F YOU HAD a column in 175 newspapers and a fifteenminute radio show that went out over 400-odd stations of the Mutual and ABC networks, a home at Toluca Lake complete with swimming pool and a much better than speaking acquaintance with Hollywood's stars, you'd think that you'd have about all to be asked of life.

you'd think that you'd have about all to be asked of life. Jimmie Fidler has all these things, but he hasn't yet achieved what he really wants. The goal he's driving

for is still outside his reach. He'd be the happiest man in the world if he had fifteen minutes of radio time to do with as he likes. He'd devote that fifteen minutes to telling the story of America, to interpreting its flavor, not via news or news commentary, but by way of



human interest stories and anec-dotes.

"I'm not under contract now as to my material," says Fidler. "I can say what I want; if I chose, I could do such a column right now. But my sponsors hire me to sell their product. They know, and I know, that my Hollywood gossip program does it successfully. If I tried another type of program and it didn't sell the product, then that wouldn't be fair to them."

As it is, Jimmie most enjoys his "Americans in the News Award." because it comes closest to interpreting America as he would like to do it. Jimmie's staff culls the news each day for outstanding heroisms performed without thought of reward and by unknown Americans, gives the collection to a motion picture actor who selects the one he thinks most worthy.

"The star runs over the list," says Jimmie, "and perhaps decides that we should give the award to a little girl who fished her sister out of the cistern. The little girl is sent a beautiful watch which she never expected to get, and a \$50. United States Savings Bond."

Great Admirer

In the course of his life, Jimmie has met a number of men and women, some of whom have been pretty big heroes in the eyes of most Americans. But the hero in his own eyes is J. Edgar Hoover.

ACK IN 1945, Abe Burrows, a writer on "Duffy's Tavern," thought it would be fun to entertain a couple of song writing buddies

with some slap-happy songs of his own—songs that mercilessly kidded the sometimes-not-so-honorable profession of song-writing. Frank Loesser ("I Wish I Didn't Love You So") and Johnny Mercer ("Blues in the Night") laughed their heads off at Abe's improvised ditty, "I looked under a rock and found a rose and that rose was you."

It developed that Abe couldn't get

near a piano without being showered with requests for "The Girl with the Three Blue Eyes," "Ain't You Sorry, Now Tokyo Rose, Sorry for What You Done?," "I May Be Sick in the Hospital, But I'm Not Sick of You," or any one of his other hits at the "hits."

Singers and comics, seeing the audience value of the Burrows tunes, tried to buy the rights to some before Abe had even written them down. The late Jerome Kern told Abe never to sell his songs to anyone. "Keep them, and use them yourself," was Kern's advice.

Pretty soon, Abe was invited to more parties than he could ever at-

They Laughed When He Sat Down At the Piano

Abe Burrows' Party Entertaining Gained Such Enthusiastic Devotees That Friends Pushed Him Into the Limelight of Radio

tend. More and more he enjoyed entertaining people instead of writing the lines and hearing the audience laugh vicariously. Entertaining the boys at Birmingham Hospital proved to Burrows that his songs were as funny to an audience of strangers as they were to personal friends and song-writers.

The national magazines heard about Burrows rolling such funny folks as Groucho Marx, Danny Kaye, Bobert Benchley and Henry Morgan in the aisles, and articles about the "comic's comedian" began to be read by a public who'd never heard a Burrows song. It was Joan Davis (whose show Abe writes) who finally said, "I'd like to see you in front of an audience with those songs," and handed her packed CBS studio over to Abe one night after the broadcast. As a result he went on the network on a fifteen-minute-a-week series with Milton DeLugg and his trio.

Love of show business was passed down to Abe by his father, a business man who used to paste Tony Pastor billboards free, just to get a chance to get behind scenes. After college, Abe became in quick succession a runner in Wall Street, wire clerk, board man, customer's man, certified accountant, maple syrup salesman, wall paper salesman and finally woven label salesman. Ambitious to sell gag radio scripts, Abe became known as "Gags and tags" or "Abel the label" around the glamorous world of the woven label.

Eventually landing in radio solidly, he became in turn writer for Ed Gardner, "Stoopnagle," Rudy Vallee and John Barrymore, Dinah Shore and Joan Davis.

Most of Abe's satirizing is pointed at the song-writing field, because having so many song-writing friends

made it natural. "If they had been advertising men — I'd have been making up crazy ads." Everything stupid and pompous gets the Burrows fire, however. "The Hucksters" he calls "the greatest expose of the motion picture industry" he has ever seen. He wonders if maybe he shouldn't call himself just "Abe," dropping the last name the way Hildegarde does. He signs off sometimes with "This is Abe Burrows saying, until next week—keep smiling. But I don't know why." He kids children's gooey albums with "Herman, the Harp," concert baritones get the needle with "Heinz, the Huntsman," travelogues with his "Mighty Boulder Dam" and "Lovely Waukesha Natural Bridge." This last seems to bring the biggest listener response and requests for scripts. So far he has repeated only one number and hasn't the slightest fear of ever running out of ideas. He gets a good deal of material submitted through the mail, all of which is returned unopened. Seems 'he has a terrific backlog of ideas that have piled up during the past gag-writing years and if one should happen to coincide slightly with something that's been sent in, he doesn't want to be responsible.

