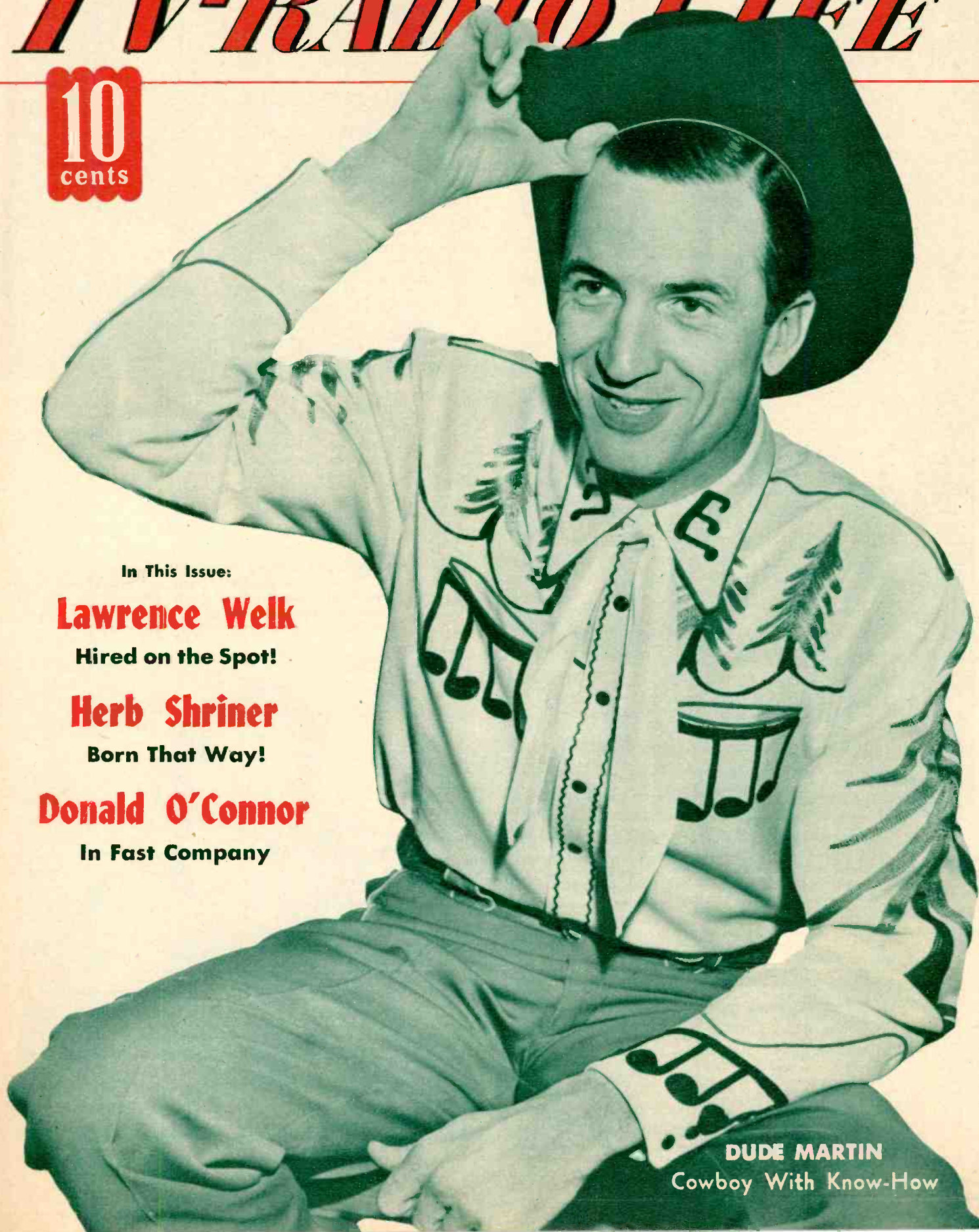

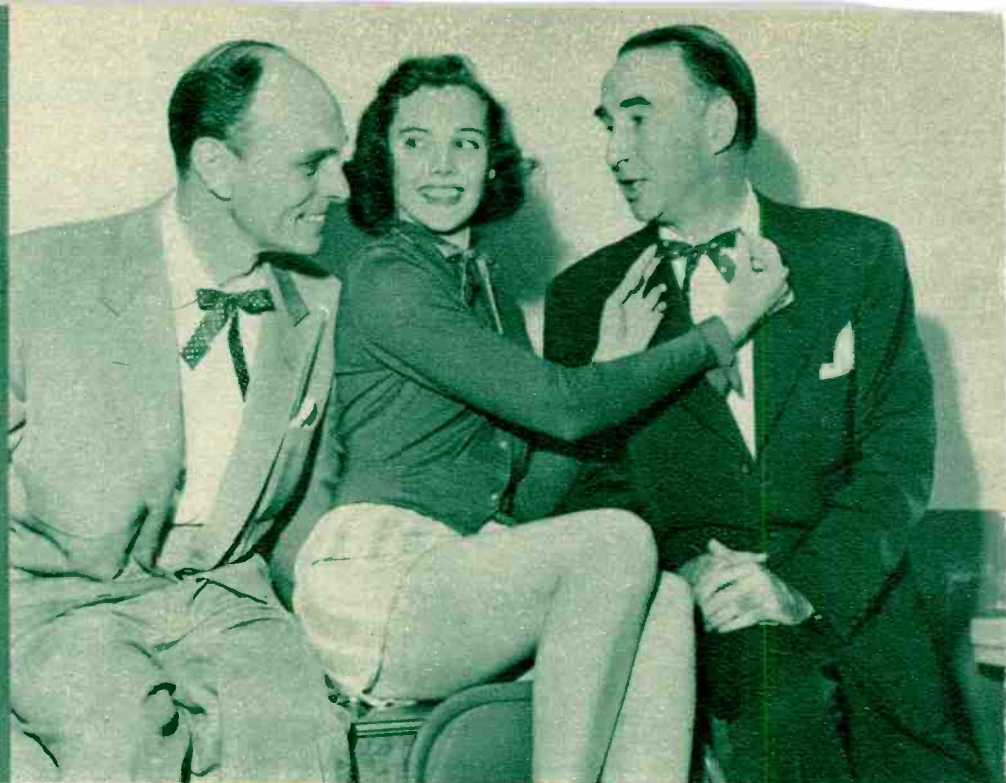

How "One" Builds A Reputation

Exacting Standards and the Work of Experts Go Into the Building of "Studio One's" Long-Standing Reputation for Excellence

SMOOTHLY, WITHOUT apparent effort or strain, the drama called "A Bolt of Lightning" unfolded itself before ten million viewers on Monday, November 12 of last year, as "Studio One" celebrated its 100th production as an hour-long dramatic series over KNXT and the CBS-TV network.

Like "A Bolt of Lightning" (the rousing story about American patriot James Otis) each program in the successful series demanded approximately ten full weeks of constructive preparation.

Let's follow the course of the 100th production in the work-packed days before it was finally recorded by the relentless cameras in CBS-TV's Studio 42, the mammoth stage on the third floor of New York's Grand Central Terminal Building.

For a small army of technicians and artists, every Monday evening is an objective attained after weeks of planning—the final climax to countless operations essential in producing an hour-long TV show with such exacting standards.

Two or three weeks ahead of each performance, Richard Rychtarik, senior scenic designer for the big show, completes his basic floor plans of all the sets to be used. This often means as many as nine large-scale drawings—nine separate sets—for one show. Copies are dispatched to producer Worthington Miner, the director; and to the CBS carpentry shop where forty-nine carpenters and laborers start the scenic construction under supervision of Bill Mensching. For that November 12 drama, flats to be painted in accordance with the feel and background of pre-Revolutionary Boston were built as wood frames, covered with enamelline duck—ever inch fireproofed before it leaves the shop.

Work Progresses

