T was early enough on a Monday morning for us still to be yawning sleepily as we drove along the pretty tree-lined B e v er l y Hills street in search of the Frankovich residence. A car out front bearing a sign that read "Have Breakfast with Binnie and Mike" provided a fairly good clue. We parked and approached the house with caution, aware that it was but a few moments before broadcast time. Sounds of activity from within, however, made us know that it was still safe to knock.

Inside, in the center of a spacious, warmly furnished living room, at a small table scattered with typewritten sheets and newspaper clippings, sat the Frankoviches (cinema actress Binnie Barnes and her sportscasting - Republic - Pictures - producer husband, Mike Frankovich). They waved a friendly hello without taking their attention from the minute hand on the mantel clock. Engineer Johnny Greene (whose car it was out front) was standing by in the next room, ready to signal them through the small square opening on one wall that was originally cut and is still used for the projection of home movies, which the Frankoviches frequently show. Their living room is soundproofed for the same purpose, and the room's furniture arranged so, as to be easily turned about for a film audience's occupancy.

It was eight-twenty-nine and the closing theme of "Wakeup Ranch," the program preceding the "Binnie and Mike" show, could be heard over the KFVD outlet in the next room. Mike smiled across the table at his wife and called her attention to it. "There's your song, darling."

Binnie grinned and began to sing, injecting a twang into her brisk English diction, "—out where Mother Nature's really givin', all the things that make a heap o' livin'."

Then they were on the air.

# The Johnny in Jack

We Meet Jack Webb, Who, in Turn, Introduces Us to "Johnny Modero"

ACK WEBB crinkled his dark eyes and turned his broad grin in our direction. He was talking with earnest enthusiasm of "Johnny Modero." "Johnny" is Jack's other self — the similetongued hero of Mutual's new Wednesday night adventure series, "Johnny Modero, Pier 23."

"Johnny" has this to say about the business he's in: "It's a boathouse on the outside. But it's inside where I make my money. People come in the back door—and go out the same way. Most of the time they don't tell me their name and I don't ask 'em. For down here on the waterfront a set of morals causes no more

Jack has this to say about "Johnny": "I like the guy. I like him because he doesn't carry a gun. I like him because he doesn't ask for a fight, but can always take care of himself when one comes along. He's the kind of a guy I think a lot of us would be under the same circumstances. I like 'Johnny'."

Dialers like Jack. A local boy, and somewhat of a radio veteran, having written, announced and acted for the ether medium a number of years now, Jack Webb gained the greatest amount of attention from microphone fans with his portrayal of the title role in the San Franciscoemanated series, "Pat Novak for Hire." Thriller addicts delighted in his low, flat, close dialogue delivery. "Before that," he told us, "I'd played character parts and mostly romantic leads, at which I think I'm lousy."

Asked about the mail response to his "Pat Novak" portrayal, he grinned and admitted, "It was mostly from women."

His "Johnny Modero" has the same attraction.

#### Heart Interest

Enraptured feminine dialers will be happy to hear that actor Webb is still a bachelor—but on the other hand it isn't likely that he'll remain one for long. He is engaged to actress Julie London. When they marry, he hopes to secure a home, but meanwhile he has an apartment and knows he's lucky to have found that.

He and Julie go to the movies a lot and consider it "a school." "I even like to see the bad ones," he smiled, "because I always learn something."

As for "private eye" portrayals, he picks Dick Powell as his favorite. "Bogart's good, too, but he looks the part so completely. Powell accomplishes the portrayal with an added dash because he doesn't look the part."

Jack confessed that he is no avid mystery reader, but when he does read them, he likes the English ones best. "They're better," he summed up.

He listens to the radio a lot, abhors the audience participation shows and doesn't approve of audiences at dramatic broadcasts. "It'd be all right if there were a glass partition placed between them and the stage."

Being watched while he's working, however, doesn't bother him in the least.

