I have sold and serviced television receivers; produced live and film television shows; head a business based on Television Research and am Chairman of the Research Committee of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences. Because of this I feel duty-bound to answer Mr. No-Name's letter which appeared in the "Video in Review" column of your July 3 issue.

The first mental reaction I have to this letter is, "This man does not own a television receiver." If indeed he does, it is very unfortunate that he is not aware of what television really does have to offer Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Televiewer and family. It is not true that all that television has to offer the local viewer is boxing, wrestling, baseball, children's shows and Milton Berle and Arthur Godfrey; and any statement made to that effect is both unfair and untrue.

The facts of the matter are that every week the six operating television stations in this area offer the viewer in excess of the average figure of 180 diversified entertainment hours of viewing. Over 525 different programs have been offered for public viewing since the first of the year; and in this count film features, film shorts collectively are counted as a single program.

The most valid and noteworthy reason for purchasing a television set is that whenever something of great importance is happening your television receiver will take you direct to the scene, or rather take the scene direct to you in your living room, so that you can see what's going on WHEN IT HAPPENS, AS IT HAPPENS. That's something in the way of an extra privilege that up to now, with television available to anybody who will buy a receiver, no one ever dreamed of being able to take advantage of.

Yes, it's a long list of credits to give television; and it is difficult to imagine any individual who would question the advisability of purchasing an apparatus which would guarantee them all of the above and more at the flip of a knob. Mr. No-Name, television brings you every

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form of entertainment, sport, culture and information.

It is true that not all programs on television are perfect and the answer to a dream come true. Far from it. But every program that I have mentioned in this letter to you needs no defense for its quality or alibis for lack of it.

If what I have said is true, and it is, my answer must be "What more do you want? What are you waiting for?"

Top Columnists Answer 20 Questions

Louella Parsons, Erskine Johnson, Sheilah Graham and Frances Scully Relay Favorite Stories and Advice as They Answer Twenty Questions About Hollywood Legends

Question: What is the greatest human-interest story you've ever covered on the Hollywood beat?

Louella Parsons: ". . . The life, career and death of Charles Ray.

"I choose the story of the homespun star who became a millionaire and died a near pauper because it is the most outstanding case of 'going Hollywood' I have ever encountered. At the height of his fame, Charles built a home in Beverly Hills with marble bathtubs and gold shower knobs. His butler wore knee breeches, His private life of luxury (bordering on the royal treatment) was in the most violent contrast to his screen roles of the timid, shy, bashful hero. When he quarreled with his producers and tried to branch out for himself as a 'lover' in The Courtship of Miles Standish,' he lost every nickel he had made, and died in almost destitute circumstances. He was a great star-but he WENT HOLLWOOD, and it ruined his life."

Sheilah Graham: "Margaret O'Brien's opposition to the marriage of her mother to Don Sylvio. And later the break-up of her marriage, due primarily of course to Margaret's opposition. I covered this story on the long-distance telephone. Mrs. O'Brien

called me from Palm Springs, Florida. to tell me that she was going to marry Don Sylvio and when I asked 'How is Margaret taking It?' she blurted out all the details of Mar. garet's antipathy to the whole idea. 'She hasn't stopped crying since I told her,' she told me. This, of course, was a scoop for me, and I also got the first story of Mrs. OBrien's separation from Sylvio. When I called her quite casually to find out how things were with the family, 'I'll tell you later' she said rather ominously. That evening she called me to say that the marriage was off, had never been consummated, but she insisted that Margaret had nothing to do with it."

Erskine Johnson: "When he broke into show business as an unknown hoofer, Fred Astaire played a theater in San Francisco. Headlining the bill was a vaudeville star, Joe Neimeyer, also a dancer, who took young Fred in tow and gave him a lot of pointers. One day Astaire introduced me to his stand-in on a film set. Fred was paying back an old debt. The stand-in, down on his luck, was the same Joe Neimeyer, white-haired but still handy with his feet."

Frances Scully: "In 1941 when I

was femceeing my original servicemen's show, 'Your Blind Date,' it was the custom to invite the audience of servicemen to come up on the stage, where I had a 'blind date' for each of them. One evening a young soldier came up and said that he didn't know how to dance and could I please introduce him to a girl who wouldn't mind teaching him. I found a lovely little blonde girl who took over that task. In 1943, when I was down at Union Station seeing a Navy man off, an Air Force Lieutenant and a very pretty girl came over to say hello. They were the couple I had introduced at the 'Blind Date' show; he had just returned from active service overseas and they were married that very day!"

Question: What is the hottest scoop you've ever had?

Louella Parsons: "The biggest scoop I ever had, and the 'cleanest,' because all other papers were many editions behind me, was the divorce story of Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks. At the time, Mary and Doug were the King and Queen of Hollywood, and Pickfair was the palace where they entertained real kings and queens and dignitaries when they visited Hollywood. Sup-

posed to be ideally happy and famed all over the world as a most happily married couple, the story of their contemplated divorce was bannerline-high in importance in world news. I got it because, as much as I hated to believe it, I had heard whispers that all was not well between them. Almost apologetically I went to Mary and told her what I had heard. I could hardly believe my ears when she said, 'It is true, Louella. Douglas and I are parting, and you may print it.'"

Sheilah Graham: "The hottest scoop—and I mean literally—was the Howard Hughes plane crash in Beverly Hills. I was due to go on the air in ten minutes on that Sunday when I was called and given the story. So I had it first on the air. At that time there was not time to check how badly Hughes had been burned in the crash or whether he would live."

