JOHN SCOTT TROTTER, well-known chef, antique dealer and man of music, was practically en route to New York the day we met him, for an interview. Congenial Trotter is a sparkling conversationalist and the fact that he had a coming Bing show and his packing still to attend to didn't dampen his spirit a bit.

Keeping four shows ahead on Bing's transcribed series keeps John hopping, so we welcomed the chance to find out just what music problems face the maestro of a recorded commercial show.



Men of Music

No. 36 of a Series

John Scott Trotter

Arranger, Composer, a Fine Cook, a Dealer in Rare Antiques, but First And Foremost Bing's Man of Music

"Well, there's more work on a transcribed series for everyone involved," John averred. "We're really just getting out of the experimental stage. Remember we jumped right into this thing on very short notice and had to pioneer it as we went along. We were on the air before we knew it!" he said, speaking of the early part of the Crosby series. "We've learned a great deal this past season and next year we're expecting the show to be smoother."

An interesting development on this transcribed series has been in the handling of the musical numbers. Each number, according to Trotter, is recorded three times—twice before the broadcast transcription is

made and once during the actual show. One of the two pre-recordings is a long version, the other a short. If the audience reaction disturbs the mood of a ballad, one of the other recordings can be cut in to make a smoother spot. Leeway on the timing and cutting of the transcription is possible with this protective method. John is enthusiastic about the new development and says that next year they'll try many more ideas that have been made possible through it.

Of the controversy that raged about the Bing transcriptions, John said, "Bing is so good that people take it for granted." He agreed with us that few people outside Holly-

wood knew or cared whether The Bing was being heard via transcription or via live wire.

Specialized Music

Watching Trotter lead the orchestra on a Crosby broadcast is a fascinating experience. No matter what type of performer appears, he has a perfect arrangement and orchestration. For accompaniment he can use the full instrumentation or break the band down into small combinations to fit the vocalist. Trotter believes that people like to hear the kind of arrangements behind the performer that they have heard on previous performances by the artist. For instance, for Al Jolson, Trotter used backgrounds behind the songs as much like those in "The Jolson Story" as was feasible in a radio broadcast. The same holds true for the songs of Bing, Peggy Lee, the Andrews Sisters, etc., when the audience is familiar with a particular recording. He usually retains the arrangements he makes for visiting stars—the one exception was the sooper-doooper one of "Wind 'Round My Heart" that he made for Beatrice Lillie. "Who else in the world could sing 'Wind 'Round My Heart'?" he laughed.

Trotter wishes that more of the artists he works with were familiar with just what an arrangement involves . . . which is a great deal of hard work. "Some day," he threatened laughingly, "I would like to have someone stick with me through

MEET "Corliss Archer" is a young show. Watching the cast at work, you can almost imagine that you're watching a college cast at work on a class play.

The show, based on the misadventures of the younger set, sprang in real life from just such an occurrence as has been dramatized as part of the "Corliss Archer" series.

It seems that several years ago a Hollywood screen writer was driving home to Beverly Hills with his wife and two teen-age daughters. Two handsome young soldiers, looking for the U.S.O., were trying to thumb rides. The girls insisted their father stop and help the boys. Father did, and at the girls' insistence found himself inviting the boys to dinner at home. The two youngsters, elated at this grown-up dinner party, put on a sophisticated act that rocked father with silent laughter. The topper came when their little next-door boy friend came over and was promptly shooed away for fear he'd give away the ages of the two sirens.

Mushrooming Success

Father, of course, was F. Hugh Herbert, and the \$1,500,000 idea for "Corliss Archer" was his reward for taking two good-looking soldiers home to dinner. He wrote the episode into a short story, "Private Affair," and sold it to a national magazine. The magazine wanted more of the same, so the same characters continued in fifteen more short stories. Using the first episode as a springboard, he expanded it into play form. "Kiss and Tell" became a Broadway smash, a movie riot and, of course, a perennially popular radio series. The play has been seen in London, Australia, New Zealand

and Hawaii. Four road companies have played it in the United States. It's seen U.S.O. performances in the U. S., Europe and Japan—which sounds like the circle is complete, from U.S.O. to U.S.O.

Author Herbert claims that Janet Waldo fits to perfection his original conception of the teen-ager. Though he no longer holds the reins on the radio "Corliss," his characters are so well drawn that the present writers, and of course the cast, capture the same exuberant spirit of the original.

Potter Pegs 'Em

Platterer "Pete" Finds that Northwest, Bay Area, and Los Angeles Differ in Disc Preferences, Tries Pleasing All

PLEASING America's choosiest record audience, the students of West Coast schools and colleges, is a complicated matter involving, in addition to weighing the most popular tunes, the time of the day and week, the condition of the listener, and even the weather reports, according to Peter Potter, the amiable host of KHJ-Don Lee's "Chesterfield ABC Record Party."

Popular Pete has found that his program, the first local network disc show and the first platter program to bow to campus tastes, must be designed to please the nation's most ardent record fans and record critics.

Covering the entire coast from Mexico to Canada, Peter has found that a tremendous factor in selecting tunes is the wide variance in music tastes between the borders. Each week Pete polls listeners on their "ABC," or top tunes of the week, and each week he finds that invariably the Northwest chooses the "sweeter" pops, the Bay Area goes for the novelty tunes, and the

Southland plugs for hotter jazz and swing standards.

Selecting his tunes by these standards would be easy, but Pete avers that this is but the beginning. Guests two nights a week, top figures of the music world such as Tommy Dorsey, Benny Goodman, Dinah Shore, and Perry Como, means that on those nights Pete will yield to their tastes in music and play the requests that best suit them. Pete also found that on Mondays he should keep the music sweet for the most part, as the students get over their combination "weekend's over, work's begun" Monday feeling.