## Smart Sayings of Adults

In spite of the fact that we love revivals of the old tunes, we heard the other side of the story recently from a bright fifty-year-old, and we're in-clined to think he has a case. "I wish to heck they'd start writing good new tunes," this long-time radio listener complained to us. "Revivals of the oldies are all right for the younger generation, but, darn it, I remember most of the old tunes the first time they were popular. I didn't mind them being revived in the twenties and then again in the thirties, but here it is again in the thirties, but here it is 1947 and they're all being dragged out again. At this rate I've got three or four more revivals of the same tunes to go through again and I don't think I can stand it!"

#### Whiffenpoof Contest

What does a Whiffenpoof look like? For a long time people have wondered, but nobody did anything about it— nobody, that is, until RCA-Victor cut a record of the Yale drinking song, warbled by Robert Merrill, and de-

cided to stir up interest in its disposi-tion. Inevitable consequence: a contest.

Southern California disc jockeys were enlisted in conducting a week's competition among their listeners,

who were urged to draw their impres-sions of a Whiffenpoof. Two thousand listeners had ideas of what one looked like, and, spurred by desire for an RCA-Victor radio-record player com-bination offered as prize, transferred their mental images to paper. All eleven jockeys receiving entries were spurred, too. Each was to pick his three best entries for final judging and if one of his listeners received the prize, the jockey, sharing in re-flected glory, received a radio-record player, too.

Last Friday the boom was lowered on the thirty-three final entries. Three stolid judges sweated through a ses-sion of eliminating the offerings, one by one, until a lone winner was agreed upon. Discarded were many clever concepts, ranging from the

a waspish tirade on "Why do people keep tearing in here about that thing?" until you're ready to slink off into oblivion muttering you'll never answer the phone again.

This sort of tomfoolery enrages us as much as you, the fall guys. But we fancy a few *more* danders will be up when both "Pot O' Gold" and Ever-sharp hear how frivolously their names . . . and reputations . . . are being bandied about. And we hope we're standing on the sidelines when the proper squelching starts! Mean while, as the old "don't take any wooden nickels" slogan goes . . . "don't say we didn't warn you!"

#### Strictly for No Laughs

Recently at a most inappropriate place in the story, the sound of in-tense physical conflict in a "This Is Hollywood" drama was accompanied by waves of laughter from the audience. This is the sort of thing that makes the listening audience irritable. They feel they have a right to know what's going on in the studio, and a stupid reaction on the part of the spec-tators present demands an explanation.

The explanation is simple — an unsophisticated audience, instead of being emotionally involved in the plot line, prefers to watch the sound man scuffling with himself and taking falls for the actors because it makes the onlookers giggle. But no longer-at least on CBS's "This Is Hollywood".

Producer Frank Woodruff has now moved sound man Berne Surrey to a spot where he can be heard but not seen. Berne and his equipment have been screened from view and the listening audience will be relieved of at least part of the disturbing sounds that come from a studio attendance.

We hope this is a trend. Not that watching an ace sound man isn't a fascinating experience in itself, but the studio audience is present to help the listeners in their reactions, not mix them up emotionally.

# "Wake Up"-Evvie Scott

As one of the Southland's few feminine disc jockeys, warm-voiced Evvie Scott attractively holds her own on KMPC's daily "Wake-Up!" at the dim hour of 6:45 a.m.

You may remember Evvie not long back on KHJ's old "Rise and Shine" with guitarist Muzzy Marcellino. Now, in her own quarter-hour she's back, with her same breezy views and news, chipper and cheery in spite of the "alarm clock" time. One thing we've always liked about Evvie, too, she knows good morning music. Her choices are rhythmic without being "bang! bang!" and pleasantly sentimental without being "schmaltzy."

If you're one of those people who can't speak to a soul before ten, who snaps and snarls through breakfast, and who resents the very "ha-ha! I've been up since four myself" tone of most spinners on the early dial, you'll find Evvie's manner as soothing as a cool hand across your brow! We're lots less grouchy ourselves since we enthusiastically became fans once again!

#### "So Proudly We Hail"

Even if the light touch of romanticism hasn't yet colored your grapplings with American history, and your predominant associations are of heavy books reeking with endless dates and data, you still may have termed a recent "So Proudly We Hail" show as "swell".

