It is almost unfortunate that there are ro secret formulas to gardening for the occult-minded to latch onto gleefally in their respective wrests with nature. People love formulas, brews and rites.

How Green Is Your Garden?

The Problem of Lawn vs. Vacation Need Not Disturb the Gardener Who Heeds These Few Simple Rules Laid Down By Joe Littlefield, A Real Green-Thumbed Expert From TV

crets to success with a lawn or garden," Joe says earnestly. "All it takes is regular, periodic follow-through on a few important fundamentals. and your beloved plants will blessedevent to beat the band." Regular work, preparation and protection are the fundamentals.

Insulate Your Yard

It was during a discussion of protection, as the expert talked of "howto-do-it" gardening chores, that this lively enthusiastic personality came up with a good tip for you July vacationers who would like coming home

to the lawn you left behind.

"People don't go off and leave their homes unprotected. The shades come down, and the house is closed off from heat. It is a little more difficult to protect your whole lawn, but it can be done. Insulate it."

No Joke

And how do you insulate a lawn? The answer lies in "mulching." a word made comical to the non-gardener through a succession of jokes built upon it.

This particular insulating mulch

is made of moistened peat moss and weed-free Red Star steer manure. In addition to sounding funny, this will keep the root-zone soil area cool and evenly moist, will fight weeds and will keep the sun from toasting your ground at home as it toasts you on a faraway beach.

"It's a simple process," Joe explains. "You can buy the peat moss and manure. Moisten the peat moss well and let it stand until enough water drains off so that when you pick up a handful and squeeze. it merely drips. That means it's ready for mixing.

"This mixture you spread in about an inch-thick layer over your lawn area, using an empty fertilizer sack as the unit of measure. You will require about seven sacks of the mixture to a 1000-square-foot lawn. Of course the apartment dweller with but a few feet of precious green needs only a small sack to do the trick."

Leave It Down

The mulch is spread with a lawn mower, on which the mower roller has been adjusted for a close cut. Water it well, adjust the mower roll for a high cut, and roll over it again. That's all there is to it.

Does anyone need to be told to leave the grass-catching bag off while this spreading operation is going on? No. unless, of course, you want a bag of mulch to cart along on your trip!

It had been years since I had had opportunity to spend some time with the Lee gal, but it didn't take sixty seconds to see that she had changed in some ways and was the same in others.

Can Westerns Hold Their Own?

Tim McCoy, The Man Who Brought Something New to Both Movies And TV, Says an Answer Lies in Keeping the Western Turns "New"



Silent Era to TV

- Colonel Tim McCoy should know all about a d d n g something new. Each time he isn't engaged in our country's m i l t a r y service, he has brought nevelty to the entertainment field. First it was the American Indian, who was introduced to motion pictures when Tim McCoy trooped some 500 Indians across an equal number of miles to appear in Jesse Lasky's "Covered Wagon." McCoy employed the same Indian friends, at the closing of the epic picture's filming, in a novel bit known as "the prologue." The public ate up this pre-film stage-appearance series for years. It took a depression to sound the knell on these lavish, expensive prologues.

When TV snapped up the former cowboy star and brought him to the public's attention again, McCoy was quick to see that TV, even then, could use something novel. So he borrowed a page from his past and introduced the Indian to this new kind of camera.

Keep Up With Audience

But TV grew like a weed, and Westerns abounded on all channels. Half the cowboys, real and otherwise, were explaining ropes and guns to audiences of little folks. His Indian friends were tied up by contract to stations, or securing needed work on other shows. Audiences, with seven channels among which to pick and choose, need wooing.

What possibly is new in the way of Western lore? There are only so many he-rode-that-a-way plots. And only so many ways to show moppets how to swing a lariat, or to draw a six gun and play at knocking over Jesse James and his bold gang.

"But complete authenticity on TV is novel," explains McCoy. "And certainly no saga ever penned for a movie oater or a TV show could be half as exciting as the story of Roy Bean, Wyatt Earp, the Marshal of Tombstone, or Wild Bill Hickok."

