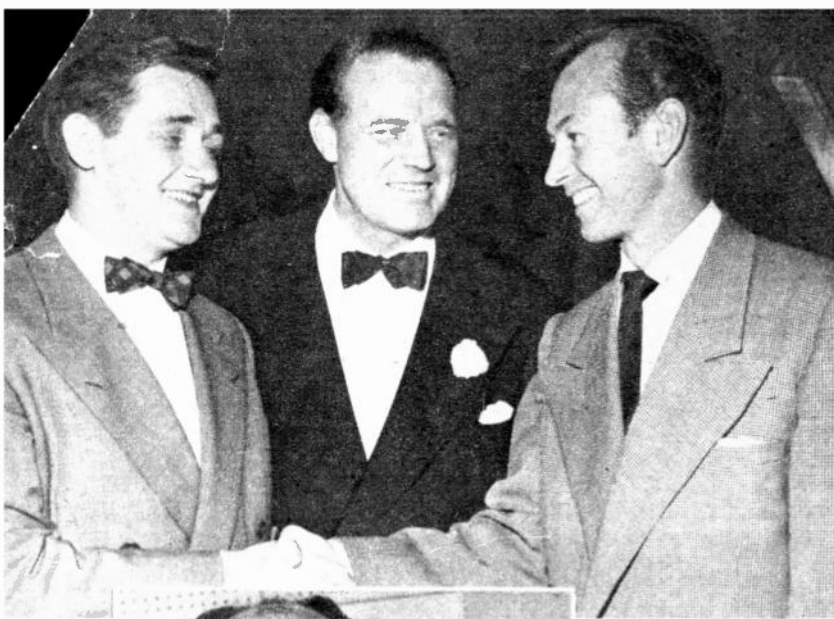

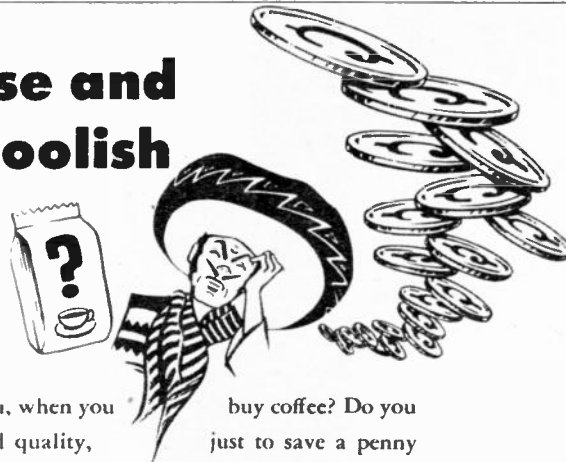

The role was the start of many radio commitments including "One Man's Family," the Fanny Brice show, the late Frank Morgan's program and over 200 radio shows in all. He is now "Donnie Henderson" on CBS's "Beulah" airer.

A dialectician, Henry has just finished narrating a documentary film, "Our Island," made in Tahiti and written by Lela Rogers, mother of actress Ginger Rogers. The feature-length picture tells picturesquely of life on the island with Henry as "Ru," a Tahitian native boy.

To prepare for the film, Henry was tutored in the language by a real chieftain and reveals that while the dialect is difficult, the vocabulary is quite simple since there are only

sixteen letters to the alphabet and the words are composed mostly of vowels.

Hobbies

Last year Henry developed an interest in interior decorating and put his French Provincial tastes to the task of redecorating his bedroom. He loves horses, and although he sold his steed, "Denver," he is determined to get another thoroughbred jumper.

At present his favorite possessions are clothes, a Great Dane affectionately called "Honey Girl," clothes, and a bright-blue Oldsmobile '98" convertible. He almost forgot to mention that clothes are one of his main loves.

Girls!

For all his teen-age polish, Henry is quite timid when asked what he thinks of girls. His idea of a real splashy evening is to "go to the opera and then on to dance the Charleston at the Mocambo." He prefers, in the plural, the intelligent—but cute—type and, like a respectable gentleman, has blacklisted the "beautiful but dumb" kind . . . his opinion, which he gave through gritted teeth, was, "Those girls are all right until they start talking . . . but then, oh murder!"

NOT ONLY does Doye O'Dell, who nightly entertains for the small fry over Channel 5, look and talk like a real cowboy, but he actually was raised on a cattle ranch in Plainview, Texas.

Being a true son of the West, Doye was "no higher than a heifer" when he learned to sing and play the guitar. When he was in his teens, Doye left home to sing for Amarillo's station WDAG. A year later the bright lights of New York lured him

to the East, and for two years he entertained in Schenectady, where NBC signed the Texas lad to a four-year contract.

While he was touring New England, a Monogram Pictures executive caught Doye's act and liked it so much that he offered to bring the singing, guitar-playing cowboy to Hollywood. "I didn't even let the ink dry on the contract before boarding that West-bound plane . . . I didn't like New York!" Doye reveals.

In Marines

In 1945, just as Doye was set for stardom, the war interrupted and he served in the Marines for two and a half years. Upon his return home, Doye discovered that the picture situation had changed and the opportunities were hard to find. "My old friend 'Wild Bill' Elliott put me back on my feet," he claims, "by introducing me to Herbert Yates, head of Republic Pictures." Again Doye was handed a motion-picture contract.

Besides completing nine "Marshal O'Dell" epics (soon to be released on television), Doye is also a popular

recording artist on the Mercury label. He is composer of that best-selling Western ditty, "Dear Okie."

Cowboy Duds

Looking like a real Texan, Doye dresses in the typical duds of cowboy hat, piped shirt and fancy boots. He used to buck broncos and in remembrance of his rodeo days wears an ornately carved belt buckle from the Radio Cowboys' Association of America.

Popular with children because he tells them interesting yarns, introduces famous Western artists and asks the youngsters to come down and guest on his teleshow, Doye is really very quiet when away from the cameras and appears to be extremely modest about his career.

