Though neither Gloria nor Jane can recall working together before, they have been friends for years and their careers have paralleled one another's surprisingly. Both were born in England. Gloria calls herself an old Liverpuddlian, the name for those born in Liverpool. Jane's parents were Welsh and she admits that listening to "How Green Was My Valley" on "Lux" made her cry because it reminded her of her father. Both have been in this country for years, Jane since childhood, and Gloria proudly announced that she has voted in every election since becoming a citizen.

### Both Musical

Both studied music—Jane was a violin, piano and voice student, Gloria studied piano and voice. Both appeared in opera and musical comedy before switching to straight dramatics. Gloria's career encompassed tours that took her to every important European capital, and between them she and Jane have appeared with almost every great name in their lifetime. Jane was a Boston Opera Company star—"I've sung everything from 'Jack in the Beanstalk' to 'Carmen'," she added. In addition to opera, the concert stage, legitimate theater, resident stock, pictures and radio have claimed the talents of this pair, though never as a team until now. Both were working with the Henry Duffy players locally at the same time—but in different companies.

"I rem oer being rushed through the crowd waiting for me at the stage door and across the street to my hotel. People shouted, 'Here she comes!' when I came out!" recalled Jane.

"And the Stage Door Johnnies!" continued Gloria. "They don't have anything like that now."

Both agreed that the old days were much more exciting and glamorous because the barrier between players and audience was much greater. "The illusion is gone now, and after all, show business is the business of illusion," Jane sighed. "They've let the audience in on all the secrets," sald Gloria.

According to both our stars, radio is full of such talented young people as to be almost amazing. "Many of these young people are stars, great stars," they told us. "And so often they don't even get name credit on a show. It's ridiculous. If you went into a theater and they didn't give you a program, you'd be indignant."

Both are ardent hobbyists. Jane calls her new granddaughter, Mary Jane, and her garden, her two main interests. "I love to get into the earth and dig," she laughed. "And I can't wear gardening gloves—I buy them, put them on, they fall off and the next time I dig in the garden I dig one up."

## For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

### Ten Family Shows

Next time some radio critic claims there are no programs fit for family consumption, reach into your wallet and bring out this ammunition. It's a list of ten radio shows adjudged as best in exemplifying family living.

Making the award is the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, which conducted a nationwide poll. Points considered in voting were (1) Is the family true to life? (2) Is the family democratic recognizing the rights of others? (3) Does the family recognize God in its everyday living? (4) Is there a high moral tone to the program? (5) Is the sponsoring commercial in keeping with the best in family life? (6) Does the program make you want to have a better family life? (7) Is there a high type of humor? (8) Does the family show an interest in the community, the nation, and the world? (9) Is the home the center of security and strength? (10) Does the program portray the family as improving? Seven out of the ten points were considered essential to award.

These qualified: "Ozzle and Harriet," "Aldrich Family," "Date with Judy," "Greatest Story Ever Told," "Life Can Be Beautiful," "Ma Perkins," "Mayor of the Town," "One Man's Family," and "Pepper Young's Family."

### Meat or Poison

We see where designers of the new "Golden Rocket" streamliner are planning sound equipment designed to give travelers recorded music with their meals and broadcasts with their gin rummy. Several speakers are going to be installed in car ceilings, each speaker controlled with a conical amplifier that "will limit the sound to the area of the car immediately below." ### "The General Mills Hour"

To hear or not to hear a radio serial regularly, that is the question. Personally, we're not long ourselves by the sides of the Helen Trents, the Ma Perkinses and the Evelyn Winters, anguishedly wringing our hands for a happy ending. We know, from too many years of the same, that there'll be one.

But, from ten to eleven every ayem on NBC, we're fairly staunch earlenders to the troubles of the folks on "The General Mills Hour," a serles of four programs including "Today's Children," "Woman in White," "Masquerade," and the Biblical "Light of the World." If we must have radio serials (and since there are so many, we apparently must) a collection of such good radio serials is certainly the desired end. We like the sensible scripting, the swallowable situations, and the expert acting which goes into each quarter of this time. There are enough people experiencing enough widely diversified problems to keep the action interesting throughout the weeks, whether you're a fan or not. The stories are not fantastic constructions of what might happen, but careful observations of what does happen to ordinary folks, even as you and I.

Particularly commendable is the fourth of the series, "The Light of the World," which sympathetically and reverently dramatizes the story of Man's Great Comforter from Genesis to Revelations.

That a lot of good money and good streamlining time have been put into every portion of this package is evidenced, not only by the excellently planned and announced commercial messages, but by the consistent casting of the best, and naturally highest-paid, talent in AFRA. The entire four-way production, to say the least, is to us a refreshing change from the "Road of Life" and "Life Can Be Beautiful" hash-ups which flank it fore and aft.

