The Problems of a Prop Man

Pity the Life of a Prop Man. Here's the Inside Story of The Work a Man Like Alec Borden Has to Do Just to Give You a Few Extra Laughs on the Comedy Hour Show

IF YOU WANT to join the ulcer factory, just try Alec Borden's job. Al happens to be the unit property man for the Comedy Hour, and the things he's asked to do would curl the hair of the most stalwart characters.

Take, for example, the time Al was asked to get a dinosaur that would break up in pieces for a Martin and Lewis show.

"The producer had told me he had been trying for a year to find such a prop," Al commented. "I only had a few days to locate it and after scrounging around all over town I finally found a break-away prop house that built a dinosaur for us. This was actually one of my less complicated jobs.

"On another Martin and Lewis program, I was told on Friday before the Sunday show that I had to get a pail to go over Jerry's head—but his face had to show through it. So I had to have a plastic one made. It cost us about \$20, and you could have bought one in a store for about a dollar. After all the to-do to get the pail, it was never used.

"One of the biggest problems I run into is budget. We're allowed about \$500 for all the props, furnishings, and other such items for a program. This doesn't go very far. For example, on one Abbott and Costello telecast a crystal chandelier was called for.

It was to fall on Lou. This was okay except that it took up almost all of our budget for the entire program.

"Time to line up props for a show is also a headache. When I was working in the theater I normally had two to four weeks to get a play together. I seldom have more than five days to get an entire TV show lined up. Actually, on TV a prop man is really a special-effects man since he has to originate most of the ideas used. Naturally, the ideas must be based on the sketches written by the writers—and I have to admit that the writers do get carried away at times."

Props Can Be Dangerous

"Like the one skit in a Donald O'Connor show. The whole thing was to run only six minutes but among the things called for were a plant to grow from six inches to six feet out of the floor, revolver shots going all over the place, and, to top it all, a duck flying across stage—BUT with a man hanging on to its legs and flying along too. The latter was really dangerous since the man had to be about fifteen feet above the ground. We finally solved it by bringing in tracks, harness, and piano wire, putting the duck on a carrier with the man suspended by piano wire and attaching him to a track so he could be pulled along.

"We used piano wire in another O'Connor show. Donald was to be

pulled up about six feet in the air while sitting on a chair. During the dress rehearsal the wire broke, so we fixed it as quickly as we could—and then just prayed that it wouldn't break in the actual performance. Believe me, I had nervous prostration in that show! Fortunately, the wire didn't break."

One of the most peculiar requests was for an Eddie Cantor show. He was supposed to be the father of eleven children in a skit, so a gasoline pump was rigged up that would bring forth milk. To show the milk coming down through the glass container a valve was placed in the rear of the contraption and another person on stage would pull it when Eddie had to pump out the milk.

"Eddie uses props less than any of the Comedy Hour stars," Al said. "On the other hand, Lou Costello will use any and all kinds. However, on trick props he refuses to work with them even in rehearsal since he prefers to be as surprised as the audience when he does actually use them. As a result Lou really takes a beating. On one show about 300 apples were to be dumped on him from a height of about twenty-five feet. I was worried about his safety but he assured me, as did Bud Abbott, that he was used to such tricks. He did ask that I split them so that when they fell they'd break and sort

Where Has Helen Been?

If you think Helen Parrish is new to TV you have another think coming. Why, back in 1940—well, read her story for yourself.

WHEN HELEN PARRISH finished her first "It's a Good Idea" show for KNBH (Tuesdays at 7 p.m.) someone commented that she didn't look at all nervous. To which Helen remarked, "I wasn't. This is old stuff to me."

And indeed TV is. Not many know it but back in 1940 in New York Helen was already so active on television that columnist Earl Wilson called her "The first lady of TV."

Of course video hasn't been her only claim to fame. She was at one time a prominent star in Universal pictures, playing in such hits as the Deanna Durbin "Three Smart Girls" series. But when she married writer Charles Lang she gave up pictures to tag along with him, as she puts it, when he went to New York to act in a play. Oh yes, he was an actor, too. While there she went into television—and very successfully.

"Actually, doing 'It's a Good Idea' is quite like the show I had in New York called 'The Hour Glass,'" Helen reminisced. "In fact, it was the first sponsored hour-long program, and because big names were anxious to see how they'd look on TV I had many famous guests. On one show I had Bert Lahr, ZaSu Pitts, and Peggy Lee. However, whenever I think of 'Hour Glass' I can't help associating it with my pregnancy. You see, I worked on the telecast up to and including the eighth month. To keep my bulkiness from the viewers the station built an hour

glass for me. I stood behind it so that only my shoulders and face were visible. It was quite a trick! When my baby was born I went back to the show."