One thing he is quite proud of and will tell immediately is that he was "born in Texas and reared in Texas" . . . however, Doye didn't "wed in Texas," for he married a former California model, Ruth, and they now live in Van Nuys. Anyway, he's got a lovely palomino, "Blondie," which helps keep him from getting too homesick.

We could be wrong, but from here it looks like CBS-TV's "Teller of Tales," featuring both **Maugham's** short stories and **Somerset** himself as stage setter, approximates ABC-TV's "Billy Rose Show" on which Rose's stories are dramatized and Billy himself sets the stage! The similarity of thought behind the formats in no way detracts from the excellence of either! . . . "Double or Nothing" emcee **Walter O'Keefe** is taping his radio shows as fast as possible so that he can take off for Gotham and six days of video activity which encompasses seven shows. . . . Song-and-dance team **Peggy Ryan** and **Ray McDonald** to New York soon to present a closed-circuit audition of their new TV show, "Tap Time," which NBC-TV wants. . . . Peggy and Ray have shaped a half-hour format featuring dancing stars of today and yesterday with a special showcase for amateur hopefuls. . . . TV emcee and sportscaster **Bill Welsh** and **Antrim Short**, his manager, have organized a video packaging firm to be known as "Man About Sports, Inc.," and will devote the format of their video series entirely to the field of sports. Welsh and Short are prepping a basketball show as their initial entry. (Bill is currently working on a Columbia picture featuring the Harlem Globetrotters, and we can't help wondering if maybe this fine pro team aren't part of the "initial entry"?). . . . Those good **DuMont** kinescoped shows, now seen on KTSN, will have to go when CBS-TV takes over the video portion of the **Don Lee Enterprises**. Most likely bidder for the films ("Touchdown," "Starlight Time," "Famous Jury Trials," "Hands of Destiny," to name but a few) is rumored to be **KFI-TV**.

Berle (Milton, that is) is leading a twelve-city **Hooper** survey by nineteen points as of the last week in October. . . . Looks like something new has been added. A downtown theater carried the televised football game in its lobby one recent Saturday. Now, did it require a paid admission to get in to see this game, and if so, how come the **SC-UCLA** business management, **KTTV** and **Hoffman** aren't squawking? . . . More good films coming up for

KECA-TV's Chevrolet Triple Feature Theater are: "The Gentle Sex" with **Lilli Palmer**; "They Met in the Dark" and "Secret Mission" with **James Mason**; **Beatrice Lillie** in "On Approval" and "Beware of Pity," featuring **Sir Cedric Hardwicke** and **Lilli Palmer**. . . . **Wallace Stark**, famed mural and portrait painter, has been signed by **Jerry Courneya** as art director for the series of fifty-two television shorts which Courneya is producing for **Bing Crosby Enterprises**. . . . **Clark Dennis** was offered a permanent emcee role on **KTLA's "Bandstand Review"** as a result of his standout job during his three performances on that show. If his bookings can be worked out, the popular tenor may take over the spot. . . . **Patti Page**, a standout even among the array that graces **Berle's** show, is set for more appearances with the crazy one. . . . The "Chimplock Hums" series, starring chimp star "**Tamba**," is rolling again. **Tamba** got back into the video swim after five weeks of movie work for **Universal**. . . . They are calling **Chico Marx**, of ABC-TV's "College Bowl," the "Knut Rockne of television." On his first show he called five football predictions right on the nose, including the **Notre**

Dame-Tulane and **Army-Michigan** tilts.

Amateur Photogs Take Note

KTTV received a good number of requests from amateur photographers for instructions on how to get a clear picture off their TV screens. They recently issued the following simple specifications for this fascinating new hobby.

Set your camera firmly on a tripod, put on a portrait lens, and move in close for a big image. Make sure of your focus. Open the diaphragm fully and set the shutter at a slow speed—anywhere from 1/5 second to 1/25 second. With your finger on the cable release, wait for the moment when your subjects are moving least.

Among the techniques reported to KTTV, here are two which produce excellent results:

A Rolleicord with a No. 1 Portra lens over its regular Triotar and an exposure of 1/10th second at f3.5 on Plus X 120 film.

A Bantam with 1/25 second exposure at f4.5.

Television Survey

Sales of television receivers in this area during the month of September took another good hop, as shown by the following figures compiled by the Electric League of Los Angeles, Incorporated.

Total estimated number of television receivers in the area covered by the Los Angeles signals as of September 30.....747,807
Total figure as of August 31.....693,369

Total for September, 1950..... 54,498

The total estimated population reached by the Los Angeles signals is 5,092,482. An average of five viewers to each set installed, including the set owner's family and guests, gives a total of 3,739,335 "lookers and listeners."

The above figures mean an outlay in the area of approximately \$207,000,000.00.

Rose Parade Goes North

Another television "first" for Los Angeles and San Francisco will be established on January 1, 1951, when KTTV's coverage of the sixty-second annual Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade is for the first time transmitted by microwave to San Francisco, where Northern California television

After all, if it's dog food you can always have a baby feeding a dog, an unbeatable attention-getter—but what can you do with a bottle of wine? Whatever good can be done, Piuma did it!

... To the whole set-up of KNBH's "The Little Show," starring John Conte. Of particular interest is the vintage of the songs usually paraded.

... To the warbling on the Campbell Soup commercials done by the Modernaires. You can hear 'em on the Jack Carter show Saturday nights.

"This Is Show Business"

Like everyone else, people in the entertainment realm have problems too... and so goes the format of CBS-TV's "This Is Show Business," which weekly counsels comedians, singers, dancers and dramatists fortunate enough to be paid for their troubles.

