I class it far and above the highly-touted "Theater Guild," "Lux," "Ford Theatre," and their glossy kind. My heart is grate-ful to Mr. Andrew Love, the producer, who, it would seem, has closed ms eyes to the "names," and cast his scripts liberally with those people in radio who rarely have the opportunity to show what they can do. The difference lies, I think, in the fact that he is willing and has the time to create good radio, searching for and working with the actor if necessary, instead of merely calling in a group that requires no more from a director than cues and cuts, and assembling the various components that please the sponsor.

It is little wonder that dramatic shows do not rank higher on the popularity lists. The radio listener is anything but the boob certain factions in the industry classify him. The same person who attends and enjoys the theatre, adult motion pictures, can certainly and does give time to listening to radio fare high in production and performance values, especially when it is uncluttered with personalities and the same familiar voices heard on any of a dozen other shows.

If Phil's Ever in a Jam

There Frankie Am. Because It's Been "Just a Perfect Friendship" Between Remley and Harris Since They Met as Kids on a Boat to Honolulu

OW, LET me cheat a couple of years on my age, can you?" whispers Frank Remley, the guitar player who has been Phil Harris's best friend so many years that he is now a radio character played by Elliott Lewis, mentioned regularly by Jack Benny, and considered a trademark in comedy.

Frank, the "man with three home towns," (Valley City and Fargo, North Dakota, and Moorehead, Minnesota), carefully states that his birth date was October 23, 1906.

One summer while he was still in high school, Frank and two other boys, Ernie Johnson and Ray Whisenand, made a trip to California. They found a room near Westlake Park and wrote flourishing letters home about their excellent jobs and financial opportunitiés. "But what we were really doing," Frank chuckles, "was bumming around the dance halls at Ocean Park and going to the beach. Spending all our money and having a wonderful time."

Ernie's folks sent him the cash to come home when the spree ended, but Frank and Ray were too humiliated to wire for help. They got up fifty dollars between them and decided to ride the rails; spent one dollar apiece to reach Pomona, and when a passenger train came along they jumped on the back.



In Barstow and Yermo, California; Salt Lake City; Livingston and Custer, Montana; and Manden, North Dakota; the police found the boys and threw them off freight and passenger trains with monotonous regularity. Frank and Ray carried their disappearing resources in their shoes, and begged potatoes, onions and bread along the way.

When they finally reached Valley City and tried to claim the clothes they'd sent on ahead of them, the boys looked so disreputable they had to get someone else to cash a check for them. The next day Frank went to the depot again, washed and presentable. "And who came up, hitting me for two bucks," he chortles, "but Slim, one of the hoboes we traveled with on the road."

Frank decided he was "crazy about California," and when he graduated he came back and got a job as a bookkeeper in a bank at Sixth and Main Streets in Los Angeles. "But they couldn't find me much," he admits, "because, even though I was left-handed, I'd always wanted to play a banjo. I'd started taking lessons, and I'd sneak off to the 'smoking room' to practice."

Meets Phil

Even though Frankie still couldn't play it very well, an agent "liked the looks" of the banjo, so he asked Frankie to take a small band to Honolulu. *That* was how Remley met Harris! Phil was on the same boat, with the first jazz orchestra ever to visit the island.

"I always liked to laugh at Phil, and he liked to have someone to laugh at him," reminisces Frankie about the beginning of their great friendship.

Before he made the trip, Frank had met a girl named Helen Hobart at a party. Frank had brought his banjo, played it, and "we went kind (Please Turn to Page 32)

He'll Never Sing the Blues, but Clark Has Hit the Top of the Heap With His Own Style

CAPITOL record, "Peg O' My Heart," featuring the romantic tenor voice of Clark Dennis, pulled that young man from relative obscur-

ity among the ranks into neck-andneck popularity with some of today's leading baritones. Or so legend would lead us to believe.