Abe thinks he is doing the song writing profession in particular and the public in general a service by nailing "the phony." "Song writers have told me that since I ve been working at this, they think twice before putting down a corny lyric. I have a good friend, though, who has just written one of the phoniest ballads of the year. I m going to wait a while and then let him have it." The good song writers, Burrows claims, have taken his satire to heart, the bad ones he doesn't care about be-

cause they can't write anything else. What's Wrong?

Popular songs are such a farreaching medium that Abe thinks some of their more obvious faults should be corrected. "For instance, he said, "in songs about somebody being jilted, it's always the girl who's been jilted, not the man. The girl is supposed to pine away waiting for him to come back. Sometimes the song suggests that she should even kill herself! Then, there's such a false standard of beauty set up in the popular song. All girls in songs have to be beautiful—but they must be beautiful in a certain way—five foot two, eyes of blue, yellow curly hair. According to popular song standards, if two people wear e y e gl as ses, they can't sing to each other." Beyond the pale is Abe's opinion of songs that poke fun at fat girls.

But don't get him wrong, he loves songs. He just hates anything pretentious or phony.

Good songs can't be kidded, according to Burrows. "Simple, sincere songs—they don't even have to be good — can't be kidded," he amends. "For instance 'I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now?" That's a simple, sincere statement. "White Christmas' can't be kidded. Even a tune like 'Bloop Bleep' can't be—it kids itself. The songs the people like are usually the simple, sincere variety. The people as a whole like

pretty good things—their standards are good."

The first step in creating a Burrows-type song is either the title or the "front phrase," then the rest of the tune follows. Abe neither reads nor writes music—"But I'm not proud of that," he says quickly. "I'd be better off if I did. I don't believe the character who says you don't need book-learning, that good old horsesense is the best. He should try book-

Carried on One Thousand Radio Stations, "So Proudly We Hail" Goes to Half-Hour

INETEEN months ago —on June 1, 1946, to be exact—a n e w fifteenminute radio show was inaugurated. The program, titled "So Proudly We Hail,"

gram, titled "So Proudly We Hall," was a transcribed dramatic show offered by the War Department in behalf of the Army's Recruiting Service. Its aims were simple—a good radio show, professionally produced in the best Hollywood style with actors chosen from Hollywood's topnotch list of performers and offered to those stations throughout the United States which were not members of one of the major broadcasting chains.

This month—on January 11, 1947— "So Proudly We Hail" achieves its full stature — a half-hour presentation—and on a record-breaking 1,000station network. This "network" is the largest ever amassed for any single radio series in history. Since the series is transcribed, each radio station carrying it can spot the program on its schedule so that it is shown off to best advantage. Hence, if a radio receiver could pick up any radio station in the country, the listener could hear "So Proudly We Hail" on practically any fifteen minute period on any of the seven days of the week.

Idea for "So Proudly We Hail" came from Colonel Mason Wright, officer in charge of the recruiting program publicity division. When the army decided to go into radio in a big way for its recruiting drive, the

MacGregor. four major networks — National Broadcasting Company, Columbia Broadcasting System, American Broadcasting Company and Mutual Broadcasting System—all immediately volunteered time on their chains for the recruiting programs. But the hundreds of smaller independent stations over the country had no chance to fall in and help recruit the thousands of young men needed to keep the Army at its peace-time level. This new dramatic show would fit the niche, Colonel Wright reasoned.

Chose Experienced Man

Investigating the field of radio broadcast companies handling such programs, Colonel Wright settled on C. P. MacGregor, an independent transcription producer who made radio history with his transcribed "Hollywood Theater" series.

Radio Hard Hit

Radio was hit by two mean old natural phenomena last week that raised more havoc with programming than any number of Senate investigations or censorship codes. We're referring, of course, to Southern California's virus "X" and New York's gigantic snow storm. From both main network points of origin, executives, performers and technicians were snow-bound or flu-bound away from the mike.

Hal Peary was virus X-ed out of "The Great Gildersleeve" and the script was written around him for one broadcast. Mary Livingstone missed her Jack Benny show and a guest appearance on a Bing Crosby recording—Alice Faye, who had a cold herself, subbed for Mary on the first show and, of all people, Tom Breneman performed her chores for Crosby! Jack Benny, too, labored under a heavy cold on his broadcast a week earlier. Gracie Allen missed one of the Burns and Allen shows with that ole debbil virus and Jane Wyman played substitute. Ed Gardner shook off his case of laryngitis in time to carry on. Fred Shields was written out of "Corliss Archer" and also missed his Glenn Hardy news broadcast on Mutual when he was struck down. Barbara Luddy enacted "Mary" for the eighth consecutive year on the "First Nighter" Christmas broadcast, though she, tdo, was affected by the "X." Hugh Studebaker on the same show was harder hit—he dropped out of the broadcast. Wendell Noble at Mutual found himself coming down with the illness just before Christmas, so he recorded his Christmas spot ahead and then had his announcer, Ted O'Connor, do the rest of the program on Christmas day. Other victims at Mutual i included program coordinator Ned Tollinger, assistant program director Bob Forward and all the net's engineers, three of whom were absent.