Recently, Thomas Mitchell starred in "The Spirit of '76" as the ghost of Revolutionary War hero Paul Revere, descended from that slightly higher echelon habitated by spirits.

Corporal John Larkin, 1944 G. I., hard at transporting dynamite to the front, was aided in his chore by this charming ghost who later informed young Larkin that in the days of the powder horn and blunderbuss, when Lexington and Concord were topics of the time, it was Grandfather Larkin's horse that Paul Revere had ridden on that memorable night. There was masterful comedy in G. I. Larkin's understandable assumption that Ghost Revere was simply a fellow G. I. whose battle fatigue resulted in his self-delusion of being the Paul Revere who had been pretty well regarded about Boston.

C. P. McGregor produces this War Department program sponsored by the Hollywood Co-ordinating Committee, and the dressed-up pitch for recruits to the service lay only in the wistful parallel on the part of the gentle ghost concerning the equipment, billeting and particularly the benefits of the Revolutionary soldiers and the G.I.'s of today.

The show was one of the most

charming bits of drama and delicately handled presentations we have heard, outranking some of its pretentiously ballyhooed brothers and sisters by far. If the forthcoming "So Proudly We Hail" presentations continue in the same caliber, 4:15 p.m. on Saturdays is a very good time to tune to KFI.

#### "Pianists of the Future"

Like many friendly offerings from Pasadena independent KXLA, this sincere little quarter-hour daily is a small package, enclosing a diamond of unusual listening luster.

A well-chosen organ theme sets the quiet salon background, as Scotchman Bob McCune graciously steps forward

#### Victor Lindlahr

For fifteen minutes a day at 9:15 a.m. what you eat is Victor Lindlahr's business—that is, if you happen to be listening to KHJ. With threats, pleading, cajoling he tries to make his audience mind their calories. But for those established devotees of the game or for beginners desirous of a proper and winning game, Robert Lee Johnson, most popular radio bridge authority, lines up the hands, then suggests the bids and reasons behind them. Later in the show dialers get a chance to win one of his two excellent books on better bridge.

Nightly at 10:15 KMPC presents your authority. Monday and Wednesday nights Mr. Johnson verbally deals the hands and gives the questions to be answered for the prize. Three correct out of possible four win. Tuesday and Thursday are given over to bidding and discard information, and Friday evening sees the questions by the lis-tening audience answered. A few weeks of this and you can pull your chair up to a table of experts with nary a worry ... at least about your bridge.

#### Downtown & All Around

Nothing is more conducive to stir-ring yourself out to go see your own town than hearing about it from someone who has rambled through the zoos, the cactus gardens, the museum or the parks.

Mary and Harry Hickox fog the fact that they are sponsored by and work. ing in co-operation with the Down-town Shopping News by the very lightness and unrehearsed sound of their Monday-through-Friday four o'clocks over KFI. But Mr. Howell's ideas run along such lines as tracing the current continental European food shortage, or the work, in all countries, of old debbil weather man, who flies the flag of no country.

Or touching lightly on atomic re-search by pointing out that it would expedite mass production, then par-alleling with this the Columbia Uni-versity College of Physicians and Surgeons' report that there are thirty-three viruses known as usable that could further facilitate this whole-sale killing should some nation care to resort to these measures during wartime.

"Awful," retorted Mrs. F. curtly.

We sat back and listened intently. Ad-libbing your way through thirty minutes of airtime is no simple stunt, but the Frankoviches managed it with a maximum of ease and a minimum of awkward silences and repetitions. Their cook, Olive, served them coffee as they talked, and they even managed to drink that down in between ad libs.

They talked of many things—of an item in the morning paper, the opening of the baseball season, of a movie they had seen the night before, of Mike's annoying habit of leaving his clothes strewn around the room (this from Binnie, of course). Mean while, Olive shepherded the Frankoviches' three lively youngsters—twins Mike and Michele, and Pete—into the carpeted hall, then, on a signal from their father they sidled shyly up to their parents' side to say brief hellos to their mother and father's radio friends.