Weather also plays an important part, for on rainy nights the soothing melody music is much more happily received by listeners than some smoking hot trumpet or drum work. Saturday Peter spins the top single tune in the Northwest, the Bay Area, and the Southland, and the four top

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

"Menace in White"

If you just happened to be waiting in some would-be "doctor's" office when Stu Novins recently dragged himself in, you probably said to yourself, "Well, there's a guy worse off than I am." As a prospective patient, his hair disheveled, his suit rumpled, his chin covered with a three-days' growth, this pathetic-looking man bore not the slightest resemblance to Stuart Novins, handsome dark-haired, soft-eyed CBS writer-producer and assistant news and special events head. His discharge button probably seemed the most substantial thing about him.

The button was real, for Stu was in the service. But his visits (eleven of them over a nine-week period) to offices of self-styled "doctors" was his self-assignment preparatory to Novins' scripting of a documentary program exposing the illegal practice of medicine. Fruit of Stu's labor in the vineyard of research is to be broadcast Sunday, May 25, over CBS-KNX and the entire Columbia Pacific Network at 4 p.m. under the provocative title, "Menace in White".

We don't know how much and what kind of "fearless expose" broadcasts have been aired before, but we think Novins' "Menace in White" is probing a new field in radio. To gather his material, Stu worked with medical examiners and their files and even was in on some raids and arrests. His program in no way questions or jeopardizes the legitimate practice of medicine.

Posing as an ex-G.I., he made appointments with various "doctors" under suspicion of mulcting the public. "I'm awful nervous—can't sleep nights," was his complaint. Recommended "treatments" ran the gamut from pills to a machine (later found to contain weeds) which the patient pointed at himself while sleeping and which was supposed to cure anything. One illegal doctor psycho-analyzed Stu by giving him a legitimate test in which Novins was to segregate printed cards into certain categories, "True", "False" and "I don't know". Stu automatically put every third card under "True" and divided the rest. When he'd finished, the "doctor" stated: "Your problem is the same as most returned veterans—insecurity—" and proceeded to outline ways and means for the shattered Novins to attain stability. Other practitioners tried to achieve a cure by barraging Stu with hoked-up electrical gadgets, lights a-blinking, that sounded to us like the atom pile scene in "The Beginning or the End". Stu wryly re-

ported to Radio Life that by the time he'd made the rounds of the phonies, he *wasn't* able to sleep nights and really *was* "awful nervous". He beat it for the desert and in one marathon, thirteen and a half hour writing stretch, pounded out the rough script for "Menace in White".

He hopes that his "Menace in White" will be well enough received to encourage investigation of other

Stu has had such an extensive and varied writing background (scripts for "The Whistler", "That's a Good Idea", "Man Named Jordan", and "Crook's Cruise", that he was assigned an Easter special event, "Cross Section, U.S.A." which involved the wrestling with descriptions of spring bonnets and Easter parade fashions. Stu went through with it, and nobly, too, but he first went on record by protesting, "When it comes to special events, I'm strictly a flood and disaster man!"

Dumb Deal

Now is the time to sustain a healthy appropriation for continuance of all United States air programs slanted for foreign consumption and if possible to add new broadcasts and more complete coverage to those we have. That's why the House's action last week in refusing to approve funds for the continuation of the State Department's International Information Service and especially its "Voice of America" broadcasts seems nothing short of sheer stupidity.

For years, while Hitler utilized his radio mills to pour out Nazi propaganda, this country slumbered blissfully. The war was a couple of years old before we hit our stride in using radio as a potent weapon. We need to employ that weapon as much now, when we're at grips with ideas, as we did when the struggle was waged with men and materiel.

To immortalize the great funmakers of American history, the National Laugh Week Foundation conducted a three-month poll of theatrical historians and amusement page editors. Nominees were those humorists who had devoted at least a quarter of a century to creating laughs in art, entertainment or literature.

Radio did all right with three current radio comedians elected to the Humor Hall of Fame—NBC's Fred Allen and Jack Benny and CBS's Jimmy Durante. In company with such guffaw guests as Will Rogers, Robert Benchley, Charlie Chaplin, W. C. Fields, the Marx Brothers, Damon Runyon, Mark Twain and James Thurber, our boys are insured at least a measure of immortality in that most difficult and perishable of arts—the creation of laughter.

Andy Mansfield

You may have discerned by now that the reason we harp so much on disc jockeys is that way down deep we're really crazy about them! Some more than others, of course, but all the boys supply their kinds of music to their kinds of audiences so each one has his *raison d'être*. Which is the roundabout way of saying that Andy is *our* kind of disc jockey.

Andy is the musician-writer-commentator-turned-disc-jockey who supplies the pithy comments on new record releases in Radio Life under the title "Notes to You". You don't have to be a record collector to enjoy Andy's sly synopsis of record ratings and you don't have to be an amateur discographer to enjoy Andy's program on KLAC, Sundays at ten ayem. "Musical Cavalcade" is the title of his spinning session—but that only tells half the story. Andy's interested in the "human angle" of recorded music. He dislikes playing a record merely because it's new and everyone else is playing it. He likes to be able to tell his listeners the who, what, when, where and why of each particular disc.

He'll preface the playing of Phil Harris' new record of "The Preacher and the Bear" with its grand-daddy, Bert Williams' original version. He can drag out the early versions of almost any resuscitated song hit for your comparison—frinstance, his playing of an early Jolson record of "California, Here I Come" in juxtaposition with the recent waxing of the same tune from the "Jolson Story" score.

His guests, too, speak for themselves, and Andy, mike-wise from years of experience on the popular "Andy and Virginia" series, makes sense on an informal air interview. Here too, he uses his tricky gift of humor and his human interest slant. Mother's Day, he presented "Mother Barbour" — not the one from "One Man's Family", but Mrs. Dave Barbour who is, of course, Peggy Lee, and daughter Nicki, in her first joint mike appearance.