Insofar as the public is concerned, it is true the Irish lass, "Peg," did lead the singer of her praises into their hearts. But in the music world Clark Dennis has always been a hot item.

A Musician's Musician

Many other singers when asked during an interview whom they admire, or whose phrasing and style they particularly enjoy, promptly acclaim "Clark Dennis." And practically every step forward during his career has resulted from Clark being approached by the big-time outfits he has joined.



VETERAN of candid camera shots that he is, young Mr. Dennis, the minute he senses the popping of flashbulbs, seems to adopt an expression of near apprehension. The beauteous Miss Stalford here shares a score with Clark. The first break of this sort occurred when Clark, still quite young, had driven fifty miles to hear the old Ben Pollack crew. For several years Clark had been dabbling in music, first singing on WFDF in the old home town of Flint, Michigan, later on the West Coast with Raymond Paige and the late Orville Knapp's band. Clark had heard Pollack on the coast and thought he was great.

"I was back in Michigan, working for a spark plug outfit at the suggestion of my father, who thought anyone who got into the music world was out of his mind. His idea of the way to live meant starting in some outfit's stock room and twenty years later winding up as their president. So there I was, working in the stockroom of AC Spark Plugs.

"One day I picked up a newspaper and saw that Pollack was playing in Chicago, only fifty miles away. That night I 'borrowed' my father's car, picked up a gang of fellows and away we went. When I saw Pollack he wanted to kncw if I could still sing 'that good California style.' I sang a song with the band, and somehow found myself with another job, at the great salary of twentyfive bucks a week.

"When I got home next morning with my big news, no one was very happy. It seems that my father, who was a doctor, had a call in the middle of the night, and since I had his car, he had been forced to take a cab miles into the country to visit a patient. He took my old Ford jalopy and sold it to make up his enormous cab fare, and away I went to starve in Chicago on twenty-five a_week."

In Chicago Clark had his second opportunity to join another aggregation still listed among the greats. But when Clark tells the story, he's more concerned with its romantic aspect than with the fact it was another step forward.

Romance

"I had gone out to a club in Chicago to knock a few golf balls around, and ran into Jimmy Dorsey and the girl vocalist, Jane Vance, from the Whiteman band. That very afternoon I told Jimmy I was going to marry the girl. Dorsey told me I'd marry her over his dead body, then promptly warned Janie "Don't marry that guy, Janie, whatever you do. He's a tenor!"

But Jane Vance liked this appealing tenor voice. Not only did she immediately take an air check of Clark's singing and send it to her boss and good friend Paul Whiteman, she became Mrs. Dennis the following Christmas when she and Clark were touring with the King of Jazz. Paul Whiteman, a day after hearing Clark's air check, had contacted and hired him.

No less a personage than Sidney Strotz, now West Coast Vice President of the National Broadcasting Company, was the next to spot the Clark voice. This resulted in a two-(Please Turn to Page 32)

"I'm limited," he admits frankly. "One thing I've always tried to do is to keep only one role at a time. If I didn't, it would be just like hearing me on Wednesday, and then again on Saturday."

Probably no one will take more exception to these opinions than Jack's public, a breed vast and loyal to the spellbinding Webb voice and dramatic mannerisms. But, Jack adds:

"I look at it this way. Bogart didn't do so badly, did he? Why not build toward something? Now, everybody in this business has his attitude. Elliott Lewis has his. Paul Frees has his. So, I make an effort to be good at detective roles. When I say I'm limited, I mean 'straight voice' . . . heavies, cops once in

a while, bartenders and private eyes.

"No. I don't plan to stick with this idea forever. But I certainly won't try to pretend I can play any character or dialect or trick-voice thing you can name. Because too many times I've seen a new guy come in to work the show, and he looks nervous and he falls apart; and I look at his AFRA card and it says he plays everything from Ethiopians to Chinamen, straight down the line. So I don't think it makes you typed . . . unless you insist on being an Indian and won't play anything but Indians."