### "Ethel and Albert"

We hear so many uncomfortable digs these days about the mishaps of matrimony, the folks who "wish they were single again," that it's downright rejuvenating to drop in each day for a radio look-see at "The Private Lives of Ethel and Albert."

marriage can be fun, with two of the right people, this grand little program continues to prove it! Ethel and Albert are so absolutely actual that we have to chuckle at ourselves in our own married lives, all over again. Their ridiculous little spats, their wonderful beliefs in each other, their harried, but so-familiar "situations." are as natural as a walk-out the door As "Ethel," Peg Lynch acts with true womanly intuition; as "Albert," Allan Bunce is convincingly "just like a man," Small offspring "Susie" is far from a problem child, but! as lively as they come; turning her oatmeal bowl upside down, sugar, cream, cereal and all, at the start of each unmonotonous day. Slapstick, however, graciously omits itself from the picture, either in incident or interpretation.

Scripter as well as star, Miss Lynch has created a delightful unbroken trend of dialogue for each day's intimate and happily inspired visit. There are no "listen tomorrow and see what happens" danglings, each episode being a compact little story in itself, on your ABC dial each Monday through Friday, 1:45 p.m.

Thrifty Drug Store's noisily "cut-rate" commercials are a slightly startling contrast, but not objection-ably so. If you're looking for some-thing simple, sweet and not too frilly in daytime entertainment, we think you'll like the entire ensemble.

### Johnny Modero"

All who deplored the passing of the old Pat Novak from the radio scene will be glad to know Jack Webb is again with us in the person of toughcracking "Johnny Modero," whose own description of his boathouse habitat we'll borrow. "It's a boathouse on the outside, but it's on the inside I make my money. People come in the back door . . . go out the same way. Sometimes they tell me their names and sometimes they don't, and sometimes they pay me . . . sometimes not. A set of morals down here at Pier 23 causes as much stir as Mother's Day at an orphanage."

All through Johnny's almost laconic narrative of his fast.moving adventures with the near-underworld he does jobs for, you feel the old Dick Breen influence. Herb Marolis and Louis Markeim, writers of the new Webb show, have done a beautiful job with the story idea suggested by Breen, and the use of high-powered similes goes merrily on. We won't try quotes. "Smooth as a set of ball bearings in mayonnaise," in writing, without the advantage of that won-derful Webb voice, isn't particularly impressive.

Johnny does have one friend in the new scripts. This one is "Dippo," of whom Johnny says, "'Dippo' used to be a doctor, and a good one, until he started trying to beat the income tax

rap by listing liquor as a dependent." But "Dippo" does the telephoning and police-file-checking that provide Johnny with fast right answers, and save him, each Wednesday night, from the respective hands of police and thugs ... in the very nick of time.

Some Wednesday soon put the children to bed a half hour early (the show is not for them) and turn your dial to KHJ at 8:30 p.m. You'll like "Johnny Modero, Pier 23."

### Cleanups to Cutoffs

The facts, fancies and fallacies that comprise "Woman's World" daily at 10:30 a.m. over KXLA are announced as being "an information program for the homemaker." Bob and Marian Lee jointly emcee the half-hour of facts from which many outside the realm of homemaking can certainly glean a worthy idea or two.

Under the guise of musical inter-vals, a series of organ melodies slips across ideas pertaining to spring, love, the weather, etc., that Marian skilfully adopts for feminine fare. Spring naturally suggests housecleaning, and Marian couples both with a tip that if we wear our low heels and girdles while we scrub and bend, we'll feel much better later. And bend your knees, not your back, when lifting. Tint your starch when freshening a colored article. For the recalcitrants to whom just cleanliness holds no appeal, Marian points out that dirt and grime will rot your house away. It becomes apparent too late for objection that Oakite claims responsibility not only for this portion of the show, but for all the good results of your housecleaning efforts.

Arthur Murray's sponsorship is re-sponsible for the "Teen-Age Page" that suggests Junior's early yen to shave is easily satisfied with a mild shave stick that will also keep his face much, much cleaner than the single daily scrubbing he may be coerced into. The "Page" also suggests, of course, that Junior and his pals will take on added grace after a few Saturday afternoons at Arthur Murray's, learning to dance.

To many of us, the idea of cutting off slacks, grown too short through repeated cleanings into pedal pushers or shorts, might not have occurred. Or of making "dickies" out of blouses whose sleeves have gone.-

The half hour "Woman's World" doesn't pretend to be the answer to banishing drudgery forever, but tune in to Bob and Marian some a.m. during your work and see if you don't come away with at least one laborsaving device. The show's chuck full of good ideas.

### Putting It Briefly

Have you ever wished desperately you were a luckier person? Our own desire spins the web of our destinies. Or so Anacin would lead us to believe when it presents "Real Stories from Real Life" five nights a week over KHJ at 6:15.