While Hollywood was recuperating, New Yorkers were digging themselves out of snow banks. On "Information, Please," Clifton Fadiman announced that the program's engineer, unable to get transportation through the storm, had walked for six hours in order to make the broadcast. The program's regular planist, also snowbound, was unable to get to the studio at all. Most dramatic entrance was made by James Melton, scheduled as a guest star on the "Metropolitan Opera Round Table" discussion. The tenor, snow-bound on his upstate farm, was replaced by Boris Goldowsky until mid-broadcast when Mr. Melton stamped into the studio and

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

Cecil Brown

Analyst Cecil Brown follows an impressive line-up of morning newsmen on KHJ, 8:45 a.m., Monday through Friday. The fact that Brown's broad-cast of current event comments isn't dimmed by the three that precede him is a tribute to his method of description and analysis.

Brown digs behind the headlines of the day and gives listeners the back-ground—often from his own experience—of current happenings. You may recall that during the war, the cor-respondent was involved in many of the important developments in the European theater. He escaped from the Nazis in Yugoslavia, was finally captured and later released by the Germans in Hungary. He broadcast for CBS from all over Europe in addition to such spots as Syria, Palestine and Egypt. He was expelled from Italy by Fascist officials for his broadcasts from Rome. He was rescued in the South China seas after the de-struction of the Repulse and the Prince of Wales. You can realize that this sort of background would lend authority to current news interpretation. Brown is not resting on his past performances, however. Last spring he made a trip to England while a series of excellent news men substituted on his daily broadcast. He makes ex-tensive U. S. speaking tours also, and includes his coverage of regional hap-penings on his radio reports.

Brown gives his news subjects the benefit of a dignified analysis. He pokes no fun at Henry Wallace-he discusses the *discrepancies* in the Wallace speeches. J. Parnell Thomas, General Bennett E. Meyers, Robert Taft and other subjects who make fine targets for the more ironic newscasters are allowed to make their records, actions and speeches speak for themselves through Brown. The newsman never dismisses a fact or a figure with a quip or a cliche—he tries to give a rounded picture of a few happenings in his short fifteen minutes instead of quickly reprising the whole news review.

On the personal side, Brown has a slight speech defect that may either charm or disturb you, depending on how his broadcast policy as a whole affects your particular slant. The letter "r" seems to have been left out of Brown's speech, but he gets around it nicely by substituting a sort of "l" sound.

In spite of his international back-

ground and scholarly approach, Brown has made many of his best broadcasts on human interest occurrences. Recently he covered the last vaudeville performance at Loew's State in New York, final stand of the big-time variety performer now converted to straight movies. He brough the curtain down on an era and its personalities with all the tenderness and nostalgia of a great human interest reporter.

"Happy Theater"

"Happy Theater," KECA, 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, is not a comedy show, as you might imagine from the title, but another of Harriett Harris's excellent programs for chil-dren and children will find the still dren. And children will find that the show is indeed a "Happy Theater," thanks to Miss Harris's astute way with children's stories. Not only does this story lady adapt famous fairy tales to her style of presentation and write original whimsies too, but she gives voice to many of the main char-acters. She plays "Happy," the squeaky-voiced, elfish character who romps through each broadcast, and does all the leading women's and children's parts. Male voices are done by a selection of versatile radio actors by a selection of versatile radio actors.

This is the sort of children's show in which we would have delighted as a youngster. The characters are easily identified, the plot is clear and each story is completed on one broadcast.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"Inner Sanctum"

Of the highly touted three ways to fight headaches, sponsor Bromo-Seltzer Raymond, Your Host" and his "Inner Sanctum" tales isn't one of them. (Monday, 9:00 p.m., KNX.)

A listenable time of that sort on the radio dial is reasonably expensive. The "Inner Sanctum" storles are always well cast, and even if it were scale, the casting fee would be fairly high. We only wish some of the budget had been allowed to purchase top stories in place of having the players seemingly make up the story as they go along.

An example, and a glowing one, of the tasty vehicles used for this half hour of "drama" is the story of the mild-mannered young man who was walking, late one n i g ht, along a bridge. A series of sound effects led the listener to believe (quite correctly) that the young man had prevented a woman, engaged in preventing a cat from being drowned, from being drowned herself. In gratitude, the woman pressed the cat onto her rescuer. Credible enough so far, but when the cat started doing the bidding of the young man and killing every-one in sight, it became a little boring. A satisfactory explanation came out that all the gore and catcalls didn't really happen at all. The young man was a homicidal maniac, and half this was just in his mind.

