JACKIE ROBINSON, the local boy who made good in a big way, revealed plans for eventual retirement from baseball during accompanying interview.

HEN Jackie Robinson decided to quit baseball after last season, it was the many letters he got from parents

he got from parents and children pleading with him not to that changed his mind. His Saturday radio broadcast on ABC (heard here on Mondays) has attracted bigger and better audiences, nine-tenths children. His own relaxation comes with playing with three-year-old Jackie, Jr. For the past two years he has worked with the YMCA as a youth counselor, a job which he eventually plans to make full-time. In his spare time, he visits children's hospitals and charity wards and answers letters that the youngsters write him. He wants to devote his life to making children happy, healthy and good citizens.

In Hollywood to make "The Jackie Robinson Story," the famed athlete had given ten interviews, posed for seven picture layouts, read the movie script and familiarized himself with the studio in the first four days. A Pasadena boy, Jackie was headlined for his exploits at UCLA between '39 and '41. Football, basketball and the broad jump won him three letters and national attention. He played baseball only one year in order to

make his fourth letter. "I batted .063," he laughs, "and if you don't know what that means—it isn't good."

Always interested in boys'-club work, Jackie joined a Negro ball club in order to get to the East to make contacts. He was shocked at the conditions under which the players were forced to live and determined to get into the big leagues. History was made when Jackie, the first Negro to crack the color line in our national game, was signed by the Dodgers. Voted the most valuable player in the National League last season, Jackie has more than lived April 21, 1950 up to the faith that Dodger boss Branch Rickey has had in him. And with all his success, Robinson has never for a moment forgotten his original ambition, to point the way to good citizenship for unfortunate children.

The Right Way

"Just letting the kids know that there is someone interested in them means so much," he emphasizes. He works on their tremendous interest in sports to pull them "the right way," as he calls it. If a small boy tells Jackie that he wants more than anything to be a big-league ballplayer, Jackie will point out that first of all he must have a good education and learn to take care of his body, being careful not to smoke or drink while he is growing. He stresses the importance of team play and even credits his own success as a player to belonging to a great ball club. He knows that the youngster may forget his ambition as he grows older, but that whatever good habits may have been instilled along the way will become ingrained.

After appearing on many interview programs on both radio and televi sion, including an appearance with the late Bill Robinson on the Milton Berle show, Jackie decided that his work with children could be aided with a program of his own. In the same spirit he granted the filming of his life story by producer Mort Briskin for Eagle-Lion films. He has felt no qualms of stage-fright in either his radio or movie chores. "Just one more challenge," he smiles.

His small son, Jackie Jr., a threeyear-old bundle of spirit and energy, accompanied him to Hollywood. His daughter, Sharon, four weeks old at the time of this interview, stayed in New York with Mrs. Robinson. Tiny Jackie wants to be a baseball player during ball season, according to his father. Since watching the Western films on video, however, he has a new ambition—he'd like to be an Indian.

"Am I to Blame for Disc Jockeys?"

Another Side of the Record Controversy Story From the Viewpoint of an Insider

HEN bands were booked into the Palomar, I, as its exploitation manager, bought records and albums and took them to the five disc jockeys on the Los Angeles scene: Don Otis at KLAC, Carl Bailey, then at KRKD, Jack the Bellboy on KFVD, Al Jarvis on KFWB and Mel La Mon, who did "Yellow Cab Cabaret" on KFAC. My simple plan was that the jockeys would play the band's records, people would hear them and head for the Palomar to dance. I thought the jockeys would flip, they were so amazed. "Can the Palomar afford to do this?" some of them asked.

In those days the record problem was no problem. The station usually made a tle-up with a music store —we'll plug your store if you supply the records for our programs. Some of the tiny stations still do this. Often the late-at-night disc jockeys were merely guys stationed alone out in the sticks to night-watch the transmitter. No one thought of them as important enough to pressure into playing this or that in order to plug a client.