Erskine Johnson: "I announced the marriage of Bob Taylor to Barbara Stanwyck. I walked up to Barbara and said, 'Are you going to marry Bob?' and she said, 'Yes.' Very complicated!"

Frances Scully: "This is a scoop I didn't use on 'Star Gazing,' but gave to ABC news commentator Hank Weaver. We scooped everyone else for a week. Here's the story: When Loretta Young appeared as Queen of the California Millinery Show at which I was femcee, she told me during luncheon at the Ambassador that the preceding Sunday when she arrived at Mrs. Bob Hope's home to attend the charity garden party for the Carmelite Nuns, the police had preceded her and closed all the games! Loretta then pitched in with Dolores Hope and auctioned the donations instead of selling chances on them."

Question: What experience in the past has been most valuable in your work as a columnist?

Louella Parsons: "Curiosity! Without genuine and sympathetic interest in other people and what they are doing, you will never be a columnist, my friend."

Sheilah Graham: "I was a great reader and loved to write as a youngster, but what has proved most valuable in my present work as a columnist is a lifelong curiosity about what makes other people tick."

Erskine Johnson: "Ten years as a copy boy and reporter on Los Angeles newspapers."

Frances Scully: "I think my many experiences with Irene Rich have

had more influence on my career than and the else. When I first went out on my own professionally on the air, Irene took me aside and explained the importance of such things as punctuality . . . never wearing your troubles on your face . . . the importance of smiling . . . never paying any attention to gossips even if their remarks are directed at you. I believe all this advice has meant a great deal to me."

Question: What is the most heartbreaking story you've covered on the Hollywood beat?

Lowella Parsons: "The romance, marriage and suicide of Paul Bern, the brilliant producer, who married beautiful Jean Harlow at the height of her fame. Jean loved Paul with admiration and respect for his fine intellectual qualities and his sweetness, but he brooded that he could not bring her real love that would hold her and make her happy. On the terrible day for the entire industry, not many months after their garden wedding, Paul shot himself through the head in their home.

"A sad sequel to this tragedy is Jean Harlow's death at the time when she was one of the most loved stars in Hollywood. She was in love with William Powell and heartbroken because he felt after his unhappy marriage to Carole Lombard that he didn't want to marry another popular actress. Her death came so suddenly, and saddened not only her mother and Powell, but the entire world."

Sheilah Graham: "The most heartbreaking Hollywood story happened outside of Hollywood—the Carole Lombard crash in an airplane coming back from a bond rally."

Erskine Johnson: "The actress who won two Academy Awards—and now can't get a job."

Frances Scully: "I was doing the 'Hollywood and Vine' show from the Brown Derby. As was the custom of this ad-libbed show, we visited with stars who were lunching there. This particular noontime a well-known radio performer had planed into town, so naturally Bob Latting and I gave him a whirl at our ABC mike. When he left he was headed for the airport to return east. The next day while I was sitting at our special Table 22, I received a phone call from a little boy who asked to speak to the star I had had on the air the day before. When I explained that the gentleman had left for the East, the child, with a quiver in his voice, said, 'He was my daddy and I thought that maybe this time he would call me and mommie, but I guess he doesn't want us any more.'"

Question: On the basis of your inside knowledge of the workings of stars and studios, what pitfalls or mistakes would you warn a young movie hopeful against making?

Louella Parsons: "... Inexperience, conceit and temperament. No matter what you hear about 'Cinderella' stories and overnight success, the groundwork for stardom is hard work, training and self-discipline. The really great actors in Hollywood have never stopped learning. It is only the fly-by-nights who think they know it all. If you sincerely want a career in the theater, approach it with humility and the knowledge that it is a long, hard road of denial and sacrifice ahead."

Sheilah Graham: "I warn all newcomers, especially young girls, although this also applies to young men, against using the night-club (Please Turn to Page 15)

Traffic

The Word "Traffic" Usually Brings to Mind a Vision of Moving Cars on a Crowded Boulevard. Radio Station Traffic Operations Are Even More Involved, and Can't Have Any Tie-Ups

> HEN KHJ-Don Lee's Tony LaFrano picks up the telephone and says, "Elinor, tomorrow 'Ladies First' will

originate from Studio Two, because we'll have to have 'Queen for a Day' in One," he sets in motion one of the least-known but most important departments of the network—the Traffic Department.

The word "traffic," to most people, brings to mind a vision of signal lights, police officers, and violation tickets. Just how the word can relate to a network radio station operation is a mystery which might require some clearing up. Traffic is the nerve center of a broadcasting station, where the process of controlling the flow of radio programs along the network wires is coordinated. Tony LaFrano's call to Elinor Barney, Traffic Manager of Don Lee and KHJ (FM, AM and KTSL Television), tells her that the schedule will have to be set up to inform the program artists, the engineers, master control, and recording, that "Ladies First" will originate in a

studio other than its regular one, so that the proper lines will be called into operation at broadcast time.

Errors Expensive

Because of the exactitude of the work, where a typographical error could cost the network thousands of dollars in lost revenue, Traffic re-quires quick-thinking, clever persons to keep in mind the myriad details of changing programs, not only from day to day, but even several times a day. The personnel must be highly efficient and reliable, decisive and without temperament. Working with Elinor, who herself is all these things, are Traffic Assistants Jim "Butch" Swain and Gloria Murison.