The preceding weeks' stories have

been of just about the same caliber. But there's no getting around it. People like their radio mysteries. They like 'em gory. They like "Inner Sanctum." As for the minority who object -they can fight ennui three ways, Turn your radio dial high, low, off!

"It's a Great Life"

Each Saturday night at 8:30, Steve Allen, the young man who makes a living laughing at life, and his gang of funsters, bring three true-to-life humorous stories to CBS' "It's a Great Life.'

Basis for the adaptations by Bob Carroll and Steve are stories sent in by listeners. Each writer-inner whose idea is accepted receives a worthy prize, and any idea is likely to catch the eye of Mr. Carroll and Mr. Allen. A couple of weeks ago, the first story, suggested by G. M. Shea of Arcadia, California, traced the trials of a man who made a New Year's resolution to give up smoking: the second sketch told what happened when a man went to take his driver's license test for the first time; and the final story concerned the transformation of a corner bar into a small football stadium after a television set was installed.

The fact that the stories are true-to-If often acts as a redeeming factor. In place of thinking "How dull can it get!", listeners are busy squirming with embarrassed relish at someone else's awkward position, and mutter-ing, "Wouldn't that be awful to have happen!"

There's a good idea in this show. Occasionally the listeners are tempted to wonder if he wouldn't do better to withhold the prizes from the listeners, and put the money spent on them into salary for an idea man or another writer who would think up situation comedy a little less trite than the listeners' ideas, but by the end of the evening these traitorous thoughts are forgotten.

Lud Gluskin and his orchestra provide a few show tunes and furnish background for tiny songstress Nancy Norman's entertainment between acts. Milton Stark produces this sustainer, and old "Sunrise Salute" Jack McCoy announces.

"Red Hook 31"

Eastern radio producer Woody Klose chased a rustic bit of real estate in Hudson Valley, New York. The young married couple believed (a) that New York City proper was no place to rear children, and (b) that the Klose fam-ily could carry on a novel radio show direct from their home. One of the ideas was right. New York is confining for youngsters.

The name of the show, heard at 2:45 p.m Monday through Friday over KHJ, is "Red Hook 31," based on the telephone exchange of the Klose country home. The format is based on a city-bred family's enjoyment of life on a farm. Woody, Virginia, and their four boys, Taylor, Nicky, Kevin and Christophar, who range in age from ten to two, talk about their discoveries, the state of the crops, how big is a

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cow, or various anecdotes of farm life. Occasionally a guest drops in to be introduced to the listening audience. One of the worthies who "just happened by" was Judge Brown, head of the Masonic Grand Order for all New York State. A very worthy gentleman, true, but he was able to display only the same knowledge of farm life and the latest styles in combines as that aired by the Klose family.

You'd think Woody, being a pro-ducer, would realize that sticking to a known medium (in his case, producing, rather than chatty, at home ad libs) is the wisest course. There's always the hope that farm life will be so instructive, so rapidly, to the whole family, that a couple of weelts' time will find listeners getting the real inside on life in the Hudson Valley. Till then, we don't think you should stay home from that matinee to hear "Red Hook 31."



Snatches a Sponsor

When we talked to that mellow melody man, Abe Burrows, in order to get the story you'll find in this issue, he had just auditioned his show for a sponsor. Decision on it was pending as we pecked out our lead on our type-writer, so we merely crossed our fingers while typing and didn't mention the fact that our Mr. Burrows might be a sponsored man.

Well, recently Abe gave the lie to all those who still said he was too sophisticated and intelligent for the average radio audience—he got his sponsor. The lucky concern is Lister. sponsor. The lucky concern is Lister-ine. They're assuming, and rightly so for our money, that far from being over the heads of listeners, this time next year Abe will probably be Amer-ica's Sweetheart. His sponsored show started last Saturday at 9:00 p.m.— and it couldn't happen to a nicer guy.

If you establish, what d'ya call it— empathy wormth, they have be took empathy, warmth-they laugh. Look at Sara Bernhardt-she toured in vaudeville in America and she spoke nothing but French. But she had empathy and the people loved her. Now I ain't no Sara Bernhardt, but I am friendly," he smiled.

"If the people don't know when to laugh, you should tell 'em," he in-sisted. "You don't know till you're told, do you? I didn't know what Sussex was until I'd read Thomas

Hardy. After all, that's the purpose of literature, to inform, and radio is vocal literature-or it could be.'

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Is Fidler More Than a Gossip?

Until the day when he can have his program on Americana, Fidler continues to cover his Hollywood beat. He has his work down to pretty much of a routine. He gets up at the same time every morning, including Sundays. On week-days and Saturdays he works until noon at his office, which is an old Hollywood residence he has taken over for the purpose, with his office downstairs and his staff's headquarters upstairs.

Partly because he's inclined to be nervous and therefore must take things easy, and partly because he's worked hard ever since he joined the Marines as a sixteen-year-old in the first World War and feels he's entitled to slack off a bit, Jimmie leaves his office at noontime three afternoons a week, plays golf or swims and suns at his Toluca Lake residence. His Hollywood friends, such as Bob Hope, Harry von Zell, Wayne Morris, Johnny Weissmuller usually join him.

