IG, JOVIAL Don Wilson takes a lot of kidding about his portly build,—especially on Sunday afternoons. We don't need to tell you

that's the day the Jack Benny show is aired, coast-to-coast, on the NBC network, and that Wilson is the announcer.

In appearance, Don is the direct opposite of that other Wilson, lean, spare, scholarly, grave of mein, who was our nation's President in World War I. His looks and general bearing typify the prosperous American businessman, with a background of college sports. He has to stoop to get his six-feet-three into a taxicab without bumping his head and when he steps on the scales, the dial doesn't stop moving until it gets somewhere around 215 pounds. He still has his hair, which is brown, his blue eyes twinkle, and he's as ruddy-faced and jolly as Santa Claus, despite a very definite bearing of dignity.

Jack Benny never lets either Wilson or the radio audience forget that Don is a BIG MAN. Here's a typical example of the kind of ribbing Benny gives Wilson on the latter's tonnage, almost every week.

### Is Ribbed

JACK: . . . Cupid brought me because I was born on St. Valentine's Day, but the stork brings everybody else.

WILSON: You're a little wrong there, Jack, a crane brought me.

JACK: What's the difference?

Stork, crane . . . They're both birds. WILSON: I mean a crane like in a shipyard.

JACK: Oh, you mean hoist ... Well, Don, you're an exception. You were a very heavy baby ... I understand your nurse had to jack you up to get your diapers on.

But Don't doesn't mind being kidded about his weight. He might not be the announcer on one of radio's foremost variety shows today had he been a little chap. That big frame of his helped to make him a football star at the University of Colorado. Sometimes ardent devotion to the pigskin in college days proves a handicap to later success. It worked the other way in Wilson's case. The knowledge that he gained playing varsity guard made him one of the National Broadcasting Company's ablest sports announcers and his success in that work led to his place on the Benny show.

Don's interest in athletics didn't interfere with his studies, either in high school or college. He had a couple of things in common with that other Wilson, to-wit, firstly, outstanding scholarship; second, a marvelous "gift o' gab." His first appearance as a public speaker was when he was a high school sophomore. He was the proud participant in a debate. All the others on the two debating teams were seniors. Evidently his ability as a speaker was beginning to win recognition, even then.

"While we sat there on the stage of the high school auditorium in Denver, waiting for the school principal to come, I was petrified—scared

stiff and perspiring bucketsful," he says now, in speaking of the incident. "But as soon as I stood up and started to talk, I was all right."

He took no interest in dramatics but sang in a male quartet in high school and in the glee club at the university. As a high school student, Don clerked in his father's drug store after school. It didn't take high pressure selling to peddle pills, but the experience sufficed to let him know he had a certain persuasive power with words. Soon after he got his college sheepskin, he took a job as salesman for a wholesale drug concern. On Sundays, he was baritone soloist at a Denver church.

## Sang First

It was Don Wilson's singing voice which first introduced him to radio listeners. When one member of a successful harmony trio dropped out, the other two invited Don to take his place. "I had no ambitions for a singing career, but the novelty of it appealed to me so I accepted," he says.

"We were very courageous," Wilson reminisces. "We sang everything from the 'Prune Song' to grand opera."

The trio performed at luncheons, banquets, theaters, programs of all kinds. In 1924, the three began to do programs over Denver stations KOZ and KFEL. Under Piggly-Wiggly's banner, they went to San Francisco to sing over KFRC, then toured California for a year, as a Fanchon and Marco unit. The trio dissolved in 1928. Wilson and Martin Dougherty, the two remaining members,

came south and landed jobs as staff singers on KHJ.

Maybe you remember those two merry "waker-uppers," "The Early Birds," and "The Two Boys, Don and Mart." Both duos were the lads from Denver. They worked early and late, snatching meals on the run. Often their only salvation was the eight bars or so of music opening and closing the programs.

Buying a new car cost Wilson his job on KHJ, says Wilson. Don Lee, then the owner of KHJ, also was the Los Angeles Cadillac dealer. "When the manager of the Don Lee used car department learned I had to sell my car before I could buy a Cadillac, he gave me a very definite brush-off," he says. "So I sold my car to the Packard agency and bought a new Packard. Not only was the Packard a competitive product but Earl C. Anthony, the Packard agent, was the owner of the rival Los Angeles radio station, KFI."

