I Listened to Radio Moscow

*An On-the-Spot Report of
Europe's Battle of the Airplanes*

IF YOU can imagine a radio dial on which at least 300 stations can be logged in an hour—a dial on which as many as three different stations come in clearly within the width of any ordinary pencil mark—a tuning knob so sensitive that in removing your fingers you release enough pressure to change the station . . .

If you can imagine an ordinary popular-priced table model that easily (with an inside aerial) will bring in broadcasts in at least a dozen different languages—from points as far distant as Moscow, Tangiers, London, Stockholm, South Africa or Paris . . .

If you can imagine millions of similar radio sets in the homes all over Europe, Great Britain, Soviet Russia and Scandinavia, then you have a picture of the field on which is now being fought the Battle of the Airplanes!

Business brought me to Helsinki during July this year, while the

Presidential Conventions were going on in Chicago and the Olympic Games were going on here. I had a home about fifteen miles from the city, where there was no electrical interference and no high mountains to impair reception. In fact, the only "interference" was the constant "jamming" (by Iron Curtain stations) of programs originating in the Free Countries.

* * *

The first and most important impression I got was that I couldn't identify the origin of a program by the language in which it was spoken. Russian, English, Finnish, German, Swedish can be emanating just as probably from Radio Moscow or from Voice of America or from the French National Broadcasting System in Central Africa or the British Broadcasting Company's overseas services.

Thus the airplanes provide the real battlefield abroad today—a battle of ideologies being fought out over the ether. Whether the listener-minds

are as sensitive to the propaganda being broadcast as their fingers are on the tuning knob, I don't know. My conclusion is that the net result is that each side probably is merely holding its own.

The basis of Soviet education (and propaganda) is that Communist peoples are told from youth up that theirs is the most fortunate lot in the world.

"You are the happiest people, the best fed, the best cared-for, the most fortunate anywhere. All that you hear to the contrary is merely capitalist lies, deceit and sham to cover the really unfortunate status of the people of other lands," runs the story—over and over in ceaseless variations.

In their attempts to "sell," both sides use artfully the pleasant voices of announcers right out of your home country. In reporting the recent incident of a British plane violating the Russian-held Porkola area near Helsinki, Radio Moscow used an announcer so patently Swedish that some of my Swedish friends here actually thought the broadcast was coming from Stockholm—until the sign-off.

Last night, at 11:00 o'clock, I was listening to a report in English, via Voice of America, of the Democratic Convention. I hadn't touched the dial, but at 11:15 the voice suddenly changed to Russian. An instant later the beam was raucously jammed. Apparently the Russians didn't care about a broadcast in English (for so infinitesimally few Russians can understand anything but Russian). But when Voice of America started talking in Russian—that had to be obliterated.

Obviously one of the chief objectives of Soviet broadcast stations is to jam the beams of Free Nations stations. This is true whether the program is given in Russian or in any of the other languages in which the Free Nations' radios try to reach the people of the "fringe" countries, and the "fringe" listeners behind the Iron Curtain. The recently installed giant transmitter of Radio Koepenick in East Berlin is said to have been erected more to blot out RIAS, the American-sponsored German language station in West Berlin, than to sell "fringe" Germans the Communist ideology. Radio Koepenick now has a power of 300 kilowatts—six

AGNES Isn't Sorry

1. Do you feel that your spectacular success in "Sorry, Wrong Number" has resulted in your being "type-cast" so far as radio is concerned? In other words, have you ever been sorry about "Sorry"?

No. I play varied characterizations, but "Sorry" has always been my favorite. Since it has become probably the most famous of all radio plays, I'm very happy to have been so closely associated with it.

2. How many times have you done "Sorry" on "Suspense"? Do you feel that any one of your performances was particularly outstanding?

The September 15 show on CBS will be the eleventh performance on "Suspense," counting repeat broadcasts which we used to do "live." Not counting repeats, it will be the sixth. I don't know if any was outstanding. I felt they all were somewhat different, although basically the same.

3. Would you care to play the role on the television version of "Suspense"?

Yes, if a satisfactory adaptation could be written. This would be a big job. There should not be any flashbacks, as there were in the movie version, as this kills the suspense.