#### Infrequent Appearances

"We don't like to have them on the show very much," Binnie explained to us later. "Only for a few moments once a week. Your own children always appear to you to be the brightest, cutest, most entertaining kids in the world, but other people can become darned bored by them."

As for ad-libbing a half-hour airshow five times a week, Binnie exclaimed that, although in the beginning she had sweated through just ten minutes of the show and thought that by then they must have talked overtime, the thirty minutes is gradually seeming less ominous. "You know," she told us, "in my picture work I've always been allowed to ad-lib. I would be given merely the gist of what was to be done and then could do it in my own manner of speaking. I'm much more at ease then."

We found the striking-looking Mrs. Frankovich heartily sold on radio, to the extent that she may abandon her screen career almost entirely.

"I didn't like radio at all before," she grimaced. "But now—oh, I can't get enough of it! I'd like to do another show in addition to this one! I would love it!"

Asked how the "Binnie and Mike" show came to be, the actress related: "I don't know exactly. Our friends were always remarking on our exemplary family life—we are home a lot, we don't go night-clubbing, our neighbors all know us so well and the kids are known by everyone. Anybody who sees them says, "There's Binnie and Mike's kids,' you know. So the thought somehow grew for a radio show that would present all the little amusing and heartwarming things that are a part of everyday family life—particularly a large family. Ours is comparatively small," she smilingly observed. "I was the youngest of sixteen in our family. One of my sisters now has fourteen children and another has twelve. So," she concluded, returning to the subject at hand, "we made a sample record of this family 'Breakfast' show, and here we are."

Even while we were talking, Binnie was intent on garnering tidbits for the next day's broadcast. Mike had kissed her goodbye immediately after their sign-off to head for his office at Republic. But a few moments after his departure, the three children, who had raced out to see him off ("He has a loud exhaust on the car just for the children's amusement," grinned Binnie. "Our poor neighbors are nicely indulgent.") came racing back in with the lament, "Daddy's car won't start, Mommy, and he wants you to give him a push!"

"Now, there," announced Mrs. Frankovich, turning to us, "you see? Every morning I find myself out in the driveway heaving at the back of Mike's car. Tomorrow I'm going to talk about *that* at breakfast!"

> EADING a Lucky Strike commercial is as exacting ... and as much fun . as singing at the Met!"

Oh, come now! But that's what the man said.

Startling words, indeed, yet they came from a man who does one, and has done the other.

Nearly all of us have heard Basil Ruysdael, during his years with the American Tobacco Company - spon-sored "Hit Parade" or Jack Benny show. We've heard him tell us about those Lucky Strike cigarettes being round and firm and fully packed. Some of us may have heard him as featured bass singer with the Metropolitan Opera Company during those golden years from 1910 to 1918 when the Met was featuring such voices in its company as that of the notable Enrico Caruso.

Mr. Ruysdael is a great big man, with a humorous, kindly face and a straightforward manner. And he has the most delightful and flattering interest in other people. One has only to meet him to find himself shortly telling all about his own work, interests and pastimes. Radio Life almost fell into this attractive pitfall, but we rallied enough to pull something about this announcer. And quite an interesting array of facts turned up.

Mr. Ruysdael had mentioned the "Met," and in answer to our sur-prised query, "Metropolitan Opera?", he answered almost matter-of-factly.

"Oh, yes, when I was in Berlin years ago I was engaged from there

to sing with them. I stayed with the Met in this country from 1910 until during World War I."

"Was Europe originally your home, then, Mr. Ruysdael?"

"Oh, no . . . I'm a New Yorker." Here he laughed. "I'm one of those 'Cornell men' you hear about. I had just been in Berlin for further musi-cal study."

He also explained how he came to leave the Met, that greatest of opera companies, after his eight years with it.

"Nineteen eighteen was during the first World War, you know, and I joined the Marines. Well, I went back overseas with them, and it wasn't to sing, believe me. Then when we returned, and I left the service, I decided I would go into that thing called radio so I got an that thing called radio, so I got an announcing job at WOR."

