RITHEE, fellow aesthetes, hast noticed a subtle new delicacy of tone in our fair Southland's culture these last few weeks? Should it, ere next December, soar to heights heretofore unattained, one might easily see as the cause the erudite presence of the Blue Network's "Archie." However, if, in-

erudite presence of the Blue Network's "Archie." However, if, instead, it should reel, collapse and flicker out completely, we'd be there before rigor mortis set in, to stand over the corpse and chant, "We told you so!"

"Archie" hadn't been here long enough to lose a lingering aroma of the corned beef and cabbage he serves in "Duffy's Tavern" before we appointed ourselves a sort of secondstring reception committee. So we speak with some authority.

Ed Gardner in real life, "Archie," was in process of toasting himself when he fell victim to Radio Life. It was one of those hot days when visions of ice cream sodas, Arctic wastes and sea-blue swimming pools kept projecting themselves into our mind. That appointment with Gardner turned the swimming pool into real stuff. He confesses a liking for lolling in the sun and that's what he was working at on the plot of grass in front of his cabana. It's virtually on the rim of the Hollywood Garden of Allah Hotel's swank swimming pool.

Stretched out in a beach chair, while his friendly, blonde wife frisked about, "Archie," in swimming trunks, looked cooler than anybody has any right to in such weather. So we immediately opened fire,

Gardner was reluctant to pin the orchids on any one of his program guests, to the exclusion of the others. "They were all wonderful," he opined, sidestepping. "For some strange reason, they all come on the show to get insulted and yet they wind up as our friends.

"It's too bad they behaved themselves so well. I wish I'd had more trouble with guests on the show. It's so much easier to rap somebody than to do a Pollyanna."

"We've certainly had a wide variety of them."

He mentioned Martinelli, Jane Cowl, Tallulah Bankhead, Clifton Fadiman, Oscar Levant, Ray Milland, Mary Martin, Akim Tamiroff, Kate Smith, Deems Taylor, Ilka Chase, Milton Berle.

"When Berle was booked, I thought 'Here comes Berle! Here comes trouble!" He usually hogs the laughs. But I was wrong. He went out of his way to point up **our** best lines.

"The night Herbert Marshall was on, we were doing a Greek Relief benefit show afterward at Madison Square Garden. I started out in show business as a writer and director, not as an actor, you know. When I

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got into this 'Archie' part accidentally, it took me a while to get used to it. At first, the sight of an audience terrified me, and when I get out on a stage without a mike in front of me, I get positively sick.

"At that Greek Relief benefit, I stood up there ten or twenty minutes without getting a single laugh. Marshall didn't get any, either. He was reading a serious telegram and 'Archie' was telling jokes. But we both got the same number of chuckles—none. So we went out afterward and had ourselves a hilarious celebration."

"And what kind of a pal did Marshall turn out to be? Witty?" asked Radio Life.

"A very fine partner," grinned "Archie." "But I don't know about his wit. Mine got so good I didn't give him a chance to let me find out."

We darkly suspected "Archie" of seizing an opportunity to spread the butter a bit thicker on his bread, but after much wrinkling of the brow, he finally presented the poisies for the best guest performance to the sponsor of "Duffy's Tavern."

Names the Best

"Lee Bristol, the sponsor, put a lot of professionals to shame as a guest," he confided. "He came on the last show this year and gave such a good performance everybody thought he was an actor. The fact is, I have two reasons to be in Hollywood. One is to make the movie version of 'Duffy's Tavern.' The other is to agent Bristol for pictures. All I have to do after I land him a contract is to sell him on signing! It shouldn't take more than five or ten years."

"Don't be surprised if you walk down Hollywood boulevard some night and see some theater marquee all ablaze with 'The Minute Rubs of 1944' or 'Sal Hepatica Nights,' starring Lee Bristol.

As our 'average listener,' we used 'Finnegan, the jerk.' We auditioned the show for him. According to that 'scientific test,' the trombone player was the most popular guy in the whole show! To make the 'audition' smell just as bad as possible, we wrote in a lot of bum jokes. It turned out that those were the cracks that got the biggest laughs!"