4. Does "Sorry" take as much out of you, emotionally, as the first time you did it?

Yes. I never get glib in any role. When I can no longer feel the character in the same way, I may as well give it up.

5. Has your interpretation of the role changed since you first played it in 1943?

No. The basic characterization has always been the same, although I have altered details.

6. Did you realize, when "Sorry" first was submitted to you, that it was going to become a radio classic?

No. I couldn't even finish reading it because it made me so nervous, and I was afraid it was too morbid and that people would turn it off.

7. Has the script been changed any since this first performance?

Only a word here and there. As a matter of fact, I still use the same tattered, dog-eared script as I used in the original broadcast. Probably no one else could read it at all, because I've scribbled ad libs—extra little words and reactions—over almost every page.

8. Have you kept any other good-luck charms, aside from the original script, from that first broadcast—or do you always wear any particular article of clothing?

No.

9. Do you know the play by heart?

No. Of course I know a great deal of it, but if I were going to memorize the role, I would have to act it physically and not just vocally.

10. Has the mounting terror of "Sorry" frightened listeners into any irrational acts, as did the "Men From Mars" broadcast?

I've been told that—even though "Sorry" doesn't pretend to be a news-cast, as the "Mars" show did—hysterical listeners here and there have telephoned their own police depart-

ments to try to get help for the poor invalid about to be murdered. I understand that some also have picked up their own telephones and upbraided the operator for giving me wrong numbers and busy signals. The telephone company, incidentally, objected to repeat performances of the play.

11. Do you have any emotional hangover after a "Sorry" performance?

Yes. I'm so tense, it takes me hours to "unwind." And I always find myself double-checking all the doors and windows before going to bed.

12. Do you still rehearse for each performance of "Sorry"?

I most certainly do—just as a runner trains for each race, even though it's always the same distance. I have to get set psychologically each time. And then there are sound effects, music, and other characters to be considered.

13. Are there any important roles in "Sorry" other than your own?

Yes. The sound man is extremely important. A mood can be projected expertly, you know, in the mere dialing of a telephone. Also, the various telephone voices each must convey just the right tone. For instance, we had trouble once because a girl playing a telephone operator couldn't keep a note of sympathy from her voice while I was pleading with her for help.

14. How do you pitch your final scream so that the train whistle comes in on the same key to drown you out?

I always "tune up" my scream with the sound man's whistle, to be sure we'll hit the same note.

15. Who wrote the musical score—and is the same score used each time?

Lucien Moraweck, who writes all the "Suspense" scores. He also has won an Academy Award for motion-picture scoring. Yes, the same score is always used.

16. Do listeners enjoy hearing the same play repeated so many times?

Apparently they do. At any rate, Auto-Lite has more requests for repeats of "Sorry" than for any other play. Each time it is performed, the mail brings a flood of requests for still another repeat.

17. Who wrote the play?

Lucille Fletcher. She got the idea while living in a small old house in Sutton Place. With the East River as her front lawn and the Queensborough bridge soaring overhead, it occurred to her that this was an ideal background for a tale of genteel horror. The result was "Sorry."

18. Do you prefer doing the play without an audience?

Yes. By the time I'm through, my hair is down in my eyes, my blouse is pulled out, my make-up vanished, and sometimes I find I've even removed my shoes and jewelry without being aware of it. I'm thankful I don't have to worry about how I look.

19. Has a radio version of "Sorry" ever been done by anyone else?

So far as I know, there has been no American network broadcast by anyone else, but the play has been translated into nine different languages—including something called "Afrikaans"—and it is widely used as a model script by colleges and radio institutes throughout the country.

20. What psychological preparation, if any, is necessary for your performance?

There is no special preparation necessary for me, other than rehearsing the lines over and over until I feel I am becoming the character I portray. Once the rehearsal begins, I try to keep building the mood I want until the radio performance is over. Therefore, I do not leave the studio during these six hours or so. Elliott Lewis, the director, has a sandwich and Coke sent in, but I can't really taste any food until it's all over.





How ... and Why ... I Make Roberta Linn's Dresses

↑ **EVER SINCE ROBERTA LINN'S** childhood, her mother, Madge, has worked hard for her daughter's career. Even today, she makes all her dresses, handles her voluminous correspondence, and of course, like any mother, takes care of all household chores. (KTLA-Hall photos.)