Access to Treasures

McCoy, a student of Western history both military and cultural, is in a fine position to dramatize, with live actors or his shadow boxes, story upon story, all of them instructive and authentic. The Colonel has free

access to almost anything he chooses to take from the Southland's finest museums, which, in recognition of Tim's work, have been loaning him treasures for years.

The time a fan wrote Tim asking if he would demonstrate for his audience the use of gun canes, McCoy was able to procure for his interesting half-hour demonstration not only a gun cane, but a full layout of freak guns of all sorts. A gun on the Mc-Coy show is never "the gun that killed Jesse James," as much as it is a firearm with an interesting history to the development of its parts.

Anything Goes

One writer had heard McCoy daily introduce his subject by an informal "So and so asked me in a letter about lariats and their origin." So the wag sent inquiry about saddling a horse.

McCoy was delighted. "This was a wonderful idea. The kids are always

seeing someone ride off in pursuit or search on an already-saddled horse. According to the Westerns, a horse is never out from under that saddle."

So, while it took a full week, going step by step, Tim showed the proper way to approach, blanket and saddle a horse. Then he showed how to mount it.

"About the only way the movies ever show a man mounting his horse is to have him drop out of a tree, off a moving box car, or take a flying leap from the swinging bar doors across the porch and onto his horse's back. I wanted to demonstrate a method a little more practical for the beginning cowboy," muses Mc-Coy.

The mail he gets is full endorsement of the story-teller's wisdom in choosing things authentic. But no matter how heart-warming and lavish the writers' praise, few of them can resist the pun that was inevitable when Tim brought the truth about the West to TV... the business about "the real McCoy."

A Gag

Despite his fatigue, Ray took time out to explain how he and his partner in comedy began their activities.

"It started as a gag," Ray said. "You know how two fellows at a radio station will get together and clown around.

"Well, in 1946 Bob and I were both staff announcers at WHDH in Boston. After I finished my newscasts would remain at the studio and pull some gags on Bob's disc-jockey show. The station liked it so much they gave us a daily morning program. Since signing with NBC this year we have been doing too much, really, but we hope it eventually pays off."

"You'll excuse me now," Ray con-cluded. "Bob's home getting some

shut-eye, and I think I'll do the same before we start rehearsing for our afternoon TV show."

That was the last time we saw Ray Goulding. He looked like a tired, disillusioned man.

Shortly thereafter their TV show was dropped. Sponsors and the pub-lic were still unconvinced that their satire, mimics, and general tom-foolery were worth the dough and time.

Bob and Ray kept plugging away, however, and NBC was stuck with a contract.

Last month the crazy working hours and the zany routines finally paid off.

Bob and Ray won the coveted Peabody Award as the top comedians on radio.

Instead of ulcers the boys now have sponsors, and plenty of them. They're also scheduled to give TV another try in the near future.

KEEP 'EN ROLLING!

PORTS FANS like it rough. The tremendous success of both boxing and wrestling on TV proved that.

One of the roughest and fastest games known to man is ice hockey. This year, however, ice hockey was not available in Los Angeles.

So what happened? Jack Rourke from KTTV got a brainstorm, or an icestorm, or a rollerstorm, or whatever you want to call it.

"If we can't have ice hockey, we'll give the fans the next-best thing roller hockey!" Jack reasoned.

Problems a-Plenty

It sounded simple enough, but turned out to be a complex situation.

First of all Jack and his colleague, Dick Wendelken, had to go out and hustle up some hockey hotshots. With the aid of Captains George "Killer" Koudounas (Hollywood Hawks), Al McCall (L.A. Arrows), and Clark Headrick (Long Beach Raiders), they managed to round up enough players for three teams.

Because there was no regular hockey rink available, Jack and the boys had to build their own at the Redondo Beach Skateland Arena.

One of the oddities of the entire operation was that this sport was developed primarily as a TV package and secondarily as a "rediscovered" sport.

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Consequently many other problems were encountered and conquered: insurance for all the players; uniforms and equipment for the teams; pay for the players; the installation of 400 seats at the rink (they've packed as many as 800 at one time); and good lighting and camera locations for TV purposes.

The first practice game was held in late winter, 1951. Then it took a few months to convince the KTTV bigwigs that this "sport" might make a good "TV show."