Young instrumentalists and composers who have not yet been recognized will be presented on the air and given a chance at a debut with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra in a contest in Los Angeles next winter, with the Southern California Symphony Association and radio stations KTI-KECA and the Los Angeles Daily News as joint sponsors.

Contestants may live anywhere. They must be of American birth. Instrumentalists must be not more than twenty-one years of age, composers, not over thirty. Only those who have not performed with or had their compositions played by a major symphony orchestra will be eligible.

Prizes totaling \$500 in War Bonds will be awarded. For the winning instrumentalist, there will also be a solo appearance with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra; for the winning original score, a performance by

Post-War Radio

What General Electric engineers think the war will do to radio was the news received last week by Radio Life. You've been wondering what will happen to your set after the war. Here's what they say. War will hasten developments and work improvements in broadcast transmitters, but G. E. sees no radical changes that will prematurely obsolete present equipment.

What is expected is that many of the low-powered AM stations will be replaced by FM stations. This will mean higher power and clearer channels for the remaining AM stations. Along with FM broadcasting, television is expected to advance. Manufacturing experience gained in the production of electronic equipment for war will undoubtedly result in lower priced television receivers after the war, and this, plus public demand, should accelerate the expansion of television service.

Said General Electric: "After the war, we expect to continue building all types of transmitters, FM, AM, television—together with auxiliary equipment."

Lux producer, Cecil B. DeMille, plans to be back on the air September 13 with a special adaptation of "Random Harvest," co-starring Greer Garson and Ronald Colman. Meanwhile, he's busy producing and directing the film, "The Story of Dr. Wassell."

She will not be cut in from Hollywood, principally because Miss Smith requires a special type instrument and also uses five Cuban rhythmists as background for her distinctive music. They remained in New York.

That date marked the addition of Alec Templeton, blind pianist, composer and improviser, to the already impressive aggregation of talent on Morton Gould's CBS "Carnival of Music.'

Templeton will continue the unusual offerings which have had much to do with building up his great popularity. He delights in bizarre travesties on the works of the great mas-ters,—such compositions and transcriptions as "Haydn Goes a Ridin," "Eugene's On Again" and "Mrs. Bach Goes to Town." His titles are fun, ch what?

captures the listener's interest, and fits into the beat of the thing. But the results achieved are too distinctly Johnny Richards for his music to be termed mere adaptations or even superb arrangements.

As often as not, his composition is entirely original: he's been com-pelled to "write something ice cold about a refrigerator." But it might be something red hot about a street car motor, or something spine-tingling about a police-car siren. An ear that hears, a mind that is sensitive to the ear's impressions, an everon-the-alert imagination, and a talent for composing . . . these are some of the ingredients that are blended into a Richards number. Plus one all-important addition ... a sense of humor.

This young composer holds that there is no excuse for uninteresting music: if it lasts for only a few seconds it should never be dull. The listener who is tired of musical sound effects that mean nothing will sigh with relief to learn this, and do well to tune in Richards' music. Sweet or swing, serious or gadget, it all has interest.

Present.

Do you remember Uncle Wiggly Longears, of your nursery days? And how every one of his adventures ended with something like this: "and if the kettle doesn't wind the dish mop around the sugar bowl's ears, and make the cream pitcher spill milk-tears on the breakfast food, I'll tell you tomorrow of . . .

sponsibility for maintaining that aura of culture. At the time of our interview, Gardner had been unable to find a successor to Shirley Booth, his ex-wife, for the role of 'Duffy's' daughter."

The actor (producer, director, writer; ex.stenogrepher, train dispatcher and salesman) was pessimistic about the possibility of finding a worthy successor anywhere.

"That part was written around Shirley originally," he reminded us. "I've auditioned about 100 girls in New York and here. If, by the grace of good luck, the right one comes along, fine. But we don't want to sell the part short. We'll probably have to develop a new girl character and write 'Miss Duffy' out of the script."

It seems "Miss Duffy's" Brooklynese is the hurdle the applicants can't surmount.

