NE OF THE least-known talents of some of the best-known radio personalities lies in their culiexception they were happy to pass along tricks and secrets to the readers of Radio Life. One or two of the folks we asked apparently enjoy the name without the game, but we en-joyed their comical answers so thoroughly that we are printing them for you to see.

JACK BENNY (NBC Star) Frankly, it's obvious why this is my favorite recipe for Christmas, New Year's or any other holiday.

'Twill Soon Be the Night Before Christmas, and "All Through the Houses" of These Radio People Will Ring Praises of Their Home-Made Goodies

SCOTCH SHORTBREAD 1/2 Cup sugar 1 cup Snowdrift 34 tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla 2 tbsp. milk 2 cups all-purpose. flour

Cream first five ingredients. Lightly stir flour into mixture in four or five por-tions to make a soft dough. Turn onto lightly floured board, roll out 1/2 inch thick. Cut into one- by two-inch rectan-gles. Place on ungreased cookle sheet and prick each two or three times with a fork. Bake in moderate over (350 dea fork. Bake in moderate oven (350 de-grees) twelve to twenty minutes, or un-til delicately browned.

GARRY MOORE

(NBC's "Take It or Leave It")

I can always remember, as a little boy back East, picking (and eating) blueber-Dack Lass, picking (and eating) blueber-ries. In fact, I would pick a few quarts, sell them to my mother, and then eat all the ples she made. I couldn't lose. This is her recipe, and I hope you will like it as well as I do, at Christmas time or any other.

BLUEBERRY PIE

- 1 quart blueberries 2 tbsp. flour

1 cup sugar 1 tbsp. lemon juice 1 double crust nine-inch shortening pastry recipe

Wash blueberies. Add flour, sugar and lemon juice, and put into a bowl. Roll pastry for crust 1/2 inch thick on lightly floured board, then turn into pie plate, cutting steam vents near the center. Turn

berries into lower shell; then roll out up-per crust and place over berries. Seal edges together. Flute the edge of the crust. Bake in a moderately hot oven (425 degrees) for fifteen minutes, then re-duce to moderate heat (350 degrees) for twenty-five minutes. Cool on shelf.

MAURICE HART (KFW8 Disc Jockey) These spicy little grilled sandwiches are especially good for a late snack. We like them all the time, but they'd be equally appetizing to a Holiday crowd. CHEESE SNAPPERS

- tsp. mustard tsp. Worcestershire sauce dash garlic powder dash black pepper

1 dash black pepper Butter two pieces of white bread light-ly on both sides. Spread sauce gener-ously on one side of each piece of bread. Place a thin slice of American cheese be-tween sandwich. Put on griddle and grill both sides. Now comes the trick: Use a heavy plate, or the bottom of a clean, heavy pan or pot to press firmly down on the sandwich while it is grilling. When finished, the cheese and sauce should be melted together, and the two slices of bread about pressed into the size of one and well browned on both sides.

LURENE TUTTLE

("Junior's Mother" on NBC's Red Skelton show)

Every Christmas ever since I can re-member I've had one or two radio shows to do and so when I get back to the house

it is usually pretty late, so I like to start my Christmas day with a "brunch" in-stead of just a breakfast. So for years now my favorite Christmas merning break-fast has been a cranberry jelly omelet. I have it every so often during the year but it seems to taste a little different and a little better on Christmas morning.

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One dozen eggs and add 4 tablespoons of water and beat slightly; halve and cook in two frying pans. Divide $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of diced cranberry jelly to each omelet when it is half cooked.

Just before omelet is finished cooking, fold and serve with powdered sugar and tiny sausages.

DENNIS DAY

Show") Mom and Pop and everybody else in our family always have been great eaters, and when a holiday like Christmas rolls around we have always had some real feasts. With all the rich holiday food, the family decided once or twice during the height of the season to make one meal a light one. Somehow the family took a liking to a special soup and it has always remained on the season's menu as our fa-vorite. We add a tossed salad, coffee and rolls, then our soup and that's all—but we like it. like it.