The scene changes to 1945 and I come back to Hollywood after the war to take up record exploitation again—but what a change! There were at least eighteen disc jockeys and another being born every minute. They got (and still get) between thirty-five and forty free records a week. We had brought on and nurtured a situation locally that had gotten out of hand—and the same thing that has developed in the same ratio everywhere else in the U.S. A lot has been written in the trade papers about the jockeys making or breaking a record or an artist while actually knowing nothing about music—that the band business has reached its present low because disc jockeys stopped playing instrumentals and made stars out of the band singers—that the jockeys are throwing their weight around and are too impressed with their own importance.

If so, I'm partly to blame for pass-Page Six



ing those free albums and records around. The jockeys get many more records than they can play on their show. Sometimes a "Rag Mop" or "Chattanooga Shoe-Shine Boy" will come along and all the record companies will rush to get their artists to record it and into the hands of the local disc jockeys, and the boys will wind up with five records of five singers doing the same tune. The jockeys have found out that they can't satisfy everyone and some of them have stopped trying to please anyone.

Too Much Music

Additionally, the output of the record companies has increased so tremendously since 1939 that I can't even estimate the amount. There is so much music on the air now that the better it is the less chance it stands of being played. That sounds contradictory? Take Mrs. Average Housewife, who listens to her favorite disc jockey with half an ear. He's grinding out the tunes one after the other and Mrs. A.H. barely hears them. Suddenly, a song with a gimmick or a few tricks comes along that attracts her attention. She listens because the trick can make an immediate impression, regardless of what the tune is actually like. A beautiful ballad is easily lost in the shuffle of the novelties and gimmicks.

Each record company has a budget for exploitation of its product. If the budget happens to be small, a lot of disc jockeys are not going to get free copies of the records. The recordcompany man will make an attempt to get the discs to the guys with the biggest audiences. The other jockeys, asked why they haven't played a certain record, will reply, "I didn't get a copy." Three sources supply records gratis, the publisher of the music, the record company and the exploitation man who represents the artists. Sometimes I give out two copies to each jockey—one to go in the station library, one to spin. Actually, it's possible for the jockey to receive five records of the same person singing the same tune. The jockey has a legitimate story on his side and so have the record companies. The giveaway has got to stop somewhere—and when it does, some jock won't get some record.

Some of the boys discover a tune, build it up and kill it—you can credit them with the whole operation. It's no news that a novelty can be killed overnight. The fan clubs do their bit to add to the evil. They hear a new disc sung by their star and immediately they are on the phone to the stations, demanding to hear the record. It may be a lousy record, but the jockey will play it if the public demand warrants it. Organized fan clubs pushing a star and public demand, however, are not the same thing.

I actually don't think that many disc jockeys have a personal axe to grind. Here and there throughout the country there are jocks who have gotten tunes of their own recorded, and naturally they push these if they can. Only where personalities are closely entwined do the clashes occur. If a jockey doesn't like the song plugger and doesn't like the tune he's pushing either, he won't play it. If, however, he likes the guy and the artist, he'll still play a tune he doesn't like himself. If I know that a jockey just doesn't like the sound of my client's voice, I don't antagonize him by insisting that it's his duty to play my client's record. I know that one guy not playing it isn't going to make that much difference. (Look at Sammy Kaye and Guy Lombardo records—the jockeys very seldom play them and yet they sell just as many copies of tunes as the artists that are plugged by the jockeys.)

With all the overlapping of exploitation and the plethora of music and records that stack up on a jockey's desk, there are bound to be involvements somewhere. Recently, a station manager remonstrated with his disc jockeys—who the heck were all these characters running in and out all day with records? It was taking up valuable time and disrupting the office routine. It was, of course, the various pluggers and exploitation men, enthusiastic as ever. One of the girls in the record library decided to figure out just what the contribution of the "characters" amounted to. She discovered that the station had effected what amounted to a retail saving of between twentyfive and thirty thousand dollars worth of records! That's a lot of shellac—maybe it's too much.

The Earth-men do and whether or not our planet is destroyed is left to the imagination of the listeners.

The following week, the broadcast concerned the work of "humanoids" in the year 2006. Humanoids are efficient robots invented to take nasty work off Earth-men's hands. This story, too, pointed out the fallacy of such super-science thinking.

