



Kiss of Life

Lucky You If You Become a Winner of KFI-Bowl Auditions, for Chances Are You'll Scamper up Fame's High Ladder

*H*AVE YOU ever wondered what becomes of young vocalists and instrumentalists who win radio competitions? Whether they go on to bigger and better things, or whether they get lost by the wayside?

In looking over the list of winners of the "KFI-Hollywood Bowl Auditions" for past years, KFI was pleased to note that the great majority are climbing the ladder of

fame with alacrity.

Among the winners especially notable for their achievements are Olive Mae Beach, soprano, and Paulena Carter, pianist.

Olive Mae, a 1947 winner, is a graduate of Occidental College and has had the lead in Mozart's "Cosi fan tutti" which ran for three weeks at the Las Palmas Theatre. In 1948 she appeared in the Hollywood Bowl (July 29) as one of the two soprano soloists in Gustav Mahler's Eighth Symphony. Three "Standard Hour" guest appearances—two in May and one in June of 1948—and a thirteen-week show with NBC singing light opera were also on her agenda. In the fall of 1948 she went on tour with "Cosi fan tutti" and will make a movie of it this spring. During her interview, Miss Beach said "all the forthcoming radio work is a result of winning the KFI-Hollywood Bowl Auditions, I'm happy to say."

Paulena Carter, who won in 1944 when the winter series of the program was called the "Young Artists Competition," has played a return engagement at the Los Angeles Philharmonic; started her third season last fall with the Meredith Willson program; co-starred on the twenty-week "Stars of Tomorrow" series; guested five times on the "Standard Hour" last season and is scheduled for seven more performances this year. In addition she has made guest appearances on Paul Whiteman's "Radio Hall of Fame," the Sunday evening "Ford Hour," and the "Music Hour From Hollywood."

Other Instances

Even those winners who were still studying in school at the time of the competition have made definite progress, not only in furthering their

studies, but by concert performances and recitals as well. There's Lillian Magdow, brilliant pianist now in her freshman year at U.C.L.A. Lillian recently returned from New York, where she studied with Hoszowski. Jack Browning, who was only twelve years old when his piano virtuosity won acclaim, recently gave a recital with the Claremont Chamber Music Society. Jack is now attending Thomas Starr King Junior High School. Another U.C.L.A. student is Gilbert Reese, cellist. He gave a successful recital at the Long Beach Municipal Auditorium recently, and also appears this spring at Wilshire Ebell Theatre.

Other names you've no doubt noticed in the music reviews are: Robert Jamieson, cellist, now in his second season with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra under Alfred Wallenstein; Gloria Greene, who has given three piano recitals in Town Hall, New York, was soloist with William Steinberg and the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, and will play as soloist with the Kansas City Philharmonic Orchestra under Efrem Kurtz next season; Bill Shirley, whose lovely tenor voice was heard on KFI's "Ladies' Day," was in the original cast of the Broadway hit "Look Ma, I'm Dancin'," appeared on the Paul Whiteman Show "On Stage America," and is now under contract at one of the major film studios; Madaline Miller, concertizing around the East and Middle West with her eight-year-old daughter, who seems to have inherited her mother's lovely soprano voice; and John Arnold Ford, basso, whose rendition of Don Basilio in the "Barber of Seville" with the American Opera Company received outstanding

plaudits from major Los Angeles newspapers. Ford also appeared at the Hollywood Bowl in 1948 and now is a member of the San Francisco Opera Company.

A shining example of success in two fields simultaneously is soprano Phyllis Moffet. Phyllis, who has been Mrs. Brubaker for four years, combines the roles of wife and mother of a nine-week-old son with her singing. On the staff of the Inglewood Park Concerts, she also is soloist at the Hollywood Presbyterian Church, and recently was soprano soloist in the "Messiah" at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium.

Appearance of young people on "Hollywood Bowl Auditions" is like stepping into a doorway of oppor-



That Marvelous Miller

Marvin Miller Finds Time to Pursue Many Careers and Hobbies With Enthusiasm and Purpose—But One Item He Leaves Alone

AT ELEVEN o'clock one morning, Marvin Miller's phone rang. Ken Burton, producer of "The Railroad Hour," musical-comedy show on which Marvin is the announcer, was on the phone. "Can you do a French accent?" he asked.

"Yes," said Marvin, "I do a rather good . . ."

"Can you hit an E?" interrupted Burton.

"I don't sing," was the reply.

"Look," continued the producer, "there's no time for trouble—can you hit an E?"

"I can hit a C," Marvin offered.

"We don't have time to rearrange the music. Go over to the piano and find the E." Marvin did. "Now sing it." Marvin did! Early that evening, replacing the artist who had become indisposed earlier, he joined Gordon MacRae and Metropolitan Opera diva Rise Stevens in singing one of the leads in "The Cat and the Fiddle." His duet with Miss Stevens,

"The Night Was Made for Love," will remain a high point in the eventful Miller career.

One Exception

Marvin's radio creed, "I'll tackle anything except a Scandinavian accent," has paid off with a career of amazing versatility.