Starting in February and lasting for thirteen weeks, the games gave Sunday night viewers almost two full hours of zinging pucks, flying fists, and close, exciting contests, all aptly described by versatile Bill Welsh.

At the end of the thirteen-week period (won by the L.A. Arrows), public interest (plus some loot from the sponsors) had so increased that a second thirteen-week schedule was decided upon. A fourth team from San Diego was even added to the list.

Right now the hot-tempered rollsters are in the midst of a new squabble for the championship. The final playoffs are scheduled for August 10.

From every angle then—economically, TV-wise, and sports-wise—this is one business that is really rolling along! AL AND CARROIL McCALL, both of the Los Angeles Arrows, seem to be pretty successful in keeping Chuck Curcio of the Hollywood Hawks away from the all-important puck. (KTTV-Rothschild photos.)

> "strictly a baseball fan." Mary said he doesn't see anything so keen about watching her on TV, but enjoys talking to anyone about baseball when he is on the KLAC shew.

Whenever Mary has spare time she still loves to go off to the track or play a round of golf, and claims that a ride in a car is an event for her. Speaking cf golf, her score is in the low eighties, which anyone will admit is "good golf." She has played golf with the famous pro, Babe Didriksen, who is a friend of hers.

In most matters Mary is as calm as she appears on the TV screen. She said, "I never get rabid about anything and I dislike arguments of all kinds and always avoid them." Her role on the daily five-hour TV session is as informal as it seems to set-siders. Often she doesn't see the program schedule for the day until she is about to go on camera.

Television or Racing?

We asked Mary about her TV chats with popular star Betty White, with whom she shares the camera spotlight. Mary said, "Betty is just a typical girl. We talk about her boy friends a lot, but I know Betty is the kind of girl who dates only one fellow at a time."

Although horse racing is still very dear to Mary, she admits: "I was fortunate to be in cn the ground floor of TV. I learned on the way and I made my mistakes, too."

Before Mary hurried back to the KLAC studios we asked her for a little advice on "playing the horses."

"I never bet on place or show, I always bet a horse to win. You get your biggest returns that way. It your horse doesn't win you really aren't in the money. I'd rather put five dollars on a horse to win than put two dollars across the board."

She assured us, however, that she would never tout anyone on any horse as a "sure thing."

Would she trade the TV cameras for the horses? Mary answered "Oh. no. At this point I wouldn't think of trading television for racing."

T'S NOT often that a girl becomes a popular television personality by making a habit of going to the races. But that's just about the way Mary Sampley and Eddie Albert's KLAC video show arrived before the cameras.

Mary's TV career began in 1949 when Al Jarvis had the afternoon KLAC spot. It seems that Jarvis posted the race results as a regular item on his program and needed a girl to write on the blackboard all the racing information and perhaps give a few sidelights on the horses in the running at Hollywood Park. Mary, who was then spending all her time at the races, was a natural for this job and so was called in to post the track information. Gradually the race results became a big feature and Mary gained at the same time a growing audience. These same race results are today more or less prohibited from receiving TV attention as this is said to encourage gambling and betting at the track.

She Owned Horses

Mary spent her time at the races not as a big-time bettor, but as an owner and trainer of horses. She and her husband at one time owned five race horses which ran regularly at Hollywood Park, Caliente and Bay Meadows. Television was then only a medium where Mary might see her own horses running.

After her success in front of the

KLAC cameras, Mary has discovered that "there can be just as much heartbreak in horse racing as there is in TV." Although she no longer owns race horses she remembers the horses she once counted on and how one lost out after he developed the blind staggers. One of her horses, "Seargo," was beaten in a photo finish.

Early Theater Work

Theater work, especially pantomime, came first with Mary when she was in college. She did some extra work in films and acted professionally before her marriage. She loves to do her comic songs and hopes to do more of them on the Eddie Albert show or on a video show of her own. Every time she browses around a music shop. Mary is looking for songs which are tailored for her comic interpretation. If viewers have any song suggestions she would be interested in hearing from them.