Man With a Plan

Jack has also been doing picture January 23, 1949

work, and has finished "Hollow Triumph" and "He Walked by Night." While on the "Night" set, he made a good friend of Police Sergeant Marty Wynn, one of the technical advisers on the picture.

"Why don't you do a real cop series some time?" Wynn wanted to know. "These private eye shows are a gag. The private eye today is just a peeper for the force. He's not licensed to handle cases, and even if he nails somebody he has to call in to us for help.

"You could get all the adventure and all the thrill and all the romance you have in a 'Regan' or 'Novak' in a genuine cop. And every man on the force would be tickled to death to have such a program." Wynn further promised Jack that if his idea could be developed, he could make available to him enough authentic police material to keep the program going for a number of years. "You know," Jack reflects, "it's not a half-bad suggestion, and we're working on it pretty hard."

Jack helped develop another good show this summer, which still might be in the "pending" stage. It was called "Escape with Music," and featured Jack as a character called "Joshua" who left his tiresome surroundings each day and traveled in imagination to adventure in every sort of locale. It was an excellently done little program, carried off well by Jack's low, flat delivery and the late Al Sack's picturesque melody, but with Al's untimely and regrettable death, negotiations came to an indecisive halt.

So, until these "tentatives" become reality, Jack is concentrating on more definite plans. From "Novak," "Modero" and "Regan," he next moves into video, with a character who might be called "Joe Friday." Bill Rousseau and Jack are working the show together now. Jack thinks that mysteries are best told on television by film at the present, for the sake of finished production. And he thinks that whodunits, no matter what they are, will have a long life on the home screen.

"As long as people like mysteries," he says, "you might as well give them what they want."

NBC's Alan Young teed off his series of Tuesday nighters (5:30, KFI) last week, with a mixture of delightful nonsense and . . . just nonsense. The weak spots in the scripting can be tightened up in time, and should be easy to forget if Alan goes along as he did in this first show's good spots.

Louise Erickson, formerly of "A Date With Judy," takes the femme role, with Jim Backus, Hal March and Ken Christy, all stalwarts of comedy, in supporting roles. Director Helen Mack's wonderfully light comedy di-rection brought out the best in all of them, particularly during the hilari-ous sketch that flashed back over Alan's early life. Young himself is much better at rambling patter than at delivering pat, contrived gags, and if that is apparent to listeners, it sure-ly will be to both the comedian and the production powers.

George Wyle's music was so good as to be scarcely noticed. Sadly enough for the poor orchestra leader, that is an excellent criterion of suitability. The "Regalaires," we think, sounded exactly like the other half dozen or so singing groups on the air, and their numbers served merely as interruptions in the show.

As far as we are concerned, the new program is happy listening, and our one hearing has already formed a Tuesday night habit. We will take care, however, to turn our attention elsewhere during commercials for sponsor Tums. Tums may be great for the stomach or what-have-you, but their touting is death on the ears. Even Alan Young's bright personality floating dialward can't negate any. thing that dull.

Frances Scully .

Early this month novelist-playwright John Marshall visited Frances Scully's "Star Gazing," heard over KECA four days each week (Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday) at 4:00 p.m.

We have heard a load of Frances's informal interviews with the stars and enjoyed them thoroughly. Knowing that John Marshall is a man who himself puts words in other people's mouths (his latest writings are a story and screen play written for Rosalind Russell, called "You Can't Judge a Lady"; and "The Beautiful Insect," a play he is polishing for fall produc-tion) we were eager to hear how he'd deliver lines into a mike.

On voice merit alone, Mr. Marshall is a wasted thespian. Seldom have

we heard more intriguing masculine tones.

But it is with regret that we report we have seldom heard lines more obvigusly *read.* Mr. Marshall's timing, emphasis, enunciation and interpretation were all perfect . . . too perfect. He read from his script, a good script, full of entertaining information, but it seems that a light session of chatter should come out as a light session of chatter, not like Laurence Olivier reading Lord Byron's pennings.