Last Tuesday night the story they

borrowed from "real life" concerned a greedy young man, Allen, who thought to expedite his good fortune by murdering his kindly and wealthy uncle and laying the blame on his hapless brother, Jim. Jim was a mys-tery writer, and had evolved a plot wherein the victim dies as a result of a poisoned cigarette. Allen simply adopts this idea (hoping Jim will be blamed) and does poison uncle, only to discover uncle didn't really smoke the cigarette, he just had a heart attack from which he will recover nice-Allen, in his nervousness, picks lv. up, lights and inhales deeply from a cigarette on uncle's desk. Too late he realizes he's been trapped by fate. He's enjoying one of the poisoned cigarettes! He labors out a confes-sion to Jim and dies repenting his wickeaness.

That idea is certainly as good a twist as we've heard on some of the big mystery thrillers that win such acclaim from 'their avid followers. Our only complaint about the show is that fifteen minutes just simply doesn't hold enough dialogue to establish its characterizations with any force, nor to make it at all suspenseful

You who don't have a favorite tough-guy delivery you dial for, or an interest in the similes some of our mystery shows provide, will like this capsule. But we kind of hate to scratch around our radio dial right at the dinner hour to be rewarded with a fast fifteen minutes. Wish they'd spin it out to a half hour once a week, or twice a week, rather than half a show twice as often.

### "Those Websters"

It kinda makes us jittery when an emphatic announcer states "We now present the adventures of a typical American family." Even sugar-coat. ed, it's a bitter pill to gulp when we're next dosed with enough fantas. tic, frantic adventures to make "typical" seem a term for folks with perpetual twitches and twelve extra legs.

But we breathe easily when it's time for Mutual's brand of "typicals," a breezy bunch of characters who re-side in Spring City and call them-selves "Those Websters." Lots happens to them, but it's all normal. And it's likewise good scrubbed fun.

"Dad" (Willard Waterman) is a reassuring sort of chap who has his dif. ficulties, but who studiously avoids stumbling through them with a series of rattling moans and mad slappings of the brow. "Mom" (Connie Crowder) keeps her hands quietly folded in her lap, speaks in gentle "excellent thing in woman" tones, and straightens bent situations with patient, firm humor. Young folks "Blfl," "Belinda" and "Jeep" are delightfully played by Gil Stratton, Jr., Jane Webb and Jerry Spellman.

Frank and Doris Hursley serve a delicious type of script, basically sensible and wholesome, but garnished with enough paprika and parsley to maintain the appetite. The unusual selection of producer Joe Ainsley in both support-casting and background effects is in fine evidence.

We even like the commercials, which are concise and, to a\_degree, compelling, attesting to the selling skill of a better-than-average\_copywriter.

Matter of fact, we wouldn't be leery of having "Those Websters" as nextdoor neighbors at all, and don't think you would either, soon as you get ac-quainted, around about 2:00 p.m. on KHJ every Sunday!



### More Grime

Merely to evaluate its listener appeal, we exposed ourselves again the other evening to thirty more minutes of microphone crime, this time under two diverse format guises. One ("Warden's Crime Cases," KHJ-Don Lee, Tuesday, 7:00 p.m.) carries the customary "Crime Does Not Pay" message through the dramatized plights of criminals who have been caught, while the other ("Special Investigator," KHJ-Don Lee, Tuesday, 7:15 p.m.) warns the public of frauds.

Both of these are messages worthy of listener attention—but both are de-livered in a manner we think is lacking in entertainment and effect.

The first, for instance, recently related the tale of two illiterate-tongued thugs who aspired to the headlined fame of a Dillinger, so when they held up a subway station attendant to obtain a loot of nickels, they killed him for good measure. Then they whiled away their time buying (with nickels) all the newspapers that carried glaring accounts of the "subway slaying," and playing (with nickels) the slot machine at a nearby corner pub. All this activity, of course, was (Continued on Next Page)

like leaving a trail of breadcrumbs for the police, who followed it sternly, straight to the thugs' apartment, which they found littered with scrapbooks of the nickel killers' press clippings.

So these two were shown that crime does not pay—supposedly. (Personally, we were left with the impression that they would never learn anything. And certainly this program did nothing toward proving to its listeners that crime doesn't pay. Anyone with tendencies toward defying law and order who heard this would only smirk at its absurdity.

Nevertheless the program's foreword states that the cases heard on the show come from the actual files of the late Lewis E. Lawes, former warden of Sing-Sing Prison. It is too bad, if they are to be brought before the public at all, that they are not presented in a far more intelligently contrived documentary manner that would not make a mockery of their message — that crime, indeed, does not pay.