Mike, Mary's seven-year-old son, receives most of the TV star's offcamera attention. He is allergic to horses and according to Mary is

It all started when Jack and his producer friend, Jim Parks, were kicking ideas around for a television show. Jack, a past master at giveaway shows, jestingly remarked, "Why not give me away?" That did it . . . an idea was born, and the "Win Jack McElroy" feature of his KNBH show has caught on like a prairie fire.

Members of various clubs appear on the telecast to tell of their project

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and why they feel they should win Jack. Each week the judges award mirth-and-madness McElroy to the club whose project they deem to have the most merit. This is indeed a fortunate break for churches and philanthropic groups. If you want to raise money to build a new wing for your church... host a group of kids at a summer camp... or replenish the laboratory of your local hospital, your financial troubles are over when you hit the JACKpot and win Mc-Elroy. Strange as it may seem, Mrs. McElroy isn't jealous when other women win her husband, because, after all, they are only winning his entertainment talents. Proceeds from the McElroy performances are donated to the club's pet charity.

Jack, who loves his calories and rarely bothers to diet, has been around radio row long enough to make some candid observations of audience-participation shows. Although he isn't one to sell radio short, he thinks TV is the medium for audience - participation shows. Somehow the people get into the spirit of things more easily on television than they do in radio. After they've been told the camera is going to 'pan' over their sea of upturned faces, they give it everything they've got."

Women vs. Men

"Women are more responsive than men," Jack continued, "because they are less inhibited . . . they like to have a good time and enjoy themselves; whereas men are reluctant and shy. However, if you can succeed in getting a man to relax he'll show his true colors and ham it up."

Televising an unrehearsed-five-aweek show requires a skillful technique and then some. Jack's use of sincere flattery has been successful beyond question. His knack for handling audiences is enviable. Perhaps it's because of his genuine warmth toward people and his adherence to an old saying ... "To my faults a little blind, to my virtues a little kind," which does the trick on television as it does anywhere else.

OSING AN amateur contest won Bill Anson a permanent spot in show business. Paradcxically, he lost a limited engagement as vocalist with the Paul Whiteman band, but he won a contract as an entertainer with "Pops's" band. "You see," Bill explains, "while the other contestants sang their num-

band. Tou see, Bin explains, while the other contestants sang their numbers straight, I clowned just to be different, and much to my surprise my impulsiveness paid off." The former commercial artist subsequently appeared in vaudeville and eventually became a disc jockey in the Windy City. In 1946 Bill won the KFWB nation-wide disc-jockey contest and has been with the staticn

ever since. Married to Gerry Manners, a former dancer, Bill and the family —two junior misses—live in the Hollywood Hills.

Two of Bill's outstanding talents ... one obvious, the other hidden ... are song-writing and mimicry. He out-Continentals "The Continental." His waxed parodies of the "lover" are classics. If The Continental and Capitol records ever call it quits, Bill's savoir faire would fit the bill. (No pun intended.)

A close friend of the late Joe Penner, Bill has exclusive rights to the Penner properties. Listening to his letter-perfect take-off of the "Do you wanna buy a duck?" comedian can be an unearthly experience.

Bill's efforts in the scng-writing field are well known. It would appear that being a record spinner would put Bill in a "natural" spot for plugging his songs. Quite the contrary, Bill has been forced to compose under a nom de plume because D. J.'s who plug their own songs have become tantamount tc poison for band leaders and top vocalists. LAST WEEK, POLITICS UNDRESSED IN FRONT OF THE WINDOW with the , shade up, thanks to TV, and everybody in the United States had a chance to get an eyeful. In one week, citizens of this country probably learned more about politics than they ever had from history books, and I believe the general result will be most salutary. I almost envy children growing up today with the opportunities to learn things through television that no other medium can possibly offer.

NATURALLY, THE CONVENTION TV COVERAGE, like any other "first," had its rough spots, hitches, dull moments and other often avoidable debits. Some viewers fussed about the commercials, but the majority took the plugs as part of the price. Came a letter to my desk Thursday from a Cynthia Wise of Pasadena, who had a comment which I had heard no one else express: "Yesterday (Tuesday) evening while opening the program with some lovely songs, among them our National An-them and 'America the Beautiful,' the sponsors were so anxious to put their sponsors were so anxious to put their two cents worth into the program they spoiled it. The man singing 'America the Beautiful' was singing the stanza 'America, America, God shed His grace on thee,' when Philco burst in with 'Philco quality the world over,' etc. Now was this necessary? Our country should have respect for

our songs, even if the few people sponsoring the program don't."

