Sirs: Ted Tessey's question about the practice of saying "this station" instead of giving call letters should be the pleasure of the stations to answer, but knowing their tendency to ignore inquiries (my pet peeve) it's doubtful if any of them will so may I?

Mr. Tessey says he sometimes has to wait five or ten minutes to identify a station. He's playing in luck; legally I believe a station can sound out for thirty-five minutes running without disclosing its identity. They really are not trying to be coy or confusing when they say "write to the station to which you are listening," nor mysterious, no matter how much they crave your continued attention. It's merely a practical way of getting around a mechanical hurdle.

The announcement may come from some far place you never heard of-Schen Smith, for instance-and go simultaneously to a network of stations with a hundred or more different call letters; the agency hand-ling the account most likely is in New York; the sponsor could be in New Orleans; and he in turn is apt to have distributors near each of the stations releasing the program. You could write to any of them and expect results, but Uncle Sam's postoffice likes you better for writing the station nearest you-the "station to which you are listening" -as probably your letter would have to gravitate back to your local distributor before you get your results. Or the program or announcement you hear might be a recording-one of dozens and dozens of replicas being played around the country at the convenience of the stations. In either case it is possible to break in at the phychological instant, have the local announcer give the local call letters, then switch back to the network announcer or the record, and sometimes it is done, but it is a much more expensive and diddly process than it sounds, takes a mass of paper work, causes no end of jitters behind the scenes, and, what's important to you, limits the program's smoothness - and flexibility, since the local announcer must know at just what fraction of a second he is to expect his cue and how many seconds and fractions he may and must use. For instance, KWKW takes longer to say than KFI. Not much, of course, but a dead heartbeat of time or an overlapping can help to ouch things up like a stumble in marching cadence.

Most people who do much listening_either know definitely or have an instinctive feeling for a station's identity, and Radio Life's program finder is a great help in finding where you are at on "the station to which you are listening."

Newscaster Sam Hayes' Listeners Send Him Pancakes, Tell Him About Their Pets, Suggest Hair Restorer

EWSCASTER Sam Hayes rolls out of bed at 5:30 every morning in order to get to the NBC

studio in time to broadcast the breakfast news. For lesser mortals who cock one sleepy ear in the direction of his headline hearing, his life is interesting—there's a lot behind this well-established name and voice.

Sam Hayes has been delivering accurate accounts of the news in a rapid-fire, friendly way since 1931 when he won an audition, became the first Richfield reporter, and was heard nightly in that capacity for six years. "Yes, I was the original Richfield reporter," he told us. "Before that I got my start in radio in San Francisco as a member of a National Players group."

When he was very young Sam discovered he had the gift of gab which has since made him famous throughout the land. His father was a Presbyterian minister noted for his oratory, and at the age of nine the youngest member of the Hayes family used to preach sermons in the family parlor on Sunday evenings.

He followed his bent for public address at Stanford University, where he majored in dramatics, then joined the theatrical company which led to his radio renown and subsequent motion picture f a me. He has been in over 100 motion pictures, mostly enacting the role of a newscaster or sports announcer. He has another claim to fame in his record of sorts, of only having two sponsors in thirteen years of radio—Richfield and his present sponsor, the Sperry Flour Company.

ILL GOODWIN looked at Bips, shock his head and reluctantly ordered a light lunch. "I'm on a diet," he explained resignedly.

"That's the movies for you," he said with a wistful sigh. "In radio, you can weigh two hundred pounds, and still be a leading man." Bill is tall and husky six feet, one, and one hundred and ninety-odd pounds. "And the camera adds to your weight!" lamented Goodwin further.

"But it doesn't to your hair!"

Who would have thought we'd see the day? Goodwin, that big, care-free guy with the happy-go-lucky grin, watching his waistline and worrying over his hairline! Goodwin, gone Hollywood!

The movies have plucked him from the airlanes as a budding new screen personality. You can see him currently in the MGM Technicolor hit, "Bathing Beauty," and soon, as Betty Hutton's husband, in the story of fabulous Texas Guinan, "Incen-diary Blonde." assurance that he will remain active at the mike.

"I wouldn't be content without radio," Bill told us. He started his career on Sacramento and San Francisco radio stations, then came to KHJ in Hollywood, where he did everything from acting, staff announcing and writing copy to handling sound effects and manning the instrument board in the engineer's booth.