It's hard to put your finger on just what it is that makes you fall for that Mansfield man's personality, but we'll hazard a good guess that it's his love and understanding of music —and people.

"Kiernan's News Corner"

This is one of those "either you're in Kiernan's corner or you're not" propositions. You'll swing majestically to his support, or you'll just as violently join the opposition. But one way or the other, the man will have you going. In his daily fifteen-minute bout with the latest, toughest news, we've yet to see him put up a poor show.

Humor is the "kayo" of Kiernan.

The Play's the Thing

At last someone has undertaken to prove that the best in radio drama lies not in the cliché-packed noggins of the radio writers, but on the shelves of the public library. "The Play's the Thing", KFI, 6:30 p.m. Sundays, presents the classics of theater and literature condensed in a half hour of precious rhetoric.

James Church, formerly identified with NBC's popular "Great Plays" series, tastefully adapts and directs such long-lived creations as "Richard III", "David Garrick", "Midsummer Night's Dream", "Tartuffe" and "School for Scandal", to name the first few presentations of this series. Wisely he uses no "corwinisms", "obolisms" or "orsonizing" to project his capsule classics. The lines which have already survived despite generations of various interpretations, change in style and adoption of new mediums, are allowed to speak for themselves.

The cream of the local radio crop is chosen to populate these presentations, with an occasional movie player of legitimate reputation included. Recently Thomas Gomez and Selena Royale, both of the movies, have been heard in excellent portrayals.

We hope this program is the indication of a healthy trend toward classical drama on the air. "Theater Guild" has offered some fine examples and the reputation of CBS's "Studio One" (heard in New York, but not here) has preceded it to the coast.

Radio listeners have gradually got-

ten out from under their "twelve-year-old mentality" reputation and attention to programs of the caliber of "The Play's the Thing" will help speed up the process. To the quote which furnishes the title to this show, "The play's the thing wherein I'll catch the conscience of the king", we'd like to append, "and the radio sponsors, writers and producers."

"Mysterious Traveler"

Tuesday, 6:30 p.m.'s "Mysterious Traveler", introduced by a suitably voiced narrator, invites the dialer into the realm of the strange and terrifying. The scene is set by the wail of a lonely train whistle, the listener bade to settle back and get a grip on his nerves. Following the line of strictly make-believe, the show can achieve some pretty weird effects, and if you like this sort of thing, you'll enjoy KHJ's weekly offering.

The most recent we heard concerned a venomous old woman who referred to her heirs as "vultures" and devoted her life's last breath to duping them out of their inheritance. Forced by her husband's last will and testament to leave one of the unsavory trio the money, she set them at one another's throats throughout, with the victorious (and thereby only one of the three remaining living) among them left to her mercies. Then Granny contrived to have living heir three murder her. Of course under law a murderer cannot inherit any estate of his victim.

The sound effects are sensational, if it pleases your fancy to hear the full treatment when poor old ladies are throttled to death by maddened nephews, or when helpless girls are drowned.

Twilight listeners who like a "snapper" to their eeries will be delighted with this word painter of the scary who calls himself the "Mysterious Traveler."

"Only Young Once"

Jack McCoy is a brave young man. If you don't believe us, listen in some afternoon at 4:30 on KNX and you'll find the aforementioned McCoy conducting "You're Only Young Once", an audience participation stint—for kids only. If you're between the ages of eight and fifteen, you can attend the broadcast and share in the prizes and fun. If you're any younger or older than that, perhaps your interest in the show will be governed by your relative age difference.

Jack keeps the kids in hand, asks the questions and awards the prizes from the "surprise box". Happily every child on the program receives a prize—so no one goes away feeling hurt or unsuccessful. Though Jack's questions are routine—"what's your name?", "what do you want to be when you grow up?", "what does your daddy do?"—the kids' answers are not. And that's where the entertainment comes in. The direct replies for which our youngest and liveliest generation are famous bang out of the mike with the finality of rifle shots. (Example: "Do you go out on dates with your girl?" "No." "Why not?"

"Her mother won't let her out of the house." "Why won't she?" "She hates me.")

Coyness is at a minimum. If a child decides that the answer to a question is "I dunno," McCoy has to settle for "I dunno"—he won't get any further elaboration.

Remember, these aren't quiz kids or juvenile jurors. They're just the little neighborhood boys and girls you probably see scootering down the street on your way home from the store. And if you haven't held any cryptic conversations with children lately, you'll find that "You're Only Young Once" will put you back in touch with the matter-of-factness of childhood.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"What's News in the Stores—Nancy Dixon"

Press notices on this famous little shopper's service series, featuring value-scout "Nancy Dixon," have been alluringly written. We're great bloodhounds after a bargain, and "a tour of Los Angeles' main department stores, broadcast directly from downtown Radio Central" sniffed of a chance to find many. So we flicked our dial to KHJ at 1:15 and settled forward, pad 'n' pencil in hand, to listen.

The entire show, as it is now written, is very well interpreted by capable mikesters Janet "Nancy" McCoy and Herb Allen. Into what actually adds up to fifteen minutes of straight commercial copy, they both manage to inject a rejuvenating serum of cheerfulness, warmth and vigor. We also thought the quick resume of the day's bargains, offered at the end of the show, a useful little catalog to save busy shoppers many steps.

But aside from these points, we

would like to venture a well-meant suggestion on the grounds that it's a shame to get only so much, and no more, out of an idea alive with such possibilities.

It struck us that "Miss Dixon" is too obviously a "studio personality." We cannot, by the wildest yank on our imaginations, envision her hiking enthusiastically from counter to counter spying and citing values. It's a secret of the trade, of course, but we know many "in the field" shows which completely illusion the public by the clever use of sound effects, all the time remaining within the bounds of a closed and carpeted studio. We think a cleverly handled hustle-bustle background could get "Miss Dixon" out and moving around where she's actually supposed to be.