CHICKEN SOUP

5 cups white stock

Wash and strain one and one-half cups wild rice. Add to 6 cups boiling, salted water and cook for twenty minutes. Do not stir. Drain thoroughly and place rice in top of double boiler, together with 'a pound butter, '2 cup diced salted almonds and '4 cup diced green onions and chives. Salt to taste and allow to steam in dou-ble boiler until ready to serve ble boiler until ready to serve.

COMMANDER SCOTT

(ABC's "Romance of the Highways") This is one of the most healthful dishes I know, and one that should prove appe-tizing to all the peoples of the world:

Give me a good holiday soup and it makes any day like Christmas. Here's one of my favorites:

HOLIDAY SOUP

Whole carcass of turkey 1/2 cup celery (diced) 1/2 onion (finely cut) Salt and pepper to taste 1 cup flour 1 cup flour 2 eggs Hot water $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. hamburger Green pepper (finely diced) $\frac{1}{2}$ onion (diced)

½ onion (diced) Broth: Pour water over carcass and boil about two to three hours adding water when necessary. (Keep covered with wa-er.) Whie broth is cooking, mix flour, eggs and enough hot water to make a rather hard dough. Roll into large ball, cover and leave for an hour. Then roll out to half-inch thickness, cut into half-inch strips and then into half-inch squares. Fry in deep fat until brown. Place in waxed paper. Fry in deep waxed paper.

Mix hamburger, green pepper, season-ingstand onion. Roll into tiny half-inch bails. Fry until brown and place in waxed paper.

When broth is cooked, add hamburger balls and cubed noodles five minutes before serving.

JIMMY SCRIBNER (MBS's "Johnson Family")

(MBS's "Johnson Family") Each year, the Scribner household re-ceives from Smithfield, Virginia, a Smith-field ham which they've ordered in plenty of time for the festive season. A Smith-field is the only ham that weighs more after it is cooked. Only one county in the South raises the razorback hog (its diet consists entirely of peanuts) which contributes this delectable entree. The older the ham, the better and more val-uable it is. The hams on display in Smithfield are over 150 years old, and at that ripe old age are a rare delicacy. The English Court has served Smithfield ham on Thanksgiving and Christmac to the royal family for sixty years. And here's how the Scribners fix theirs: SCRIBNER CHRISTMAS HAM

SCRIBNER CHRISTMAS HAM

The ham, weighing approximately fif-teen pounds, is soaked overnight. The water is then drained off, fresh water added, and the ham boiled for about two hours. It is then put into a 450 degree oven and baked for one hour. No sauce or preparation is required, because all the richness and flavor is contained right in the ham itself.

("Brooksie" on MBS's "Let George Do It") This pudding has always been a favorite for our Holiday dinners because it is less rich than plum pudding, but serves the purpose beautifully.

JELLIED CHOCOLATE

PLUM PUDDING

1 thep. plain gelatin 1/2 cup cold water

7 these around fuice 7 these augurt 1/4 cup ground chocolate

- Y₄ cup ground chocolate
 1 cup whipping cream
 S₄ cup prunes, well drained
 Y₄ cup pecans or wainuts
 Y₅ tsp. sait
 Y₂ tsp. ground cloves
 Y₂ tsp. ground clonamon

Soak gelatin in cold water for five min-Soak gelatin in cold water for five min-utes. Add sugar, ground chocolate, cloves and cinnamon to the prune juice and bring to boil. Add the soaked gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add salt. Chill until slight-ly thickened. Beat with a rotary beater until fluffy, then add the cream, whipped stiff, together with the prunes and nut meats. Pour into a melon mold, or indi-vidual molds and when ready to serve un-mold and serve with foamy sauce.

RUBY DANDRIDGE ("Geranium" of NBC's Judy Canova Show)

About nine years ago I added baked ham to my Christmas menu in addition to turkey, and my guests seemed so pleased with the recipe that through the years this way of serving baked ham has be-come "my favorite Christmas recipe."

10 to 15 pound tenderized ham

Place in roaster; boil equal quantities of brown sugar and water to make a thick syrup.

Pour over ham; open large can of pine-apple rings; pour juice over ham and place rings on ham, fasten in place with tooth-picks.

Take jar of spiced cherries; pour juice over ham and place a cherry in center of each pineapple ring.

Place in 300 degree oven for one hour during which time baste four times.