Don Lee fired him. Another of today's famous radio announcers, then was manager of KMTR, suave Harry von Zell. When Wilson applied to him for a job as an announcer, von Zell turned him down. Years later, when Wilson asked him the reason, von Zell exclaimed, "Why? I was scared to death about my own job!"

Anthohy heard about the Packard incident, put Wilson on KFI and children became acquainted with his kindly voice and hearty laugh on such programs as "Big Brother Don." It was on that station that Wilson became an announcer, specializing in sportscasts, and eventually chief announcer. In 1933, at the invitation of John Royal, vice-president of NBC, Wilson became a member of the New York staff of NBC. How One Man's Vision Won World-Wide Audience

HE POWER of prayer. A reason rarely given for the success of a national radio program. Yet Dr. Charles E. Fuller, Baptist clergyman, says it is prayer which put "The Old-Fashoned Revival Hour" on the air and age Six has kept it there for nine years,—his prayers, his wife's, his associates' and those of millions of listeners in the program's vast, unseen audience. The program has gone out over an ever-increasing number of stations, until now it is almost world-wide and has the largest radio audience of any religious program on the air.

Dr. Fuller makes no claim to brilliance as an orator, nor is he one of those shouting, pulpit-pounding radio ranters who antagonizes religious and non-religious dialers alike. He's a big, quiet-mannered, soft-spoken man, six feet, one and a half inches tall, with gray hair, kindly brown eyes and a benign countenance.

The "Old-Fashioned Revival Hour" is for people of all denominations and is directed to beginners in the study of the Bible. Its gospel messages are simple truths, couched in language understandable to the humblest as well as the most learned listener. The program's chief aim is to reach people who have not followed the Christian pattern of living.

## No Mike Fright

"When I preach, I completely forget about the microphone and the huge radio audience out beyond it," the tall clergyman told us, as we talked in the office of Radio Life. "I picture some lonely miner in a little cabin on a mountainside or someone else alone and perhaps struggling with what seems like an insurmountable problem."

Whatever Charles Fuller may lack in eloquence, say his friends, he makes up in the earnestness and sincerity with which he speaks. No other speaker in the history of religion has ever had a weekly audience equal to that of this unassuming Baptist pastor who began his adult life as a business man.

The "Old-Fashioned Revival Hour" has more than 800 outlets in the United States, Central and South America, Canada and Alaska and is shortwaved and sent by transcription to Europe, Africa, Asia, Australia and islands of the sea. Dr. Fuller also conducts the "Pilgrim's Hour," which originates at the Long Beach Municipal Auditorium at 11:00 a.m. each Sunday and is broadcast over the Mutual network for more advanced Bible students. Its weekly congregation in the big auditorium numbers more than 2,000.

Add the cost of this broadcast to the necessary office expenses and the total is many thousands of dollars each week. No denomination backs it. There are no sponsors. Yet every week's mail brings in the tremendous sum required to carry on this work. To the program's postoffice box in Los Angeles come letters from millions of devoted listeners. The great majority of the contributions are "widow's mites,"—small sums, often saved and given only by means of touching sacrifices.

### Supported By Gifts

"These contributions are all freewill offerings. We have never had a single pledge or subscription," Dr. Fuller asserts. "The program is supervised by a non-profit religious or ganization, under the strict supervision of the State."

The organization was formed by a group of Long Beach business men in May, 1933. Dr. Fuller was anxious to put the program on a thoroughly sound business foundation to eliminate any possible basis for criticism of the disposition of funds. To solve the problem, the Gospel Broadcasting Association, Inc., was formed under the laws of the State of California.

All funds received are deposited to the credit of the Gospel Broadcastiing Association and are checked out over the signatures of two of the executive officers, Dr. Fuller told us, "A careful accounting of the receipts and expenditures of the money used to carry on the work is kept by the most modern bookkeeping methods and the accounts are audited every ninety days by one of the best-known firms of public accountants in America.

The twenty-five organizers of the association annually elect nine from among their number to serve as a board of directors, supervising the financial and business details. Rev. Fuller is in complete charge of the program's contents. Four other ministers comprise an advisory committee on spiritual matters.

Be they large or small, every freewill offering from a dime up is acknowledged by letter. To read and answer the donors' letters requires the services of a staff of 35 girls at the Gospel Broadcasting Association offices in Pasadena, and the use of a mechanical letter-opener and much other modern labor-saving equipment.