The Traffic Department makes up each week a work sheet of the programs for two weeks ahead. sheet is changed from day to day to conform to the advance changes in the program schedules as the week progresses. Since there is a time lag in the operations of departments dependent upon the information received from Traffic, the daily program boards must be up to date and set a full day ahead of time. This is so the boards, from which Butch and Gloria type the operations sheet or resume each day, will be complete

DAILY MESSAGES ARE SENT from New York and broadcast on a closed circuit. Although the material is led on regular network lines, it is not sent to the transmitters and listeners do not hear it. Taking notes are Jim Swain, Elinor Barney, Lann Calkins and Gloria Murison. THE RECORDING ORDERS show that an "air check" is to be made of the "Red Ryder" show. Gleaning this information are Phil Strauss, contact producer for the show, and Earl McCallum, head of the transcription department.

and correct as of the time the resume or final operations sheet is taken from them.

The information from which the work sheet, or step one, is corrected and kept up to the minute, comes from a variety of sources . . . sales orders, Mutual program schedules, Don Lee program changes, and the Mutual conference call. The conference call is a fifteen minute period set aside each day when the network lines are reserved for communication between New York and all stations on the system. During this period, stations "fill" with local programs (Please Turn to Page 15)

On the opening broadcast, Hans Conried was a cast addition as "Hoffenberger."

The public's insatiability for adolescent comedy is seemingly not yet on the wane. "Corliss" is a caricaturization of the average teen-ager, and as such she appeals to the vast horde of mothers, fathers and aunts of teenagers. All the real-life "Corlisses," "Janies" and "Judys" we've known have left the program strictly alone. They prefer something a little more sophisticated.

"Make-Believe Town"

CBS's new daytime serial, "Make-Believe Town," heard on KNX via transcription at 10:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, started off backwards on its first broadcast, then quickly recovered itself. The announcer presented the series with "CBS brings you . . . 'Make-Believe Ballroom'-uh --'Make-Believe Town!'"

With Virginia Bruce as hostess, the series about Hollywood gets a ring of authenticity and a charming personality to introduce the stories to listeners. Each broadcast is a complete thirty-minute dramatization about the denizens of the film world, proving that, after all, they're just like "you and me."

The first story was the one about the girl who didn't want to be a Hollywood star. We've known two instances of this in real life—one girl got a better deal from J. Arthur Rank and the other went to Broadway to star in a play. You can see how true to life "Make-Believe Town" is. Radio in Review

This is the sort of story that proved so effective during the 1930's that the industry actually exerted pressure to have them soft-pedaled. 'Thousands of young girls descended on Hollywood, convinced that all they had to do was walk past a movie studio and a jaded producer would immediately recognize them as "that girl there, that one with the sensitive face—have you ever thought of going into pictures, dear?" But the stories are extremely effective, and 'Make-Believe Town" does them well. Ralph 'Rose's production is of the superior sort that made his "Tell It Again" so entertaining. Colleen Collins as the Svenska heroine gave a charming performance on the first show and Paul Dubow as the jaded producer was almost believable.

"Make-Believe Town" should stack up as good entertainment of the superior soap-opera type, with none of the disquieting overtones of the documentary.

"Broadway Is My Beat"

"Broadway Is My Beat" moved from New York to Hollywood without the slightest notable change in the program. Its ingrained "New Yorkiness" remains intact at KNX, 9:30 p.m. Thursday.

"Detective Danny Clover" is one of those rare sleuths (rare at least on the air) who is attached to the police department, and yet who is not a figure of fun for private eyes to show up as a footless bumbler. "Danny," as the title implies, pounds the beat on glamorous Broadway, where he unravels the big and little crimes that take up the time of a variety of typical Broadway characters—small-time gangsters, gamblers, taxi drivers, show girls, night-club owners and prize fighters. You can see that the setting is a veritable jump into the plot. Larry Thor makes "Detective Danny Clover" a more appealing character than most radio sleuths. He reminds us a little of the kindly detective in the old play "Broadway."

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

We Point With Pride

... To one program that has guest interviews of great listening interest, "Life Begins at Eighty," whose guest oldsters have brought a wealth of wonderful stories and memories to the mike. Where else could you find an interview with a man who accompanied Amundsen and Peary on their polar explorations? Only one of the fascinating personalities interviewed on the program in recent weeks.

... To American poet Samuel Untermeyer, who proved to be such a live-wire guest on a recent "Twenty Questions." Untermeyer not only asked good questions and contributed to the final answers, he also added the light touch. When "Poet and Peasant" overture was used as a subject in honor of poet Untermeyer, he quipped, "Well, there's no doubt about my being a *peasant*, it's the *poet* that's in question!"

... To Burl Ives's stint as sub for 'Walter Winchell. The balladeer is one of those wise performers who doesn't deviate from the style or the songs that made him famous, and his fifteen minutes are pure Ives. Even his commercials for Kaiser-Frazer are listenable.

We View With Alarm

... Another mannerism to add to our list of words we could do without during radio interviews with celebrities—"Actually" as in "Well, actually it isn't" or "Actually I was in Boston at the time."

... The amateur standing of young Guy Madison, who appeared as "Amory" on the "NBC University Theater" broadcast of F. Scott Fitzgerald's "This Side of Paradise." Madison, who conveyed none of the misguided idealism, juvenile standards or even the youth of the character, emerged from the broadcast with his reputation as a "simon-pure" still intact.

... That joyful middle commercial on "The Whistler" that manages to break the suspenseful mood as cleanly in two as if they'd played a Betty Hutton record instead of a sponsor's plug.

