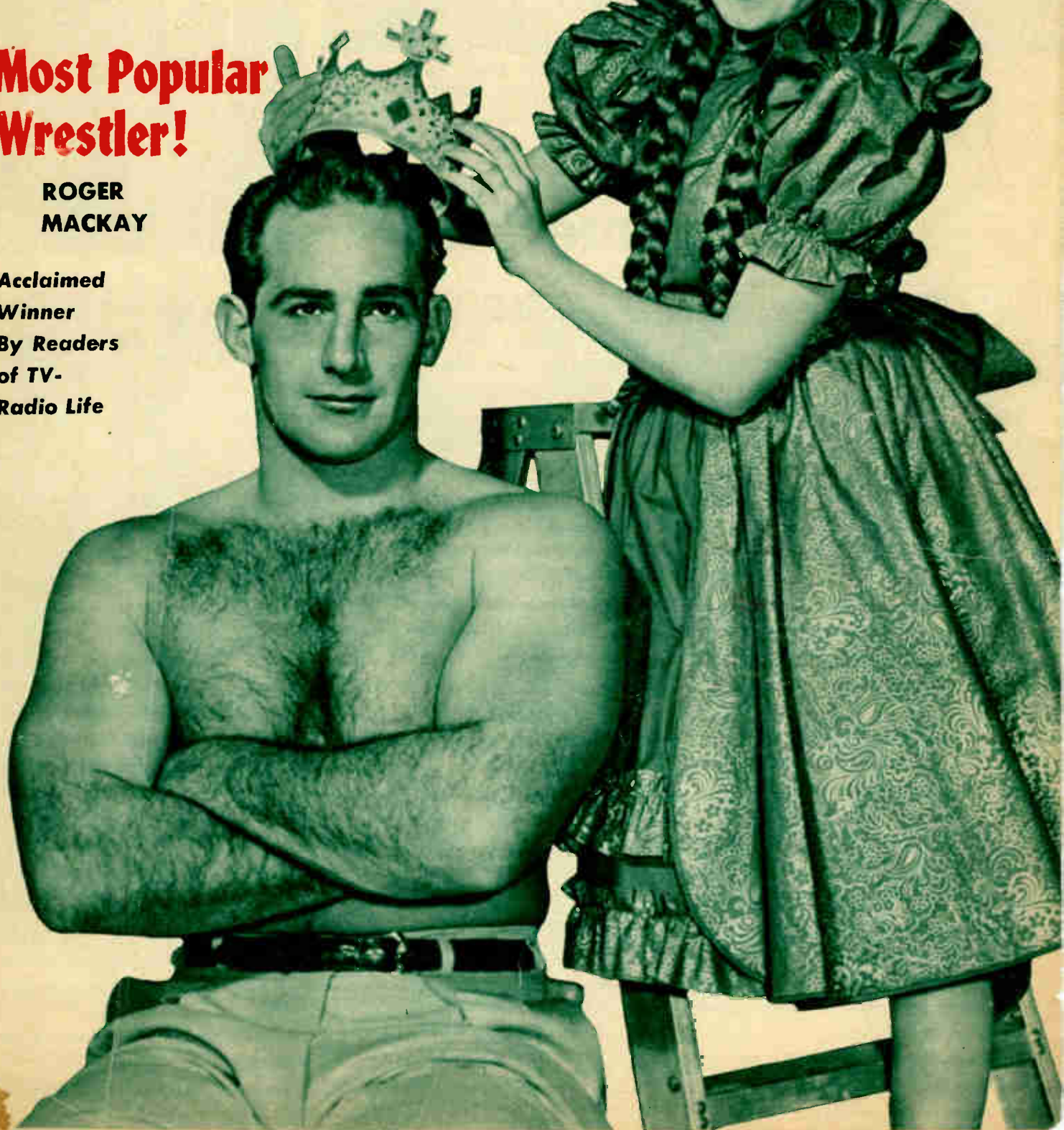

**K**TLA's PUBLIC-SERVICE educational program "Playcrafter's Club" has quickly established itself as a most popular 5-p.m. television offering. It has a rating of over 5 and is viewed by at least 300,000 people daily in Southern California. Recently it was named as the outstanding children's television program by the Los Angeles District PTA, and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has also presented a Scroll of Appreciation to the station for televising this type of educational program.

Designed to teach youngsters from five to twelve how to make things and use their leisure time at home, "Playcrafter's Club" is produced under the auspices of the California Teachers Association, Southern Section, in cooperation with the public schools and city and county recreation departments.

Lessons in woodwork, newspaper weaving, puppetry, painting, leathercraft, pottery, raffia, gardening, clay modeling and associated arts and crafts are presented by teachers from the Los Angeles City Department of Recreation and Parks; Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation; Burbank Recreation and Parks Department; Glendale Municipal Recreation Department; and the Los Angeles City Schools Division of Youth Services. This is the first time in television history that this many educational and recreational agencies have cooperated in a video presentation. Each day, a teacher from one of these groups and four youngsters appear on "Playcrafter's Club" to demonstrate specific arts and crafts.

The program was originated by Arnold Pike, Radio and Television Director of California Teachers Association, Southern Section. He approached Klaus Landsberg, KTLA's head man, with the idea last summer. The station was most interested in scheduling a daily afternoon educa-

tional program, so after several discussions "Playcrafter's Club" made its television debut on August 27. The production of the educational program is relatively simple. Each teacher rehearses with his students at the recreation center or school and goes through a brief rehearsal with KTLA's director, Bernie Ebert, before the show. The teacher or one of the youngsters' parents brings the students down to the station.

**Response to Show**

Since the inception of "Playcrafter's Club," there has been a great renewal of interest in arts and crafts in the schools and recreation centers. Many letters have poured into the station praising the program. A den mother wrote: "I just wanted to let

you know how much I enjoy and benefit by your program. I am a den mother for Cub Scouts, and since handicraft is a 'must' for the boys, your program is a great help in giving me ideas and showing how they are done." Another came from a teacher who wrote: "I am a kindergarten teacher. We all agree that this type of program that the Playcrafters are presenting is very worth while." There have come reports from hospitals for mentally retarded children that "Playcrafter's Club" offers a wonderful opportunity for children to learn how to use their hands via television.