"Dimension X" should please all science-fiction fans mightily and intrigue the rest of the slow old 1950model listeners. Production is excellent —music and sound effects are appropriately eerie. Norman Rose is the weekly host of the program and a different cast is used in each thirtyminute drama of the future.

It seemed odd to us that the present is so neglected in this series, though the creators may be planning something about it on future programs. Enough is happening in 1950 In this vein to puzzle and interest listeners. At any rate, the time is ripe for Orson Welles and his "Men from Mars" to make a comeback just like Dixieland and vaudeville.

"Strictly From Dixie"

This show takes us back to our adolescence when we sternly collected 1000 signatures attached to a statement begging the "Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street" to stay on the air. We were too far ahead of our time; "Lower Basin" went off and never did return. But now, Dr. Henry Levine with "Strictly from Dixie," practically the same show, has been swept back on the tide of approval that has suddenly struck Dixieland music whether mickey-moused like the Firehouse Five or played like the real McCoy.

"Strictly from Dixie," KECA, 8:00 p.m. Monday, is the real McCoy, or the real-est that could occur on a radio network. Recently, the original "Lower Basin Street" vocalist, a gal by the name of Dinah Shore, guested on the new program and reminisced about the old show (didn't mention our petition, though). She revealed that the page, Dick Charles, who wrote "Mad About Him Blues" for her is now producer of the program and that most of the musicians are back in their chairs. Dinah was sweet and nostalgic about her affection for the

gang and its music. New vocalist, Mary Lou Harp, did a bang-up version of "Mad About Him Blues" in tribute to Dinah.

If you're one of the 1000 who signed our original petition, you don't have to be told what the program is like. And you'll hear such dearly beloved old classics as "Muskrat Ramble," "Original Dixieland One-Step," etc. Oddly enough, this group doesn't use a fire siren on the second chorus of "That's A-Plenty."

... To the fine, full-blown melodramatics of Mutual's "I Love a Mystery." The adventures of "Jack," "Doc" and "Reggie" take us back to our early radio-listening days with their mysterles replete with hair-raising screams, mysterious "enemies," banging shutters and ghostly **fo**otsteps. And no psychology.

.... To the Hollywood Bowl Easter Services, broadcast with dignity and beauty in spite of the raindrops that plop-plopped on the microphone.

... And to another charming guest appearance by Gloria Swanson, this time on "Twenty Questions," intriguing audience, listeners and Herb Polesie alike.

... To Ezio Pinza's dramatic singingacting performance in the "Death of Boris" scene from "Boris Godunov" on the "Telephone Hour's" tenth-anniversary program. And the next day we read in a Hollywood chatter column that it wasn't generally known, but Pinza had lost his voice. The rest of the Metropolitan stars should lose their voices like that!

... To Olivia de Havilland's repetition of her remarkable performance in "The Snake Pit" on "Lux Radio Theater." A difficult enough role to enact in front of a camera, it seems an extraordinary feat to recreate it before a microphone set-up, sans sets and make-up. And Leo Genn makes such an entrancing psychiatrist that we still wish he'd married the heroine!

We View With Alarm

... The regulars who are still turning up with regularity on the audience-participation shows. One of them, a Brooklynite, has become as familiar to us as Arthur Godfrey or Bing Crosby. We're surprised that she doesn't become as well known to the emcces.

... People on audience-participation programs who pick categories that they know nothing about. We've visited some of the programs and seen that they often do have a selection of subjects from which the contestants may choose. So we're still wondering why some jasper will pick "Famous Songs" and then be unable to identify even "Swanee River."

... Commercials that are so ridiculous that the listening audience can hear the studio audience trying not to laugh. Having an actress walk up

to a mike as a show is fanfared on the air and exclaim, "Oo-ooh! Nasty dandruff!" or something equally poetic, deserves a laugh and often gets it.

Commercials that require a \$10,000-a-week guest star to come on after the show and say, "Yes, I am never without Blank's soap chips. I've used them for years," while the audience mentally calculates how many years it's been since the star has had to wash so much as a hanky hem.

All the young actresses who feel they must strain their throats in order to sound like Tallulah Bankhead or speak on the intake of breath in order to sound like Margaret Sullavan. Many of them only manage to sound as if they had just come off the "People Are Funny" talking derby.