Helen was in New York for five years and was busy all the time. When she and her husband returned to Hollywood she began appearing in several TV dramatic programs such as Fireside Theatre and "Racket Squad," and made regular appearances on KTTV's "Without Fear." Last year she also had a half-hour morning show on ABC called Larry Cotton's Coffee Club.

A Show Is Born

Jack Douglas, prominent TV producer, was working on the Cotton offering at the time. Not long ago he got an idea for a show to be called "It's a Good Idea" and he remembered Helen. The package was offered to KNBH and the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company bought it.

Helen, however, isn't limited to this one program. She does other shows and has been doing many of the Westinghouse commercials. In fact, she was signed to do forty in three days the afternoon we talked to her.

"I know Betty Furness is associated with Westinghouse," Helen said, "but I've been doing most of the spots for the West Coast. You should see me, though, at home when I hear Betty is on. I drop whatever I'm doing to watch her. She's a really wonderful television personality."

Helen has been married to Charles Lang for eleven years and they have worked together actively. He does all of his writing in longhand so Helen has typed his scripts all this time. Now that he has gone back East to appear in "The Male Animal" and since he will continue with his writing for Hal Roach, Jr., while back there Helen can't help wondering just how his scripts will be done.

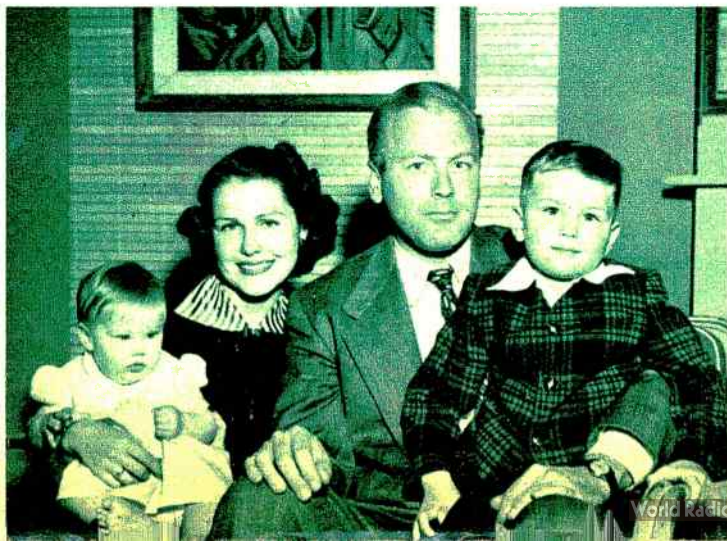
"Maybe he'll see what a good secretary he had in me," she laughed. "After all, I'm the only one who can read his writing—including himself."

There are two children in the family—Charles Lang III, six, and Molly, two and a half. Helen has no help and does all the typical household chores.

"I can do this because I don't have the usual nine-to-five daily routine," she commented. "And when I do get tied up, Charles has always pitched in and at least cooked the dinner for me."

Give Helen a good look and you'll keep looking. That's for sure.

MY BABY *Came from Heaven*

Robin Elizabeth Rogers Came to Earth on a Special Mission . . .

I WAS SO happy when Robin was born. Although I loved Roy's children as though they were my very own, Robin was my first daughter and how I longed to fuss over and love her. She was such a beautiful baby.

I became suspicious that all was not right with Robin when the nurses spoke in whispers and avoided my questions. My happiness fled when the doctors told me that Robin came into the world with an appalling handicap. Her physical and mental condition foredoomed her to a short stay on earth.

I was stunned. I cried bitterly and asked God what I had done to deserve this. Self-incrimination seemed futile when I looked about and realized that there were other good Christians who had similar crosses to bear. I was so confused that I kept asking God, "Why . . . why?" I was always trying to find some reason for Robin's affliction.

After our initial shock Roy and I began to think that perhaps there was a reason why Robin was sent to us in her "condition." Maybe we were supposed to do something about it. Maybe we were chosen to help the thousands of children who were retarded.

We turned deaf ears to the professional advice of sending Robin to an institution. Instead we took her home to love and care for.

Robin had constant nursing care and medical attention. Whenever I was away on an engagement I worried so because I wanted to be with Robin every second, to give her every bit of love I had in my soul.

Robin was gradually fulfilling her Mission. We had always been a devoted family . . . Roy, the children, Dusty, Linda and Cheryl and myself. But little Robin weaved her heavenly magic on all of us. The children were kinder and more considerate of those less fortunate than they had ever been before. Eventually both Roy and myself gradually found peace by accepting God's will . . . that Robin was an Angel on a Special Mission.