The same criticism can be applied to the second program, "Special Investigator." Instead of treating its worthwhile subject matter, public frauds, in a manner to command dialers' respectful attention, its presentation is no more than another uninspired "dumb crook" skit that relegates the fraud manipulation into the background while the dialogue cent-



ers chiefly around two competitive crooks out to get into the same racket and ply goodies on the same girl.

What sounds more promising is the show's offer of a free booklet called "Is It a Fraud?" We assume its contents *must* be more informative than the show.

"Twenty-eight," the contestant replied.

"I'm sorry, you're wrong," answered the quizmaster. "It would be twentyseven minutes—three for each round (21) and six for one-minute intermission between each round."

The contestant wanted that \$50 and how! He was fast with his protest. "According to the rules," he glibly but firmly ventured, "if a technical knockout is scored, the loser's seconds are granted one minute in which to decide whether or not they'll throw in the towel. That would make it twenty-eight minutes."

### Finnegan's Advice

Guess Charlie Cantor does such a convincing job of acting as dumb "Clifton Finnegan" on "Duffy's Tavern" that we've never thought of him as being a platform speaker. That's why we raised an interested eyebrow the other day when Charlie consented to speak for the combined radio and drama classes of Beverly Hills High School.

Promptly, we dispatched our spy to see how Charlie would make out.

"Those of you who have listened to 'Finnegan' may be surprised that I can talk," he explained. "I didn't make any notes because you know I can't write."

Charlie then turned serious—mostly about the serious side of comedy. "It's important to get an approximation early—of your acting ability. You must have a natural tendency. Either you have the makings of an actor, or you haven't," he declared.

"If you do have ability," he continued, "try to get as much experience as you can. Get up in front of an audience and see how they react. That way you learn timing, a most important factor, especially in comedy. Drive yourself and work, work, work!"

Charlie admitted that present-day opportunities for experience were limited compared to old vaudeville days and suggested that summer hotels might be likely proving grounds.

"Radio auditions are murder," the comedian confessed. "You may be three times as good as the fellow who gets the part. Don't be discouraged if you don't hit the jackpot the first time. It may simply mean that your voice didn't fit the particular part they had in mind." To Charlie's way of thinking, the best way to begin in radio is to get a job at a small station, glean all the experience you can before even setting foot inside a big station.

Perhaps one of the speaker's best tips was this: "After you've taken your audition, contact your people once a month—drop a little note or drop around. But be tactful and avoid making a nuisance of yourself."

They didn't act as if they'd completed a 33,000-mile tour of the Far East—they didn't until they gloated over the menu and with gleams in their eyes ordered eggs and grapefruit, coffee and cinnamon toast. You see, all the novelty of sitting down, ordering, and

being able to eat what they ordered hadn't worn off, for while the Winters were following their important itinerary (November, 1946 to March, 1947) they became inured to bread with bugs in it, rotten eggs, and other distressing culinary items which make us sick to think about and would have made the Winters quite ill had they partaken thereof.

Your Radio Life reporter decided to feast on what the Winters had to say (yielding only to the extent of a waffle and black coffee) for we felt seriously commissioned to make the most of this breakfast conference. Reason No. 1: You readers had been so insistent of late on discovering the whereabouts of former CBS commentator William Winter, and No. 2: both Mr. and Mrs. Winter had so much to tell (two hours went like wildfire).

TO BRING YOU UP TO DATE: After broadcasting via shortwave in 1941 to Japan, Chinà, and other countries where Jap anti-American propaganda needed answering, Winter became a target for enemy programs. Radio Tokyo cooked up one called "Winter Goes to Bat" and Radio Hsinking whipped up another called "Winter Goes to Bat" and Radio Hsinking whipped up another called "William Winter Talks Nonsense." Just before the war ended, one Jap radio station presented a playlet in which three characters died and went to heaven, but were refused admittance because of their sins. The three culprits were: Churchill, Roosevelt, and William Winter.

In the summer of 1944, Winter, who had by now been broadcasting to Australia in response to MacArthur's request, made a tour to the Pacific as a war correspondent and it was during this time that the idea germinated for the comprehensive trip just com-pleted by Winter and wife Celia. The idea, briefly, was to visit the Far East in an effort to learn more about the people and their customs, to record as much of the life as possible, and by playing of such records, to promote a fuller understanding between our country and those of the Far East. To enable themselves to equip such an expedition, the Winters sold their home, car, and practically every other personal possession. Their equipment weighed 1100 pounds.

As Mr. and Mrs. Winter tackled their fine American breakfast, their conversation assumed the aspects of

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a thunderstorm—a brilliant flash of lightning comment here, an ominous rumble of studied criticism there—a bolt on another topic miles away, but all closely identified with the stormy problem of one world. Not one world in a political sense, for their safari was not initiated with this objective, but one world in the sense that we're all people and we're all very much alike, and that if we can be brought to realize this fact, we'll be able to unlock the door to peace.

