That Miraculous Metropolitan

The Metropolitan Opera Brings Its Colossal Productions to a Faithful Air Audience Each Week Without Losing a Note From the Singers

HE headlined hullabaloo over this year's threatened Metropolitan Opera season brought even more attention than the venerable and well-publicized opera house usually gets. Would the Met grant the pay

gets. Would the Met grant the pay increases? Would the Met open at all? Was it true that the opera was so far in the red that it couldn't afford to operate? Did it need the modernization that Billy Rose said it did?

In the midst of all the unanswered

questions, Broadway impresario Rose had offered to operate the opera house for one year, streamline its production by using Broadway staging techniques and incidentally pull the big show out of the \$220,000 deficit announced by George A. Sloan, the Met's Board Chairman.

Met Radio-wise

There is one department in which the Metropolitan needs no tampering—even from the indefatigable Rose's point of view. That's the radio series offered each Saturday after-

noon by the American Broadcasting Company during the opera season. The complete opera matinee is brought directly from the stage to the music lover at home—no technical upsets, no stage waits, no dead air.

Considering the size of each production, the length of the broadcasts and the organization and planning that must go on behind each weekly program, the technical achievement of the radio personnel is considerable. For those of you who still think the Met is an old fogy and also for those who've often wondered how the big musical operation is put together (and you too, Mr. Rose), here are the eye-opening details:

Fourteen microphones are used in bringing the program to the air. Eight are placed in strategic spots about the stage. Six are used during the popular intermission features, Opera Quiz and Opera News.

Milton J. Cross (as all regular listeners know) is the personality upon whom the unity of the three-hourlong program depends. He opens the program with an announcement from the Texas Company's box. At all times during the ensuing broadcast he is in contact with ABC network master control and with the rest of the opera house.

Act One

Backstage an assistant producer is stationed to cue the conductor. In a box located in the famed Grand Tier of the opera house, ABC producer William Marshall with an engineer listens to Cross's opening talk, piped into the box from the announcer's mike. As the lights go down, the assistant producer backstage cues the conductor to enter. Cross de-

scribes this familiar ritual. The microphones in the orchestra pit start to open. As the backstage mikes are turned on, producer Marshall (armed with a score of the opera) directs his engineer as to levels. The show is on!

Act Two

Milton J. Cross works throughout in both the producer's box and the stage box. As the first act ends, he gives the call for the station break and then introduces Boris Goldovsky, who is already set with his guests in the Metropolitan Opera Guild room. The controls then shift to this room. Goldovsky, with a hanging mike over his piano, delivers his popular Opera. News and introduces his guests, who sit before a table facing three more live mikes. An overflowing audience of Guild members, opera stars, visiting notables and friends watches this intermission program. By this time, Cross is back in producer Marshall's box with the chief engineer. He introduces the second act of the opera from here and then goes back to his stage box, where Olin Downes, music critic and quiz master of the Opera Quiz, is waiting. Two more mikes are placed across the box for the three experts who'll mastermind this musical "Information Please." Cross calls for the station break and then introduces Downes. A control engineer here feeds the mikes to the control box, where the producer is still on duty,

"Great Scenes From Great Plays"

Most breathtaking performance of the season took place on the opening broadcast of Mutual's "Great Scenes from Great Plays," KHJ, 8:00 p.m. Friday. Star Walter Hampden narrated and enacted the role of "Cyrano de Bergerac," reprising the famous love speech and death scenes. In recreating these bits from his most famous stage role, Hampden brought drama in the grand manner to the microphone.

The great stage star will continue on the program as host-narrator of the program. His beautiful classical speech should be enough to compel intelligent listeners to follow the series weekly.

The Episcopal Churches of America serve as sponsors of this fine program, and they have made an excellent choice of subject and talent. The short mentions of religion and churchgoing are sensible and listenable. The theme of the program, "Cyrano's" courage and triumph over adversity through self effort, was tied into the message of the sponsor.

In the ensuing weeks an impressive line-up of great plays and stars will be heard, but Mr. Hampden's "Cyrano" will stand alone in the series as it has on the legitimate stage for a generation.

