had submitted for that day's use. The line was to be spoken by Jane Ace. It was a remark that the temperature must be 91 degrees.

Such talk, the CBS censor explained, would be giving information to the enemy. Ace explained that he had written the script several days before. What the weather would be on the broadcast date, he couldn't even guess. There was much jiving before Ace and the censor reached a compromise agreement. They changed the figure from 91 to 92.

Ace also was asked to delete another line. It had to do with a remark by Jane Ace, "I'm not deaf and dumb!" The censor contended that deaf-mutes might resent it. "But how could a deaf and dumb person object to something he couldn't hear?" expostulated Ace. The censor's reply, if any, is not known.

Heading West

Good news for listeners who like the Camel show starring Jimmy Durante and Gary Moore, Radio Life hears that they are coming to Hollywood the middle of August and will broadcast from Radio City here. It will be our first look-see at the new radio combination, who make merry over the ether every Thursday night at 7.

At New Location

Atmospheric conditions permitting, Raymond Clapper (KHJ-Mutual Don Lee, Mondays and Thursdays, 7:00 p.m.) will be heard from a new overseas location on Monday, July 12, when the broadcast will be heard from Algiers, North Africa. Clapper left London after his July 1 broadcast to go to another theater of war.

According to the latest word from Clapper, he expects to return to the United States about the end of July. The several surprise guest-speakers who have broadcast with him from London include the General who led the big American bombing raid on Kiel. As it meant broadcasting to the United States at 4:00 a.m. London time, this was quite a concession on the part of the General.

Whenever Clapper is scheduled to speak from abroad, Paul Sullivan stands by in the Mutual-Don Lee news room, ready to substitute in case the pick-up from overseas is unsatisfactory.

In releasing programs for the people we hope to maintain the gracious title given to us some time ago—"America's Most Individual Radio Station."

Freddy Martin of the BLUE Network's "Melodies for Uncle Sam" program has been cited for the outstanding work both he and the BLUE have done in boosting the sale of United States war bonds and stamps. He's a Minute Man. This honor was conferred upon the popular orchestra leader on the night of the Fourth of July, when he was presented with the official pin of the United States Treasury Department. Few citizens are thus honored.

Occasion was the first anniversary broadcast of the program. In the year "Melodies for Uncle Sam" has been on the air, its sales of war bonds and stamps have totaled a quarter of a million dollars.

Radio Life salutes Freddy Martin and his consistently entertaining Sunday night program. He had a hard time getting his idea on the air, but it has certainly clicked. We think he's one of the few who can carry a program like this.

Winchell has been heard in the east over the Blue Network and in the west over the NBC-Red... a sort of purple network arrangement.

That's all over now. Along with KECA, some 150 other Blue stations will carry the Broadway chatterer's Sunday night Journal.

Jimmy Fidler has been broadcasting over KECA on Sundays at 8:15 p. m. Now, under the schedule rearrangement which gives you a bigger and better Sunday night lineup of top-flight shows, Fidler moves to 6:45 p. m.

Between Winchell and Fidler comes one of radio's unique shows, the allegedly renowned Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street.

For several months it was also a "purple" feature.

Now, all Blue again, it adds the spice of the roguish rhythm to KECA's Sunday evening entertainment menu, at 6:15 p. m., with a half-hour to clown around in.

Last week we slipped you the tip that a new musical show was going to replace Earl Godwin. We take it all back. Now comes word that Watch the World Go By will keep the 8:00 p. m. spot across the board on KECA, but the program lineup is still undetermined.

All of these changes mean that Sunday on KECA is bigger and better than ever. Besides the shows we've mentioned, there are such big programs as Sammy Kaye's Sunday Serenade, Drew Pearson, John J. Anthony's Good Will Hour, Quiz Kids, and Inner Sanctum Mysteries. What's all this talk about record companies "bootlegging?"

Rumors are current some of the leading companies are recording new tunes, in spite of the Petrillo ban, and putting them out under the pretext of having recorded them last July.

Every one knows that the Petrillo ban on musicians recording went into effect last August. That's been almost a year. And yet, some observers point out, record companies are still dealing out new releases.