Occasional chats with salesgirls, humorous observations of other "shoppers," clever shopper stories and perhaps even hints on buying etiquette might be inserted with a minimum of script effort, but could be so effective.

Perhaps there are sponsor limitations, but we wonder why the varied special activities at Bullock's, Robinson's and The Broadway are ignored . . . the knitting and Spanish classes, the charm talks, the fashion shows, the cooking demonstrations, which are such an enticement to hop a streetcar downtown . . . and perhaps stay and stray a little afterward, up and down the aisles. Such information certainly belongs under "What's News in the Stores," and it's selling-stuff plus!

Briefly, we think the entire fifteen minutes could use just a little more "drammer" and a little less "yammer." Right now, even with two very pleasant, very natural people doing their best by their lines, to us it sounds like an appraisal of a Dollar Day Bargain Page . . . and we just don't like to see that happen to a potentially "different" offering!

Johnny o'Clock, We Guess

On Monday, May 12th, we listened, as usual, to "Lux Radio Theatre." The play of the evening was "Johnny o'Clock." For a while we credited ourselves with not quite enough attention, for we became extremely muddled, and the curtain left us not knowing just what had happened during the hour. But the following day when we hazarded a few shy questions to fellow listeners, they comforted us and left us feeling not quite so stupid by such answers as "Well, uh, I guess there was some mix-up about some watches being just alike . . . Let me see, I'm not sure just what part Lee J. Cobb did play . . . Oh, yes, Dick Powell was what's-his-name."

The departure from the usual excellence of Lux presentations lay in the fact that there was little or no continuity for the listener unless he had a marked script in his hand. And the characterizations seemed to hold such similarity as to confuse even intimates

of the cast, which included Dick Powell, Margarite Chapman (we later found out she was the good girl), Lee J. Cobb and Janice Carter (guess it was she who finally shot someone or other).

Radio Theater has had more complex stories on the air and they have clicked off with clarity and punch. We wondered what had happened in "Johnny o'Clock." It was nice hearing lines well read by a group of capable thespians . . . if only we knew what the story was!

On Mike (About Studio Happenings)

"Dr. I.Q."

Even the good and seldom-stymled Doctor was totally unable to make a quick recovery on last week's "I.Q." show (from Portland, Oregon) when a pleasant-faced, unassuming little man stood up to answer a set of musical questions, and left the house rocking.

Things went quite sensibly on the first query, a little ditty along the lines of . . . Q: "Folks who are very witty are known as what?" A: "Sharp."

"Fine, Fine," reassured Val "Dr. I.Q." Valentine. "You've got the idea. Now . . . Q: "A lot of people live in what?"

Pensively, the little man sent his eyes ceilingward. "Hm-m-m-m," he pondered. Suddenly, his face brightened . . . triumphantly he ventured—"Bars?"

Who says the audience doesn't make the show?

Cutting Capers

We get awfully tired of some words. We've been tired of "terrific" for years. The use of "natch" and "character" makes us want to scream. That also goes for "yuck," "solid," "square," "moron"—and while we're at it, such well worn phraseology as "what d'ya know for sure?", "how dull can you get?", "how's your love-life?", "don't do anything I wouldn't do," etc.

We bring this up because we're afraid that the use of the word "caper" on nine out of ten mystery shows is going to doom this heretofore innocuous word to our list. It seems to be used instead of the word "case"—why, we wouldn't know. Here we've been plodding along for years reading and listening to things titled "The Case of the Muddled Mike," "The Case of the Bewildered Blonde," etc. Suddenly we're face to face with titles like "The Caper of the Dead Producer," "The Caper of the Forgotten Dictionary."

One mystery fan we know says it's driving her wild, that one show used the word three times in one half-hour and that the following three shows included it too.

How dull can you get?

The People Spoke

The tag on KHJ's "What's the Name of That Song?" (and a highly enjoyable show it is) is the selection of a member of the audience for a try at the jackpot question. The selection is

done in a very fair manner. One participant already on stage gives emcee Dud Williamson his or her phone number, and the first two numerals in that particular telephone listing designate the row and the seat from which the contestant is picked.

Last Wednesday evening a slight mistake occurred and the young lady brought on stage had been carelessly selected from row five, rather than row six, as she should have been. No sooner had she nervously made her way to the stage than the mistake was discovered, and Dud, in place of calling up the right contestant and letting the two of them join their efforts, or contest with one another for the \$110, was about to send her back down to her seat and bring up row six's occupant.

At this point the audience showed its mettle and redeemed itself for any off-side plays such as prompting, whistling or stamping feet, and generally carrying on in the annoying fashion audiences are sometimes given to doing, by loudly demanding the young lady be given her chance. We rather imagine it was pretty comforting to the girl, who was about to have to shuffle down off the stage and retake her seat in row five with nothing for her trouble but a red face.

Unfortunately she didn't hit the jackpot, but it was warming to know that an audience's careless studio antics cover a kindly bunch of hearts.

Off Mike (Personalities)

Slow But Sure

Not so long ago, our "Ear Inspires the Pen" column received a letter from a listener which went something like this:

"I would like to ask . . . how does a beginner, who is capable, get a chance on the radio? If one does not have credits, one cannot get a producer to even grant a chance hearing. But exactly how do you get credits without a chance hearing? Frankly, it sounds like a vicious circle."

Since we get so many queries of the same type, we know that there are a lot of talented youngsters wandering around on the outside rim of Radio-Hollywood wistfully looking for a way in. And to prove that there's a definite way to go about it, we'd like to tell you a story about a "couple of nice kids" who found one!

At random, we picked a boy and a girl who aren't big people in radio yet, but will be some day. Maybe their experiences will show you that the road up isn't really too discouraging, if it's carefully traveled as a planned step-by-step process.