Morgan's cutting impersonation of the leather-lunged giveaway emcee and Fred's lugubrious singing of the "mystery melody" ("Though lah-de-de-dah may come your way, they bring the flowers that bloom in May") was worth not winning the giant jackpot on the opposition station. In an effort to vary the familiar "Allen's Alley" routine, Fred bantered with his stooges in a casual "sidewalk stroll" manner. "Claghorn" was replaced with Kenny Delmar's new Russian character, which we enjoyed-"Ajax Cassidy" was dropped in favor of Peter Donald's "gloom-chaser" character, which we didn't.

Jack Benny, KFI, 5:00 p.m., 10:30 p.m. Sunday, came back to the air with his tried and true cast and writers. It goes without saying that the Benny show repeated its tried and true success. How Jack manages to stamp the program with his great personality while giving his stooges all the laugh-lines, we'll never know, but it continues to be the twist that makes for success. Our slight misgivings on the opening show were due to the limited appearance of Phil Harris. We especially liked The Sportsmen and their yodeling echo gag.

Harris-Faye Show, KFI, 5:30 p.m. Sunday, started the season with a sparkling program. Phil Harris took top honors, crowded by Elliott Lewis as "Frankie Remley." It will be his task in the ensuing weeks to hold the forty-five-minute show together with his personality and talent.

Carmen Dragon and his orchestra supply the almost continuous music behind the principals, a large job well done.

No musical comedy ever written had a plot that amounted to much of anything-few have had dialogue that stood up after a year's time. The mu-sic, memory and mood are the sole survivors in most cases. "The Rail-road Hour" should re-discover the spirit behind each of its musical com-

Television may not be reviving vaudeville as rapidly as some had hoped and others feared—but it's doing all right by the talent hunts and amateur hours.

The cream of one talent hunt will be paraded, beginning October 30, each Saturday night at 6:15 over KFI-TV, KFI-FM and KFI regular AM. The show is Packard-Bell's Television Talent Test, and here's how it works. The P-B dealers in the first four areas, Long Beach, Hollywood, Pasadena and Downtown Los Angeles, have avail-able Talent Test entry blanks. En-trants will be auditioned, with the full treatment of costumes, lighting and production, by KFI producer and emcee Cliff Arquette. Both amateurs and pro-fessionals may participate, but unless you know your talent is of pretty high caliber, don't get your hopes up about breezing through the auditions as winner. The idea is to get new faces and new talent from the different sections of the Southland, through an area-byarea hunt, so you can see that reaching the screen, the frequencies and the amplitudes won't be a cinch.

At the end of twelve weeks of parading the chosen talent at the station, KFI devotes the thirteenth week to bringing together the most outstanding talent located on the previous programs. Don't ask us what kind of acts the hunt is looking for . . . we don't know. Ask your Packard-Bell dealer. (Besides, we'll be a little busy for the next few weeks practicing tap dancing and training a dog we know for an act!)

Some of our Radio Life-reading friends wanted to know, apropos of last week's mention of non-paying video packagers, who did pay and who didn't. One outfit (Stokey-Ebert) frankly admitted . . . "Nope, we can't pay our talent now for the simple reason it would mean digging down into our own jeans for the tab . . . " Then they went on to commit themselves to something so startling we asked if we could quote it. It seems that the kids who help them now, for free, won't be forgotten when the Stokey-Ebert enterprises become national. Their plan is, when this going national occurs, that in every case that a performance is shown more than once, by means of film, the actors therein will be recompensed for each showing . . just like the transcription ruling in radio. tionize the world and make him famous, while "Belle" has the constant task of getting him out of trouble.

Likes Role

While Karl Swenson, who plays the role of "Lorenzo," says his part as the easy-going, affable, but frustrated inventor is the one radio part that most appeals to him, Karl's own career-building has been anything but the easy path.

The young man started out to be a doctor, but after taking pre-medical courses in two colleges—Randolph Macon in Virginia, and Marietta College in Ohio—he decided that his studies had been directed in the wrong path. So he braved parental objections and started all over, this time on a dramatic career.

Karl began studying acting with Maria Ouspenskaya as his tutor, at the Laboratory Theater in New York. He started his professional theatrical career with stock companies, and later played in Broadway productions, including "One Sunday Afternoon," "The House of Renson," "Fools Rush In" and "Highland Fling."

