If You're Looking for an In to Show Business!" That's the Invitation Extended Young American Talent on "Opportunity Night With Horace Heidt"

T'S AMAZING," reflected bandmaster Horace Heidt, "what exceptional talent is waiting to be discovered in our high schools and colleges and youth organizations."

You've heard that before, and so had we. But sitting next to showman Heidt through preliminary auditions for his NBC Sunday "Opportunity Night" gave us new respect for the actual, unpublicized efforts which show business will and does make in behalf of amateurs.

While the Heidt program was in Hollywood, countless anxious young people in the area rated their first chance to be heard. Radio Life got a good picture of this by watching typical competition from USC. After two days of hearing Trojan talent, scouts for the show had notified thirteen boys and girls to report at the NBC studios for a final selection of four.

It was rather heart-yanking to watch those nervous young people, gathered in a sclf-conscious huddle outside the studio doors before 7:30 p.m. One or two were brash, a few seemed speechless with terror they were all nice-looking and eager, manifesting ill-at-easeness in one way or another.

But it was pleasant to sense strain leaving the atmosphere as soon as doors opened and friendly executives asked the waiting hopefuls to come inside. The youngsters made for a line of chairs along the wall, and seated themselves almost of one accord.

First up was a confident young trumpet player with take-off specialties on Clyde McCoy, Harry James, Bunny Berigan, Heidt liked the act. "Very good," he encouraged through

the control booth mike. "Try a few more for me, will you?"

Kindly Help

This same genuine kindness was given each new contestant throughout the two and a half hours of tryouts. Heidt tirelessly spent an average of ten minutes with each routine. He had conversational little additions like "What year are you in at college, son?" and "Any kind of m u sic you're particularly interested in as a career?" for every new participant. Under his pleasant "Fine!" and "I liked that very much" encouragements the competers visibly relaxed, lost their gulps of embarrassment and performed up to their separate pars.

One demure little girl, with an unusually lovely classic soprano, thought deeply when they asked her for an encore. "Well," she suggested, "I could *try* 'Cow Cow Boogie!""

Heidt firmly switched on his mike again. "No, let's have none of that. Let me hear you in something else classical."

She scored her second success with "Make Believe."

Inside the booth, too, private build-ups were given each boy or girl approaching the mike. "I heard this fellow sing 'Peg O' My Heart,' Horace," enthused rotund little producer Jerry Bowne, "and I think you'll like him too. Nice tone and delivery." Or ... "Here's an act that only needs cditing to be very good and original."

It seemed to be the regret of everyone concerned with the show that all the young people couldn't be chosen as "best." Even when the top four performers had been told they'd been picked for the Sunday show, the rest of the disappointed ones must have felt that their abilities had been observed and appreci-





ated, and passed over only because there wasn't quite room for them all. Instead of the abrupt dismissal which one might expect after seeing movies and stage plays, each of the omitted youngsters was given a personal telephone call by producer Jerry Bowne, explaining why in as helpful, kindly terms as possible.

In his first two air shows, Horace Heidt auditioned more than 700 entertaining people, both amateurs and professionals, looking for a break. He expects to see at least 20,000 more in his present nationwide search before twelve months have passed.

The show began in Fresno and has moved east via Los Angeles, Birmingham General Hospital, the Pasadena Playhouse, Omaha, Des Moines, Minneapolis, Youngstown, Columbus and Cleveland, Ohio, to New York. \$250 has been awarded each broadcast-winner, with \$500 set for the act which comes through in front after thirteen weeks of open competition, \$1000 for the best performance at the end of six months and \$5000 for the grand winner of the year. This accumulation will make the yearly winner recipient of the largest prize ever offered on a radio talent show.

How Set Up

Traveling in advance of this giant opportunity sweepstakes are four scouts. Alan Bode is coordinator of the project, and reporting regularly from outlying cities are John Leer, Frank Reeves and Leon Duseau. Managers of local theaters and NBC radio stations are being of active assistance in the many, many auditions which such a wide circuit of coverage entails. The program is greatly interested in collegiate tal-

On the heels of such other 1947instigated talent shows as Arthur Godfrey's and Eddie Dowling's "The Big Break" (whose time the new "Opportunity Night" has taken) the Heidt program has of course been narrow-mindedly tabbed "just another in the chain."