The boy's name is Lee Roddy. Twenty-six years ago he was born in an Illinois whistle-stop named Iuka. His people were farmers and after a time they moved to Oakdale, California, where his father bought a small ranch and settled down to raise turkeys, vegetables and ten youngsters. A bus stopped to take Lee, his three brothers and six sisters to school every day, after morning chores. His mom baked all their bread,

put up shelves of preserves every winter. It was a long "hello" from Hollywood.

But, when he was a senior in high school, Lee got to pondering. He'd been "scribbling" since he was six, and every time he'd seen a show, or read a book, he'd had ideas about doing it "a little bit differently." It appeared definitely reckless, but he wanted to take a chance on something. He'd never been away from home in his life, and it was his first ride on a train when, at the age of 21, he jingled his entire savings together into one pocket and set out for Los Angeles.

Of course, he found out right off about the big gates around the studios, and that none of them were bowingly, scrapingly held open for him. But instead of the typical "hard luck to great riches" story, he did have a hundred dollars in his slacks, so he got a place to live and prudently applied at a defense plant.

Between rivets, he made calls at agencies, production offices and radio stations, but at each stop his literary showing of "a few things in the children's section of an Oakland paper" by-lined "Lee Roddy, age 14" diminished. They smiled, of course, when he also insisted that he had a terribly ambitious attitude toward work. So, they informed him, had a lot of other people.

So, finally sensibly sawing his grand scale plans down from starting at the top to starting at the bottom, Lee enrolled in the fall radio classes starting at L. A. City College.

While he was registering in the library, two wide-eyed young things came up to ask the way to the radio department. "One of them," he grins, "was a funny-faced little red-head." Her name was Cicely Price, (and she's the other half of our story). Lee gallantly proffered his arm, and they joined forces "academically."

Somehow, Lee and Cis had every class together, and over their books and an occasional coke they made a lot of plots about taking Hollywood by storm. Lee finally entered a strategic application at NBC, when he heard of an opening as pageboy. He made \$18.00 a week, which amounted to \$16.66 clear. Out of that, he minused \$5 a week for rent, bought all his own books for college, financed his clothes and transportation; which left only a smithering for food. It called for quite a cut from a farm-boy's diet, and Lee lost twenty pounds in a jiffy. "Incidentally," Cis will add, patting Lee's quite-rounded arm, "You'll notice he's gained most of it back."

Then, NBC needed a diplomatic page to handle the client's booth on a few of their major shows. (Client's booth, for the uninitiated, is a glassed-in box-office seat to the broadcast, into which everyone tries to jam at zero hour, proclaiming to be "a very dear friend" of the star.) "Since they couldn't find anybody diplomatic," kibitzes Cis, "they took Lee."

From assistant page, Lee advanced to head page, and in that spot he

commanded a pretty wide scope of all available openings around town. KMPC eventually needed a combination night receptionist, office boy, and telephone operator, for instance. Lee took over the job for two years, until he was out of college, graduating as top man in his class.

By now, having at least some radio experience behind him and a sizable chunk of radio education as well, he found a bit-sized job as a copywriter at Mayers advertising agency downtown. There he learned that, "no matter how terrible it sounds on the air, there's a lot of work to making a spot announcement as bad as it is."

Writing copy didn't keep him busy all the time, so he managed to reel off some freelance scripts. CBS picked one up, on his first big break. It was a "V. J." story entitled "Unknown," and it was produced over the entire t.c. network with some of Hollywood's biggest talent, including Herb Rawlinson, Cathy Lewis, Lurene Tuttle and Hal March. Columbia had numerous calls for repeat, so they used his script again, "and," they assured, they were "a ready market for more."

The ball was rolling by this time, and Lee followed it back to KMPC, where he joyfully entered old surroundings in a new capacity, as staff writer. He had his big chance to write steadily and a wide variety of shows, and he used it beautifully. Lockwood-Shackelford agency spotted him immediately for their new Mutual series, "California Caravan." And, after Lee had scripted the first thirteen weeks' stories for them, he had a call from Lenz advertising agency proffering an executive position, as head of their new radio department! And, from that he's traveled into a new field which he finds as fascinating as radio, writing educational movie shorts for the Signal Oil Company, covering the history and presents of California's gold-rush towns. From thence, he'll probably travel so fast we won't know how to keep up with him, but we do agree he's not pipe-dreaming about that office of his own some day, with "Lee Roddy Productions" gold-embossed on the door. It's all down in blue-print, and he's patterned his life on the same system quite neatly thus far.

And about Cicely? She's 21, and afraid her career "doesn't sound as spectacular as Lee's, but it's been lots of fun." She lived in Chicago until she was nine, when, because of her father's health, the family moved to Arizona, then California. She had three brothers and two sisters, all considerably older than herself, so in devising most of her own amusement she discovered she liked to act. Her brothers were amateur radio bugs, and the house was continually cluttered with setups, walky-talkies and boiling pots of solder, so she thought of radio as her medium almost from the beginning.

In the eighth grade, she chose drama as her permanent elective, and by her first year in high school she had already accumulated valuable "know-how" through the many youthful radio groups she had joined as

a regular performer in self-written, self-directed productions. After graduation she scanned further possibilities for education, and picked City College, where she met Lee.

As soon as Lee left NBC, Cis took his page job. After that, she moved to the CBS mail room, where she trained herself on the best contacts and agencies, and watched for a chance. Her persistence won her a small part with narrator Bob Purcell on his "Voice of the Moment." It was her first actual "credit" and a small one, but she found it her "in" to time on recorded commercials and many incidental shows. She had a call to come to Chicago a short time ago, where she made several auditions and a worthy impression, and she's been screen-tested for pictures. Little by little, she's on her way, and her listings with AFRA attest that she's one of the most promising "comers" in the ranks.