As each unit of flat is completed, the set painters take over. They mix and apply their colors precisely as specified by designer Rychtarik. Even in black-and-white television color is an important factor—not only in camera's acceptance of elementary colors and various degrees of grays, but to set the mood of the show in the responsive minds of the actors

themselves. Water paint is used to finish the flats. It's quick, and looks well.

While the sets are being prepared for "A Bolt of Lightning," costume designer Julia Sze is hard at work on her vital phases of the production. She starts, in this instance, with research on the period—using the vast resources of the New York Public Library—and making her preliminary sketches of the early-American costumes to be made or rented from one of the large costuming houses. During the week preceding the telecast, actors make scheduled appearances for fittings, with designer Sze's professional eye following each performer's dress through its final alteration and approval. Sze, too, must be ever alert to color. The lacy cuff-ruffs used by men of 1750, for example, must be dyed a baby blue—because of the objectionable halos which are created on the television screen when the TV cameras pick up dead white in their sensitive lenses.

Even the make-up used by each member of the cast must be planned far ahead. Bob Jiras heads this important department for all productions of "Studio One" and has a staff of experts to aid him.

To maintain authenticity, every chair, table and what-not—on every set—had to belong unmistakably, in

this drama, to the middle and latter eighteenth century in America. That artistic assurance is the responsibility of Jane Waterman, who devotes her days exclusively to insuring this quality for productions. Whatever early-American "prop" is needed, it is decorator Waterman's job to find it, rent it, see that it is covered by insurance—and make sure that one of five CBS-TV dispatching trucks picks it up and delivers it to the right studio at the right time.