But Heidt and the intent, interested men who are working with him on this most extensive scouting effort of the season have definite counter-comment. "There are so many still-unknowns waiting for a chance... any kind of a chance... that even another show offering them opportunity to show their stuff could not possibly be considered 'extra' or 'old hat'!"

GOT TO DO everything I wanted," exclaimed commentator Frances Scully, speaking of her recent trip to New York City. "Even had a ride in Central Park at three o'clock in the morning."

Apparently Miss Scully continued in New York the feverish round of activity which she maintains in Hollywood, where she clicks off five weekly air programs and emcees or lends color comment to a wide assortment of air and fashion enterbonnets in advance. "Wouldn't you know it?" Frances laughed. "I had to get off the train in New Orleans, had a mike shoved in my hand, and did comment on a preview while wearing my one and only black suit!"

If Miss Scully had been whisked from the train en route west, it would have been a different story: She would probably have furrowed her brow over which New York-purchased outfit to wear. For her bags came back bulging with modish outfits, schemingly selected with a fashion eye on future events. A lavish brocade suit, for example, was bought and stashed away awaiting the Millinery Show, which the commentator emceed again this last December, while a gold hat which John Frederics styled on Frances' head was immediately earmarked for the Academy Awards.

Differences Cited

"There were very few beautiful hats in New York," said Miss Scully, "because inclement weather makes feathers, veils, and ribbons look bedraggled. In fact, the difference in New York and Hollywood clothes reflects the difference in life there and here. Their lunch hour is short, their cocktail hour an accepted part of the day's routine, and nightclubbing is taken for granted. I saw many black faille suits and for evening, very dressy clothes. But in

Sideman to Jacks Paar and Carson, and "Tokyo Mose" to Thousands of Ex-GI's, Are the Present and Past of Mikeguy Hy

HIS, in case it confuses you, is Japanese doubletalk, and goes to the tune of "London Bridge Is Falling Down":

"Moshee-Moshee Ah-No-Nay Ah-No-Nay, Ah-No-Nay, Moshee-Moshee Ah-No-Nay Ah-So-Deska."

To announcer Hy Averback, as to any ex-GI in Tokyo during the first American occupations, that kind of gibberish recalls a lot of memories. Part:cularly to Hy, who as "Tokyo Mose" took over the radio platter and chatter time held by "Tokyo Rose." The jingle was his theme song.

While it wasn't exactly swell to be on that side of the Pacific, Hy and the rest of the AFRS outfit which was staging radio for our troops at that time formed a great comradery which carries over into their civilian friendships today. A lot of those fellows had a lot of fun together. Get George Dvorak, Jack Paar, Bob Lemond, Alan Botzer, Hans Conried and Hy together to talk about it ... and you'll have a convention of buddies that'll jaw the jeebers out of any "Good old Siwash" reunion you've ever seen!

Plus his "Tokyo Mose" routine, of course, Hy became unusually popular entertainment when he played straight man to Jack Paar in a comedy air show the two of them and Paul Masterson staged in Noumea. Hy first met Paar in Guadalcanal, where Paar was heftily occupied as a ditch-digger. They found they could "really go along with a gag together." When Paar came back to the states and latched on to his own radio time in the summer Jack Benny spot, he immediately looked up Hy for his announcer.

Hy first met Hans Conried in Manila. "Hans had a crew haircut," Hy recollects, "and a tremendous Colonna mustache. He used to lope around the island looking for treasures in the antique shops." It was a "three happy chappies" reunion for the trio of them (Hans, Paar and Hy) on the Paar ABC and NBC shows.

Initial Enterprises

Before the army, Hy started in this town in 1938, as a free-lance actor on "Calling All Cars," etc. He put in another year at KMPC as a combined actor announcer writer and worked up to assistant production manager. When he left KMPC it was to head the radio production division of a local agency. A few more months of subsequent narrating and writing for film tracks, and doing some free-lance acting, then came his R.S.V.P. invitation to join the infantry. Hy went out with the first AFRS division, including Dvorak and Botzer and headed by Bob Lemond. The boys formed their own "Mosquito Network" in New Caledonia, and later moved en company to Tokyo for a similar 'schedule of broadcasting entertainment.