IT WAS just a little over a year ago that my daughter, Roberta Linn, and I learned that the Lawrence Welk Show was going to be televised over KTLA. As exciting as this news was, it presented a problem—a clothing problem.

The band had just finished a rugged two-year road tour. One-nighters—with the constant packing and unpacking, and always being "on the move"—are not only physically fatiguing, but they are also tough on a girl's clothing.

Getting on TV was a big break for Roberta. She wanted to have—she *had* to have—suitable dresses to wear.

It's no secret (especially to husbands) that a woman's wardrobe can be an expensive item. We had also read about the fabulous sums that many of the feminine TV per-

sonalities had spent on their wardrobes.

My birthday occurred just about the time the first show was going on TV. For a birthday gift, Roberta and my son, Bill, gave me a sewing machine. (I'm still trying to convince myself that it was a *coincidence!*)

Since we couldn't afford to go out and buy an extensive wardrobe, I went blithely about the business of taking advantage of my gift. Although, like any mother, I have always made things for my daughter, it was not until then that I started sewing steadily again.

Sews for Singer

Now that I look back, I am surprised that I even had enough nerve to start the project. Nevertheless, in the face of all this, I did.

I picked out all the material, created all the designs, and, of course, did all the necessary machine and handwork.

The type of material used varied in quality. Paradoxically enough, many people have made the most favorable comments on the most inexpensive dresses.

For sixteen consecutive weeks, I made a dress a week. To date, I have made more than thirty-five dresses for the KTLA show.

Although I have no illusions about being a professional dressmaker, designing gowns for TV presents many interesting challenges.

I believe a woman's dress should be designed to fit her personality. This is what I have tried to do in my daughter's case.

Roberta is not the sophisticated type. Her songs, her style, her entire personality seem to please many different types of people.

Consequently, I have tried to make her clothes eye-catching and attractive, yet plain and appealing.

Luck, Skill or Both?

To me, one of the most difficult, tedious, time-consuming, yet fascinating parts of the task involves the beadwork.

I start sewing the beads with only a general pattern in mind. Nine

times out of ten, when I'm through the final product is much different than my original thought. Luckily, everything seems to work out for the best each time, and the comments have been quite favorable. Or maybe people have just been kind to me?

As a matter of fact, there have been so many nice compliments about some of the beaded dresses that Roberta has an idea she might like an outfit *entirely* beaded. Ye gads!

In conclusion, I would like to say that Roberta's success on TV during the past year—especially the many encouraging remarks and letters she has received—has been doubly gratifying to me.

First of all, I am, always have been, and always will be very proud of her work. To achieve success in the world of show business is a long and difficult grind. And I know that whatever measure of success she has achieved, she has worked very hard at it and has done it by herself.

If the dresses I make help her popularity, then I am happy and satisfied knowing I have contributed my share—no matter how small.

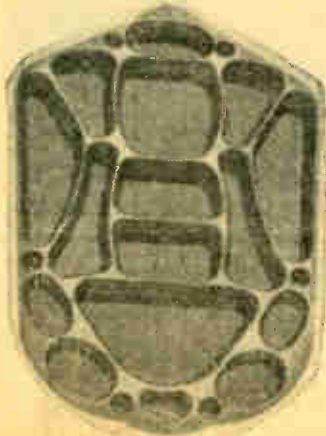

SCALLOPED POTATOES AU GRATIN:

- 3 large potatoes
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper
- $\frac{1}{3}$ pound American cheese, diced or grated
- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup milk

Peel potatoes and cut in two lengthwise. Cut in thin crosswise slices. Place layer of potatoes in oiled baking dish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and add half of the cheese. Spread 2 tablespoons of butter over potato layer. Add remaining potatoes, salt and pepper, butter and cheese. Sprinkle top layer with paprika. Add enough milk to cover $\frac{1}{2}$ of the potatoes. Cover. Place in 400° F. oven for 1 hour. Remove cover and cook until tender . . . from 45 minutes to 1 hour. Yield: 4 servings.

PIQUANT STRING BEANS:

- 1 pound string beans (or 1 No. 2 can)
- $\frac{1}{3}$ cup chili sauce or catsup
- 1 tablespoon horseradish

Cook string beans as usual but add chili sauce and horseradish for an unusual taste combination. Delicious with salmon. Yield: 4 servings.

gained support of a group of television and educational representatives who voted to appeal to Governor Earl Warren for such a meeting.

