
Who Says They Aren't Glamorous!

My Life With Link

A

S OF JANUARY 15, 1953, Art Linkletter, a personable young man of TV and radio, and I have done 2080 shows together. Eight years have passed since that fateful day when I cast my lot with the unpredictable Link—and I still feel here is a guy who will go far some day.

That Day at CBS

Everything began the day a call was issued at CBS, where I was chief announcer, for announcers to audition for a show called "G.E. House Party" to be presided over by one Art Linkletter. I sort of ambled by and when I saw forty-five men waiting to be auditioned I turned around and walked the other way. A little later in the day when the mob had decreased considerably in size someone asked if there were any others who wanted to audition. I decided to give it a try. Frankly, I didn't expect anything to come from this so

I was a surprised fellow when later that day I got a call saying I was it. And so began my life as foil for Link.

It took me a while to get on to Art's easy ad-lib style but now nothing he can do or say can throw me. The average guy who might be called on to go on Link's show could conceivably flip his lid with all the unexpected antics that occur on the program. Fortunately for me, I'm so used to Art that I know when he's going to inhale and exhale and when I should jump in—and when I should keep quiet.

Of course, my job is mainly to handle the commercials, all of which are done gag style—at Art's request. He won't do one straight. This has been fine except for the cockeyed things I've been called on to do.

Commercials Are Fun

Like the time I had to do a ballet—and all to show how to use one of GE's washing machines. A charming



little song was written and delectable lyrics were added so it was my job to dance out those lyrics. I looked and felt ridiculous but I learned long ago to be ready, willing, and able to do anything thrown at me.

There was also the parachute gimmick. This happened the first time we did a nighttime TV show. Somebody got the cute idea of having me come down from the top of the stage in a parachute and do the commercial. I was put in a harness with a steel cable attached to the back of the harness rig. In addition, four guys held on to me. I had to swing back and forth over Art's head while he did an act with Ginny Simms—and then on cue I was dropped on a guy wire to do my spot.

I can't remember all of the gags that have been pulled, but there have been plenty. And each one has given me more and more respect for Art's very genuine talent as a fun-maker.

Art Loves a Joke

Art never gets thrown by any gag—or boner. He loves a practical joke so much that if the crew doesn't pull one on him he's disappointed. In one commercial Art was supposed to walk to a bureau and take out various pieces of laundry from a drawer. Since this routine was used several

times on various shows we used to put all sorts of gag stuff in the drawer to throw him. He didn't even get flustered. He simply went along happily for the ride.

Art works hard but he does know how to relax. I found this out about him after being on the road with him so much the first four years of the show. His main modes of relaxation are handball and swimming.

Even-Tempered Art

Not only is his ability to relax unusual but so is his even temperament. He seldom gets mad but when he does he doesn't go around carrying a grudge. He simply tells you what he's mad about and why and then forgets it. This makes him an easy guy to work with since there's never any tension in spite of all the pressure of our jobs.

Those eight years have been a pleasure and from them I think I have found why Art Linkletter is such a popular personality. He has a sincere and honest interest in people. To me, he'll always remain unique because he is one emcee who really hears what people on his show have to say. His mind is on them and not on what he's going to do when the program is over.

Life with Link has been memorable, to say the least, thank you!

IT DEPENDS ON the girl whether or not she should go on the road. I can't speak for every girl, but I can for myself because I hopped around the country for eight years singing with bands. Mother and I drove through every state in the Union, in every kind of weather. We averaged 300 miles between jobs, which was not hard mileage if the weather was nice. But when it was stormy we often tried to get a start right after I was through with my performance at night. This was never fun driving in the dark because we missed too much of the countryside.

Visiting every nook and corner and meeting the people were two of the finest things about being on the road. After awhile I gained experience in sizing up and handling all kinds of people. I was able to tell the difference between those from the East and those from the Middle West. Finally I got so I could pick the place where people came from simply by watching the way they danced.

But a girl on the road only meets people. She doesn't have time to cultivate them or have interesting dates. Often I met someone I'd have liked to know better. We'd say "Hi!" and the next thing I knew I was 300 miles away! One exception to this was my first love, Reginald

Should a Girl Go on the Road?

