Percolating Mentality, and That Fabulous Source of Energy, Keep Spunky Helen Gerald Moving as Fast as Her Saddle Shoes Can Go

T WAS a sloshy afternoon when radio bobby soxer Helen Gerald bustled in to see us. In saddle shoes, bright green sweater, gray chalk stripe coat and flapping head scarf, she didn't look an inch like the upsweep pictures we'd seen of her before.

Nor did she talk like them. Whisk went the bandana. Swoosh went her fingers through her hair. "If I'm mussed, you understand," she explained matter-of-factly. "It isn't a bit nice out." Within a space of about two minutes more we also learned that: she'd had a colossal day at U.S.C., she hadn't seen us

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for such a long time, she loved the way we wore our hair, our new offices were *beautiful*, and she'd like to go somewhere and have a cup of coffee.

A perpetual enthuser, Helen nonetheless thinks as fast as she talks. Her eyes literally crackle with intelligence and vitality, and she uses her smile as an ingratiating punctuation mark for every busy sentence. Scarcely twenty-one, so far she has successfully combined a college drama major and psychology minor with microphone work on nearly every major dramatic show, and noteworthy emoting in ten motion pictures.

DRAMA WITH A FRENCH, ITALIAN, Spanish or English accent. "Nothing to it," assures lovely Helen, who masters them all

An expert with dialects, Helen speaks three other languages as fluently as English . . . French, Italian and Spanish. Her mother, who also holds a degree as a Doctor of Philosophy, was formerly a language professor for seven years at Columbia University, and has tutored both Helen and her older brother, Robert, from the time they were children. In addition, Helen made several trips to the continent as a youngster, visiting friends and relatives in Italy, France, England and Spain. This extraordinary background in language is apparent in a sort of smooth polish of speech and manner rarely found even in grown-ups. Perhaps it is part-explanation too, why Helen seems so much more adult than her years.

Happy Home

Her family life is unusually harmonious and happy. Her brother, Robert, who will be married July 20, is now a teacher at Roosevelt High School in Los Angeles, having spent three years at Columbia and final degree training at U.S.C. Helen's father, who sang with the Philadelphia opera company before the war, is now with I. Magnin as one of the coast's foremost fashion designers. The Ciancaglinis (Helen's real name is Elena Ciancaglini) live in an ambling four-bedroom stucco in Burbank, just a few turns from former Lockheed Air Terminal. Altogether, the family has been quite active in the arts from the time that Helen was six years old, the protege of Theodora Irvine, and playing her initial role as "Cosette" in "Les Miserables."

It was Dimitri Ostrov, notable New York casting director, who first spotted Helen thereafter, in such Juvenile Actors' productions as "Quality Street", "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm," and "Anne of Green Gables", and wisely concluded that she was good acting material for Arthur Hammerstein's "One Flight Down." From her major portrayal of "Betty," Helen merited enough rave notices to land her firmly in New York radio.

At this time, as well, she was acting in foreign languages, with the Italian Theater of Art Company, headed by internationally famous Giuseppe Sterni. Franz Werfel's moving "Song of Bernadette" was then in the hands of Hollywood's casting directors. As one of the leading possibilities for "Bernadette," Helen was "imported" to the West Coast. At final judging, however, she was considered too young for the part (she was then fourteen). The family had moved west too, so they all decided to stay, and for the next few years Helen concerned herself with graduation from Burbank High School, in the class of '43.

HE Sportsmen are back from their first taste of vaudeville. Away to Chicago had gone the quartet with ol' Massah Benny's show for a week of breaking attendance and box office records at the Chicago Theater. After making their mark there, the boys and those lively, corny, great arrangements of theirs were taken by Benny to the Roxy, in New York. Here the troupe toppled the all-time high daily record of theater attendance.

However, the Sportsmen's enthusiasm for stage work holds no treason to the radio medium that supplied them with more than forty different shows on which they've worked.