Departure

Robin returned to her Heavenly Father two days before her second birthday. A few days after her burial I was struck by the sudden force of her Mission and what she had done

to me and the family. She had a message for the world and I decided that I was the one to write it for her. I was so overcome with grief during my initial attempt at writing her story that the words would not come. I floundered helplessly and was forced to cease writing.

During Robin's illness I had been approached by many periodicals asking me to write about her. However, I refused because I didn't know whether it would be the right thing for me to do. It wasn't until she departed that I knew it was my duty to write about our little Angel.

I found consolation and inspiration in Dr. Norman Vincent Peale's wonderful book, "A Guide to Confident Living." His chapter on death was of particular help to me. It was quite by accident that I discovered the book. Roy and I were on our way to fulfilling a rodeo engagement at Madison Square Garden when my tear-stained eyes spotted the book on a rack in the railroad station.

Guidance

As soon as we arrived in New York, I hastened to see Dr. Peale and told him my story. He agreed that if I wrote a book about Robin it would bring enlightenment to the world and a better understanding of handicapped children. There were so many parents who were needlessly ashamed of their children and kept them hidden from the world. Dr. Peale's confidence and spiritual guidance gave me the strength I needed.

From this point on I was so inspired that every spare minute I could take from the Rodeo was used to write her story. This time the words flowed from my pen and I completed the book in three weeks. Dr. Peale arranged to have the book published and he wrote the introduction to Robin's story, "Angel Unaware." All royalties from the sale of the book are to go to the National Association for Retarded Children. In California alone there are approximately 80,000 retarded children. Helping them has become our life's dedication.

It has been said that tragedy and sorrow never leave us where they find us. In this instance, both Roy and I are grateful to God for the privilege of learning some great lessons of truth through His tiny messenger, Robin Elizabeth Rogers.

"Conklin" Spelled Backward

Doesn't Mean That His Portrayer Is A Pompous Old Windbag, and If You Think So, Read This for a Surprise

FUNNY THING," one of Gale Gordon's friends observed the other day after lunching with the actor and his wife Virginia. "Gale plays mostly pompous, crabby or stuffy roles on radio and TV, but he isn't that way at all in real life. As 'Mayor La Trivia' on 'Fibber and Molly' or the father on 'Junior Miss' or 'Mr. Conklin' on 'Our Miss Brooks' he gives people the idea he might be rather disagreeable. But I've never heard him say a cross word to Virginia or a mean thing about anybody. That's rather unusual, especially in Hollywood."

Gale and Virginia, married for fifteen years, play husband and wife on the TV version of "Our Miss Brooks." In addition to being "Mrs. Conklin," Virginia has also been seen on the "Kissing Cake" commercials.

She is too busy with radio commitments to do much cooking at home, but she does insist on making out all the household menus and doing the marketing. TV has actually absorbed so much of the Gordons' time that their only chance for vacation comes with a switch in shooting schedules, which sometimes allows four or five days respite. The pair are usually so tired by then that they do little else but rest.

This is not exactly a hardship when your home happens to be a lovely estate—charming California Colonial type house in Encino, set in a clus-

ter of orange trees and surrounded by flowers, terraces, and other accoutrements of Valley living. Home is especially complete because Virginia can turn an accomplished hand at decorating and Gale is a one-in-a-thousand mechanic.

Is Handy

"He has always fixed the little things that went wrong around the house," Virginia stated with more than a trace of pride. "Plumbing, broken furniture, anything like that."

During World War II Gale entered service (November 1942) and was sent to San Clemente. His aptitude test showed such high ability in mechanics that he trained in ordnance. Gale likes to tell about the Sears machine shop he had accumulated for his home shop before getting into uniform and how he donated it to the Camp to start the ball rolling. Finally, when he was assigned to LST 201, a series of rare circumstances shoved Dale into a situation where two weeks after going aboard he was taking care of all the ship's guns, all sizes and kinds (some of which he had never seen before) from the biggest to officers' pistols.

So keen is Gale's mechanical ability that all he has to do to learn how something is put together or how it runs is watch someone else do it or run it once. Sometimes not even this aid is needed. On the LST a Japanese pistol came into his hands and Gale

patiently studied until he hit the trick of taking it apart.

Putting back together again is never a problem. Virginia likes to tell about the birthday present she gave Gale—a Shopmaster, complete and versatile tool ensemble. The salesman thought he was doing the Gordons a special favor by showing Gale how to assemble the tool, but before he had turned his back, Gale had the whole thing torn down and discovered there were some screws missing.