"In answer to those who claim that educational television programs are dull and nobody will watch them," says program coordinator Arnold Pike, "Playcrafter's Club" should prove how wrong they are. Educational programs cost very little to produce and can be as entertaining as other types of programs. We hope to start several other video programs in the near future equally as instructive and interesting."

Each day, Monday through Friday, a different art or craft is telecast on "Playcrafter's." On Mondays, Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Department usually does something in woodwork; Tuesday, Burbank provides projects such as Indian beads; Wednesdays, the Los Angeles City Youth Services show how to sand-paint; Thursdays, Los Angeles County Park and Recreation Department usually has something with puppets, while on Friday, Glendale Recreation Department has been specializing in ceramics. However, all groups vary their projects.

In the public interest KTLA is donating two and a half hours each week to "Playcrafter's Club." It is the only Los Angeles channel which thus far has cooperated to this extent in telecasting a public-service educational program.




# Candid Camera:

*It's Fun When the Joke's Not on You*

 **ALLEN FUNT, ORIGINATOR AND HOST** of KLAC-TV's "Candid Camera" (Friday, 8:00 p.m.), concentrates on installing one of his hidden microphones in a harmless-looking card-index box.

**F**ROM WHERE you sit beside your TV set with your eyes glued on Allen Funt's "Candid Camera," you probably think it's one of the funniest shows you have ever seen. But then that's when the joke is on the other guy. What if concealed TV cameras and mikes were catching your every word, every gesture? What if the joke were on *you*?

#### Not Funny to Them

A young, dark-haired fellow who thought he was getting just a shoeshine became the prize subject on one of Funt's "Candid Camera's" recent screenings and didn't think it was so funny. He didn't even believe Funt when he said, "Look, fella, you're on TV." From the shoeshine

customer, the master of the secretive lens got this reply, "So who cares about television? I came in here for a shoeshine. That's all I want."

Another not too happy individual who didn't see the humor of the situation was a delivery man. When Funt confused matters by challenging all the messenger's requests to "talk with Allen Funt," things didn't look so funny. It appeared for a moment that the victim and the instigator of "Candid Camera" might part arch enemies instead of friends.

A lady star of the secretive lens series felt pangs of embarrassment during her TV meeting with Funt. Funt, who masqueraded as a beauty expert, told the young lady that she did not know how to apply mascara

to her eyes. Since the woman customer was a stage make-up artist, she resented Funt's blunt (for the purposes of comedy) accusation. But this skit ended in laughs all around when the young lady was told, "but you're on television. Right now. See, there are TV cameras behind that curtain."

#### Everyone on TV

Funt believes everyone should be on television. He not only is thoroughly convinced of this fact, but he spends hours putting every Tom, Dick and Harriet in front of the TV cameras—hidden ones, that is.

All you have to do to get on TV is to be around when Funt, with his hidden cameras and microphones in tow, visits your neighborhood drug store, shoeshine shop, or beauty parlor. You never know, of course, until it's all over that you have been the star of one of his "Candid Camera" episodes.

Funt will gladly hide his video cameras in a liquor store, where any customer, lady or gent, might be his victim. And the subject of his conversation could easily be, "What's so good about a big city?" Or, "How can you stand to live in a small town?"

#### Candid Fiend

This candid-camera fiend has more than ten years of radio experience, both in the agencies and as a "gimmick" man for network shows. When he resigned his agency job to rely upon his ideas, he started with fourteen ideas and three hundred dollars. He soon had fourteen dollars and three hundred ideas. Those three hundred ideas have multiplied ten times since TV has given him more impetus.

He is a native New Yorker, graduate of Cornell with an M. A. from Columbia, married and nearly forty years old. His idea for "Candid Microphone" came from an experience he had in the army.

#### Army Life

When he was stationed with the 42nd Infantry at Camp Gruber, Oklahoma, as a corporal with Special Services Division, Funt dreamed up the idea of a "gripe room." The room was in reality a booth where soldiers could make recordings to send home. Completely uninhibited, the soldiers would stalk into the booth and let off steam to their families. Nothing, from chow to the weather to the sergeant, was left out of their tirades against army life.

From the barracks life, Funt went into civilian life to find out what people on the street or in the beauty parlor have to say about anything from politics to peanuts.

If you still want to get on television and air your views as the camera grinds out your every gesture and grimace, then take a good look at Allen Funt's photo on this page. Keep on the look-out for him because he'll be looking for you. Who knows, you may be his next star on KLAC's "Candid Camera."



1. Did any of your brothers and sisters turn to vaudeville, and with what degree of success?

None. Oldest is a doctor, next a dentist, next our only sister, then a businessman, then an artist, then a dental technician, then Albert on the show as my assistant, then me.

2. Elaborate on your most embarrassing experience after turning from teaching to being professionally funny.

A kid I had advised not to go into show business turned up as emcee at a banquet and introduced ME.


3. What is your zodiac sign and what significance do you lend the indications thereof?

None.

4. What is the funniest thing that has ever happened to you during a revisit to the old stomping grounds of things academic? Explain.

Most kids asked for autographs. One kid showed a "Late Pass" signed by me years ago. He is still using it.

5. Do your former fellow-teachers hold you up as a pillar of success or as a pitfall to be avoided . . . or do they even mention you to their students as a confere?

They are proud of me. Consider me a guy who "broke out."

6. Now that you are a TV personality and no longer a schoolteacher, have your opinions regarding television's effect on children changed? If so, how?

I feel that there is as much good on TV as bad. It is the parents' responsibility to select.

7. What are your hobbies and why these particular ones?

Still play string quartets every Tuesday. Wanted to be a concert violinist.

8. How many children do you have, and with them do you practice what you preach?

One boy, age eight and a half. Try out all theories on him. Use him as guinea pig for TV material.

9. Which type of show do you pre-

fer . . . your former "Sam Levenson Show" or "This Is Show Business"?

"Sam Levenson Show" by far. It will be back soon.

10. Do you think television will replace the classroom? To what extent?

Never. Experiments are being made at WPIX, New York, in lessons for homebound children. Teaching is never effective as a one-way process. There must be questions and answers and individual attention.

11. Do you think TV comics can maintain the pace they have set without collapsing from overwork?

No. We will all "die" young. Even Charles Chaplin could not be taken in weekly doses.