Panelists who pass the advice back and forth are playwright George S. Kaufman, comic Abe Burrows and writer-critic Clifton Fadiman, who acts as host-moderator. These three wise men are aided and abetted in their verbal battles on "who should do what and why" by equally astute guests like Faye Emerson, Gypsy Rose Lee, and Thomas McCaffery.

Most of the difficulties that confront the performers are of a nature pertaining to show business, and when Page Eight

talked over by the professional panel make sensible, enlightening listening. "Stranger Than Fiction"

In a television series that closely parallels the old John Hix motion-picture features and Ripley's "Believe It or Not" newspaper syndication, United World Films presents each week, on film, vignettes of people, places and things that are literally stranger than fiction.

Three or four oddities are presented during each half hour—a recent typical array being a peek into the home of Donald Douglas, plane builder of worldwide reputation who for kicks builds model boats and harpoon guns, laboring along with the most amateur of home-builder kits. He's the man who at his disposal has engineering brains, drafting boards, and probably the best in dies and tools. But Douglas would rather putter at home—for fun.

C. B. Barton's Klamath Falls farm is completely stocked in black and white stock and pets. What fiction writer would have dreamed up white rats, cows, black cats and goats, white deer and turkeys, and black buffalo and dogs, as four-legged dwellers of an otherwise regular farm enterprise?

Miniature trains aren't at a premium—but the one shown on "Stranger

Than Fiction" hit a new high in to-scale perfection.

"What's My Line?"

For a fisherman, the above-named half hour is, from where we have been sitting, the most informative period on television's packed schedule.

Conducted by Mary and Charlie (Mr. and Mrs. J. Charles Davis II), the thirty minutes start with locales, lines and general tips, and work up, or down, as you will, to guestings, films and still pictures.

Every program offers schedules of boats, their itinerary, their catches and reservation information. The Davises seem to know what boats bring in the most and biggest, too, from their reports . . . as compared with our own dismal catches.

Equipment, both in use and out (e.g., nylon line loses a couple of pounds test weight when wet) is discussed. Trips for the sportsman with but a few days leisure are outlined; pictures of the destination and the piscatorial prizes obtainable there are shown; equipment for these jaunts is suggested.

Guests, many times dragging fish as big as themselves, trophies which tag them as world champions of skin diving, or motion-picture film of especially exciting episodes on the briny, always appear to contribute.


During the Sunset Line sponsorship of this excellent show, a contest loaded with good prizes ran. We hope for the best in the way of new sponsorship for Mary and Charlie—not only in hope of more contests, but because if ever a show deserved good sponsorship, this one does. Not the least of its interesting facets is the concise, brisk manner in which the Davises trot their show along its too short thirty minutes.

J. Smiley performed, got a good hand, then was rushed off-stage so a lovely model who just happened to be part of a commercial could make her appearance. Oh, yes, he again addressed Burnette as "Barnett" on Smiley's way out. Oh, brother!

"Blind Date"

A sharp-witted bit of femininity named Arlene Francis once upon a time had a radio show called "Blind Date," in which she pitted young men contestants against one another. The prizes were whirls about town with lovely models, to places a gentleman of distinction would be proud to have as background for his photo.

Now the show is on television, and there seldom were a more natural group of components for the visual than lie in "Blind Date." Good looking young fellows, pretty girls, and Arlene herself, who, when she doesn't become unbearably coy or gushy, can give any of her model lovelies a run for their money.

The game is simple enough to preclude any explanation. The business of boys vying for dates with girls is a little older than Solomon, although not usually done for the sake of amusing the public.

On the first show, October 12, an appropriate kick-off found six likeable lads who had already emerged winners in previous "Blind Date" competitions. The All-American lineup included representatives of Yale, Princeton, Colgate, and Columbia. Arlene, looking gorgeous, put them through paces that brought out two packages

Horace Heidt Show

Monday, 8:30 p.m.
KTTV, Channel 11

In a format identical to the radio prototype, Horace Heidt debuted his television of the "Original Youth Opportunity Program," filmed during an October bash at the Hollywood Bowl, over Channel 11.

As he has done for the past three years, "Horace—for Philip Morris"—highlights his thirty-minute reviews with the cream of young talent he has "discovered" throughout the nation.

Seen on the opener were previous radio winners, "The Pepperettes," a trio of dewy-eyed girls who sang out in a lusty interpretation of "I Didn't Know the Gun Was Loaded," and Pierce Knox, the remarkable blind boy whose talents at the xylophone rewarded him with the \$250 championship and a chance to compete on following shows until the honors are bestowed upon another contestant. As of last week Pierce was trying for his fifth victory in a row. Other two participants on the program were tap dancer Jeanne Harvey and pianist Conley Graves.

With the exception of too-often repeated panning to one particular portion of the audience (we would have liked to see how the other spectators were reacting to the acts, too), the camera did an excellent job of lensing the whole of the Bowl and following the performers so that they were in complete focus throughout their stints.

Heidt naturally displays a terrific amount of showmanship and makes a good appearance on the screen. Glib as he is, Heidt gets a little carried away in his sparkling introductions and fancy build-ups which could make a viewer feel that he's getting too much of a good thing and, consequently, change channels.

On Lens (About Studio Happenings)

Backdrops on the Double

If you've wondered how television shows produce those huge background scenes that change in a split second, you should know about Teleflex. It's something brand-new in television.

Teleflex is the name of a process developed by a Los Angeles firm to provide video shows with theater-size screens and projectors that throw clear, lifelike images on the screen from the rear, thus giving the stage set a huge backdrop.

More than 15,000 different photographic scenes and artistic designs have been collected on glass slides by the Teleflex firm to enable television producers to have the entire world at their command.

Famous places are most in demand

for TV show backdrops, says Miss Donna Fargo, the company's president and general manager.

"Our Teleflex screens give the shows an opportunity to use dozens of different scenes in one show, something impossible with stage sets," she said.

