ERSUASIVE of personality and splendid of character is the charming gentle-man-criminologist whom mystery writer Craig Rice has creat-ed for her popular ABC radio series, "Murder and Mr. Malone."

It is happy chance that the man who enacts that role of "Attorney John J. Malone" is of equally ap-pealing quality. Few who have worked with Frank Lovejoy have worked with Frank Lovejoy have failed to feel his magnetic kindness. He is possessed of a poise which comes from thinking in terms of "other people." Resultantly, he has an ingrained courtesy above and beyond the Emily Post manual. He is not merely correct . . . he is chivalrous (a term fast-coming obsolete!)

Whatever else Frank Lovejoy's drawbacks of character, (and being guite normal, he must have a few), he is infinitely perceptive and generous. Tell him you're from Colo-rado, and he'll have something grand (and honest) to say about Colorado. Admit that you liked a certain book, and he'll reply (with sincerity) "I can see where you would." Not that his approach is stereotypedly Elsie Dinsmore . . . he just seems to have that faculty of considering "What

that faculty of considering "What would I like this guy to say to me?" Frank is married to blonde five-foot-two radioite Joan Banks, and of her he says, "My wife is a real hu-man being . . and I think she's a little hit smarter one than I am little bit smarter one than I am. Women usually are, you know."

Over the Cir

With Greatest of Ease Jaunts Walter O'Keefe, Who Revived "The Man on the Flying Trapeze" and Who Now Brings New Life to CBS' "Double or Nothing"

Getting acquainted with Walter is easy. It seems natural to have him call you by your first name five minutes after meeting. Getting a story out of Walter is not easy. He talks so interestingly on so many subjects and digresses so frequently

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Hollywood," he explained briskly. **His Attributes**

Our complaint is that Walter O'Keefe should have barged into "something in Hollywood" years ago, for he combines several requisite in-

gredients for emceeing: a glib tongue, a tongue he can put in his cheek, a dash of cheek for dealing with the public, and a way of dealing with the public because he likes folks. He recalled some Greek text from his Notre Dame days—a line about being "wise in the ways of cities and men"—that's the tip-off on O'Keefe's attitude toward people. Right now, his ambition is to tour South America, and consequently he's studying Spanish "so I can meet folks there on the same level."

Speaking of this reminded Walter of the time he was traveling around the country on Wendell Willkie's campaign staff and had to make a speech in Phoenix. Bravely starting out with four or five gags he thought were pretty good, he increasingly realized that he was scoring about sixty per cent with his listeners and couldn't understand why until he discovered that more than 5,000 of the 12,000 in his audience were uncomprehending Indians. O'Keefe still mirthfully refers to his "one night stand in Phoenix."

Walter likes a five-a-week series because he doesn't worry as much as he did when piloting productions like Lucky Strike's "Magic Carpet," his Nestle show, the "Camel Caravan" and "Town Hall Tonight." He claims to do his show thinking while driving from Pasadena to Columbia Square, where he arrives each morning about 10. In the afternoons he's planning to write songs and play golf. You'd never guess O'Keefe had survived infantile paralysis. but he says his bad leg bothers him when he runs.

Any publicity story on Walter makes a big point of stressing the idea that, had it not been for his illness, he might never have entered the entertainment field. That's difficult to swallow after hearing him tell a few stories in rapid-fire dialect. Although he dabbled in many fields, he could never have been contented permanently in anything but entertainment, in which he began his career by writing lvrics and skits. Then came a play that won a John Golden prize among the year's ten best. Later he joined Texas Guinan as her master of ceremonies.

During the three years Walter was at Barney Gallant's in Greenwich Village, he danced, sang, wrote songs, dreamed up skits, and cooked up impersonations. Then came his first venture in Hollywood, writing with Bobby Dolan the music for Ina

Walter's re-discovery of the song, "The Man on the Flying Trapeze," catapulted him to Broadway, then onto Rudy Vallee's air show, thence to ether stardom.

O'Keefe got a big bang out of his now twelve-year-old Michael, who, about a year ago, rushed home from school waving a paper and yelling, "Daddy, here's my radio contract!"

("And I didn't have any, at the time," Walter said with mock sadness in relating the story.)

The "contract," it seems, was a release to be signed by Michael's parents before he made a guest appearance on Art Linkletter's show.

"That's the only time I ever stood in a studio line," O'Keefe recalled, in telling how he and Mrs. O'Keefe attended the show.