ROD O'CONNOR

(NBC's Red Skelton Show)

(NBC'S Hed Sketon Show), I love to eat, all anybody has to do is look at me and they can tell that. One Christmas—back so long ago I can't re-member when—my wife and I were invited out and the hostess had on the menu a Cranberry-Raisin Pie. It was so good it melted in my mouth and I got the gal to give my wife the recipe. We had the pie a couple of times after that but it never

tasted quite as good and then I got my wife to show me how to put the pie to-gether, and, by George, I turned out a pie that really tasted tops. Yet it is the only thing I can cook worth a darn. So as a sort of memorial to my culinary provess I make it a point to whip up one cf my special pies for each Christmas.

CRANBERRY-RAISIN PIE

- 1/2 cups of cranberries % cup sugar 1/2 cup water 1/2 tbp. flour 1/2 cup seeded raising

Mix ingredients and cook ten minutes. Cool, bake in one piecrust with a rim. Crisscross strips for top crust. Makes nineinch pie.

> ANNA ROOSEVELT (ABC Commentator)

(ABC commentator) My favorite recipe is a wonderful con-coction of my Hungarian-born house-keeper, Theresa Takacs. It is called Honey Cookies, Hungarian Style. I particularly like them because they are so fine to have when there are children in the home, as there are in mine, and, of course, for chil-dren in the neighborhood. Here, with full credit to Theresa, are the ingredients:

3 cups granulated sugar 2 cups honey 1 cup butter

- 4 cups flour
- 1/2 cup chopped citron 1 cup chopped walnuts

- 1 tsp. brown cinnamon 1 tsp. brown cloves 1 tsp. soda dissolved in one cup of cold water
- 3 eggs

DIRECTIONS A LA THERESA Heat the sugar, honey and butter to a boiling point, and allow to boil for five minutes. Remove from stove, and while still hot, stir in 4 cups of sifted flour. When this mixture is almost cold add the walnuts, almonds and citron and 1 tea-spoon each of ground cinnamon and cloves, and the soda which previously has been dissolved in cold water. Now add the eggs which have been well beaten, and enough flour to form a stiff dough. Let this stand four days in the refrigerator. Roll out and out in squares, and press an almond into the center of each cookie. Bake in a mod-eration.

EARLE ROSS

("Judge Hooker" on NBC's "The Great Gildersleeve")

"Like most men," says Ross, "I had dabbled at the hobby of being an amateur cook for some years, and ruined a lot of fine ingredients, before I made up my mind that it was best to specialize. I decided that if I ever were to make any reputation as a chef among my friends, i must pick one dish and practice on it until I was a master at whipping it up. This I did for weeks until now I can immodestly say I make the best spa-ghetti sauce I ever tasted. Some of my friends tell me I'm right. Here's the way do it:

ROSS SPAGHETTI SAUCE

- HOSS SPAGHETTI SAUCE ¹/₃ cup cooking oil ⁴ medium onions, chopped fine ² cloves garilc, very finely chopped ² No. 2 cans tomatoes, strained (1 quart) ¹ can (6 ex.) tomate paste ¹/₂ tap. garlic sait dash cayenne pepper ¹/₂ tap. Worcestershire sauce ¹ bay lea² Heat oil in success

Heat oil in saucepan; saute onions and garile until soft. Add other ingredients and simmer over low fire for two hours after addirg bay leaf. Remove bay leaf before serving piping hot over cooked and well-drained spaghetti, and serve with sour-dough French bread. Eight to ten servings.

CARLTON KADELL

(NBC's Sealtest Variety Show)

This little recipe not only utilizes left-overs from the proverbial Christmas "bird," it is also popular and easy to serve any time during the Holiday season when you want to handle a crowd during an open-house session.

an open-house session. First of all, it requires that you have a roast turkey and a baked ham on hand. Prior to serving you also prepare a big oblong pan of combread and a generous quantity of creamed mushroom sauce. The latter is a standard white sauce with mushrooms added to taste. The turkey and ham should be sliced in sandwich-sized slices. Here you have the "makinge" for your "Plantation Shortcake" and all you have to do is keep it hot until ready to serve up. The way you serve depends on whether you have chafing dishes, elec-tric roasters and all. You can serve from regula: utensils.

regula: utensils. To serve, you slice the cornbread in about three-inch squares, then slice through the center and lay out on the plate like an ocen-faced sandwich. On one-haif of the cornbread square place a slice of ham, and on the other a slice of turkey. Smother the whole thing with a generous ladle of the mushroom sauce. That's all there is to it!