Attempting to snatch their enthusiastic quotes from the air and tag them on the proper speakers when the boys are wound up is like pinning down leaves skittering in the face of a strong wind. But the enmasse consensus was: "Doing that vaudeville with Benny, Rochester and the gang gave us a new perspective on ourselves we would never have experienced otherwise. Periodically everyone in radio should take a flier at this sort of thing . . . make it part of their career. We enjoyed actually having a chance to see what reaction we were getting, and what went over best with audiences. We found that people want us to be funny. Our novelty tunes 'Sipping Cider Through a Straw', 'Brazen Little Raisin' or 'Wyoming' wow 'em. They were milder about our straight pop tunes." They Applaud Vaudeville From On Stage and Off, Call It "Good Training", and Helped to Shatter Attendance Records With Their Own Funny Acts

It's easy to combine their quotes on a subject in which they are so completely in accord, but impossible to think of this slick working unit who heckled Jack Benny so successfully through the past year, as anything but four. Each possesses a vibrant, outstanding personality all his own.

Talkative One

Bill Days is referred to as the top tenor, and he's the boy who is the business manager within the group. Bill claims to spend most of his time on the telephone, and this probably accounts for the fact that he talks more than the rest of the boys.

Max Smith, second tenor, is the quiet one of the group when they' aren't warbling, and augments his musical duties by being secretarytreasurer of the group. Max keeps tab on the bills and signs the checks. It was he, too, who kept a complete day-by-day log of the boys' eastern junket.

Marty Sperzel, baritone, manages their business office hidden away in the Otto K. Olesen Building in Hollywood, and can be depended on to line up the quartet when duty calls.

The member supplying the bass voice is Gurney Bell. In the role of librarian he keeps his finger on musical matters, and he's also the guy who usually starts the nonsense among the group. The foursome love to clown, and kid each other continuously and unmercifully. Some of their best arrangements grow out of this kidding around, and in order to keep up the spontaneity only short rehearsals are held.

Two Arrangers

John Rarig, onetime singer with the group, is first arranger, Jeff Alexander the other, and the Sportsmen's lively ideas keep these two hopping.

The present group began working together in 1943, and you've since heard them on a galaxy of shows that included the Benny show, Ginny Simms show, Judy Canova and Eddie Cantor hours and Jack Haley's show. Incorporated into an organization, they keep a regular business (Please Turn to Page 32)

I used to listen to Woody on a program that came from Hollywood, before he was famous." Back in Jamestown, North Dakota, Peggy never imagined she'd be starring on her own program from Hollywood with this same Herman. Or that her future husband and present co-star would be Dave Barbour, who played a torrid guitar on many of the records she spun while she dreamed of being a famous singer.

When Peggy joined the great Benny Goodman band as featured vocalist, this same Barbour was contributing his guitar in the rhythm section. Partnership of Lee and Barbour which resulted in matrimony has also given the world of popular music such hit numbers as "You Was Right, Baby," "What More Can a Woman Do?", "I Don't Know Enough About You," "If I Had a Chance With You," "If's a Good Day" and "Everything Is Movin' Too Fast" all numbers that deserve an encore on their summer show.

Hit Tunes

The third member of the trio, Woodrow Wilson Herman, who made his professional debut as "The Boy Wonder of the Clarinet," is best known as the bandleader who gave the record fans such prize items as "Fan It", "Golden Wedding", "Blues on Parade," "Caldonia," and many other numbers you just *try* and get.

"This is what I call a happy arrangement," beamed Peggy, speaking of the show. "I think Woody's wonderful and I love working with my husband. And I'd say that even if he wasn't my husband!" she laughed.

A show for youth, the young people presenting it are starting off with musical reputations and standards high. Guests will be drawn from the younger ranks of the celebrity lists— Diana Lynn and Donald O'Connor will be the first two. Popular music in a variety of aspects will be dished out, and there'll be a dash, to quote Peggy, "of humorous blues and an occasional 'artistic number'."

Cinders in the 'Private Eye'

There seems to be a blueprint for success on the air this season—just get yourself a show about a "private eye". We've decided to take the easy road to radio riches and fame by creating one of our own. After a quick listen to a couple of hundred detective stories in the last few weeks, it was easy. Anybody can do it—and most everybody has.

Our private eye will be called "William Casey". He has a secretary, "Millie", who has a sort of joyless affection for him. She never tells him so, but she keeps worrying about his safety—thus tipping her mitt, as they say. He merely states from time to time that he admires her work, a statement which merely gives "Millie" a case of the sulks.