Her firm furnishes slides, projectors and screens for shows of the American Broadcasting Company in Hollywood, New York and Chicago. Other networks and independent stations throughout the country soon will be using Teleflex process.

A typical show that relies heavily on Teleflex for its entertainment is "Stop, Look and Listen," the quiz show starring Art Baker on KECA-TV, seen Wednesdays at ten p.m. This show uses a panel of guests each week and asks the panel to guess the identity of pictures thrown on the giant screen.

Now You See Him— Now You Don't

Ever wonder how Art Baker, on KECA-TV's triple movie program, gets into and out of those Chevrolet commercials? He's baffling local viewers by walking right into a scene to plug his sponsor's automobile.

It works thus: At intervals during the three films, the intermission is suddenly called, and Baker appears in whatever the last scene has been in the film. This is done by the clever use of a still photograph on a slide which is thrown on a Teleflex screen in the TV studios, the shot having been taken from a frame of the film.

The TV camera expertly picks up the screen image to make it look like part of the movie film. In this manner, Baker appears to be in the film, but isn't.

The Church Into Homes Via Video

Great credit goes to the First Presbyterian Church of Hollywood for pioneering the spread of religious fare into homes by means of television. Under the leadership of Dr. Louis H. Evans, and with the guidance of the Reverend Clifton E. Moore, minister of radio and television, the First Presbyterian Church has inaugurated a series of television vespers to be seen Sundays at 5:00 on KNBH's Channel 4. KNBH donates the time for these services, and to them goes great credit, too.

While the Sunday sunset services have been started by the church named above, they are to be completely non-denominational. All churches can and will participate with the help of Reverend Moore. The weekly formats are designed to include some top name of the entertainment world who reads to the viewing public his favorite Scripture and tells why it is his favorite passage.

Starting on November 12, this fine series is slated for telecasting at five o'clock on Channel 4, with only December 3 (because of a previous station commitment) finding the program at another hour which should be announced in the television log.

Here is the name of the winner: Mrs. P. F. Sheehan, 22630 So. Main St., Torrance, Calif.

The hint is: Here is how to make a good dog bed that's easy to keep clean. Cut a piece of plywood according to the size needed for the dog (give him plenty of room). Make a comfortable pad, preferably of denim, lightweight canvas or such material. Then make a pillow slip of the same material, slightly larger than the pad. Put a few large snaps on inside of slip hem. Slide pad into slip and then slide plywood board inside also. Snap the slip at end. And there you are. On wash day, slide off, wash and return to bed.

HERE IS A HINT FOR LEVELING SOIL: Either in the garden or when making a new patch of lawn. Attach a board to the rake and the job becomes quite simple. The board should be a little wider and a little deeper than the rake. Drill a pair of holes, several inches apart on each side of the center of the board and fasten the board to the rake with wire.

HERE IS AN EASY WAY TO PEEL TOMATOES. Stick the tomato on a fork and hold it over the gas flame until the skin breaks. Then it's a simple matter to peel.

HERE IS HOW TO CLEAN YOUR PANAMA OR FELT HATS when they get finger-marked or dingy. Just take a slice of bread, break it in two or three pieces and rub it all over the surface of the hat, rubbing a little extra on the soiled places, then brush the crumbs off and PRESTO! your hat is fresh and clean.

FOR A HANDY CAKE PLATE TO TAKE TO CHURCH BAZAARS, etc., take a heavy piece of stiff cardboard, cover with aluminum foil. This way, you don't have to carry the plate home with you.

Victor Records is re-issuing **Walter O'Keefe's** "The Man on the Flying Trapeze." . . . **Frank De Vol** is lining up an all-new fifteen-piece orchestra for his Hollywood Palladium debut November 14, since his radio musicians are restricted from playing for him outside of their five-a-week broadcasts because of union quota limitations. DeVol has already set vocalist **Helen O'Connell** and a harmony group called the Dream Makers. All will be heard on his nightly CBS Palladium broadcasts. . . . **George Fisher's** marriage to **Mary Ann Holt** of Hollywood on September 16 was just recently revealed. Scene of their nuptials was Carson City, Nevada. . . . The press is being partied in Las Vegas to witness the creation of a "Johnny Dollar" radio script built around a gambling situation and using the Nevada city as background. . . . "Lux" announcer **John Milton Kennedy** will appear in the Warners' film "Lullaby of Broadway" — as a radio announcer. . . . **Virginia Kaye** and **Robert Haag** are the replacements on "Rosemary." . . . **Dr. Charles E. Funk**, editor emeritus of Funk & Wagnalls since his retirement three years ago, is the new Speech Consultant for the Columbia Broadcasting System. Dr. Funk recently authored "Thereby Hangs a Tale," volume devoted to stories of curious word origins. . . . **Rebel Randall** is emceeing "Juke Box USA" for AFRS, five times a week. . . . **Laurence Olivier** will be on "Lux" November 6, maybe doing "Rebecca."

Radio Korea

YOKOHAMA — It was quiet, that morning in Seoul. The quiet that follows a desperate battle. An oc-

casional sniper was still heard, distant and alone. It seems no one had told them the city had been retaken by the United Nations forces. It was Wednesday, October 4.

The quiet of the city was suddenly broken. A voice, distinctly American, disturbed the silence by saying: "Good morning. This is Armed Forces Radio in Seoul, broadcasting on 610 kilocycles. We now bring you the news."

All day long, twenty-one hours a day to be exact, the inhabitants of Seoul and outlying areas, civilian and military alike, are now provided with music, news, chatter and just plain radio fare.

Actually, that early-morning voice wasn't a Communist trick. It all started back in Tokyo, when plans were being drawn up for the Inchon landing. General Headquarters decided that along with the fighting forces should go an AFRS unit. It was to be set up in Seoul as soon as the city was secured.