Writing His Story

Walter is now writing a book, "My Mother Dropped Me," "which'll explain everything." He's been so busy moving and settling here he hasn't had time to book up old Notre Dame friends. Probably because he and Ed East both have shows on CBS, they have managed to see each other recently. But mention Notre Dame and O'Keefe will snap at the chance to talk about his great friend, Knute Rockne, at whose home Walter stayed during his first year (1916) at the university.

"Rockne always used to look me up whenever he came to New York." O'Keefe reminisced. "Between the time I finished college and one night when Rockne was in New York, I'd become a great friend of Heywood Broun, who had written for The World, but had switched to The Telegram about a year and a half before the night Rockne walked into the night club where Broun and I were I wanted Heywood to meet Rockne, so we went over to his table.

" 'Rockne,' I said, 'this is Heywood Broun.'

Horror Is Hard Work

A Lorre Characterization Requires All the Energy That the Actor Can Spare. Here's Our Description of The Screen's Ace Scary at His Job

> Saturday, 9:00 p.m. NBC-KF1-KFSD

WO PUBLICISTS at NBC passed Peter Lorre in the hall on the day of Lorre's debut as star of "Mystery

in the Air." He was wearing a slouch hat and had that ever-present cigarette under his lip. One trembling publicist is reported to have said, "Gee, isn't he scary?" to his equally unnerved friend.

A week later, both these boys were telling us what a nice guy Peter was.

Lorre, it seems, may scare the folks with his appearance, but it's his charm and humor that slay 'em.

It's on record that one of these attributes caused his fall from grace on his first professional stage job. It was in 1924, and Peter had been hired as a humble spear carrier. There was a line in which the star pointed off stage and exclaimed, "Look, here comes the eagle!"

"Everything would have been all right," explained Lorre, "but it so happened that he pointed at me. So

I dropped my spear, flapped my arms and tried to look as much like an eagle as possible—everyone was amused except the producer."

Tough breaks in trying to make good as an actor once sent Lorre to working days as a clerk in a banking house, while he took part in theatrical activities in his spare time.. Continually late for his clerking job, he was called into the manager's office for a showdown. The head man doled out his verbal spanking to the chastened Lorre, who listened respectfully and wiggled his ears throughout the speech. Both Lorre and the manager decided that the young actor should devote all his time to the theater!

Since his first screen hit as the pathological murderer in "M," Lorre has been famed as a fear-rouser, but many of his early roles in Vienna were in comedy.

Stage Set-Up

It's as the star of "Mystery in the Air" that we saw the impressive Lorre in action, however. He works alone at a mike in center stage. Paul Baron's atmospheric orchestra is curtained backstage out of audience sight, as are the workings of the sound man. The stage is blocked off behind Lorre, and supporting cast members come out from behind it to work another mike facing the star. This arrangement sustains the mood of the program and enables a spectator really to concentrate on the Lorre virtuosity. He acts every line out with all the talent and strength at his command. "Adventures of Charlie Chan'

Oriental proverbs and all, soft-shoed Charlie Chan came padding back to fadio last week, to courteously out-fox the foxey over Mutual network, each Monday night at 8:30.

Aside from some bewildering switches of scene, the half-hour was satisfying contrast to currently "standard" mayhem. Charlie's quaint observations ("These ancient eyes perceive a cartridge of unusual caliber") and polite workings with the local law are a great lift, after the pressure of strenuously picturesque crime-crack-ers who talk so bitterly, out of the sides of their mouths, to thugs and cops alike.

Original radio "Chan", Ed Bakeley, returns with the series. His pleasant impassivity makes the role authentically Chinese-cosmopolite (without conjuring picture of a bowing little Mandarin out of character in Panama Whites) and is a good radio match for Sidney Toler's beloved film enactment.

"Number One Son," as portrayed by Leon Janney, seems a bit "Brewster Boyish" after Keye Luke's expert handling of a young Oriental gone slap-happily American, but we'll grant the role's a hard one, and watch for subtle improvement.

Opening hoodwinker had its locale in San Francisco. Further "Chan" ad-ventures are set for travel about the globe, with Alfred Bester writing from the original Earl Der Biggers (Dutchman) formula. At the organ is Gene Perazzo, and throwing cues, Charles Vincent. John Cole directs.

Velly happy see you back, Cholly, after all these long thlee years.

"Jack In All Trades"

KNX Sunday afternoon at 3:30 of-fering, titled "Jack in All Trades," is a good at-home game as well as lively entertainment.