* * *

To edify our readers, DIGGIN' DISCS conducted a private investigation. We learned that some of the smaller companies actually ARE recording illegally. At any rate, it's considered illegal by the musicians' federation.

Their version of it is that they are hiring non-union musicians for recording, and that everything is very much above board. These smaller companies are putting out the latest tunes, and are CLEANING UP. But one of these days, Mr. Petrillo will catch up with them.

AND WHEN HE DOES! Jim Petrillo never forgets.

* * *

So far as we were able to find out all of the major companies—that is Victor, Bluebird, Columbia, Okeh, Decca, Capitol—are playing ball with the musicians' union. They are doing this NOT of their own choice, but they have no alternative.

MR. PETRILLO CAN GET VERY NASTY. Bandleaders and musicians who record against his orders are subject to stiff fines, also.

Representatives of the majors told us that ABSOLUTELY they have done no recording since the ban went into effect—that is, no recording requiring musicians.

A number of late discs have come out with vocalists and vocal groups—without even a piano for accompaniment.

Some of these have been "JOHNNY ZERO" and "COMING IN ON A WING AND A PRAYER," recorded by the Song Spinners for Decca; "COMING IN ON A WING AND A PRAYER" by the Golden Gate Quartet for Okeh; "YOU'LL NEVER KNOW" and "CLOSE TO ME" by Frank Sinatra for Columbia.

Dick Haymes has made a series for Decca and the Four Vagabonds and Ethel Merman for Victor.

* * *

If you choose to be loyal to your "name" favorites, just sit tight until the big companies and Mr. Petrillo thresh out their differences. Personally, we think the smaller outfits who are recording "illegally" will be run into the dust.

school "to keep him out of mischief."

The young student, so full of pep and curiosity about the way other people spoke and sang, didn't do so well at dancing, but he became very adept at singing all the songs the dancing school played for the prouetting youngsters in the class. After he had put on a few "parlor demonstrations" for the Hookey family and friends, his mother took him to a New York amateur radio program and he won hands down—his first audition at the age of two.

Since then, under the guidance of the Clements Company, which specializes in child talent, he has been a "steady" on children's programs, has guested with big names in radio, and has continued his accumulation of melodies and lyrics. He now has a repertoire of 150 songs.

His first radio presentation was, naturally enough, a favorite song of his native city—"East Side, West Side," and when he first sang it, three years ago, he showed a proclivity for dead panning and rocking back and forth. There was a tendency then for his coaches to change this style of delivery, thinking it would be better if he had a more conventional approach to his audiences. However, his first studio audience was so overcome by Bobby's ability to match the rhythm of the music with his shoulders, his hands and feet, and at the same time wear a completely disinterested mein, that attempts to change him were dropped, and the "style" became his "Rocking Horse Rhythm" presentation.

Off the air Bobby is not much different from any other five-year-old. He likes pets, especially a turtle which he adores, gets himself dirty in just about the same brief span of time another youngster would, and protests just as loudly when his mother attempts to renovate him. He certainly isn't spoiled, as the Mutual studio staff will testify, for he makes no fuss about rehearsing his lines over and over, and obeys the silence signs like a trouper.

He does have one habit that has to be guarded against. He entertains a special "girl friend" each week end, and he so enjoys playing host to these other tiny tots that he wants to lavish them with as many gifts as possible.

Sometimes he doesn't check the ownership of the gifts, and has been stopped in the process of donating a Mutual microphone to "Termite" Daniels, one of his guests, and on another occasion told one little girl she could have an ottoman on which was embroidered a stately Indian with arm upraised.

To those in the studio as well as to those listening by loudspeaker, there's a high spot in his program when young Master Hookey gets his cue for the commercial. With his dead

BUILD UP to Belly Laughs

*How Big-Time Comedy Shows
Use Various Techniques to
Warm Up the Studio Audience*

IN three minutes and a-half NBC's "Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou" will go on the air from an auditorium studio where a capacity audience sits waiting. Ken Christy, the "Mr. Hutch" of the show, lopes across the stage with a stepladder, gazing upward in a worried way. He blunders into Riggs at center stage, falls sprawling. "Who are you and what are you doing?" demands Riggs as Christy picks himself and the ladder up. "Oh," replies Christy, "I'm an OPA man, looking for a ceiling." It's just another warm-up gag.