Not that Miller has anything against the Scandinavians—the accent is a very difficult, subtle and unusual one, and the actor-announcer claims to have never been around Scandinavians long enough to master its intricacies. He contents himself with myriad other abilities. As an announcer, you've heard him on "The Railroad Hour," the Louella Parsons show, the Jo Stafford show; as an actor you've heard him on practically every program emanating from Hollywood. He's made several movies, and his versatility has been displayed as a Japanese war-lord, a gangster, a blind pianist. If you read Script magazine, you undoubtedly see his Loaves and Fishes column, a guide to restaurants and fine eating

in Southern California. In last month's issue of the poetry magazine the American Bard, poet Marvin Miller was represented with a contribution. He is listed in the Biographical Dictionary of American Poets. In addition to all this activity, Marvin finds time to transcribe a poetry program of his own (not heard locally), emcee the Army's "Command Performance" program whenever he can, do several information broadcasts for Armed Forces Radio Service including the popular "American Heritage." Recently he has taken up carpentry as a hobby, and at this writing he is energetically building cabinets for his small son.

The Poet's Ear

Marvin waxes nearly poetical about his enthusiasms—from an interesting character portrayal to finishing a piece of his woodwork. It was his poet's ear that indirectly landed him on the air. While a student at Washington University in St. Louis he became interested in radio, so interested that when he heard an announcer mispronouncing "Samson et Delilah by Saynt Seens" he personally remonstrated with the station manager. He took a letter of recommendation from his debating coach to the station ("I bet that impressed them!" he laughs now) asking for an audition. As an announcer he was a flop, the station decided. On his way out the door, Marvin had the inspiration to say, "By the way, I do a one-man show." "Seeing how cheap this would be, they immediately became interested," he adds. The youngster lied his way into the writing of his program and received five dollars a week for his seven-character production. Originally ambitious to become an English pro-

Partner to 'The Voice'

HAVE you ever sat in the darkness of a movie house wondering why the voice of the star was so hauntingly familiar? There's a good chance you heard that very voice the Saturday night before on NBC's "Hit Parade," which features vocals by Frank Sinatra and honey-blonde, green-eyed Eileen Wilson.

Eileen, when she isn't happily rehearsing for her Saturday part in parading the top tunes polled during the previous week, or when she isn't busy at home experimenting on recipes and a new kitchen stove, puts in some grueling hours at the movie studios.

Her work is dubbing. The big names for whom she does the lovely vocalizing must remain a secret, and Eileen abides by the letter of the work contracts she signs. (She wouldn't even tell us!)

More Than Just Singing

"Dubbing" means more than simply watching a film track and making music in time to the moving jaws of the very beautiful (but not always musically talented) leading ladies of the silver screen. Every breath, every sibilant, must be expressed vocally exactly in time with the motion on-screen.

Sometimes the procedure is reversed. The song is sung and the actress follows the song with lip movement. "That's easier!" Eileen rejoices.

The fact that her contribution to movie musicals is carefully hidden is of no importance to Eileen. She is more pleased, each Saturday night, by the coast-to-coast announcement which states, "The 'Hit Parade,' starring Frank Sinatra and Eileen Wilson."

To most aspiring singers, the "Hit Parade" epitomizes the pinnacle of commercial success. To most fans, singing on the same show with Frankie epitomizes the pinnacle of everything. Eileen, too, admires Sinatra. "He's always been a favorite of mine, and it really is a thrill working with him."

But even without this appearance Eileen would be happy—just because she was singing.

"I love to sing any time, any place. Sometimes when Ray and I are driving along together we have to agree . . . 'Okay now, no more singing for a half hour.'"

Ray is vocalist Ray Kellogg, featured with the Les Brown band. Eileen, too, used to sing with this musical aggregation.

"Les is a wonderful person to work for, and a great friend. When the agency for the 'Hit Parade' first evinced interest in me, he hustled around and got up all the sound tracks and records I had made with his band. He sent them to the agency. I really believe Les was instrumental in my being chosen. It isn't every band leader who will cheerfully give

up a vocalist just to give her a break."

Classical Background

The musical career that has been capped by singing with one of the most popular bands and a featured spot on the nationally known and long-popular "Hit Parade" began about fifteen years ago. The first nine were taken up by rigorous piano study of a strictly classical nature. Lieutenant-Commander Eshelman, his wife, and daughter Eileen lived in San Diego at the time.

Upon her graduation from high school, Eileen entered UCLA. While still in university, she began taking vocal lessons from Art Wilson and auditioning for local radio stations. When she started singing professionally, the more difficult name of Eshelman was discarded professionally for the name of her vocal coach—Wilson.

"Miss Wilson" sang with Skitch Henderson, Will Osborne, Lou Brigg, Al Sack and Ray Herbeck before finishing school and joining Brown's band. The period spent with Les's group did more than launch Eileen onto the popular Lucky Strike show.

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

NBC Radio Institute

National Broadcasting Company and the University of California will cooperate for the eighth successive session this year in offering a Radio Institute.

Coincidental with this announcement came the presentation this week of a gift from the broadcasting company to the University in the form of a check for \$500, earmarked for two scholarships of \$250 each to U.C.L.A. undergraduate students interested in studying radio and theater arts.

Presentation of the scholarship gift was made by Jennings Pierce, director of public service and station relations for NBC to Provost Clarence A. Dykstra for the University. The gift brings the total number of scholarships offered by the broadcasting company to fourteen.

The 1949 Institute, with all classes accredited by the University, will be held from June 2 to July 30 in classrooms located at National Broadcasting Company headquarters in Hollywood. Advance enrollment will be accepted at U.C.L.A. after May 15 through University Extension, and is limited to persons having four years of college training or one year of commercial experience or educational experience in a radio station.