His first radio part was in 1937. Karl has since played in many nighttime dramatic and mystery shows, and held down "Lorenzo's" portrayal.

Started Early

Lucille Wall, the patient "Belle" of the serial, decided quite young (and quite unlike Karl Swenson) to become an actress as soon as possible. She was just five years old. By now Lucille has played more than 600 different parts in front of a microphone.

The tall, slender actress, considered one of the best-dressed women in radio, started her dramatic training in a methodical fashion, attending the American Academy of Dramatic Art after her graduation from the Sacred Heart Academy in Washington, D. C. She spent her summers in stock, then joined Jane Cowl's road company, doing bit parts and understudying leading roles in ""Romeo and Juliet," "Anthony and Cleopatra" and "The Merchant of Venice." Lucille was "discovered" for radio, and made her bow as the "Collier Love Story" girl with Fredric March.

The attractive actress divides her time among radio roles, her home, and her hobbies. The latter two are practically synonymous, for Lucille's New York City apartment is furnished in 18th-century English style, and as a collector of antiques, Lucille haunts shops for bargains in Sheraton and Chippendale.

Joseph Julian and Frank Behrens, as "Sandy Matson" and "Jim Barker" respectively, complement the cast of the story line on "Lorenzo," whose inventions have made him a character to the town, but not to "Belle," who loves him. The struggle of the two for security could be anyone's story, but somehow, in this production by Anne and Frank Hummert, the serial manages to carry more smiles than tears.

Twenty-six Years Ago

Station KHJ Was a Tiny Rollicking Coffeepot, Atop the Old Times Building. The Saga Is a Tear-Jerker If You've Any Sentiment at All

HERE are three Spirits of Radio Past in the history of KHJ.

One strolls the landscaped lawn now at the corner of First and Broadway, recalling the old Los Angeles Times Building, and the twenty-five-by-thirty room in its tower, where a station began.

Another sits astride the rusting transmitters on the Don Lee Cadillac center at Seventh and Bixel, where San Francisco joined Los Angeles and a new network was born.

And the third roams the hallways of a modern building at 5515 Melrose Avenue, where KHJ had its last operations before the final big move to Vine Street.

In each of these sentimental settings, a sequence of radio took place, a bustle of show-business and teamwork and horseplay resounded, a part of KHJ's life-story was told. Small wonder that the ghosts still walk.

On April 13, 1922, KHJ opened operations as a 50-watt, 760-kilocycle station, designed to build subscriptions for the Times. The dedicatory program opened with the "Star Spangled Banner" and a brief address by the late Times publisher, Harry Chandler. Louise George Dorr, Josef Schwarz and Edith Mason were soloists, and Hal Skelly, headliner at the Orpheum, offered "Ten Minutes of Fun." Latest n e w s bulletins were then flashed to the city set-owners who had spent hours building and adjusting their cat - whisker crystal sets. The program closed with a bedtime story by "Uncle John" and a poem by James W. Foley.

The late "Uncle John" Daggett, a Times reporter who was noted for his eloquence, was appointed manager of the new enterprise. E. K. Barnes, now retired and living in Inglewood, joined the staff as a technical and programming assistant. Van Newkirk, who has his own agency now, and who was with KHJ for many years, soon began to h ang around as a "meeter and greeter."

Together, Van and E. K. still remember such favorites as "Queen Titania and the Sandman," Wesley Tourtellotte, Mona Content, Claire Mellonino, the Titian Trio, Charlie "The Prince of Pep" Wellman, the Piggly-Wiggly Girls, June Parker, Nell Larsen, Veola Vonn, Richard Headrick ("The Little Minister"), Dickie Winslow, Baby Muriel McCormack, Maggie O'Shea ("The Blarney

Girl"), Freeman Lang, Edward Murphy, and Elvia Allman ("The Surprise Package Girl," who is today's "Mrs. Buff-Orpington" on "Blondie.") Nostalgia

"Elvia had a gift for making herself look gangling," E. K. chuckles. "We had auditions two mornings a week, and one day my secretary, Gladys Meyers, warned me to prepare myself. Elvia made an entrance I'll never forget. She bounced in, pulled off her felt hat, ran her fingers through her red hair and announced 'I want to recite for you.' She did a panicking thing about a Southern girl at a dance, and we put her on the air. The fan mail began to pour in and Elvia was a star. Those were the happy days in radio, when it was all a fraternal affair.