Several minutes of such nonsense

precede each of radio's "big name" shows and nearly all the audience-presented programs of lesser scintillation. In radio vernacular, that period is the "audience warm-up." It's almost as important an ingredient of an air show's success as is the program itself. Some part of the 20-minute interval between opening of the studio playhouse doors and the moment when the broadcast begins is utilized to put the audience into a responsive frame of mind. How this is accomplished differs in each show.

The Tommy Riggs show uses a typical Olson and Johnson technique. Gags, wisecracks, and a succession of wild happenings follow one another

in rapid-fire order, keeping the audience in a constant state of mirth and expectancy.

An off-stage voice yells, "Wire for Mr. Riggs! Wire for Mr. Riggs!" Then the voice materializes into a messenger who hurries over to Riggs, at the "mike"—and hands him a piece of wire.

Wally Maher comes in, reading from a script that reeks of the familiar "horse opera" style, startles the audience with a series of revolver shots. Accosted by Riggs, he looks up from the script and out over the footlights, amazed, then exclaims, "Oh, wrong audience! I thought this was the Red Ryder show."

Before his program, Jack Benny is introduced by emcee Don Wilson,—introduced, introduced, and introduced. The big build-up runs something like this: "Introducing the star of our show to you, is something like hauling coals to Newcastle. I wish that there was more time allotted to me. Unfortunately, we have only three minutes to go and I have a prepared introduction for our star that takes an hour and a half, so that I'll have to forego much of the pertinent detail about him. However, there are a few things that time will permit us to say,—principally that in real life, our star is quite the contrary of the character he portrays on the air. You, the radio audience, know him as a tight, stingy, penny-pinching person, but in real life he is most generous. Not only in a financial way is Jack Benny very thoughtful of the cast, but he is constantly

HE'S HAD three years of radio experience — and the draft board can't touch him.

He's a radio star — and still he can't read.

He's Bobby Hookey — five years old, with a press agent and a network radio commercial all his own.

And he's a real "Whiz Kid," the pride and joy of the Mutual Don Lee network and the I. W. Clements Company, who jointly took him off amateur shows, children's hours and guest performances, to give him a regular quarter-hour network program, with "The Pharmaco Company" as his sponsor.

Bobby is such an ardent gum chewer that his mother, who is also his coach, plays safe every Sunday night by making him "spit it out and open wide" before she turns him loose into the studio that releases his "Rocking Horse Rhythm" to a nation of radio listeners.

Already, Bobby is pointing to his mother as the source of his success, tuned to an income of \$200 per week, and his fame, nation-wide, with stories in nationally distributed magazines and newspapers.

For it was his mother, who teaches him his songs and patter for each Sunday night program on Mutual Don Lee, who discovered that the youngster was a talented mimic who could remember song lyrics long before he could carry on a conversation.

Mrs. Hookey, not at all musical herself, and her husband, a mechanic in the Bronx, gave Bobby his start when they entered him in a dancing



TAKE *Good Care* OF YOURSELF

Saturday, 12:45 p.m.

SEVERAL months ago, a Long Beach couple's nine-weeks-old baby became ill. The parents, for hours, tried in vain to find a physician. In the middle of the night, the baby's condition became worse. The alarmed parents, in desperation, bundled the baby up and started to drive to the Hollywood Hospital, where the infant had been born. En route, the child died of strangulation. It was a needless death, preventable with that proper treatment. The newspapers, without exception, blamed the

death on the shortage of doctors caused by the war.

To thoughtful readers, this tragic item of news brought some realization of a gravely important fact: that the civilian population must, to a large degree, rely upon its own knowledge and training in combating illness and disease throughout the war. To meet this vital need, radio has stepped into the breach with a new kind of program. NBC, realizing the situation's seriousness, weekly brings its listeners in 11 Western states "The Visiting Nurse of the Air," broadcast from KFI at 12:45 o'clock each Saturday afternoon.

By means of this weekly series of

home nursing hints, NBC endeavors to teach the public how to safeguard its own health and care for the sick in the home. The pleasant voice of Grace L. Smith, registered nurse, brings this information to the program's radio audience in 15-minute chats.