12. Do you ever regret switching from the teaching profession to being a comic? Explain.

Yes. I liked the academic environment more than the show world.

13. How much preparation does it take to put on a telecast such as yours?

It takes six days to prepare my monologues. There is practically no rehearsal. I prefer to allow a free play of trial and error on stage. It's more human that way.

14. Do you believe Hollywood will replace New York City as the TV center of the world? Please explain.

I think it will remain a matter of personal preference with the performer. I like New York.

15. To what or to whom do you owe your success?

My immigrant parents' undying, self-sacrificing devotion to education.

16. Is there any way your teaching background aids you in your work? Please give examples.

Yes. I build a routine as I taught a lesson:

1. Create interest; 2. explain your subject; 3. summarize the lesson; 4. leave on a question for thought.

17. Do you wear make-up on TV? Explain.

Yes. Otherwise I would have a black beard. I am blond, but I don't appear so on TV. I also look much older. I am thirty-nine.

18. Who is the most interesting personality you have met since entering show business? Why?

Irving Mansfield, the producer of my show. While possessing a thorough show-business training he knows enough to leave me free and unhampered to work in my own way at my own pace. He doesn't try to make an actor of me.

19. If a young man asked you today, "Which shall I go into professionally, television . . . or teaching?" What would you tell him?

Neither. Teaching is not appreciated or paid for. Television is ulcer-producing and hectic.

20. Have you ever considered returning to the teaching profession?

Yes. After a lousy performance.

Starting soon, we will all watch the antics of some of our favorite TV stars via the kinescope treatment, for "Colgate" is being moved to 8:00 p.m., same day. Reason given for the change is the poor viewing hour at which the show currently appears.

The time differential between East and West Coasts meant New York got it at 8:00—a good viewing time—while we here in California and nearby suffered the early time of 5:00.

When this switch does occur, keep your eye on your TV logs. We anticipate a great bouncing about of competing shows on competing channels.

Naturally each of the stations will want its very best show opposite this audience-puller, in line with the regrettable existing policy of throwing everything at the set-sider at once. That way you are forced to make a choice.

## "The Big Hello"

This month CBS Television unveils what it terms "a revolutionary new programming idea in TV." "The Big Hello" is a realization of the dream most of us have held since childhood—that of some day talking to another human being miles away (even on opposite ends of the continent) and being able to see one another during the conversation.

Designed as a weekly half-hour public-service program, "The Big Hello" will utilize the microwave relay across country in both directions. The television public will be sideline observers to the natural drama of human emotions during two-way phone conversations.

Typical participants might be a veteran just returned to the West Coast from Korea, who would phone his wife in New York and see his small baby for the first time. Or a young man on one coast might call his parents on the other and proudly display his bride-to-be. Situations are infinite.

Jim Fonda worked out the "new" programming idea—and isn't he lucky it's 1952. "Tom Swift" and the eldest of the fun-loving "Rover Boys," back in the twenties, had to dream up a gimmick that did the same visual trick—without the help of television!

### "Schlitz Playhouse of Stars"

Friday, 6:00 p.m.  
CBS-TV, KNXT, Channel 2

More than justifying its selection by TV-Radio Life as the best dramatic show on TV, "Schlitz Playhouse of Stars" presented its finest show of the season recently in Herman Melville's "Billy Budd," adapted extremely well for television by Don Ettlinger, from the fine play by Lewis O. Cox and Robert Chapman.

A minor masterpiece in the original, "Billy Budd" on TV retained to an im-

pressive degree the spirit and content of Melville's study of men at sea caught in the illogic of inflexible military law, and thus unable to feel and act as men.

Focal point of this story of the United States Navy in the early nineteenth century is "Billy Budd," a young seaman who is the personification of goodness and honesty. He has, however, a speech defect which ultimately leads to his downfall, and which illustrates Melville's thesis that nothing can be perfect.

In the end, "Billy" dies, destroyed by the evil ship's master-at-arms, "Claggart." But strangely, "Billy" is victor in the struggle, because his last words, "God Bless Captain Vere," are still words of his goodness and trust.

The powerful and moving theme was not diluted in the Schlitz presentation, a tribute, we feel, to the sponsors and producers, and an indication that there is room on TV for thoughtful and controversial ideas.

Production-wise, there was little or nothing to cavil with in the play. Producer-director William H. Brown, Jr., handled his actors and cameras in an efficient and imaginative manner, projecting the tragic atmosphere of the piece with a sure touch. He was helped no end in this respect by A. A. Ostrander, whose fluid and practical set was a perfect complement to the action it encompassed.

The acting was more than competent. Walter Hampden, grand old man of the stage, gave a sound, sometimes touching performance as "Captain Vere." Charles Nolte, in his original Broadway role of "Budd," did a good job with a difficult characterization. Peter Hobbs played "Claggart" with the proper villainy; while Wolfe Brazzell did well in the part of "Dansker," the common seaman.—A. D.

### *The Eddie Albert Show*

*Monday-Saturday, 12:30 p.m.*  
KLAC-TV, Channel 13

Eddie Albert is the personality chosen to fill what must amount to an actual vacuum left by Al Jarvis on KLAC-TV. For the first two days he tried hard. We went back to work and abandoned watching until Mr. Albert has had time to completely orientate himself to a new medium and a raft of new situations.

In his favor Albert has good looks, a delightful personality, myriad movie-personality friends on whom he must be able to draw for guest shots, and enough native poise and intelligence to handle sitting around a TV station being entertaining for even this long stretch each day of the six-a-week he appears.

On the other side of the ledger must be recorded Mr. Albert's appearance experience under direction. In pictures and plays he has had the benefit of a director telling him what to do, when. Too, TV is brand-new to this professional, and he must be straining to do it well. Some joker off the streets has no standard to maintain, so relaxation is in order.

All Eddie Albert needs is to relax and start the easy sort of gab with guests and studio visitors that helped

make his predecessor so popular. He has Betty White to help, and the rest of the old Jarvis crew on hand.

Once Albert gets with it and makes with the sort of graciousness he undoubtedly would extend guests at his own home, he should click right down the line.—J.P.