He writes his newspaper column in the morning, spends Thursday after-noons visiting the studio lots. On Friday afternoon and Saturday, he writes his radio show, spends Sunday afternoon adding final news and airing it.

Gets Tips

He gets his news in four wayshis staff brings it in, he picks it up himself around the golf course, the swimming pool, or at his athletic club; Hollywood press agents supply him with it; people send it via notes and phone calls, some anonymous. Fidler checks every one of the latter, under the theory that anything can lead to a story.

Oddly enough, anonymous tips are by no means necessarily on the unpleasant side. Many deal with per-fectly legitimate and pleasant events; are anonymous because people, by nature, like to be news broadcasters themselves, but don't want it known they did the telling.

In the course of his covering Hol-lywood, Jimmie naturally runs across dozens of scandal stories. "I never print them," he claims, "but I do keep them on file for the develop-ments they almost always lead to. For instance, if I hear that a certain married actor is stepping outside the reservation and I find out it's true, I don't publicize it—I simply watch that marriage. Sooner or later it will break up.

"Hollywood reporting is a lot like hunting. A good hunter doesn't just wander around in the woods with his gun in his hand, hoping he'll stum-ble onto something worth shooting. He watches everything—a broken limb, a sound, an odor, a track on the trail—ignoring nothing that can lead him to his quarry.

Naturally soft-spoken, Jimmie has an air delivery unbelievably different from his usual manner of speech. Page Thirty-two

He developed it particularly for radio so that he could crowd as much information as possible into his allotted fifteen minutes. Each script takes about 3,000 words: if he spoke at his ordinary speed, he could get in only about 2,000 words. In fact, such top radio announcers as Harry von Zell Truman Bradley, Don Wilson, and Bill Goodwin have guestcast his program, have had to cut the script from 750 to 1200 words simply because they couldn't talk as fast as Jimmie.

The rapidity of his reading has solved the problem of more news, but it has created other problems which Jimmie has had to invent special techniques to surmount. He discovered that he was reading so fast that everything jumbled together. To get around that, he does two things. First, he puts each item on a separate piece of paper, even if it's only three lines long. Each script runs around forty pages instead of the usual twelve or thirteen—but the time it takes Jimmie to turn the page is enough to put a little hesitation after each story.

Secondly, he never uses commas to punctuate his scripts—only dashes. He discovered he wasn't paying any attention to the commas, because physically they added no separation. When he wants a brief pause, he uses one dash; for a longer pause, two. The imperceptible shift of his eye past the dashes is enough to take care of punctuation.

Even as a Hollywood columnist, Fidler is militant. He is constantly crusading against communism and juvenile delinquency and for clean pictures. He believes that his fight for clean pictures has given him a remarkably adult audience; he often gets fan letters from senators, congressmen, governors, mayors, judges. He gets requests for copies of his open letters addressed to President Truman from the White House via the FBI, and Senator Brewster asked for copies of his editorials on the Howard Hughes-Johnny Meyers investigation.

Because of the caliber of that fan mail, the average person would feel Fidler's fears are needless when he says, "I've often thought of breaking away from Hollywood to do a pro-gram on America, but there's danger that people might not accept Fidler as an interpreter of America as they accept him as an interpreter of Hollywood. I'm not the showman that Winchell is-I don't have the voice Lowell Thomas has-maybe I just wouldn't go."

Early in the war, MacGregor was called upon by Armed Forces Radio Service to supply the army with ra-dio transcriptions for overseas use. MacGregor's extensive library proved invaluable in those early days in supplying the overwhelming demand for entertainment for the armed forces in every branch of the world.

All during the war, MacGregor

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continued his program of recorded shows for overseas use, recording as many as 100 regular radio programs a week for shipment abroad.

s .

The first program was released on June 1, 1946, over 350 stations rang-ing from 250 to 50,000 watts each. It starred Clark Gable in "First Choice" -a story, naturally, about a man picking the Army as a vocation. Since Gable's appearance, MacGreg-or has called upon seventy-eight other Hollywood stars. No one has appeared twice as yet.

"News Is What You Make It"

And Nelson Pringle Makes His Different Through Finding Angles Which Are Just A Little Bit More on the Human Side

Monday-Friday, 7:15 a.m., 11 p.m. CBS-KNX

BS NEWS ANALYST Nelson Pringle is able to deliver the news with its hair let

down because he always gets the story behind the story. That's what holds "Pete," as he's known around CBS, to a schedule that begins at 4:00 a.m. and ends at midnight, most of the time.

"A good portion of the news of each day breaks before I even get to the studio, no matter how early the hour. Then, if the story doesn't need some intense tracking down, I do my show, catch a few winks, and still have all afternoon for the night broadcast material."

The pre-dawn stint is what keeps Nelson an up-to-the-minute news analyst. He spends the earliest hours at the Columbia shortwave, listening. It would be a tough assignment to discard, sort and discard again until a fifteen-minute broadcast was readied out of some fifty thousand words of ticker tape material. But Nelson interprets too.