"When Little Nell lisps, 'Everybody says I sound exactly like Shirley Booth'," I say, "Then let them all chip in and pay your salary, because I'm the guy that doesn't think so." That Brooklyn dialect is murder." (His pronunciation didn't quite make it "moider.") "A Southern drawl or almost any other dialect can be faked. But that Brooklyn twist just about has to be real. If girls who want to play 'Miss Duffy' say they graduated from the Sorbonne or Radcliffe, I ask them where they went to grade school, That's what counts in the way they do the lingo."

"Is that where you got it down so pat?" we giggled.

"That's right," said "Archie." "I went to Public School No. 4 in Astoria, Long Island, where I was born. They talk the same language there as they do in Brooklyn—and the same goats walk in the alleys."

Was Smart

Gardner recalls that he skipped several grades at that school and was the youngest lad in his graduation class. His report cards gave him "A" for effort and studies but "C" in conduct. That he was an only child may have been partly the reason. He was especially bright in music and gave a concert on the piano, sponsored by his music school, when he was only seven years old.

Possibly Archie's oft-admitted interest in the arts stems from that early training and his lifelong, but entirely untaught, dabbling in art. The mention of music brought us to the realization that we had not asked "Archie" a single question relating to the finer things of life.

"We can't let this opportunity pass without asking you something about your preferences in the field of art, Mr. Gardner," we said. "Who, by the way, is your favorite conductor of symphonic music? Tchaikowsky? Damaroff? Janssen?"

"There was a conductor on the old Steinway line out in Astoria I liked better than any of 'em—Harry Theis. I'm not quite sure whether he was symphonic or Presbyterian."

We endeavored further to draw him out on the subject of culture. He spoke readily and fluently on the subject.

"I imagine if I knew what it was, I'd probably think it was a very fine thing if I didn't overdo it. I always wondered where it began and ended.

"It's just about the same with culture as it is with a guy who's drinking whiskey. If you put it up to the normal guy, he doesn't know where either one of them starts or stops. If he's been drinking and you ask him whether he's drunk or sober, he always says, 'I'm sober.' If you talk to people about culture, they always say 'I'm cultured'—or try to give you that impression—if they don't know where it starts. Me, I think it's more fun to write a book than to read it."

Gardner had just finished writing "Duffy's First Reader," which is coming out in the fall.

Had he any plans for the general uplift of culture in Southern California during his stay?

"If there's anything I can do to tear it down, I'll be very happy to," said he, and settled his six-feet, one and a half inches more comfortably in the beach chair.

original scripts before they are mimeographed, make notes of any revisions, consult with producers before and during rehearsal. After script corrections are made and scripts are re-mimeographed Continuity combs them again before placing the Master Copy stamp on one of the copies. This copy belongs to the network producer and bears the legend: "This copy represents as accurately as possible the program."

Further and audible checking on scripts is done in the Continuity office, which is equipped with a receiving set to bring in the dress rehearsal.

In addition to all the other items to be cared for, there's the matter of clearance when names of real persons are used on the air. That's one reason performers employ the names of friends, who won't mind if their John Henrys are broadcast. A star might grab a name from a hat—Reuben Ranshackle, for example, and pin a gag on him. But sure as he does, up will pop a real Reuben Ranshackle from Punk Falls with a damage suit all ready to go.

Hence, all the names used on shows are subjected to clearance, and if the person mentioned is a star, release is obtained from his or her studio, sponsor, or agent.

A while ago, Charlie McCarthy's agency became alarmed at the number of laughs other comedians were amassing by using the dummy's name. It requested Continuity Acceptance to delete outside references to Charlie. Soon after, it asked that names of none of its stars be used on other shows. Among those affected by this order was Bing Crosby.

As everyone knows, Bing and Bob Hope are extremely close friends and make frequent references to one another on their respective air shows. No sooner had the agency order been promulgated, than Hope wanted to mention Crosby on his program. Told of the ban, he went to Bing and received a blanket clearance to mention The Groaner whenever he wanted to. That's how one star hurdled his problem.

In general, editors find performers cooperative and understanding. Sensible stars know that editors are actually working for the benefit of the performer; they realize that should some item in bad taste be aired, public opinion would be damaging and stations airing the show might even have their licenses revoked.