... The decision that has the new show about Hollywood, "Make-Believe Town," heard in the afternoon on all the CBS outlets—except KNX in Hollywood, where it's pegged at 10:30 p.m. Statements that start out with "This afternoon's story ..." or "Tune in every day at this time ..." sound just plain silly when they bounce into the living room about the time you're setting the clock and snapping out lights.

... The cigarette commercial on NBC's "The Big Story" that becomes ridiculous when it's read after the dramatic opening. Recently the program started out with a girl being strangled. In the next instant, the commercial announcer cried, "Guard against throat scratch!" Took us several minutes before we realized it wasn't part of the plot.

Duo a Hit

When singer Jack Smith and maestro Frank De Vol appeared on London's BBC radio show, "In Town Tonight," they were pleased to spot Benny Goodman, his wife, and actress Merle Oberon in the audience. Pretty illustrious attendance, they thought.

But when the popular musical duo left the show and passed out the stage door, it was *they* who were literally mobbed for autographs, while the Goodmans and star Oberon were scarcely noticed by the pack of Smith-De Vol fans.

Pit and Podium

If you're interested in owning a record of your very own name set to music in any style that pleases you, dial KECA any week-day morning at 11:45, and listen to the offer made by pianist Felix De Cola. If you are the lucky winner of his musical question, you win the name-song, played on the air and recorded for you. De Cola dropped in the other day to tell us about the show and instead was barraged by questions. What is the most requested style? According to the musician, most people request a light ballad treatment, occasionally will request their name musicalized a la Beethoven or Tschaikowsky. What, we wondered, would happen if some one asked for Schonberg, the difficult composer who says that violinists should have seven fingers on each hand in order to play his concertos? The problem hasn't arisen yet, admitted De Cola. An extremely clever fel-low at the keyboard, De Cola avers that no one even comes close to Alec Templeton at this sort of improvisa-tion. "Do you know," he exclaimed,-"that Templeton is able to play two different melodies with one hand while 'he plays a third melody with the other?" No, we didn't know, and somehow we wish we hadn't found out. The thought has been bothering us like an unsolved mathematical problem:

One of the most entertaining and informative music appreciation sessions on the air remains the Green Room intermission on CBS's Sunday symphony. Last week Whittemore and Lowe, one of America's top double-piano teams, revealed some interesting facts about their career and their profession. Piano teams, a form of entertainment of which we are inordinately fond, are quite recent developments, according to the duo. Very little piano literature has been written for teams, and a great deal of the music used is transcribed from solo compositions. The problem is to inject a new duo-piano quality, quite different from the original solo.

Whittemore and Lowe hoaxed themselves to success in an almost slapstick manner. After graduating from music academy, Whittemore was given a trip to Cuba by an aunt who lived there. He was invited to bring along a friend. Arthur Whittemore asked Reid Lowe from the same school. Desiring to impress a couple of Bennington girls who were also sailing, the two boys signed the passenger list as a team of duo pianists on a concert tour-after first ascertaining that there was but one piano on board. They impressed the girls, but they also impressed Whittemore's aunt. On arrival, the boys discovered that she had booked them into an impressive concert hall in Havana. The two had never played together before, but they made such a valiant effort on that

Is television killing radio? Ask this question and start an argument you can't finish! If you are a TV convert and your friends are not, already you have probably had a few debates in which no one has convinced the other side of anything. In the radio-video industries themselves they argue the question just the same as you do, with perhaps more heat and frequency, for to these workers the outcome is a bread and butter proposition.

The trade paper Variety recently asked this dynamite-loaded query in a typical headline: "Has AM (radio) Entered Its PM?'

Those who think radio will stay point out that there are many news and musical programs which are so effective on radio that it would not be worth a sponsor's extra thousands to televise. "And what about the soap operas?" they demanded. "How can a woman look at 'Helen Trent' and do the housework?"

One Network?

Because some programs don't lend themselves too gracefully or profitably to television and because they cost too much proportionately and will never reach the masses that radio does, those who argue that radio is here to stay do seem to have some valid points. Many believe that eventually there will be one strong, top-notch network and that it was this conviction that motivated CBS's William Paley to buy Benny, Crosby, Burns and Allen and a flock of expensive stars to assure that his would be the Number One skein.

Perhaps you are one who is sold on television but who thinks it may stunt its growth with meager material or monotonous performances. There is no one who won't admit that today's

occasion that two careers were born!

It's big news when Igor Stravinsky, the man who created a musical revolution that may well rank in later ages with the ones engendered by Haydn and Beethoven, signs on to write original scores for a radio show, NBC's recently auditioned "Night-mare." Strange that Igor was once considered so unorthodox and uncom. mercial that audiences rioted at his concerts! Radio and movie music has, however, been so derivative and reminiscent of so many Stravinsky scores that probably the only riot that will occur will be the maestro's, when he's accused of stealing his own stuff. That's what happens when you get into the game late!

video programming can be improved, but in defending what there is to see now, these people liken the just-born era through which video is passing to the early days of radio. "Give 'em time!" is their theory.

The question of using up talent is not so easily dismissed. Hearing Milton Berle once a week is one thing. Looking at a performer is another, for the impact of sound plus sight is much heavier than sound alone. It might simmer down to the place where a star would make video apwith another star. Edgar Bergen has wanted for a long while to try this in radio as a panacea for the doldrums.

If yours is a family with a TV set, you have no doubt done what the others have: for the first three or four months following installation you have boycotted movies, shunned books, and let your records gather dust. TV has been the big thing. Then the novelty has worn off and your yen to mingle in a crowd has asserted itself. Your looking has leveled off. But in the meantime you have been weaned from radio.