Instructions to establish the station were issued to Headquarters, Japan Logistical Command. Men had to be collected, equipment located and readied. Major Edgar L. Tidwell, of San Diego, radio officer, immediately began plans for obtaining personnel from AFRS stations throughout Japan and getting an entire radio station crated for shipment at a moment's notice.

By October 20, First Lieutenant Albert O. Jones, officer in charge of the new station, Francis X. Crosby, a civilian radio engineer, and seven enlisted men, along with crate after crate of equipment, were waiting in Yokohama for Seoul to be retaken.

First to leave was Crosby, who had worked as a radio engineer for the Economic Cooperation Administration in Seoul before the war began. He left, with two enlisted men, on September 28. When they arrived at Kimpo air field, snipers were still serious about their rights as defending heroes. Crosby's job was to find a studio and make arrangements for the arrival of the station crew.

The second wave of AFRS Seoul personnel departed from Yokohama on October 1. All the equipment necessary to operate a radio station was loaded on a plane at Tachikawa Air Field and with the eight men flown to Ashiya. There the delicate equipment was transferred aboard a plane for Kimpo. They arrived at ten p.m. Sunday and made their way through the rubble to Seoul.

Crosby had found the former WVTP radio studios in the American Embassy

building in the heart of Seoul. The retreating Reds had attempted to destroy the building. Two bombs had been exploded in the basement. Fortunately for AFRS Seoul, they only blew out one corner and damaged the lobby a bit. The building had been looted, but the sound-proof studios were in good condition.

The nine men worked for 48 hours setting up the station. Turntables had to be constructed, rooms wired, transformers connected and antennas erected. During this time the men were sleeping on cushions on the floor and eating when they could.

Then the eventful moment arrived. At 7 a.m. on Wednesday, October 4, just three days after it had arrived in Korea, AFRS Seoul was on the air. The crew settled down to enjoy the fruits of its labors.

But the station didn't stay on the air for long. It seems that Crosby had strung the antenna up the side of the eight-story Embassy building, across the street and up a smoke stack atop a building 30 feet away. A Korean, innocently cleaning the top floor of the Embassy building, decided to throw some trash out the window. Down came the antenna. Crosby climbed up the eight flights, fixed the antenna and the station was back on the air. A few minutes later, out came a chair, down came the antenna. Up the building went Crosby. When it happened the third time Crosby lost his temper. He posted himself in the street below with a carbine. A shot in the air gave public notice that this was not the city dump.

AFRS Seoul is now on the air again, this time without any hitch. Lieutenant Jones reports they have the best audience in the world. Every member of the staff is doing his utmost to see that the United Nations forces in Korea get the best radio programs possible.

CBS Shows Rate Top

CBS radio programs have an overwhelming lead, both daytime and nighttime, over all other networks, according to the new National Nielsen Ratings Top Radio Programs listings.

The Nielsen ratings give CBS the top six nighttime programs and the top six daytime shows. In each part of the broadcast schedule, CBS garnered eight of the top ten positions.

The network's nighttime shows in the top ten are "Life With Luigi," "Lux Radio Theatre," "Mr. and Mrs. North," "Mr. Chameleon," "Mystery Theatre," "Truth or Consequences,"

"Gangbusters" and "Mr. Keen, Tracer of Lost Persons."

CBS daytime programs in the top ten are "Romance of Helen Trent," "Ma Perkins," "Our Gal Sunday," "Arthur Godfrey Time," "Aunt Jenny," "Big Sister," "Wendy Warren and the News" and "Guiding Light."

Frank Fontaine Signed

Frank Fontaine, who scored so heavily on the Jack Benny show with his "John Sivoneyyyyyy" character, has been signed by CBS to an exclusive two-year radio-television contract. For the time being, he'll continue being heard on Benny broadcasts and making guest appearances on other Columbia shows, while the network's program department prepares a new TV series for him.



New News Set-Up

Dick Joy, veteran CBS news broadcaster, is now being heard on "Ten O'Clock Wire," for seven years a nightly news feature originating at Hollywood's KNX studios and aired over the entire Columbia Pacific Network.

With the new set-up, Joy will be carried only by KNX, with Chet Huntley continuing the network show through November 11 when Grant Holcomb, currently director of the news bureau for KCBS, San Francisco, will take over. Huntley will then devote his entire time to his program of news analysis aired over CPN at 5:30 p.m., daily except Sunday.

Dick Joy first joined CBS in 1937 as an announcer and special-events broadcaster. He is now part owner of Palm Springs station KCMJ.

In announcing this change in the

popular news program, it was explained that in presenting a regional network news program, there is an obvious restriction on the presentation of national news in relation to the community being served.

"We feel," KNX general manager Merle Jones said, "it is an obligation and responsibility of station KNX to offer news broadcasts as an area service rather than a regional service. While the full CBS network broadcasts of Edward R. Murrow and Lowell Thomas and the regional network programs of Chet Huntley, all carried by KNX, are unsurpassed in their coverage of national and world events, it still seems necessary to us to bring many of these news happenings closer to our KNX area so they can be presented in relation to their importance to Southern Californians!"

KNX has expanded its news bureau to obtain more complete local coverage for both its twelve o'clock noon news show and the "Ten O'Clock Wire" program.

Talking Chimes

No doubt you've noticed that the NBC chimes are now talking, enunciating the names of the network's stellar attractions. The new venture is part of the network's "Three Chimes Mean Good Times" promotional campaign.

A casual remark to a newspaperman by Charles Barry, NBC Vice-President in charge of Radio Programming, to the effect that the "chimes will talk this fall" resulted in the "Talking Chimes."

Pat Steel, manager of the Audience Promotion Section, worked out the Talking Chimes with the sonovox division of Free & Peters, the outfit responsible, among other phenomena, for Bromo Seltzer's familiar "Talking Train."