Lighting Planned

In the televised drama, the play plot is rivaled in importance by the light plot—a vastly complicated diagram of the entire studio area, 8,500 square feet, which must be under illumination controlled by the lighting director. Saturday evening, before Monday's show, as stage hands are getting up the trucked-in scenery to represent old Boston, three electricians prepare the complex lights for their all-important assignments in the drama—to simulate night and day in all their phases, indoors or outdoors, dark or moonlight, fair or stormy, as the script of the play demands, at half a moment's notice.

In an air-conditioned room adjoining the main studio, another somewhat more placid and reflective operation is going forward. Eugene Cines, head of the Record Library, is choosing special background music from thousands of records from all parts of the world.

On Monday—for the first time—all these far-flung and separate activities merge. They all come together under the coordinating supervision of Producer Tony Miner. The sets are in place, the lights are ready to come on. The studio is alive with actors, cameramen, boom handlers, sound experts, electricians, stage hands, make-up artists, wardrobe supervisors, floor managers. All are ready for their individual assignments, all aware of their specific places in the pattern, all sensitive to the delicate teamwork which must begin when Director Paul Nickell says . . . "Hit It!"

IT'S ALMOST a waste of time to ask Lucille Norman, the lovely musical star of CBS's "Hollywood Music Hall," what are her ambitions—her dreams. They have all come true.

A handsome husband, Bruce Kellogg (who gave up his promising dramatic career to be her business manager) . . . a lovable five-year-old daughter, Pamela Jane . . . a beach-house, a smart Hollywood apartment . . . and a coveted vocal-acting career in radio, TV and movies.

Plus all of these reasons why most women look at her and say, "What more could you ask?" Miss Norman, who is not yet thirty years old, has more beauty and grace than most of the other vocalists in either the classical or pop category.

No Egoist

You might easily imagine that this radio songstress is inclined to be conceited. But she is far from it. When asked what she thinks when

women say "I envy you," her only comment was: "It always surprises me. My life is no different from any other woman's. I'm only in a different type of work, that's all."

Lucille is not pretentious when it comes to herself, but she will talk for hours about her little daughter and her wonderful husband. Pamela Jane is "doing great" in ballet. Miss Norman knows it takes time and energy to be a mother. She believes that "raising a child is the most difficult thing in the world." She gives her husband credit for her career success because "everything happened after he took over my career. He did it after he got angry at the way others were presenting my singing."

Her Philosophy

Miss Norman's philosophy of life, which has saved her from being a self-centered star when she had all the apparent reasons to become one, started many years ago. It was a Rosalind Russell movie, "Roughly

Speaking," which gave her a lot of the solid ideas she uses today in finding happiness. She remembers, too, when her grandmother told her a long time ago "to follow the spiritual side of the Bible." Maybe religion seems out of place in a life which appears to be as glamorous as Miss Norman's, but she does not hesitate to say that it plays a big part in her daily living. Not long ago she accepted the teachings of an idealistic religion. She has discovered since then, "I don't fear going on for a performance any more."

Singing was not in the saddle when Miss Norman did her most recent film with Randolph Scott, "Champagne Bandits." She said about it, "I loved every minute of it . . . and I learned how to ride, too."

If there is any one performance which the gracious singer dreams of doing, it is a truly worthwhile musical on the screen. She wants "to run the gamut of singing different-type tunes in one picture."

Is She Temperamental?

Is Miss Norman temperamental during rehearsals? We kept our eyes opened expecting some Hollywood-type outburst from the blonde beauty who has a career which is the envy of much older troupers. On the contrary, we saw how smoothly the orchestra played, under the direction of Wilbur Hatch, and how much they enjoyed doing musical arrangements for Miss Norman.

Perhaps another reason Miss Norman is too busy "to worry about myself" is that, as she remarked, "There's a heck of a lot of work to being a vocalist. It's not all fun."

A Long Way to Go

Speaking of fun reminded the popular vocalist: "My husband and I are always planning a trip to Europe, but we never seem to be able to make it. If we take a vacation we'll probably get only as far as Lake Tahoe."

Does she feel that she has anything more to learn about her profession? "Oh, yes. I have a long way to go . . . and everyone always has more to learn, no matter how far they have come."

LAWRENCE WELK INDULGES in a few Hulanics with Lei Aloha and Moana, featured TV dancers with Harry Owens's Royal Hawaiian aggregation. Welk and his popular orchestra present their weekly video show over KTLA direct from the Aragon Ballroom on Lick Pier in Ocean Park.

ELEBRITIES of show business are a dime a dozen at Hollywood's Brown Derby. The only rustle of attention generated arises from the tourists when Jack Benny, Phil Harris or any one of a daily dozen other famous-faces strolls toward a booth.

But the most blase bunch on earth toward the famous are the white-clad waiters at this restaurant. To them an odd-thousand-dollar-a-week comedian is just another to feed, and probably another check to okay.