Is Johnny breaking out in red spots that might mean measles? Is spinal meningitis reported in your town? Miss Smith can tell you what the symptoms are and tell you what to do until the doctor comes. She can, in short, teach you the fundamentals of disease prevention, symptoms of the more common ailments of both children and grown-ups, and the most dangerous contagious diseases, home treatment and remedies, diet for illness and the convalescent period. If you will write to her, asking for advice on problems which do not call for emergency measures, she will answer you on the air. A chart mailed to you on request will help you better to understand and follow her home nursing chats.

The program, one of 25 on NBC's list of public service features, is presented in co-operation with the United States Health Department to supplement the government's program of public health instruction. It is now in its seventh month on the air. The first 13 talks were devoted to instruction for emergencies. There followed informally-presented lessons on bedside nursing technique, then on isolation and quarantine technique, next on communicable diseases. Currently, the subject is intestinal infections—especially important in summer-time, when the eating of more fresh fruits and vegetables increases the need for this sort of knowledge.

It might be interesting to speculate on what kind of a person the network might choose for this highly-specialized new kind of a radio job.

The ideal selection would be someone who combines a pleasing personality with thorough training and experience in nursing and nursing instruction. An individual with a calm and low-pitched voice. Healthy, wholesome, vital, and blessed with that great abundance and steady flow of energy which belongs only to those who find much that is worth-while in life. Possessed of that indefinable something which comforts and reassures both the sick and the well. Last, but most important of all, having the strong liking for people which

IT'S a backyard fence on a party line!

That's the closest one may come to describing "What's Doin', Ladies?", the inquisitive, nose-y, yet laugh-laden question - and - answer program presided over by Art Linkletter at 2 p. m. every weekday over the Blue network.

Every day Art Linkletter (more about him in just a moment) runs back and forth among the audience—asking questions, peering into purses, giving away money and prizes until you wonder when he has time to draw a breath—and the women gobble it up!

The plan of the program is simple. Each day a feminine crowd gathers in Hale Bros. Department Store (one of San Francisco's largest) to answer Art's question, "What's Doin', Ladies?" They tell him they have just come down town to buy something—and from there on it's easy.

To add to the fun there are several running gags, among them "Barter Day," "Can You Take It?" "Observation Day," the "World's Smallest Victory Garden," and the daily auction.

Barter Day is one of the most popular. It is held on Tuesdays and Fridays. Here women bring their white elephants, Linkletter describes them; and if a trade can be arranged it is consummated after the program goes off the air. One of the first and most successful barterers involved a woman who had an old muskrat coat and a daughter who wanted to take music lessons, but had no piano. Another woman, hearing the offer of the coat, came down the next week with news that she had a piano and a daughter who wanted a fur coat. That deal made history with listeners. Now everything in the world is swapped.

That is, everything in the world is traded except coffee, sugar, shoes, and other rationed products. Shortly after Barter Day began doing a land office business in sugar and coffee, the local OPA office called up and pointed out that Linkletter was conducting a black market! The violation was a technical one, but he doesn't do it any more.

"Can You Take It" a Wednesday feature, now seems to be the most popular among the studio audience. During it Dorothy Farrier, head of a school of beauty and modeling, analyzes the appearance, makeup, and dress of a woman selected from the audience. Linkletter stands by tossing in helpful remarks, and the audience eagerly soaks up the free beauty tips. As a reward for standing up before the barrage of advice and suggestions the volunteer then receives a free course at the Farrier school in whatever she needs most—hair styling, make-up, or weight reduction.

Among the recent promises Miss Farrier has made was to take off 30 pounds in three months from a rather buxom woman, adding five inches (by illusion) to a short woman, clearing up the complexion of another. As

soon as the volunteer is fixed up she is brought back to the program to demonstrate the transformation—and many women attend the following Wednesday just to see the change Miss Farrier has wrought.

One of the most appealing stories concerns one rather heavy lady who, when told that Miss Farrier would take 25 pounds from her, protested that her husband liked her that way. "In fact, he often told her that he liked her better now than when she was slimmer." Miss Farrier convinced her however, and three weeks later the husband called Miss Farrier to thank her for the wonderful improvement she had made in his wife's appearance.