Musical theme for the program is the appealing hymn, "Jesus Saves." The program blends its spoken gospel message with well-loved oldfashioned hymns, quartet and choir music. Musical director is Leland Green, an accomplished young musician who worked with Dr. Fuller when he was pastor of a Placentia church. Rudolph Atwood is the pianist. William MacDougall, Arthur Jayseley, Herman Hosier and Al Harlan make up the male quartet.

### Many Conversions

That the program successfully serves its evangelistic purpose is convincingly indicated by the many thousands of letters which bring stories of conversions to belief in Christ, says Dr. Fuller. These letters come not only from men and women who have fallen away from high standards of Christian living but also from hardened criminals in whose lives religion has had ho place.

He tells of one man who wrote to say the"Old-Fashioned Revival Hour" had saved him from suicide. Reared in a Christian home, he had almost forgotten his early teachings. When his wife left him and took their children with her, he lost faith in life. He went into his garage, turned on the motor of his automobile and lay down in back of the car. He had almost reached unconsciousness from breathing the carbon monoxide fumes when, from the car's radio came strains of hymn singing and a quietly-spoken message from the Scriptures,---the "Revival Hour." He began to realize the enormity of what he was doing, struggled to the door and somehow, managed to get out. Weeks later, he wrote to tell of his experience and to ask for help

in returning to the Christian way of life.

Numerous letters have come from other near-suicides who have found, in the "Revival Hour," courage and the strength to go on.

In his early life, the 56-year-old pastor of the "Old-Fashioned Revival Hour" had no interest in becoming a minister. It was not until 1919, after spending several years in other work, that he turned his back on a successful business career that he might dedicate himself to teaching the gospel.

Charles Fuller's parents came to Los Angeles from New York State as pioneers in the 1870's. Dr. Fuller was born at Third and Hill streets on April 25, 1887. The firehouse was close to his father's furniture store and as a small boy, Charles Fuller loved to ride the firewagons when the alarm sounded. Once he was soundly and publicly spanked for indulging in that favorite diversion against his mother's orders.

The family later moved ot Redlands, where Dr. Fuller's father bought 250 acres of citrus groves. As a Redlands high school student, Charles was a big, shy, awkward lad, who did better at football than conversation. He continued to shine on the gridiron when he entered Pomona College in 1906. He was graduated with honors.

After his marriage to Grace Peyton, his high school sweetheart, Fuller became a citrus grower. He lost his groves when frost killed his crop a few years later. Moving to Placentia, he became manager of a fruit growers' association and the largest packing house in the world. Again he purchased an orange grove.

### Bogan Bible Study

The Fullers would have been amazed, at that time, if anyone had told them that Charles Fuller some day would become the pastor of a church which would be built on the vacant lot across from their tiny home. When his wife became increasingly interested in the Bible, he had no share in her enthusiasm. But a chance sermon delivered in Los Angeles by a former college friend stirred his conscience. He began to see life in a different light.

The young business man began to study the Bible. He had never liked to speak in public and felt that it would be impossible for him to preach. But one day, in a secluded spot in the packing house he managed, he went down on his knees and prayed for guidance. With his wife's approval, he gave up his job. Where the money for his three years of ministerial training at the Bible Institute of Los Angeles would come from, he didn't know. But he had faith, he says, that God would supply his needs. Three weeks later an oil company offered him \$10,000 for a lease on his orange grove!

In 1926, Calvary Church was erected in Placentia, across the street from the Rev. Fuller's home and he became its pastor. It was after pinchhitt'ng for the scheduled speaker on

a gospel radio program at a religious conference that he first saw the vision of what religious broadcasts by radio could mean in spreading the gospel. From his church at Placentia came his first broadcasts, through remote control from Long Beach station KGER.

Fuller resigned from the pastorate of Calvary church in 1932. He had lost all his own property in the depression. He was entirely dependent upon his listeners for the money to pay for broadcasting his two programs. There were many anxious hours. One Friday night, there was a big deficit in the amount needed for the following Sunday's broadcasts. At dinner, he and his wife prayed for the needed funds. A few minutes later, a telephone call brought word that their beach cottage had been leased at a good rental. Then a young dentist phoned to say he had a contribution. It was for the exact remainder that was lacking—\$150.

The two programs went on the air over the Mutual network with a 13station hook-up in 1937. Seven months later Fuller faced cancellation of his "Revival Hour" broadcast due to a conflicting national broadcast. With complete faith that his needs would be met, he signed a coast-to-coast network contract. That meant a cost increase of \$3,000 a week. Listeners voluntarily provided it.