"Radio is a wonderful training ground," he said with real enthu-siasm. Now, in addition to his work on the screen, he hopes to branch into other realms of broadcasting. His great ambition is to have his own comedy show on the air.

"Radio has spoiled me, though," Goodwin continued. "My memory has become pretty poor! When I've got a movie script to memorize, I have to study and study and study. then rehearse and rehearse and rehearse! One system I use is to write my scene from memory on the typewriter. It helps to make it stick in my mind." He told us that his wife cues him when he rehearses aloud at home.

But in spite of all his study, moaned Goodwin, on the first day of a film's shooting, "I'm deathly sick to my stomach, my eyes feel like they're burning holes in my head, I'm swimming in sweat and I can't remember a thing!

"Whereas, before a broadcast," he smiled, "I merely get butterflies in my stomach!"

His most recent movie role is in "The House of Dr. Edwards" in which he plays a scene with Ingrid Bergman. "Every time she looked at me," Bill gulped, "I'd go blank!" He names Bergman as his Number One actreess.

"And my Number Two woman in the professional world," he said then, "is Gracie Allen. She is one of the sweetest, most charming people I know."

One of Bill's closest friends is Frank Sinatra, and the singer is one of his favorite subjects of conver-sation. "Frank has great charm and humility," he declared.

Delightful Family

In addition to telling us of his work and his friends, Goodwin waxed enthusiastic about his home and his family. His wife is a non-pro-fessional, and they have three children-Jill, four; Bill, two; and Lynn, eight months.

Goodwin is an enthusiastic rancher. "I love the country," he beamed.

"There is nothing to beat living in the country," he insists. But his exclusive air contract and fast-increasing screen assignments leave him limited time to enjoy country life.

"There's nothing to beat sitting around in your shirtsleeves on a warm summer night in the country." Recently he purchased a second ranch, of 677 acres, on which he plans to raise alfalfa.

Besides farming, he finds pleasure in flying and golfing. He has always liked night life and enjoys listening to good dance music, but he and his wife have curbed their night-clubbing since the children came.

His screen career further necessitates his following the "early to bed, early to rise" policy, particularly when the film is in technicolor and he has to report to the studio in the early morning hours to have his makeup applied. Having to don makeup is the thing he likes least about movie making, and he hopes to continue doing without it for black and white photography.

But for any such annoyances that screen acting involves, it also has its compensations—love scenes, for instance! "Mmmmm," beamed Bill, his eyes twinkling, "I like 'em!"

weighs 205 pounds—he has genial, intelligent features, brown hair and grey-blue eyes. He has the build of an ex-football player, but admits he only gets around to a little golf now and then.

The responsiveness of the radio public to the friendly personality he projects over the ether when he delivers the news is shown by the voluminous fan mail he receives. Much of it contains stories of tragedy and human life and much of it is highly amusing. One morning he announced that a 12 year old boy named Ray Clancy had sold the record high of \$5,300 worth of war bonds in a drive that was going on. His brother Jim, on a destroyer in the South Pacific, heard the broadcast. "You'll never know who's listening," remarked Sam. "That's why it's so important to make all the names clear."

Perhaps the most unique letter he has received was from a little girl six years old in Clarkston, Washington. She informed him the number of her years and that she tried to make Sam Hayes Pancakes for her grandmother, then said she



was sending him one and wanted his opinion—"do you think they are O.K.?" When he opened the letter out fell a half-dollar-sized pancake, very stiff, but unmistakably a pancake!

Unique Suggestion

The text of another choice note was! "This morning on your radio broadcast you told about a Dutch cheese being fired at a warship and busting the mainmast. It gave my husband a very bright idea for he suggested that I send my biscuits to Admiral Nimitz with the request that he try 'em on the Jap navy." This one was from a housewife in Morrow Bay.

Hayes has received much favorable comment for his airlane editorlalizing about kidnapping, especially on his broadcast about the Lindbergh kidnapping. It's almost a crusade with him. "I'd be the first to editorialize if it happened again," he said, "despite the usual practice of not editorializing in news broadcasts."

Has Fine Son

Sam has a 15-year-old son named Ron, who may or may not be following his father's footsteps. He has broadcast two commercials on the airlanes in place of his dad, both times brought in more requests for the model airplanes Sperry was giving away than Sam tallied up. Ron's bent is more toward aeronautical engineering, his father told us. He's an excellent draftsman and cartoonist and knows all the current airplane models.