Between projects in their home, bought three years ago from noted radio writer Don Quinn ("Fibber McGee and Molly," "Halls of Ivy"), and their professional work, Gale and Virginia lead a completely story-book life. When Gale wants to relax, he paints (one of his oils was his Christmas present to Eve Arden). Virginia loves gardening and tries to raise all cut flowers for the house.

"I love to have flowers in all the rooms," she enthused. Asked whether Gale helped in the gardening chores, Virginia indicated hers was a solo job. Gale secretly enjoys the colorful bouquets his wife arranges, but asked by TV-Radio Life if he cared whether or not Virginia went to the trouble of raising and fixing flowers, he assumed a distinctly "Conklin" pose, raised his left eyebrow meaningfully, cocked an eye at Virginia and said sonorously, "I have my flower!"

TV Pioneer:

George Rivera

Six years ago, when George Rivera became the proud owner of San Diego's first TV receiving set, the antenna atop his North Park home became a San Diego curiosity. Rivera's appetite was whetted, even by 1947 vintage programs; he asked Mexico's Secretary of Communications and Public Works to assign him a channel for telecasting from Tijuana.

The secretary's advice was to wait, since the United States and Mexico had not yet divvied up border-area channel allocations. But Rivera took the precaution of sewing up thirty-five strategic mountain-top acres as a transmitter site, if and when.

With signing of the North American Treaty between our State Department and Mexico, Tijuana was assigned two VHF channels. Rivera got one of these, erected a stucco building on Mt. San Antonio and began ordering equipment. He had by this time acquired a partner—Emilio Azcarraga, owner of extensive TV, radio and patent holdings in Mexico.

The Korean outbreak forced a delay, but early last December XETV's transmitter and tower parts rolled across the border in five trailer-trucks. XETV sent its first test signal on January 27, 1953.

TV reception up to 125 miles is no novelty in Southern California. Greeting XETV management's request for reception data, however, was a flood of mail from points as far north as Taft, and areas above Santa Barbara, both more than 200 air miles from the transmitter.

For some of eastern San Diego County and parts of Imperial Valley, XETV claims to have provided the first clear TV image yet received.

Two networks (NBC and DuMont) have petitioned the FCC to affiliate XETV, and Alvin G. Flanagan, until recently ABC-TV's western program director, has applied to beam live shows to XETV from studios in San Diego. XETV maintains San Diego offices.

Pending FCC approval on these requests, the station is limited to filmed programs. High points of the week's programming are Wednesdays, with *Liberace at 7:30 p.m.*, and *"Douglas Fairbanks Presents"* at 8, and Tuesdays, when XETV shows a *"Movie of the Week"* at 8 p.m.

Ed Murrow of "See It Now" is not only TV's most stimulating personality but his news commentary on KNX Mondays through Fridays at 5 p.m. is the most thought-provoking program you'll find anywhere. Ed never hysterically campaigns on any issue, but he does give facts—and is not afraid to name names. His recent blast at General VanFleet for contradictory statements made about ammunition shortages in Korea and Ed's dynamite-packed commentary about the \$100,000 offered for a MIG plane and Red pilot as compared to the complete lack of action to release correspondent Bill Oatis, still in a Prague jail, were sensational. The public owes a vast debt to Ed Murrow for speaking his mind on controversial issues without ever resorting to haranguing or unfounded name-calling. All commentators—and all political figures—should listen to him and learn how to present the real truths to the American people.

Alan Young's new format on his TV show was a sorry affair—if the first telecast is to be any basis for judgment. Somebody must have told Alan that the more frantic and confused the action the better the whole thing would go over. The result was just plain unfunny. Surely Alan's talents deserve better treatment than this.

Did any of you have the misfortune to catch a thing called "Once Upon a Dream" week ago Sunday on KNBH? It took over the Hallmark Hall of Fame time—and if Hallmark can get anybody to watch future shows after seeing this abortion Fate will be kind to them. This so-called fantasy was loaded with production but was about as lousy a show as you're ever likely to see. The film that was blasted on this one!

Monty Margetts, who should certainly be having a show of her own, was given a rush call to take over Chef Milani's spot for a week due to the chef's illness. As usual, Monty breezed through the proceedings, in spite of the short notice given her.

Thomas McDowall, Roddy McDowall's father, presented a fascinating half-hour commentary on the history and actual details of the coronation on KALI a couple of Sundays ago. The accurate reporting, the fine music heard, and the actual voices of those who participate in this most impressive of all of England's ceremonies made this show outstanding. Now that the coronation is about with us, other stations would do well to contact Mr. McDowall and re-run his program.

Caught Terrea Lea, a favorite of ours, on Tex Williams's show recently and was slightly bowled over to find her wearing a leather jacket and jodhpurs. With the figure this young lady has, why is she covering it up so unattractively? What's wrong with being your glamorous self, Terrea? Yes—even on a Western show!