"We went into many strange homes," smiled Celia Winter. "Their chairs were different from ours, their method of cooking was different. But they do and like the same things we do. The man goes to work in the morning, the woman cares for the home and children. In the evening, the family visits friends."

"They all want to come to America," Winter volunteered. "Far Eastern people think every American is a millionaire. The basis for this is largely the movies. Hollywood has done a poor job of interpreting Americans. And the distortion of American life by the movies makes it more difficult for other peoples to understand us."

AMERICAN PRESTIGE, according to the Winters, is at a very low ebb and the Japanese propaganda, "Asia for the Asiatics", has made a very deep impression. "The Japs", continued Winter, "may actually have won the war on this ideology. Signs of a Pan-Asiatic movement are evident and there is great resentment of the white man. What we need in the Orient," he went on, "is a common policy of all Western Nations."

Winter pointed out the Far East's common problem, caused by most of the farmers being share-croppers, unable to buy land and becoming entangled in a vicious cycle of borrowing at usurious rates because sixty to eighty per cent of what they produce is taken as rental. This, supplemented by war devastation of manufacturing plants, brings about economic unrest, a sure-fire foundation for political unrest. "We need the UNO to say it'll help," explained Winter, "by sending officials to supervise administration of funds earmarked for expenditure in these countries. This

would give the people a chance to rebuild their own economy."

The war, Winter pointed out further, has made many peoples dis-satisfied because they've seen trucks, jeeps, and other modern equipment and they want these aids for themselves. Szechwan Province in China, the commentator said, had never seen a wheel until 1924, but now wants to live in the airplane era.

WE'RE NOT UTILIZING RADIO to promote understanding, the Winters believe. They'd like to see public address systems installed in Far Eastern towns and villages, with a constant stream of information flowing into the minds of the natives.

The Winter recordings, which are "man-on-the-street" interviews with peoples in the Pacific, constitute a five-a-week, half-year series under the title, "This Is Your World," to be made available for sponsorship by Teleways Radio Productions of Hollywood.

Explained Winter: "The U. S. is probably the only country where public opinion is the strongest factor in determining policies. We hope by giving our information in sugar-coated doses, the average American will learn about his neighbors. Although American prestige is at low ebb, it's still higher than that of any other na-tion. It will remain so, because other peoples want the things we have.

THE WINTERS NOW HOPE to interpret European life and customs via recordings. We hope they have good luck selling their series. They didn't mention it, but someone close to the couple said they'd spent \$12,000 on their Pacific tour.

His Own Words Concerning "Ham Radio on Each End of the Set" Leave Out a Story of Winning Against the Odds ....

N THE EARLY 1920's, in Athens, Ohio, an eight-yearold boy named Frank Bingman could be found any day after school, poking amid the local telephone company's trash heap in search of old condensers, coils, resistors—any old parts. This conjures to mind the picture of an owl-eyed little genius peering from behind thick-lensed glasses, and dealing in electronics and physics terms frightening to the layman.

Not a bit of it. The good-looking six-footer who today can be heard announcing the Joan Davis show was as cheerful, regular a guy then as he is now, and retains these interests and ambitions that led him through some tough times to a pleasant and remunerative position. And, if we can predicate Mr. Bingman's future on his present successes in the face of odds, a still better spot awaits him in the radio sun.

The "odds" Frank experienced in his climb were the result of that period in the 30's when a frightening thing called a "bank moraforium" existed, but Frank blandly explained it away as though it were the most natural beginning in the world.

"As long as I couldn't go away to school, I applied for a scholarship at a dramatic school in New York. I had to be on the spot to audition for it, so I hitchhiked to New York to look around." The statement doesn't explain that, armed with only twentyfive dollars and lots of ambition, he made the trek in four days, and through a completely unprepared-for audition won the coveted scholarship to Feagin School of Dramatics. The training and experience he garnered here as a result of the cooperative system in which all school members designed and built their own sets, made their own costumes and staged their own productions, put him in line for still another scholarship. This one was from the Schuster-Martin School in his home city, Cincinnati. Things happened fast back in Ohio. Frank met a pretty ballet student at the school. He also landed one part after another doing soap operas and announcing spots. So within two years he and the ballet student were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bingman, both working in radio, she as the very first girl "disc jockey". That was a relatively unknown term then. So started their pennysaving for the move to the legendary land of opportunity, California.

The film city treated Frank kindly, and consistent radio listeners could hear him on such network topnotchers as "Abbott and Costello", the Ginny Simms show, "Great Gildersleeve", "Maxwell House", and the Jack Benny show.

### Long Service

In 1942 Frank volunteered for service in the Army, and a happy combination of ability, previous training and luck landed him in the radar division of the civilian employees for nine months of study. The following years saw him in combat duty in BACK IN CIVVIES and way out of that dollar-a-word class now, Frank fronts the Joan Davis show as announcer. (Robert Perkins Photo.)