"Observation Day" is Thursday's feature, and panics the house. In a casual matter Linkletter invites a member of the audience to come forward, and, after talking to her for exactly five seconds, hides her in the control booth. Then he asks another woman in the audience to describe the first one—her age, height, weight, and what she had on, whether she is married and what her husband must be like, and disposition. Then the first woman comes out and answers the same questions. The situations that arise are both embarrassing and funny. In return the women get prizes for being good sports.

Several daily features on the program give women a chance to walk off with money or worthwhile presents. Art usually starts off by having one of the women select a pack-

age from a trayful of gifts. The present is hers if she can correctly answer the question attached to it—and, confidentially, the answers are usually pretty easy!

Every day Linkletter goes through his audience peering into purses. It's not as bad as it sounds—because what he does is to give away \$3 if the woman he selects has a certain article in her purse. Every time he asks for something different—such as a photograph, an unused postage stamp, a blank check, or a sample of material—and each woman gets only one chance to produce what-

ever it is.

doing innumerable little things to make our association the very pleasant one that it is. He usually bends over backward in his thoughtfulness for us. He is very tolerant, very thoughtful, very considerate, under any and all circumstances."

While this spiel is going on, Benny clowns, mutters, "Well, hurry up!" "We haven't much time!" pretends increasing embarrassment. Finally he breaks in with, "Folks,—Jack Benny."

When Wilson introduces the star's sour-cracking helpmate, Mary Livingston, Benny, over to one side of the stage, beams, "My wife! So lay off, fellows!"

There follows the routine of Benny picking up one of the musician's violins and sawing off a few bars of "Love in Bloom"; the closed eyes, the soulful expression of the "great artiste," the interpretation, as "corny" as he can make it. Business of several planted cohorts throwing pennies at Benny is always a click.

In the Burns and Allen show, gravel-voiced George Burns puts over the warm-up plea. He goes through the usual procedure of assuring the audience that it is under no obligation whatever to applaud. "But"—with a very confidential note in his voice—"of course we won't mind at all if you applaud when you do like the show and when you do, don't clap slow, this way (demonstrates faint up and down patting together of hands). Clap this way—fast. Then if there are 800 people in the audience, it'll sound like 3200. And if there are 3200, it'll sound like 12,800.

"Aside from that, clap or don't, just as you please. But of course, you know how actors are. The more applause they get, the better work they do, and the better work they do, the more the sponsors pay them. And the more the sponsors pay them, the more money the government gets. And the more money the government gets, the more planes and ammunition it can buy, and you want to win the war, don't you?"

Comedian Budd Hulick on NBC's "What's My Name" uses this gag to warm up the studio audience: Announcer Ken Roberts walks across the stage, interrupts Budd to mumble something to him and Budd answers, "10:30." Then Budd tells the audience: "The Bulova people just called—they wanted to know what time it is!"

A bit of clowning by Billy Mills enlivens the "warm-up" for the "Fibber McGee and Molly" program each Tuesday. Mills chases (Wimple) Thompson around the stage, yelling "Mr. Sanborn! Hey, Mr. Sanborn!" When Fibber asks for an explanation, Billy halts and replies, "Why, I'm Chasin' Sanborn."

Hal Peary, who has the title role in NBC's "The Great Gildersleeve," aired from KFI at 8 p.m. each Sunday, introduces all the supporting members of the cast with some kind of a wisecrack by—and from—each.

For several weeks' Peary had been getting laughs from the audience in his introduction of petite redhaired Lurene Tuttle (his niece, Marjorie, in the show) by allusions to her "son who works at Lockheed." One night Lurene surprised him with the announcement that her son was backstage.

"Yes, this is my baby!" she answered Gildy's amazed look gaily and proudly. And fetched in Sonny Boy, 300-pound bass viol player kidnapped from the orchestra.

When Peary introduces Lillian Randolph, the colored maid of the show, asking her what she wants to do to help win the war, her prompt reply is "I wanna cook for those Japs—just for **one day!**"

Eddie Cantor, guesting June 20 on Joe E. Brown's "Stop and Go," heard from NBC-KFI at 9:30 p.m. Sundays, did a lot of pre-broadcast clowning. When Announcer Herb Allen talking to the audience, dropped a scrap of paper out of his coat pocket, Cantor hurried over to pick it up. Without turning to see who the "picker-upper" was, Allen took it and mumbled, "Thanks, boy."

finds in gratitude alone adequate reward for a lifetime of service to the ailing.