New Books on TV: Robert Alan Aurthur has written a rather amusing novel called *"The Glorification of Al Toolum."* Aurthur, who writes for *"Mr. Peepers"* and *"Philco Playhouse,"* has presented a real zany picture of a zany American family, but his attempts to draw a biting satire of advertising agencies and TV fell a little flat. Let's hope he wasn't afraid his sponsors would "can" him if he went too far. In spite of the fact that he missed the boat, *"The Glorification of Al Toolum"* is fun for those idle moments. . . . *"The Television Workshop,"* published by Northwestern Press, is a well-presented technical book on all phases of TV production and should be in the library of everyone who is in the industry or hopes to enter it. Without going into a lot of involved terminology and details, it makes TV as fascinating a medium as it actually is. A good job.

Lifelines

ASSURANCES THAT "SPACE PATROL" would "continue indefinitely" greeted this column's inquiry at ABC last week following the tragic death of the program's creator, **Mike Moser**. Mike originally wrote, directed and produced the show, but about four months after the series started rolling, turned the writing over to **Norm Jolley**, who still writes the half-hour weekly "Space Patrol" (microwaved coast to coast) and also serves as script editor for the Monday-through-Friday segments. **Dik Darley** later took on direction of the half hour and **Larry Robertson** of the strip shows, with Moser acting in advisory capacity.

IT IS ALSO EXPECTED THAT THE "Space Patrol" merchandising will proceed, as there are now seventy different items on the market, among them a bubble helmet which is probably the largest-selling toy in America today. Those close to the picture feel that popularity of these items has only begun and that it will actually be next year before such merchandise hits its stride.



PAGING MR. DIOGENES

If Mr. Diogenes were alive today, and if he could read the mail we have received on our series of articles on fraudulent advertising, there is no doubt he would need a larger lantern!

If the letters we have received are any indication, it would seem that about one-fourth of the population is engaged in cheating the remaining three-fourths. With an estimated ten million dollars yearly of the Southern California consumer's money being channeled into the pockets of various and sundry crooks it appears as if the honest business man doesn't have a chance.

Who is to blame for this condition? What can be done about it?

YOU are mainly to blame for the existence of these racketeers. **YOU** can put them out of business. And **YOU** can keep them out of business.

Some of you have written to HOME LIFE and have said your common sense told you that it was impossible to buy a vacuum cleaner for \$8.95 or some other such ridiculous price. But the words sounded so good, the salesman was so persuasive, and your sales resistance was so low, that now you are in trouble. Or, **YOU** had it in your heart to talk your friends into buying a water softener, not on the basis of its being something you had purchased and would recommend, but just to get that promised \$50 credit toward your own purchase. And that

\$300 overpriced water softener was no better than the water softener available at the local store for about \$150.

And when you listened to the fine promises made over the airwaves by that used-car outfit, you plain old forgot one thing: **A used car, in most instances, is a car that the owner no longer wants.** Remember that the next time you go to buy a used car.

So, Mr. and Mrs. Consumer, **YOU** must be on guard to keep from being cheated. Before you buy, investigate. Don't make your purchase the first time offered. Compare, check prices, quantity and other information. Beware of house-to-house salesmen, whose offices are in their hats, whose guarantees are worthless, and whose claims are not backed up by reputable goods.

And, next time you hear of a fraudulent scheme "hooking" someone you know, report it. If a TV or radio station is involved, write to them or write to us with the facts. We'll pass it along to the station, if you so specify.

KFMB in San Diego has recently announced the banning of all "pitch" type commercials. KTLA has taken a step in the right direction with a new policy on used-car commercials specifying car license or motor number be shown to the viewer.

If enough of your protests reach the stations, they must take action. Advertising is the lifeblood of their business. Once you lose faith in it, they suffer. Don't let them forget it.

LET'S LIGHT UP MR. DIOGENES'S LANTERN FOR HIM.

I have just read your article "How Lucky Can You Be?" in the latest issue of TV-Radio Life, with the knowledge of one who was so "taken."

The thought of the whole mess still sickens me. A fellow worker of my husband gave our name to a similar company as you suggested in your article. The salesman told us we just couldn't afford to pass up this wonderful opportunity, and to think of the money we would save. For every name of a friend of ours that they sold a product to (they sold water softeners, incinerators, garbage disposals, and possibly other things) we would get a \$50.00 commission. "Why it's entirely possible we wouldn't have to pay a cent for our softener," he said.