Even Miss Scully, whose sociability and off-mike font of interesting light chatter are both unlimited, could well throw away the rigid scripts while she's on the air. With her poise and experience, she doesn't need them.

School bells are ringing again, and not just for our children! Because there are thousands and thousands of us who desire further education. NBC last summer assumed the role of little red schoolhouse in launching a vast adult-education project.

Believing that the only solution to the public demand for further education and a general broadening of hori-zons must lie in taking higher edu-cation from the campuses into the homes of those desiring it, NBC and the University of Louisville experimented first with a literary series

built around the world's great novels and the "University Theatre" program -heard locally on KFI Sundays at 11:30 a.m. Listeners registered with the University for a home-study course which involved not only the network broadcast but also supplementary guidance broadcasts, assigned reading, regular reports, and an examination at the end of the course. Two kinds of certificates are awarded—one for students not interested in college credits, and the other, involving more concentrated study, for those desiring credits. Washington State College and

210

KHQ, Spokane, participated in this literature series, as did several other universities, and the results of the first experiments are now being studied by other schools.

The second phase of this ambitious project starts Saturday, February 5 (KFI, 4:30 p.m.), in cooperation with the University of Southern Califor-nia's College of Music. A seventeen-week concert series entitled "Pioneers of Music" presented by leading or-chestras throughout the nation will be the core of a home-study course in the evolution of music from 1600 to the present. Additional courses in the fields of economics, politics, and current affairs will be available later with other universities participating.

It is much too early yet to tell the degree of acceptance this plan will achieve, both from universities and from the public. However, such a vast project as this, of so frankly a publicservice nature, certainly deserves our

TV, home of the mighty one-man concert hall; and Richard Goggin of ABC, which offers another Test of the Town.

"The big problem facing all of these televisers is where to find for amateur programs a Simon-poor amateur who is content to remain Simon-poor. Too many of these mercenary jerks are forgetting the prestige of being seen in the best taverns, and are starting to ask for money!"

The participants in the television round table enjoyed Pat's quips as heartily as did the attending audience, but after general laughs all around, went on to make some very positive statements. At earlier Ad Club roundtable sessions among these same gen-tlemen, we have heard some tall hedging and generalizing, but not so the other day!

Hal Bock of KNBH came out flatfootedly with the statement that video is being hampered by the cost of tal-ent now, and that KNBH would take an aggressive lead to bring in new talent and fresh faces. (In our opin-ion, some of today's biggest established radio stars are wise in their refusal to let their AM shows be simultaneously televised. In most cases the show would be dull as dishwater, what with stark white scripts showing in every hand, lack of costume, and in many cases, lack of ability, more than enough to spoil the most cherished of illusions surrounding "our favorites.")

Klaus Landsberg of KTLA offered an equally lively discussion topic by announcing that video is ready to take the place of radio, and that KTLA is practically ready to inaugurate day-time fare. He added that film fare is much better than coaxial-cable transmission, and that the Coast's efforts at programming not only match the East's . . . they surpass them. KFI-TV's Haan Tyler stressed the need for shows that can go on without endless hours of rehearsal, and endless dol-lars entailed in paying technicians as a result. Too bad he didn't mention a recent KFI experiment. The station had chartered a phone service, pa-raded some talent, and just by way of checking to see how many people were interestedly viewing the show, asked for phone votes. Inside of two hours, 1,100 calls were recorded. That doesn't count the people who would dial the given number a couple of times, get a busy signal, and with a muttered "Oh, nuts!" give up trying.

Harry Witt of KTTV talked of the advantages of sharing ownership with a newspaper (L.A. Times). KLAC·TV's Don Forbes indicated that his station would continue to concentrate on sports. Well they might. They just concluded a pact with the Los An-geles Angels for their entire year's games. The station will revamp its entire schedule with the season's opening. A B C's Richard Goggin (KECA TV is not yet on the air) stated that five . a . week appearances are fatal to performers . . . that tele needs constant change.

year stint with Don McNeill's Breakfast Club, and contracts with Coca-Cola Refreshment Club and "Duffy's Tavern" followed.