"Casey" also has a pal, and here we've run into a little difficulty. We can't decide whether to make "Pal" intelligent and drunk or dumb and sober. Hmmmn, maybe we'll make him all four.

Each week our detective will get involved with a different femme fatale. This creature will be almost censorable—but not quite. She'll be mixed up with one or more of the shady characters in the script, but at the denouement of each story she will be revealed as (a) the *real* murderer, or (b) an innocent victim of circumstances, "shielding the man she loves". In this latter case, she will, of course, commit suicide.

By dint of careful study of many current scripts, we've decided to break our story down to six basic scenes. One: we meet all the characters and one is found dead under mysterious circumstances a couple of seconds after talking to "Casey" about a case. Two: "Casey" discovers a clue. Three: he discovers another clue, contradicting the first one. Four: he is involved in terrible trouble and comes close to death. Five: he discovers that the first clue leads to the real murderer—the second was just to throw him off the track—and he traps the killer. Six: he explains to the audience what happened.

Sunday, 4 p. m.) is out on the loose!

"People are more fun than anybody" on this copyrighted new radio brain-tempest, starring "The Off-Guard Con-versation". On one single broadcast, the microphone traveled to the cigar counter of a hotel lobby and watched a man wonder whether he'd dropped a new \$10 bill . . . snuck up on an electrician while he unperturbedly helped ABC's reporter figure costs on a home-model electric chair . . . hung around the waiting room of a doctor's office as two expectant fathers com. pared their wives' constitutions . . . hid (undetected) under the chair of a "private eye" . . . recorded merrily away when the program's sleuth accosted and argued with a man about his mustache.

Permission to use incidents is pro-cured from the individuals, so this outrageous new view of life as she is lived is legal. Occasionally there's need for erasing (the man got noisily bothered about his mustache) and a pleasant voice interrupts "Censored, Censored, Censored." But most of these words-unawares are delightfully entertaining ... radio's own March of Time, with no cramped style on subjects!

The dozen or so radio reporters who travel about the five New York bor-oughs gathering "material" for the show remain anonymous. Studio narration is Lamont Johnson's and Dorian St. George announces. The whole unusual series is an original Alan A. Funt production.

We've always believed that the flavor of real people talking real talk is something that no actor could possibly approximate. When these same "real people" set up before a mike, however, they usually turn into Mr. and Mrs. Joe Doakes, unable to project anything but a self-conscious murmuring of their name, age and occupation.

At last, real life conversations are brought onto the air intact. You may feel a slight twinge of conscience about the propriety of eavesdropping, but the sound of private conversation plucked from the office, street or cof. fee shop also gives you a strange feel. ing of omniscience and somehow turns out to be oddly moving.

"Fiesta"

We've heard tell that "Fiesta", KNX at 8 p. m. on Fridays, is one of CBS's most popular audience shows because it's "so much fun to watch." Happily, a good deal of this spirit comes through to the listeners. The name "Fiesta" is no misnomer. The cast of singers and musicians contrives to make the show sound like a gay party.

Star of the show is the explosive Latin from Manhattan, Olga San Juan, whose bombastic vocals may lack the subtlety of a Carmen Miranda's, but whose showmanship and enthusiasm key the tempo of the half hour. Olga specializes in those bingo-bango South Advertisement. American songs whose lyrics seem to

be made up chiefly of sounds likc "chi-chi-chi-chi-bim-bim-boom" with an occasional yelp and a "dr-r-r-r-r rrrr!" thrown in for good measure.

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Olga also carries much of the dialogue that aids in tying the musical numbers together. Usually the slight plot-thread in the show is concerned with a slight mixup between romantic baritone Bob Graham as the "Americano" and Harry Bartell as "Pancho", a south-of-the-border comic, vying for Olga's attention.

"Pancho's" comedy is in the familiar "you know my seester's neck—well she's in the reever up to eet" vein. (The voice rising on the last word in each sentence.) Naturally, Bob wins these romantic squabbles in a song but "Pancho" wins the laughs.

Señor Wilbur de la Hatch (known as plain Wilbur Hatch on his other shows) supplies the music in Señor Lud el Gluskin's absence. In addition to being satisfyingly Latin, the arrangements are gay and theatrical enough for those folks who can take a samba or leave it alone. The five Brazilian Samba Kings supply authentic Brazilian rhythms to which Olga San Juan more than does justice.