Just that easy ... "got an an-nouncing job at WOR." But Basil Ruysdael had been trained accord-ing to the rigid requirements necessary to an operatic delivery, and got off on the right foot in interpreting these lines of a different nature simply by adhering to a principle of his. He still employs this principle.

#### Is Sold

"I won't announce any product unless I'm convinced it's the best in its line and I'm sold on it myself."

That sincerity is very real. We might have been dubious talking to anyone else, but in Ruysdael's good, basic, man-to-man way, sincerity shows up in every word.

"If you were selling soap from

door to door, you wouldn't greet the housewife with a well-read babble of words concerning the soap. It's the thought behind the words that counts, and if you think it's a good product, you'll sound all right. That's why I enjoy my work so greatly ... it just doesn't seem like work, talking about things in which you believe, to people you know will bene-fit by what you say."

Basil Ruysdael joined the "Hit Parade" as a regular quite by acci-dent, thirteen years ago. He had been doing the voice of a cigarette in a commercial on the show and when an encouncing spot was left when an announcing spot was left open through illness on the part of the regular announcer, he took over the task. "Took over" is certainly the term. He's done their announc-ing since that day, with only two weeks of vacation from radio in thirteen years. That isn't exactly as confining as it may sound. The present work with the Benny show and the "Hit Parade" enable Mr. Ruysdael to commute to and from the six-passenger cabin cruiser he calls home while he is here on the coast with the shows. The big boat is anchored off Avalon, at beautiful Santa Catalina Island, and proves an ideal place for this ardent enthusiast to live.

It didn't need such a real taste of California to convert New Yorker Ruysdael, however. "I had been in California for two years around 1923, when I was engaged in instructing Lawrence Tibbett. I later announced on the same show Tibbett sang on ... the 'Hit Parade,' you know. But knowing a little about California, wasn't I glad to get back to the coast, though! More than by your sunny clime, however, I'm impressed by you people out here. No one in

E went up the hill to Bill Anson's house the other day, and had a most entertaining time. Bill, whom we met when he came here from Chicago last year, is a disc jockey at KFWB.

You probably know about disc-

jockeys, and how they have dis-proven the old adage that "there is nothing new under the sun," by the manner in which they have risen to heights unprecedented by almost any other radio figures. From the obscurity of being the guys who swept out the studios between changing records, they have swept to a popularity now insuring them great faithful audiences at even the most improbable hours. And all the songs, articles and stories appearing about them that depict them as a pretty glamorous bunch of boys do so with cause.

California won Bill in a contest. KFWB early sensed the phenomenal success of platter appeal as a ruse to beguile listeners with commer-cials. So a panel of advertisers staged a huge nation-wide audition for a top-notcher with a mellifluous voice and an easy delivery. Mr. Anson, of Chicago, belonged to the voice that won the "ayes" and found himself on short notice transplanted to our sunnier clime.

Emerging victor in a contest of any sort shouldn't have been a sur-prise to Bill. As a teen-ager he won a scholarship to the Chicago Art Institute in a competitive commercial art exhibition. Then a submitted publicity stunt won him a good spot in the advertising game. The result of entering, as a gag, a record he made doing a series of imitations won him a place with Paul Whiteman's group, with whom he toured for a year. This taste of the entertainment world so intrigued Bill that he went into vaudeville. Stunt night participation won him a nightclub engagement, which, in turn, led to work on the stage. A year after the advent of Anson meeting radio, he found himself doing seven air shows a day and more than that each week in vaudeville.

#### Not Haphazard

But background has paid off, and that's why Bill's show today is just a little bit different. He's an emcee at heart, and likes people. And there's no glancing at a page of carelessly scribbled ad lib reminders, nor a casual dipping into stacks of records

for any old platter his hand happens to light on. One of his delights is scouring through listings from the smaller off-label r e c o r d in g companies to find forgotten melodies and appealing arrangements. Then he listens to the records he chooses. Bill's own home has a special niche for his excellent collection of everything from an album of riverboat jazz to a group of Kostelanetz.