"Dan Griddley was another one who just wandered in and said he wanted to sing. He had a marvelous (Please Turn to Page 39)

ADIO and television will play love scenes in salmon pink, soap operas in lemon yellow, and moody stuff in mauve and chocolate, now that the Mutual-Don Lee Network has completed three acres of studios done up in nineteen difterent colors, here in Hollywood.

Whatever the story line, characters and producers will be whisked off to a studio with the right chromatic temperature to play their parts. The only thing missing will be inky black studios for "Whodunits."

The Don Lee organization spent \$3,000,000 on the largest studio in the world, building for simultaneous transmission of television, radio and FM. The plant incorporates fourteen studios under one roof.

While the visiting public will be awed by colorful studios almost as large as airplane hangars, it's the building as a whole that's such an amazing structure, in both design and equipment.

The building, approximately 285 by 280 feet, has three stories plus a basement, and covers a total floor space of about three acres. The entire structure is air-conditioned, by means of 200 tons of refrigeration, in such a manner that the temperature can be regulated in any one part of the building without affecting the rest.

Architectural design of the plant has followed a Latin American motif as conceived by Claude Beclman, architect, and Herman Spackler, his associate. In the forecourt of the main entrance-way stand two fiftyfoot high, thirteen-ton Washingtonian Robusta palm trees. Cypress trees and other shrubbery complete the landscaping pattern. The exterior of the building is marked off to resemble the use of large stone blocks, finished in a warm sand coloring. Parking space accommodates approximately 150 cars at the rear of the building.

Main Entrance Lobby

Upon entering the main lobby of the new studio, the visitor's eye falls on a large mural depicting a day in radio, and illustrating everything from drama to weather, and from symphonies to electronics. Art work throughout the building was designed by Robert Sinnott and his wife.

Immediately behind the information desk is a large abstract map of the area covered by the Don Lee Network, done in wood veneers of ten kinds. Zebra wood, oak, Brazilian mahogany and curly maple are among some of the woods.

To the left of the lobby is a large soundproof glass window giving a view of the master control room. This has been arranged so that the visitor

will be able to watch network switching operations without disturbing the engineers on duty.

This master control is the nerve center of the whole place. The tenton magic electronic giant that does the "controlling" is thirty-two feet lorg and ten feet high, and is the very latest model in appearance and engineering. Into the switchboard are connected fourteen incoming and outgoing networks, and input and outgoing networks, and input and outgoing networks, and the discjockey and announce booths. There are approximately five miles of wire and 75,000 soldered connections in this equipment which handles all FM and AM radio programming. There are 821 relays, forty-nine amplifiers, 850 indicator lamps and 2, 500 jacks. A separate panel controls the television lines. Despite the complexity of this equipment, the controls have been organized for easy supervision by one man.

The working departments have been situated so that those most closely associated, operationally, share adjacent space. An ultramodern telephone system installed has an automatic dial system and a complete exchange within itself, serving the hundreds of phones throughout the big building.

Facts and Figures

Construction actually began October 28, 1947. Vine Street travelers soon grew used to the sight of the average crew of sixty men each day swarming over excavations, erections, and finally disappearing from view entirely within the structure's shell. What the passers-by couldn't know was that it took eight of these men three months to install 80,500 squares of Celotex covering 108,500 square feet, or that it took another eight men four months to install the broadcasting equipment only. HERE'S nothing a photographer likes to do so much as get out and take pictures, if he's got a halfway decent excuse," explains "Behind the Lens" man Maurie Webster.

To demonstrate, Maurie and his sponsor, the Westlake Camera Exchange, threw the party at Columbia Square depicted on these pages. With whoops of exuberance, approximately 1100 amateur and professional shutter-clickers thundered into the hallways, lobby and studios of KNX to accept the invitation. Free flash bulbs were passed out by Westlake, and the station supplied professional models, entertainers, its stages and studios, for subject matter. Radio Because He's a Camera Bug Himself, Maurie Webster Started This Show, and the Folks Who Like the Idea Seem to Be Countless!