Chernoff said he was not a spokesman for the industry but said that a majority of commercial TV stations are opposed to the use of the medium for nonprofit educational purposes on the grounds that channels allotted for educational use would be lost to commercial use and that they would provide strong competition to existing commercial stations.

Robert Burgert, San Diego chairman of PTA radio and television committee, said the California Congress of Parents and Teachers would back a television educational system only if it is supported by state taxpayers. He described educational television as a "just charge on all the people of the state."

Lifelines

TV AND RADIO, WHICH SPENT a comfortable summer idling along, have now put their feet way down on the throttle for an exciting pace. As if return of favorite shows and premiere of new ones weren't enough, NBC and CBS are breaking their necks to get into new television studios. If you have recently driven past Beverly and Fairfax, you don't need to be told about CBS's Television City. Under construction since early this year, it is now 85 or 90 per cent complete. Thirty miles of coaxial cable have been installed and other pieces of equipment, among them a marvelous pre-set lighting panel.

AN INVENTION OF DR. GEORGE C. IZENOUR of Yale, this panel enables its engineer to pre-set lighting controls so that the operator can be ten light cues ahead at all times. It controls five and a half million watts and sounds as if it would take a real expert to operate.

CBS-TV EXPECTS TO ORIGINATE ITS first shows from Television City some time the first week in October. The telecast to originate first will not be chosen as a special honor, but rather as an expediency, as the official opening will come later. It is quite possible that Jack Benny, who has a telecast October 5, may be the one to christen the new plant. At first the boys became impatient waiting for a catch because casting takes a while to learn. I enjoyed watching their skill develop. They threw a lure, making it appear as a real fly. As the fish rose to the bait the quickness of their reflexes set the hook. And how proud they looked as they snagged a one- to one-and-a-half-pounder at the end of a one-pound leader. Their eyes shone brightly with the joy of achievement. Once they learned to land them I couldn't keep the boys out of the stream.

"The Crosby entourage then moved on to Montreal. The local constable expressed his interest in establishing a camp for underprivileged boys in the Laurentian moun-