Hy himself originated the "Tokvo Mose" project. Signing on with such cheerful observations as "Running eyes. Running nose. Very unhappy. Tokyo Mose," he endeared himself to thousands of khaki-clad listeners in much a similar condition. Most of his show was slap-happy philosophizing and a wild assortment of records, and Hy spiced it up by addA FOOTNOTE that the personable Mr. Averback is still a bachelor ought to get some takers. ing such campaigns as "The 54 and Under Club" . . . (Points for discharge had lowered to sixty, and the boys naturally felt the next drop would be to fifty. Instead it was to fifty-five. Hy had fifty-four. His immediate radio protest of such goingson was easily the most popular fanpuller on the air.)

"Mose" unfortunately never got a chance to meet and interview "Rose." The Army nixed a planned program, much to Hv's regust, because of the "Hail the conquering hero" elements of the situation.

But summing up all his army broadcasting, Hy smiles reminiscently. "It was really quite pleasant. The fellows were swell listeners. The gang was full of good ideas. Even the Japanese were nice to us."

Hy joined another agency for a while, following his discharge. But he had to write and announce a baby diaper program and he "wasn't happy." So he started taking on dramatic and comedy parts, and finally was playing straight comedy. Then Paar came back, and they began the recent Lucky Strike show. Bids to announce the Jack Carson-Eve Arden program and "Hit Parade" followed.

In person Hy is rather small and trimly built. He has a close haircut and a gentle, sincere face, and any remark you can draw out of him about someone else is inclined to be well-intentioned. He appears to have an enormous number of good friends. His closest at the moment is Hal March, who's also still a bachelor.

Hy adds, rather wistfully, "I'm *terribly* eligible."

F THE SUCCESS of a radio program can be measured by its longevity and the faithfuness of its audience then the Inglewood Park Concert, "Melodies America Loves,"

belongs to the handful of programs that supply the backbone of radio.

For over seventeen years and in approximately 1.050 broadcasts, this musical show has never failed to



please the lovers of the quieter classics and familiar songs of the past.

For the past eight years, Earl Towner has conducted the orchestra on the program.

Maestro Towner studied music in his home town of San Francisco and is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. The greater part of his effort was directed toward composing and conducting, but he did some indifferent vocal studies, as the members of his family were all interested in singing.

Towner's first radio job was with the male quartet on "The Blue Monday Jamboree." famous early West Coast radio show. Earl sang bass. Unable to get away from the singing angle of the business, he became vocal director of KFRC, the San Francisco station from which the "Jamboree" emanated, and had a fine glee club of fourteen voices under his director of the station at that time, needed an assistant and (Please Turn to Page 32)

Your Cue (Shows You) May Like)

"Breaking All Records"

Comedian Steve Allen on his "Breaking All Records" show, KNX, 11:15 p.m. Monday through Saturday, is strictly an acquired taste — but after you've acquired it, you can't let him alone. The first time we listened to him, we heard nothing but an unidentified rattling and a good deal of irritating laughter. The second time, he was devoting the broadcast to running a wind-up train on inadequate track in front of the mike. The third time — we were fans.

Steve is one of the wacklest and youngest (a mere child of twenty-six) of the current air comics and his behavior on this nightly program almost defies description or analysis. It does make his formatted comedy show, 'It's a Great Life," seem sane by comparison, however.

As far as we can determine by regular listening, he uses no script, no thought, no notes and hardly any records in planning his air performance. Often he dispenses with even his theme and just rattles cellophane for fifteen minutes. He reads letters from listeners and comments on them —if he's in the mood. He banters with Joe, the engineer, and seems to enjoy himself hugely — though the audience can hear only Allen's part of the conversation. Recently Joe (whoever he is) got an AFRA card, and listeners were able to hear his golden voice on the air. He wasn't bad either. Of course he's no Basil Rathbone when it comes to diction, but he sounded more lucid than many highly touted guest stars we've come across.

Currently Allen is. concerned with the circumstances under which tigers will attack human beings and with reading fan mail written on odd materials — the aforementioned cellophane, tin foil, wood, etc. You can expect anything — or nothing — on this program, and get both. If you've relaxed enough by 11:15 p.m. to listen to Allen, and you're not expecting a high-powered comic, you'll probably be amused by his lackadaisical attitude and contrasting incisive wit. And if you like Jim Hawthorne and Arthur Godfrey — you'll love him.

"Suspense"

p.m. on Sundays, the first three shows rang the bell with adaptations of Cor-nell Woolrich's "Black Curtain," starring Robert Montgomery; "Sam Spade," with you-know-who, and James M. Cain's "Love's Lovely Coun-terfeit," starring James Cagney.