Five guests weekly visit the show, and on a blackboard onstage are listed their respective occupations, plus five more, for the sake of confusion. Studio participants attempt to guess, from this occupational list and the clues given by emcee Jack McCoy, what employment category each contestant falls into.

For whatever job category with which the visitor is tagged, he must answer five questions. For questions answered correctly, both he and the studio participant who named his work, get one dollar, two dollars, three dollars and so on up to the total of fifteen dollars. At the end of question time, the audience guesser has the

prerogative of standing by his choice of jobs for the guest, or changing for another category. Whatever his choice, if he is correct, his money is doubled. If his choice is incorrect, his favorite charity benefits. Mr. Guest receives a brand new Parker 51 fountain pen in any event.

Listening at home makes a good game. Jack McCoy not only has a delivery that includes everyone, everywhere, but manages the entire show so smoothly that even the unrestrained whoops from the audience don't annoyingly leave at-home-listeners in the dark. You know every minute what's going on and what's being said.

The Todds

The guitar and piano of Art and Dorothy Todd, CBS' Monday through Friday stint at 4:45 p.m. could be termed "hot" by lovers of that brand, "sweet" by adherents to the predominately melodious, and "swell" by anyone.

Too bad, they bear the unpretentious title of "The Todds". The initiated know, but at-random dialers hearing them thus announced would have no idea two able musicians were about to jump off into ten minutes of instrumentals and vocals that pack an old and a new, a happy and a blue.

Art rides his guitar strings and sings through Samba tempos, a touch of the west, or a page of the past with equal facility. Dottie companionably attends the ivories and vocals through all the arrangements, and deals out her own share of novelty, boogie or rhythm in a daily single.

Before formating their little show, the Todds pulled a couple of tricks from the good taste department. Art forsakes an electric guitar for a good, old, steel one, and both forsake coy chatter for brief announcements. They could call their program a musical cocktail . . . it's a good little lift at the end of an afternoon.

"Backgrounds For Living"

Can Chinese decorative accessories be tastefully combined with period



furniture? What are some approved floor coverings for the new outdoor rooms so popular in California?

Home furnishings and decoration, your own "background for living", is a particularly interesting subject just now while people are dressing up makeshift living quarters, or building homes. Edgar Harrison Wileman, decorator-commentator of KNX "Backgrounds for Living", Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 2:30 p.m., is one authority without that offensive positiveness. He merely suggests, in a most practical and charming fashion, ways and means of recognizing genuine antiques, furniture placement and color combinations, or wall finishings for everything from stall showers to play rooms.

Mr. Wileman's experience and training go back to the days in England, twenty-seven years ago, when he worked in a West End home furnishing store. After a few years he came to this country and joined Barker Brothers staff, who are now sponsoring his afternoon appearances.

You've gotta be good to stay on the air twenty-one years discussing as variable a subject as his. At a banquet given for Mr. Wileman on his twentieth anniversary, Barkers dragged out an old record of one of Mr. Wileman's shows, during which he had advised people to bedeck their walls with painted velvet draperies. The record was twenty years old, of course, and Wileman himself was amused. The change is apparent today when you hear Wileman prescribing simplicity, color and strictly twentieth-century modes and materials. The interested homemaker gets the best in knowhow three days a week through Mr. Wileman's excellent fifteen minute show.

" David Street Show"

The network made a production, with post-broadcast party, out of the "David Street Show's" firster last Friday at 8:00 p.m. Happy to say David didn't let anyone down. His deft baritoning included "The Old Chaperone" (the novelty he was first to introduce on the air), holding all the amusing dialect Dave does so well. Mr. Street's good voice is accompanied by the vocal group formerly associated with Glenn Miller's band . . . the "Mellowlarks". Ernie Felice, who also held a spot with a big band (Goodman's), brings his Quartet along for Friday's music makin'.

Studio pal George Jessel appeared as a guest, and host Street exchanged a few personalities with him regarding Lois Andrews Jessel Street Brodie. It didn't particularly spark the show, but couldn't be termed offensive, either. Both of them plugged George's "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now" with a fine vocal solo from David Street and some laughable remarks by Mr. Jessel.

A person wouldn't stay home especially to hear the program, but if you are near a radio at this Friday night time, David Street is the boy to hear. He's going to have more big name guests, too. Playbacks (Critical Comment)

Kate Smith Speaks

Selling America to Americans over the air has always seemed to us a little like exhorting a natural blonde to bleach her hair—the condition has already been established. Now that Kate Smith has moved to Mutual (KHJ, 9:00 a.m. Monday through Friday) from CBS we can't get with her any better than we ever did.