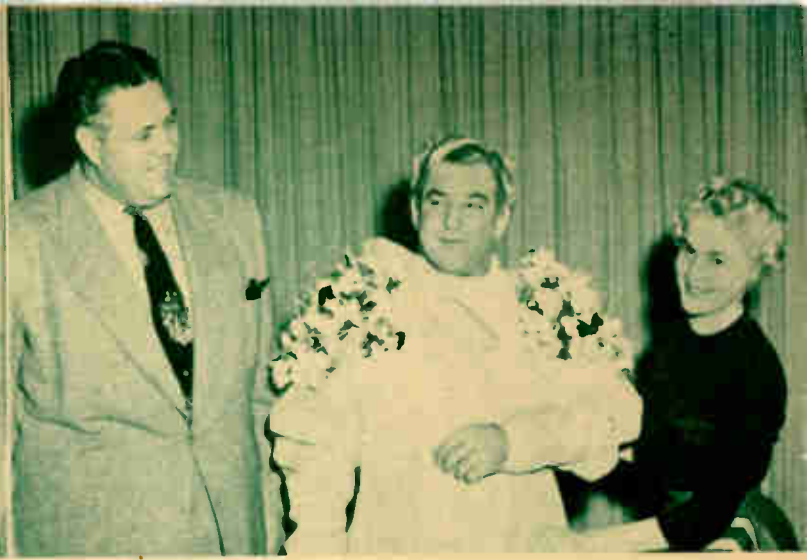

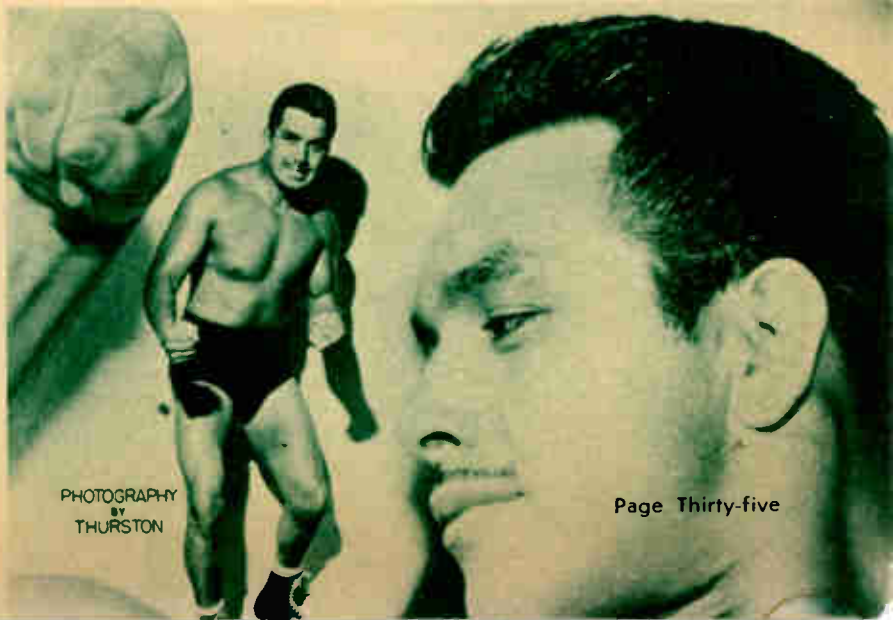

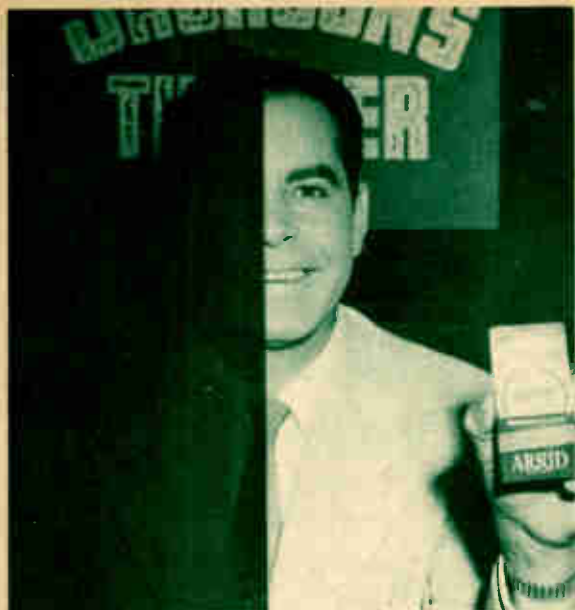

You Don't Miss Much on TV

IF YOU remember your own school grades, a ninety-five average seemed pretty high. "Why, that's almost perfect" is probably your rationalization.

Yet the KNBH-NBC news bureau, centered in Hollywood and covering nine Western states, can back up this high claim of quick picture news coverage.

It's not hard to remember the Ridgway return, a really big story out of San Francisco, and the speed with which planes, men and efficiency got that one on the air, coast to coast. And one hour and forty-five minutes after skinny Johnny Longden drove his 4,000th winner across the wire, people both here and in the East saw the diminutive jockey being interviewed.

When Bill Bridgeman, the faster-than-sound man, pulled his plane into Douglas, the pictures were taken, sped to the studio lab in twenty-two minutes, processed and on the air nationwide in well under an hour.

Roy Neal's title, "Supervisor of the News Department, NBC Western Division," makes no mention of the fact that he is a young brain imported from the East for the express job of seeing that TV is utilized to the fullest on news beats. Other picture media, such as newsreels and newspapers, have been beaten by a full day. The Chadwick swim pictures in the newspapers were taken in many cases from a TV screen, with full credit printed beneath them. Roy seemed the logical one to ask just what has fallen into the five per cent of stories missed or gone awry.

"The things you haven't seen can never be laid to errors of men and material provided by the net. We

have the finest cameramen available," he credits, naming each and telling what they do. "A guy who can edit film right in the camera by getting the right shots saves a lot of time. Our kinnie lab is perfect, and we even have a gismo on the projector that lets us grab a negative, throw it on the projector and roll either locally or coast to coast without waiting for a print."

But the crew have been led astray. "A tip from way out in left field took the gang to the headquarters of an organization which insisted it had developed the flying saucer," he laughs. "We learned a lot of double talk that meant nothing."