"Peg" Bows In

It was a letter from the President of the United States himself that occasioned Clark's move into the Army. For two years he toured with an all-GI show, covering the entire Pacific area.

Upon his discharge in 1946 Clark dug back into radio, making guest appearances on network shows. Once more he was heard, liked and signed, by no less great and astute a singer than Johnny Mercer, who got the Dennis name on Capitol Records' dotted line. About this time "Peg O' My Heart" was cut, and the fancy of America's disc-buying public was captured.

And still Clark went on connecting with men in the business. This time it was the agency bigwigs who chose him, from a parade of singleshot guest vocalists, as a permanent member of "The Revere All-Star Revue," then heard on KHJ, and starring blonde Marion Hutton. When Marion joined another show, and the sponsor moved the Revere program to ABC with Jo Stafford as its star, they asked Mr. Dennis to continue on.

Clark manages to do frequent personal appearances and an air show, cut records, and still find time for treks far and wide to listen to his favorite musicians, because he has a tremendous vitality and a never-ending love of music. All music.

Dennis is as much a jazzman as he is a classicist. In one breath he'll praise Eileen Farrell's beautiful so prano voice, or Jan Peerce. In the next he'll rhapsodize over Louis Armstrong's guttural musical tones. His record collection ranges from McKinney's Cotton Pickers, the Mound City Blue Blowers and old Crosby Bobcats classics to the twelve-inch albums of Ravel, Debussy and Delius. In a big pop band Clark is equally satisfied by the sharp sing of a brass section and the lyric flow of the strings.

But with all that love and knowledge of music, and in spite of making the big time during an age of baritones, this singer (who has been termed by other musicians "such a good tenor that he makes you forget he's a tenor!") can never hope to sing his own favorite type of music.

Clark will state flatly, whether for publication or not, "Ethel Waters, in her prime, was the best singer of all people of all times. She said the words, made the sounds, and lent an animation as no one else can. Certainly no one today!

of nuts over each other," he explains. "She said she missed me when I went to Honolulu." They were married after he came home. "Stub" (Frank nicknamed her that "because she's so stubborn") has been Phil's secretary for fourteen years. She traveled right with the band, making hotel bookings and train reservations and handling Phil's mail and public relations, up to the time that the gang signed for the Benny show and settled in Hollywood. The Remleys have Frankie, Jr. (six and a half) now, "and brother, what a character!" exclaims his father. "He's a little dandy."

Frankie and Phil didn't meet again for several months after Honolulu, however. When the Remleys heard that Phil was coming to Loew's Theatre as a drummer with Glen Oswell's band, they got seats for the first show. "That must have been about 1925," Frank calculates. "I was with Don Alvin's orchestra at the Green Mill, I remember Phil came out there with a girl one night, and they entered a dancing contest. The prize was a big satin pillow, and we all clapped for Phil under our music stands and he won. You couldn't hold him after that ... he was convinced he was the world's greatest dancer."

In '26, Frankie and Phil had a chance to go to Australia with Carroll Lofner and Chuck Mall, as the only four Americans in an all-Australian band. The boys had agreed to furnish trio numbers, and as the boat came in sight of Sidney they suddenly remembered they hadn't even tried to sing together. Frankie had been in a trio once before, with Jess Kirkpatrick and Bernie Taliaferro, and with his "past experience" they organized five or six hasty little specialties.

"We were "The Melodious Three," he recalls. "Big shots. Phil looked like Baby Peggy, of course, in those days. We wore those tight suits and sang with megaphones and that 'over the shoulder' business.

"So we just knew we were going to kill everybody when we got back here," he continues. "But Phil went with Henry Halstead's band, and l couldn't, because Lew Ayres was playing banjo for them. So the trio broke up, and I went to work at Harry Miller's on Seventh Street."