Not that we're immune to a wellplaced patriotic appeal now and again. Mason City's Meredith Willson can bring a lump to our throat by one of his simple tributes to a small American; we stand up and sing "The Star-Spangled Banner" all the way through at the end of each Hollywood Bowl program we attend. But when Kate starts over-plumping her Americanism—we just feel a pang of guilt over that *French* pastry we had for lunch yesterday and we fold up our *British* sweater and decide to wear it another day. The difference between the way Meredith and Kate present their appeals is not so much in the material they use as it is in the manner in which they present it. Meredith speaks as one fellow citizen to another. Kate speaks like a suspicious

"Hollywood Holiday"

We tore ourself away from the record jockey shows with great reluctance on a recent week-day night and gave a listen to KECA's "Hollywood Holiday" (Monday through Friday at 11:30 p.m.).

It may have been due to the late hour, but what we heard was merely the same old confusion of give-aways, audience participation, interviews and crowd noises. The show takes place in Tom Breneman's stay-up-late restaurant and the confusion is probably due to the effort to make the broadcast serve as a night-club floor show, too,

Jack McElroy is the emcee and though he wasn't too sharp on the show we heard him do, we've always liked his brief stints on other programs and have expected bigger things from him in time to come. But this isn't one of them. Jack's a good entertainer and a good singer and any merit the show may develop during the rest of the season will probably be due to his efforts.

To add insult to injury, commercials fly thick and fast throughout the chatter.

The show seems an obvious attempt to entice out-of-towners in for an evening's night-clubbing at you-know-where—but it'll be a cold day before the Breneman enterprises find us tucked away at a corner table. Then again, maybe that's the only way to get there early enough for "Breakfast in Hollywood"!

The atmospheric mysterioso filled the bill perfectly and "Ah Sin" was ushered in musically with apt descriptive strains. It wasn't until producer Jim Burton said that the "authentic Chinese music" sounded hauntingly familiar that Aurandt broke down and confessed that he had merely taken the old ballad "Is It a Sin?" and given it a "Chinese" arrangement.

Dept. of Useless Information

you're lucky if you don't kill yourself in between. Acting is hard work."

Frank's first radio show was "Gang Busters," in 1938. For a year he worked at WLW, Cincinnati, which he considered "a great professional training ground." Along with "Mr. D.A." (Jay Jostyn) he was part of the station resident company, and consulted a bulletin posted each evening listing assignments for the next twenty-four hours. Schedules included as many as four or five shows a day, with announcing on some, as well as acting. WLW's programming featured a great many educational and unusual ideas at that time, Frank recollects. "Famous Jury Trials" was one just beginning its long-time show career.

Among his New York radio jobs, Frank worked with Helen Hayes on the former "Lipton's Theatre" series ("a wonderful, wonderful woman"), was "Vic Manning" on "Joyce Jordan," "Larry Halliday" on "A Woman's Life" and numerous assorted characters on "This Is Your FBI," "Molle Theatre," "Crime Doctor," and "Theatre Guild on the Air." His collection of good friends on the way has steadily increased with programs, and on the whole he finds radio thrives with "a pretty grand bunch of people."

He has exceptional admiration, he admits, for Bing Crosby, with whom he recently finished Decca's "Man Without a Country" album (in which Joan is also dramatically featured).

Chosen Immediately

Frank's original purpose in coming to California was to fulfill an acting contract with "Story Productions." In the meantime, he has been on loan to Universal-International for the technicolored "Adventures of Black Bart." starring Dan Duryea and Yvonne DeCarlo. The "Murder and Mr. Malone" part was his on immediate audition, as soon as the series began on KECA at the first of this year; and in addition, he has been narrating the dramatic "Design for Peace" sketch weekly on the rhythmic army show, "Sound Off!"

When told that his story had been requested by a gratifying lettercount from Radio Life readers, radio's "Mr. Malone" smiled appreciatively and made a wise observation: "There's no test for how the public will react to you. You may be a big hit, or you may not, regardless of how hard you think you're trying. You're grateful when people like you. You shouldn't be mad when they don't."

Halfway through the rehearsal we noticed the beads of sweat standing out on his forehead. He had long since clawed his hair into an unruly pattern. As the climax of the script approached, the perspiration rolled down his face and arms, and at the conclusion his damp sport shirt clung to his tubby frame.