*Wednesday, 7:30 p.m.*  
KLAC-TV, Channel 13

The white-tied and tailed concert pianist, Liberace (pronounced "lee-burr-achi"), on his opening whirled through thirty minutes that ranged from "Warsaw Concerto" to "Piano-Roll Blues." The audience applause aloud in the studio and silently at our set side was tremendous.

The personable artist who made such a hit in night clubs all over the country probably has never been the type to hunch over a keyboard giving his all to his "art." His legs beat time, his shoulders gyrate and his fingers fly in time with the music, and no one listening feels called upon to sit silently like a mummy enjoying the "master's music." Everyone can pound and sway and be in the act, and ten to one they'll all love it enough to keep watching this Wednesday half hour for many, many weeks to come.

Everyone loves a mother bit, and the star of the Liberace show didn't err in a brief introduction of his own mother. But the brother bit could have gone. It added nothing.

Neither did the moment when Liberace, who epitomizes culture to most viewers, indulged in about as faulty a bit of grammar as we have heard. To wit . . . "She has always been dear to my brother and I."—J.P.

## Korla Pandit

*Sunday, 6:00 p.m.*  
KECA-TV, Channel 7

On the Sunday night of two weeks ago, there must have been an extra stir of activity at ABC-TV's big center. Korla Pandit's show was to be kine-scoped (or video-recorded) for Eastern consideration and possible consumption.

What the East will see is one of the most popular personalities on the West Coast, at work entertaining legion

fans. The turbaned Pandit sits at the organ and piano arrangement he handles so beautifully — speaking nary a word. He just looks at the viewer, by way of shooting the camera an enigmatic glance (last time we called it a "meaningful glance" and caught it from the writer-inners!) now and then.

Korla can play both organ and piano to beat the band, and his treatments of "Jalousie," "Ode to a Desert Love," "Chili, Chili," "Moonlight Sonata" and "Old Rugged Cross" make great listening. He's a fine musician.

To make music visual, film clips and narration are added. A few feet of moon and clouds while the narrator talks about "peace and solitude abounding" might accompany "Moonlight Sonata." Or the glimmer of water and a small swimming duck might illustrate "Water Lily."

A guest spot, filled by a bead-decked dancer, recently accompanied Korla's musical story of "Krishnari," the divine flute player who stole the hearts of the maidens with his celestial flute.

The camera work on kine-cutting night was handled beautifully, and Korla was at his poised, organ-thumping best. Once the Easterners get a look at—and a listen to—the most championed man in West Coast TV, they may well acquire the habit and loyalty of a good many viewers on this Coast harbor.—J.P.

### *"Personal Appearance Theatre"*

*Tuesday, 7:00 p.m.*  
KECA-TV, Channel 7

A proposed series titled "The Professor," packaged jointly with star Joseph Schildkraut and writer Arnold Phillips, was introduced to viewers a week ago.

The star was great, giving his psychology-prof role a light, believable touch. The writing seemed to us just fair, and the supporting roles rather poorly done.

The story line followed the prof, whose charm and youth rendered him a buddy of all the college crews in unraveling a sordid campus murder for them. The killing of the frustrated girl student blessedly turned out as unpremeditated. (We half suspected she had done herself in when she saw how her fellow "college student" portrayers conducted themselves at rehearsal.)

Whenever a film is made depicting desert days, an army camp or Indian

wars, technical advisers are called in—or better yet, people who have actually lived on the desert, in an army camp, or who have fought Indians are sought. Why then, on occasions when campus dwellers are to be characterized, can't a couple of bona fide students be dredged for the roles? That shouldn't be hard, especially in a town like Hollywood. The actors who essay these roles just can't seem to bring them off. They either get too cute or remain completely static, and almost always are dressed more like clowns than average students.

But that minor flaw takes not too much from the novel situation, excellent acting of Schildkraut, and fresh interest offered by the premise of "The Professor." It should make a good regular series.—J. P.

## "Family Night With Horace Heidt"

Friday, 7:30 p.m.  
KLAC-TV, Channel 13

Horace Heidt has been rolling along on the talents of his huge stable of "amateurs" for a good many years. His latest television entry will lend impetus, especially since viewers by this time probably don't care whether or not these amateurs have gained professional stature and rank.

On hand for the show's debut were portly baritone Ralph Sigwald; newcomer Richard Smith, also a baritone and a Marine; and John Stanley, whose comical rendition of "Little Bo BEEP" provided a lively new touch to standard TV turns.

The pace struck and held on this show rivaled anything we have seen carried on the cable from New York. The production set some new standards for West Coasters to shoot at, and the only disturbing note that could possibly be spotted was the behavior of Horace Heidt himself.

His way with the performers made this reporter think he might be giving them a good pinch as he suavely introduced them to viewers, then urged them to do their best. (Of course he wasn't!) And Mr. Heidt's well-intentioned but completely out-of-place prayer and pleas at the end of this lively talent-fest seem awkward. —J.P.

## We Point With Pride

... To the combination of simplicity and excellence that results in Channel 7's Friday night "Solo Drama." Walter Covell runs through a one-man repertory-company spot, changing suits and voices and playing one role after another back to the voice (still his) of another role. His timing is the trick, abetted by novel quickies in the way of stories.

... To the manner in which Ralph Edwards handles TV chores. His emceeship of KNBH's birthday party turned that event into a fast-moving, spontaneous period as bright as a long-planned, lengthily rehearsed,



high-priced article. (It had no rehearsal.) It was Ralph, too, who was quick enough one noon to pick from his audience young **Robert Chadwick**. Robert, but two and a half, almost stole the show with his nonchalant reverse-interview.

... To another simple idea well carried out. Each Saturday afternoon two wrestlers appear on KNBH to be interviewed for their public by **Captain Leslie Holmes**, aide de stuff to **Lord Bears**. The trio don't waste a second of the fifteen minutes. The questions and answers, all controversy-provoking, are banged out in a most satisfactory fashion, with no punches pulled.

### *We View With Alarm*

... The tendency of a Friday night newscaster who seems to act more as though he were auditioning for a movie role than giving news of the day. His actions are doubly noticeable by virtue of the straightforward manner in which the other three participants cuff through their bits of information.