TV or Not TV

Deep down inside, most radioites are convinced that television is going to outstrip radio. Proof is the number of stars working in video for peanuts just for the opportunity of getting in on the ground floor.

Gals (yes, and guys) are reducing for the merciless cameras and the less attractive are going in for face-lifting. and nose-fixing. To get into the feel of a looking audience, performers are doing summer "straw hat" theater and • vaudeville.

For there is one fact they cannot overlook: every day TV sets are being sold in increasing numbers. At last count (July 15) there were 2,000,000 in the United States, New York led with 685,000; Philadelphia had 190, 000; Chicago, 163,000; Los Angeles, 150,000 Prices on sets are dipping 150,000. Prices on sets are dipping noticeably, thus stimulating increased buying. (Last week RCA clipped \$100 from cost of some of its models.)

Apparently there is no getting around the maxim: "A single picture is worth a thousand words.'

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Looks Like

Video, in one instance at least, proved to be a boon at the box office KTLA rather than a hindrance. beamed the run of the Roller Derby, picking up the spectacle four out of each seven nights. A questionnaire was set up and issued to patrons at the gate of Pan Pacific Auditorium, asking "From which medium did you first hear of the roller derby?" One thousand six hundred and one persons first heard of the derby through television, and 165 heard of it on other media.... Looks as if you can have a motion-picture contract and still appear on television. Here's how. Acquire the distribution rights in this community to some video brand, as Bob Hope did to DuMont. (He is said to have bought a large block of stock in the company, also.) Then work for a studio, like Paramount, that is reported to be heavily interested in DuMont. They won't care if you appear on the network in which they are interested. It isn't for sure that Mr. Hope will make his television appearance on DuMont this fall, but the word is out that negotiations are on. And Mr. Luckman of Lever Bros., Hope's regular sponsor, evidently thinks Hope is such a good kid that he gave him an okay to go ahead. . . . KNBH dropped "Nocturne" from its channel, but will find another spot for the Luscious Lucille (Norman). ... Milton Berle will completely bypass radio next year, concentrating, naturally, on television. And why not? His former Texaco contract called for \$2,500 per TV show and \$2,-000 per radio show. The new pact gives "Miltie" \$12,500 weekly for the part two verse. Why two verse? next two years. Why two years? Does Berle think he will be worth more at the end of that period, or does Texaco think he will be through? ASCAP has again extended (to September 1) the right of television to use ASCAP members' music. The union has been dickering, meanwhile granting extensions, for several months with the television interests. ... The new "Cinemascope" pre-viewed a week or so ago by KLAC-TV seems to some of the movie folk working in radio like the perfect medium for telensing their shows. Al-ready NBC's Screen Directors' airshow Alis looking into the use of Cinema-scope for their "Playhouse." Of course the actual "Playhouse" radio format can't be used on video, because the radio show used stars and screen plays featured in the picture, with the film director handling radio-director Page Twelve

The screen plays cannot be chores. cleared, nor could the contracts of the actors and directors. Don Sharp, who owns the package, said that eighteen original scripts have been prepared. Judy Canova's agent is getting up a combination radio-television package for the star for this fall's entry Commissioner A. B. into video. . . Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler is reported as being prepared to negotiate baseball contracts, radio and television alike, as far ahead as 1956. The cash in-volved would definitely improve players' welfare, and the days when radio and television were regarded as box-office threats are dead, in baseball, at least. However, boxers and their managers in the East are insisting that video does ruin the house take, and are insisting that video be allowed only outside the 200-mile ra-dius of the city in which the big bouts are staged.

Stop, Listen, Look (^{Shows You} May Like)

"Children Should Be Heard"

Doing a reverse on the parable "Children Should Be Seen and Not Heard" is KFI-TV's youthful participation show, "Children Should Be Heard," (Sunday, Channel 9, 2:30 p.m.)

Emceed by that personable young Harry Koplan, the program is charming to watch, principally because of the unabashed questions the young quizzers spear at guests.

Premise of the stint is to get the children to speak their minds, and Koplan cleverly phrases the questions up to the youthful level. He uses extreme care in clearing up any issue that involves the youngsters in a cross-wire conversation.

Last week's guest was producer Merian C. Cooper, whose picture "Mighty Joe Young" was the topic under fire. Persistent queries on how the movie was made were asked, with Cooper giving intelligent and direct answers to all. About the only question which met with hesitation was whether the ape was real. Gracefully hemming and hawing his way out, Mr. Cooper revealed that it was a secret as valuable to him as the Coca-Cola formula was to the beverage firm.

Telling of the fabulous sum the movie was making during its premiere in New York, one youngster was prompted to gasp, "Gee, in just plainol' New York?" Brewing worry was the idea that the animals in the picture might have been hurt, a thought the producer velvet-touched when he explained, "Oh, no, not *really* hurt. I always like to make a picture with a happy ending."

One requisite of the boys and girls appearing on the panel is that they be good conversationalists, and parents who feel their offspring have a natural gift of gab and would like to have them appear on the stint are invited to drop a card to KFI-TV, 141 North Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles.

Jim Hawthorne Show

The Jim Hawthorne show (new time 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, KTTV, Channel 11) is just that . . . the Jim Hawthorne show. In the presence of the bespectacled, check-coated Hogan, no one else has a chance.

Everyone who used to hear Jim's brand of breakaway whimsy on the radio knows what to expect . . . talk about a bus line from the La Brea tar pits to Iceland, the difficulty encountered crossing the Bering Straits, purchase of Pomona to fill the gap.