("Mother Barbour" of NBC's "One Man's Family")

"One Man's Family") For any Holiday or special occasion din-ner, I nearly always serve fowi such as turkey, goose, squab or pheasant. With them my favorite combination is cran-berries. Alone or in the form of jelly they have a very tart taste. This recipe of mine keeps the good taste but still takes out the tartness.

1 quart cranberries 1/4 cup chopped nuts

Punch and Judy

(MODERN VERSION)

It is unlikely that any of California's seventy-eight fairs, which horse racing in the State supports, offer Punch and Judy shows. But that militant married couple was the star attraction of fairs throughout the world for centuries.

Fairs are almost as old as recorded history. In Medieval days they were festive occasions in every city, town and hamlet. Farmers offered their produce, merchants hawked their wares, jugglers and tumblets staged their acts and Punch bashed Judy with his enormous club.

Although Punch and Judy no longer club each other over the head, the spirit of fairs is much the same as it has always been. Farmers exhibit their produce and merchants display their wares. Punch and Judy shows have become midways offering elaborate entertainment.

California today is the first agricultural State of the nation.

California fairs owe their very existence and operations to the State revenue derived from horse racing. Cash awards for the housewife's prize-winning glass of jelly and the some 161,000 separate exhibited items in agriculture, livestock, domestic arts and handicraft are made from racing revenue. It supports 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers activities. It provides the funds to build fairgrounds and permanent improvements.

There were only nine fairs in the State before racing was legalized, whereas there are now seventy-eight.

A recent survey showed that 99 per cent. of Californians approve the fairs. Certainly, then, an overwhelming majority of our citizens must approve California racing which supports the fairs.

KNOW what my friends are thinking — that I'm a fine one to expound on this subject! When, as a matter of fact, among my intimates I have long been known as the Scotch-tape Kid. Scotch tape the boon to all procrastinators-has been my rescuer under every kind of dire last-minute situation-situations such as only a skilled "put-offer-till-tomorrow" like myself can get herself into. Now, I know that, with Christmas, you would think there could be no situation. After all, it isn't like a sudden invitation to a shower or a forgotten birthday. It's a big fat red date on the calendar that's always been there every year, all year long, for twelve months it's there, staring you right in the face, reminding you to get busy. But do putter-offers pay any attention to big fat red dates on calendars—don't be silly! It might make things easy for them.

So it is that, come two shopping days before Christmas, I can usually be found still dashing frantically from counter to counter, elbowing my way through stores full of other irately bewildered putter-offers who are wondering, like me, how on earth this could have ever happened to them again!

And on Christmas morning, in the handsome mound of decorative December 19, 1948 packages under my friends' trees, there is one disturbing sight—a wellmeant but badly battered package hurriedly swathed in ragged tissue and reams of Scotch tape.

But this year—in the tradition of the chronic procrastinator—I vow to improve my ways—and my Christmas wrapping.

With this righteous resolution in mind, here are some of the plans I've formed for my Christmas wrapping—and if there is among you one who is not the putter-offer I am, perhaps these suggestions will be put to use, after all.

First, as for the fundamental mechanics of wrapping a package, I have it on good authority (my husband!) that absolutely no method surpasses the "drug-store wrap." look like misshapen bundles of laundry as mine have the tendency to do. Therefore, it is my resolve. and suggestion to you, to employ the "drug-store wrap."

Tape Imperative

Of course, I also in sist that— "drug-store wrap" or no—it is imperative to 'have plenty of Scotch tape on hand. Since none of us have more than the standard equipment of two hands, two elbows, two knees and two feet to a pply to the strategic parts of a half-wrapped package to hold all the ends in place while trying to wrap the other half a two-inch strip of Scotch tape should be stuck on every loose corner that's apt to pop out of place.