The not-so-wonderful part of Henry's show involved guest-star-sponsor Fred Allen. Morgan's comedy requires a straight man, not another comedian. We wouldn't be surprised if this time, though, Henry became a gallumphing commercial success. His newness has worn off, audiences know what to expect of him. All he needs is a sponsor and a band that can cue his act.

Steve Allen

Wouldn't it be funny if CBS discovered the top comedy star of the decade right in their own stable, so to speak? And if it turned out that they had this prize parked on the bench throughout all the stewing, stealing and signing of the past year? We're thinking about Steve Allen and his "Breaking All Records," KNX at midnight, Monday through Saturday. Anybody who'd stay up until midnight to listen to a comedian must be crazy. That's probably what Allen figures, so his hour is a fast, funny, ad-lib performance with no worries about "Will this be over their heads?" "Will the sponsor like it?" "Is the show going to run long," etc. If he feels like interviewing a guest star for one solid hour, he does. And the interview usually turns out to be a very meaty one in which you actually learn something about the personality. Recently we heard Steve interview Benny Goodman and Hoagy Carmichael. Goodman is a fascinating personality, but a difficult one to capture via the interview—we know, we once tried for three weeks to make him say more than "yes" or "no" to our questions. Steve presented Goodman as the charming, intelligent artist he is. Hoagy, who is no problem interview-wise, sat down at the piano and played, sang and ad-libbed a delightful musical session. That's a lot of talent to wheedle into performing between twelve and one o'clock in the morning on a sustaining show!

The half-hour comedy-variety program that Steve had on CBS last season seemed to us to be a very promising entrant into the big-time comedy race. His midnight show is even better. What sounds like a good-sized studio audience is on hand each night. This is a phenomenon in radio as far as we know. Since the program has been on the air, people have started dropping in at that late hour just in order to watch Steve. The dropper-inners have reached such a number that sometimes the show moves into an audience studio. Steve still plays records, reads the mail and foils with the piano, but it's his own humor that makes the show unusual.

If you're bothered by insomnia, don't just lie there and suffer. Tune in on Steve Allen, and at least enjoy yourself!

Dr. Louis T. Talbot

Spirited is the beginning of the broadcast heralding Dr. Talbot week-day mornings at 10 o'clock over KFVD. An enthusiastic choir launches the broadcast by singing "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations." Other musical numbers feature the exceptionally fine Bible Institute male quartet in standard selections.

Dr. Talbot, president of the Institute, devotes the latter half of his thirty minutes to a verse-by-verse reading and interpretation of the Bible.

Listeners are supposed to follow his Scripture analysis with Book in hand. Obviously accustomed to addressing audiences without aid of script, Dr. Talbot speaks in tones which are stentorian but authoritative, dogmatic but compelling.

It is too bad, but it seems that even a religious program has to embrace a plug of some sort. In the case of this program, it wasn't a desert lot or a pressure cooker that had to be sold the other day, but an audience on the notion of sending in fan mail. Several minutes devoted to an appeal for such mail paid off handsomely, we hope. From what we have heard, those who are interested in this daily Bible study are extremely devoted and should not hang back waiting for someone to beg them for literal approval.

"The Judge Speaks"

Judge Ida May Adams, who happens to be the Judge Speaking on this weekly (Tuesday, 9:00 a.m.) KGfJ public-interest feature, sounds like an erudite Lulu McConnell graduated cum laude from law school. Her delivery smacks of the same earthiness, and though Judge Adams noticeably reads her scripts (she pauses to turn pages) her opinions are meaty, to the point, and indicative of thought in preparing and coordinating material.

The other morning when devoting her quarter hour to safe driving, Judge Adams threw out some interesting facts. Out of fifty-two persons sampled by a recent test (and these were not persons cited for traffic violations) only one "pressed the clutch pedal down" as he should when starting the car. She told of the case of a small schoolchild who escaped serious injury because the driver in front of whose car the little girl darted was alert and had good brakes. She warned that if a brake pedal could be pressed within two inches of the floor, the brakes needed adjustment. She added that each car, like an individual, has a personality all its own, and hence Judge Adams advised against indiscriminate driving of others' cars.

As efficiently as the garage man, the jurist tackled the whims and vagaries of valve caps and tire pressure. It seemed rather odd at first to hear her discuss such matters, but on second thought we decided that any woman smart enough to wade around in habeas corpus and non sequiturs has a perfect right to discuss the innards of an automobile. Or anything else she wants to, for our moola.

"Hometown Jamboree"

The title of this show gave us the definite impression that we were to hear an interview program featuring folks from "back home" now happily transplanted to Pasadena. But when "Hometown Jamboree" came swinging onto KXLA's dial at 11:30 (it's on Monday through Friday) there was Cliffie Stone with a pack of folk and Western music. It sounded good—that accordion bouncing and that fiddle snapping. The show virtually breezed onto the airwaves and across the dial.

Conducted along the informal lines of such programs, "Hometown Jamboree" parades a variety of talent like Merle Travis, Bucky Buckshot ("five feet standin' on her toes"), Tennessee Ernie, Eddie Kirk and several others. Cliffie does most of the talkin' but Ernie actually plays "heavy," and drawls so well he sounds amazingly like "Abner" of "Lum and." His little backwoods chit-chat comes straight off the cob, but his singin' is real he-man stuff.

To you who go for this type of entertainment we recommend "Hometown Jamboree." It is a good before-lunch pickmeup.