Jim prattles through a half hour in • this fashion, using his wonderful "talk-back-a-scope," a device by which viewers are enabled to "talk back" to Jim; and also literally using a couple of luckless stooges. These stooges are in the guise of visitors from Bakersfield and other outlying towns whose mere names, under the facile Hawthorne touch, set viewers off into uncontrollable mirth. The dialogue these "visitors" and Jim go through is impossible to recreate for the simple reason we laughed so hard we can't remember.

But it was awfully funny. Jim doesn't have to say anything remembrance-worthy or have a great format for a video show, any more than he did for his air stints. His personality is so definite and so definitely engaging that *he* is the show.

Of course, attached to the show's contest are some wonderful prizes you might be lucky enough to avoid winning. A 100-pound cake of ice; a Cadillac water bottle (fill the bottle with water and you can pour right into some friend's Cadillac); a oneway bus ticket to the Arctic; fifty prizes each of which is a bottle cap from a famous soft drink; or even a one-day subscription to the Los Angeles Times.

All through Jim's show some stooge —a cute-enough-looking girl who did the stint quite ably—kept putting in with the star and his dialogue. Finally, at the end of the show, her presence and bits of interruptions were explained in an extremely obvious pitch for another KTTV show. The plug served no purpose, but we enplyed the Hawthorne half hour sufficiently to go along with the gag... "Pantomime Quiz, Pantomime Quiz, Pantomime Quiz!"

of interest to their listeners. The network lines then carry messages from New York with daily changes or corrections in the program schedule

Because of the time differential in New York and Hollywood, and the fact that Don Lee carries Mutual programs at times other than those at which they are received from New York, Don Lee also has a daily fifteen-minute period when those program changes and corrections which apply to Don Lee are broadcast on closed circuit to the regional network stations for corrections on their local program schedules.

Speed of communications is the essence of correct and properly co-ordinated network radio program scheduling. Last.minute messages regarding special events, new programs or program changes come to Don Lee by direct teletype from New York. The two key stations of the Don Lee network, KHJ, Los Angeles, and KFRC, San Francisco, are also linked by direct teletype. This enables corrections or changes to be made almost up until air time. The teletypes are under the capable hands of Lorraine Holmelund.

With multitudinous programs originating in the studios at 1313 North Vine Street, a major problem is that of scheduling studios, engineers, an-nouncers. sound men and producers. This calls for split-second liaison between the Program and Traffic Departments, an assignment and re-sponsibility which falls to the dili-gent care of Jean Lang. Jean has served for five years in the various departments of the Program division, gaining a well-rounded background for her present intricate and important job.

One thing even all the well-oriented people in Don Lee's Traffic Department are not always prepared for is the last-minute scheduling of a special event. There is a fire of major proportions in an outlying Los Angeles city, or some endurance flyers pass an established mark. The Don Lee Special Events Department's George Martin goes out on a rush call with his portable tape recorder, and edits his tape down to program length. This show is then to be inserted in the Don Lee schedule as quickly as possible because of the news value of the story it tells. All the facets of Traffic are called into operation and a last-minute shift in the program schedule is arranged.

With the inception of Daylight-Saving Time in the East and some Middle Western states and cities, almost the entire Don Lee schedule of programs has been transcribed for playback at convenient Coast listening times. 1 pkg. lemon gelatin 134 c. boiling water 1/3 c. light corn syrup and 1/2 c. sugar or 1/3 c. honey Grated rind of 1 lemon Juice of lemon (4 T.) 1 tsp.,pineapple flavoring 1 large can evaporated milk 2 T. melted butter or margarine 1/2 c. crushed vanilla cookie crumbs

Place can of evaporated milk, mix-ing bowl and wheel egg beater in coldest spot in refrigerator overnight, so as to chill well.

so as to chill well. Dissolve lemon-flavored gelatin in boiling water, add either corn syrup with sugar, or honey. When cool, add lemon juice, lemon rind and pine-apple flavoring. Place in refrigerator to chill, and when it starts to congeal, empty contents of milk into bowl and beat until stiff. Fold into this the gelatin mixture, a small amount at a time, still continue to beat.

time, still continue to beat. Melt butter or margarine and to this add 1 cup of the cookie crumbs, place in bottom of a large glass bak-ing dish that will fit in freezing compartment of refrigerator. Pour into this the gelatin mixture, putting remaining crumbs on top, and let freeze until firm.

If drawer of refrigerator is large enough for the mixture, that may be used.

The first radio gag men had it soft. Dial your memory back a coupla kilocycles to 1922. Some pioneer mikeman clips a funny out of the paper and screams it into the ether. Twenty, maybe thirty miles away pop is scratching on the old regenerative or the crystal set, and the whole family is shh'd into deathly silence. Faintly the words are discerned above the caterwauling static:

"Who was the lady I seen you with last night?"

such magazines as "Judge," "Life" (then a funny instead of a foto) and "College Humor." And they were lifted from vaudeville acts.

"Why is a husband like a furnace?"

"Bocause if you don't watch him, he'll go out!"

or

"What does an elephant have that no other animal has?"

"I dunno. What?"

"Baby elephants!"

"All right, you're so smart. What do Elks have that no other animal has?"

"That's easy. Baby elks!"

"Nope, Parades!"

Stop rolling in the aisle and take your seat, lady.

The first radio comedians were chiefly ad-lib lads who could go on for fifteen or twenty minutes, trading silly sallies. Much of this stuff would seem very thin and lifeless today, but twenty-five years ago it was such a miraculous novelty to have noise of any kind come out of

Who Was That Comedian J Saw With Last Night?