Off mike, Lee and Cis are the best of friends. They coach each other repeatedly on their separate goals of attainment. Cis reads Lee's scripts, and Lee offers hints on her inflection, effectiveness and ability. They're both open-minded youngsters who want and welcome suggestions. Their perfect companionship seems to suggest a fine basis for marriage, but they each want to await just a span more experience, although they agree their regard for one another is far too valuable to be treated lightly.

In any case, we've so admired their energetic, clean-minded approach to their ambitions that we thought you'd find it encouraging to hear about them too. It may seem quite different from the sensational spiral to "fame" so many press agents trill about, but if you're a youngster who sincerely yearns for a success of equal texture, why not try it the same slightly slow . . . but definitely sure . . . way?

Back in the Biz

One of the people we begged for an early return to the mike in a past "Voices We'd Like to Hear" article has heeded the brassy call of show business and planned a resumption of her career—however, not in radio. It's that fan favorite Gale Page, long a heroine of radio dramas ("Today's Children" was her last appearance). Gale's returning to the screen in the Cagney production of "Time of Your Life" in one of the leads. Her last screen appearance was in the wind-up of the "Four Daughters" series. Let's hope that the resumption of Gale's screen career heralds her eventual return to the air.

Berlin-Bound

En route to Berlin, Germany, to take charge of radio and theatrical troupes forming for the purpose of entertaining members of the armed forces all over Europe, is local girl Dene Beckett, former vocalist with Kay Kyser's band under the name of Linda Stevens. Dene's official title is actress-singer-technician and she's the first American woman to hold such a position in the Europe theater.

Bing Crosby sings the four sides in this album from the picture of the same name, and while they're very listenable, they're not exceptional... orchestra backing by Trotter is very smooth and well-arranged. Best side, in a novel sort of way, is "Country Style" with Bing doing a swell job at square dance calling (according to grandma) which helps a lot in making this one a pleasing 2-noter. (Decca Album A-531)

Selecting proven favorites of yesterday for her first album offering, Jeannie McKeon sings eight sides with ease and style... Roy Bargy provides orchestra backing, and while quite suitable, accompaniment sounded thin in spots... Jeannie never sounded better, but a larger orchestra would have showcased her voice to better advantage... album is still a good 2-noter. (Black and White A-71).

JOHNNY LONG ORCH.

One of the most danceable bands in the business provides two sides of music for hopping—"Hawaiian War Chant" with native lyrics by the Longbeachcombers—and "Evening in Paris" for a 2-note rating. (Signature 15120).

KAY KYSER ORCH.

Better than her first release is Jane Russell's singing of a catchy Kyserism, "Boin-n-n-ng!"... this time Russell doesn't have to be seen to be appreciated—and the 3 Kyser "boin-n-n-ngs" at the close express our rating. (Columbia 37338).

EDDY HOWARD ORCH.

One of the best this week is Eddy's singing of "I Wonder"... his sugar-coated pipes never sounded more sincere, especially on the reverse "Ask Anyone Who Knows"... and it's a toothsome 3 notes for this twosome. (Majestic 1124).

PERRY COMO

Two contrasting sides, "Chi-Baba, Chi-Baba" on the Italian lullaby side, and "When You Were Sweet Sixteen", a barber-shop favorite of years past, make for very easy listening... backing is by the Satisfiers and Lloyd Shaffer's Orchestra, and the Como warmth and finesse make it easily a 3-noter. (RCA-Victor 20-2259).

the whole process." John strives to make each arrangement he touches, good musically. He feels that he is doing his bit to make modern music popular.

He names as his favorite composers those of the modern classical field, and in Trotter's work the same mood and conception are apparent. Hindemith he names as a particular favorite. Trotter is thrilled that he was instrumental in bringing together Dr. Ernst Toch, leading modern composer, and the Capitol Record company. Dr. Toch has written a book, "The Shaping Forces of Music," which Trotter calls the most important book ever written on the subject. The Capitol Record company will publish it in about six months, and if you are an incipient composer, it's a Trotter recommendation.

He credits the movies and radio with acclimatizing listeners to the modernists and cited the example of what he overheard at a recent Hindemith concert. It seems that in the twenties the works of Igor Stravinsky were considered so unusual and disturbing that people were unable to accept them. Trotter recalls that at this particular concert, he sat next to two old ladies who felt outraged at the music by composer Hindemith. "Thank heavens," he heard one tell the other as she glanced at her program, "the closing number is that nice old 'Firebird Suite.'" John is heartened that in one generation the revolutionary Stravinsky should be known as the composer of that "nice old 'Firebird Suite'".

Doesn't Recommend

When we asked John if he had tried writing any popular songs, he replied, "Life's too short to get that involved," and averred that he was a very hard person to find when hunted down by amateur composers who want aid in getting their music on the air. "Even if a song were wonderful I wouldn't know how to tell them to get started," he added, speaking of the great number of aspiring songsmiths, "other than going through the same old routine of writing a hundred, two hundred, five hundred songs before somebody says, 'I like that.'" Trotter never recommends a song to Bing. Even the song pluggers from Bing's own firm (and they have to go through the same routine as pluggers from the other companies) know better than to ask John to get next to Bing with one of their tunes. "Song writing is a wonderful hobby," insisted Trotter. "I'd say write as many tunes as you want and play them for your friends—you'll have a good time doing it. As for selling them—life's too short! And anyway, you shouldn't try to sell them in Hollywood—try New

York," he added, getting a little more hopeful.

A modernist in music, Trotter swings quite the other way in his number two enthusiasm. He has an antique store, and while traveling, tries to track down rare pieces for his customers. "It's really a full time job," he sighed. "There is no source of antiques here. I want to deal in the finest pieces of furniture—no cup-and-saucer trade. I've recently gotten some shipments from North Carolina, one from my home town of Charlotte, and a few things from New Orleans." John's partner works in the shop full time and restores the fine old pieces that are obtained, putting them back into utilitarian use. "I can't stand chairs you can't sit down in and drawers that won't open," exclaimed Trotter. "We fix things up so they are usable."