The reason they paid the \$50.00 to us was that they did no advertising except through personal contacts, and the money his company saved from magazine and other types of similar ads was given to the person who gave the company names of prospects who bought any of the products. Well, anyway, the pitch was nearly a ditto to your article. I'm glad to say that none of our friends, whose names we gave, bought anything.

It took us a while to snap out of this daydream, and when we did it was too late to do anything as we had signed the contract. Thank heavens we only have a few more payments to meet. The only good that came from this whole thing is that I have acquired a terrific sales resistance. I hated learning the hard way, some people have to, but I do hope others more fortunate than myself will learn a lesson from your article—that you never get anything for nothing.

Then you're all comfortable in an easy chair and then the gimmick. After he beats around the bush for a while you get tired of it and pin him down to the facts.

First the album is not yours unless you sign up for some photographs. Two pictures each year for seven years and only three dollars and some odd cents a picture and they know good and well (as you have stated before) you won't stop at one picture. He then tells you that you don't want to fool around with such a little sum each time you have a picture taken, so you pay the full sum NOW. Which adds up to, when he gets through, \$50.00. Nice little sum!



Home projects you do yourself are the newest national pastime—and most of them started here in California. Indoors or out—they mean real satisfaction, so let's start with our . . .

GARDEN CHECK LIST

ONE: Bermuda (devil) grass is a plague to many new homeowners, who call to ask me how to get rid of it. Most lawn experts now agree—don't fight it . . . take care of it! Spring feeding, plus seeding in the bare spots, will give you a rich green lawn. Water once a week—twice a week on sandy soil—and soak it thoroughly.

TWO: Kids having spring fever? Let 'em grow something, in a small section of garden that's theirs alone. Start either with seeds or bedding plants, and choose easy-to-grow flowers like marigolds, stocks, African daisies, snapdragons or forget-me-nots. They'll learn as much from those plants as in many schoolroom sessions.

THREE: Roses will look better and stay healthier if you water them by overhead sprinkling instead of irrigation. It washes the foliage and helps prevent mildew. But—do it in the morning, so they'll be dry long before the sun goes down.

NOTES FROM THE HOME FRONT

A new table—without straining the budget? Why not make it yourself? Start with the top—anything from a birch or walnut slab door to a reclaimed top from the second-hand store. Might even be a sheet of plywood with ceramic tile cemented on, a sheet of plate glass or a piece of flagstone. Legs aren't difficult—wrought iron sets in several sizes are widely available. Fasten them directly to a wood top, or to a wood frame beneath the glass or flagstone. Or use a fancy pedestal, an urn or any object large and sturdy enough to support the top. Save money—and create a conversation piece. Unusual furniture is in style today!

Best tip for a neat repaint job in an old house—clean up the hardware. It's probably slopped over with paint, so remove it before starting and soak in a can of paint remover. Wipe each piece clean and replace after your paint job is dry. Some difference!

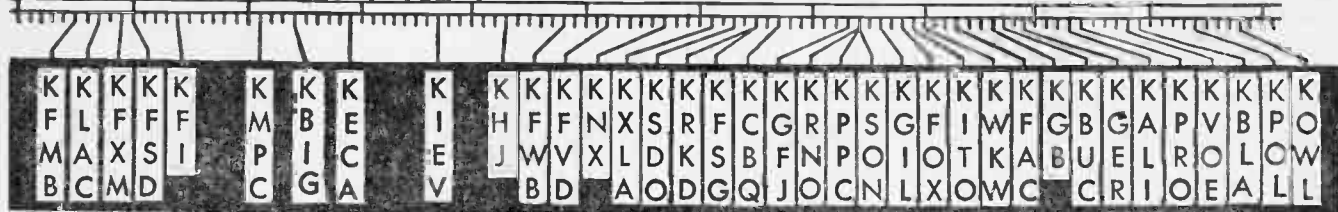

clusively to the armed forces by Armed Forces Radio, that they're not entirely forgotten by the civilian populace.

On Doris's show she reads one letter a week from a GI. To select this one is quite a chore since she receives as many as 10,000 letters a week. The boys unburden themselves of their loneliness and their troubles in their mail. They tell her of close calls they may have had that day, of death that walks freely on the battlefields, of their homes, of their girls. They even send her songs they have written. But in all the letters there is one common thing: their gratitude to her for singing directly to them.

"Naturally, I'm thrilled that I can give these boys some pleasure," Doris said. "They all want me to sing their favorite songs—usually ones that have special meaning to them because of their girls back home. The most requested numbers are 'It's Magic' and 'I'll See You in My Dreams.'" Doris paused and then laughed lightly, "The names they've given me! Queen of the Troops, Miss Wolfhound, and Morale Booster are only a few. One soldier wrote that even bullets were named after me."