Out of Character

Yet when Lawrence Welk one day sat in the Derby over luncheon, it was one of these indifferent white-

coated gentlemen who moved up with all the diffidence of a first-time autograph seeker to ask the popular maestro . . . "Aren't you Lawrence Welk?" The unusual fan went on enthusiastically to explain that he and his family never missed one of Welk's Aragon telecasts.

This sort of thing happens almost every time Welk goes out. More amazing than this is the orchestra leader's genuine surprise and pleasure at being recognized. He still, despite the new attendance records and broken return-engagement records set by his "Champagne Music," fails to realize he is what Hollywood calls "a personality."

The son of an Alsatian immigrant (who was a farmer by trade and a musician at heart), Welk started almost as a toddling youngster to learn music. Many a sour note was heard as he reached up a small hand to prod at his father's old-fashioned

accordion. Although he had never taken a lesson, by the time Lawrence was thirteen he had learned to play the instrument passably well. It was a beautiful instrument with sparkling rhinestones on it (result of many months of penny-saving on the part of his family) which proved the inspiration for young Welk to start studying ardently and practicing in every spare moment he had away from farm chores.

But unfortunately when Welk, as a grown-up and the leader of the "Biggest Little Band in America," hit the road, he didn't immediately hit the big time. It took several years of Yankton, South Dakota, radio and one-night stands at such palaces as Bernard's Pavilion in Broken Bow,



Nebraska, before the champagne-bubble music floated out on a national radio hookup.

Not Hard

Emergence into the big time came when Welk and his tired musicians drove up to a swank hotel in Milwaukee, ready to check in for a little rest and some hot baths. A big-name band was just leaving, after a successful stand at the hotel's popular Terrace Room.

" . . . It occurred to me that the musicians in my orchestra were just as good as the boys in anyone else's band, big name or no big name. And certainly they would enjoy getting off the road for a few weeks. So before I knew what I was doing I'd told the band to hold it a minute while I went to see the manager about getting booked into the Terrace."

A story book would have the band being turned down flat, with a contrite manager later crawling to Welk to plead that he fill in at the last moment of an emergency. Then Welk and his boys, savoring triumph, could have gone on to unheard-of popularity.

What actually happened was that

Welk's New Signoff

Isham Jones, famous writer of songs, has penned special lyrics to his old favorite "Why Can't This Night Go On Forever?" to be used as Lawrence Welk's new closing theme each time KTLA presents "Lawrence Welk's Champagne Music," 9:30 p.m. Fridays.

From where we sit, it looks as though the popular maestro who packs 'em in at the Aragon Ballroom won't have a real closing theme. Now flying the Laura Scudder Fine Foods banner on his telecasts, Welk, Roberta Linn, Dick Dale, Gene Purcell and all of them will go on and on. He has already set a new record for long contracts by signing a second six-month pact with the popular beach ballroom.

Four Candles for "Beany"

As long-time observers of the Hollywood TV scene we have seen hundreds of bright young men create hundreds of video program ideas—some bright, some dull. Only a few of these have managed to get their idea past the brainstorm stage, while the others are still trying, or have resignedly gone back to work.

One of the former is Bob Clampett, whose "Time for Beany" (KTLA, 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday) celebrates its fourth birthday on February 28.

Clampett has been around Hollywood all his life, as a cartoonist, idea man, writer, director. When he left the Leon Schlesinger short-subject studios some ten years ago after directing "Looney Tunes" and "Merrie Melodies," he retired to a garage with a determination to stay at it until he had created the puppets he knew could be devised. When he emerged he was stony broke but he had won.

The results finally arrived on Channel 5 as "Beany," "Cecil, the Seasick Sea Serpent," "Captain Hufflepuff" and others. They have won countless awards including one from TV-Radio Life. "Beany" still is about the most popular kids' program on the Western channels; it's now seen on sixteen stations including New York, where it began this month. The twist is, this Hollywood-born program is viewed in N.Y. under sponsorship of a Florida orange-juice company.

What's to Damage?

A couple of weeks ago stations KNBH and KTTV telecast portions of an old silent motion picture, "Safety

Last," starring Harold Lloyd. Five days later the boom fell in the shape of two suits asking a total of \$300,000 damages for asserted copyright infringement and \$50,000 attorney's fees! The filer—the Harold Lloyd Corporation.

5 eggs, 1½ cups powdered sugar
whole grated lemon
2 tbs. cornstarch
1 tsp. vanilla
½ carton sour cream

Mix till creamy and smooth. Put in round pan with graham-cracker crust (5 crushed crackers), put into cold oven at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Then turn down to 300 degrees for 50 minutes. Then take out, spread rest of sour cream mixed with 4 tsp. powdered sugar on top and return to oven for 10 minutes.

1½ cups chopped walnuts, ½ tsp. salt
1 whole grated orange

Mix well, butter a cake pan, bake at 350 degrees till done.