Life also entered into the spirit of the thing by awarding first prize, a \$200 Busch-Pressman camera, for the best picture made during the day.

Maurie Webster had a program similar to "Behind the Lens" on KNX in 1938, '39 and '40, called the "Columbia Camera Club." It was the first show dealing with photography on any network, had a membership of several thousands, and it introduced Maurie to his wife.

Maurie had a friend who was a professional photographer, and who kept talking about "a very cute girl you ought to have on your show." The young lady's name was Judith Russell; she was a photographer's

model and quite a camera enthusiast herself (she took and developed her own pictures and specialized in baby photos). One of the pictures for which she had posed was among the most widely seen in the last ten years. It was a portrait called "Judith," done in high key. (Only two years ago, the Websters heard that it took a prize for a salon showing in India.) Judith guested on Maurie's show the first of December in 1939. Four months later, she and her interviewer were married.

Back to Camera

Judy Webster decided she'd like to get back into baby photography shortly after she and Maurie had their family. (Scotty is seven and Susan is five now.) So Maurie built a fully-equipped darkroom for her, and his wife now runs quite a happy little business on the side.

"Kids are alive and interesting," says Maurie, "and it's unfortunate

that too many people insist on getting bad pictures of them. We have some wonderful pictures of Susan, for instance, that I took when we were back in Cambridge, and she was just learning to cope with a spoon."

Maurie strenuously advocates "action" in picture-taking. "Every day, coming out of Columbia," he says, "I see people taking pictures of 'Aunt Mary,' standing real stiff and squinting into the sun. Two more minutes, and they could get a good shot. There are three simple rules. Get the background. Get the subject. Get the picture.

"Now over at Columbia I think everybody wants the marquee as background. Then, the subject should be doing scmething . . . it doesn't matter what . . . looking at a road map, going through broadcast tickets, reading a newspaper or just talking. But not, for heaven's sakes, staring into the camera! Then get the picture. By that I mean making sure that everything's set correctly, that nobody's going to walk in front of you and that something isn't growing out of the subject's head (a favorite trick of amateurs). All ready? Snap the shutter."

On "Behind the Lens," Maurie gives many such hints. "The kind of pictures made by guys with \$1000 equipment, I can make and you can make," he insists. "The show isn't a classroom, but just so you go away learning something!"

"Of all hobbies you name, I think photography is the most universal. Almost everybody either owns a camera or wants to, and of all those people few are experts, and most are not even good amateurs. But they're happy. And I think I should add that our program doesn't propose to make anybody an expert. I know too many photography experts, and they're not happy."

THE CROWD WAS EXTREMELY PLEASANT ABOUT BEING CAREFUL of the surroundings, and the party was so successful that further get-togethers and some excursions are being planned. "But not until we rest a little bit," sighs Maurie Webster.

(Continued From Page 35) that 9,300 miles were driven by trucks removing 44,673 tons of earth to prepare for construction.

Other gargantuan tasks are revealed by the fact that approximately 17,000 tons of concrete were poured for the walls and basement, and 49,-000 gallons of water were required to mix the concrete in the studios.

Two hundred fifty-eight tons of lumber were used for these studios, of which 100 tons were used structurally. Eighty-two thousand square feet of acoustical plywood was used to cover the polycylindrical diffusers in the large studios. Roof trusses totaled sixty-five tons in weight. Nails? Over 5,000,000, not counting the 16,000 machine and anchor bolts tying the concrete together.

The imposing edifice that spells the fourth and latest chapter in Mutual-Don Lee Network development bears large gold address numerals above the Vine Street entrance. Small wonder, looking back on the years of hope, months of planning, and more months of careful preparation, that the group now housed there laugh at the usual superstition hovering over number thirteen. They call their address, "1313," their good luck.

voice and he was an instant hit. That was the way a lot of our talent came to us, and of course some of it was very good and some of it was unspeakable."

On November 14, 1927, the Times sold KHJ to Cadillac dealer Don Lee. When the station moved to the Don Lee Building at Seventh and Bixel Streets, there were approximately 100 employees. The studios were on the second floor and the transmitters on the roof. Now, as one wanders through the Cadillac headquarters downtown, there a re cars parked, ready for painting and repairing, where microphones and broadcast equipment once stood.