Considerably smartened up by the Trotter discourses on music and antiques, we thanked John and told him how much we had enjoyed his music on the Crosby show. John countered by telling us how much he enjoyed Radio Life, "especially," he added, "the 'Men of Music' series!"

"At ease" is the command CBS newscaster Bob Garred tries to keep in mind while he's on the air. We learned a thing or three about his method for poise before the public. He sits down at a table for the entire show, wears moccasins and sports shirts with collar open. Close at hand are his beloved pipe and tobacco pouch, and right in front of him he puts a picture of his wife and baby, and perhaps a recent pleasant letter from the "folks at home!"

Frank Barton

Now Chief of Announcers at NBC and an Instructor of UCLA Announcing Course, Frank Barton Started Out on a Trumpet

I PROBABLY shouldn't be quoted as saying this," Frank Barton smiled, "but I think anybody can be an announcer. That is," he specified, "anybody with a pleasing voice, a good education, a few of the 'breaks', personality—and perseverance!"

Mr. Barton, chief of announcers at NBC and instructor for the past three years of the radio announcing course of UCLA's Radio Institute, is well qualified to know whereof he speaks. Of the latter position, he informed us that lately there had been many women registering for his announcing classes.

"Of course," he grinned, "I make myself unpopular with them from the very beginning by telling them they're wasting their time. It isn't that I think there is no place for them in radio. It is just that there is no place for them in the field of announcing.

"Still," he added, "I do think that anyone with any radio aspirations should spend a period as an announcer. After all, it is the announcer who supplies the final voice. If all workers in radio familiarized themselves with the announcer's job, they would know better the material which he should be furnished."

Announcer on NBC's "Standard

Hour," Jack Haley and Dennis Day shows, and co-presenter with Hal Gibney of a five-a-week feature news program called "Top of the Day," Frank Barton has been in radio since 1936 when he auditioned for and won a junior announcer's post at NBC, San Francisco. In 1942 he came to Hollywood, and in 1944 became the network's chief announcer here.

Engrossed in Music

Prior to 1936 and ever since his high school days, he had been a musician. Born in San Leandro (a native Californian!), he attended St. Mary's College, where he organized a band and wrote the school song, "On to Victory." He played trumpet with various orchestras while still in college, and after his graduation trumpeted, sang and arranged music for the Anson Weeks, Horace Heidt and Tom Coakley orchestras. With the latter aggregation, he made a number of records for Victor.

Although now Frank has pretty much abandoned all of his musical interests, he maintained them for a while following his departure from the orchestral world, to pen in commemoration of the erection of NBC's new San Francisco studios a tune entitled "The Sidewalk Superintendent's Song," and during the war, a ditty called "There'll Always Be a Santa Claus."

"I guess," he admitted, "you could call me a frustrated tunesmith."

In his radio work, announcer Bar-

ton expressed particular enjoyment in special events assignments that he has handled. His very first plane ride came about as a part of such a stint when he was called upon to broadcast from a skyship during a "People Are Funny" show.

"From the ground Art Linkletter instructed me to list as many words as I could think of beginning with a certain letter," the mikeman related. "Well, I was alone in the gunner's compartment, with mike, earphones, flashlight and stopwatch in hand, and out of touch with the pilot, who had put the plane into a fast dive. Thinking of any words at all wasn't easy—let alone saying them out loud!"

Another time, Barton did a broadcast from a Paul Mantz plane, describing the descent of a parachutist over Beverly Hills, and on still another occasion he was sent atop a San Francisco hotel to describe the lighting of the Golden Gate City exposition. "But when the lights of the fair came on," he laughed, "I couldn't see a thing. Another building obliterated my view entirely. I could only describe to the listening audience how I *imagined* it looked!"

As his worst radio boner, Barton remembers the time, very early in his radio career, when from sheer nervousness he read the sound effects man's instructions for a "GONG" with a time signal.

Although his duties now find him


So some afternoon when that four o'clock lull hits and you'd like a cup of tea, drive out over Cahuenga Pass, or take Laurel, and start out


Should you miss it, turn back the Bank building there by the Old Timer's . . . go past Cornelia's and you're there again.

'Lucky' On the Air ...and Off!

Credits Luck With a Liberal Share of His Success, but Can't Disclaim the Heritage Lending Him Ability and His Irish Charm.

MICHAEL DUNNE, (ABC's "Deadline Mysteries") or Stephen Dunne, as we shall henceforth know him, flatly states that he lends no credence to the theory of dramatic heritage, yet he walked out on a good start in training for one profession to work at that creation of legends known as acting.

Stephen's father, a jolly Irishman quite unlike the traditional and formidable Shakespearean scholar, was once an Abbey Player in Ireland, and Stephen's admiration and pride in speaking of his father certainly belie his disclaiming that his own choice of profession was a result of any inherited proclivities.

Years ago the Dunnes forsook Ireland and the theater to come to America, where Stephen was born. After eighteen years of basking in his father's personality and reminiscences Stephen hurried himself away to New York . . . but he worked at the only trade he then knew. He became a stenographer. This palled in what he now sees was a fortunately short time.

"I knew if I wanted to get out of that rut I'd better train for a profession. So I quit my job, and left

for Alabama, via Northampton, Massachusetts, the old home town, to tell my parents. They were glad, but didn't offer much in the way of help. Times were tough for everyone then. But I went on down to the university anyway, and managed to enroll."

The next two and a half years must have been a blur of fatigue and worded pages for the struggling young Irishman, who found it necessary to earn while he learned. "I was lucky though, in finding work as secretary to the head of the school's psychology department. That was my minor in school, and I learned a lot that way. Aside from the purely academic benefits I acquired, the self-orientation I learned in psychology stood me in good stead later on."