Batter:

- 1 cup flour
1½ cups milk
3 eggs

Spread pan with salted butter and cook batter on both sides.

Cheese Mixture:

- 1 lb. hoop cheese
Salt and pepper in cheese according to taste
Grate ½ lemon rind into the cheese
if cheese is too dry put 2 table-
spoons sour cream into it.

Wrap cheese mixture in blintz and finish frying in 1 inch butter.

PICK of the PIX

The Screen Actors Guild and the Independent Motion Picture Producers Association have recently signed an agreement, covering about seventy films made since 1948, which stipulates that actors shall receive 12½ per cent of their original pay when the picture is sold to television. This arrangement is long overdue, of course, and should prove a boon to film players, but I can think of many performances for which the actors were lucky to collect the first time.

The following are not necessarily the "pick of the pix," since the movie menu is pretty skimpy this week, but might more properly be labeled "flicker fare warning."

"The Hairy Ape." Based on the famous play by Eugene O'Neill, this version takes considerable liberties with the original, but, even so, manages to tell the story fairly well. A ship's stoker, played by William Bendix, hears himself referred to as a hairy ape by a beautiful young lady of the upper class, Susan Hayward, and in his efforts to prove he's as good as she is, invades her apartment where he soon becomes convinced that they occupy approximately the same level. In the play, the stoker winds up dead in a zoo monkey house, strangled by a real hairy ape. The picture's ending is not quite so hoary.

"Betrayed." This tale of murder and romance features Kim Hunter, before her smash hit in "Streetcar Named Desire," Dean Jagger, before his Oscar-winning performance in "Twelve O'Clock High," and Robert Mitchum, before. A creaky plot involving a young lady married to a murderer and the brash young man who tries to help her, keeps the picture from going anywhere, but the presence of the aforementioned personalities makes it reasonably acceptable.

"Hell's House." A very early Bette Davis-Pat O'Brien epic about bootlegging and reformatories. Interesting only because it offers Miss Davis in the unrewarding role of the hero's blonde girl friend, a character she essays with scarcely a hint of the unique facets of personality which were to give her such continued success.

"Thanks a Million." One of the half-dozen or so Hal Roach comedies about the army, with William Tracy and Joe Sawyer. Most of you who idly turn the dial looking for a movie have probably seen this one, since it's been played on local television several times already, but if you haven't, it might amuse you with its simple, direct, pie-in-the-face type of humor, always good for a laugh and usually missing from present-day movie comedy fare.

Elmo Roper Airs Election Issues

As head of a coast-to-coast public-opinion-research organization, Elmo Roper, public-opinion analyst, will begin a series of weekly reports on the major issues of the 1952 elections over NBC radio network, February 17. He will analyze the grass-roots reports of his 300 "samplers" on his fifteen-minute weekly radio reports. Roper said he "will dig out what Americans think the major issues of the 1952 campaign are, and which candidate's approach to each of these issues the majority approves." It looks like radio is starting early to keep in step with the rapid-fire pace set by the fighting politicians.

Roper's radio comments and his telecasts will be part of NBC's pre-convention and pre-election political coverage. The public-opinion analyst will be a member of NBC's news staff at both the Republican and Democratic conventions in Chicago next July, and will stand by to analyze the up-to-the-minute returns on election night next November.

"Irma" Gets Citation

Although "My Friend Irma" does not appear on her broadcasts to be the brightest young businesswoman around, she was awarded a citation by one of the country's best-known organizations of business and professional women, as the "most resourceful businesswoman of the year." The women's group, known as "Saturday's Children," is one of the New York City branches of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. The citation was inspired by the offer on the part of Marie Wilson, star of "Irma," to serve as secretary for a day to the person who offered the highest contribution to the March of Dimes, thereby winning \$5,000 for the polio fund, as the highest bid from the Coca-Cola Bottling Company, Fort Worth, Texas.

"Mysterious Traveler"

A recent broadcast of the "Mysterious Traveler," one of Mutual's Sunday mystery-lineup air shows, proved that when radio drama is good it can be very good. "Mysterious Traveler" will hold your attention and never fails to tell an intriguing tale based on supernatural science fiction or straight detective.

On this particular air show, "Stranger in the House," a story was told of a young couple who bought a house in Vermont only to be haunted by the ghost of a beautiful woman who had been murdered in the house years before. It was the young husband who was of particular interest to this ghost, who was always leaving a trail of narcissus perfume. When the man of the house displayed signs of madness his wife called in a doctor. This led to more contention, as the husband was frequently interrupted in his intimate conversations with the feminine ghost. After the house burned down and the husband was taken away everyone believed that the ghost had been thoroughly eliminated. Later, however, when the couple were driving along in their car, the scent of narcissus returned and the husband, under the ghost's influence again, murdered his wife.