Invincible in his rank, he has established himself, through some thirty-odd thousand fan letters a week, as being enshrined firmly in the hearts of his followers. No wonder disc jockeys command plenty of respect these days! But we came across someone who bows not to any prophet of the platters. It occurred during our entertaining day at Bill's house.

The Anson home is high on a hilltop overlooking Hollywood. It's a streamlined, uncluttered place of sliding glass panels, patios and terraces, on a three-quarter acre site, and commands a magnificent view.

The day we visited, we were greeted by a tiny, fair-haired child. She was Ruthie, and qualified as being Bill's eldest by having reached the ripe old age of three. It seems that this was m oth er's day to shop. "Mother" is Gerry, the lovely blonde ballet dancer whom Bill persuaded to become Mrs. Anson shortly after he met her in Chicago. The Ansons' nursemaid was busy that day with the new baby, April, just six months old, and Ruthie, left to her own devices, wanted to play. "Daddy" was putty in her h ands, even when "play" turned out to be a prety big order. It seems that playing house is just impinging itself on the child's mind, so that started it. Even a network president who would order one of today's mighty knights of the turntables to sweep up would be regarded as out of his mind, but not so with little Miss Anson. A word from her sent Bill scurrying to a broom closet to don apron and man the mops.

Our pictures tell you better than any words we could employ just what went on, when one of radio's high-powered boys of that group whose opinions can either cement or undo even a record company's best efforts, fell into the right hands.

We stayed quite late to watch the fun. And do you know who had the best time of all that day? That's right. Bill Anson.

J T DOES something to you, we've always maintained, to get up as early in the morning as KECA's "dawn patrol", Ralph Langley and Doug McKellar. They have to rise and shine, week in and week out. But the funny thing is that in the case of these two KECA announcers who head the first shows on the station's broadcast schedule, hustling around early seems only to have given them a keen sense of humor and helped them to see the cheerful side of life.

You'll go far to find two members of radio's numerous announcing profession who have more fun at their work—Ralph Langley, who starts the day with "Morning Watch" (5:30 until 6:30 with a quarter-hour out at 6 for the news), and Doug McKellar, known to his audience as "That Feller McKellar" (6:30 until 7 a.m.). Besides enjoying their work, they radiate good fellowship to their fans, as the mail bag proves.

In a way, you might say that KECA could count these two early shows in the "public service" column, for they definitely help citizens of this area off to a more cheerful start, especially those whose pursuits make it necessary for them to be up at the crack of dawn.

#### Likes Change

Master of his own particular brand of zany humor, Langley says his new "Morning Watch" (recently changed from the "Musical Clock") offers him more inspiration. Think of the possibilities, he says. He's now able to watch the clock and get paid for it, watch for all kinds of new ideas to pass along to his fans, and watch for lively recordings with which to entertain the customers.

Doug, "That Feller McKellar" to you, presents a fast moving half-hour of sense and nonsense. Corny waxings and lively rhythms are features, as well as his own gems of wisdom and sage advice on such weighty subjects as how to get "junior miss" out of the bathroom out of the bathroom so that the old man can get shaved in time to catch the 7:05, and what to do with Bobby when he uses the available supply of hot water to make a bathtub lake for his boat.

We're sure it really must be getting up at the crack of dawn which heightens the Langley and McKellar senses of humor. for the things that go on around KECA's usually business-like studios in the early morning happen at no other time in the day. On a recent morning when George Irwin arrived for his 7 o'clock newscast, he found all the studio furniture removed and a gav red hobby-horse the only available "seat" from which to read the news. It was George's birthday anniver-sary, and the early morning boys had to have their joke.

Then they're given to all sorts of ideas. Recently Morning Watcher Langley has been afflicted with that common ailment, the housing problem. Making conversation in front of the mike one morning, he men-tioned that he'd soon be living in the back seat of his new automobile. Two days later he received a letter from one of his regular fans saying she was saving old nails for him, and since her husband works in a lumber yard, she might also be able to save him some second-hand boards! This gave Langley an idea, so he announced if his listeners would each save him a bucket of dirt, he'd soon have a lot on which to build a house—if he could find a place to put the lot!