Robert Montgomery, who will be heard in the dramas occasionally, serves as narrator of the series, necessitating a sometime change from the strict first person singular narration of the protagonist.

As in any hour-long dramatic show, much more of the mood and plot line of the original piece are retained. This advantage is especially marked in "Suspense" mysteries which often de-pend upon devious plotting. The hour programs no longer leave the listener pondering over the unexplained actions or loose threads of minor plots left hanging at the denouement. Thankfully, producer Bill Spier has looked into the field of famous thriller fiction (as you can see from the al-ready listed titles) and taken advan-tage of the opportunity to present sturdier plots, rather than expand the thirty-minute originals formerly used.

As always, the supporting casts are superb, though familiar through long service on the "Suspense" series. Music, composed and arranged by Lucien Moraweck and conducted by Lud Gluskin, adds immeasurably to the mood.

Only wrong note struck so far was the introduction of author James M. Cain at the conclusion of the "Love's Lovely Counterfeit" broadcast. Author Cain, who uses his typewriter like a sawed-off shotgun when he writes dialogue, delivers it over the air like a Casper Milquetoast.

Now that the field of best-selling thrillers has been tapped, we're hop-ing that the works of the earlier mystery writers - Mary Roberts Rinehart, S. S. Van Dine, Agatha Christie and Earl Derr Biggers - won't be entirely forgotten in favor of the current vogue for the hardbitten heroes and detectives.

"Home Is What You Make It"

Fraught with possibilities as the title appears, "Home Is What You Make It" (KFI, Saturdays, 1:30 p.m.) is not: (a) a course on interior decoration, (b) a series of lectures on delinquency, religious, social and civic problems, or (c) a John J. Anthony forum for family adjustment.

Yet, as successfully as though they were hearing the best of three such programs, interested listeners may utilize this excellent half-hour as a single educator in all these happiness. concerning topics, plus many more.

Format is extremely flexible on this varying weekly series. An underlying theme, however, seems apparent to us, and we would term it "The Development of Human Harmony."

Subject matter is of world-wide im-

port. NBC has therefore taken itself a job, in attempting to prove that the American home unit cannot function without regarding itself as a small part of the universal whole. To this end, a recent broadcast (January 17) gave one of the finest dramatic analyses of the atomic problem we have yet heard. David Lilienthal's atomic address to the nation, (which your narrator conjectured has probably been missed or disregarded by the average public through general horror of the entire topic) was repeated in its entirety, with pauses for dramatic interpretation of each pertinent point. By the end of the thirty minutes, we, at least, certainly felt a much calmer and healthier curiosity regarding this probable great influence on our futures than we had expressed before. This attitude, the program assured us, was a step in the right direction.

"We also found "Home Is What You Make It's" Christmas presentation a deeply influencing religious help in our holiday just past. On that broadcast, the Biblical Nativity history was set forth so significantly that the world at the time of the Christ Coming appeared at once parallel to the condition of the world today. That listeners might again turn seriously to the Saviour's teachings was not "preached" on the program, yet more than one of us must have felt such inclination at the system cue.

These two examples of "Home Is What You Make It" context matter are a far-from-adequate coverage of what may be expected from week to week. Surprise subjects and unusual "angles" are program policies, but "The Home" is "top star."

Lou Hazam writes and Jack Kuney produces the series, which is sustaining and from the East. Both gentlemen are obviously intense and imaginative about their assignments.

This is the scene that Miss Pons used for her original audition in 1930, and her repetitions of it on the Saturday broadcast never fail to bring the audience to their feet in a frenzy. The communicable excitement makes for wonderful radio moments.

We View With Alarm

The airing of the public love-fest between Louella Parsons and Ginger Rogers on last Sunday's broadcast of Louella's usually informative chatter show. The patently phony "Well, what in the world were we mad at?" routine that marked the end of the long Parsons-Rogers feud was particularly irritating to those who remember "what they were mad at." It's nice that "the girls" made up, but it would have been even nicer over a cup of coffee at the Derby — without a mike in sight.

video appearance is as painless as Parker. One of the Royal Family of Fun Accelerates the Wagering On His Show With the Same Wit-but a New Personality

Wednesday, 8/30 p.m. ABC-KFCA/KFMF

HEN the audience steps into Groucho Marx's fast-moving participation program, "You Bet Your Life,"—

you can bet your life a healthy percentage of the gleeful guests show up with no thought of loot in mind. They come to enjoy are ad-libber Groucho.