It was a good story line and was especially well scripted. Lyle Sudrow, the husband, and Bryna Raeburn, the wife, used control in enacting very emotional scenes. Both performers gave an excellent dramatic performance, which is seldom equalled in any but the top dramatic shows on radio.

Maurice Tarplin does a good job each week as the "Mysterious Traveler," the only consistent member of the cast. It is written, directed, and produced by David Kogan and Robert A. Brown, and originates from New York City.—A.G.

Music Man for Martin and Lewis

Dick Stabile, musical director for comics Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, KFI, 9:00 p.m. Friday, is kept busy making music and being the perfect foil, on and off stage, for the verbal jibes of NBC's zany comedy team.

Stabile was born May 29, 1909, in Newark, New Jersey. When he was fifteen he joined the Joe E. Brown show, "Captain Jinx," as a sax man, after six months of lessons. From there he went to "Good News," then to "Strike Up the Band," where he introduced George Gershwin's "The Man I Love," with a brilliant sax solo.

From 1929 to 1936 this musical director toured with Ben Bernie, playing such spots as the Chicago World's Fair, College Inn, and other swank locations. He formed his own band in 1936, recording through the years, and then in 1942 he signed with the Coast Guard and for three years was a Chief Petty Officer in the music department. Since then he has done all their radio, TV, theater, club and motion picture work and only last month inked a seven-year pact with them.

It's a peculiar fact that at certain times certain territories produce a crop of great wrestlers. Years ago the Bohemians in Nebraska predominated the wrestling scene with such greats as Stecker, Pesek, the Duseks and the Pintos.

Later the scene shifted to Oklahoma with the giant Indian grapplers, Roebuck, Strongbow (of course), McLain and Jennings. Now Minnesota is the recognized hotbed of wrestler production. The land of 10,000 lakes seems to have cornered the market on contemporary wrestling greats — Nagurski, Gustasson, Pazandak, Johnson and Levy—all different nationalities coming from one seething place.

Now campaigning here in Southern California are Polish Joe Pazandak, better known as The Champ, and Leonard "Butch" Levy. "Butch" is without doubt the greatest Jewish heavyweight wrestler the profession has ever known. Not only is he a great wrestler but a fine all-around athlete. He is rated as an all-time great in both professional and collegiate football and had the honor of playing here in Los Angeles with both the Rams and the Dons. Although he is big, weighing around 245 pounds, he has the speed of a lightweight.

Principally through the power of KTLA's transcriptions of the wrestling matches from Long Beach, local fans are robbed of another prominent wrestler—Mr. Moto. This Nipponese strong-

A Cowboy With Know-How

*How Dude Martin Jumped From
Bronco-Busting to TV Production*

AT FOURTEEN Dude Martin was busting broncos, following rodeos, strumming on a Western guitar and dreaming of the day when he would have a horse all his own . . . not of the day when he would have a TV show all of his own. And he certainly was not, at that tender age, harboring ambitions of being video executive producer at KTTV.

Was it easy, this jump from a riding cowboy to a TV singing cowboy? Dude's comment was, "You have to be *very* lucky to get away with it."

Bay-Area Experience

Before bringing his Dude Martin Variety Show with a "Western flavor" to the 9:00 p.m. Wednesday spot at Channel 11, Dude spent almost twenty years in the field of Western music. He roamed the country on personal appearances with his musical cowpokes and became well known as a radio personality. During most of this time he originated his broadcasts from San Francisco. In the Bay Area he gained the enviable record of never being off the air for a week and of never being unsponsored during his eighteen years in the business.

When you talk with Dude Martin today, it's a tossup as to whether the conversation will concern "mood setting," "across-the-room sound," "video camera positions" or "folk tunes with a Western beat." As KTTV's top producer he spends much of his off-camera time solving programming and sales problems.

Knows His Business

If there are any who doubt that

this singing cowboy knows his business you have only to be around when he remarks, "For success in any medium you have to have two things. A show that will sell your sponsor's product, and a show that people are interested in watching. And you've just got to remember that the sponsor is not an evil you have to put up with, because if you don't sell products you won't be around very long."

Dude can just as enthusiastically talk about his Western variety telecast and its performers. When asked about his comic, Hank Penny, Dude said, "He's a very great personality. A natural comedian, who has the heart for being a great comic. Hank is very serious about this business of being funny. He's what I call the biggest hard-luck guy in the business . . . he hurts himself on every show."

Dude thinks his singers, Sue Thompson and Dick Stewart, have "tremendous appeal and are a rare combination with top rating with the bobby-sox crowd." His formula for putting on a good show goes something like this: "Get a gang together that acts like they're having fun. Keep the show moving. And make it a family-type show, with something that will appeal to every member of the family."

A Shy Guy

This executive-producer Western-man admits: "I always want to be on-camera part of the time, but I get almost as much kick out of preparing other shows and viewing them as I do out of getting into the act myself."