Sonovox works like this: The individual "chime" tones are sounded on a novachord. Wiring from the novachord bypasses the loudspeaker, brings the tone directly to two miniature loudspeakers which the "articulator" holds against his or her throat.

The sound of the novachord is transmitted through the walls of the throat, and by silently forming the words the articulator actually makes the chime tones speak without using his own voice or whispering.

"Barty" Feted

"Barty," radio-performing cat of Hal Nichols, owner-manager of KFOX, Long Beach, has been selected from among the cats of America to appear on the 1951 "National Cat Week" seals and posters throughout the United States, according to an announcement received from Dr. Guy Bogart, National Vice-Chairman and California State Chairman of "National Cat Week, Inc."

Considered to be the highest honor which can come to a cat, the National Cat Week selection was based on "Barty's" "outstanding personality and

on the fact that he is probably the best-known living cat in America today."

For a number of years, the handsome tortoise-and-white Nichols feline has been a performer on his master's "Memory Room" program (6:30 nightly on KFOX, Long Beach). "Barty" is probably the most-publicized animal of his kind, having been pictured and written about in magazines and periodicals throughout the U. S. and in Great Britain, Australia, and other foreign countries.

National Cat Week is being observed this year November 7 through 13.

Hope for Korea

The President of South Korea came to see the Bob Hope show during the NBC comedian's Korean tour, but he couldn't get a seat out front. There were too many GI's. And the GI's had been there hours before the show was due to go on.

Almost 3,000 American fighting men, wearing helmets and carrying rifles and sidearms, thronged Seoul's National Theater, which was built to hold 1,700. The men jammed the aisles of the main floor and the two balconies, climbed on the window sills in the outside corridors, poured into the wings and backstage and even stood behind the stage curtain where they could hear but not see Hope and his cast record Bob's NBC show.

In the meantime Syngman Rhee, President of the Republic of Korea, sat in the lighting technician's box to the side and above the stage.

Beef Puff

(For that left-over roast)

- 3 c. diced cold roast beef
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 2 c. hot mashed potatoes
- 1 T. fresh horseradish
- 2 t. salt
- Few grains cayenne
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 c. shredded cheese
- 1 T. butter or margarine

Combine onion, potatoes, horseradish, salt and cayenne. (You may enjoy braising the onion in the butter before adding.) Combine milk and beaten egg, then stir into potato mixture. Fold in diced beef, turn into casserole, dot with additional butter or margarine, and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, for about forty-five minutes. Serve hot.

Sleepy-eyed, Curt and Martha Tilton and Country Western's orchestra gather to plane in the airfield-Suisun, California. Destination: Korean Air Lift, Eastern terminal for returning wounded and embarking troops. Fog grounds the jittery travelers until noon when the Army plane finally takes off. Ten minutes out, a motor coughs, quits and the pilot turns back with a load of suddenly "green" passengers. Still in flight, it catches again and the plane resumes course. Two hours later a landing and the troupe, dragging musical instruments, rush into the terminal building to face an audience of 300 grim-faced youngsters leaving in a few minutes for war, rifles at their sides and wearing steel helmets. For one hour the troupe improvises on a too-small stage and with a p.a. system that distorts music and voices. But from that first note of music, smiles light up the faces of those youngsters. They relax and forget war for the moment and are happy. And, in that same instant, the performers forget their discomforts. With cheers and whistles ringing in their ears, Massey, Tilton and Washburne and his orchestra are rushed in cars and trucks to the hospital where, just two hours before, two plane loads of seriously injured from Korea had arrived. Then that first step into a ward of forty boys, pain and the experience of war written vividly on their faces. A choked feeling as they talk to kids badly wounded, legs and arms gone. It is in that first step into the ward that everyone in the troupe comes to the full realization that this IS war. The headlines, serious before, here become stunning, overwhelming reality. For hour after perspiring hour, Curt, Martha, Country and his orchestra play and sing, going from ward to ward and into rooms where there are only one or two boys in serious condition. Curt and Martha sit on their beds and talk to them about home and sing to them softly. The smiles that come into those eyes are all the satisfaction the entertainers need. Perry Botkin, the guitarist, sums it up best when the troupe leaves the hospital for the first meal in twelve hours and the trip back home: "Do you know I never believed I could forget I was hungry. I did, and it's too bad we can't stay a week." Curt and Martha chorus, "We'll be back." That's the story of ALL show people. They give—gladly and wholeheartedly—the only thing they have to sell.

Who's Van Wooten?

Bob Crosby received a cryptic wire the other day from Yank Lawson, former trumpeter in the Bobcats. It read: "Alec Van Wooten arriving Municipal Airport, 2 p.m. Please meet plane."

Bob had never heard of Alec Van Wooten, and he was surprised to hear from Lawson. However, he asked his wife, June, to meet the plane inasmuch as he would be deep in rehearsal for CBS's "Club 15" at the time.

June was punctual, and so was Van Wooten, a full-grown German shepherd dog, now a happy addition to the Crosby menage.

Composer Can't Stop

Gene Von Hallberg, composer and musician with NBC in one capacity or another for the past twenty years, says that once you start composing there's no stopping, night or day.

He estimates that the volume of music he has composed in ten years for NBC's "Mr. District Attorney" bridges, which average ten seconds each, would equal twenty-five symphonies in length.

Von Hallberg has been evolving his musical theories since early childhood in his native Brockton, Massachusetts. His older brother, Sven, bought and studied records to learn the styles of different dance bands, and trained little Gene to do the same. Gene began playing piano in his brother's combos when he was twelve and hasn't stopped since then.

Gene has a large music library and specializes in learning styles very fast. Writing a successful score for a radio program involves pleasing the following persons: the players in the orchestra, the orchestra leader, the director of the program, the listening public and, most important of all, as a point of pride, fellow arrangers.

"Every musician composes and plays for other musicians," he asserts. "Beyond technique, what have you got philosophically? You can evoke any emotion with one chord—but it must be the right chord!"