Kay Kyser is cited as an example of the understanding, cooperative type. If there is any challenge about a portion of his "College of Musical Knowledge" script, the questionable part is dropped immediately. Lux is an excellent example of an invariably immaculate show.

There are some performers, however, who fight to retain a soiled gag. It's useless to try to explain to them, because they are thinking of the terrific laughs they can draw with their off-color cracks.

Once Continuity Acceptance has put its foot down, there's one chance in a million the gag will be put over. Few are the cases on record where stars have remained adamant, have gone on the air with every intention of including the questionable bit.

When such an unpleasant situation is forced, there's one final, drastic card which Continuity Acceptance plays. The editor warns the engineer in the control room. When, as, and if the performer comes to the questionable part and sails defiantly through it, the engineer turns his controls.

The performer delivers his questionable lines—but only to the studio audience.

While he is thumbing his nose at the blushing figure of good taste, not a single word of his script is being broadcast.

That blank wall of unexplained silence is Continuity Acceptance's way of insisting that our air shall be kept clean.

Not Many of His 24 Hours Get By Without Being Put To Some Constructive Use

HE rehearsal was over. The stage was quiet with that unearthly absence of noise evident only in a sound-proofed room. Everyone concerned with producing the show had left, except its star. The noise and bustle of the street outside seemed a million miles away. Used to dashing around to interview people who were on the verge of dashing around, one hardly knew how to cope with this m o m e n t of time-arrested-inflight, nor with the calm manner, the relaxed attitude, and the undivided attention of the man sitting there ... a man of leisure, apparently, who had learned how to take life easy and enjoy it as he went along.

That's the impression a first meeting with Jean Hersholt makes: he's the outward personification of the scholarly, polished gentleman who lives life gracefully, unhurried and unworried. A weekly broadcast, an occasional moving-picture, and all the rest of his time to be spent assembling and enjoying the fine paintings and rare first editions he owns.

An attractive picture, but incomplete, as the next half-hour revealed. "If you want something done, ask a busy person to do it," seems to be the motto of people who know Mr. Hersholt. For without doubt he's the busiest person to be encountered in many days. His life is organized on a wide-range basis which permits him to manage effectively the activities usually engaged in by four or five average people. For the past six years he's been president of the Motion Picture Relief Fund, the function of which is to assist those members of the industry who can no longer work because of age or infirmity. Since 1940, when Denmark was invaded and the National Association of Danish Americans was formed, he has been president of that organization. Both these societies require a great deal of time and attention. To take care of the enormous correspondence of the latter, Mr. Hersholt has set up an office in Beverly Hills, at his own expense.

Add to this the time demanded by membership in various other organizations, by a weekly "Dr. Christian" broadcast, by the making of movingpictures, and one wonders how he does it all in a day made up of only twenty-four hours. Not many of the twenty-four get by without being put to some good use. On this day he had arisen at six o'clock to attend a meeting of the Los Angeles Breakfast Club, at which the visiting Danish Ambassador was present. After rehearsal there were two broadcasts of "Dr. Christian," then a meeting of the Motion Picture Relief Fund at twelve-thirty that night. On the average, he goes to bed at two in the morning.

He hasn't had a vacation in five years. The nearest approximation to one is his yearly three-day trip to Bohemian Lodge in Northern Cali-fornia. On two of the three days this year he attended meetings of the National Danish Association. A unique aspect of this Association is that its fifteen board members live in almost as many cities, so that whereever Mr. Hersholt finds himself, he'll find a fellow-board member. He plans to call a meeting of this board in Chicago, in August, stopping there on his way to New York for his two annual Eastern broadcasts. While there, he'll also attend a convention of AFRA, of which he's vice-president. In September he hopes to be able to attend a convention of Danish Brotherhood Lodges. These lodges, four-hundred in all, are part of the larger organization, and the purpose of the convention is to start a war bond drive among Danish Ameri-cans. The purpose of the group since Pearl Harbor has been to aid the war effort and work for a free Denmark. Whether Mr. Hersholt can attend this September convention, held in Minneapolis, depends on whether he can get a plane reservation, for to get there on Thursday after a Wednes-day broadcast would necessitate flying.