... To Marian Jordan, whose "Molly McGee" is as gay and bright as the very first time we ever heard her. She retains an unaffected charm in doing the characterization all these years. It must be real!

... That "Tallulah" suit that Tallulah is bringing against NBC, CBS and the soap company that proclaimed "... take me home and squeeze me" in conjunction with the actress's unusual first name.

... That salad-dressing singing commercial that hasn't had a note or a word changed for at least a year. Have a heart, fellas!

... The shows that change time without letting us know about it. Radio and TV Life readers who depend on our logs get very distraught!

... The stars who treat their press

agents as messenger boys (or girls). It makes them both look foolish.

... That "Lora Lawton" seems to have popped out of the frying pan into the fire. Can't she have any pleasant experiences?

"Feature Page"

Part of the fun in tuning programs with impressive titles is to see whether or not the shows live up to what you'd expect from their names. We imagined that KWIK's "Feature Page" (9:30 a.m. Monday through Friday) would be a Nesbitt-passing-parade type of thing, but lo and behold, it was recorded music—Shep Fields in numbers like "Blue Champagne" and "I Guess I'll Have to Dream the Rest." After each record, the announcer tossed off an amusing little human-interest item about a trash collector, or a husband leaving his wife a tip after eating breakfast, and then it finally dawned on us that this was the "feature" part of the title. Only we would have liked it better had the little items been chunked together, thus allowing listeners to be swept along with the mood of the music.

This matter of mood, we insist, is important. We think "the little woman" is more responsive to it than she realizes. When the music is so-so and dull, she probably drags around, listlessly wielding the broom. It switches to gay or even martial strains and she sloshes clippety bang through the dishes. It segues into dreamy stuff, and if she's like a lot of ladies we know, Mrs. Homemaker grits her teeth and tackles some ugly, thankless job like cleaning the greasy kitchen stove. That's why announcers who arrange platter programs should establish a musical mood and let well enough alone for a few minutes. When they interrupt with palaver, they upset milady's emotional pattern, leaving her undecided whether to shake the throw rugs vigorously or fall into a small slump until matters at the turntables settle down again.

Cathy Lewis Back

Cathy Lewis, delightful actress wife of Elliott Lewis, is back on the air after her bout with ill health. During the past few weeks, Cathy has been doing supporting roles on two or three Hollywood dramatic shows, watched closely by her doctor, who prescribes work but no overwork.

The actress is also busily disproving that radio actresses are a competitive, "catty" lot. To give her confidence and to back her up should she find herself unable to go on, Cathy has had three of radio's top actresses separately or simultaneously sitting by. Unasked, Lurene Tuttle, Jeanette Nolan and Shirley Mitchell drift in, chat during rehearsal, wait through the broadcast and then go out with Cathy for coffee. "Believe me," Cathy says positively, "the story that actresses get in each other's hair is just a myth!"

Hopper on Video

Hedda Hopper and NBC announced this weekend that the actress-columnist will star in a new series of television programs featuring Hollywood's greatest entertainers. The show will originate in Hollywood, and will be released over the entire national NBC-TV network. The starting date of Hedda's chatter and patter will be announced later.

Shower-Takers Create Dirty Pictures

KFI-TV sent out a very interesting release that explains the once-in-a-while "jumpy" picture viewers endure.

It seems that the cleanliness habits of the bathtub brigade of Los Angeles residents who make a daily trek to the tube for late-afternoon ablutions have created problems for KFI-TV's engineering staff.

Late in the afternoon, during the peak periods of electrical power use, the local power sources throw an extra electrical impulse affecting the cycle of current into homes equipped with electric water heaters. This minimizes the use of electric power by those heaters during the hours of peak loads when Los Angeles workers are on their way home. Power use by transportation facilities reaches its peak at this time of day.

The change in cycle of current has caused a "jumpy" picture on Channel 9 at this time, necessitating rectifiers to be installed in the television equipment. Or, as more clearly stated by the KFI-TV engineering staff:

"At 4:30 p.m. for a period of thirty seconds, the sine wave of the electrical power circuits, as shown on our oscilloscope, indicated that a second frequency of 720 cycles had been superimposed thereon. We found that this materially affected the lock-in circuit of our pulse synchronizing generator, in that it tried to follow the slight change of phase which was caused by the superimposition, thus affecting the timing of the sweep circuits in the various cameras and equipment with the result that the television picture would oscillate during the thirty-second period. The difficulty was overcome by the installation of a low-pass filter, thereby isolating our lock-in circuits from the superimposed frequency."

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

Teleforum

Each Thursday night, KTLA (Channel 5) presents what is called the "Teleforum." Every week, experts on each side of an important controversial question of state, national, international, political or sociological import discuss informally the question of the night. Now entering its second year on KTLA, the show has been moderated by Freeman Lusk since its inception. Mr. Lusk handles Public Relations for the Board of Education.

Typical of the fine minds this popular show brings to viewers weekly was the show of two weeks ago. Feeling that World Government Week, then being observed throughout the nation, brought into focus many important issues facing the United Nations and other organizations devoted to achieving world peace, the question "Is the World Ready for World Government?" was posed.

With the same ultimate aim of world peace, but with divergent methods in achieving it, two outstanding organizations were presented. The United World Federalists, proponents of immediate adoption of world government, were represented by Los Angeles attorney Ralph G. Lindstrom and Dr. Leo Doyle of Berkeley.

Supporters of the United Nations plan and members of the American Association for the United Nations were Dr. Robert Neumann of the Department of Political Science at U.C.-L.A. and Professor John Ervin of the U.S.C. Law School.