The best recommendation we can pass on regarding this program is that several listeners we know, who were formerly allergic to Latin American music of any kind (due probably to injuries received in conga lines), think that this show is fun. Olé!

"Plays by Ear"

Learning that author Hector Chevigny is blind, some will want to hear his NBC "Plays by Ear" through morbid curiosity or hypocritical pity. No such attitudes are welcome.

With great simplicity, Chevigny takes the microphone (KFI, Mondays, 7:30 p. m.) to host this compelling Monday half-hour of miraculous wisdom and drama. The series originates in New York, and we would surmise from the few pauses in his introduction that he is reading from script in Braille. Oherwise the entire work is that of a man who holds with no sodden sympathy for his handicap ... who wants his listeners to know the fantasy he has seen in the dark.

Chevigny writes with the smash of a Huxley or a Wylie . . . but his pen holds new ink . . . indelible compassion. Beneath the surging surface of this ridiculous, neurotic, colossal, beloved century he contends that there is a vital circulating vein of basically fine humanity. Atom-worried, laborbewailing, delinquent-weary dialers will be grateful to know someone thinks so.

Casting of these dramas could perhaps be better, is our comparison of opinions. Joseph Curtin's mature voice recently was out of whack with the

character of a thirtyish, susceptibleto-romance scientist. Musical offset is heavy and a little typed, for so much inspired whimsy.

But such paltry quibblings are chaff before the wind. What one magnificent mind can do with sustaining radio time is the monumental consideration. Corwin, Oboler and Welles have found a fourth crusader.

"Housewives' Exchange"

Laconic Jack Sherman casually announces himself as the "old Skipper of the Skillet" (reminiscent of anything?) daily over KFVD at 11:30 a. m., to dust off the recipes stacking up at the station, and to deal out the prizes.

Right now, the program is prizehappy. One prize goes to the daily sender-in of the best set of lyrics to the show's theme, "Humoresque". Another goes to the lucky woman whose phone number Jack has picked from the "Exchange" member roster, to call with the week's quiz question. The puzzler just now is "What are the first seven words to the 'Declaration of Independence'?" Third prize is on the membership contest.

For the sake of variety, probably, Jack really does give a few household hints of real worth, regarding the utilization of leftovers, how to bake a maple sugar pie, or the care and fooling of husbands who shy from disguised dishes.

The jackpot on the big membership contest is a David Jones Third Dimensional Sound radio, installed in any room of the winner's home, and finished to match the surroundings.

If you want to pick up some helpful hints, a laugh or two, and a chance at getting in on the goodies, better listen fast. The big contest goes off July 25, so gather your clan, have them all join "Housewives Exchange", then as quickly as they can, sit down and write Jack a letter telling him all about how you got them to join.

'Club 15'

Brother Crosby (Bob, that is) got off with a bang Monday night, June 30, on the new five-night-a-week, 8:30, KNX melody-variety offering, "Club 15".

Margaret Whiting joins the vocal offerings Monday, Wednesday and Friday, pretty Patti Clayton on Tuesday and Thursday. No effort is spared to make this nightly fifteen minutes a hit. Jerry Grey, long associated with Glenn Miller arrangements, does the scoring; the sprightly Modernaires get aboard with their novelties and backgrounds; Writer Carroll Carroll and Producer Cal Kuhl (the same partnership who contributed to the success of another Crosby—Bing, on the "Kraft Music Hall") supply the lightly-written dialogue that smacks of being strictly ad lib.

Undoubtedly there will be equally as many wry and scornful "Oh-no-ers" as "Yes-why-not-ers?" to the suggestion that in the wooing of a new audience Mr. Crosby would have done well to stand by the fame acquired through a distinctive styling that other musicians termed "phoney" Dixielandthen went to hear anyway. But if Mr. Crosby brought any disappointment to some dialers in leaving by the wayside the swell beat and style that immortalized "South Rampart Street Parade" or "World Is Waiting for the Sunrise", a few sessions of listening to "Club 15" will alleviate your sense of loss.

It needn't be an ordinary clambake, and Bob's just the boy who should know this. The baritone who has seen them come and go since the days when the Dorsey brothers had an orchestra together, to which he added his vocals, can turn up something pretty interesting with this opportunity. Hope he hasn't forgotten.