After a scene like this we would feel like going home for a good cry. Lorre? He stuck a cigarette under his lip, dimpled his round face into a sweet smile and listened to the cigarette commercial with apparent interest.

First blast at the illusion came when a grimy-faced tinkerer clambered up from behind a small and marvelous railroad train, with a "Hi!" It was the usually immaculate Mr. Rose himself, who, in that

door for complete quiet and working there is a lot of bunk, as far as I'm concerned. I usually do my work in any room of the house to which I lugged my pen and paper the night before. If there are people there, okay. If the radio is playing, that's all right too. Music is my business, not a thing apart from my life I

must drag away into solitude to work on. It's when I work at night that I come up here."

The "studio" proved to be a fas-cinating place of recording machines, a piano, shelf upon shelf of sheet music old and new, and seemingly endless albums of records that covered classics and jazz alike. Mr. Rose's music having a definite classical touch, we were frankly sur-prised to find among his record collection early 1920 Okehs and Brunswicks, with such artists as Louis and Lil Armstrong performing, but it seems Dave has a warm spot in his heart for this early music. "Of course I can't hark back *that* far, but I was on hand when a good many of the Chicago boys were making records I'd like to have in my collection today. After I got out of school in Chicago, one of my very first jobs was with Bud Freeman and Gene Krupa. We got the princely sum of two dollars to split among us for the evening's work."

Probably many times in the old days Dave's path crossed with that of the tiny dynamo, "Her Nibs" Miss Gibbs, who has now joined him on the Pabst "Blue Ribbon Time."

After Dave left the Chicago College of Music, he was pianist and arranger with the orchestras of Ted Fio Rito and Roy Shield before trying his luck in Hollywood.

Shooed to Fame

Little Georgia Gibbs began her career when she left high school in Worcester, Massachusetts, to tour with the old Hudson-De Lange band. Later she was with Richard Himber, featured as "The Gibson Girl." The big break came with the Cafe Society Downtown engagement in New York, when "Her Nibs" warbled "Snoo Shoo Baby" to fame. Radio and vaudeville engagements have kept her busy until she recently signed as Mr. Rose's-other half of the "Blue Ribbon Hour." Dave is delighted with the Gibbs voice and personality, and arranges two numbers each week for her lyrics, as well as part of the Rose medley that finales each week's show.

"Best thing about Georgia, though, is that she likes my train," he grinned. "But Georgia is interested in just about everything that goes on."

Being an interested listener himself has turned into a payoff for composer Rose. Less imbued with his own importance than just about any other highly successful artist, Dave pays attention to people and their conversation. He listens to their discussions and to stories of *their* hobbies. That's one reason the composing, that comes to him as naturally as walking down the street, often happens just like that.

"There is only one working rule I attempt to impose upon myself. That is to use pen and ink. In that way I avoid the erasing and changing that wastes time, and with me usually the first idea proves the best."

One night while sitting with a group of friends, Dave's attention was captured by the different tinklings made by glasses with varying levels of ice left in them. Into a basic melody he wrote several drum parts, one for each glass containing ice, and came up with "Happy Little Ice Cubes," a tremendously popular tune.

"Monte Cristo's" del Valle and Rodman Vie to Produce Culinary Masterpieces

WO seasoned bachelors

who like to cook are Jaime del Valle, producer of Mutual's "Count of Monte Cristo", and Vic Rodman, who plays "Rene Michon" on the adventure program. When the "Count of Monte Cristo" cast is enjoying a between-rehearsal lunch at Mutual's Hollywood studios, the conversation naturally falls on food, and usually goes something like this:

RODMAN: How do you make spaghetti sauce, Jaime?

JAIME: Well, I usually take, and add....., then I-(and so on).

RODMAN: Do you? You know I don't do it that way at all. I take more olive oil and add it when it is finished.

JAIME: I never tried that. By the way, what's your recipe for Beef a la Milanaise?

Since Jaime and Vic have never had the same recipe for the same dish, and since each recipe always sounds utterly mouthwatering, Radio Life thought its readers might like to try both sides of the same question and decide for themselves which they like the better. Here's

JAIME'S SPAGHETTI SAUCE:

- 4 lbs. spaghetti
- 4 lbs. chuck (small pieces)
- 10 large onions
- 6 garlic
- 4 cups olive oil
- 1 cup chopped parsley 10 oz. dried mushrooms
- 4 cans tomato paste
- 2 cans tomato sauce
- 10 bay leaves
- 1/2 tsp. sage
- 1/2 tsp. marjoram
- ½ tsp. oregano
- 1/2 tsp. sweet basil
- dash cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice and clove
- 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- salt to taste
- antipasto
- cuts of salami
- liverwurst
- minced ham
- cheese, peppers, olive

Wash mushrooms, add water to cover and soak. Cook in same water until tender. Fry out onion and garlic in olive oil and add meat. Cook all sauce ingredients in separate pot, simmering slowly. Add meat and onions about an hour before serving.