In many times of personal misfortune,—when his only son, in childhood, lay dying with pneumonia, when business troubles beset him, Charles Fuller says he put his faith in prayer. His friends say he believes with his whole heart in what he preaches.

# Acquire Blue Interest

Time Inc. and Chester J. Laroche last week acquired an interest in the Blue Network, recently purchased by Edward J. Noble, Lifesavers tycoon, from NBC for eight million dollars. Amount of shares sold by Noble to publishers of Time, Life and Fortune was 121/2 per cent of those outstanding. Same amount was purchased by Laroche, well-known radio executive, formerly chairman of the board of Young and Rubicam Agency and or-ganizer and present head of the War Advertising Council.

It is expected that Time will make a major contribution to the Blue's news programs and that Laroche will be a valuable executive.

Said Noble of the deals:

"These transactions leave me with substantial control of the shares of American Broadcasting System, Inc., which I intend to hold for an indefinite period. However, I have in mind, at some later date when I have ob-tained fuller knowledge of the enterprise and can measure the risk involved in equity ownership, to invite volved in equility ownership, to invite participation by other management officials, fellow members in affiliated stations and possibly the public. In all probability, such shares would be offered by the company and not by any other present stockholders."

Music of Spike and His City Slickers Accepted Now for Satiric Merit

PIKE JONES has packed more work and worry into the past twelve months than he squeezed into twelve years of drumming

before he and the City Slickers zoomed to phenomenal success.

The other day he rushed into the Brown Derby fifteen minutes late for a luncheon appointment with Radio Life. He looked prosperous, but had to write a check to pay for the meal; he assured us he had plenty of time for our interview, but was interrupted by four telephone calls.

Time there was, however, to determine one thing. Spike's corn and

A year ago, this group was a sensation because of a little number giving Hitler the raspberry right in his face. At that period, Spike and the City Slickers, riding the crest of new-surging popularity, were besieged with gold-plated offers for personal appearances in New York, Chicago, and other key cities.

There followed months of h ard work—two radio shows a week, personal appearances, movies and "Salute to Youth" War Bond rallies in the schools of Southern California. In the months which intervened between their first success and last summer when the b and members finally went East, corn took root. Spike and the Slickers went on from "Der Fuehrer's Face" in to complicated satirical numbers like "Chloe"

and "Black Magic". As they trekked Eastward with their rattling washboards, clicking thimbles, wigs, and slide whistles, they left in their wake two broken house records and the feat of bowling over staid Boston.

### Broke Two Records

Their "meet the people" tour had several highlights, among them a chance to meet Father Flanagan of Boystown, to whom Spike delivered Tom Breneman's "Breakfast at Sardi" orchid. In Milwaukee they broke the box office record for the Riverside theater, then on to Hammond, Indiana, where another high mark was surpassed.

Boston, according to Spike, was very unusual in its responses. Good showmanship dictated that the band reserve "Der Fuehrer's Face" for its encore, so it regaled the audience first with "Glow Worm", "Liebestraum", and "Hotchacornia". Bostonians sat so tight-lipped and feeble-handed after each number that Spike thought the act there was a fizzle.

Leaving his podium, he hurried back-stage, found his manager, and exclaimed: "You'd better get us out of this. See if we can book transportation for New York right away!"

But as soon as the repertoire was completed, Spike and the Slickers were surprised by a tremendous ovation. Seems Bostonians do not like to break the continuity of a musical series by applauding, hence they save all their cheers until the end of a presentation.

### Other Shows

In New York the group opened at State Theater and established the biggest Sunday box office record in the State's history. Sprinkled throughout the trip were numerous appearances at camps, bond rallies, and radio shows.

### What People Like

"We learned what the people want", Spike stated after completing the tour. It was a test for the "band

that plays for fun", because it had never clocked extensive audience reactions outside bond rallies and similar appearances.

What the people want, Spike learned, is satire. Loosely called "corn", the brand of music dealt by the Washboard Wizard and his assistants pulls a song apart and pokes fun for all the lines are worth. Some folks may object to hearing a number like "Night and Day" satirized. Spike expects this. But more folks will get a kick out of debunking sentimentality.