The academic connotation of all those titles might have led a viewer to expect something pretty pedantic—until he saw these smart men warm up to their side of the issue.

It was a lively discussion that the most casual of laymen could grasp. More than that, this sort of discussion is one of the most hoped-for forms of entertainment. Radio has done such a job—often and well, and it is most heartening to see the still-young medium of television bring a parallel to viewers' screens.

It isn't surprising that "Teleforum" now has about seventy-five per cent of the television audience in Southern California each Thursday night, nor that because of audience insistence the program was extended a few months ago from its original half-hour to one full hour. Many viewers hold "Teleforum Parties" for their friends and neighbors, and continue the discussion themselves after the televised hour with Freeman Lusk.



tunity, like parading in a brightly spotlighted showcase or testing out on the sounding board for tomorrow's concert great. But an appearance also involves prodigious work. It takes an instrumentalist anywhere from three months to a year to learn a concerto. It takes a vocalist endless seasons to acquire sufficient technique to sing the heavy arias from grand opera. The preliminary rehearsal with Sample and the orchestra amounts to at least five hours for a ten- to twelve-minute air performance. Even the judges spend literally hundreds of hours each season to hear the 800 or more applicants and to sift the semi-finalists, finalists, and ultimate winners.

And the work on Sample's side? Fifty to 100 man-hours weekly to make the orchestral arrangements, copy them, and otherwise knead the program into highly presentable shape.

Miller has several unusual claims to fame. His favorite boxer, Umbra, is the only dog on a sound-effect record with name credit on the label—a sound man admired Umbra's bark, recorded it for posterity, and Marvin saw to it that his pet received proper recognition. Marvin is also the fortunate possessor of one of the most unusual and most devoted fans in radio. This fan, wife of a Montana rancher, sent the Millers wonderful cuts of steak and churned butter throughout the war-time shortage period. DIALAGNOSIS

Program Views and Reviews from the Tenth District P.-T.A.

By JUNE D. PRAY

"The outstanding group of its kind in the country"—so says Gertrude Broderick, U. S. Office of Education radio specialist, concerning our Los Angeles Tenth District Radio Division. Due largely to the dynamic leadership of Mrs. Clara S. Logan, Radio Chairman for the past five years, we have attained a position as the foremost in our field, and we think more people should know how we have achieved it.

Our monthly meetings are addressed by speakers well-known in radio, so that our activities will be soundly based on knowledge of our subject. A recent guest, for example, was Joseph Brenner of the Federal Communications Commission. During the meetings specific programs are discussed and evaluated, and four programs each month are selected to receive our special promotion. Two or three times a year we publish "Good Listening"—over 200 radio and television programs recommended by us for family listening—for which we receive requests for copies from all over the country. We make annual awards to outstanding programs for children and for family listening which are enthusiastically received and usually broadcast on the programs. Through the cooperation of Radio and Television Life, we conduct this weekly radio column, "Dialagnosis."

So much for our regular activities. In addition, we have taken on some really big chores. We conducted a survey among 314 pediatricians, sociologists, psychologists, and neuro-psychiatrists to determine exactly

what effect crime shows had on juvenile listeners. The results (ninety per cent of the experts said such programs had a detrimental psychological effect) received national publicity and were released by Associated Press to newspapers throughout the country. Last January, with the kind cooperation of KFI, we broadcast a half-hour documentary program on the results of this same survey, and we are receiving requests for transcriptions from all over the country. From time to time we have been instrumental in keeping good programs on the air and in removing harmful ones. At least partly because of our efforts, KFI adopted its policy of no crime shows before 9:00 p.m. We have had articles in national magazines, and our chairman has acquired a reputation as an able speaker on the subject of children's radio. Last month Mrs. Logan addressed the Western Radio Conference—the first time a listener has ever been invited to do so.

We are proud of our accomplishments and national recognition, but they have been earned by hard work, thorough study, and a determination to make our views respected and effective.

(These always call for MORE)

2½ cup mayonnaise
¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper
1½ teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1 tablespoon grated onion
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
½ cups cooked rice
2 cups drained flaked salmon
Dry bread crumbs, or rolled dry cereal flakes.

Combine mayonnaise and seasonings in a bowl. Add rice and salmon. Mix with a fork and let stand about 5 minutes, to blend well. Shape into round, oblong croquettes, roll in crumbs, and place on a cookie sheet, covered with brown paper. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes, or until nice and brown.

These may be made in the morning and placed in refrigerator until time to bake, which makes them that much better.

Gentleman of Fortune

Is No Cliche When Applied to Dynamic Stacy Harris, Alias "Special Agent Jim Taylor" of ABC's "This Is Your F. B. I."

AT RISK of being extravagant, we should like to claim that Stacy Harris is one of the most fascinating men alive.

"This Is Your F.B.I.'s" star was reading "No Place to Hide" (David Bradley's frightening account of the chain reactions from the Bikini atom tests) when we located him in the Derby. As he snapped his book shut, he pointed to the title: "That really says it," he confirmed, "No Place to Hide."

The man is not a cynic. Just experienced. When you ask Stacy to tell you, however, about being a fighting member of the French Foreign Legion, an ambulance pilot and "Hell Driver" in the rugged El Alamein and North African campaigns, and a recipient of the Croix de Guerre, he changes the subject with something like: "Did you have a nice Christmas?"