Before going to Chicago in August, he must first finish a picture being (Please turn to page 38)

How They Keep the Air Lanes Clean

By Evelyn Bigsby

ON'T BE frightened by the impressive title flourished by any r a d io network's Continuity Acceptance Department. In plain talk, Continuity Acceptance means censorship. This department must give a meticulous reading to all scripts which go on the air from its studios, must delete any portions which violate the rules of network policy.

Elsewhere on this page, we have listed the commonly accepted axioms of good broadcasting. You will note that they restrict use of the Deity's name, ban statements offensive to religious views and racial characteristics, vulgar material, allusions to crime, insobriety, or physical handicaps.

Sounds simple, doesn't it?

But if our readers could investigate the work of Continuity Acceptance as Radio Life ventured to do the other day, they would find that heads of this department are **really** 'twixt the devil and the deep blue. On the one hand they must account to their network, its stations, and the listening public if anything in bad taste goes on the air; on the other hand, often they must perform the disagreeable duty of censoring a script over the protests of a highly paid star and a brace of agency representatives.

As one head expressed it: "It's like meeting a wealthy, fashionably dressed society woman, telling her that her hat is in bad taste, and making her like it."

At best, it's a terrifically nervewracking job, one which demands quick decisions and calls for utmost tact in keeping everyone as happy as possible.

For most Continuity Editors, com-



edy shows provide the ticklish work. Here the angles of censorship are innumerable. A gag in the mouth of one comedian may not be dirty. Put the same words in another's mouth, and they will be censorable. Fibber McGee is cited as a good example of the star who can say almost anything and keep it clean. For him and Molly, there is a warmth of wholesome response that shields them from pitfalls. The same is true of "One Man's Family." Its characters can frankly discuss the facts of life and receive only respectful hearing. In other scripts, the same topics might prove disastrous. It all depends on what the audience expects from a certain performer. If he has a reputation for off-color stuff, a comedian is apt to draw an off-color response.

The Continuity Acceptance Department Is Radio's Washer-Upper

> In scrutinizing a gag, a Continuity editor must take into consideration what precedes and what succeeds the crack. Suppose that a gag is ollowed by a "clean-up" line. If one person in the audience takes the gag the wrong way and starts a round of suggestive laughter, the effect of the ensuing "clean-up" line is lost.

> A line in print may look perfectly harmless, but to test it for good taste, the editor must imagine he hears it coming from the lips of the comedian. If innuendo is lurking, out the gag must go.

> Needless to say, editors must be familiar with all the gags, past and current crop, which might masquerade in a script. They are by no means Puritanical or mid-Victorian so-and-sos, who gleefully pounce on every little laugh. They are simply doing a job to keep your air and mine fit for consumption. Sometimes they find it difficult to draw the line on a certain situation. They then may call on someone else for an opinion, or may edit the material on a hunch. Editors know the ropes so well they can almost sense something that will not be quite accept-

Censor's ABC's:

- 1. The use of the Deity's name, or reference to His powers and attributes, is permissible only when used reverently. Only when baptism, marriage, burial, or other sacraments and ceremonials are absolutely essential to the plot may they be used.
- 2. Statements and suggestions which are offensive to religious views, racial characteristics and the like must not appear on the program.
- 3. Material which depends upon physical imperfections or deformities such as blindness, deafness, or lameness, for humorous effect is not acceptable.
- Sacrilegious, profane, salacious, obscene, vulgar, or indecent material is not acceptable for broadcast, and no language of doubtful propriety will be used.
- 5. The introduction of murder or suicide is definitely discouraged at all times, and the methods employed must not be described in detail. It is the aim of radio to broadcast drama plots free from morbidity.
- 6. Details as to the technique employed to accomplish criminal or anti-social practices must be minimized.
- 7. Emphasis on insobriety is not permitted.
- 8. Figures of national prominence as well as the peoples of all nations shall be presented with fairness.
- Except in case of factual news statements, appearances of or references to persons featured in criminal or morbidly sensational news stories are not acceptable.
- 10. The use of the word "Flash!" is reserved for the announcement of special news bulletins exclusively and may not be used for any other purpose except in rare cases where by reason of the manner in which it is used no possible confusion may result.
- 11. False and misleading statements and all other forms of misrepresentation must be avoided. This applies to misrepresentation of origination point of program as well as to all other matters.
- 12. Speakers must be recognized authorities on subjects they discuss.
- Time for the presentation of controversial issues will not be sold except for political broadcasts during campaign periods.