Doris, incidentally, pays the bill herself for all eighty-ten pictures she sends the boys—plus all the postage. And this runs into quite a sizeable item.

Since Doris's show has been on the air, civilians are now writing and asking her to sing certain numbers for particular boys in the service. And lately young teenagers have been asking her for the addresses and names of GIs so they can write to them.

There aren't many radio shows that have entertainment and yet have a purpose. Doris Day deserves one big, long bow for doing a terrific job.

Record Notes to You

JAZZ A LA DECCA: Again available, after being discontinued for years, are the great jazz albums that made history for this label in the thirties and early forties. Once more back in their places via the 33½ or 45 Long Play route are **Gems of Jazz**, volumes one to five, **Five Feet of Swing**, with its swing recordings by Dorsey Brothers, Bob Crosby, Jimmy Dorsey, Chick Webb and Casa Loma bands, separate albums by **Jimmie Lunceford**, **Fletcher Henderson**, **Lionel Hampton**, **Dorsey Brothers** and **Joe Venuti**. For the specialist, there's an album of **Chicago Jazz** by the musicians who were the early exponents of this school; there's **Kansas City Jazz** that features practically every great jazzman who was there when Kaycee was really jumpin' . . . Don't expect Mansfield to list the personnel on the above albums, for I'd need another half-dozen columns to do it.



JAZZ CONCERTS? Well, there's the **Charlie Ventura** Pasadena appearance with his sextet, the **1950 Dixieland Jubilee** at Shrine Auditorium, the **London (England) Festival of Jazz** in 1951, **Louis Armstrong** Concerts in Symphony Hall (Boston) and **Pasadena Civic Auditorium**, and the **Lionel Hampton All-Stars** at Pasadena.

Also available are albums by keyboard artists **Art Tatum**, **Count Basie**, **James P. Johnson** and **Eddie Heywood** and the collection called **Kings and Queens of Boogie**. Dixie devotees will find ample and great two-beat rhythms available in **Eddie Condon's** five albums, as well as four more by the **Lawson-Haggart** combo, one by **Bud Freeman's Wolverines**, and collections featuring the bands of **Pete Daily**, **Phil Napoleon**, **Ray McKinley** and **Joe Marsala**.

Including some I haven't mentioned, there are forty-four albums of jazz available on Decca dating from the early thirties (when it was produced primarily for export trade) to the present day. In its own category, each album might be considered a collector's item, for what one school of thought praises, another might condemn . . . and yet the variety of jazz, the hundreds of musicians represented and the selections they played make each one individual. This is especially true of the earlier items where the personnel was selected without regard to the origin or color of the musicians; most of the combinations heard are mixed bands featuring stars who rarely, if ever, had the opportunity of playing together before or since. See what I mean when I say it's nothing but great? . . . A.M.

THANKS, HANK

There's been lots of wailing, moaning, and the gnashing of uppers about the boxing situation lately.

Mainly because of the unfortunate exhibition of courageous glass-chinned Jimmy Collins, some sports writers and commentators have even gone so far as to favor outlawing the fistic game entirely.



As a sort of change of pace, then, this week I thought it would be heartening to listen to a guy who disagrees with these sour-

apple pseudo-crusaders.

I'm talking about Hank Weaver. Unlike many of his contemporaries, Hank really knows the fight game. During his years of announcing bouts (you see him each Saturday night doing the ABC bouts from the Hollywood Legion), he has garnered the respect of both the experts and the general public.

As a matter of fact, in a recent nationwide poll of RING magazine (the bible of the boxing world), Big Hank was selected as the fourth most popular and proficient fight announcer in the entire country.

Fourth place may not seem much to boast about. However, when you consider that he is seen and heard only locally, while the top three (Stan Lomax, Jimmy Powers, and Russ Hodges) have been regulars on many coast-to-coast shows, then Hank's award becomes all the more amazing.

For my dough, considering the many preliminaries and unknown newcomers, and the caliber of commercials he has to contend with each Saturday night, he does a better job than anyone around. That includes the much ballyhooed, very much over-rated network darlings.

Hank himself has a tremendous respect for boxers. But he has no false, platonic illusions about the fight game.

"Make no mistake about it," says Hank. "It's a rough business. You've got two guys in there trying to knock each other's brains out. The man who is best at it is the winner. It's as simple as that."

"The real secret to a successful boxing card is to know just how to match the various men. For example, that Collins-Carter bout they made such a fuss over, should never have been staged at all. It was a badly mismanaged deal from beginning to end."