Pacific invasions, and it wasn't until December in 1945 that he was honorably discharged with several decorations and the rank of technical sergeant. It was on his return to his home in Hollywood that he first saw his son, Bruce Michael, a chubby youngster of thirteen months, who had inherited his father's blue eyes and black hair.

Back on radio row, FTank tackled free lance work again until he was selected by a panel of listeners, who were looking for a new voice, to announce the Joan Davis show. To this he's added the announcing job on "Hollywood Players". And until about a year ago, his was the voice that said, "CRESTA...BLAN-CA", that wine company's tuneful trademark.

But on the side, the boy who once poked about in a trash heap for materials now has the unlimited possibilities of war surplus outlets to enjoy, and is happily back at building his own radio sets. As Frank puts it . . . "ham at both ends of radio now". He has even persuaded Mrs. Bingman to study with him for their amateur licenses. Probably her acquiescence was a fair trade for his having built the turntable Mrs. Bingman uses in playing the records for her junior ballet or dramatics classes in the kindergarten school that occupies a good share of her time.

"Tandelayo," as her name must imply, is a little giddy, a little gig-gly. Inclined to see the world through rose-colored glasses any-way, Helen turns on the giggles as quickly as a thirsty man does a pump.

Too, "Tandelayo" is the sweetheart of "Schlepperman," featured comedian on the show. And that Helen, as Mrs. Sam Hearn, has been for more than twenty years.

She met Sam when both were playing in the 19<sup>1</sup>6 Schubert revue,



"The Blue Paradise." That was quite some time before Jack Benny dis-covered the "Schlepperman" in Sam, even before his famed rube character that made him a stage star. He was billed as a Dutch comedian in "Paradise" and Helen as a prima donna.

Helen Eley had had what was then called the theater bug ever since she could remember. Her mother was Belle Nicholson, a singing star of her day. At fifteen Helen started running away from home to go on the stage and by the time she was seventeen had made the grade, via a manicuring route. One of her patrons was a friend of Marle Dress-ler and arranged an audition with the famous comedienne.

That resulted in a small part in "Tillie's Nightmare." From then on it was a steady climb into featured roles, stardom in Broadway revues and a vaudeville company all her own. She and Sam were on many bills together. including "Marry Me," bills together, including "Marry Me, which he authored.

Into Practice on His Musical Disc Program Goes Don Otis' Philosophy of "Trying to Do Whatever You're Doing Better Than Anyone Else"

S HE a successful young business executive?" you'll say when he walks into the room. "Or is he a veteran entertainer?", you'll ask

when he begins to talk to you about show business with such complete understanding and enthusiasm. He's neither, in a way, and yet he's both, for he's Don Otis, KHJ music man who is now writer, producer, and announcer of his own daily musical half hour, "Music with a Smile."

Don has been both executive and entertainer in his day—and good at both—but the second part of one's first impression comes a lot closer to the real Don Otis, for ever since his very first job—as an usher in the Million Dollar Theater in Los Angeles—he has never earned his living in a way that was not connected with the entertainment world.

It was while young Otis was still attending Hollywood High School in the mornings and working in the afternoons, that he grew to know some of the actors and musicians who were "greats", and it was then that he began to nurse a love of honest-to-goodness well-executed entertainment.

### Strive for Perfection

One of those people he met was Rube Wolf, a brother of Fanchon and Marco and "a real showman", says Don. It was Wolf who first impressed upon him the importance of aiming for perfection in show business, "trying to do whatever you're doing better than anyone else"

Since then, when Don held hopes of becoming a singer, he's done everything from singing in theater lobbies to radio program directing, but he's always applied Rube Wolf's advice to whatever his job. On his "Music with a Smile" show, he tries to make more than just an ordinary platter stint out of a recorded music program. Featuring light classical and musical comedy favorites, "Music with a Smile" is one of the few record shows that is entirely scripted and carefully cued in advance. Don chooses the music himself, often from his own extensive record collection, and preserves a continuity of artistry and musical quality that makes it much more like a "live" broadcast than a recorded one.

With the original intention of becoming a singer, Don hopped a freight train for Chicago one day after his graduation from high school. He'd come a long way from that first trip "riding the rails" when a couple of years ago he went back to Chicago as the transcription manager of a popular record company, this time via Constellation with accommodations at one of the Windy City's finest hotels. But it was on that first trip that he met Belle Baker, one of the greatest female interpreters of song at that time.

"Miss Baker was probably as great an influence on me as any of the show people I met," explains Don, "for she taught me the value of interpretation in song, and since I realized that I'd never have a really great voice, I put my energies into interpretation."