... The attempt on "International Airport" to recreate the piano-playing of Herman Chittison and the acting of Staats Cotsworth of "Crime Photographer" in like scenes. For a while last week we thought that "Photographer" had magically appeared on another station, so close was the imitation.

(You'll love this)

1 No. 2 can apricots
1 y₀ c. chopped pecans
1 orange
1 y₂ c. chopped dates
1 Mayonnaise
Whipped cream
1 y₀ c. seedless raisins
12 maraschino cherries
1 pkg. iemon-flavored gelatin

Drain apricots well from juice. Measure juice and to it add enough water to make one and three-quarters cups liquid.

Heat to the boiling point and pour ver gelatin, stirring until dissolved. over gela Let chill.

Let chill. When just about ready to set add apricots that you have diced, orange sections with all membrane removed and cut in cubes, dates, nut meats, cherries silced, then pour into indi-vidual moids and chill thoroughly. Serve in lettuce cups, the edges of which have been just lightly dipped in paprika, and add half mayonnaise and half whipped cream as a dress-ing. Do not completely cover salad with the dressing, but just a portion of it. of it.

In the great New York local 802 of the Musicians Union, there are only nine zither players listed and some of them hadn't worked for years. Frank DeVol, musical director of the program that CBS insists is called "The Jack Smith-Dinah Shore-Margaret Whiting Show," instituted a search for a zither player when he programmed the "Third Man" theme on the series. The "SNR" is the portion emanating from Chicago.) The pair are currently at work actually whipping up their own TV'er with the help of writers Charlie Isaacs and Harold Goodman. . . KTLA's "Dixie Showboat" and "Hollywood Career" (formerly "Girls Only") are being syndicated by Paramount Television for national release. . . Pilot Radio Corp., which makes those marvelous little Pilot Portable TV sets, has come up with the answer for harried parents whose children won't give it up till all channels darken. Their big new set has double doors that lock!

. and Natalie Kalmus, in conjunction with Richmond Television Corpo-ration, has come out with a marvelous line of video cabinets, built to accommodate the big new screens, and designed to fit any and all home dec-orating schemes to a "T"... According to a report by the Radio Manufac-turers Association, all TV manufacturers are now moving into production of twelve inches or larger. Every-body wants 'em. . . The Masquers, a group of venerable showmen from vaudeville, stage and movies (a par-allel to the East's Lambs' Club) have packaged a video show which is currently being presented in the East for sponsorship. Format is dramatic and variety, and the Masquers is full of top names in both. "The Clock" top names in both. . "The Clock" was snapped up by Emerson Radio just after Lever Bros. dropped it, and will continue on NBC-TV through the while continue on NBC-TV through the summer, alternating with "The Big Story." Show has been seen here on KNBH Wednesdays at 9:30 p.m. with no word of change..., Hoot Gibson is set to appear in person on KLAC-TV, each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Show will find Hoot pro-loguing for the minutes with Gibson loguing for ten minutes with Gibson Westerns being serialized into twenty-minute periods following his appearance. . . Milton Berle is now making Victor records. Of what, we don't yet know—and don't much care. We happen to like both his singing and yukking. . . . **KTLA** had to shift sixteen programs and days to accom-modate the wrestling telecasts.

More Wrestling-More Trouble

The wrestlers, who bowed off television before because they felt tele-Page Thirty casts hurt the gate, and thus their own percentage, trickled back for the KTLA Thursday sessions and KECA-TV Friday matches.

Almost immediately KLAC-TV offered wrestling from the Pasadena Arena every Monday night. Major difference is that MCA offered the KTLA and KECA-TV scraps at \$4,000 each, while the independent operator who handles Pasadena includes time and talent in his \$2,700 offer. Naturally everyone else concerned is screaming.

While the Pasadena operator, who owns his auditorium and feels he can authorize telecasting from there when, if and as he chooses, is so right, MCA has a contract with all the wrestlers.

MCA has suggested KLAC-TV pull out and avoid a fuss that is being set up by Ford and Hoffman Radio, who are picking up the chit on KTLA and KECA-TV, and who are pretty steamed not only over the fact that the KLAC-TV rassler package would go for \$1300 less than they paid, but would constitute the third night, whereas they believed their two bought and paid-for mat nights would be the only two in the field.