"In the roaring boom" — and in cuts a sound record of screeching brakes and horns. "In the silence of my lonely room" ---dead silence, broken by remark, "Quiet, isn't it?"

"Keeps repeating, and repeating"in stuck-needle tone, "and repeating and repeating! Darn those radishes!"

These are samples of the corn which has taken root.

### Songs Hard To Find

"It's hard to find songs", Spike said somewhat dejectedly. "You know-songs that lend themselves to satire. But we keep working on it."

After a song is chosen and arranged, all the Slickers help with suggestions. At Spike's invitation, we later watched the band rehearse "Night and Day". Over and over again they worked on a line or phrase, polishing inflection or coordination. Audiences, possibly, do not begin to fathom the infinite detail going into such a gaily rendered novelty.

Besides the number and its arrangement, Spike has duties which few, if any other, leaders shoulder to the extent he does. Every song must be accented by slide whistles, helmets, and other mirth-provoking gadgets. "No other leader", sadly commented Mr. Lindley (Spike) Jones, "has to worry whether his men have their guns and false wigs ready!"

SPIKE THINKS HE HAS MORE worries than any other bandleader. "Who else has to see that the boys have their wigs, their German helmets, their whistles, and their false noses?" he demands. We think he has a point, as this picture shows.

Star-Gazing at 8 a.m.

It Put Life Into A Program Given Six Weeks to Live

Saturday, 9:30 a.m. CBS-KNX



OW DOES it seem to see and work with the stars at eight o'clock in the morning?

The logical person

able director of the CBS dramatic show, "Stars Over Hollywood"—the program production executives said would last six weeks but which is now going full speed ahead with 175 performances to its credit.

"Until we started 'Stars Over Holly-wood'," Producer Paul Pierce told Radio Life the other day, "Saturday morning was considered completely unsalable time. We began with a rating of 2.2 and have gone as high as 10.8. Right now, we're hitting 6.5 and are very satisfied and are very satisfied.

"We actually pioneered the Sat-urday morning field. Armstrong later moved into the half hour ahead of us with its 'Theater of Today,' Dick Powell now follows us, and 'Let's Pretend' recently took over the 8 o'clock spot. But our show broke the ice."

Easy to take is "Stars Over Holly-wood," for it features big-name stars in light dramatic entertainmentromance, comedy, actual farce, occa-

sionally a mystery, but tragedy perhaps once a year. Chief aim of the program is to be amusing, for it strikes housewives busy with their Saturday morning chores at a time when they cannot assimilate powerful drama.

Scripts are written by a group of writers, about ten being the most consistent contributors. Pierce himself has written approximately 21 of the programs.

Usual procedure is for the story to be selected first, then the star. Some of the personalities who have appeared include Mary Astor, Alan Ladd, Anita Louise, Billie Burke, Edna Best, Jane Wyman, Connie Bennett, Joan Blondell, Basil Rathbone, Merle Oberon, Phil Harris, and Eric Blore, luminaries most often associated with extravagant night-time programs. Usually, six or seven of Radio Row's most competent actors assist the stellar attraction..."We get the pick," said Pierce, "because there are no other dramatic shows Saturday morning."

Ivan Ditmars furnishes music on the organ, supplemented by a harp and violin. It sounds like a small orchestra, so cleverly are the microphones placed and so adeptly are arrangements made. Thus it is that "Stars Over Hollywood" garners a tremendous audience at comparatively low cost—lower than many big-time evening programs with budgets five times as generous.

### Rehearse Early

Dress rehearsal on Saturday morning at 8 runs into air time and would be a sensational performance to view IF it were viewable. Not so, because actors and other performers, in appreciation of the early hour, dress most casually.

"They arrive," explained Pierce, "in unglamorous attire — pajamas, bandanas, curlers, slacks, sucking lemons to clear their throats at such an early hour, or sometimes still rubbing the sleep out of eyes. But by 9:30 they're rarin' to go."

Pierce, who is marking his fourteenth year in radio, has the background to handle stars in top-flight production. "I began in radio as announcer for a troupe of hillbillies from one to four ayem—for nothing!" This happened on KEOW, a Magnolia Park station, now defunct. Through the mazing mill of radio as chief announcer at KRKD, staff announcer and head of the writing department at KFWB, Pierce pieced together his experience. Then on to CBS as writer-announcer-producer of special events, where he did crazy things like riding a canoe through one of the Los Angeles aqueduct tunnels.