Frankie played with Vincent Rose at the Montmartre, and with the bands of Jackie Taylor and Prof Moore for about six months. Then Phil came back to town, looking for a job. "And I'm not kidding . . . he was!" So Phil and Carroll Lofner (of the Australia excursion) became the Lofner-Harris partnership, hired Frankie again and went to Balboa. "By then, Phil was really singing!" enthuses Frankie.

Phil Makes Name

When Lofner and Harris split into two separate orchestras, Phil was booked at the St. Francis in San Francisco, and stayed there two and a half years. Phil was doing a lot of Bert Williams numbers and becoming very popular with them, and his next offer was from the Cocoanut Grove. For a full year Harris and his co-singer, Leah Ray, jammed the Grove every night, during the run of the Olympics. "That was where Phil really made a name for himself," believes Frankie.

Phil Harris and Company went into radio on NBC's "Melody Cruise" for Cutex, one of the first traveling air musicals. After that, Phil with Leah Ray made personal appearances for three months, but he was lonesome for Frankie. When he received Phil's wire, "Come on back and let's reorganize the band," Frankie loaded his bags into the car and made the trip from New York in five and a half days.

They were booked at the New Orleans Hotel when Jack Benny telephoned asking them to join the show in two weeks. "We took off for California," Frankie relates. "Oh man, were we a happy bunch of guys! Jack's always been my favorite comedian, you know. I used to go to the theater when I was a young fellow, just to sit there and laugh at him."

The Frank Remley gag began on the Benny show n e arly thirteen years ago, when Jack used to say something to Phil about "Frankie, your guitar player." When they built some lines around it and decided to make a "Remley" character part of Phil's own show, Frank himself requested that Elliott Lewis play the role. Frank and Phil have voices which are extremely similar: also, Frank read for the part, and by his own insistence. "wasn't good enough." Frank taught Elliott to play the guitar, too.

"And you know," he says elatedly, "he's left-handed, just like me!"

Anna Roosevelt Has Joined Her Famous Mother in Broadcasting Ideas on Just About Everything

NNA ROOSEVELT, who recently started a thrice-weekly daytime commentary with her mother, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, has her father's capacity for making converts of skeptics. This talent springs from several factors. One is her genuine warmth of personality. Another is that twinkling-eyed smile with which her father withered critics, and a third is her sincere desire to attain friendship with those who regard her askance.

Anna Roosevelt feels that there is no excuse for people getting off on the wrong foot. She is prone to decide that the fault is with her rather than the other party, and she is both quick and eager to clear up misunderstandings.

Anna, who usually does her portion of the "Eleanor and Anna Roosevelt" program from Hollywood, does not live in a never-never land in which she deludes herself into think-

ing that everybody is wild about her. Being a Roosevelt is too decisive an identity to produce such a phenomenon.

When she senses antagonism whatever the person's station in life, or in radio particularly—she makes it a point to get to know the individual better, and to reconcile the differences, if possible. Usually, it's possible, because the tension invariably is a product of the imagination.

She has revealed, in her short time on ABC, a willingness and a talent for seeing many sides of an issue. Her broadcasts to date have betrayed a very human, very intelligent person with a proper respect for the little things in life. She can discuss in the same breath, and with unquestionable sincerity, her views on the threatened return of short skirts and the dangers of continued discord in the United Nations.

ID SHE always want to be a comedienne? That's a logical lead-off question for Lucille Ball. Her answer — "Mmmm-hmmm!" Meaning, "more than anything."

"And it all springs from a feeling of inferiority," she asserts. "At the age of twelve or thirteen when an



adolescent is either too ugly, gangly or unhappy to make an impression or it doesn't come easily, he does or says something funny.... People laugh, and he feels more acceptable. That's the beginning." Though Lucille sounds autobiographical in making this statement, it is humanly impossible to imagine her being "ugly, gangly, unhappy." She's so sparkly in appearance, so forthright in personality that rather than attempt a description we'll just repeat the simple fact that she's as vivid and lovely as we've seen her in Technicolor movies.