In his spare time Sam plays golf and picks football winners with amazing accuracy. With Major Lyle Chapman he has devised a system of forecasting winning teams that is eighty-five per cent right. They achieve this amazingly high degree of accuracy by a system of mathematical formulas—every strength and weakness of every player is given a mathematical value. Hayes and Chapman have tabbed ninetyfive per cent of the Rose Bowl games correctly. They started the system in 1929, commercialized it in 1938. Chapman is the ideal teammate for teampicking, Hayes claims, He played football for Purdue and used to announce the football games for the West.

Biggest Thrill

Hayes claims the biggest thrill in the course of his radio career was doing on-the-spot broadcasting of the disastrous Long Beach earthquake in 1933. NBC wanted to correct the fantastic wild reports of casualties which were flooding the nation immediately after the catastrophe occurred. So Hayes was assigned to a 15-minute broadcast from the still unsettled ruins over the double network and all Canadian stations—next to the president's speeches the most widely broadcast program to that date.

Non-professionally speaking, Sam says his biggest thrill was a ride in a P-38. It seems the radio is removed from the cockpit, which is only built for one person, and the hardy soul who wishes to go along for the ride sits behind the pllot in sort of a piggy-back position. "Roaring through space at a speed of 500 or 600 miles an hour is some thrill," he recalls.

Back to his mail, one listener had evidently seen his picture, and acted upon his own initiative. He received a circular advertising the Richard Hair Restoring System, together with a note from the originator of the system: "T saw your picture and as your case is the type that can be restored I would advise you to take advantage of our two months offer for which we take the risk!"

A lady wrote about her pet rooster named Sam Hayes and a man told about a neighbor's Persian cat who daily plumped himself down in front of the radio as soon as his broadcast started, left as soon as it was over. Other people have written about using the sponsor's product, little rhymes and personal experiences.

Another listener wrote: "I heard you broadcast about a group of engineers that wouldn't work on anything that was known to be workable. I would like to have their addresses, as I have an idea that is plum crazy!"

A Mr. Anthony Problem

There was a woman who had four little dogs who lined up before the radio and listened to his broadcast every day. The time of the broadcast was changed and the lady begged him please to go back to the old time—she couldn't do a thing with her animals, for they were all mixed up and had completely lost their sense of timingt

N 1928, when Rudy Vallee was a young bandleader, broadcasting from a small independent radio station in New York, NBC's program board was called up on to decide whether he would be added to the network's

list of featured entertainers. Most members of the board were anti-crooner. There was, however, one woman on the board-Bertha Brainard, then eastern program head of NBC. It was she who swung the votes to Vallee.

"Being men," Miss Brainard said

to her fellow board members, "you don't understand what that boy has in his voice. Being a woman, I do!"

Rudy Vallee was the Frank Sinatra of the twenties. He fascinated the females. The night club at which he appeared was always crowded with women. They didn't dance. They merely sat and gazed at their idol, too hypnotized by his charm to speak---or squeal.

Theater managers reported that school girls arrived at the theaters where Vallee was singing, with cheir lunches under their arms, prepared to sit through three or more performances just to look at and listen to Rudy. When he appeared on the stage of the Palace in New York, women sitting in boxes and in the front rows, tossed orchids and corsages at him. They weren't called bobby-sockers in that era. They were "flappers."

Some said it was Vallee's "sex appeal" that attracted them. Others, including the late Heywood Broun,

came to the same conclusion that has been formed regarding Frank Sinatra's hypnotic effect upon women.

"Vallee," opined Broun, "appeals to the maternal instinct of all wom en.

The crooner himself, accepted this wholesale adulation with calm and quiet courtesy. "I'm not kidding my-self," Vallee said to one interviewer almost two decades ago. "I'm just a fad and this won't last. In a few years, I'll be just a memory."

Sidney Skolsky, writing of Vallee in 1929, reported that the Rudy of that day was ambitious to make a million and that his big fear was that he would be fat and bald at forty.

Still Going Strong

Today, at forty-three, Vallee re-tains his luxuriant head of curly brown hair, is a slim figure just recently out of uniform, and has returned to the airlanes with a show that he himself has heralded as something bigger and better than anything he has ever done.