I HAPPENED TO BE LISTENING to the radio in the yard when this was transpiring, so missed the incident. But I am inclined to believe that it was just a slip-up in proceedings, rather than a planned interruption.

STRICTLY FROM THE DISTAFF point of view, I'd like to say that a lot of politicos need to slick themselves up a bit if they want to impress the feminine voting contingent. TV has sneaked up on a bunch of "the boys" who'd better get the egg off their vests and the gleam in their eyes.

SPEAKING OF GOOD LOOKS, when are they a handicap, rather than an asset? Jim McCulla, KMPC's news director, has the answer to that. Seems that due to his commanding radio voice, he has been called for several TV news auditions, but was always a loser. Finally the puzzled Jim was

told: "You were great, but you look much too young. Audiences might not believe a guy your age. (Actually Jim is well into his thirties.)

FOR AWHILE McCULLA CONSID-ERED ways and means of aging himself. "I even tried to worry myself older," he relates, "but I couldn't find anything worthwhile worrying about."

HOWEVER, JIM GOT HIS TV CHANCE just the other day and he didn't need to develop gray hairs to get it. His long, time friend Carl Schroe-der, emcee of KNBH's "Hollywood Hour," had to have an emergency ap-pendectomy and asked Jim to sub for him. "This is your opening. Go to it!"

A FEW HOURS LATER, when he faced his first TV audience, McCulla was pretty scared, but Anita Louise gave him a good laugh just before he went on and everything went smooth-ly. If Jim clicks in TV, we'll bet he'll find plenty to worry about. In fact, five years in TV will probably age him wettight that he'll he most sufficiently that he'll be the most-demanded news-telecaster in town, with a mature appearance to match his voice:

GRAY WRITES FROM JEANNE PARIS: "Having my second honeymoon here. Did London, Amsterdam, Rhine River, Germany, Switzerland, Cannes. Have 3500 feet of colored movies of trip. Plan to use it on TV."

JACK MCELROY of KNBH says the reason he and Paul Pierce were as-signed to cover the Chadwick swim was "We don't get seasick. Paul has

a sailboat, and I'm a great fisher." Both men had no time to realize how the telecast might develop and no time for research. "We didn't even bother to meet the gal before she went into the water," Jack told me, "but it didn't take long before we both really fell in love with this magnificent gal. Covering this event was the greatest thrill I've ever had in broadcasting and telecasting. The greatest until now was the end of the war, downtown in front of Mike Lyman's broadcasting for KFWB." Both Paul and Jack hope they will be assigned to cover Miss Chadwick's next try in September. They are preparing themselves, in any event. If they are chosen to co-emcee the televent, they will have every scrap of interesting information they are able to resurrect. "We'll also watch something else," Jack confided. "On the swim last week, we put too much praise on the effort of TV. The viewers realized the importance of what TV was doing and we shouldn't have heaped it on so much." A sound observation, don't you think?

After twelve years' absence from the major air lanes, Homer Griffith, with his well-known program, "The Friendly Philosopher," returned to the air last week, over KECA, Los Angeles, and KGO, San Francisco, under the sponsorship of "THE RICH PLAN," through Calvert and Perry Advertising Agency, Hollywood. The program will be expanded to about twenty-five stations on a cooperative basis in other dealer markets.

"Radio vs. Journalism"

Don Clark, director of CBS Radio's "Stars Over Holly-wood," decided he wanted to be a newspaperman but . wound up in radio.

Don talked himself into a cub-re-porter job on the Albany Evening News. Everything was fine until he was persuaded to become radio editor (one of the first in the country) of the News and the Knickerbocker Press. Subsequently he was talked into taking five dollars less and joining station WGY as announcer, writer of dramas, ukulele virtuoso, song writer and janitor.

The next step was with WGBS, the Gimbel Brothers station located in their New York store.