They'll all probably get into the same old fuss, with all wrestling leaving the channels. This could get pretty dull.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You) May Like

"Music in the Morgan Manor"

KECA-TV's Wednesday night (8:30, Channel 7) "Music in the Morgan Manor" is just what the title implies, no matter how you read that "manor." It's Russ's same old manner of music, and the show is presumably laid in a combination living room, music room and den in the Morgan home, a gathering place for the orchestra leader's talented friends.

Russ and the whole crew who participated to make those popular records whose sale ran into the millions recreate the music for viewers; various guest stars put in appearances; and a nice air of informality reigns. One night recently we spied Joe Venuti behind a false beard that was later jerked so the hot violinist could get into the act almost as Joe Venuti. We say "almost" because Venuti never did get his violin up and start playing. A rather obvious omission—and one that served no purpose other than to disappoint the many fans of the musician-comedian.

Morgan recently inaugurated the policy of each week awarding an outstanding young person in the music field with a beautiful Crosley (his sponsor) television set. Little Toni Harper, the phenomenal colored singer not yet in her teens, was Morgan's first choice, and her performance was charming.

Morgan himself usually does a song with which he is closely identified, and you don't have to be a fan of either Morgan or the old tunes to enjoy his "nowhere" voice that is redeemed by absolute feeling and style.

The show can serve as an admirable example of how to utilize music for the visual. As a matter of fact, the show could easily be a simulcast —going out on the air as it does on the video channels . . . or could, we think, if a couple of the pretty girls who help on commercials and generally lend color were either taught how to speak or replaced by a more mellifluous-voiced bit of pulchritude.

Second Glances (Critical Comment)

"McMahan's Minstrels"

KTTV has allocated their middle of the week (9:00 p.m., Wednesday, Channel 11) to a lavish new show appropriately dubbed "McMahan's Minstrels," after sponsor McMahan's Furniture Stores.

McMahan's have gone "first class" in their production, with stars Tudy Williams, headline vocalist; Norwood Smith, handsome, rich-voiced baritone; song stylist Jack Powers, the Leonard Gordon chorus; comedians Peenie Elmo and Bud Harrison and interlocutor Tiny Stowe giving it everything they have.

Format allows for the Dixieland band (full band) to do its stuff, for vocalists, dance routines and gags galore, but it seems to us the title "Minstrels" is a misnomer. There are a lot of alliterative terms—musicmakers, musicians, musicale, merrymakers—that, we felt, would better have described the show, particularly as "McMahan's Minstrels" are tor were, for their first week,) almost immediately preceded on another station by a much more "minstrelish" show held on a TV-station-built levee.

The commercials were presented in a fashion that showed honest effort toward integrating them. Possibly "integration" of commercials is intended to make them more pointed. A commercial is a commercial, and to us always as obvious as a sore thumb, and whether that is good or bad depends upon how grateful you are for the particular entertainment on view. We happen to be grateful to the Mc-Mahan show for a half hour of jolly musical comedy—despite our stubborn insistence that it isn't our idea of a minstrel show—so have nothing but chuckles over the commercials.

'Cole's Cozy Corner'

KECA-TV bowed in a musical-variety half hour (Channel 7, Wednesdays, 9:30 p.m.) starring Buddy Cole and Vonnie King (also known as Mrs. Bud-

dy Cole and Yvonne King), and called "Cole's Cozy Corner."

The name was most appropriate. It seemed to us that half the time the conversation got so cozy viewers must have been lost. Husbands and wives invariably have little jokes and bywords that don't exactly fracture or enchant casual hearers, and in our case this was so true. Even the Coles' first guest, Hoagy Carmichael, went in for patter more than for plano-play-ing, and the latter is definitely Hoa-gy's forte.

Both Vonnie and Buddy are well known to music lovers—Buddy for his albums, accompaniments and solo performances on both organ and piano . . . Yvonne for her vocalizing as

one of the King Sisters vocal quartet with Alvino Rey and Horace Heldt's bands, and for her own blonde loveliness.