"Sunny Side of the Atom"

"The Sunny Side of the Atom", Columbia Network's Documentary Unit production of Monday, June 30, ran for an hour. That's a long time in the face of conflicting dramas, and it is barely possible that a few may have switched away to pursue other offerings. Not to a more lively show, nor a better narrated one. Nor to a more interesting nor mysterious one. There weren't any on the air.

To portray the Documentary Unit researcher who criss-crossed the country in several months of travel to visit America's main centers of atomic energy research, Agnes Moorehead was the perfect choice. Aggie's always in time with the show. Her introspective

dialogue matched the mood perfectly on every occasion.

The actual data assembled for the program on the beneficial uses of atomic energy were as enlightening as news of the atom bomb had been.

The wind-up scene between researcher Moorehead and a cab driver who thought "The atom should be sent back to where it came from" was a natural as an awakener and an appeal for more of us to learn about this "sunny side of the atom", to talk about it, read about it, and know that science in a period of a few years can convert atomic energy into feeding the world, striking oil where no oil exists, and tracing down disease to its eradication.

The broadcast was directed by Carl A. Beier, with the musical score com-posed and conducted by 'Robert Stringer.

The dosage of knowledge in this first of radio's comprehensive pictures of the constructive uses of atomic energy certainly turned a treatment into a treat.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"Wendy Warren And the News"

A cunning trap has been set by CBS for opposed-to-soap-opera dialers. Sly Walter Winchellish news flashes introduce the fifteen minutes beginning at 10:00 a. m. and the unsuspicious reporting voices of Douglas Edwards and "Wendy Warren" innocently carry through.

But beforeyoucansayJackRobinson, Edwards and "Miss Warren" have left their news studio, waved goodbye, and oopsie daisy, you're plunk in the mid-dle of "Wendy's" romances and har-assments, whether you like it or not. Dilemmas are fairly standard-two loves, a demanding career and the menacing sheathed sarcasms of a jealous "other woman". Then back comes your announcer with his Maxwell House Coffee commercials, and before your head's free of the ether, the operation's over. Painless?

Analytically, we'd call the entire trick cutting off noses to spite faces. In so surreptitiously snagging the news-listener, we think the program endangers its own main following, the soap opera contingent. In the long run, blunt honesty would be the best policy. The combination of current events and drama is novel enough to attract attention without arriving in pulled-up coat collar and dark glasses.

We would suggest that "Wendy" and Mr. Edwards indulge in a little outside-the-studio-door patter, to indicate that they are on their way into a news broadcast, but that dramatic folderol will follow. "Wendy", incidentally, is enacted by Florence Freeman, whose voice we have always liked. Charles Page Twelve

"Welcome Travelers"

Another good idea that seems to us to have gone slightly wrong is ABC's "Welcome Travelers", heard every week day at 9:00 a. m. on KECA.

The premise is an exciting one-Informal interviews with people trav-eling to or through Chicago. The pro-gram in practice, however, becomes just another audience participation show, perhaps a little more strident than most. It's aired from the famed College Inn of Chicago's Hotel Sherman, and ace emcee Tommy Bartlett is aided by Jim Ameche and Bob Cunningham in corralling his subjects.

People from such points as New Jersey, Kentucky, Texas, New York and even as far afield as India are put through the audience participation stunts. As in most shows of this type, it's the interviewees who make or break the program each day. The gentleman from India, for example, was interesting and informative about his country and his travels-or as much as he could be between emcee questions.

From a totally different point of view than that intended by the pro-ducers of the show, the program is fascinating—and that's if you're interested in phonetics. The conglomeration of accents that we Americans can dream up is truly amazing when they're all heard on one show.

The Dignified Voice of "Evening Concert" Informs the Fans of The Gas Company Music Program

H, YOU'RE not Thomas Cassidy!" is the greeting usually accorded this mikeman in an introduction. Possessor of a low, digni-

fied voice and a manner that conveys his personal interest in the great musical classics, he is afraid that the mental picture he projects is one of a paunchy, elderly pedant. At any rate, Cassidy is about thirty years younger than the fond fans of the Gas Company's "Evening Concert" imagine him, and in addition to his love of classical music he exercises a healthy interest in the songs of Bing Crosby.