And Rodman's version of the same thing:

Fry one onion in olive oil to golden brown, add 1 large can solid pack tomatoes and 1 can tomato paste, add a large pinch of sweet basil, 1 large can button mushrooms and a few dry mushrooms. Then add 3 heaping tablespoonsful of salted capers in bulk and one cup of claret wine. Brown well 2 pounds of ground round and add to above. Let simmer for about an hour, then fry 3 or 4 pods of garlic minced in a half cup of olive oil and simmer for 5 minutes and add to above.

Jaime likes a good cole slaw salad:

- 1 tablespoon mustard
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon salt

1 cup whipped cream

Mix mustard and salt. Add lemon juice and 2 tablespoons cream. Beat remaining cream until it begins to thicken. Add mixture and continue beating until thick enough. Add shredded cabbage.

Vic's idea of the perfect salad to serve with spaghetti is a tossed green salad:

Dice four fresh tomatoes. Put in bowl, add minced garlic, olive oil, 2 cans anchovies, season with wine vinegar and chill. Pour over torn lettuce.

Vic has one favorite beef recipe:

Take beef and puncture several places, deeply. Put bean monde seasoning, food seasoning, black pepper and sweet basil into each incision with finger. Let set for several hours. Put in open pan in slow oven. Add claret wine from time to time, basting every 10 minutes till done.

But Jaime has half a dozen:

GUIDING THE DESTINIES of Boeuf Strogonoff with his right hand, del Valle industriously stirs the ten mushrooms (fried in butter) which will be added to the big, saucepan.



BOEUF VIGNERON:

Two pounds of beef cut into oneinch cubes. 3 or 4 chopped shallots or onions and garlic. Fry out onions and garlic and add meat. Place in deep casserole, cover with red wine. Season with salt, pepper, thyme, sage and bay leaves. Cover casserole lightly, simmer two hours in moderate oven. Half hour before serving, add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of browned bacon, $\frac{1}{2}$ pound mushrooms, and 12 small onions. Add to meat and cook $\frac{1}{2}$ hour more.

BEEF A LA MILANAISE:

Tie five pounds upper round beef into roll. Pierce thru in 8 or 10 places and insert pieces of macaroni and salt pork in alternating holes. Sear in hot lard all over, place in deep casserole or saucepan, and cover with following sauce:

Soak 2 oz. dried mushrooms in one pint hot water for one hour, drain and chop. Heat 2 tbsp. olive oil and fry out onion, then add 2 chopped tomatoes, the mushrooms, 2 sliced ortegas and the water in which the mushrooms have been soaked. 1 tsp. of Kitchen Bouquet, 1 cup white grape juice, 1 cup ripe olives, salt and tabasco to taste. Simmer all together 5 minutes, then pour over the beef, cover tightly and bake slowly in the oven, basting frequently. When tender, place beef on platter and surround with spaghetti which has been mixed with the sauce. If sauce has been thickened too much, thin with soup stock. Roast for 3 hours.

BOEUF STROGONOFF:

Clean two pounds filet of beef. Slice into thin pieces and mix with salt, pepper and dash of flour. Fry out chopped onion in 2½ tablespoons butter. Add bits of meat and ¼ cube bouillon, one tablespoon of Worcestershire, and one cup sour cream. Mix well and cook until a deep yellow-brown but do not dry sauce.

DEVILED STEAK (FLANK STEAK)

Choose steak about 1½ inches thick, weighing 3 pounds. Place steak in deep earthenware dish and cover with mixture of:

- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 2 tbsp. tarragon vinegar
- 2 chopped onions
- 1 chopped pepper
- 1 crushed clove garlic 1 tbsp. Worcestershire
- 6 whole cloves
- 6 peppercorns

Let stand 1 hour, turn over, let stand 8 hours. Heat 4 tbsp. olive oil in frying pan, lay in steak after wiping dry, and cook 3 minutes, turn over and cook until tender. Place in fireproof dish, strain over marinade and bake in moderate oven 25 minutes. Serve on same dish and sprinkle finely chopped parsley over it.