The show is slated to go for twen-ty-six weeks, so any minor deficien-cies, such as lack of interesting chatter subjects, can be cleaned up. The musical talent is there—plenty of 1t —and the two people parading it should be a drawing card.

-Wait for Hawthorne to hold still before you shoot. Don't try to catch him moving around. -Be sure your television screen presents a sharp, clear contrast at the time you shoot. -A gray image on the screen is better than a jet black, muddy one one

A tripod is essential, as the image A tripod is essential, as the image tends to vibrate. Hand holding the camera will only add to such movement, causing a hlur. Best results will be had by shoot-ing at a tenth of a second at f.8, using film that has the speed of 64 tungsten, such as super XX. Be sure that your camera is ex-actly perpendicular with the screen.

-DO NOT use flash or lights of any kind. -In focusing on the screen, get as large an image in your camera as possible. 8

Before cutting material that has a tendency to ravel, pin your pattern firmly on it, then mark around the pattern edge with a wax crayon. Cut on this line and the material will not ravel

ATTIE MCDANIEL claims that her motto Claims that her motto is "I ain't dead yet." Which is a master-piece of understate-ment. She's equipped with enough vitality, ambition and talent for two. And it's carried her to the heights of her

profession.

She's remembered as the first per-son of her race to win an Academy Award, an honor she received for her performance in "Gone With the Wind"—and for the past two years she's been "Beulah," a character which has become one of the best belowed on the air beloved on the air.

beloved on the air. The reality of "Beulah" comes from within Hattie herself. She speaks of the cast as "a wonderful family." Ernie Whitmore, who plays her boy friend, she calls "Bill" even off mike. She even admits that she sent him a "Beulahish" Valentine last February 14. She once stayed up all night cooking in order to bring a celebration dinner to the stubring a celebration dinner to the stu-dio for the whole cast and crew of the program.

Hard Work Ahead?

Hattie has had offers to be "Beu-lah" on television, too, but she doesn't see how she can do both ver-sions at once. She hasn't even made a movie during her radio seasons, a movie during her radio seasons, except during summer vacation time. "And eventually you get through with a movie," she sighs. Hattie did appear on the Ed Wynn show and had herself a fine time dancing and singing "Some of These Days."

Few realize it, but the comedienne is actually a radio pioneer. She thinks she may have been the first Negro girl singer on the air. In 1923 she was vocalist with George Morrison's orchestra and sang her songs into a horn.

She has always worked toward the

Excepting Bucky, who got her job as featured vocalist when Cliffie heard her accompanying some records at his Record Corral and decided she was plenty talented, the whole cast brings to the program a wealth of background in the Western music world.

Cliffie, the slightly shy emcee, got his start by tooting the tuba in Burbank High School's band. However, after marching all day in a parade with the big horn wrapped around him, Cliffie's ambition gave way to an instrument which he made sure he'd never have to tote on his back . . . the bass fiddle. His first paying job came with a Hawaiian trio. The boys, who thought they were about the luckiest musicians in the world, played five nights a week for three collars apiece. The job folded when Cliffie advanced to Stuart Hamblen's radio show in 1935.

Not Cut Out to Act

Although he turned in a few performances at Pasadena Playhouse, Cliffie admits they didn't bring out any thespianship so he kept on strumming the bass, with Freddie Slack at Slapsy Maxie's, and in Ken Murray's "Blackouts" of '42 and '43.

Stone claims he started rollin' in 1943 when he was signed as comedian and bass fiddler on CBS's "Hollywood Barn Dance." (He lasted as long as the show did . . . four and a half years.) The same year was also the beginning of his still popular "Wake-Up Ranch" on KFVD and a live talent program, "Hometown Jamboree" on KXLA, which is also aired from El Monte on Saturday nights.

Herman's Cliffie's Dad

One of the most enjoyed entertainers on the teleshow is Herman the Hermit, Cliffie's dad. The delightful bearded character is a seven-man band rolled into one and can get a musical note out of anything and everything imaginable, including battered frying pans and coffee percolators, all shapes and sizes. Herman's garage is reputed to be crammed with unique instruments that would make a junk dealer joyous.