There is a forceful reason for this attitude. "Look," Stacy explains, "someone writes a story about you and your troubles in the wars, and sooner or later it gets to a buddy of yours or a guy you cared something about in the service. So he writes you a letter, wanting to know 'What's the matter, pal? Do you have to trade on this? Haven't you got anything else to talk about—a little talent, maybe?' And no amount of publicity in the world is worth getting that letter."

But Anyway

Stacy was with the British Eighth Army all the way, driving an ambulance, reconnaissance car and motorcycle courier for the French Foreign Legion. He learned to speak fluent Arabic on the trip, by swapping languages with an Egyptian orderly who wanted to know English. Stacy also speaks a little German, some Spanish, French and Italian. He has been around the world twice, and into every major country except Russia. A slight hindrance to all this travel has been the fact that he possesses no home town for passport reference—he was born in a lumber

settlement called Big Timber, in Quebec, Canada, and two years later the entire town packed up and moved away.

Stacy has been exposed to the theater all his life. His father, David Stanley Harris, was a great Shakespearean in his day; his uncle, Leland Stanford, is famed for playing "Douglas" to Raymond Massey's "Lincoln." Whenever Stacy "needed a buck," as he carelessly puts it, he got a job with a tent or radio show, which is how he happened to play "Jack Armstrong, the All-American Boy" in Chicago for a year.

Stacy went to the University of Washington, however, to study forestry, and he worked as a timber cruiser while he was in school. He also liked to box, and he reached the semi-finals of the "Golden Gloves" tournament in the lightweight division. When he left college, he joined the Seattle Post-Intelligencer as a sketch artist. "You've seen those 'artist's conceptions of the crash (or murder)' when the paper didn't have an actual photograph?" he asks. Eventually Stacy had to write a story to accompany one of his drawings, and this established him as a report-

er. He has also worked on the San Francisco Chronicle as a police reporter, and on the New Orleans Times-Picayune as a legman.

Cruising the Continent

He went to China, when he was still quite a kid, as a Black Gang laborer on a boat out of Seattle. He skipped ship to stay in Hong Kong a while, and caught a boat back to San Francisco. In 1939 Stacy tried Randolph Field, but he flunked out as a flier. So, as a wiper, he shipped out of Mobile for England, got his lifeboat ticket and came home as an able-bodied seaman, after wandering around through France.

He wanted to join the Canadian Air Force, but the U. S. passed its law forbidding service to a foreign power; so Stacy visited the American Volunteer Group and was sent to Syria as an ambulance driver. After reaching a horror-saturation point, where he admits he was about to find a corner "and count his marbles," Stacy transferred to the French Legion. He was eventually invalidated and returned to New York.

Tagged by "F.B.I."

There he met "This Is Your F.B.I.'s" producer, Jerry Devine, who was then doing a show for the Army called "Homecoming." Stacy was called for a few parts on the series, and soon after "F.B.I." was launched Devine chose him to play "Special Agent Jim Taylor." Stacy is frankly quite sentimental about both the show and the role. He journeyed to Washington, in fact, to spend two weeks in the F.B.I. Center and gain a real perspective of the law's crime operations as related to the program.

Stacy, Jerry Devine and "F.B.I." announcer Larry Keating are fast friends and shipmates. Keating has a yawl called the "Bayodere" (Indian for "Dancing Girl"), and the three of them recently had something of a

I HAVE just listened in for the first time to your Spelling Bee, and it took me back to the little old schoolhouse up in the northeastern Washington woods, to the night when my mother and seven of her brood of ten (including me) spelled down the adjoining community at the Saturday Night Literary Society. I'd like very much to try it again . . .

This letter, typical of hundreds received every week by Ben Alexander, emcee of the new Monday night version of "The Spelling Bee," earned Mrs. Irene Stanley, the writer, an opportunity to be one of eight contestants on the show.

"Mrs. Stanley's letter is to me another bit of evidence that Americans were brought up on spelling bees," Ben commented. "Spelling bees are

a traditional form of entertainment, just as much fun today as they were 150 years ago. Foreign visitors have remarked how extraordinarily interested in their language Americans are. This program proves it. People from every walk of life have appeared on our broadcast—young and old, rich and poor—school-teachers, students, doctors, window-dressers, stenographers, authors, bakers, life-

guards, lawyers. They all love to spell, love a good old-fashioned spelling bee."

Mrs. Stanley's voice was vibrant with excitement as she faced the microphone in the first round of "The Spelling Bee." In his interview Ben found her to be a writer of "perfectly harmless poetry." Her easy "warm-up" word to spell was "minimum." Nothing to it. Mrs. Stanley breezed through succeeding rounds spelling "rostrum" and "possession" without faltering.

And then came round four, the championship round in which everyone left standing spells until a winner is found: The word theme was "flowers." Mrs. Stanley spelled "fuchsia" and "cyclamen" correctly. But just when it began to look as though she might get into the big money, Ben fired the word "chrysanthemum" at her.

"C . . . ah . . . unh . . ." Mrs. Stanley began unsurely, and then swiftly, " . . . r-y-s-a-n-t-h-e-m-u-m. Chrysanthemum."

No Disgrace

"Now I want you to understand," Ben tells contestants before the show, "that being unable to spell a word is no disgrace. Some people never misspell a word when they're writing, but just let them try to spell it aloud and they stumble all over themselves. On top of that let them try to spell it right here on the stage of NBC's Studio E in front of an audience of 300 spellers and see how they make out. So don't feel bad if you're spelled down. Either you know how to spell the word you're given or you don't. And nobody knows how to spell all the words in the dictionary. Remember, 'The Spelling Bee' is a game. So come on and spell your best! Let's have fun!"