After climbing the intricate ladder of radio success in the East, he was brought to Hollywood in 1935 to do the adaptations for (as well as direct) a dramatic series starring the late Leslie Howard. Producer-director stints followed on the "Bob Burns," "Mayor of the Town," and "Amos 'n' Andy" shows.

However, one of Don's most cherished radio experiences occurred more than twenty years ago when he hired CBS's Nila Mack for her first radio job. He assigned her to write a children's show which eventually led to her award-winning "Let's Pretend" series.

A Gag

Despite his fatigue, Ray took time out to explain how he and his partner in comedy began their activities.

"It started as a gag," Ray said. "You know how two fellows at a radio station will get together and clown around.

"Well, in 1946 Bob and I were both staff announcers at WHDH in Boston. After I finished my newscasts I would remain at the studio and pull some gags on Bob's disc-jockey show. The station liked it so mucb they gave us a daily morning program. Since signing with NBC this year we have been doing too much, really, but we hope it eventually pays off."

"You'll excuse me now," Ray concluded. "Bob's home getting some shut-eye, and I think I'll do the same before we start rehearsing for our afternoon TV show."

That was the last time we saw Ray Goulding. He looked like a tired, disillusioned man.

Shortly thereafter their TV show was dropped. Sponsors and the public were still unconvinced that their satire, mimics, and general tomfoolery were worth the dough and time.

Bob and Ray kept plugging away, however, and NBC was stuck with a contract.

Last month the crazy working hours and the zany routines finally paid off.

Bob and Ray won the coveted Peabody Award as the top comedians on radio.

Instead of ulcers the boys now have sponsors, and plenty of them. They're also scheduled to give TV another try in the near future.

KEEP 'EN ROLLING!



One of the roughest and fastest games known to man is ice hockey. This year, however, ice hockey was not available in Los Angeles.

So what happened? Jack Rourke from KTTV got a brainstorm, or an icestorm, or a rollerstorm, or whatever you want to call it.

"If we can't have ice hockey, we'll give the fans the next-best thing-roller hockey!" Jack reasoned.

Problems a-Plenty

It sounded simple enough, but turned out to be a complex situation.

First of all Jack and his colleague, Dick Wendelken, had to go out and hustle up some hockey hotshots. With the aid of Captains George "Killer" Koudounas (Hollywood Hawks), Al McCall (L.A. Arrows), and Clark Headrick (Long Beach Raiders), they managed to round up enough players for three teams.

Because there was no regular hockey rink available, Jack and the boys had to build their own at the Redondo Beach Skateland Arena.

One of the oddities of the entire operation was that this sport was developed primarily as a TV package and secondarily as a "rediscovered" sport.

Consequently many other problems were encountered and conquered: insurance for all the players; uniforms and equipment for the teams; pay for the players; the installation of 400seats at the rink (they've packed as many as 800 at one time); and good lighting and camera locations for TV purposes.

The first practice game was held in late winter, 1951. Then it took a few months to convince the KTTV bigwigs that this "sport" might make a good "TV show."

Starting in February and lasting for thirteen weeks, the games gave Sunday night viewers almost two full hours of zinging pucks, flying fists, and close, exciting contests, all aptly described by versatile Bill Welsh.

At the end of the thirteen-week period (won by the L.A. Arrows), public interest (plus some loot from the sponsors) had so increased that a second thirteen-week schedule was decided upon. A fourth team from San Diego was even added to the list.

Right now the hot-tempered rollsters are in the midst of a new squabble for the championship. The final playoffs are scheduled for August 10.

From every angle then-economically, TV-wise, and sports-wise-this is one business that is really rolling along!

T'S NOT often that a girl becomes a popular television personality by making a habit of going to the races. But that's just about the way Mary Sampley and Eddie Albert's KLAC video show arrived before the cameras.

Mary's TV career began in 1949 when Al Jarvis had the afternoon KLAC spot. It seems that Jarvis posted the race results as a regular item on his program and needed a girl to write on the blackboard all the racing information and perhaps give a few sidelights on the horses in the running at Hollywood Park. Mary, who was then spending all her time at the races, was a natural for this job and so was called in to post the track information. Gradually the race results became a big feature and Mary gained at the same time a growing audience. These same race results are today more or less prohibited from receiving TV attention as this is said to encourage gambling and betting at the track.