He explains simply the term "interpreting the news.

"It's no longer what the big fellow says from atop his political or eco-nomic seat. It's what the little fellow is doing, thinking and feeling low is doing, thinking and feeling that is of interest today. That's truer day by day. So 'interpreting' really means an evaluation of hap-penings as they affect people . . . how they feel, and what they say and do about it . . or what they can expect as a logical outgrowth of the current events." current events.

A little incident typical of Pringle's approach in garnering color is the manner in which Nelson procured a story on Avak, the Healer, who re-cently made a trip by plane from Albuquerque, New Mexico, to Los Angeles. Mr. Pringle could have picked up the fact of the arrival from the teletype or wire service and sent it listener-ward. Instead, he hied himself to the airport for the actual arrival. Rather than waste time and precious opportunity by attempting to approach Avak and work through

an interpreter, Nelson fell in step with a fellow passenger, introduced himself and sounded the man out on the trip. Thus he learned that healer Avak had been quite airsick en route. Certainly neither interpreter nor the airline employees would have divulged this bit of amusing background for one of the day's news items.

First-Hand Reporting

Another time, when the old Sunset Strip Mount Kalmia Castle eviction was in full force, Nelson went out to talk to the assortment of homeless people who were milling aimlessly about the big grounds, by that time littered with half-packed cartons and trunks. Making no effort to be anything other than a reporter, Nelson engaged roomers in conversation. They were only too glad to put out tales of high rents and the start-lingly sudden loss of a home. Many of them could provide Pringle with background on the sprawling grav. background on the sprawling gray stone mansion itself. Thus, at broad cast time, listeners didn't hear merely about a mass eviction from a big old house. Out came the full tale about the old landmark, its life as a boarding house, and the en masse departure of those set adrift by the eviction.

Nelson never attempts to conceal his identity when he goes news hunting. And he never breaks news before the promised time. His reputa-tion for integrity has paid off handsomely in the way of advance tips from, some downtown news buddies. They know Pringle will never scoop them on a tasty item, so they gladly share their finds with him.

In getting up the news of national scope or overseas origin, Nelson says he finds the new wire recorders a great help. "I can pick out the most

meaningful segments and play them directly for the listeners. They are all recorded right on the scene, and wired to me verbatim. By using these I can let my listeners hear the events actually happen."

The "actual event," as he calls it, certainly couldn't be any more human than a Pringle account. Al-though he's tabbed "Yankee re-porter" because of his eastern birth and upbringing, Nelson has a delivery far from a cold New England. tinged lesson in rhetoric. A little of the Maine background does linger in Nelson's speech, but what he says is warm and human, and he always manages to pick out the little angle

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Give 'Em What They Want!

Chicago Listener Survey in 1940 Showed That People Wanted to Hear Drama and Good Music, Hence the "Theater of the Air" Was Formed

ONDENSE a grand opera ' into an hour? It can't be done! Besides, radio listeners don't like opera. They want to hear stuff they can understand."

Those were the words of the skeptics in 1940. Their rebuttal?

The "Chicago Theater of the Air," now in its eighth season of weekly operetta and grand opera broadcasts



over the world's largest networkthe Mutual Broadcasting System.

The "Theater of the Air" met the first of its critics' objections by presenting grand opera in English—so that listeners who loved the melodies of operatic arias could understand what the songs were about.

Of course opera in English had been tried before, but with relatively little success. Sure, the words were in English. But these words were literal translations of the foreign language in which the opera was written. The words had too many syllables for the musical phrases the important words were on such high notes that they were hard to understand—they just weren't "singable."

To counteract this initial defect of opera in English, Henry Weber, musical director of WGN, Chicago, and of the "Theater of the Air" series, commissioned two New Yorkers to make special translations of many of the favorite operas of American listeners.

These two men — George Mead, organist at Trinity church, and Thomas P. Martin, conductor of the New York Civic Center Opera company—know music. They recognize the importance of maintaining the lyric quality that makes opera more than just drama set to music. They are familiar with the vocal problems of the singer. And their translations of such operas as "Carmen," "Rigoletto," "Faust," "La Boheme," "Aida" and "La Traviata" have contributed to making the "Theater of the Air" the favorite musical listening of millions from coast to coast.

Singers Selected Carefully

Another factor in the success of the "Chicago Theater of the Air" is the high caliber of the musicians who make up the cast of more than 100 performers for each production. Soloists are chosen with care from the ranks of America's foremost singers — Morton Bowe, Richard Tucker, Thomas Hayward and others from the Metropolitan Opera company; concert and operetta singers like Jane Lawrence of "Call Me Mister" and Selma Kaye, Winifred Heidt and Graciela Rivera of the San Carlo Opera company make frequent ap-pearances at the "Theater of the Air" microphone in the studios of WGN in Chicago, where the broad-casts originate. For seven years, the prima donna of the series was Marion Claire, star of the Chicago "The Great Waltz." Miss Claire made her farewell to singing last summer,-but her valuable knowledge of the world of opera and operetta is being applied to "Theater of the Air" presentations through her new position as production supervisor of the series.