The format of this Elgin-American Compact-sponsored show adheres to today's trend: another quiz give-away, with the give-away noticeably large But there similarity ends. Three teams of contestants, chosen by the audience from among its own numbers weekly to play "You Bet Your Life" constitutes one departure. The teams are usually composed of outlandish combinations such as a house detective and a switchboard operator; a mother-in-law and a sonin-law; a traffic cop and a lady driver; or a barber and a bald-headed man. To prevent the possi-bility that there might not be any janiters, cops or other desired types present, weekly ads inviting the different categories to the show are published. Ad answerers are admitted sans ticket.

Show Gimmicks

The teams go through ludicrous interviews with madman Marx. They vie with one another at building up their stake. They try to guess a "secret word." They flush and squirm and have a wonderful time. They

usually walk off with a pocketful of cash. The games are easy, and the "secret word" gimmick is always a common household word which is mentioned very often in everyday conversation. So chances are good that someone on the show will stumble across it during his appearance When that happens, the show stops, bells ring, people shriek — and Groucho pays off at once with \$250 cash!

Few other shows ge all out for the pandemonium paraded under the guise of a "warm-up." No sooner is the studio audience settled in its comfortable seats than "the mustache" zooms on-stage to head a lot of tomfoolery that brings down the house. During this period everyone connected with the show gets into the act. Producer-packager John Guedel, who also assists during the show proper, is prominent through a stunt that never fails to summon gales of merriment from spectators. Groucho bides his time, sneaks up behind the polished-looking Mr. Guedel, and lifts the producer's toupe. Usually a letter or two, ostensibly addressed to Groueho, drops to the floor. Possibilities of this situation are myriad and obvious.

the vast number of disc jockeys extant, and "how easy those guys who just sit back and play records have it."

Jolly, nasal-toned Al Jarvis, prototype of the wax works successes, pooh-poohs this idea.

"Listen, if I were to sit back, say 'I'm Al Jarvis, the guy who started it all,' and just take it easy as rec-

It's a formidable sight, but Al welcomes every letter. ord spinners reputedly do, I wouldn't have a listener left inside of six months! The longer you stick by this work, the tougher it gets. This sixteenth year of mine proved that to me."

Jarvis arrived at the sixteenth milestone of popularity and labor through having regarded each successive year as the "tough one."

The road Al trod leads from a Valley station way back when the Star Outfitting Company was his single sponsor. Now at KLAC's colorful early California structure in the heart of Hollvwood, Jarvis houses his "Make Believe Ballroom." That means a huge record room, his three secretaries and their lists of myriad sponsors, a personal publicity man, and himself, in a full suite of smartly decorated rooms. The topography of his course has almost unerringly

followed markers set up by the public pulse.

Keeping Up With the Public

Al discovers these "markers" through contests, by open telephone lines into his studio, and by a continuous audit of the sales sheets that reflect Mr. and Mrs. John Q's buying. It's finding out what the hearers want that makes up the work. Playing the preferred platters is easy ... even three and a half hours a day.

"It's not a matter of gaining listeners. They're already tuned in or they wouldn't hear the records I do play. But I can lose a lot of that audience unless I try to pick the best arrangements, insofar as listeners are concerned, just as often as I'm able "

So far Al's hit an amazing percentage of prognostications. He's picked winners including Nat Cole, Benny Goodman, and Stan Kenton. long before eminence tagged them. For weeks before Francis Craig's "Near You" stampeded buyers into record stores, Al had been spinning the disc on "Mak- Believe Ballroom."

Frankie Laine had been heard innumerable times both on record and in person with Al before the bobby soxers adopted him to bestow the favor of being catapulted to national fame.

Yet Al's the lirst to scoff at the suggestion that his prognostications are always true, or that he can spot talent unfailingly. He tells the amusing story of having attended a Thanksgiving party with his wife, Marilyn.

"Frederick Spielman was playing the guests' requests on the piano. When he was asked to do the 'Habanera' from 'Carmen,' up stepped Marilyn and sang the selection, noteperfect. from beginning to end. I knew she sang popular ballads well, but certainly hadn't spotted her for a classical voice or repertoire. And I've been married to Marilyn for two years!"

a featured part with Clark Gable in "A Night in Bombay." Novello entered the Signal Corps when the war came along and ended up writing and producing all GI revues at Camp Crowder. Headliner of the series was a production of Clare Booth Luce's brilliant play "The Women," which, with an all-male cast, toured service camps to provide much-needed hilarity.