"Collins had no business stepping into the same ring with Carter. I said so many times, even before the fight. But Collins, who has a fabulous repu-

Did you ever stop to think how few times a wrestler has been slated to appear on a night's program that he didn't show up and a substitution had to be made? When you consider the mishaps that

can befall any of us, automobile accidents, sickness and injuries, domestic problems, isn't it remarkable that when you tune in your television set or buy a ticket to an arena, that the man you want to see is almost always there and ready to go?

In most respects, wrestling is just like any other sport. The fans go to see a particular man. In football, if the public's star isn't playing, they hoot and stomp until the coach puts him in, whether he is ready to play or not. The same goes for basketball, baseball, and boxing.

There are a lot of nights that wrestlers don't feel like wrestling too. Many times they have sore muscles from the previous night's battle, maybe they are catching a cold, or their children are sick, but they are in there pitching. Often, for no reason at all except that they are human beings, they just don't feel up to par, and yet they wrestle because they hate to disappoint their fans.

Once in a great while, a wrestler doesn't show up because he doesn't want to meet the man he is slated to face. This happens often in places outside of Southern California. But due to the intelligence of John J. Doyle, Southern California matchmaker, such occasion is a rarity here. Doyle is to be complimented on the even yet interesting matches he makes. It is easy for a youngster to be permanently injured when he is over-matched with a rugged veteran and the odds against their showing up for too tough a match are high.

It isn't always the novices who back away from a battle. One of the most unusual cases happened recently with Mike Sharpe. According to Johnny Doyle, Mike had been signed to appear on the big ABC Wednesday night hook-up against Enrique Torres. Last-minute word arrived that Mike had his back broken the night before. A substitution was made, much to the displeasure of the fans. Doyle investigated the matter and found that Mike was back in the wrestling business and the only conclusion to be drawn was the fact that Mike just didn't want to face Torres. This incident, combined with the poor showing Ben made in running away from

tation for being knocked out, was a big drawing card in Boston. So they booked the fight, and as a consequence the entire boxing profession suffered a black eye."

Lou Thesz, probably means that the Sharpe boys will be extremely rare in these parts.

Joe Hernandez:

He Eats, Sleeps, and Lives Horses

JOE HERNANDEZ has been around race tracks for a good many years now.

First of all, as a reporter for the Hearst papers, he covered the thoroughbreds from Chicago to Los Angeles during the late twenties and early thirties.

His first major job as an announcer came in November, 1932, at Tanforan. Two years later he started to call the stride-for-stride shots at famed Santa Anita. He's been the regular announcer there ever since.

Right now Joe is getting ready for the racing season at Hollywood Park.

The stocky, black-haired Hernandez does more than merely call the races. He lives at the track. An ordinary day's work finds him out at the track by seven or eight in the morning. Right up to post time, you can find him at the barns chatting with the owners, the trainers, the jockeys, and every Tom, Dick and Harry who hangs around the stables.

In brief, this man who originally comes from San Fernando has spent a lifetime studying every angle of horse racing. So when Joe gives his opinion on the racing game, he

should know what he's talking about.

You Can Win

"You can beat the horses," Joe explained to us one day between races. "I know hundreds of guys who have done it, and still are doing it. You've got to be smart about it, though. You've got to study all the different angles, and then bet accordingly. It's not easy. But it can be done."

At any meet, when he's actually calling a race, Joe himself never bets. He says he can't do it and still be objective and fair in his reporting.

Joe claims that his greatest asset is that he can concentrate completely on a race. Just before post time he sets his twenty-year-old binoculars on top of the mike and goes over the chart.

He knows all the horses. He mumbles repetitively each horse and the colors to himself, so that by the time "they're off" he has them memorized.

No Fixes

After that you know what happens—you've heard him hundreds of times over KMPC and KNX. His voice and style have made him "the Clem McCarthy of the Pacific Coast."

Joe never calls the end of the race

over the public-address system. He leaves the final call up to the officials.

However, he does do the finish for the taped portion of his radio show. Even in the closest of races, Joe seldom misses picking the winner.

The greatest race he has ever seen was between Noor and Citation, in which they raced neck and neck for the last three-fourths of a mile, with Noor winning by a nose in a photo finish.

He says he has never known of a "fixed race." The most dramatic and heart-warming event he ever announced was when Seabiscuit came out of retirement to win the Santa Anita Handicap in 1940.

In private life, Joe and his wife live in Cheviot Hills. His daughter, Patsy, has three children. Twenty-three-year-old Frank is studying to be a priest, and twenty-two-year-old Frances wants to be a career girl.

For two years Joe worked back East, and he has also called the Kentucky Derby.

Does he have any other ambitions? "No," says Joe, "I'll be happy if I can keep doing what I am doing for the rest of my life."