Said the pretty little Richman, "That just shows you what training and talent can do!" as though speaking of a Curci-like coloratura solo on an old Victor red seal!

Ames Brothers (Coral) have a top pair of contrasty etchings in the up-tempo'd "Oh, Babe!" and the calm but rhythmic "To Think You've Chosen Me," easily the boys' best since "Sentimental Me." . . . **Connie Haines** (Coral) offers her easy and relaxed versions of "Why Do I Love You?" and "I Must Have That Man." . . . The effective charm here is in straight vocal against rhythm instrumental backing of small group. . . . **Billy Eckstine** (MGM) is another artist who plays it straight on "I'll Know" and "I've Never Been in Love Before." . . . Accent is on "Love," but both tunes make fine material for Mr. B.'s equally fine talents. . . . **Eddie Miller** (Capitol) has a fine rocking instrumental in "Who, Me?"—but, aside from a little reed squeak toward the close, the flip, "Hour of Parting," is one of the best showcases for Eddie's tenor sax in many a moon. . . . **Bing Crosby** (Decca) handles the vocal chores on "Marrying for Love" and "The Best Thing for You" sans vocal tricks on a pair of tunes that will have to be heard more than once to register. . . . Classically, the week's best is the Capitol-Telefunken LP edition of Beethoven's Second Symphony and a superbly brilliant reading by **Erich Kleiber** conducting the Brussels Radio Symphony Orchestra. . . . **Elliott Lawrence Orch.** (Decca), with fine choral assist, offers the old grads' lament, "The Beer That I Left on the Bar," and the radio alma mater, "Halls of Ivy." . . . Both are done in strict tempo, and while this might be more commercial, much of the beauty of Vic Knight's fine lyrics to "Ivy" is lost. . . . **Jerry Lester** (Coral) debuts as a wax artist on "Orange Colored Sky" and "Time Takes Care of Everything," and while his vocal ability leaves much to be desired, radio and TV fans will like the typical Lesterisms on this platter. . . . **The Andrews Sisters** (Decca) do a swell job on "Guys and Dolls," backed by a tongue-in-cheek version of "Bushel and a Peck." . . . **Georgia Gibbs** finally etched her top night-club number "Ballin' the Jack," for Coral, and from here it looks like a potential hit for Her Nibbs. . . . RADIO-TV

Lifelines

I CAN'T TAKE THE PINKY LEE fade-out on KNBH without piping a protest. Thursday, last week, was the wistful little comedian's final stand on his TV stanza, and the way we get it, money was the only reason Pinky didn't continue. He claims that with a talent budget of only \$2000 a week, he was actually out of pocket trying to give viewers a solid telecast. His pleas for another \$1000 were apparently deafened by the sponsor. And so, Hollywood loses one of the two live programs it has of any stature (in New York, all they do is throw it in your face to name any outside Pinky and Alan Young that can hold a candle to Bigtown's offerings).

THIS PENNY-PINCHING IN HOLLYWOOD makes a person rather heavy-hearted. I am told that the budget for orchestra alone on a top-drawer N. Y. TV production comes to more than the entire talent budget on a "big" TV show here. Someone has pointed out that Hollywood is to be commended for coming up with shows as good as Lee's and Young's, for by relying on resourcefulness and necessity mothering invention, Hollywood video is actually growing sturdier than the East Coast's budget-pampered offspring. Just the same, I'd like to see the local lads get off the plain bread diet once in a while and gorge themselves on cake.

THOSE WHO SAY WE WILL NEVER get big budgets here until we have the lookers like the other coast may have a point, but they are overlooking the fact that Los Angeles has more TV sets than any other city in the country, except New York. I still think that is amazing.

SEE WHERE THEY HAVE HAD a shake-up on Frank Sinatra's show. I think it will take more than that to make The Verve a video star. Whose idea was it, anyway?

DID YOU SEE THE CHEVY TRUCK commercial on "Triple Theater" the other night? That real sharp truck driver was ABC publicist Jerry Ross (one of the nicest in the biz), who was asked to do the commercial because he looks a lot like the guy on the billboards plastered all over town.

ALL THE PEOPLE WHO ASSUMED Hoffman would get the Don Lee radio and video interests keeled back on their heels when CBS topped the bid by a needed ten per cent. Seems very few realized how much CBS wanted a TV channel. It's been no trade secret that all has not been bliss in the KTTV set-up, where the L. A. Times has a controlling 51 per cent interest and CBS the remaining minority. ABC is set with its Channel 7, NBC-TV has Channel 4, KTTV is on Channel 11, and that leaves three: KLAC-TV, which isn't interested in selling now that Jarvis and the other daytime programming has the operation out of the red; KFI-TV, which Earle C. Anthony still hugs tightly; and KTSN, Channel 2, belonging to Don Lee, which CBS will acquire in the transaction with

Yankee Network. Hoffman claimed to have bid \$1,000,000 more than the Lee properties were worth, so that makes the CBS bid about \$2,000,000 more than supposed value, but when you've got to have something, it may be cheap at almost any price, and that's why I think Hoffman, if he and his interests wanted to finagle a deal, should have bid just what the property was worth in the first place and then topped the CBS bid which tacked on 10 per cent over the original Hoffman offer. That, however, would probably have gotten Hoffman nowhere, as CBS must have been pretty determined to nab that channel. Could a twist now be for the FCC to unfreeze the channel allocations? CBS might then get something for millions less than it did No. 2.

EVERY DAY ON HIS "SECOND CUP of Coffee Club" program in the early morning on KNX and the Columbia Pacific Network, Harry Babbitt records a "personal platter" for somebody who has requested it. But last week he did a personal platter—with a capital "P." It was really that personal.

FIFTY YEARS AGO HARRY AND DAISY BABBITT of St. Louis were married. Out of that marriage, in addition to other children, was a Harry Babbitt, Jr.—today's CBS singing star.