"I guess people who listen to classical music don't write letters," he sighed when we asked him about the mail he receives regarding this popular series. Though the great segment of the listening public which turns on the "Evening Concert" night after night may not express its enthusiasm by mail, a more unusual tribute to the program is the fact that it has turned up as a background in two recent novels, according to Cassidy!

This mikeman's interest in classical music is a twenty-four-hour-aday affair. "I'm always thinking about the 'Evening Concert'," he laughed, "it's like a drug." He enjoys digging up brand new recordings never before heard locally and rediscovering rare classics. Three mornings a week he teaches voice at his own musical alma mater, the Los Angeles California Institute of Music and Allied Arts. A concert baritone, Cassidy admits that his enjoyment in working with the "Evening Concert" is so great that he has turned down vocal opportunities to continue with it.

A Bing Admirer

His present love of classical music started with an interest in singing as a small boy. And that's where Bing Crosby comes in! Bing was his first musical enthusiasm. "In fact, I used to croon like Crosby," he smiled, and then amended himself, "no, that's not right—nobody croons like Crosby!" Cassidy started studying concert baritone, and while a student with Irmalee Campbell he started on the path that led eventually to radio. His teacher asked him one night to see a girl student home to Ninety-First Street. "I remember thinking to myself, "Wouldn't it be awful to come this far to see a girl every night!" Well, you know what happened—I took her home every night for weeks and we finally got married."

Mrs. Cassidy liked Thomas's speaking voice and thought he ought to be a radio announcer. He went down and auditioned at KMPC. He didn't win but he surprised himself by being much better than he had suspected. He got an opportunity on an NBC station in Boise, Idaho, where he announced, did some writing, programming, interviews and concert criticism. Auditioning at KFAC for his present berth on the "Concert," he was chosen over a field of thirtyseven entrants.

"Musical background and luck," is the terse reason Cassidy gives for his

break. He has been with the program for four years now and has enjoyed every minute of it. He has taken only one day off in that time and doesn't know whether or not he wants to take his scheduled vacation. He does all the programming for the "Concert" and can remember to the date when he last played a selection. He follows the accepted style of concert programming used by symphony conductors and builds the show like a regular concert. "We open with an overture so people can finish their dishes and sit down in time to catch the symphony. Do you realize that a conductor programs five concerts a year while I have to do six a week? Multiply that by fifty-two and see what you get!" And the answer multiplied by Thomas Cassidy's four years on the program will give you a statistical idea of the work involved.

1250 Programs!

KFAC's wonderful record library is the source of these nightly concerts. In addition to the station's efficient musical cross index of records, Cassidy has compiled one of his own. Requests to the "Concert" usually take care of themselves, as he programs so far in advance that they are usually scheduled automatically. He has repeated only one program intact and that is his "Voices of the Golden Age of Opera". He prides himself on never talking down to his audience, and he keeps his musical introductions as short as possible. He wisely concludes that he would soon run out of material. concerning his music and musicians if he tried to

OWNS and people are pretty much the same the country over," Springdale's Mayor of the Town will tell you. "Twenty miles to the south of Springdale is Crescent City. Marilly, my housekeper, sometimes takes Butch over there for the day, but most of the time Butch and I head out to the north of town, on the River Road. There's an old swimming hole out there at Rock Creek, and a nice grove for picnicking.

"It's kind of hard, offhand, to tell you more about.Springdale. You have to know all the people who make it tick—Archie Chamberlain, our Chief of Police; Judge Williams, who next to me is the best checker player in town; Sexton Meader and our Reverend Dinwiddie. None of us are so proud of the part of Springdale just beyond the tracks at the foot of Hill Street. You understand there's nothing really bad down there, just some juke joints and a couple of pool rooms.

"If you want to know any more, think of your own town. I guess our folks and the places they've built up are just the same as any place else. Between now and next fall when we come visiting on the radio again, stop by my house some evening. We'll sit on the porch and I'll talk your arm off. Butch and Peewee Taylor and Bitsy Morgan will be playing out under the street lamp in front of the house. That's a standing invitation, and I'll be looking for you."