The Bixel Street era was an industrious one. Don Lee connected his new purchase with his San Francisco station, KFRC, and inaugurated a network. By the first of the year, KHJ had acquired a new 1000-watt transmitter.

The old-timers began to be augmented by newcomers; among the most important was musical showman Raymond Paige. The staff boasted several vocalists: Eloise Kirkpatrick, Hulda Dietz, Eleanor Rennie, Claire Van Nostrand, Carl Omeron, Leigh Harline and Robert Cheatham, Leslie Brigham, Robert Bradford, blues singers June Parker and Bob Swan. At San Francisco's KFRC, Meredith Willson was musical director, and Al Pearce, a romanticlooking young man with wavy hair, was beginning to make good. There are many outstanding radio personalities today who obtained their starts in the Don Lee organization ... Burns and Allen, Don Wilson, Bill Goodwin, Ken Niles, Nadine Conner.

When Paul Whiteman came to Hollywood to do his Old Gold Hour for KHJ, an unprecedented engineering experiment was attempted. Microphones were placed in front of eyery orchestral section (and the re was great scurrying to provide enough of them). While at KHJ, Whiteman also set the pattern for mood music and musical bridges, standard devices in radio today.

Louella Parsons brought Hollywood to the microphone, giving such stars as Mary Garden, Marie Dressler, Marlene Dietrich, Norma Shearer, Buddy Rogers, Will Rogers and John Boles their first radio debuts. "Chandu, the Magician" and "Dramas for Youth" were important program favorites.

Develop Network

In September, 1929, Don Lee Broadcasting System became the California outlet of the Columbia Broadcasting System. This association terminated in 1936; and in the meantime, Don Lee had bought two more stations, KGB in San Diego and KDB in Santa Barbara, and had affiliated with four others, so that he had a network of eight stations. To reenlarge his operations, he join ed with fifteen Oregon and Washington stations owned by Pacific Broadcasting Company and with five more independent stations, and agreed to make the new Don Lee network the coastal outlet for the transcontinental programs of Mutual Broadcasting System.

Lewis Allen Weiss, a crack advertising expert for the Hearst Los Angeles Examiner, came to the network as vice-president and general manager in June, 1930. Two years later, he went to WJR, Detroit, as general manager, but following the death of Don Lee in 1934 he returned as executive in charge, at the request of heir and president, Thomas S. Lee. Willet H. Brown, son of Joel Brown, former Don Lee automobile general manager, had already joined the Don Lee Broadcasting S y st e m as vice-president and assistant general manager.

It became necessary, in 1940, to expand KHJ's facilities in Hollywood. The old Consolidated Film Laboratories on Melrose Avenue had been converted into a radio station by NBC, then left vacant for over a year when NBC next moved to Sunset and Vine. A five-year KHJ lease was signed with next-door ne ig h b or R K O for this Melrose plant. One of the two 500-person audience studios was at once prepared for initial broadcast of Mutual's new coast-toc o a st show, "I Want a Divorce," starring Joan Blondell. The entire exterior and interior of the main unit as well as the office structure in the rear of the central plant were renovated and redecorated, and three new studios were added to the halfmillion-dollar building.

At the old Times building there had been one main telephone, answered most of the time by E. K. Barnes's wife, "Elly," or by any one person in the vicinity. At Seventh and Bixel Streets there was a small board attended by a single operator, to handle the Cadillac and KHJ calls. At 5515 Melrose, seventeen trunk lines and eighty extensions were put in for Maggie Leaverton, new chief operator, and her assistants.

That was more than seven years ago, and the 5515 Melrose headquarters became a homelike, friendly center of radio activity, connecting the stations which continued to add themselves from north and south of Los Angeles to the great Mutual-Don Lee chain.

Finally, like a gentleman who has put on so much weight he has to buy himself a new suit of clothes, KHJ broke ground at 1313 North Vine Street and began its magnificent new structure. As the building neared completion and offices began slowly to transfer to the glossier, vaster surroundings ready for them, KHJ's employees all felt a sizeable pang. Switchboard head Maggie probably spoke for many an old. timer when she turned in her resig-nation with this explanation: "I'm going home to keep house. I'll miss it, but I think someone else had better go in with the new set-up. It just won't seem the same after all these familyish years."