... The business of tipping their mitt that some of the best shows on television go through in announcing next week's issue. We refer specifically to KECA-TV's "America Votes" and CBS-TV's "Washington Spotlight." Each fine show is loaded with matters of great contemporary interest and opinion-stimulating subjects. If you enjoy it one week—and who wouldn't in these two cases—you are a cinch to follow the hour next week—PROVIDED an unappealing topic hasn't been announced. KTLA's success with "City at Night" must be in some degree due to the element of surprise. (The Channel 5 camera tour is never announced.) Pre-show announcements can divide an audience, and it is never that audience's loss. It is the show's, we believe.

are tied up by a long contract and rendered unable thereby to do any outside work.

T'ain't so. Dawes is under two-year contract, happy with both his contract and "Beany," and has no intention of leaving any place. As for outside work, it abounds. He does the voices for a good many of the MGM cartoons you see at the movie show; and he just finished "Casper, the Curious Kitten" on record with a KTLA colleague of his, Bud Stefan. While he couldn't speak for his old pal "Cece" with the same unequivocal positiveness he accorded his own announcement, Dawes did say he had no inkling of Stan's leaving.

Not only did we hear "Beany" talk, but "Cecil's" incomparable rendition of "Rag Mop" and a "Beany" description of just what Dawes's own three children at home think of Daddy being "Beany!"

Rene Williams is a new name in TV circles.

After meeting the man and seeing his work, there can be little doubt that he is here to stay.

Mr. Williams is the creator of KLAC-TV's new film series, "Invitation Playhouse," seen Wednesdays, 7:00 to 7:30 p.m. In brief, the films are twelve-minute "short stories," each with an O. Henry twist ending. To date, twenty-six pictures have been completed, in which 197 actors appeared in speaking parts, and 156 sets were used in production.

Mr. Williams, who is a native of Switzerland and can speak eight different languages, has been active in the theatrical and motion-picture fields in Europe for many years.

Over the dinner table, he explained some of his aims for his TV films:

"I do not believe in wasting either words or films. The average movie today is too drawn-out. I take the heart out of a full-hour show, and do it in twelve minutes, without losing any of the essentials. This I have tried to do in my films for 'Invitation Playhouse.' I hope I have succeeded."

Although Mr. Williams refrained from talking too much of his own work, one of the outstanding features of the new KLAC-TV series is the exceptional productive and directorial quality of the films.

Babe arrived at the ballroom an hour late for rehearsal, with her fur badly rumpled and soaking wet. The rain and a ten-mile detour had done nothing for her disposition. But she did give Dick a big play when he spent a half-hour before the show getting acquainted.

Everything seemed great until Dick and Babe's handler led her down to the set shortly before her cue. Then, a little nervous with the wet weather, the bright lights and a highly waxed linoleum floor, Babe started throwing her weight around, cavorting like a kitten, banging into a backdrop, and upsetting the sponsor's display. Dick and Spade took over calming duties, with Babe finally showing the cameras all the poise of which she is capable. The sponsor plans to use a different animal from time to time, appropriate to the product being pushed.

This should prove an interesting series of commercials — with plenty of behind-scenes action to rivet the ballroom audience.

# PICK of the PIX

Some really fine pictures to tout you on this week, including a couple of classics of their time, so let's get right to it.

## THE TWO CLASSICS

**"The Southerner."** A poetic study of the southern sharecropper and his endless battle with earth and elements to make a living from the soil. Director **Jean Renoir** has invested this picture with a slow, sweeping, sensuous rhythm that possesses the quality of music, and has projected with humor and sympathy the hope, superstition and courage of the itinerant farmer. An exceptional production with good performances by **Zachary Scott** and **Betty Field**.

**"Topper."** This picturization of the famous **Thorne Smith** novel was a milestone in movie comedies and still stands as one of the funniest you can see anywhere. With **Cary Grant** and **Constance Bennett** as a pair of ectoplasmic nitwits out to do a good deed so they can get into the promised land, and **Roland Young** as the unwilling object of their noble intentions, "Topper" provides some of the best laughs ever put on film. This is the original of the "Topper" series, and with both **Grant** and **Bennett** as the ghosts, proves just a couple of shades better than the sequels.

## ALSO NOTABLE

**"Rembrandt."** The story of the old master painter as portrayed by **Charles Laughton** in one of the early pictures that helped secure his position as an actor. In a rather stark, wood-hard style that suggests admirably the Holland of the seventeenth century, the picture deals uncompromisingly with the artist's work, his character, and his troubles, both monetary and feminine. With **Elsa Lanchester** type-cast as **Laughton's** wife. Directed by **Alexander Korda**.

## YOU TAKES YOUR CHOICE . . .

**"Made for Each Other."** A tear-jerker distinguished mainly for the presence in its cast of the late, great **Carole Lombard**, one of the most versatile actresses in Hollywood cinema history. With **James Stewart** and **Charles Coburn**.

**"Elephant Boy."** The old favorite, starring **Sabu**. Directed by **Robert Flaherty**, the first and most skillful exponent of the documentary film.

**"Girl From Manhattan."** A not very good mixture of glamour, religion and clumsy whimsy. In the cast are **Dorothy Lamour**, **George Montgomery**, **Ernest Truex**, and **Charles Laughton**, an established television star if ever we saw one.

**"Silver Fleet."** An English picture with **Ralph Richardson**, star of London's Old Vic Theatre.

**"China's Little Devils."** A fairly entertaining little picture about the children of China and their contribution to the fight against Japan. With **Paul Kelly** and **Harry Carey**.

**"Son of Monte Cristo."** With **Louis**

The hint is: **WHEN YOUR CHILD GETS TOO BIG FOR HIS BATHINETTE. MAKE IT INTO A SEWING TABLE.** Just strip off the fabric part, but save the lid and cover it with plywood. Hang as many pockets as you like on the sides (for patterns, etc.) and saw the legs down to the desired height. It will hold your sewing machine securely and all the accessories you need go in the pockets. Another nice feature about this sewing table is that it can be folded up after use and stored out of the way.

**HERE'S A WAY TO KEEP GREASE FROM GETTING ON THE WALL BEHIND THE STOVE.** Take an ordinary window shade and fasten to the baseboard behind the stove, and a nail or hook is put in the wall at least two to three feet above the stove. The blind can be pulled up and hooked on the nail. It can be easily let down after cooking. You can add a few decals to make attractive.