Now, assuming that you've mastered both of these skills—my husband's drug-store wrap routine and my own Scotch-tape technique the fun begins: adding a distinctive trimming that will single out your present from all the others, and make it look almost too pretty to unwrap.

spaghetti and meatballs, the phone rang. When I put the receiver down, I had already decided on turkey, as sort of a double celebration. It was really Christmas for Al Jarvis that year, for that phone call announced the signing of my first sponsor, the Santa who paid the rent!"

Jay Stewart, emcee of ABC's "Surprise Package": "I'll never forget Christmas, 1941. Just the day before I'd gotten my 'Greetings' from the President." pilot asked me whether I would help his group give a party for a bunch of bombed-out London kids at a Red Cross Club, and I said I would. That night we had the party and I wore a red suit and cotton whiskers that came unstuck and a pillow tied around my middle. All the G.I.'s put the things they had saved from their PX rations into my bag—things they had clumsily tied up in colored paper and bright ribbon. All the kids sat around with their big eyes and

thin faces and I came down a chimney and gave out the presents. Such wonderful things-fabulous, unheard of gifts like Hershey bars and Necco wafers and flashlights. There weren't many G.I.'s at first because most of them were flying missions over the embattled bulge that day. But they came in as the party wore on and someone just off a mission did card tricks, and the kids screamed with delight and we all sang Christmas carols. I don't know what it was about that Christmas-maybe it was the war and the fact that we were all involved in that grim engagement across the Channel. But as I think back on it, the thing that made that Christmas memorable was the kids and the fact that we made them happy-and that it took so little."

Red Skelton. NBC star: "This Christmas my daughter, Valentina, will be old enough (one and a half years) to take an interest in what's going on. And that will add to the pleasure of my *first* Christmas off from work in a solid twenty years. My most memorable Christmas? That's easy---it's this one!"

Balph Edwards, NBC star of "Truth or Consequences" and "This Is Your Life": "It seems strange to say that Christmas of 1947 will be remembered as 'our' most memorable—but that's the way it worked out. For the first time since Barbara and I have been married we had the entire Edwards clan together for a week with enough time for a really old-fashioned Christmas. We had time to remember—and how could we forget with all the children around—that Christmas is a time of prayer and sharing joy on the birth of another child."

Bing Croaby: "I've had my share of Merry Christmases, but I think the one I'll always remember was when I was fourteen years old and I got my first set of drums. This event, although it drove my family and the neighbors to cotton-stuffed ears, probably was the turning point which started me into the merry mirage of the music business. I especially recall this Christmas because I sat up all day and night with my drums—accompanying old Al Jolson Victrola records."

John Nelson, ABC emcee: "I'm sure my most memorable Christmas was the one in 1945. It was the first time I had been home in four years of war, and although I was still in a Navy officer's uniform, this day will always be indelible in my memory as I just sat around with my wife and parents and had the best Christmas of my life—because I was with my loved ones and the war was over."

Ed McConnell, star of NBC's "Smilin' Ed McConnell Show": "In 1932 my baby daughter, Mary Jane, was ill with pneumonia in a Cincinnati hospital. She wasn't expected to live through the Christmas season. When I left the hospital Christmas Eve to do my show, Mary Jane's temperature had reached 106. On the program, I asked my listeners to pray for my daughter. I rushed back to the hospital after the show. Mary Jane's temperature had started to go down! And she was on the road to recovery. Those wonderful Christmas prayers helped to give me the most memorable Christmas I'll ever have."

Meredith Willson, ABC star: "My most memorable Christmas was also one of the most mind-filling experiences, too.

"Mama was superintendent of the Sunday school back home at Mason City, Iowa, and was the one to say grace at our house and special prayers like for Thanksgiving and Christmas, and I thought maybe Papa didn't believe in anything because he didn't even go to church.

"I changed my mind, though, the Christmas that he thanked my brother and me for the big red can of pipe tobacco we gave him but he said he'd like for us to change the card.

"'What's the matter with "Merry Xmas with love to Papa"?' we said.

"And Papa said 'Christmas is one word you must never abbreviate. Don't ever forget it is the birthday celebration of the greatest man who ever lived!"