It was through singing that Don found his way into radio. One day in Chicago his voice first went out over the airwaves—his singing voice. Finding himself with seventeen cents to his name, Don went down to WBBM to ask for an audition and was put on the air that same day to fill in a short show with a few songs. The ten dollars he earned went for a bus ticket to Detroit and it was there that he landed his first steady singing job.

"Those were the days," says Don, trying unconvincingly to sound like an old man, "when in theater lobbies they used to sell sheet music of the

feature songs from the film inside. I used to sing the songs while a girl sold sheet music copies."

### Turns Emcee

When Don finally came back to California in 1930, he worked as a singer in a small night club where there was a remote pick-up for one of the local stations. One night when the announcer failed to show up, Don took over his job, and that was the end of his singing and the beginning of his emcee career.

Since then Don's been in and out of the performing end of radio several times. After thirteen years as an announcer, during which he emceed remote pick-ups from the old Cotton Club "where those great colored bands used to play", he became program director of KMPC. He was soon putting in requests, though, for a radio show in addition to his directorial duties, "just to keep my hand in". He finally gave up program directing completely to devote full time to his platter shows.

A couple of years later he gave "Mahogany Row" another whirl when he became program director and manager of the transcription division for Capitol Records. But even in this ideal set-up, the call of the mike was still too strong for Otis, and when he went back on the air the next time, it was with four shows a day!

Don realizes that he's been happiest of all when actually taking part in the entertainment itself. Today, with a chance to put his "entertainment above all" theory into effect on "Music with a Smile", Don can wish for little else except a few more shows that will please the listeners as much as this one does. That plus the night-club he hopes some day to own and operate. It will feature a "different" style of entertainment, he promises, but as for what the style is to be, he'll only tell you, "That's my secret!" ROM the standpoint of production," producer Bill Lawrence affirmed, "our show is probably about the easiest on the air. All of us have worked together for years so that preparing each week's program presents few difficulties. I believe in short rehearsals. If a performer goes on the air a little nervous and selfconscious, he gives a livelier, more spontaneous performance. As a re-

sult, we merely have a reading on Friday, do a 'dress' rehearsal on Monday, and are on the air. Why, Johnny Schneller, our engineer, and Harry Essman, our sound man, sometimes don't even see a script until the 'dress', and Bill Hatch, our musical conductor, never needs to have a cue thrown at him. Each of them knows the show and his job so well.

"Another thing," producer Lawrence went on to explain, "we try to keep 'Screen Guild' simple, because I don't believe the listener is concerned with complicated production technique. He simply wants a story entertainingly told to him. We have a preference for light comedy and love stories; we avoid doing action dramas which definitely require a visual interpretation. I read about fifteen movie scripts a week, and have to hear them as I read them.

"We also like to allow a performer freedom at the microphone, permitting him to be in motion while speaking his lines. It lends variance and naturalness to his portrayal.

"Our only problem," concluded the producer, "is securing the right stories at the right time, and catchwhen KATHARINE HEPBURN showed up for a "Screen Guild" broadcast in slacks, her co-stars, Cary Grant and Jimmy Stewart, surprised her by donning girls' skirts.

ing the stars when they're not steeped in crowded picture production schedules."

As to the ticklish task of adapting full-length motion picture scripts into twenty-odd moments of airtime, this is the weekly undertaking of "Screen Guild" scripter Harry Kronman, who has been performing it successfully since 1943.

We talked with the writer about this phase of the "Screen Guild Players" series.

### Best Ones Hardest

"Every picture," he pointed out, "presents a different problem. It isn't just a question of cutting the script down, but of blending it into a different whole, of writing entirely new scenes, sometimes altering the ending completely to make it more suitable to radio. The better the script is, the more difficult it is to adapt. With a bad script, we can dispense with its inferior parts and draw from it the best that is in it. But a good script has a story line so expertly interwoven that slicing it up becomes an extremely delicate operation.

"We also have to remember," he reminded us, "the stars who are to do the play. In some instances, they are not the ones who originally performed in the picture, so that their particular style and manner of delivery must be kept in mind. This scripting assignment," he smiled, "is certainly not monotonous. One week, we are working with comedy, another week with drama, one week with Charles Boyer, another with Jack Benny.

"After twelve years or so of work-(Please Turn to Page 39)

ing in Hollywood," he went on, "we also are aware of each star's preferences and idiosyncrasies. For instance, some are embarrassed to do romantic dialogues at a microphone, others love to do it. We try to prepare our scripts in regard to these things, too."

His working schedule, scripter Kronman informed us, runs somewhat as follows: "Read the original picture script, analyze it, mull over it, make a working outline, decide on the first act climax and the ending, then make it a whole, and work in collaboration with Bill (producer Lawrence) on last-minute changes right up until airtime."