Returning from the Army, Jay quickly picked up the reins of his radio career, and today works most of the network dramatic shows. In addition, he is heard as "Uncle David" on the "Aunt Mary" soaper, was the belligerent punch - drunk John L. McGinty on the Jack Paar show and played innumerable European heavies and characters on Don Lee's "Count of Monte Cristo." In fact, at rehearsal the first question Jay asks Carleton Young, who

Jay Novello Is Equally Gifted Playing Serials, Comedy, Heavies, Characters, Not to Mention Skill At Tennis, Riding and Cooking

NE OF THE richest sources of theater tradition, the touring company of England, is the primary contributor to the vocal versatility that Jay Novello displays to make him one of the busier character actors on the Hollywood scene.

As Welsh as the name Novello, which was familiar on the Wales countryside more than six centuries ago, Jay's mother married a touring actor in the days when touring companies were distinguished principally by the frequency with which company managers absconded with a good week's gate receipts. When a manager stranded the unhappy thespians in such a manner, Jay's father took over the company and set some kind of a record by successfully managing it until the late twenties, when he retired.

Jay was pressed into roles at an early age, for reasons of budget at first, and then because he showed strong signs of inheriting his parents' talent. Since the young boys in the company played both boy and girl roles with little more than a costume change, Jay found himself exceptionally busy. When came the unhappy day his falsetto voice would crack in the midst of a girl's lines or a growing bass would suddenly turn into a maidenly trill during a dramatic scene, Jay knew he could start concentrating on male leads.

The company toured all over the British Isles, and the Novellos traveled throughout Europe on the infrecuent vacations they enjoyed, Thirty-eight giving Jay a first-hand knowledge of the continent's history, as well as some facility in the languages of the various lands. It was during his travels in Italy that Jay made his most sensational bow. In Venice, he became so engrossed in the cries of various gondoliers as they hawked for passengers that he stepped up for a closer view, and provided the expressive Italians with plenty of exercise, vocal and physical, as they rescued him from the cold waters of the canal that served as a street.

In the early thirties, Novello made the trip to America and started an enthusiastic swing of this country with a stock company. Then, one day on a windy Chicago street, a frantic producer grabbed Jay's elbow, asked him if he could act, and without waiting for an answer rushed him to a microphone and jammed a marked script in his hand while throwing the opening cue to a waiting organist.

After giving what might be classified as an "instinctive" performance, Jay realized that he not only liked the mike but that the rapid change from character to character in radio would give him a challenging change from the week-in, week-out routine of the stage.

A top-ranking name on the Chicago scene, Novello came to Hollywood in 1938, joining Burgess Meredith and other stars of the future in the NBC stock company. His NBC work led to motion picture roles and he appeared in some twenty pictures, the roles ranging from comedy dialects and heavies to plays the Count, is "How do you kill me this week, Cam?"

Possibly his weekly immersion in the life of nineteenth century Paris partially accounts for his love of classics, whether they be music, books or the other fine arts. An ardent collector, he has more than twelve hundred records scattered about his apartment, including more than seventy complete symphonies. Beethoven ranks as his favorite, although several autographed records by Sir Lancelot, the calvpso singer, can be found side by side with the works of Haydn and Delius. Out-doors, Jay prefers riding and tennis, and in the latter sport his mean mixture of smashes and lobs is guaranteed to give anybody a good game. Jay excels as a host, for he can overwhelm guests with a combination of classical music, expert cooking and unexcelled abilities as a raconteur. Novello's meals, especially his English roast beef and Yorkshire pudding, are so famed among radio-ites that he often ac-cuses guests of starving for a week before dropping in for dinner, so quickly does the food disappear.

Novello's favorite cooking trick would horrify Fannie Farmer, for he starts out with the ingredients as outlined in a recipe and then lets his imagination have free rein as to w h at additional components h e should add. That his experiments pay off is best attested by the fact that the rest of the cast of "The Count" place him neck and neck with producer Jaime Del Valle when asked "Who's the best cook around?"

which Al frequently spikes his listener interest in his record parade help keep him near the grindstone. The contests are usually tied in with introducing a new sponsor. Ideas may occur to Al during any hour of the twenty-four, just as does the shaping up of these dreams for air presentation. When he gets a brainstorm, Al pops from his bed or the lunch table to his office, outlines the scheme and lines up the detail to be turned over to his staff.