"That was no lady. That was my wife!"

That hit the jackpot! That sent the laughmeter past 1000! That topped this one! That had 'em rolling in the aisles; that wowed 'em; mowed 'em down! And why not? If a man told a joke twenty, thirty miles away and your magic radio set clutched the words right out of the clear air and laid them in your lap, you'd be an ingrate if you didn't laugh. This was truly the magic age. The stereoscope was doomed. Bicycle manufacturers saw the handwriting on the wall. And some sects denounced those sacrilegious come dians who tampered with elements out of our earthly realm.

While no accredited historian of radio humor will produce a specific joke and say "This was the first gag to make Marconi wish he had become a jockey instead," there are numerous jokes current around the early 1920's that we can be reasonably sure had their debut on the kilocycles.

earphones and loud-speakers that the public wasn't too critical.

As listeners became more discriminating and competition within the industry increased, the smarter boys (or those with the weakest memories?) resorted to writing down their gags.

These "work sheets" could hardly be dignified by calling them "scripts." They consisted of a string of two- or three-line gags, with little or no build-up, characterization or sequence of any kind.

After the funniest gag—or what in the opinion of the cast was the funniest gag—the orchestra played a chord in. G, and the soprano sang "Ramona."

As radio came into what might be called its adolescence, say in the late 20's and early 30's, performers got rather self-conscious. They wouldn't risk ad-libbing. Everything had to be written down, even to pauses and directions for stammering. A performer who, by accident or whim, deviated slightly from the script sent the whole cast into a panle of fear.

Mercifully, this rigidity was broken up by a few bold comedians with vaudeville experience — Fred Allen, Bob Hope and that fellow who plays (Please Turn to Page 39)

Age Is No Barrier to Success

HEN a man has reached the age of thirty it is usually generalized that he, besides being in the

sides being in the prime of life, is settled in his profession. Completely disrupting this surmise—that a man con undertake a goal at that age and make a success of himself—is the example of Ed Begley.

A good many years bridge the time Ed won a Charlie Chaplin talent contest, ran away to join the circus, washed dishes, supervised a pick and shovel and split steel in a Connecticut factory and the present day, in which his name is synonymous with astute air acting.

As fabulous as his late entry into dramatic circles was the perseverance he applied to win his first radio role. In 1931, during which time he was working in a factory making a living for himself as well as a family, Ed joined a group of earnest actors, the Hartford Players. Through word of mouth he heard that the home-town radio station, WTIC, was auditioning for talent. Managing to obtain the afternoon off, Ed rushed to the station for a try. The first day, he sat. The auditioner told him to return the following morning. Hopes high, he returned—and sat. By the time the third day had rolled around, he was determined he would wear a hole through the chair until they gave him the wanted audition.

Big Chance

"Sorry, the parts are all taken," was what he heard at the end of the sit-down siege. Crestfallen, Ed just stared at the man, who, sensing his disappointment, added, "But here, read this part. It's already taken, but I might as well hear what your voice is like." He heard and Ed got the part. At the first, during the preliminary rehearsals of the play, Ed remembers "I became terribiy nervous. After all, here I was a mature man and doing the role of a college boy. I thought I should at least try to sound like one, so I Avgust 14, 1949

raised my voice to a youthful pitch what was supposed to sound like a prep-school boy. 'No, no,' cried the director, 'for gosh sakes, sound like yourself!'' When Ed finally became convinced that his voice should return to natural range, he was highly successful—so much that he stayed on with the group, doing an assortment of programs ranging from philosophy to minstrel shows.

Breaks Big City

"Then I suddenly wanted to try for New York," he explains. "When I arrived, I made a regular blitzkrieg of auditions at all the stations." They paid off well with one part rolling in after another until, to the present, he has a backlog of some 12,000 air performances. Among his best-remembered parts were "Mr. Dittenpheffer" on the Alan Young show and perhaps one of his greatest portrayals, that of the celebrated detective "Charlie Chan." Somehow, into that role Ed inflected just the right amount of philosophy, the subtle spice of Oriental wit, and the soft, steady voice which held a clever degree of Chinese dialect. Now on NBC's "Richard Diamond, Detective" series as "Lieutenant Levinson," he is once more proving his capability.

On Broadway, it was he who created the role of "Joe Kelly" in the 1947 Critic's Prize Play "All My Sons," while another of his stage successes includes the all-time great "What Price Glory."

In his personal life, Ed lives in a Hollywood hillfop home where he spends much of his leisure time in the kitchen creating dishes of Spanish, Italian and Swedish origin. However, if anything went wrong with the plumbing, or if there were any recairs to be done, Ed wouldn't be (Please Turn to Page 39)

America on news assignments. He covered murder trials, wrecks, politics, the Washington scene, and inconsequential human interest stories.

In the 1920's Hill had a fling at the movies, working for Fox Film Corporation as newsreel director, scenario editor and supervisor. But his Hollywood career was shortlived. He returned to New York and got back his old job. "A real news-paperman," he said, "will never be content with any other job." Later, as a leading writer for King Fea-tures, Hill began his column "The Human Side of the News," the same title that he uses today for his Monday-through-Friday broadcasts.