"Screen Gulld Players'" musical conductor, Bill Hatch, meanwhile works out the program's score. For a single show, he may turn out as many as sixteen to twenty musical pieces of varying length that will occupy finally a mere five to ten minutes of airtime. But their function is vital and indispensable. for it is the music that establishes and enhances the mood and the theme of every presentation. The twel. On fifteen seconds of music that precedes the drama at the start of the show, for instance, must convey in less than a minute's time the atmosphere of the forthcoming offering.

Having created musical backgrounds for Hollywood radio productions for the past twó decades, Bill Hatch is well qualified to perform so skilfully the scoring tasks on this top weekly air offering, and estimates his working time on the assignment as four to five hours to score what he terms an "easy" program, fourteen to sixteen hours to score a "hard" one, and four to five hours to work out the orchestrations.

In charge of securing the stories and talent for the "Screen Guild" airings are Mr. Huntly Gordon and Mrs. Jane Thompson, of Motion Picture Relief. The stars appearing on the program and the stories used are donated to the Motion Picture Relief Fund.

### **Conduct Search**

"Sometimes," Mrs. Thompson explained to us, "although the studios have given us the stories, we find the radio rights are owned elsewhere, and our job then is to track down the author, or the author's heirs, or whoever is able to give us permission to broadcast the story."

To obtain still a few more sidelights on the production of this top Hollywood airshow, we turned finally to script secretary Claire Warnes, who is on hand for its every broadcast.

"Stars who appear on the program are often nervous," she told us, "but Bill has a way of drawing exactly what he wants out of them in a minimum of time. And their nervousness seldom is evidenced on the air. Alice Faye once fainted, for instance, and Susan Hayward's throat became so dry that it prevented her from speaking—but neither of these calamities occurred until after the play. It's that old 'show must go on spirit. Until the show is over, the performers know that nothing can go wrong, because it simply mustn't."

Asked to divulge a few anecdotes gathered in the many weeks she has observed the "Screen Guild Players" from her advantageous position at producer Lawrence's elbow in the control booth, Miss Warnes called to mind a few items.

"When Betty Hutton appeared on the show, he, extreme vitality actually had the audience on the edge of their seats. We've never seen the theater become so electrically charged. It was amazing.

"'Fibber and Molly' are so genuine and 'folksy' that someone aptly commented that they looked exactly like two people standing in line for tickets.

"Robert Young is wonderful to us. So many times, he has stepped in at the last minute, to replace an actor unable to come."

### Incongruous

"When Jane Wyman, doing 'The Yearling', was reading lines in the script, expressing great 'excitement over some black alpaca that her husband had brought home to her, we couldn't help but laugh in the control booth. On the air it was convincing, but to us it appeared pretty incongruous hearing her rave over some old black alpaca when she was standing on the stage elegantly draped in black sequins!

"Katharine Hepburn was pretty nervous about her microphone appearance in 'Philadelphia Story,' but just before the broadcast she gave a pep talk to her co-stars, Jimmy Stewart and Cary Grant, with the exclamation, 'Here we are—three middle-aged single people. We just becter be good!'"

with him three years and was the first girl to sing the ballad, "You Made Me Love You."

"There was a performer!" she says admiringly. "What audience today would wait four or flve hours in a theater for a star who had missed a train? They did for Jolson one time. Finally, up the aisle from the front he ran, threw his hat on the stage and began to sing."

How Helen got the role of "Tandelayo" is pretty much a repeat performance of that seventeen-year-old manicurist. This break came via her efforts as a housewife.

For the first six months of "The Kenny Baker Show," Helen had been a most faithful critic's panel of one, listening to the program with two ears and a big heart. Often she was consulted on affairs of state because of her showman's instinct. On this one thing, however, she was never consulted. She was told.

Kenny Baker and the show's producer, Ken Burton, were up at the Hearns' one evening discussing the new character, "Tandelayo," which, with its two previous characterizations, just hadn't jelled. As "Schlepperman's" sweetheart, "Tandelayo" was to be no Hedy Lamarr. On the other hand, she was to be no caricature. but a real natural comedy character.

Silence had resulted for a moment and it was then that Mrs. Hearn, housewife, entered the living room with coffee and cake, Immediately the silence was broken with laughter.

For Helen Eley Hearn never just enters a room—she makes an entrance. In the first place she is a colorful person physically, with her short red curly hair, brown eyes that sparkle and the freckles of a little girl. Another plus is her gracefulness from a whole lifetime of stage training. Then there's an infectious laugh that punctuates every statement. Nearly everything she says, too, comes out funny.

The three men looked at each other.

"You're "Tandelayo,' " said producer Burton.

There was no pseudo embarrassment. No hemming and hawing on Helen's part. Her eyes widened and she fell to a chair. "Gee," she said.

She was still saying "gee" a few days later as she made her radio debut. Although she occasionally read her speeches a little hurriedly, she got through without a fluff and never missed a cue. From then on her radio appearances have been relatively easy for her.