**IF YOU'RE PLANNING YOUR VACATION,** this hint might be of interest to you. Take an ordinary house brick and let it stand overnight in a pail of kerosene. If the vacation is a week end, then three or four bricks would be advisable. The brick will burn for hours and a pot to cook food or boil water can be set right over it, enabling you to have your camp fire any place you choose, even in your own patio. (Don't store the food in the same compartment with the bricks.)

## Lifelines

AT TV-RADIO LIFE WE OFTEN THINK we receive more unusual phone calls and letters than any place (or person) in Hollywood, but now I guess CBS's ticket mogul, Muriel Horner, and TV-RL are neck and neck.

WEDNESDAY NOON AT THE DERBY, Muriel kept us fascinated for two hours as she related some of her experiences. People who want tickets to CBS shows send her poems, their pictures, enumerate the sponsors whose products they buy, and even promise to buy copies of Jack Benny's "When You Say 'I Beg Your Pardon.'"

SHE'S BEEN IN HER JOB NINE YEARS NOW, so knows what to expect. In a year's time, Muriel sends out 2,600,000 tickets for CBS radio and television. A year ago TV requests

took one-fifth of the total; today, one-third. Muriel figures it costs CBS three cents for every ticket request mailed out (that includes cost of tickets, envelopes, stamps, handling—only half of the requests include return postage). An average radio ticket costs \$4.75 a thousand to print; TV tickets cost \$6.75; "Lux" (now a reproduction of a soap bar) costs \$13.75 a thousand; Jack Benny's tickets cost \$7.90; "I Love Lucy" tickets are the same price as "Lux."

DURING THE PRE-CHRISTMAS RUSH, requests and attendance always drop; during summer they are up seventy-five per cent. Midwest visitors are especially eager to see a TV show; however, after people attend a telecast a few times, they seem to prefer seeing radio shows. Many say TV, audience version, is too distracting.

CBS HAS ITS TICKET SYSTEM DOWN to such order that it can get

cardboards printed within an hour. They are done in various colors as the printer sees fit—magenta, light blue, dark blue, yellow, red, green, white, and orange. Only two shows maintain the same color: "Meet the Missus," by request of sponsor Leslie Salt, always uses red; Skelton always has yellow.

MURIEL AND HER ASSISTANT DOLE OUT all CBS tickets with the exception of Benny and "Lux," which are handled by their agencies. Recently, requests for telecasts of "Irma," "Our Miss Brooks's" audition, and "Corliss" have been heavy, but despite this, Muriel proudly says "We are right up to date on all requests, even Skelton and Bing."

IT HAS BEEN HELPFUL TO HAVE SHOWS ORIGINATING at the Vine Street Theater and Guild, which hold larger audiences than the usual studios. Muriel has six places to keep straight—studios at Columbia Square, 6000 Sunset, Guild Theater, 1313 North Vine, Vine Street Theater, Romaine Street (Lucy and Desi) and soon, Earl Carroll's. It isn't always easy to keep track of which shows are broadcasting or taping from where at what time, but Muriel hasn't missed yet and we bet she doesn't. She is alert, intensely interested in her work and extremely impartial. She keeps a list of "regulars," checks requests against this and refuses to send tickets after these people have been supplied twice during a season. She

# Radio in Review

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

## "Curt Massey Time"

"Curt Massey Time" will be going out to an international audience soon. The music man is already heard on 700 CBS and Mutual stations. The sponsor announced this week that, starting the first week in February, the popular Texas baritone's program which also features Martha Tilton and Country Washburne's orchestra will be beamed to England via Luxembourg, the small nation which lies between France and Belgium. The program, identical to the American version, will be broadcast twice weekly in England, and may be heard by many in France and Germany. This is probably the first time in the history of radio that a strip show has had such complete coverage on two continents.



## Hawthorne Takes to Wrestling

Hawthorne, midnight funny man at KNX, has come up with his own slant on wrestling for radio. It's a show, every Wednesday at midnight, slanted entirely at the wrestling fan, but with a different approach. He brings on a couple of well-known mat figures, either wrestlers, referees or both, and turns the interviews into an audience-participation stunt by letting the KNX audience in the studio fire questions at the guests. It results in a completely new aspect of wrestling and gives the listener a close-up on the private lives of their favorite grunt-and-groaners.

## KMPC May Go to NBC

Negotiations are now being conducted in New York by officials of NBC and KMPC for the network to buy the local Hollywood station, as NBC is the only net without its own station in the movie capital. NBC has had KFI as its affiliate, but has long been anxious to own its local outlet here. If NBC gets KMPC it will have to sell one of its other stations, according to the FCC ruling limiting radio-station ownership by a net to a maximum. Price for KMPC is said to be \$1,250,000.

## A Last Word

Our last word (and a good one, too) on Edgar Bergen's highly successful "Operation Santa Claus," which made it possible for hundreds of GI's to get a surprise on Christmas, is that Bergen and his dummies appeared last week in two benefits for a couple of towns in Texas and Florida . . . Post, Texas and Bartow, Florida . . . which went all-out for helping him make his "Operation" a success. Money from the benefit will go to construction of a county hospital near Post and a County Spastic Children's Home in Bartow. Bergen will also distribute to Army and Navy hospitals in the two states 4,000 pounds of gifts received after Christmas.

Just to hear Marlene Dietrich's haunting voice on "Cafe Istanbul" is enough to attract and satisfy many listeners. She talks a lot to an endless stream of appealing, adventurous men in her radio series, besides singing at least one foreign-flavored ballad as vocalist-hostess of her "Cafe Istanbul."

Marlene Dietrich becomes the interesting "Mlle. Madou" in the air series, who meets and greets characters good and bad from all parts of the world. Her all-time friend and admirer is the "Commissioner," played by Arnold Moss. Another man in her radio life is "Christopher God," enacted by Ken Lynch.

Each week "Mlle. Madou" is involved in some pretty risky foreign intrigue. She usually refuses to aid her friendly "Commissioner" in his pursuits of the lawbreakers, but is regularly rescued before the episode is over by the devoted policeman. "Christopher God" just as consistently and casually comes and goes in "Mlle. Madou's" life. "Chris," the roving American, does his share of giving the series an active love interest, which one would expect in any Marlene Dietrich vehicle.

performers. Hawk said, "We played twenty-seven shows in fifteen days, frequently going eighty-five miles over primitive and rough roads to get to the next date. Our audiences numbered as few as fifty men at times and as many as 3000 on other dates, not counting the 'solos' we played at hospital bedsides. Two things impressed me . . . the isolation of the 'forgotten men' in the Caribbean, and the great spirit of the people in my troupe."