Hill's first radio appearance was made in 1931, and his deep, rich voice made him a "natural" for the new medium. The next year, he was heard five nights weekly with his

O FULFILL successfully a boyhood ambition is, as many biographers have noted, a rarity. Most youngsters who want to become engineers, firemen, ball players, air-plane pilots or Bing Crosbys when they grow up are sidetracked somewhere along the way by the exigen-cies of life. But Edwin C. Hill, distinguished newspaperman and ABC commentator, from the time he first learned to read and write wanted to be a reporter. And since his school days in Aurora, Indiana, he has never been anything else.

Upon his graduation from Indiana University, Hill, who spent most of his free time working for the college paper, landed a job as a cub reporter for the old Indianapolis Sentinel and launched himself on a career that was to make him one of the best-known reporters of the nation.

Even before he went to New York as a reporter for the Sun, Hill had covered such important assignments as the funeral of President Benjamin Harrison, the national political con-ventions and other leading news events of the day. His warm hu-man-interest style which was later to gain him national recognition had begun to take form.

Hill's first big break came when he was sent to cover a news story about a small fire in the empty Palace Theater. Hill's story of the fire and what might have happened was so dramatically written that it was put on the front page. Within a few months, the Hoosier boy was one of New York's crack reporters.

He remained with the Sun for many years, covering the biggest stories of his time. He met the great and the near-great. He traveled with Theodore Roosevelt; he went to Europe, Africa and South

own program, and the popularity of his warm comments spread until he was acknowledged one of radio's top assets. In addition to his regularly scheduled broadcasts, Hill was called upon often to conduct special pro-grams in which he gave his impressions of outstanding news events.

Hill has published a novel, "The Iron Horse," which deals with the conquest of the West by the railroad builders. He also has written two other books, titled "The American Scene" and "The Human Side of the News."

the violin. They started issuing mock-serious commands to their stooges to "stick to the script."

Growing Up

In no time at all lesser lights and shameless imitators were writing "Stick to the script" gags into the script itself. The result was a run of quips such as:

COMIC: "If you don't keep away from my girl I'll...."

STOOGE: "You'll what?"

COMIC: "Wait till I turn the page and I'll tell you!"

Today, comedians refer shamelessly—even proudly—to their gag writers. Not many years ago a radio comic would no more admit that he hired a man to write his gags than a Victorian miss would admit to having limbs (much less legs). Yet, neither the comic nor the Victorian miss could stand without support, and the initiated knew it.

Funnymen who once hid their gag writers in the back room with their family skeleton now parade these merriment mechanics for laughs.

BENNY: Me hire gag writers? I live by my wits.

ALLEN: Yeah, I know your writers ... Horowitz, Rabinowitz, Liebowitz and Halfwits.

Benny and Allen accused each other of stealing gags, as did Hope and Skelton. The ether audience loved this righteous indignation rally. And then Milton Berle blithely admitted, even gloated about stealing gags from all other comedians. The pendulum swung from I-createall·my-own-jokes to I-steal-jokesfrom-everyone.

Even with the finest brains in the industry switching gags, refining, distilling and distorting funny quips, radio humor neared the saturation point. The rich natural resources of comedy, inexhaustible in the days of vaudeville, seemed vitiated with hundreds of comedians' demands for fresh material each week—sometimes each day.

Big-name comics flopped. Enter the quiz shows.

Then a marvelous discovery was made. People who no longer laughed at comics would *laugh at each other*. Nothing was funnier to a guy from Brooklyn than another guy from Brooklyn, unless it was a guy from Texas.

With the profit motive added in the way of prizes, radio got a new boost. The audience became the performers, and the comedian who formerly was paid to make a fool

of himself was paid to coax housewives and shoe clerks to make fun of *thems*elves.

Democracy had come to radio.

Radio humor has come of age during the past 25 years. Just as the first receiving sets were crude and cumbersome, so was the first radio humor. Lagging behind the technical development of the industry but still advancing, radio became smoother, more subtle.

Nowadays

Such masters as Benny, Allen, and Henry Morgan created a special type of comedy, tailor-made for radio, specially suited to the medium. Critics and discriminating listeners hail Allen and Morgan in particular as brilliant satirists.

In other words the humor of these men has a *purpose*—to make people *think* as well as laugh. They pour you a gag with a head on it:

MORGAN (as an official granting building priorities): "You want lumber, steel, glass. Yes, certainly. I suppose this is for a race track, night club or cat samatorium?"

VETERAN (timidly): "No, for a house to live in."

MORGAN (furiously): "For a house?.... To live in? Certainly not!"

or

HOPE: "Some people wave the flag so that they can waive the flag. Get it—w-a-v-e the flag so they can w-a-i-v-e the flag—?

For the purposes of this article we disdain from overlooking the fact that Morgan has had great difficulty holding a sponsor. It is a commentary on something or other that Morgan had to be sponsored by another comedian last season.

Nevertheless, I feel that radio humor has advanced through the

the one called upon. "My biggest achievement," he boasts, "is to water the lawn."

When motion pictures began to offer him roles, he refused because of the stories he had heard that people out here were cold and scheming. An offer to portray the water commissioner in "Boomerang" was accepted, for it was filmed back East. Then he was asked to act in "Sitting Pretty" out here. He came. "But I was determined to rush back East as soon as I was through." However, a rush of movies followed, including "Sorry, Wrong Number," "Deep Waters," "Tulsa," "The Great Gatsby" and his recent ones, "It Happens Every Spring" and "Stars in My Crown." Now Ed insists, "I'll never leave."

As to the people he was told he would surely have to cope with, he claims he has never encountered them. Perhaps the reason is that Ed relies on an ancient philosophy of human nature that "if you dig a hole for someone, you're sure to fall in it yourself."