Both Langley and McKellar bring into the fun the members of the en-

#### **Helped Build Station**

Ralph Langley, blond and genial, has a long record of experience in radio though at the outset, he ad-mits, he got into the business by accident. He was working as an engineer in an eastern Arizona town, when a friend decided to build a radio station, KGLU, at Safford. Adaptable Langley, intrigued by the idea of a new field, helped in the station's construction and remained to become its program director, doubling as emcee and newscaster.

He later became announcer on KTAS. San Antonio, Texas, and on KTUG, in Tucson, Arizona. An Oregonian by birth, Ralph returned to his native Portland, where he worked on stations in the northern city, before finding his way to Hollywood and KECA.

Doug McKellar hails from the neighboring city of Pasadena, but he's been anything but a "local boy" since he reached man's estate. After attending Stanford, U.S.C., Pomona College, the University of Arizona, and the University of Hawaii, he found himself an announcing berth on KGU in Honolulu. Later returning to the mainland, he worked at KMTR and KFI-KECA. Then came the war, and Doug joined OWI over-(Please Turn to Page 39)

By the time Mr. Darby was able to resume his duties, Carl Mahr had so well established himself that he and Frank decided to join their televity Frank decided to join their talents and efforts, and branch out on their own, with Frank as manager.

Despite dissimilar backgrounds, the two get along famously and can probably be pointed out as one of the most consistently placid duos of musicians around this radio center.

#### **Musical Heritage**

Carl, smaller and blond, who benefits musically with the German heritage that gave him his blue eyes and light hair, was the son of accom-(Please Turn to Page 39)

OR the past several years, variety and musical shows on the air, as well have in some way featured choral groups in accompaniment to their artists. On an air show they may simply provide background, they may liven up the commercials with a rollicking jingle about the spon-sor's product, or they may be a featured group.

In looking into the background of one of such featured groups of vo-calists, the Carl Mahr Singers, Radio Life came across a happy combina-tion whose pooling of talent and skills has led them far. Most consistent radio listeners have heard them, over a period of years, under various names, and with groups of from three to forty members, on such topflight shows as the "Ford Hour", on which they appeared as the Landt Trio; on the old Frank Fay

plished musicians, and through his parents' interest was released from academics to benefit by private musical tutoring. Now this fine pianist and arranger of choral groups is known from coast to coast. While in the east he did arranging for such names as Andre Kostelanetz, who had the Coca-Cola show, and for Beatrice Kaye with her "Gaslight Gayeties". Boston-born. Carl has been turned by time and California into a native at heart, and he is now employing every spare moment in the building of a ranch home in beautiful Simi Valley. located between Hollywood and Santa Barbara.

Carl laughed when he spoke of his work on the new home, and explained that Frank was usually on hand to help. "That man's never without a stamp or a hammer in his hand when he gets time." True. Frank is an ardent philatelist, and his stamp collection is outstanding. Time must not be plentiful for Frank with his work and his interest in Masonry. which has led him to the degree of a Royal Arch Mason.

Tenor Hollday's ability as a singer is more a natural outgrowth than a result of heavy training. Born in San Francisco, he couldn't have been more than five years old when he started piping childish melodies. "My mother used to play piano yery well, and while I was so little-I could barely see the keyboard I'd insist she play the only song I knew, 'Dear Little Boy of Mine'. so I could sing, loudly and not well." But much water has passed under the musical bridges since that time, and it was no child with a one-song repertoire who later sang with the San Francisco Symphony orchestra, and went on to appear on Broadway as early as 1938, and later to join the hardto-crack eastern networks.

It seemed impossible that Carl and Frank share the same tastes and work, even to both being extravagant admirers of Bing Crosby and John Charles Thomas, with never a disagreement. When asked if differences ever arose, they answered almost as one. "Differences of opinion, certainly, but we never argue them. We sit down and discuss them casually, as though they were topics of no great importance. That way we can arrive at a conclusion of the difference with no time wasted and a clear understanding by each of what the other thinks and feels."