Are comedians and comediennes different from other people? Lucille thinks they are, somewhat. "All comedians think in a fay way, to begin with. They're constantly striving for betterment. They never relax." Studying inflections, constant observation of people and "the timing department" ("think each line before you speak") are three primary rules that Lucille lays down for herself. "And it's one profession in which adversity pays off!" she adds.

Miss Misfortune

The star can take an authoritative stand on this. Her early career days were dogged with misfortune. Her

parents, Fred and Desiree Ball, engineer and concert pianist respectively, started their daughter at her music lessons when she was five, then enrolled her in the Chautauqua School of Music. At fifteen, Lucille entered the John Murray Anderson Dramatic School in New York. At the end of the first year she was told that she was wasting money, that she should apply her energies in some other field. She tried the musical stage, via the chorus in the third road company of "Rio Rita." She was fired from that and three ensuing chorus jobs before the shows were out of rehearsal. Her "first real job on Broadway" was jerking sodas in a drug store.

Things picked up for Lucille when a modeling job in a wholesale dress company led to her becoming a model for the exclusive couturier, Hattie Carnegie An automobile accident in Central Park put an end to thatand nearly put an end to Lucille. It was three years and eight months before she could walk again, reversing the doctor's prediction that it couldn't be done. Back to work, Lucille gained fame as a leading photographer's model and was featured in slick ads and billboards from coast to coast. Hollywood scouts brought her to the film capital and she was signed to a contract. She wired her family-mother, grandfather and sister-to join her in California. The next morning the studio dissolved its contract list. The family arrived in Hollywood to find Lucille an extra at Paramount.

A bit part in the movie "Roberta" changed her luck (as we recall it, Lucille merely modeled an evening gown and looked so enchanting that audiences sighed audibly). The bit led to a contract that led to her sparkling career and a happy marriage—she met her husband, Desi Arnaz, when both were cast in the movie "Too Many Girls."

"Stage Door" was her first goodsized comedy chance—"Eve Arden,

Jack Carson and I started out together in that." Lucille and Eve have had parallel careers, in a sense. Starting in "Stage Door," they both (at different times) appeared in radio with Jack Haley, Phil Baker and Groucho Marx shows, and at present both have comedy programs on CBS — as has the other RKO alumnus, Jack Carson.

Lucille picked "My Favorite Husband" as a radio vehicle because "It was the only husband and wife comedy where the people were in love with each other—my kind of love," she smiles. Though it's her first starring air series, she's been a notable radio guest throughout her career. She holds the record for repeat guestings on the Bing Crosby show. At this writing, she has either done or is committed to do three roles cn "Ford Theater" and four appearances with Bob Hope, in addition to her own program. She was happy to return to "Ford Theater" recently as star of Damon Runyon's story "The Big Street," a recreation of her favorite role from her favorite film. The heroine, you may recall, is a Broadway star who becomes a hopeless cripple—a grim echo of the fate that once awaited Lucille. The star and story were chosen by Walter Winchell as the inaugural broadcast for this season's Damon Runyon Cancer Fund, because it was Runyon's favorite.

In Love With Lessons

She enjoys activity, and in addition to her non-stop professional work she keeps up an unending program of lessons, study and hobbies. into home-life problems has registered so well with the housewives who comprise the vast majority of her listeners is the fact that she is able to draw heavily from her own experience as a mother.

Although one son, Curtis, has been in Europe with his grandmother, and a daughter, Sistie, is married, Anna has her hands full domestically with her youngest and most energetic charge, John Roosevelt Boettiger, nine years of bubbling, active boyhood.

That John is a healthy, vigorous unspoiled youngster is immediately evident. There is no trace of caste in his make-up. He is utterly unaware, in his association with other children, that he is a grandson of one of the country's most colorful presidents.