Word lists used on the program are gleaned from hundreds sent in each week by enthusiastic listeners. Each list much center on some theme or subject. Strangely enough, most lists are built around the same subjects. Some weeks as many as a

fourth of the lists received are concerned with medicine, diseases, or anatomy. "Flowers," "food," and "legal terms" are popular subjects. Anybody who submits a really clever list with an original theme has a very good chance of winning ten dollars.

Some wide-awake contributors send in lists of great timeliness. "A Prince Is Born" was used the Monday night following the birth of England's Prince Charles. "Christmas Gifts for the Entire Family" and "New Years Resolutions" were heard on appropriate broadcasts.

Good List

"Rascals" was the theme of one of the most interesting lists of all, sent in by Mildred E. Mast of Los Angeles. When Ben was checking these words in his big dictionary, he noticed that while all had similar meanings, and though all are perfectly good English, they had each come to us from a different language. "Scalawag" is a word of Scottish descent. "Hooligan" is a loan from the Irish. "Assassin" comes from the Arabic, "rapsallion" from the French, "blackguard" is English, "renegade"—Spanish, "charlatan" and "mountebank" are derived from Italian words.

"Americans are naturally word-conscious," Ben Alexander says. "They buy millions of dictionaries and other word books. Practically every big newspaper and magazine runs a column on words—how to spell them, how to use them. I think Americans are so preoccupied with words because English was a new tongue to most of their forefathers."

No exception when it comes to word-consciousness, Ben constantly

consults his big dictionary when the program is in rehearsal. "We can't be too careful," Ben says. "People completely trust the accuracy of radio programs, and I for one don't want to let them down."

As the program continues on the air, better and better spellers are attracted to try their skill. Consequently, words used must become harder and harder. To prove how hard it is to keep ahead of the people he quizzes, Ben likes to tell of the night when . . .

"We were in the fourth round. The theme was 'trees.' I always include a brief definition together with the word I give a contestant. This time, for variety, I decided to give the definition first. 'In Latin,' I said, 'this tree's name means *tree of life*.' Quick as a wink the little lady who faced me across the microphone shot back, 'Arborvitae, a-r-b-o-r-v-i-t-a-e, arborvitae.' She spelled the word

Red Nichols

Ace Jazz Musician Red Nichols Lends His Talent to Two Top Radio Groups, Plays His Own Kind of Music Nights

IF YOU'VE ever bent a happy ear to the mellow second trumpet that decorates Al Jolson-Lou Bring musical numbers on "Kraft Music Hall," you'll be interested in meeting the man responsible. He's Loring "Red" Nichols, famed for more than twenty years as one of the country's top jazz musicians and leader of the "Five Pennies," hot recording group that made disc history.

Nichols is something of a paradox, insofar as radio is concerned. He's one of the best-known musicians in the country, yet on his two radio jobs, "Kraft" and the Bing Crosby

show, he's practically anonymous. He's not alone in this—many of the names revered by record collectors and dealt with in the serious pages of books on music are in the same boat.

Six nights a week, however, Red sheds the anonymity for his own particular fame when he leads a reorganized "Five Pennies" group at a local night spot. Here, you'll find Red presiding over the lovers of his brand of hot music—record collectors, college students writing their thesis on "Jazz—American Art Form," middle-agers recapturing the days of the twenties when the "Five Pennies" were at the height of their fame, and just plain fans. Some of the folks, the "flappers" and "sheiks" of the twenties, seeing Nichols in the cold light of 1949, can hardly believe that the youthful-looking musician on the stand is the same guy. Time, that selfish demon, has practically stood still for Red. "I'm forty-three," he grins, "and I started playing in 1922." By 1923, Red was recording with groups known as the Redheads, the Black Aces. Some of his early records are on those thick Edison discs, playable only on antique phonographs. No wonder collectors

are surprised to find that Red looks so young.

The list of bands with which Nichols has played would fill a page, but a few of the early ones were the California Ramblers, Vincent Lopez, Ray Miller, Harry Reser, Paul Whiteman and Don Voorhees. The original "Five Pennies," formed in 1925 for the old Brunswick label, consisted of Jimmy Dorsey, Joe Venuti, Eddie Lang, Arthur Schutt and Vic Berton. They made enough records to stock a music store. Red, pressed to name his favorites, lists, "I Got the Heebie Jeebies," "Everybody Loves My Baby" and "Back Home Again in Indiana." Some of these early collector's items now fetch about twenty dollars apiece, and Red himself has been unable to get his "Heebie Jeebies" record. He has saved few of the discs on which he was featured. "I wasn't too satisfied—and there were other boys I liked better," he states. (For the benefit of interested jazz collectors, those "other boys" are Bix Beiderbecke, Bunny Berigan, Louis Armstrong, Andy Secrest, Jimmy McPartland.)

Music Reborn

In the past ten years, the public's interest in jazz has been rekindled to the height that was reached in the days of the musical twenties. Books have been written, movies made, and college courses devoted to the subject. Jazz musicians have been heard in concert at Carnegie Hall, the Philharmonic and Museums of Modern Art. Classical composers have endeavored (quite unsuccessfully) to incorporate the jazz man's musical forms into concert works. To Red Nichols and all other authentic jazz men, this appreciation is belated but very welcome. Red thinks the publicity has been a help in repopularizing the art, but more than that he feels that a musical cycle has been completed, that the public has naturally returned to an appreciation of the original form.