Tennessee Ernie

Adding to the hilarious antics is Tennessee Ernie, popular recording star and Western entertainer, who once yearned to be an opera singer and even trained his talents at the Chicago Conservatory of Music. However, the second world war intervened, and after his discharge from the Air Corps, Tennessee (Ernie Ford) turned up announcing on KFXM in San Bernardino. Lately, Tennessee's name has become synonymous with "Mule Train," his most popular waxing to date.

Tennessee and Cliffie are the writ-

ers of "Smoky Mountain Blues," and recently when both boys' wives were "expecting," they penned "Anticipation Blues." Tennessee and his wife heralded their first-born, Jeffrey, a few months ago. Cliffie and his Mrs. (former vocalist Dorothy Darling of the "Aristocrats") will be passing out cigars this month for the third time ... already there are six-and-a-halfyear-old Steve and Linda Darling, who tops her brother by a year.

The rest of Stone's band includes accordionist Billy Liebert (who has performed in Detroit concerts and was formerly with Texas Jim Lewis); violinist Harold Hensley (used to be with the "Tobacco Tags" in the Deep South); Charlie Aldridge at the electric guitar (hails from Eggwah, Oklahoma, and was with Spade Cooley); steel guitarist Speedy West (nicknamed in jest because of his laconic personality); Al Williams at the bass (Al was once with Harry Sosnick's society orchestra); vocalist Eddie Kirk and drummerman Johnny Powers. On the technical end of "Hometown Jamboree" are producer Milt Hoffman and director Joe Landis.

Their cracker-barrel type of entertainment is bound to appeal to the majority of viewers, whether they be cosmopolitans or straight from the hills. As Cliffie says, "We're just having a good time and want folks to share our fun."

ACK in the dim days when the pies thrown in comedy sequences were actually pies, and not sawdust-and-

paste concoctions, a huge series of flickers were made starring some of the greatest actors and pantomimists of all times.

For some years art houses have featured these old reels as precious, infrequently shown bits of lost art. Professors have penned reverent articles about them. While they actually were comedies, they came to be regarded more as museum pieces.

Currently KNBH is presenting film from the greatest array of both sound and silent filmed comedies ever assembled for television. The series started last February, and Channel 4 has a full year's supply.

Each Monday and Friday night the familiar mustached face and lovable little figure of Charlie Chaplin, whose clock like working of arms and legs has been imitated by two generations, is featured in one-and two-reelers made as far back as 1916 and 1917. Some of the best-known of this series, "One A.M.," "The Count," "The Cure," "The Immi-grant" and "The Pawnshop" belong to the off-the-cuff series of which twelve were made in twelve months. The legendary Mabel Normand, qualified as "one of the two women in pictures who could be both beauti-ful and funny," appears in many of these. Carole Lombard, the other of the respected femme duo, is featured in some of the Mack Sennett series shown.

One actor seen in the old films, peering innccently through horn-rimmed glasses as he raced through danger which today only a stunt man could handle, went on to dis-tinguish himself as Harold Lloyd. Another prentice hand was a frozen-faced little fellow named Buster Keaton.

Time" by presenting the films as straight comedy, slotted into an early hour when children rule the household television watching. Children need no reason underlying the antics of comedians. The fast-mov-ing, fantastic footage, a live with pies in the face, house-scalings and a gentle art that always has been and is now known only as "prat-falls," delights kids. The lack of dia-logue on the silents which are run seems to enhance. At the same time the station hooks adults who either "remember when," appreciate the series as the art form it has become, or who just want to see what is fracturing Junior.

In this day of keen competition for the newly popular old-time film, Bob Guggenheim, head of KNBH's film department, wisely maintains complete silence as to where he procured the precious reels.

"I can tell you we got some of our old Christy comedies from Sam Hayes' own collection," he will grin. (Sam is an NBC newscaster of eighteen years' standing.)

Cutting the Comedy

NBC, realizing that television's transmission is bound to detract from the clarity of even new film, didn't make the mistake of torturing viewers by running the original films. Brand-new prints are made as each comedy is screened and chosen for running.

"The screening is more necessary because of film content than because of quality," Guggenheim revealed. "Before the days of the Hayes (now