Members of the "Theater of the Air" orchestra are artists in their own right, most of them being members of the Chicago Philharmonic orchestra, and many of them soloists with outstanding symphony orchestras throughout America and Europe. Adolph Hoffmann, cellist with the orchestra, is composer of the theme song, in addition to other symphonic works. The chorus of thirty voices is composed of exceptional young singers in the Chicago area. Many of them are graduated from the choral ranks to supporting roles in the operas and operettas, with eventual stardom on the "Theater of the Air" awaiting them.

In addition, the "Chicago Theater of the Air" is proud of its discoveries among young singers. Richard Tucker, now a Metropolitan star, made his first network singing engagement on the program several years ago, and other young singers who have been starred in the summer concert series—Andzia Kuzak, George Tozzi, Dorothy Staiger—will be the headliners of opera bills of tomorrow.

A typical performance, broadcast before an audience in the Chicago studios of WGN, begins long before Saturday night when the curtain rises.

Work Progresses

After a work is chosen and the translation made, Jack LaFrandre, writer and director of the series, writes a script which will fit into an hour without omitting any essential plot material or any of the important music, and bringing up to date the slang of a musical comedy so that the comic sequences are still funny in 1947.

A corps of arrangers and copyists then gets to work, linking crucial scenes with musical bridges arranged from the themes of the opera, modernizing choral arrangements and simplifying stiff, complicated librettos. Much of this musical preparatory work is done by Robert Trendler, composer, arranger and conductor, who coaches the chorus and conducts the performance during Mr. Weber's occasional absences.

With script and soloist in mind, LaFrandre casts his show, choosing the best in Chicago's radio talent with a view to matching the tone and pitch of the speaking voice with that of the vocalist singing the same role.

Then follow three days of rehearsals—dramatic cast, chorus, orchestra, soloists, and combinations of them all, until a final dress rehearsal and the complete performance.

Because it has been on the air eight years, some might expect the "Theater of the Air" to lose its freshness—to become a carbon copy of a previous year. But under the inMARION CLAIRE, production supervisor of the "Chicago Theater," was the prima donna of the eightyear-old series during its first seven seasons.

spired direction of Weber, Miss Claire and LaFrandre, the series sets itself new goals and presents new performances each year.

One of its accomplishments during the current season was the presentation October 18 of Verdi's "Aida," the first time this monumental work had ever been condensed to an hour's performance. Other new operettas and operas on the 1947-48 schedule are "Die Fledermaus," "Barber of Seville," "Chimes of Normandy," "Sunny" and "Katinka." In addition, through negotiations by Mr. Weber on his pre-opening trip to New York. the "Theater of the Air" has added to its repertoire a group of operettas that have not been heard on the air for several years—favorites like "Student Prince," "Blossom Time," "Red Mill" and "Countess Maritza," which have proved their continued popularity through recent successful productions on the stage.

The "Chicago Theater of the Air" was started in 1940 as the result of a listener survey conducted by WGN. A vast cross-section of the audience preferred the familiar music of operetta and the grand opera stage to all other types of entertainment. Another cross-section listed drama as their favorite escape medium. The combination of these two overwhelming preferences resulted in the program. In the words of Colonel Rob-ert R. McCormick, editor and publisher of the Chicago Tribune, who gives a weekly air editorial on each broadcast: "The 'Theater of the Air' is living testimony to our policy-spare no expense in a sincere effort to give our listeners what they want. After all, American radio belongs to the American public, and we con-sider it a sacred trust."

GIL, the new station at 1260 on your dial, is the at-longlast - realized dream of young Gil Paltridge, president and general manager of the station. It took two years of solving legal tangles and procuring the last available frequency of this power class to bring KGLL to the San Fernando Valley.

Owned and operated by the San Fernando Valley Broadcasting Corporation, the transmitter and studios are at 14808 Lassen Street, San Fernando, and the bright new studio and offices are at 4919 Van Nuys Boulevard.

Gil, (that's where the KGIL comes from), explains that the station is going to be operated with the same

idea employed by a home-townowned local newspaper.

"Programs on KGIL are planned to appeal specifically to its San Fernando Valley listeners, rather than to a more generalized public. Local news, on-the-scene broadcasts of the Valley's own news events and civic activities, talents of the Valley's own speakers and musical artists are going to be our strong points."

Of particular interest is KGIL's unique system of programming. The shows are scheduled in groups or blocks according to specific listener interest, so as to provide a maximum flow of interest from one program to the next. Mr. Paltridge breaks the "block" system down into simplified laymen's terms with his explanation that "local events and news are of primary interest around here, so rather than splatter these features throughout the day, we provide an hour's block, holding appeal for one (Please Turn to Page 39)

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group, follow it with another block of a different nature, and so on, all of a different nature, and so on, an day. It's just as though we held a big tent show, in which the first hour would be devoted, say, to the group interested in growing things. Not just farmers, but home garden. ers or landscapers. Harry Caldwell, KGIL's agricultural director, handles this period of agricultural information, local farm news, and the 4-H Club events. The rest of the hour presents the market and weather, the Green Thumbers Club' for the backyard gardener, and contests and awards. There's also a show-time hour, a children's hour-which, incidentally, three P.T.A.'s have already put on their recommended list-a woman's hour, and a valley home hour. Those are just a few. but that's an example of how it's plotted toward a well-balanced fare of entertainment, news and cultural broadcasts."