He enjoys the respect and cameraderie of the other boys in the Los Angeles neighborhood where his mother has rented a two-bedroom apartment alive with mementos inherited by Anna from her father. Johnny's friends are constantly streaming in and out of his apartment, giving Anna the same trials and tribulations, tinged with joy, that any other American mother experiences under a name less part of American legend than Roosevelt.

Scarcely a part-time parent, she is never too busy for Johnny. She eats as many meals a day with him as possible. She sends him off to school, prods him on his homework, goes to ball games and movies with him and his friends, and even digs into her purse for the wherewithal with which Johnny, like any other American kid, rushes to the newsstands in order to buy the latest comic books.

Basic Agreement

When Anna announced before the program got under way that differences of opinion with her mother would not be ruled out on the air, she meant just that. However, if anyone expects the differences to cut deeply and give comfort to divideand-conquerers, they have a disappointment in store. Anna has too great an affection and too deep a respect for her mother ever to produce such a bombshell.

Differences, although they may prove firm and real, will be ironed out calmly and adultly. There will not be even an intellectual approximation of hair-pulling. The chief reason is that fundamentally mother and daughter look at life through the same philosophical glasses.

Specific disagreements, however, have not been rare. Many a lusty argument has raged around the Roosevelt dinner table, and Anna, like the other Roosevelts, has a mind of her own. Even while agreeing, she might

prefer to do it in her own way and with her own reasons. On the air the former First Lady is prepared to feel the full impact of her daughter's mind and independence.

Anna's last protracted radio engagement was a six-week series for Best and Company on a New York station in 1933. Several mornings a week she commented on the woman's view of the news.

She did not appear on the air again until early this year when she participated in a discussion of free enterprise and socialism under the banner of "America's Town Meeting" in a broadcast from Phoenix.

Anna's remaining pedigree is mainly literary—with politics running second best. Before assuming the publishing reins of the Arizona Times, in Phoenix, Anna was the paper's associate editor.

Earlier, Anna was associate editor of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. She held down this job from December, 1936, until November, 1943. She wrote a weekly column for Liberty Magazine in 1933 and 1934, and while living in the White House during the same years she wrote two children's books, "Scamper" and "Scamper's Christmas." They are out of print now, but they were published—by Macmillan.

"They were written day by day in the White House," Anna said, "and they were passed on by my own children night by night, chapter by chapter. They gave to a young child of from five to seven a view of what was interesting in Washington through the eyes of a rabbit, Scamper."

Anna still was an editorial beaver in 1931 and 1932 when she edited a short-lived MacFadden publication, "Babies—Just Babies." This chore represented an earlier collaboration between mother and daughter. Mrs. Roosevelt was a contributing editor.

In politics, too, Anna's labors leaned toward the editorial side. In a year and a half during which FDR's only daughter did volunteer work at State Democratic headquarters in New York, she edited the monthly magazine of the women's division, "The Democratic Woman's Digest."

Her comments on food and fashions are not passed off as expert views, but as one woman's opinions. She is not finicky about what she eats or what she wears. She insists merely that both be neat and wholesome.

Among her most prized possessions



is the green upholstered swivel chair on which FDR used to sit in the second floor of the White House while writing his speeches.

This chair is now in Anna Roosevelt's study, and she sits on it—even as her father did—when she writes drafts of her radio scripts.

I have time to do," is her explanation. "I get wound up and do everything at once."

She admits, however, that it's her husband, Desi Arnaz, who grabs cooking honors in their home. "After a day's work, he can come home and spend four and a half hours in the kitchen cooking spaghetti and meat balls for a dinner party!"

Only drawback to the business of being a comedienne, Lucille reveals, is that people are apt to expect her to be the gaily amusing, anythingfor-a-laugh gal they've seen on the screen and heard on the air. When she senses that funny remarks and whimsical antics are expected from her as a matter of course, she grows very quiet. And with unsympathetic people, she just grows quieter ... and quieter ... and quieter ...