BRAISED BEEF:

Take 3 or 4 pounds of shoulder brisket or cross rib of beef, tie on it 2 or 3 strips of larding pork, and place in Dutch oven with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped pork fat and $\frac{1}{2}$ sliced onion; baste and turn the meat until it is brown on all sides; sprinkle with a seasoning salt and 1 tsp. paprika, add 1 cup boiling water, cover tightly and simmer 1 hour. Remove seeds from 1 green pepper, cut in strips and add to the Dutch oven with 1 sliced carrot, 2 sliced onions. Cover tightly and simmer for $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 hours slowly. Lift out meat onto hot plate and set in warm place.

MEXICAN TRIPE:

Roll one lb. of chuck beef into 12 small balls, roll in flour and brown well in hot olive oil. Boil 1 pound (Please Turn to Page 39)

Monty Moves In"

It Didn't Occur to Monty Margetts to Wait For the Breaks. She Simply Made Her Own

advance of the obstacles a Thespian experiences.

When her family realized her early determination to be an actress wasn't childish whimsy, her father advised her, "If you are planning any sort of theatrical work, you'd better get rid of your accent. Otherwise you'll play Noel Coward all your life, and starve to death."

Monty laughingly recalls: "Some years later I had occasion to remember that. I was doing an English part in 'I Want a Divorce', and the role nearly finished me around San Francisco. I noticed, after a few months there, that I never got any other radio parts. So I asked a friend in the studio to find out why. It seems the producer had remarked 'I don't want that hoity-toity English gal'on any of my shows!' Complimentary enough to my ability, but before he'd believe I wasn't *really* like that, he called up on the telephone to see if I would answer in a natural voice, or be what he'd described as 'hoitytoity'."

Own Scout

Born in Vancouver. Canada, the Margetts child attended private schools until a bogey known as "the depression" occasioned a family move to Seattle, Washington. Faced now with the fact that wheeling away to New York for dramatic study in one of the good academies there was no longer possible, the determined sixteen-year-old simply made up her mind to get some sort of training on her own hook.

"I scouted around and found out that the man who 'angeled' the Seattle Repertory Playhouse also owned a bookstore, so I made a deal with him to work out my tuition. I reviewed books all day. reviewed the Playhouse presentations in the evening, and both day and night tutored myself out of my English accent,

"When I began to act in the Playhouse shows, I did seven different maids' roles in one year. Next year I started with small parts, and the last three years wound up doing most of the leads. I learned my 'theory' by keeping my eyes and ears open, and got my practical training by playing the parts." The spirit of "I'll-do-it" that marked Monty's success in her first steps stuck with her when she first became aware of radio's possibilities and decided on a mikeside career. Vacationing in San Francisco in 1927, she became so enamored of that city that as yet she hasn't returned to Seattle for even a visit. She was too busy-in radio.

Nothing about five-foot-one-inch Monty suggests the determination that has carried her along so successfully, unless it's the almost disconcertingly direct gaze from her immense blue eyes. She laughs a lot, chatters away about the house she bought in Hollywood that is undergoing a current refurbishing, and manages to make even anyone doing reportorial snooping struggle to remember they aren't engaging in mere delightful conversation.

Another vacation and a look at Hollywood radio's wider horizons started Monty's move south, and since April of 1945, when she moved here, she has captured roles on "The Whistler," "Dark V enture," "The Ghost Walks" and "Cavalcade," and for many of the different testimonial commercials of sponsors' products.

Heavy Reader

The little actress makes a point of finding time to enjoy her home and her hobbies in the midst of the "busy-ness" set up by success. A voracious reader, she gobbles up everything from Dickens (her favorite), down through the mystery shelf to the precious old Oz books she's currently reviewing with Hilary, her six-year-old daughter.

Tennis and swimming keep Monty tan all year round, but she laments, "Since taking up gardening, I find myself using my bathing suit as the approved costume for every spare moment away from the studio. You see, I didn't know about 'flats,' and planted everything from scratch, literally. That's learning the hard way."

Away from her garden Monty favors very feminine clothes, and loves costume jewelry, with the exception of any sort of necklace. She (Please Turn to Page 39)

ADIO commercials may or may not be to your liking, but they do serve the purpose of telling people something and shouldn't be treated lightly," stated radio actress Monty Margetts, who's often heard delivering the sponsor's message.