Dude appears slightly shy to those who meet him, but at the same time an extremely warm, friendly person who just doesn't know how to be pretentious. He insists that he doesn't do anything special when he's not busy with video, because "there is no such time." His hobby is hunting, but he said, "I've not been hunting since going into television. I used to spend a third of my time at it."

After taking that gigantic leap from the rodeo show to television production, Dude has a very modest recipe for success. "I have been interested in all phases of show business. I always took fliers off into other channels of the business. But there's just no substitute for experience. I love all of it."

▲ **"NO, NO!" SHOUTS** a listener as Don and Fran sing a duet. Fran, of course, is one of the nation's most popular songstresses, and Don also has a pleasant voice, although he himself admits that he won't be giving Mario Lanza any competition this year.

DURING THE past five years, television has disrupted the daily routines of millions of people.

Viewers stay up at crazy hours to watch a late movie, or take time out in the afternoon to catch a favorite show. And although TV has been a godsend for many an entertainer, many of them have complained that the new medium is more fatiguing and nerve-wracking than any other medium.

With this in mind, it was a pleasant surprise to listen to stage, screen, radio and TV veteran Don Ameche.

A Normal Life

At the present time, he and Frances Langford are co-starring in a daily variety video show emanating from New York.

Immediately after one of his daily telecasts from The Little Theater, a converted ABC-TV studio just off Times Square, Don stood in the middle of the stage, said a few words of thanks to the departing audience, puffed on his cigarette, and then explained how he felt about his new job.

"For the first time in many years, TV has given me the chance to lead a normal life again, with regular hours. Just like the average businessman, I work from nine in the morning until five at night.

"It's a lot of hard work putting on a full-hour variety show, but I love it. Working with Fran, of course, makes it doubly delightful."

While interviewing Don, Frances Langford was also introduced. However, she was obviously more interested in her handsome hubby, Jon Hall, who met her backstage immediately after the noon-hour performance. They have been married since 1938, and are still extremely devoted to each other.

Don is married to the former Honore Pendergast and the couple own a beautiful home in Shawnee, Pennsylvania. They have six children, four sons—Donnie, seventeen;

Ronnie, fifteen; Tommie, eleven; Lonnie, ten; and two adopted daughters, both five.

Before leaving The Little Theater, Tony "Pizza" Romano, the popular band leader and singer, had a few words to say. Tony is a native Californian from Fresno.

"Say hello to the folks on the Coast," Tony remarked. "I certainly would prefer to work out of Hollywood, and I understand TV is really building up out there. Maybe we'll soon get a chance to do some shows from there. I sure hope so."

Conversely, Hollywood would also like to see Tony, Don and Fran, and their entire cast, originate from the Pacific Coast. It is the type of show that any city would be proud of.

Young Old-Timer

*Triple Treat Donald O'Connor
Keeping Up With Fast Company*

FLASHBACK OF Donald O'Connor, who was a seasoned trouper at the age of five, and as he appears today . . . a versatile singer, dancer and actor.

DONALD O'CONNOR's the nicest kid we've ever worked with and destined to be a great star in television." This statement reflects the opinions not only of "Colgate Comedy Hour's" producer, Ernie Glucksmann, and musical director, Al Goodman, but also of many others in the industry.

O'Connor is keeping up with vaudeville's old-timers more successfully than most of us keep up with the Joneses. At the age of twenty-eight, he is a youngster alongside the Bennys, Burnses and Berles, although he's been in show business for more than a quarter of a century. The old-timers hold Don in the highest esteem, while he admires them and respects their constructive suggestions. George Burns, Jimmy Durante and Eddie Cantor have on many occasions spoken to Don like Dutch uncles offering their younger counterpart the benefit of their wisdom.

Background

The cliché of having been raised in a trunk fits Don like a glove. His parents were troupers; his dad, John E. "Chuck" O'Connor, was one of Ringling Brothers' greatest acrobats. Year in and year out the O'Connors trouped back and forth across the country. At thirteen months of age, Donald joined the family act with his toddler's version of the "black bottom" . . . at three he started tap dancing and at four added singing to his repertoire.

In 1938, while appearing at a Hollywood theater with the act, he was spotted by a movie executive and signed for the role of Bing Crosby's kid brother in "Sing You Sinners." Winning a contract at Paramount, Don made eleven pictures in one year.

Accustomed to barnstorming across the country, the family soon grew restless, and teen-ager Don deserted Hollywood temporarily to join his family on bookings that extended for a two-year period.

February 22, 1952

Don was making "Francis Goes to West Point" on the Universal-International lot, where we met him in his dressing room. It was a far cry from the flea-bag hotels and backstage holes in the wall of Don's earlier trouping days. The "dressing room" was a tastefully and completely furnished three-room bungalow, consisting of a fully equipped kitchen, dining alcove, living room, wardrobe room (including a barber chair) and shower.