He is recognized by all as a master showman. In the past decade, he has brought before the public such top-flight entertainers as Bergen & McCarthy, Bob Burns, Alice Faye, Frances Langford and Larry Adler, to name but a few. He brought his well-remembered Thursday evening radio revue to the ether waves for ten consecutive years under the (Please turn to Page 34)

FRIENDLINESS AND INFORMALITY prevail during the period preceding broadcasts when the program's performers and their studio audience get acquainted. Here, the Blue's "Scramby Amby" warmup culminated in a surprise treat for Perry Ward, when one of the show's contestants, Mrs. Rose Firth, presented him with a beautiful homemade cake. For the amusement of the folks out front, Ward gobbled it up greedily, went on the air with his face covered with crumbs. HE warmup is as important as the show," Art Linkletter has declared of NBC's "People Are Funny" broadcast which he emcess. That isn't always the case, perhaps, but to any program that is being presented before a live audience, the warmup is of considerable importance.

It serves in exactly the capacity the word implies. It "warms up" the audience. It is a period of informal entertainment presented just before broadcast time for the purpose of easing the audience into a relaxed and responsive mood.

Impromptu as they appear to be, warmups are set routines repeated at every broadcast of the programs, but because of the informality of the goings-on and the freedom of being off the air, almost anything can happen—and often does!

Recently, when Perry Ward was "warming up" the audience preparatory to presenting the Blue Network's "Scramby Amby" show, a woman who had been chosen to be one of the program's contestants stepped up to the stage carrying a big bundle.

"It's for you, Mr. Ward!" she beamed.

Perry tore the wrappings from it and, to his complete surprise, found a beautiful homemade cake! To the amusement of the folks out front, he stuffed his mouth full of it, and came to the microphone at air time with crumbs all over his face.

Uses Cake

With those words, the man (Art Fulton, the show's sound man) grabs the chalk and frantically fills in the final "X" while the audience howls.

CLEVER DIALECTICIAN, Sata Berner, trudges across stage, heaving a large heavy box. "Where are you going?" Sherman asks her. "I got a job of Lockheed," she replies. "Well, what's in the box" puzzles Ransom. "My lunch!" answers Sara. Sometimes, is stops at the mike to recite a Greek poem, introducing herself as "Miss Swishyakarkas." Rotund Arthur Q. A GOOD GAG is that one pulled by Art Linkletter, during the warmup of NBC's "People Are Funny" show. Art gets provoked and Murray runs off-stage toward the audience when the bucket's contents are tossed in his direction. The folks out front shriek and cringe for fear of being drenched, but paper llutters harmlessly from the pail. Mop bucket actually contained water, but wihout the audience's knowledge, Linkletter has switched pails.

same sponsorship, then emerged as an actor-comedian on the NBC Sealtest show with Joan Davis and the late John Barrymore, both of whom he brought back into prominence. A few months after Pearl Harbor, he enlisted in the United States Coast Guard, serving as a chief petty officer, then commissioned as a lieutenant. He is now on the inactive service list, enabling him to resume his spectacular career that started during his period of service in World War I.

In 1917, although only fifteen years old, Vallee was husky enough to fool the recruiting officers and he joined the Navy. It was while in the Navy that he first got his hands on a saxaphone.

After three months of service in the first World War, Rudy's true age was discovered and he was discharged. Returning to high school, he played the drums in the school band, and during vacations, rode his bike to Portland, Maine, fifteen miles away from his home, to hang around the big theaters. He finally got a job there and was soon able to purchase his own saxophone.

He still has it, in addition to an inexhaustible collection of souvenirs saved through the years of his spectacular success—momentoes of the college dances at which he played his saxophone and sang; of his trlp to London in 1924, when he attracted the attention of Edward, then Prince of Wales; of his first job in New York, a one-night 'engagement with Vincent Lopez at a benefit for the Hebrew Orphan Asylum on December 4, 1927; of Don Dickerman's Heigh-Ho Club, where he got his first big chance and where he made his American radio debut, giving birth to his famous, famillar greeting of "Heigh ho, everybody!" It was there that he started singing with a megaphone because he didn't consider himself any great shakes as a vocalist. It was there that NBC—and Bertha Brainard, speaking for her sex started him on his way to fame, fortune, and swooning female fans!