able. Marion Karol, CES-KNX editor, laughingly says that her equipment is a red and blue pencil and "something I wear under my hat."

Wendell Williams, head of NBC's Western Division Continuity Accep-

tance, says he'll give a tidy sum to anyone with a fool-proof definition of "good taste." He points out that place or time may be a determining factor in deciding whether or not something is in taste. A joke that might be all right before an audience of soldiers in camp might be objectionable to a family group gathered around a hearth-side. A commercial announcement which is acceptable for a 10 a.m. audience in Los Angeles might make luncheon listeners in New York (1 p.m.) choke on their food.

There is no doubt that war has increased his work, Williams says. By their nature, newspapers and magazines can be confined to the borders of the United States. Radio cannot, hence must undergo even more rigid censorship. Furthermore, our enemies must not be pictured as pushovers; sensational treatment of war themes must be avoided.

There is a tendency, Williams observes, for a nation at war to relax many of its standards. Authors, searching for realism in their scripts, are inclined to use stronger expletives.

The words damn and hell, creep into broadcasts. Generally, censors are allowing certain words to get by if they add realism to a war script. For example, it is now permissible for men in a war drama to say they're going through hell. But they may not tell anyone to go there. They may say "damn the torpedoes, full steam ahead," but they cannot damn anyone.

Williams, remembering that radio reaches intimately into the home, thinks the same effect can be achieved without giving offense. He points to the fact that when realistic sound effects of bombing raids were banned by NBC to avoid public panic, musicians went to work and reached the same goal with mood music.

Dorothy Brown, the Blue's Contin-

uity editor, points out that comedy has definite trends. "A few years ago," she remarks, "the words, jerk and lousy, were not acceptable for broadcasting. Little by little they have seeped into the scripts, until today, public acceptance helps get them by the editor."

Network rules require all scripts to be cleared by Continuity Acceptance 24 hours prior to air time. Mention this to any editor and he favors you with a wan smile.

Orchestra Leader Johnny Richards Glorifies the Housewife's Lowly Tools

NE NIGHT while playing gin-rummy with a group of fellow-musicians, Johnny Richards announced: "I'm in the mood to write something ice-cold about a refrigerator." Deaf to the remarks of his scoffing friends, but with his ears

frigerator." Deaf to the remarks of his scoffing friends, but with his ears open to the humming sound that had been nagging him all evening, he went home and wrote something icecold about a refrigerator.

Believing as he does that all sounds are musical, Johnny has always been distracted by them, wanting to do something about them.

COMMON, TAKEN FOR GRANTED TABLEWARE has musical merit, according to this maestro. Around its tinkle may be built a fascinating musical hit.





Everything has a beat . . the stroke of a broom, the whine of a vacuum cleaner, the drip of a faucet, some more obvious than others. Music, as we know it, is a group of tones, separated and put together at the right places. When dusting a piano, if you crash down on the keys all at once, you get only harsh discords: whereas if you proceed slowly and lightly, the sound is pleasant. By spacing dissonants, the tones are made palatable to the ear.

When Johnny and his orchestra were selected to furnish music for the Jack Carson program, he reasoned that since this was the Campbell's soup program, and ostensibly aimed at the housewife, what more appropriate than to glamorize the household appliances so often a source of boredom for this lady?