Saner, but just as exciting moments found him swooping in a glider (he was first to broadcast from one), zooming through the air in the monstrous DC-4 on her third flight, riding to sea with the fleet.

Immediately preceding his present assignments, Pierce was production supervisor for CBS, and while in this capacity, he launched "Stars Over Hollywood." Now he is free lancing,

producing the "Dreft Star Playhouse" in addition to his CBS Saturday morning show.

### **Tense Times**

He has many tense moments producing "Stars Over Hollywood," although he is not a Simon Legree in the booth. "I like to keep my actors easy and happy," he remarked. "If possible, it's better to let them read their lines the way they feel them. They give a better performance." One of the more hectic times, according to Pierce, was when Jane Wyman ate too much lobster the night before she was scheduled to star on the show. Next morning she was too ill to perform. mainly to do broadcasts of sports events and eventually devoted all his time to such programs. But before he was relieved of his studio assignments, NBC instituted its news service. Wilson and the late Graham Mc-Namee were chosen to do the news broadcasts, which usually lasted half an hour.

### With McNamee

"It was pretty hectic," says Wilson. "Usually we had no time to check on pronunciations or familiarize ourselves with the copy before we went on the air."

During the depression, the word "indigent" was much in the news. An item which Wilson read on the air made reference to some "expectant and indigent mothers." His alwaysrosy countenance became several shades rosier when he realized he had changed the phrase to "expectant and indignant mothers."

In his first year in New York, Wilson, with other members of NBC's announcing staff, auditioned for the job of announcer on the Benny show. "I was certainly jittery," he confesses. "New York still had me very much awed. Why I got the job I don't know, unless I just happened to laugh at the right time."

The big chap with the booming laugh has been with the Benny show ever since. He has become one of the select few among the elite of radio announcers who have been drawn into important radio shows as actors, besides doing the commercials on their programs.

Wilson credits Benny with being the first radio performer to "kid the commercial." "He instituted the sugar-coating. It was his idea and he started me on it. The idea took hold. We developed it after we went on the Jell-O show."

Ed Wynn began to use quips about his sponsor's product on the Texaco program. The idea spread like wildfire. Now commercials on many programs have become a highlight of the entertainment instead of mere bores, to be patiently endured.

### **Typical Commercial**

"Speaking of dreams, Jack, I had an *amazing* one last night," says Wilson, leading into a typical commercial on the Benny show. And the dialogue continues thus:

JACK: You did, Don, said Benny ... (with the brains of a wheatcake) ... What was your dream, Don?

WILSON: Well, last night I dreamed that I, Don Wilson, was a toasty brown, sweet as a nut, Grape Nut Flake.

JACK: You . . . a flake?

WILSON: Yes, I was a Grape Nut Flake and a fellow came along and poured me into a big twelve-ounce, economy size package.

JACK: Gee, this is thrilling.

DENNIS: Aw, tell it to Sweeney,

how could they pour Wilson into a twelve-ounce package?

JACK: This is a dream, like when I kissed you, remember? . . . Continue, Don.

WILSON: Well, Jack, a little later a charming American housewife came to a grocery store and bought the package I was in.

(Sound: Cash register).

JACK: Dennis, take your hand out of there. This is a dream. Go ahead, Don.

Wilson: And you should have seen the look of delight on her husband's face the next morning when he saw a whole bowlful of Grape Nuts Flakes right on the table in front of him.

JACK: Yes, yes? and then what happened?

WILSON: He put me in a spoon, the spoon broke and I woke up.

JACK: Well, Don, that was certainly a wonderful dream.

When the Benny show was broadcast from Toronto, Canada, in June of last year, the kidding commercial went like this:

WILSON: ... Speaking of Canada, I've written a very clever message which involves various cities and towns in this Dominion.

JACK: Who else is in it? . . . I mean, you have? . . . What's the matter with me?

WILSON: Yes, it goes something like this . . . (Clears Throat). When you come back from the *Lake*, *Louise* . . . and when you arrive in *Port*, *Arthur*—

JACK: Well, there are two places already.

WILSON: I want you both *Toronto* your neighborhood grocer and ask him for a box of toasty brown, sweet as a nut Grape Nut Flakes.

JACK: Toronto, that's not bad.

WILSON: Now if you arrive home and find that you've forgotten your Grape Nuts Flakes . . . Quebec to the store immediately.

JACK: Quebec . : . Quebec to the store?