Girls Fainted

Once, two school girls, representing themselves as reporters, managed to get into Vallee's dressing room at the Brooklyn Paramount. One fainted dead away when Rudy smiled at her. The other girl, after shaking the crooner's hand, declared with an ecstatic gasp, "I'll never wash this hand as long as I live!"

On another occasion, Vallee was stopped for speeding over the Queensborough Bridge. A cop presented him with a ticket, but had reason to regret his hasty act for long afterwards. Because, he had given the irresistible Rudy a ticket, the policeman's fiancee terminated their engagement!

Vallee's fan mail zoomed to thousands of letters a day, accompanied by many gifts. In one day, he received over fifty boxes of fudge!

Labelled as "The Vagabond Lover," from the song and movie of the same name, Vallee found his name being linked romantically with almost every glamor girl on Broadway, including Lenore Ulric and Peggy Joyce. He was married for a short time to Mrs. Leonie Mc-Coy, but the union was annulled. Later, 'he met and married Fay Webb, daughter of the Santa Monica, California police chief. This marriage ended in divorce, but when Fay Webb was dying, Vallee dropped his work and flew to the coast to be with her. In 1943, Rudy married young Bettejane Greer. This romance also culminated in the divorce courts in July of this year, but as we go to press, Rudy and Bettejane have again announced their reconciliation.

Frequently during his crooning career, Vallee has been reported smitten with the charms of women not even known to him. His feminine admirers cherished the thought that he was searching desperately for the perfect woman.

One of his habits when singing was to close his eves.

"He's visualizing his ideal sweetheart," the girls used to whisper. Vallee's explanation was illusionshattering.

"The spotlight hurts my eyes," he said.

tual's "Quiz of Two Cities," uses a cake as a regular part of his routine warmup. He and announcer Tommy Dixon come on stage •before broadcast time bearing a birthday cake ablaze with some seventeen or eighteen candles. Picking out some likely-looking girl in the front row, they announce that it is the young lady's birthday and that they will honor it by singing "Happy Birthday" to her, which they promptly begin to do. Then Stu gets a further idea.

Before he's through, the innocent, bewildered young lady in the front row has been the blushing reciplent of a kiss from Wilson, Dixon, and every serviceman in the entire studio audience!

Another gag of Stu's is to have Dixon seated in the audience to be used as a stooge for his "magic" act. He calls Dixon, anonymously, to the stage, and asks for the beautiful silk tie he is wearing. Looking dubious, Dixon eventually parts with it and Wilson proceeds to perform his "trick." To Dixon's horror, he takes a pair of scissors and cuts the tie into little pieces. Then he places them carefully into a folded handkerchief.

With a smile, he says to the distressed Dixon, "You saw me cut it up, didn't you? Now, watch! I'll shake the handkerchief three times, and your tie will come out whole!"

11111

Whereupon, Wilson lets loose of one corner of the handkerchief, and of course the tie flutters to the floor —in a dozen pieces! It's an old gag, but the audience loves it!

The warmup gags often employ a "plant" in the audience—someone known to the performers, unknown to the onlookers. "Ukie," popular comic on NBC's "Kraft Music Hall," got his first break being the "plant" in the audience for Bing Crosby's warm-up patter.

The other afternoon, during Ransom Sherman's warm-up monologue preceding the Blue's early broadcast of "Nitwit Court," a young boy sauntered down the aisle and mounted the steps to the stage, nonchalantly walking past Sherman.

Gag Commercials

Sometimes the programs' commercials are clowned. Before CBS' "Burns and Allen" show takes the air, Bill Goodwin comes out on the stage and begins his Swan Soap sales talk. Orchestra conductor, Felix Mills, gives his men the downbeat and strikes up the band with some loud circus music. Bill mugs and mouths his words over the music, making motions of scrubbing his back and washing under his arms. The music stops just as Goodwin ends his routine with the words, "You can buy it at your grocery store."

On the quiz shows and audience participation programs much of the warmup time is utilized to explain the program's procedure to the audience. NBC's "Amos 'n' Andy" found that they, too, had some preliminary explaining to do. Charles Correll and Freeman Gosden do so many different voices on the famous comedy show that the comments of the amazed audience were drowning out their lines. Now they use their warmup time introducing all their various voices to the folks out front!