SON HARRY DIDN'T FORGET about Father Harry when it came time to celebrate a Golden Wedding. That was why this particular personal platter was so important. Harry (the younger) sang a song for both his mother and father—for father it was "On a Bicycle Built for Two"—which begins with the words "Daisy, Daisy, give me your answer, do." For his mother he sang "I'm Just Wild About Harry."

The recording, with additional personal gifts, went to Mr. and Mrs. Babbitt in St. Louis—but although the accompanying gifts were thoughtful and impressive, his parents told Harry over the long-distance phone the gift they liked the most was . . . his personal platter.

IT ISN'T a startlingly novel discovery to find an actress who wants to play another type of role... such as doing girl roles rather than neurotics or little boys all the time. It is rather novel to find an actress as completely feminine as Marian Richman not being flung into the most overt sort of crinoline-and-lace ingenue stuff. But no. The gimmick voices, hags and small tots usually fall to her.

But Marian, as far as appearance goes, is no more out of place as a masculine moppet or a toothless witch than she was in the shipyards of San Francisco, working. Between schooling periods at UCLA and City College the ambitious girl had trekked to the Golden Gate City, foolishly allowing herself only two weeks in which to get that one "big break." Like most big breaks, hers didn't show in two weeks, and Marian found herself buried in the shipyard. "Opportunity Theater," a Sunday air show of young San Francisco talent, proved her outlet and her salvation, and ultimately led her back to Hollywood.

Men of Music --- *Norman Luboff*

No. 87 of a Series



ATALL, THIN, somewhat breathless young man hurried into a classroom at Chicago's Central College evening school. He dropped an armful of books he was carrying, straightened his tie, smoothed his hair, took a deep breath and launched into a lecture on counterpoint and harmony with the nonchalant ease that comes only from a mastery of the subject matter.

The boy was scarcely twenty, younger than most of his students. He had just left his own classes at the University of Chicago, and ahead of him lay long hours of study in preparation for morning recitation. His name was Norman Luboff.

Made the Grade

Today, at thirty-three, he is one of America's outstanding choir directors and arrangers. Coming to Hollywood in 1948 with a distinguished list of Chicago and New York credits, he

quickly established himself in West Coast network radio.

He is choir director for the "Railroad Hour" and the "Carmen Dragon Show," both over NBC. His arrangements are noted for their verve and rhythm. He gives them the dynamic direction of a perfectionist who knows what he wants.

Norman, a husky of over six feet and 215 pounds, talked about his "spindly" Chicago days during a rehearsal break on the "Railroad Hour" one day.

"I wasn't always so well nourished," he said somewhat apologetically, with a deprecating pat on his mid-section. "Those Chicago days were spindly in more ways than one."

He was born in Chicago in 1917. After preparatory schooling he en-

rolled in the University of Chicago and studied solfeggio, harmony, counterpoint and other related subjects for his music major.

"Most of the day was spent at University. In the evening I taught at Central, a liberal-arts school. Four afternoons a week I dished out hamburgers, cheese sandwiches and malts at a local drug store, and somehow found time to continue my piano studies and to sing in three church choirs weekly."

His graduate work was in composition and orchestration at the American Conservatory of Music.

After a radio debut with Chicago station WGN, as choral arranger, Luboff became choral coach for the network "Chicago Theatre of the Air." This was his first major assignment.

When Uncle Sam tapped him, Norman spent several years in the Signal Corps, where drill sergeants taught him the harmony of close-order formations.

Shortly after doffing his uniform, Luboff went to New York and sang his way into the heart of Betty Mulliner, a Syracuse soprano. In 1944 they were married.

In the meantime he had steadily forged ahead in choral arranging and choir direction. He became Ray Block's choir director and remained at that post for more than four years. Luboff handled the choirs on such programs as "March of Time," "Lucky Strike Show," "Evening in Paris," "Milton Berle Show," "Fred Allen Show" and many others. He

About the same time Marian and Daws cut records for Robert Leslie Bellem, whose "Flying Turtle," "Enchanted Toymaker" and "Sleepy Old Santa" (all three of which records and accompanying comic books got in about ten minutes under the war-time record cutting ban) are delighting children. Lyrics and dialogue on "The Flying Turtle" are originals by Daws and Marian.

Dialect Specialist

But the Richman talent hasn't always been confined to records. Marian has been heard, doing Irish, Spanish, French, Cockney British, Southern, Western, Continental, Scotch, or no accent at all, on such favorites as "Dr. Christian," "Family Theater," "NBC Theater," "California Caravan," "Johnny Dollar," "Escape," "Cisco," "Skippy," "Stars Over Hollywood," "Rocky Jordan," and others.

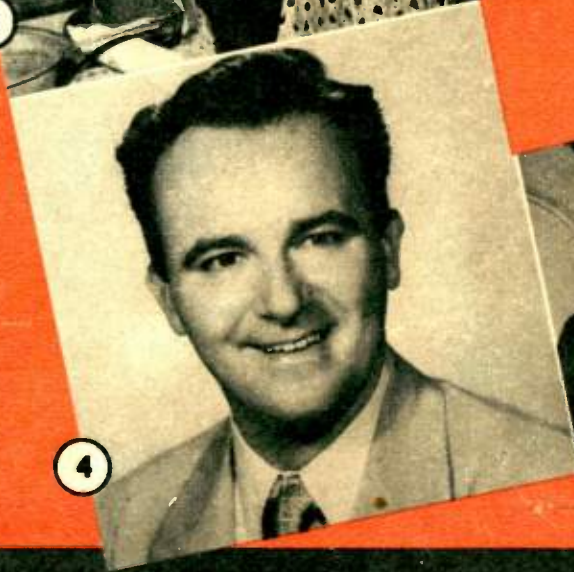