In Seven Hard Lessons

JUST LIKE POPS, TOBE JR. tackles the stove, but also like his "old man," the youngster admits his only specialty is eggs "however they happen to fall in the skillet." The Reeds live in a comfortable hill-top home in Hollywood, where the "real boss" of the household is "Butch," a sturdy stray wirehair that adopted Mr. and Mrs. Reed soon after they were married. MIKE, TYPEWRITER, TELEPHONE take only slight pre-eminence over the play-back recording machine. Tobe, Jr., poses in paternal manner, for Reed spends hour after hour checking and rechecking broadcasts, especially his narrative shows. In his library, however, are the best of other programs on which he's worked, including the Walter Pidgeon series, Fanny Brice's "Baby Snooks", Bob Burns, and "Duffy's Tavern". Home recordings are also a Reed hobby. His most prized record, Tobe Jr.'s first words, "bad man!"

HERE is probably no more industrious man in radio than Tobe Reed, and the things he works hard-

est at is keeping work a secret. "Work is for dull people," he says, and believes not a word of it.

It's all part of a game, and it finally climaxed itself when he softsoaped his three-year-old son, Tobe, Jr., into posing for some pictures for Radio Life.

> In Style With Styles

From Musical Comedy and Vaudeville, Hal Styles Has Brought Initiative And Originality to the Kilocycles, With Latest Venture an Air School

ACK in the days when radio was "wireless" and messages were transmitted in feeble dots and dashes, Hal Styles was graduated from a "ham" operator to a seagoing officer in company with such men as David Sarnoff, now president of RCA. Voyages around the world and from pole to pole tarnished the gold braid on his uniform and sent him back for a five-year hitch in his first interest, show business—vaudeville and musical comedy.

Those were the days when commercial broadcasting was shedding its swaddling clothes, casting loving eyes on the entertainment business, and Styles decided it was time for him to wed his technical knowledge of this new medium to his fondness for show business proper. So, in 1932, Hal Styles came to California and inaugurated his first news commentary in radio, "Searchlight on World Events," over KFAC. It wasn't long until Styles' infectious personality promoted him to the post of "Your Friendly Counselor" on KFI. Along about that time, he produced and starred in a half-hour variety show, "Joy, Incorporated", on KMTR ... and a smoothie, "Satin Silhouettes", over KFWB.

Then Hal Styles became the special events man extraordinary! He parachuted to earth with a portable transmitter strapped to his back, a mike in his hand, and described his jump to the audience.

Unusual Accomplishments

He broadcast from a diving suit as

he walked around the bottom of the Pacific Ocean. He broadcast from jails and hospitals. Then, when depression hit, when there were no jobs to be had, Hal Styles with his "Help Thy Neighbor" program found more than 30,000 jobs for unemployed men and women!

There have been many successful Hal Styles programs—many which will reflect Styles' interest in helping his fellow men. For instance, "Young America Speaks" was his original radio program devoted to the problems of juvenile delinquency. "Lest Ye Forget" was his original program dedicated to the problems of returning servicemen, which, among other things, found over 2,000 homes for veterans and their families.

In line with his penchant for helping the other fellow, Hal Styles last spring, sensing the tremendous flowering that was due in the radio field—with more than 500 AM and 600 FM applications granted in the last year—took over a radio school, immediately impressed his own personality upon it. Thus the Hal Styles School of Radio was born. It was immediately approved for veteran training.

When Hal does have a spare hour these days, he spends it with his chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese—and even goats—on his rancho in Reseda. And he even finds an occasional hour to take down the fiddle and bow that were his constant companions back in his vaudeville days.

Sir Thomas, on hearing that the mikeman was also a singer, grew expansive. "Come to England and I'll put you on, old boy," he told Cassidy.

Children Musical

Cassidy's two children, Dickie, three, and Peggy Anne, one and a half, are both going to be musical, he thinks. "Dickie knows KFAC and whenever he hears classical music he says, "That's Daddy's station." Dickie is also a "Whoa Bill" fan, and according to his father was rendered speechless for the first and only time by a visit to "Uncle Whoa Bill's" Fridav children's party.

Lawrence Tibbet and Igor Gorin are this baritone's favorite baritones. He has what he calls a minor collection of classical records—mostly vocal and mostly baritone. He likes popular music—"to dance to".

On Sunday, his one day off, what does he do for recreation? He takes a postman's holiday and goes to a concert!