Soon there appeared a Monday Morning Mood composition, built around the swish of a washing machine. "Swish, swish, swish," goes the washing machine, in perfect rhythm, and the music of the orchestra rises and falls, twines itself in and out of that steady impudent beat. Listening, one seems to learn all about the machine, its function, characteristics and attitude. It assumes personality. So that on next Monday morning, when the lady of the house surveys that bleakest of all tasks, the family wash, she'll remember, and smile, and even hum the little tune Johnny wove into his music, 'this is the way we wash our clothes.'

This was a clever idea of Johnny's. For who is the forgotten man, when compared with the forgotten woman, the house-wife? Not forgotten as a potential buyer, of course, for every device known to modern advertising has been employed in the effort to separate her from her money; but forgotten when giving her anything is concerned. Now, as she listens to Johnny's music, she feels important. Here is a man who understands that the tools of her craft are not so lowly after all.

To present descriptive music based on the rhythm of kitchen gadgets requires more than a clever idea. It requires a sound musical background, talent for composing and training in arranging music, and the ability to direct an orchestra. All these Johnny has: he studied instrumental music at Walverg Conservatory in New York, and later played in many top-notch bands. In 1934 he became Victor Young's assistant, and a year later went to Paramount Studios with Young as assistant musical director. After five years he left Paramount to organize his own band, playing first at the Casa Manana for the Andrews Sisters, and, later, on the "Take It Or Leave It" radio show.

Working with Victor Young, whom Johnny describes as a genius, he became a superb arranger. In directing a band, he has the power of extending his personality to his musicians, so that they catch his mood readily. To convey his thoughts through his orchestra to the listeners . . . that's the task of the producer of 'mood' music. Otherwise the mood doesn't belong to anyone but the original owner.

In creating his novelty effects Johnny's method will not be apparent to non-musicians; but they will catch and hold the interest of anyone who hears them. According to him, musical instruments can reproduce any sound. We hear the creak of a rocking chair it's the strings, and the resemblance is achieved by bowing behind the bridge. Water bubbles are captured by the wood-winds.

He may build his composition around a line or two of a song or a piece of music that seems suited to the idea he means to convey. For example, "This Is The Way We Wash Our Clothes" is exactly right for the washing machine . . . it immediately (Please Turn to Page 29)

made for the government, in which he plays . . . a doctor!

Recently this "leisurely" man lectured before the Library of Congress on his two-volume work about Hans Christian Andersen, published by the Limited Edition Club of America. While in the East he was awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree by Bowdoin College. Also while there, he appeared on the "Radio Reader's Digest" show to read the prize-winning play in the second annual "Dr. Christian Award" play contest. In announcing the contest, Mr. Hersholt said, more than a year ago: "Radio needs new writers. It needs the inspiration of new ideas from persons in all walks of life. I hope that we shall literally be deluged with manuscripts."

They were: more than ten thousand of them. Of these twelve were selected and presented as noteworthy, including the winning play. At the present time the 1943 crop of twelve is being heard on the "Dr. Christian" hour, and scripts are competing for additional prizes, to be awarded according to listener vote by mail.

A Humanitarian

In the public mind, Jean Hersholt and Dr. Christian are one, possibly because Hersholt has knit Dr. Christian together from the thread of his own personality. A quiet help-ful kindliness, a never-failing sense of humor, the ever-present urge to be of service to his fellow man . . . these are qualities immediately sensed in the good doctor and the actor alike. Jean Hersholt, one ventures to think, would have made a success. ful doctor, for he has the healing, soothing presence that is as important in the man of medicine as his technical knowledge and skill. Could this be the reason he has been so repeatedly cast in a doctor's role? Or why he has gone along for more than seven years, playing the genial Dr. Christian on the air?

Jean Hersholt in his life and works, lives up to the finest tradition of the theater. He's a modern example of the actor who, in times gone by, was more than an actor, he was also a scholar, and a man to make himself k n o wn outside the narrow boundaries of his profession. Writer, lecturer, humanitarian, collector of books and paintings, Hersholt has not let his acting shut out living. He possesses a sense of proportion that keeps everything in a proper balance. Sensitive to the needs of others, gentle, courteous, he proceeds without hurry through his day, accomplishing three times as much as the average human. A rare person, one who has been able to find practical expression for his idealism.