## Off Mike (Personalities)

### New Catalina Station

With grading and removal of 42,000,000 pounds of dirt completed, concrete foundations for the new Catalina Island radio station KBIG were poured this week. Completion of the combined studio and transmitter building, located in the hills three miles above the city of Avalon, is expected in April.

Over a million square feet of ground has been leased by John H. Poole Broadcasting Company from The Santa Catalina Island Company as the site for the new station. Operating with 10,000 watts of power on 740 kilocycles, KBIG will use three transmitter towers, directionalizing its signal to the coast of Southern California twenty-two miles away, and minimizing to the point of negligibility westward transmissions to the open sea. The site is located on the road between Avalon and the airport, and is already a sightseeing stop on the daily island bus tours.

In addition to its island studios, KBIG has taken over the Hollywood studios and main offices at 6540 Sunset Boulevard, built for FM station KFMV in 1949 at a cost of \$120,000. It is also one of the very few stations in the country possessing its own marine mobile unit for special-events broadcasts. This forty-two-foot twin-engine Chris-Craft "La Belle," KBIG's "floating studio," is currently used by consulting engineer Jay Tapp to make field-strength tests of station-signal coverage from a temporary portable transmitter. Preliminary measurements reveal a half-millivolt contour from forty miles north of Santa Barbara to 150 miles south of San Diego, and inland beyond San Bernardino and Riverside as far as Barstow.

When John H. Poole, owner-manager of KBIG, Avalon, established Hollywood studios for the new Catalina Island station late in 1951, he installed a large flashing neon sign of his call letters on the roof. To emphasize the "BIG" in KBIG he used low power in the "K," high power in the "BIG." It all sounded very logical—until Poole racked up his twenty-fifth reminder by phone, note and drop-in from interested passers-by advising him that the lights were burned out on his "K." Poole surrenders. He's putting powerful bulbs in the "K" . . . but they'll be in red neon this time, with the "BIG" still standing out in a white contrast.

# Record Notes to You

**THIS WEEK'S NATURAL SEVEN:** Doris Day's "Oops" (Columbia), Ella Fitzgerald's "Baby Doll" (Decca), Eddy Howard's "I'll See You in My Dreams" (Mercury), Billy May's "Silver and Gold" (Capitol), Patti Page's "Retreat" (Mercury), Les Paul's "Tiger Rag" (Capitol), and Lawrence Welk's "Swingin' Down the Lane" (Coral).

"Judy at the Palace" (Decca LP) is a great collection of eight top Garland hits of yesterday, recorded in the late thirties and early forties when Judy was still a bobby-soxer. "Over the Rainbow" . . . "You Made Me Love You" . . . "For Me and My Gal" and the others that skyrocketed her to success are all included, and if we can't see Judy at the Palace, we can now hear the fine nostalgic hits she's still singing today.



Johnny Desmond debuts on Coral with the continental ballad "Until," with its lyrics and melody fine material for Johnny's intimate styling. "Oh My Darlin'" on the flip is an Americanized novelty version of "Alouette" in direct contrast to "Darlin'." . . . Clyde McCoy's Orchestra is another label switcher with "Sugar Blues Boogie" his first for Capitol. New arrangement, big band, trick recording and livelier tempo make this waxing the best of a long series McCoy has etched of "Sugar Blues" down the years.

When you combine Ella Fitzgerald and Louis Armstrong on a pair of novelties like "Oops" and "Necessary Evil," the result is bound to be good, and this new Decca platter is no exception with Louis and Ella havin' a ball, especially on "Evil." . . . Walter Schumann (Capitol) conducts his outstanding chorus in a whispery intimate ballad treatment of "Paradise" that goes well with soft lights, and in direct contrast, The Weavers (Decca) join with Gordon Jenkins Orchestra for a great rhythmic waxing of the Sioux Indian tribal chant, "Wimoweh," with the slower cowboy ballad, "Old Paint," on the flip, showing to good advantage.

Helen O'Connell (Capitol) once more goes Western with Cliffie Stone's music for "Baby, We're Really in Love," but it's a wistful cowgirl Helen who really turns on her charm for the ballad "Come What May," and the side to watch. . . . Peggy Lee (Capitol) likewise heads for the range with "Shame on You," apparently hits a detour marked "Would You Dance With a Stranger?" and since boleros and La Lee go together like castanets and old lace, this is our favorite side. . . . A.M.

ONE OF the most interesting facets of TV's growth is the accompanying development of its disparate cowboy types. The phenomena include the grizzled oldster who spits tobacco and calls all women "ma'am." And there is the guitar-playing singer who calls all women "honey" and who is never seen without his braided shirts. And of course the kids' cowboy pal who swings his empty six guns, and addresses both sexes and all ages as "podner."

Kirby Grant, featured singer of Union Pacific's television song and story hour, "Singing Rails," is a complete departure from any of the popular cowboy forms. He's a movie actor, an artist, and a former concert violinist who can't get his boots off.

Grant is a "former" violinist because, by his own unregretful admission "... I'm too lazy, and there are just too many good violinists in this world. But there are no two voices that are the same. Bad or good, your voice is peculiarly your own to do with what you will."

What Grant did with his voice was to bring it to Hollywood and radio, where he got his own show almost at once.

"To give you an idea of when *this* was, let me tell you about the little girl who had a fifteen-minute period just following my nighttime spot. We were both on NBC five nights a week, so I used to wait till she finished and then Dinah Shore and I would walk across Vine Street for a

"My answer was a flat 'no.' I wasn't about to get into the boots-and-saddle routine."

While Kirby felt that a Montana background spent studying the violin had left him barely able to discriminate at any distance between the opposite ends of a horse, the studio felt just as strongly that it was Westerns or nothing for their contractee. They won.

"I haven't been able to get out of boots since!"