Typical was his "Lullaby Contest," designed to reward couples longest married through the worst marital adversities.

"I'd been reading the papers one evening, wondering why Joe Smoe's or Maisie Glutz's latest divorce landed them in the news as though they'd done something terrific. The much-divorced always hit the public eye, while those constant to marriage benefit only within their home. If anyone deserves public approbation and a prize, they're the ones."

At Christmas time, three days saw Al featuring unidentified singers on record. Any card sent to him, bearing the correct names of these three mystery voices, and the name of a druggist whom the contestant had asked to carry a new sponsor's product, won two coveted tickets to the Rose Bowl game, with the added attraction of taxi passage there and back.

For Christmas Day fare, Al had scouted around and secured the favorite records of the artists themselves.

When Jarvis enjoyed his first vacation in fifteen years, that took as much behind-the-scenes endeavor as a planned parade of visiting talent for a publicity stunt. Rather than introduce a substitute who might or

might not achere for two weeks to the Jarvis policy of friendly public attention, Al gathered up a group of diversified and popular substitutes to host the "Ballroom." Dore Schary, head of RKO, singer David Street, the Andrews and King Sisters, Freddy Martin, Abe Burrows, Eddie Cantor and George Jessel, with others, took a hand at disc jockeying.

"Those two weeks were one time I think listeners *did* want to hear the disc jockeys more than the records," Al grinned.

"We've talked a lot about what goes on to get appealing records on the air, and 'why is a sponsor,' without mentioning what I think is pretty important.

"I won't say flatly that record program fans don't want to hear a lot of talk. Some probably have favorites whose voices they enjoy... but mine, J'm sure, isn't one of them. For all my experience I couldn't walk out tomorrow and get an announcing iob. My listeners want to hear their own favorite records."

It was the satisfied listeners who made Al first click, then stick, and he knows it.

"You don't think it would take twelve hours a day or the work of four other people to pick out my own favorites from the record bin and spin 'em. I can hear my preferences at home."

Remember Jarvis' old offer of \$1000 to any listener who can correctly tell him the kind of music Al himself prefers? It still stands.

Freedman, the assistant writer, is introduced. He takes a bow with no head at all!

Even the janitor appears. Then a bucket-and-mop routine of audienceterrorizing involving chasing up and down the aisles is carried on by him and the lively emcee.

A Modified Marx

When the clock above the control board booth has rolled away thirty minutes of antics, director Bob Dwan and the ABC producer, Harfield Weedin, restore order and throw the cue that the show is really on the air.

The immediate change in Marx would mystify the hordes who worked with him and his brothers in their 'famous stage productions or motion pictures. Long identified with a violence of nonsense and the chasing of blondes (or brunettes—or redheads!), Groucho Marx manages to subordinate to the purpose of the show what by now must be natural on-stage tendencies, without losing a bit of his personality.

He never stops the ad-lib wisecracks, but they are tempered with a warmness that takes the bite out of them. Even when participants' innocent remarks are snatched up and distorted, for laughs, by the quip-master, the joke is with them, not on them.

Billy May, trumpet man de luxe a mong contemporary musicians, heads the ten-piece orchestra. After one formal introduction, Groucho refers to Maestro May as "Arturo," "Ludvig," "Wolfgang," "Leopold" anything other than "Billy." Anyone who has heard Billy May lend his terrific imaginative drive on a trumpet to the work of combos, or on the Capitol Record series. "History of Jazz," realizes the ridiculousness of the classical monikers for him. He's a jazzman to the point of being a purist.

Billy is one of the several on stage during this show who can barely contain themselves at Groucho's wittiness. It isn't an unusual sight to see him, the announcer or the engineers duck out of mike range in order that their laughter not break up a sequence.

It's understandable that this man Marx, who followed a golden career of vaudeville and stage work with his equally frantic brothers since the time they all wore knee pants, might have a hard time playing with the gallery rather than to it. Groucho expresses simple amazement at his own reaction to the show.

"It's the first time an audience has really meant anything more to me than just a sea of faces. Now I'm right in their laps! They're part of the act, and I get to know them." He solemnly admits to being "scared to death of the audience . . . at first." then quips "If I pay 'em enough. they don't hurt me!"