Carl Mahr and Frank Holiday share that rare understanding of the fact that radio is a very flexible thing, and that they must keep their medium, a choral group, abreast of the changes in all types of show. Their adaptability in their work was best evidenced by the fine showing they made on Xavier Cugat's first Hollywood Bowl concert, when they employed, arranged and conducted the use of forty voices in the Latin rhythms necessary for a Cugat performance.

We don't know what name the group will carry, possibly the "Carl Mahr Singers", but with the return of the fall shows this year, listen for some of their fine choral arrangements, and remember the two nice guys who arrange all this for you.

seas branch, and later the navy, before returning to KECA's announcing staff several months ago. Reflecting his life in Hawaii, McKellar still lists as his hobbies spear fishing, grunion-hunting and "snail-watching"—but this rugged-looking brunet young man also admits that he likes raising chickens and vegetables!

Maybe getting up early has something to do with his choice of hobbles, too, for Langley also lists fishing and working in his garden as his chief hobbies.

Robert L. Besser, "one of the Bobs" frequently at the controls when "Morning Watch" takes to the air, says that he also got into radio quite by accident (though we doubt it). He says he was going very nicely as a grocery store clerk and filling station attendant when someone gave him a crystal set! Besser studied radio, radar and television, and during the war installed radar equipment on planes at Lockheed. Before that he worked at WMT, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, his home state.

Robert A. Binkey, the "other Bob" behind KECA's early morning controls, comes from Pennsylvanla, He's been interested in radio since '33, when he built his first amateur set. Since then he has worked as transmitter operator at WHJB, Greensburg, Pennsylvania, and at WCAE, Pittsburgh, and was radio and motion picture operator while in the U. S. Army.

We're not recommending that all of Los Angeles' citizenry start arising at 5:30 each morning...but if the sun shining in your window, or the birds singing outside just happen to wake you up, then we do recommend that you dial 790 for "Morning Watch" and "That Feller McKellar"...They'll help the day off to a better start!

California is consumed by anxiety over themselves. They're friendly, helpful people."

#### Nostalgic?

Jack Benny's comedy show and the "Lucky Strike Hit Parade" in no way resemble a Metropolitan Opera Company production, and we wondered if once in a while Mr. Ruysdael didn't hark back with real longing to those old strains in the classical vein. We had recalled something humorous to him, and he laughed as he answered.

"Oh, no. I suppose I am a classicist in my musical tastes generally, but I sincerely like popular music. It offers a lot, and then too, I've worked with such wonderful people on both these shows, Benny's and the 'Parade.' And there is such freedom from strain on these programs. So when I do any reminiscing about my operatic career, it's not with longing. I am more often inclined to remember a rather frightening incident. It happened when I was singing with that grand old man, Toscanini. I didn't know at the time that he never, never gave sing-ers a 'cue'. In my part I had to come in right in the middle of a bar of music. Well, not knowing any better, I asked Mr. Toscanini to cue me. He agreed to, finally, but I'll never forget the look he gave me. Later, when he and I became such friends, I learned what a precedent he had violated. So I guess my one claim to distinction is that I've been cued by Toscanini!"

Unless, Mr. Ruysdael, you can count having your voice recognized by millions who can almost repeat your commercial verbatim as a "claim to distinction."

"I don't think it's good when the actor has to work at concentrating on his portrayal. The only thing that is necessary is that he believe what he is speaking. If he believes in his script, then his performance can't help but be effective. That's why Elliott Lewis, for one, is so good. He believes in what he is doing."

Returning to talk of "Johnny Modero," Jack declared: "With no false modesty, the fact remains that I can't miss with 'Johnny.' The scripts are so good. I don't have to 'billboard' a single simile. 'Johnny' will never run out of 'em."

Questioned about his own eventual aspiration, Jack's broad grin spread across his face again. "Well," he answered with disarming earnestness, "I'd like to make a lot of dough."