While we lunched on some delicious ravioli whipped up by Don and his actor-buddy, Phil Garriss . . . and the boys can really cook . . . our conversation somehow drifted to religion. Instead of dodging the subject as most people do, especially those in the limelight, Don discussed it freely and frankly.

Unassuming

Don's quiet manner belies his

energy and vitality seen when he's on camera. His flamboyant comical characterizations are hidden beneath a self-effacing off-stage demeanor. Although he was brought up in show business and lacked the conventional home life, Don has become neither calloused nor blasé by the ups and downs of show business . . . a tribute to his charming mother.

The young old-timer has no objections to his own children appearing behind footlights. He has plans for his daughter's (Donna, now five) television debut in the near future. Momentarily they're rehearsing a "socko" routine and dad and daughter may some day soon be sharing bows, carrying on the family tradition.

It'd be hard to make up my mind . . . but I'd probably pick any of the Midwest states, I feel so much at home in them.

8. Do you think the pace of TV comics will eventually "kill them off"? If so, why?

It may not kill us off but it'll sure slow us down. . . . Actually, we do need more time to prepare our material.

18. Do you have any extensive collections of books, jokes, records? Explain.

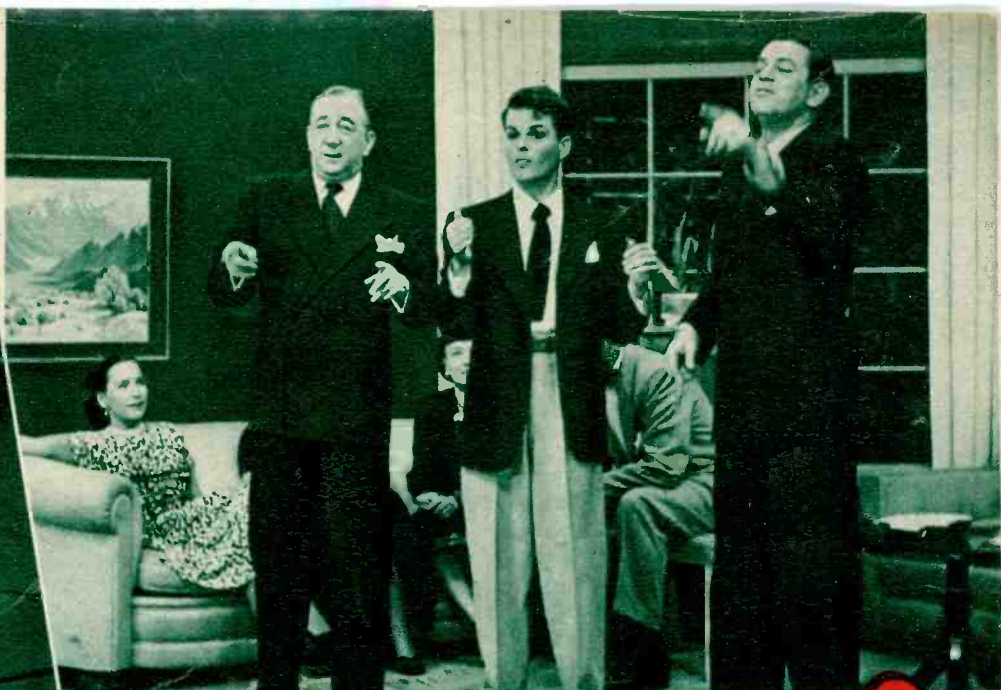
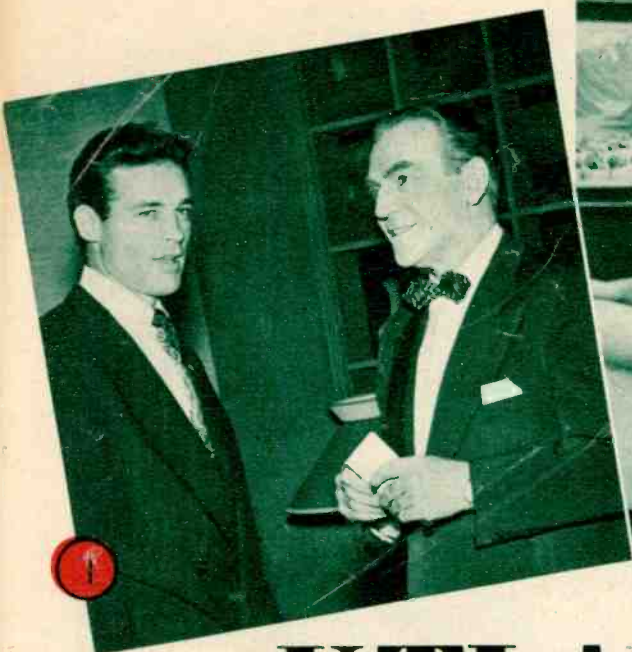