Possibly this understanding of himself in his relationships with others, possibly his natural charm, makes Mr. Dunne a colorful, interesting person who can easily adapt himself to people and their interests.

"Spoke" Pantomime

"Of course my majors in university were drama and journalism." The mention of the word drama had brought back a memory, now funny, to Stephen, and he laughed wholeheartedly at his own expense. "I still remember early in the drama

course getting up to give what I thought was a well-planned little speech. I'd made the hideous error of carefully memorizing it, spending more time on that than on the delivery. So when I concentrated on delivery in front of the class, everything I'd memorized vanished, and the whole thing became almost a pantomime, with me stumbling from one prompting to another." (Stephen can afford to laugh at that wretched moment now, being an established actor with four 20th Century-Fox pictures to his credit and a brand new Columbia Studio contract in his pocket. His advent at Columbia brought about the change in name for Michael, rather Stephen, Dunne. A confusion of similar names with an artist already at the studio resulted in the flipping of a coin, and Stephen cheerfully assumed the new name, which he adopted from his son, thereby reversing the old procedure. "The coin had only two sides . . . I had just as much chance to win that toss and keep on being Michael as the other fellow.")

The awful classroom incident he had laughed about luckily left him far from feeling forever snubbed by an esthetic medium, and he continued working and studying.

It was during his third difficult year of school that he heard of a

at work at NBC seven days a week, the mikeman still manages to find time enough to indulge in his favorite sport, golf, and his pet hobby, woodworking. In addition, he recently assembled a radio in his home workshop.

Barton, his wife, Margaret Heillg (formerly a dress designer, whom Frank first met back in San Leandro—"I played in the orchestra for her grammar school graduation"), and their three children (Dennis, eight; Sharon, six; and Michael, four) live in North Hollywood. Asked if the children listen to their father on the radio, Barton answered, "Yes—they hear me because they're quite avid fans of the Dennis Day show."

As for his own listening preferences, the mikeman regarded Meredith Willson's "Sparkle Time" as the ultimate in good radio entertainment. "I like to listen to the radio a good deal," he told us, but added, "With three youngsters around the house, it isn't easy to do."

chance to audition for an announcing and newscasting job at WOR in New York. As Stephen now modestly explains it, "Through some incalculable oddity . . . I got the job!" The following few months there and almost a year with an NBC station in Massachusetts awakened two things in him. One, an ambition to become an actor as well as an announcer; and the realization that his voice and the ability to interpret lines were his only stock in trade. "I was only one of an endless number of aspirants to making a trade of acting, so I knew I'd better learn to act well!" This realization led him to play in the Smith College Workshop and to study further at the Maria Ouspenskaya School in New Hampshire.

Living became a little easier when Stephen returned to New York as an actor-announcer. There were trips home to Northampton, and from one such trip he returned to New York with his bride, pretty Virginia Belliveau Dunne, a "home town" girl who shares his liking of the arts because of her own ability. Hers is in another medium, however, and she still uses a brush and oils to good advantage in the time out from tending Stephen James Dunne, age five, and his little sister, Christina Margaret, now just a little over a year old.

Time Full

Stephen's entry to Hollywood radio was made easy by the fact that his movie possibilities became evident

when he tested in 1944 with little Connie Marshall. Twentieth Century-Fox snapped him up, with the result that the Dunne family now lives happily in Westwood, where Stephen can indulge the year 'round his love of sports, particularly tennis and basketball. Even California's legendary rains don't bother the Dunnes, for they have their record collection to keep them jointly interested.

The same Irish heritage that accounts for the good-looking Mr. Dunne's blue eyes and brown hair also lends him a ready wit and a straightforward manner. But his manner is no ingenuous exterior. He likes people and derives the greatest pleasure from discussions of everything from the theater to drainpipes. He can proffer anecdotes, rather than opinions designed to please his listeners, because he's not trying to sell himself, being established soundly in a field of his own choosing, and one he enjoys immensely.

One of the parts he enjoys most is that of tough-cracking "Lucky" Larson, in his Sunday afternoon characterization on the ABC show, "Deadline Mysteries." He was grinning when he made a little pun about this to us, but he meant it, too. "Of course, the hazards that 'Lucky' Larson is exposed to on the air are nothing in comparison to those I would have experienced by choosing acting as a career had I not really been so lucky off the air."

Broadcasting Monday through Saturday at 10:30 to 11:00 p.m. Peter finds ideal, for he then catches the students as they have just finished studies for the day, and they can all gather around the radio for a session of the best liked tunes. Reports filtering back indicate that most of Pete's listeners average sixteen to thirty-three users per set, giving him what is probably radio's largest listening audience per sets in use.

Although Potter admittedly is broadcasting for the campus listener, he receives many, many letters from people who lament that they are "only a poor housewife, but could you play such-and-such for me?" It all goes to convince Peter that good music will always attract the listeners, and that music they themselves select is sure to bring them back again and again.

Sounds Out Fans

In addition to requests, Pete occasionally airs new tunes to sound out his audience on music with hit possibilities. Recently he aired a novelty titled "Red Silk Stockings and Green Perfume" and shortly thereafter heard from a University of California fraternity which had adopted the tune as a theme song, and was running local dealers to a frazzle snapping up their stock on that record.

Most impressive letter Peter received was from a Portland, Oregon, high school—a request for "Anniversary Song", signed by 1538 students.

But Pete's still waiting for the topper to a letter from a Portland University frosh who requested "When Am I Going to Kiss You Good Morning?" Pete obliged with the record, and the next day had two letters, one from the Portland student saying, "Thanks, Pete, she accepted the proposal," and one from his girl, a freshman at San Diego State College, also thanking him for airing her novel marriage proposal, which she heard while at a San Diego drive-in.