She Owned Horses

Mary spent her time at the races not as a big-time bettor, but as an owner and trainer of horses. She and her husband at one time owned five race horses which ran regularly at Hollywood Park. Caliente and Bay Meadows. Television was then only a medium where Mary might see her own horses running.

After her success in front of the Page Thirty-eight

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KLAC cameras. Mary has discovered that "there can be just as much heartbreak in horse racing as there is in TV." Although she no longer owns race horses she remembers the horses she once counted on and how one lost out after he developed the blind staggers. One of her horses, "Seargo." was beaten in a photo finish.

Early Theater Work

Theater work, especially pantomime, came first with Mary when she was in college. She did some extra work in films and acted professionally before her marriage. She loves to do her comic songs and hopes to do more of them on the Eddie Albert show or on a video show of her own. Every time she browses around a music shop. Mary is looking for songs which are tailored for her comic interpretation. If viewers have any song suggestions she would be interested in hearing from them.

> Whenever Mary has spare time she still loves to go off to the track or play a round of golf, and claims that a ride in a car is an event for her. Speaking cf golf, her score is in the low eighties, which anyone will admit is "good golf." She has played golf with the famous pro, Babe Didriksen, who is a friend of hers.

> In most matters Mary is as calm as she appears on the TV screen. She said, "I never get rabid about anything and I dislike arguments of all kinds and always avoid them." Her role on the daily five-hour TV session is as informal as it seems to set-siders. Often she doesn't see the program schedule for the day until she is about to go on camera.

Television or Racing?

We asked Mary about her TV chats with popular star Betty White, with whom she shares the camera spotlight. Mary said, "Betty is just a typical girl. We talk about her boy friends a lot, but I know Betty is the kind of girl who dates only one fellow at a time."

Although horse racing is still very dear to Mary, she admits: "I was fortunate to be in cn the ground floor of TV. I learned on the way and I made my mistakes, too."

Before Mary hurried back to the KLAC studios we asked her for a little advice on "playing the horses."

"I never bet on place or show, I always bet a horse to win. You get your biggest returns that way. It your horse doesn't win you really aren't in the money. I'd rather put five dollars on a horse to win than put two dollars across the board."

She assured us, however, that she would never tout anyone on any horse as a "sure thing."

It all started when Jack and his producer \cdot friend, Jim Parks, were kicking ideas around for a television show. Jack, a past master at give-away shows, jestingly remarked, "Why not give me away?" That did it . . . an idea was born, and the "Win Jack McElroy" feature of his KNBH show has caught on like a prairie fire.

Members of various clubs appear on the telecast to tell of their project July_18- 1952

and why they feel they should win Jack. Each week the judges award mirth-and-madness McElroy to the club whose project they deem to have the most merit. This is indeed a fortunate break for churches and philanthropic groups. If you want to raise money to build a new wing for your church . . . host a group of kids at a summer camp . . . or replenish the laboratory of your local hospital, your financial troubles are over when you hit the JACKpot and win Mc-Elroy. Strange as it may seem, Mrs. McElroy isn't jealous when other women win her husband, because, after all, they are only winning his entertainment talents. Proceeds from the McElroy performances are do-nated to the club's pet charity.

Jack, who loves his calories and rarely bothers to diet, has been around radio row long enough to make some candid observations of audience-participation shows. Although he isn't one to sell radio short, he thinks TV is the medium for audience participation shows. "Somehow the people get into the spirit of things more easily on television than they do in radio. After they've been told the camera is go-ing to 'pan' over their sea of upturned faces, they give it everything they've got."

Women vs. Men

"Women are more responsive than Jack continued, "because they men.' are less inhibited . . they like to have a good time and enjoy them-selves; whereas men are reluctant and shy. However, if you can succeed in getting a man to relax he'll show his true colors and ham it up."

Televising an unrehearsed-five-aweek show requires a skillful tech-nique and then some. Jack's use of sincere flattery has been successful beyond question. His knack for handling audiences is enviable. Perhaps it's because of his genuine warmth toward people and his adherence to an old saying . . . "To my faults a little blind, to my virtues a little kind," which does the trick on television as it does anywhere else.