He doesn't like the academic manner with which many of the writers and aficionados have dealt with the subject. He objects to the categorization of music into New Orleans, Chicago, Kansas City, etc. "Whether a man's from New Orleans, Kansas City, or Ogden, Utah, doesn't matter—he either plays it or he doesn't," he insists. In referring to the reams of writing done by reporters, music critics and authors on the subject of jazz, Red smiles, "A writer can go crazy on a typewriter just like a musician can on a horn."

Sole bit of advice that Red passes on about the jazz art is to "listen to the sound and decide whether it's mechanical or coming from the musician's heart—you can tell the difference. The guide to good jazz is simplicity—that goes for anything that's in good taste. Melody should be the dominant factor. The melodic line and the steady beat should always be present in the music." As for be-bop, Red sighs, "I don't know

of Public Affairs, Stuart Novins, looking at the job as a lively challenge.

Keep It Simple

"Creating listener interest in a reporting job isn't easy. The drama is there, all right . . . plenty of it beneath the surface of a local community's affairs. Deciding *what* material to use poses the definite problem of selection. It's the same problem faced in making up a newscast.

"Keeping the story simple is another of the biggest factors. Unless a listener can identify himself or his problems with what he is hearing in a script, you'll never get an idea across.

"For instance, something happened recently that takes in the whole story of getting up an 'L. A. Story.' I was driving home to the Valley one night about 6:30, listening, as I drove, to the different newscasters."

"All of a sudden I heard this flash . . . from CBS, incidentally," Stuart grins . . . "about the imminent citrus freeze.

"A citrus freeze, naturally, would have a definite effect upon the consumer, hence would be of interest to him. And the freeze is of local interest. So I decided to drive out to the citrus belt and have a look at what was going on in the way of preventative measures.

"I chose an average home, surrounded by fifty or so acres of lem-

ons, and went in to introduce myself. I have generally found that once people realize you aren't there to gloat over their misfortune they are extremely cooperative in giving information or relating their problems.

"The particular people on whom I called were out filling smudge pots and watching the thermometer closely. The drop of a point sometimes means a grower is wiped out completely, and the thermometer that night was just on the danger line.

"It was impossible to call the studio and get recording gear out there quickly at that hour of the evening, but CBS has what they call 'phonotape.' It's a phone attachment by means of which the boys back at the studio can record right from the telephone, so we were able to pick up information and conversation that formed the nucleus for an 'L. A. Story.'"

Reporter-Type Executive

The work of boiling down facts, dialogue and color into a fifteen-minute period for listeners, on what local events mean to them as consumers, is in competent hands. Only in his early thirties, Stuart Novins has worked at and mastered every facet of radio production. He has served as writer, producer and director in the programming field.

He has worked as reporter, news-writer, newscaster, news analyst and radio news executive in one of the

important newsrooms of the Columbia Broadcasting System. In public affairs, Novins has filled the difficult position of moderator for dozens of radio programs. He is currently heard each Tuesday night at 6:00 on KNX's "Women's Forum" as well as on the Saturday "L. A. Story."

A year and a half ago, Novins posed as a patient during six weeks of intensive personal research, then wrote, produced and directed "Menace in White." This hour-long documentary on illegal practices in medicine won four national radio awards.

In the spring of 1948 Novins researched, wrote and produced a seventy-five-minute documentary, "The Last Waterhole," which thoroughly examined the twenty-five-year-old California-Arizona water controversy. The program was hailed by the governors of both states as the most important survey of the problem ever undertaken by a newsmen.

During last year's election, the Novins perspective and production enabled "L. A. Story" listeners to understand clearly the wordy propositions included in the ballots on which they were to vote.

Constant Companion

Many times, whether he is digging up material for this fifteen-minute "Story" or for one of his longer documentaries, Stuart leaves his home

what it is. Frankly, I like "Tea for Two" to sound like "Tea for Two."

Conservative Background

Red's background is in direct contrast to the public's highly colored idea of the jazz musician's life. He's a native of Ogden, Utah, the son of a Mormon bishop. He learned the fundamentals of trumpet-playing at the age of three! His father made a stick arrangement that fitted on Red's knee and held the horn up to his lips. At four, he made his first public appearance, playing "My Country, 'Tis of Thee" at a college assembly. Prodigy Nichols won a musical scholarship to Culver Military Academy, where he played in the band under a former Army bandmaster. At sixteen he took a school vacation that was to decide his career. In Chicago he heard the jazz men at the Friar's Inn, heard Louis Armstrong playing third trumpet with King Oliver. "That's all!" Red exclaims now. He headed for New York and, still a teenster, started his long-lived career. "My family thought it was the most horrible thing that could have happened to me," he reveals. Only within the last ten years has the elder Nichols clan become reconciled to their son's career.

Red is married to a former "Vani-ties" dancer, Barbara Meredith. He's the father of a married daughter, Dorothy. "She's not a bit musical—and I've never encouraged her to be," he smiles. His hobbies are photography and gardening. He specializes in camellias and carnations. He's almost as enthusiastic about them as he is about his nightly stint at the Hangover with his own jazz band. He claims he could play all night without getting tired because he so loves what he does. "No pressure—we can relax and we don't have to cater to the folks who want to hear a samba."