"Another time we were set to cover Sheriff Biscailuz's big annual luncheon. You never saw this story in pictures because the Ford plant folding as a result of the steel strike came off at the same time.

"And then of course, the big riot of June 29 didn't get on Channel 4 until June 30. But the riot was in Japan, so we did pretty well," he quipped.

"I hope our audience realizes that NBC and KNBH are very much in the news business. As much so as the newsreels. We can beat them by a good margin because we have the advantage of a microwave, and there's no waiting to ship film by plane.

"We're justifiably proud of our high percentage," Neal finished. "And I'm sure anyone with a TV set knows we haven't missed much."

The fact that people know TV doesn't miss much was evidenced by post-earthquake activity this summer. Many a frightened wonderer hopped directly from shaking bed to TV set to wrestle with knobs, overly-confident of a picture that second!

times as great as any Los Angeles station. And Radio Moscow is even more powerful than Radio Koepe-nick!

Whether the Western Powers' radios are doing any counter-jamming I don't know. (After all, I don't understand Russian and what's more, I can't get a word of *English* when the Battle of Jamming is going on!) But I do feel that our side is passing no bets in the attempt to disseminate our culture. There is a regular afternoon program to teach the English language. There is an evening question-and-answer program whose substance is merely to explain the workings of the American democratic system. These are in English; similar programs are beamed in at least a dozen different tongues.

Is radio abroad, then, only a competition in propaganda? Of course not! In Helsinki there are at least four good local stations broadcasting in Finnish and Swedish, and stations come in from all over the continent with an apparent attempt to entertain and inform. Radio Moscow itself broadcasts wonderful music—of the classical type, and a pleasant Harvard graduate-woman's voice urges you in English to write for their "schedule of transmissions."

But since I left New York, I've heard but one comedy show—that from B.B.C. Laughter or audience participation just aren't heard.

Popular dance music seldom. Radio Europe and Asia are just serious business from any station you tune in. And, it has seemed to me that most of the musical programs I tune change in five minutes to speaking. Whether they are using symphony as a come-on for propaganda, or whether the classics and the commentator are sandwiched in the same fifteen-minute program I don't know.

* * *

Who's talking for the Kremlin and what are they saying? So far I've tuned in English broadcasting from Moscow (on several different bands); Warsaw, Poland; Budapest, Hungary; and Tallin, Estonia. I have heard the same "news reports," in identical words, from Moscow, Warsaw and Budapest, indicating the propaganda control of the radio output of these occupied countries. The theme is always the same, representative of which are a few "quotes" I jotted down during the broadcasts containing them.

From "Warsaw Calling": ("To keep an understanding among peoples!") "Appreciation of Soviet help . . . Soviet symbols of friendship . . . The

bacteria for the germ warfare in Korea . . . American aggression in Korea . . . Crimes being committed by the American warmongers . . ."

From Radio Budapest: "Great accomplishments under the Peace Government of the Soviet . . . How wonderful the Hungarian is doing compared to how bad the Briton is doing . . . Britain asking for more production—more production, of course, for war—while Hungary produces for peace. . . ."

From Riga, Russia (on occasion of completion of Volga-Don Canal): "Russian people's age-old dream of uniting the Volga and Don Rivers has been realized . . . A fresh contribution to the course of peace . . . Made possible by Stalin . . . Stalin, our beloved leader . . . Only the Free Soviet people have been able to accomplish this feat . . . Larger than the Panama Canal . . . Fruits of constructive labor are making life more beautiful . . . An example of the

consideration beloved Stalin has shown for our collective farmers . . . The cause of peace . . . the cause of peace . . . real democracy . . ."

And how did Moscow Radio see our Republican National Convention in Chicago, as reported, in Russian, to the people of the Soviet bloc? It saw it as a horrible example of capitalist hypocrisy in which the Eastern financial giants were struggling for control with the Midwest oil men. The candidates? They were simply straw men hiding this gargantuan struggle.

Thus it goes, on the 25th of July, in this little republic of Finland that is the last frontier against the Iron Curtain. Overhead the Battle of Ideologies goes on in the air; in the Olympic Stadium the world's athletes are engaged in the Battle of Brawn. Only the announcer on the Helsinki radio seems to be neutral . . . he has just reported the winner of the ladies' eighty-meter hurdles!