In Grace Smith, NBC found all these attributes. She has been a practicing nurse ever since her graduation in 1919 from St. Luke's Hospital, St. Louis, Missouri—never wanted to be anything else.

"I've always had a great curiosity about people, even as a little girl," says the "Visiting Nurse," of herself.

What others are most likely to say of her is, "kind of a person who makes you feel better just by being around." She's a "hail-fellow-well-met" sort, with a great sense of humor and a ready laugh, above average height, hazel eyes, clear-cut features, thick dark-brown hair, the erect posture she tries to teach her listeners to cultivate. She avoids the "two-bit" words of the medical dictionaries in preference for the more simple language understandable to the laity; has the outspoken way of talk characteristic of her profession and likes to say just what she means.

Travel, to such a person, gives more than mere pleasure, and she had many thousands of miles of it. To Germany as a new nursing graduate in 1919, to aid in the post-war reconstruction work. Later to the Orient as an instructor for native nurses. To Germany again, in the early 1930's, to study public health, at the famed University of Leipzig. To Spain, to bake out a lingering cold. To the Balearic islands off Spain's coast to write a health column for the Palma Post. Home again when the Spanish civil war broke out and the French government asked all Americans to leave.

Busy and active though her life has been, Miss Smith has found time

to write two books, "Home Nursing Hints" and "Your Job as a Mother," besides nursing columns for numerous American and foreign newspapers. The first-mentioned book was taken by Russia for translation about five years ago.

In the busy brain beneath Miss Smith's white nurse's cap are memories of many memorable scenes in the far-away corners of the globe to which she has carried a message of mercy.

She recalls Berlin on the night when the original manuscripts of non-Aryan authors and musicians were burned. The Orient, when the Chinese women's feet were first beginning to come out of their cruel bindings. Barcelona, at the time of the United States' bank moratorium—with just \$80 of acceptable cash in her possession. In the French-owned Balearic Islands when Spain's civil war broke out and all Americans had to leave. (The writing job in Palma solved the moratorium money problem in that emergency.)

Thanks partly to the many gifts of gratitude from foreign friends won through her work, Miss Smith's living room has no hint of the hospital atmosphere. Both the Chinese and Japanese governments bestowed high honors upon her on completion of her work. A Buddha (of wisdom), a gold leaf ginger jar, a pair of porcelain Hoho birds, a Pekin rug in cobalt blue are only a few of China's symbolic gifts, given only to persons held in the highest regard. Ironically enough, the Japanese gift was a harikari knife.

PUTTING IT UP— To You:

It's up to you this year to "put up" as many fresh fruits and vegetables as possible. That, Madame Housewife, is a request from Uncle Sam. So back we go to the good old days when grandma did her own canning. Get those pantry shelves stocked with fruits and vegetables you've put up yourself.

And we'll roll up our sleeves and "dig in," too!

Here's our contribution to your efforts:

1. In case Grandma didn't tell you, fruits are by nature acidic and consequently, are easy to can at home, but vegetables,

at least most of them, are non-acidic foods and require special care and sterilization. We suggest you use a pressure cooker for them. The high temperature will guard you against dangerous spoilage later on. Then, as an added precaution, when jars of non-acid vegetables are opened, boil them from 5 to 10 minutes before serving, or tasting for that matter.

2. Unless you have special equipment, you will probably be using an ordinary, large kettle for your fruit canning. In that case, you will need a rack on the bottom so that the water can get under the jars. You can make it yourself of narrow lathes. And, oh yes, be sure the kettle you choose is a good two or three inches deeper than the jars. For proper canning it is necessary to

have a minimum of an inch of water both below and above the jars.

3. You can supplement your sugar by using corn syrup in place of some of the sugar, or use no sugar at all and sweeten the fruit to taste when served. The middle course is to add just enough sugar to sweeten the fruit, and then can it in its own juices with a little water added.

Go ahead, Madame Housewife. From here on in, it's up to you!