The high heels and pointed toes led Kirby right to TV. When the sponsor of the popular "Singing Rails" series wanted someone who could not only sing the songs of the West, but tell the stories of the West in an interesting, adult fashion, this handsome actor was a natural. The man who studied sculpturing with Laredo Taft; who for years gave concert performances on the instrument with the greatest classical connotation of all, the violin; and who has had a book of poems published; and who, while still a student at the Chicago Art Institute, designed the prologue scene for the Chicago company's presentation of the year's big play. "Death Takes a Holiday," is one of the few fellows around who can be just as interested, out loud, in things artistic as he cares to be. He's big.

He has also been trained for anything that may come his way through several years of lead roles in the movie series based on the James Oliver Curwood classics of the outdoors. In this series Grant plays the lead role of a fighting "North-west Mountie," resplendent in a crimson jacket — and boots!

cup of coffee and to listen to an upcoming trio that we thought were pretty terrific. King Cole."

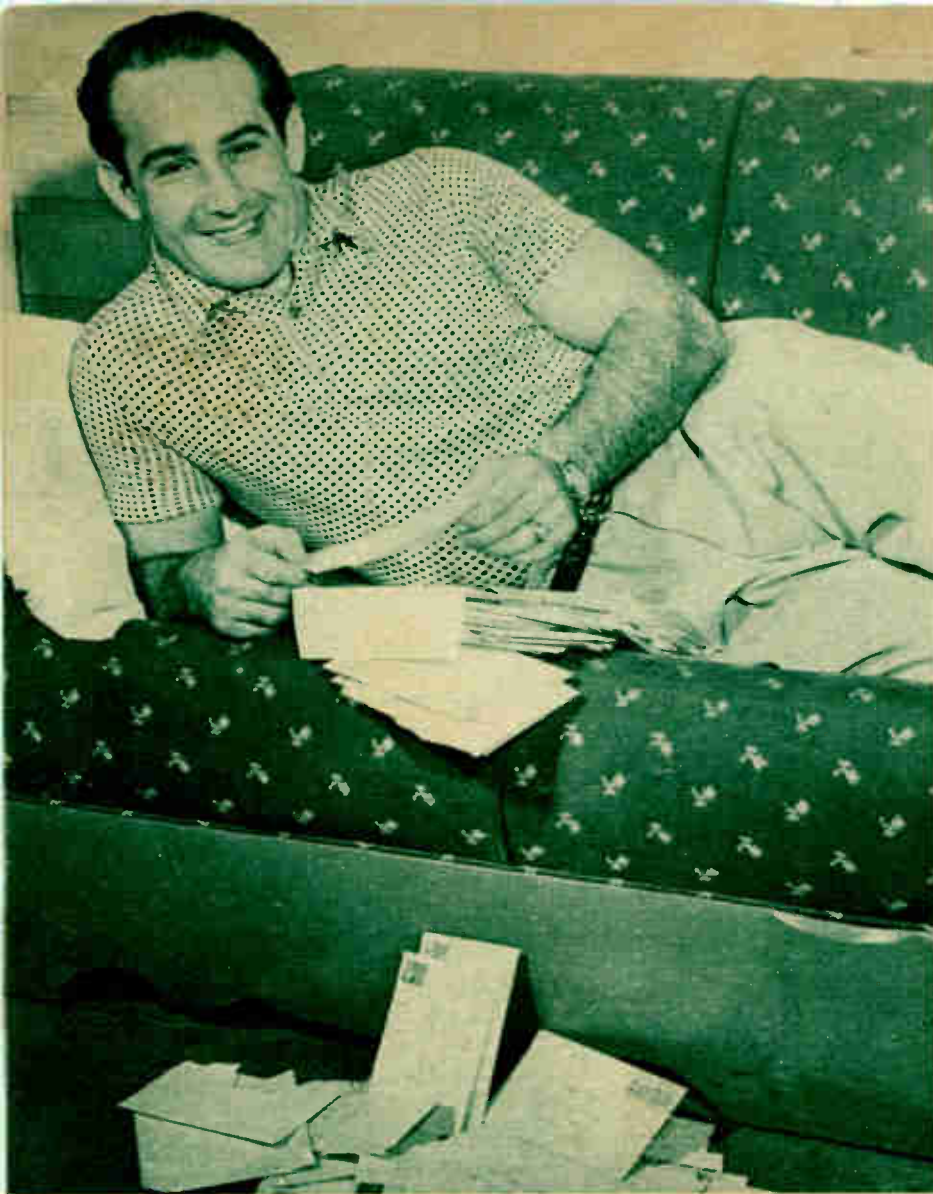
The boots Kirby Grant can't shake became a tiny shadow on the horizon when Jesse Lasky and Phil Friedman approached him at some CBS shows to participate in the nationwide "Gateway to Hollywood" contest. He participated so well that he won the contest.

But the six-month contract at RKO which went to the prize winner was not the way Grant came into boots

and pictures. From this half year he remembers getting little other than the salary and the calluses you don't talk about.

Grant was at another studio entirely, under a contract gained through his own diligence, happily singing and emoting in musicals and what he calls "bedroom comedies." It was Wally Fox who one day spied Grant in the commissary, stared him almost out of countenance, and next day asked the question, via phone, "Would you be interested in doing Westerns?"

**B**IG HANK WEAVER of ABC has been covering sports and news events for the past twenty-one years.

It is only natural, therefore, that the thirty-six-year-old announcer should have some decided views on the local sports scene.

As Hank's TV viewers and radio followers are well aware, the former Marine conducts his program in an easy-going and informal manner.

Talking to this all-around announcer, you soon realize that his unorthodox approach is not put on just for show purposes. That's exactly how he feels it should be done.

"Some of the boys, especially in the sports world, take their jobs too seriously," Hank explained.

#### No Omniscients

"Also, some of them pretend that they are experts in every phase of athletics. In doing this, they not only underrate the intelligence of many

are especially limited as far as play-by-play assignments are concerned."

#### Good Aspects

"Naturally, there are also many advantages that go along with my job. News coverage, for example, is a much wider field than sports. A handful of sports broadcasters in Southern California can sew up the majority of athletic events.

"Newscasters, on the other hand, are not only more in demand but have greater and more varied assignments.

"Although it is purely a selfish interest on my part, there is a greater security and longevity in working for a large network.

"Covering sports is a lot more fun, though, and it's a very good way to grow old and fat, and to enjoy yourself while doing it."