ECORATION of your windows at Christmas time is important, because these are the details of the house that are most seen in the evening when the lights stream out from them. There are many people who drive up and down our streets in order to see and enjoy the gaily lighted Christmas trees and decorations which are in the homes and that can be seen through the windows.

It may be your custom to put your tree in the window at the front of the house. If it hasn't been, may I suggest that, for a change, you put it there this year and that it be the center of interest at the largest window in the front of your house. And this large window, together with the others, may itself be decorated. How would you like to outline your windows with paper cutouts in color, of holly, poinsettia or other Christmas

Deck the Halls!

Some Suggestions for Making Home Jolly And Pretty With Christmas Decorations - At Windows, Doors, Mantels—Everywhere!

decorations? It might be quite dramatic to have a gold star with rays coming from it at the top center of your window as if it were shining down on the tree. Perhaps the children in your home would like to arrange a group of small figures on a table right in front of the window . . . little scenes of the stable and manger, the wise men and camels. If so, this star on the window would be most appropriate. In these days when handicrafts and much work of that kind is done in our schools, there certainly should be plenty of talent

around a house where there are children, so that cutouts might be of bells, ribbon bows, garlands, such as the Christmas wreath, or even silhouettes of the camels with the wise men and their gifts. If you do something like this, I wonder whether you couldn't fix up a spotlight on the outside of your house above the window or from a close-by tree that would throw the light on the window itself. This would be most effective, particularly if the room itself were only dimly lighted.

Now, instead of having cutouts,

most of these things that I have mentioned could be in relief or actual articles. . . I mean, you could have regular garlands and wreaths and bells with ribbon bows hanging right there in the window. The window itself could be outlined with sprays of evergreen, sprigs of holly, anything that will last.

The decorations at the principal window of your home may be duplicated in a smaller way at the other windows on the front of your house. A smaller wreath in each one or any other of the decorations I suggested or some other that you may have thought of can be put in these windows. In fact, one of the most charmingly decorated houses that I saw last Christmas was where each window that was visible from the street had a single candle in it. It was an electric candle, of course, but the very simplicity of it was delightful. It seemed almost as if every window had an eye and that each one had a greeting.

Deck the Door

In considering our windows, we mustn't forget the major entrance to our house—the front door. I noticed that when no other decoration is used, most people decorate the front door. Because we cannot see through a wooden door, we have to outline it

with greenery or lights and hang a wreath or spray of evergreens on the door, tied, we hope, with gay red ribbon and with gold bells hanging from it. Another effective idea is to fasten a wide band of red cellophane ribbon lengthwise of your door and down the center and run another band crosswise about two-thirds of the way up. Where they meet is a huge bow knot of the same red cellophane, and located in the center of this there is a bunch of silver pine cones. If you use greenery on your door, shellac it first. It keeps the leaves fresh longer and gives that added luster which is really quite attractive.

Now, for decorating the mantel shelf. Arrange some of the smaller branches that you may have clipped from your Christmas tree, in a fan shape against the wall above the fireplace. Then make a Christmas grouping of figures, which can be the attractive little candles that come in many shapes and sizes or can be actual plaster, wood, or metal figures that tell the Christmas story. Another idea is to get a snowman for the center of the mantel shelf or one for each end and place alongside very small evergreen trees or against the candles in the shape of little fir trees and then place a line

THE FAMILY CHRISTMAS tree, with lights and balls and prettily wrapped packages, stands near the fireplace and also shows through the front window. Mr. Wileman also suggests twin trees or even a "grove." or row of silver Christmas-tree ornaments from one end to the other.

If you have electric light fixtures on each side of the fireplace, substi-tute candle bulbs for the regular globes and cut out a silver or gold star from paper or thin metal leaf and attach it to the wall back of the candle light. Then, just for the Christmas season, take down the mirror or picture that usually hangs there and replace it with a giant wreath of evergreens tied with a huge red bow. Take away the customary ornaments on the mantel shelf and use giant candles-one at each end. Or if you already have the electric lights, use tiny Christmas trees-one at each end of the mantel shelf with a few miniature Christmas-tree ornaments on them.