Paltridge has been managing things ever since his University of California at Berkeley days, when he turned the college paper's red ink balance into a neat plus of \$18,000. Since then, Gil has been associated with some of the leading West Coast advertising firms. In 1941 he switched to radio, winding up at KFI in 1943 as director of promotion and public service.

Directs Programs

The energetic young head of KGIL's program department, to whom falls the enormous task of supervising the station's eighteenhour per day schedule of broadcasting, is Bob Seal. In former years, Bob, who thinks the Valley is the only place in the world, was program director of the largest station in San Francisco, NBC's KPO, (now KNBC). After his transfer to Hollywood five years ago, Bob became the NBC producer assigned to the Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Joan Davis and Gene Autry shows.

KGIL's commercial manager, W. L. "Len" Smith, first glimpsed the Valley when he visited there with the late Major Bowes' singers in 1936. Before coming to California, Len was sales manager at CKEY, Toronto, Canada, where his record attracted Valley big-wigs of radio. His knowledge of sound commercial management is based upon seven years' experience in successfully adapting radio advertising to local merchandising and promotion.

Even chief announcer Jimmy Powell, big, good-looking radio veteran who started at KVOA in Tucson, Arizona, declares a strong Valley loyalty. Mr. Powell is the boy who in 1942 won the H. P. Davis award for newscasting. The Davis is a national award going to the top radio

announcer throughout the country.

An eighteen-hour-a-day program along the frequency of KGIL carries the transcribed music and voices of some headline artists to augment the Valley projects. The well-stocked record library was planned with care in place of indiscriminate wholesale buying.

The standard AP and UP wire services and teletypes provide world-wide coverage, while three roving reporters, armed with tape recorders, cover the Valley proper, turning events into man-on-the-street interviews. This picks up the Valley-ites' reactions to happenings as well as the immediate color of the occurrences, all designed to create greater interest among community listeners.

The newsroom is headed by Christy Turner, Valley newspaperman who switched back to radio news work after six years "out of the fold," when he worked on newspapers. Prior to moving to the Valley in 1941, Turner was with WOC at Davenbort, Iowa, where he helped pioneer one of the first independent radio station newsrooms. Christy is also handling publicity for the new station.

The two 200-foot steel towers arising from the ten-acre KGIL-owned property forward the 1000 watts that insure the sponsors of radio programs on KGIL that their shows will be of sufficient power to be heard by the least sensitive of radios in the San Fernando Valley and the surrounding hills. There will be no interference, claims Paltridge, from nearby stations coming in on top or interfering with KGIL reception. Neither will reception fade at night, as on weaker stations.

The motivating community interest that marks the bright new station holds its proof in that all the men connected with KGIL live in the Val-

that other reporters missed after even the usual fine-tooth-combing.

One would rather think Nelson would welcome as he did the wire recorder any device that would even minutely widen the slim margin of leisure he now finds. Yet he disliked air travel intensely, no matter how it speeded his up-and-downthe-coast trips, until he came across the Southwest Airlines, whose planes skip in and around mountains and across the plains, from here to the Bay City, never getting higher than a couple of thousand feet.

"You can see everything . . . it's like a speeded-up trip by car. Then the line went a step farther and installed a radio service similar to that on trains, so instead of sitting idly in the sky, you can see and hear things every foot of the way."

An encyclopedic brain doesn't prevent Pringle from being a practical joker when a tempting occasion arises. Several years ago, as he was sitting in the newsroom early one morning, a loudspeaker from the downstairs record room blared out a popular tune, "Arthur Murray Taught Me Dancing in a Hurry." Immediately Pete lifted the phone, dialed an inside number, and, using a disguised voice, informed the un-happy disc jockey that *he*, Pringle, was Arthur Murray; further, that he was annoyed to the point of a law-suit by the record, that it was detrimental to the dance instruction palaces he'd established, and that he was sending his lawyer right over to CBS! When a frantic young man with his head in his hands rushed upstairs mere minutes later, in search of someone to whom he could unburden his wretched load of worry, he found newscaster Pringle sprawled across the desk phone, helpless with laughter.

How did so distinguished a gentleman come by the careless name "Pete"?

"My fellow cadets at West Point used to call me 'Poncho Pete,' eventually shortened to 'Pete,' because I carried a poncho to sit on, those occasions when I'd go for a stroll with my current girl, along old Flirtation Walk leading up to the Point where everyone sat to watch lights and stars and such. It seemed a perfectly sensible, comfortable arrangement, but somehow caused great interest and the nickname for me," Pringle grimaced.