"First of all, they should never be patronizing. Anyone reading a commercial who makes her listeners sound only half-safe, half-clean or half-smart destroys the entire appeal of her work.

"I think commercials should be acted out. Unless there's some heart in it, no series of well-pronounced words is going to be convincing.

"And for! women's products, a woman should do the talking. That, in my mind, makes it a 'me-to-you' thing.

"The pitfall to be most avoided is coyness. That can well be left to ingenue parts on youngster shows . . . it has no place in an intelligent commercial."

These very definite theories come from a real authority, Monty Margetts, whose ability and sincerity have enabled her to walk off with a goodly percentage of the live commercials we hear from Hollywood.

Because of its presence on our radio continuously, the commercial has bred some disregard and some high regard. A good reading of one of these toutings is no cinch to be awarded to a muddling novice. Many actresses won't even attempt them, irrespective of added revenue, because of the difficulty of sustaining a sincerity throughout. It's hard work.

Little Miss Margetts learned about hard work, and was warned well in

cleaned, fresh tripe until tender, cut in squares, dust with flour and brown lightly in hot olive oil. Place in pan, sausage balls fried in 1 finely chopped clove garlic, 1 chopped onion; fry until lightly browned, add 2 cupfuls of tomatoes, 1 chopped green pepper, 1 chopped pimiento, 1 tsp. Spanish seasoning, salt and pepper; simmer 30 minutes. Pile balls in center of hot platter, place around the cooked tripe, pour over the sauce. Note: Instead of sausage meat, substitute beef if desired.

Here's how Vic prepares rice:

Beef and tomato juice with food seasoning. Brown one cup of rice to golden brown, put in pressure cooker, cover with boiling water not over half inch. Steam for 15 minutes. Set pressure down gradually.

Jaime adds chicken to his:

SPANISH FRICASSEE OF CHICKEN

Cut up chicken weighing about 4 lbs. into serving pieces, put in kettle with five cups water and simmer until chicken is tender. Remove meat, cool, then roll each piece in seasoned flour and fry a delicate brown in fat. Wash and cook in the liquor one cup rice which has been fried in 2 tbsp. butter with 1 tbsp. each of onion and green pepper. Add 1 tsp. salt, ¹/₃ tsp. pepper. When rice is tender turn onto a platter, arrange chicken and garnish with parsley.

Then, we come to some specialties, in which both del Valle and Rodman each admit the other is pretty good. Here's Vic's recipe for ground meat:

One or two pounds of freshly ground lean round meat. Do not flat-

ten, but pat gently into patties. Brown in butter, then mince 3 or 4 pods of garlic and brown in butter. Add the juice of one lemon and baste the meat until done.

And Jaime's Caliente Salad:

Rub bowl (wooden) with garlic. Take heel of stale bread, rub with lots of garlic and place in bottom of bowl. One head of pulled lettuce, ½ cup of chopped parsley and dried beets.

DRESSING: Grind cloves of garlic in bottom of dressing bowl. Mix 4 tbsp. of salt, 2 tbsp. pepper, fresh ground, 1 tsp. brown mustard, ½ tsp. mustard powder, 1 lemon, wine vinegar, olive oil and Worcestershire sauce.

Ice lettuce, put in bowl, mix with ingredients and dressing 20 minutes before serving and wilt.

Vic's vegetable soup recipe also goes uncontested:

Take whole soup bone and cut into Add pint of water. Steam at full pressure for two hours. Remove sections. Place in pressure cooker. bones and set aside until fat congeals. Then skim off, add 1 can solid pack tomatoes, several stalks of celery, ½ lb. of okra, fresh if possible, or canned. 1 large onion cut up, add salt, heaping tablespoon of food seasoning and cook at full pressure for three minutes, letting steam gradually reduce.

Nice going, Jaime and Vic. Why don't you two get together some time and whip up a dinner for the Radio Life staff?

There has been no particular turning point in Monty's career that she can recall. Things don't just happen..., you choose a goal and then work it out. That's her belief and her practice.

"But I can remember losing my big chance to sneak my name in on an international hookup," she laughs. "It was during the war, in San Francisco. I had been helping out for quite a while by taking over the all-night session that meant news on the hour every hour, record-playing and announcing. In addition, I kept on with my daily shows, so by sunrise each day I hardly knew what I was doing.

"One Saturday morning when the news from overseas was piped into the San Francisco station, I was to give our report and finish with "This is Monty Margetts, from San Francisco.' You can imagine what