Perhaps, instead of hanging the wreath, you might do something far more original. Get that artist in the family to cut out some reindeer with a sleigh and pin this on the wall above the fireplace opening. Or instead of reindeer, there might be Christmas silhouettes of all kinds cut out from heavy paper or sheets of cardboard, Masonite, or other wallboard.

Christmas tree had been shorn of its branches entirely on one side. It was stood on the mantel shelf with the flat side against the wall, then decorated with colored lights and surmounted by an illuminated silver star which just touched the ceiling. Then banked right along the length of the large mantel shelf and at the foot of this tree were the prettiest Christmas packages that you ever saw.

If you like decorating over the doors, there are many attractive things to use. Evergreens, of course, come to our minds first of all, but even these can be arranged in new ways. Colored gourds can be mixed in with them, all carefully wired so that they stay in place and form an attractive over-door, and these same sprigs or sprays of evergreen can come down the casings as well as around the top, forming a kind of valance.

All Through the House

Christmas decorations should be carried right through the house. The kitchen should not be left without its festive touches of evergreen, candles, and bells. And certainly the bedrooms should carry the Christmas theme. The house and every room need not be fussy, but certainly there should be just some decoration—a pot of poinsettias or a vase full of them looks well in a bedroom just as much as any other room, and for the children's rooms certainly there should be sprigs of holly and colored papers and Christmas symbols of all kinds.

It is nice to arrange your Christmas cards on the mantel shelf, utilizing the whole space and standing the cards up so that they may be seen. Another idea is to make a paper cutout of a Christmas tree, pin this on the wall and then select some of the better-looking Christmas cards and pin them on the tree in such a way that they form a decoration and look as if they're hanging on the tree and at the same time you can examine them and see them so much better.

Your tree should be stood in a container with water, otherwise it will shed its needles very quickly in the warm, dry air of the average living room. Some place the tree in a tub of moist sand... others in just a bucket of water which is cleverly camouflaged and usually hidden with the gifts that are put at the base of the tree.

I have often suggested twin Christmas trees, but it didn't occur to me to suggest more than that until I read an article in Sunset magazine with an illustration showing seven different-sized trees, converting, as they say, the living room into a "forest grove." Your living room may not

be large enough to put in more than one tree, but for those of you who do have the space and like this suggestion, it gives an interesting effect.

One effective way of decorating the tree is with lights of all one color, and if you have twin trees--one on each side of the fireplace--you might use one color of lights on one side and another color on the other. However, the old-fashioned way is to have a mixture of colors, and I think you'll find the children like this best.

Remember the Christmas trees of your childhood days . . . the ornaments you used to hang year after year, the thrill of getting out the familiar ones and then the pleasure of adding new ones? Remember, perhaps, the paper chains we used to make and the icicles we hung? Today we may still decorate our Christmas tree or may enjoy seeing our own children do the very same things that we did years ago. You probably taught your children how to string popcorn, perhaps putting a cranberry between each few grains of corn, or you have taught them how to make cutouts such as gold and silver stars for the tree. Maybe father has been working mysteriously at his bench in the basement or garage, making surprises for the decoration of the tree in some way, Many people have the custom of grouping figures at the base of the Christmas tree or on a table alongside, making what is known to the Pennsylvania Dutch as the "Putz." It is a land-scape of snow with the manger, the shepherds, camels and the wise men. Children love to make these groupings.

I haven't mentioned mistletoe, have I? Well, it doesn't need mentioning—it speaks for itself. Use it if you have it or can get it, hang it here and there—it's lots of fun.

For smaller packages, place atop them one of the tiny snow-sprinkled green Christmas trees that can be purchased at any five-and-dime store. A cluster of bright tree ornaments is also pretty, and tips of the evergreen boughs trimmed from your tree and gathered in a wide bow of red ribbon makes the most Christmasy present imaginable, and brings with it, too, the cheery aroma of Christmas.

These are only a few of the many decorative touches which can be added to your Yuletide wrappings. No matter how inexpensive your budget requires your gifts to be, these interesting and thoughtful trimmings will make your gifts ones to be singled out for special appreciation and remembrance.

And looking at them, the lucky recipient will breathe an admiring sigh and sav to himself, "Gee, next year I'm going to do my Christmas wrapping early!"