(Part 1 of a Two-Part Story)

KTLA'S Roberta Linn recalls some of the memorable experiences of her life on the road as a singer with bands. And offers some sound advice to other lovelies who may be thinking of hitting the road with a career

Bartholomew Corley of Louisiana. I was in my impressionable teens when I met him—he was tall, blonde and handsome and my real big moment at the time. Reggie and I corresponded daily, but as time passed, the space between our letters did, too. For a long time I blamed my broken heart on one-night stands.

On the other hand, when I met someone I didn't care too much for. I was glad to be able to get out of town and away from him. The fellows in the band wore well mostly. I think, because they were a young group, not inclined to be irritable or pessimistic.

When I first went on the road I couldn't wait to move on to the next town. My spirits were always high and the excitement of seeing new places seemed to make me thrive. I honestly believe that both Mother and I held up better than some of the fellows.

Naturally you have to take care of yourself when you're traveling.

We found the food wasn't always what it was cracked up to be and I had to learn to get along on six or seven hours' sleep, where now I get at least eight. At the time, I didn't mind living out of a suitcase, but now I would. The turtleback of our car was always crammed and the back seat was piled high because my whole wardrobe had to be taken along for both winter and summer. There was never much time to shop except at Christmas. The band always went into Chicago on Christmas Eve and stayed a few weeks, and that's when I managed to buy what I needed.

Some of my things had to be very heavy for winter driving. We went through snow and ice many times, but the worst was in 1951. The band was playing in Rock Springs, Wyoming, and right while we were on the stand one night it snowed twenty-two inches. Mother and I should have started immediately for Salt Lake City, but instead we waited un-

til 7 o'clock the next morning. We were having a tough time because we had no chains, but even at a snail's pace the trip shouldn't have taken more than six hours. Then a furious ground blizzard hit and whipped the car up into a snow bank. Mother and I just sat there laughing and crying hysterically. Two trucks finally pulled us out and we dragged into Salt Lake twelve hours after we'd started and just fifteen minutes before show time. I dabbed some powder on my dirty face and went out to sing with my hair dishevelled and my slacks all rumpled. But how I looked didn't seem to matter, for you should have heard the sigh of relief from the boys in the band when I walked on stage. Lawrence Welk said it was the best show I'd ever done.

Next most exciting thing happening to me on the road was in Alexandria, Louisiana.



Television Technicians Unsung, Unseen Heroes

The achievement and recognition of filmed TV series is becoming more and more widespread. The technicians as well as the stars on these shows are of top caliber.

A behind-the-scenes glimpse on the set of "Schlitz Playhouse of Stars" was quite a revelation. It revealed the skill and genius of the technical crew, the unsung heroes.

Some of the "stars" behind these cameras are Russ Harlan, the cameraman, who was one of the five nominees for the 1952 Oscar, for his lensing of "The Big Sky." George Amy, supervising editor, won an Oscar twice before switching to TV.

Even ex-royalty is getting into the act. The show's art director, Serge Krizman, is the grandson of a Serbian Prime Minister. Serge graduated from the Royal University of Zagreb and painted portraits of kings before he came to this country to design the Yugoslav Pavilion at the New York World's Fair. When the present regime in Yugoslavia took over, he renounced it and migrated to Hollywood, where he acted as technical adviser on matters royal for motion pictures, before TV came along.

Roy Kellino and Ted Post alternate

as directors. Kellino, an Englishman, is best known in this country for his direction of several James Mason pictures. Post has directed many important live TV shows in New York. William Self holds the reins as associate producer.

It isn't any wonder that the sponsor is happy with the current Hollywood series. It has some of the best technical talent in the business.

Schlitz started with "Pulitzer Prize Playhouse" as its first TV venture, about four seasons ago. That was a distinguished series, but had to be forsaken because of the dearth of Pulitzer properties adaptable for TV. "Pulitzer" then became "Playhouse" and in 1952 the series dropped its live presentations in favor of a film series.

Irene Dunne became the hostess-narrator for twenty-six weeks. However, the format was not deemed feasible. It was dropped in favor of having the "performing" stars act as hosts on their own vehicles.

The "Schlitz Playhouse of Stars" sails into its second year as one of Hollywood's top film shows. William Eythe, Victor Jory, Nancy Davis, George Brent, Charles Bickford, "

bara Hale, Gene Raymond and Lon McAllister are among the line-up of stars to act as hosts in the Friday night (8:00 p.m., Channel 2) series in the near future.

Accent is on stories, with comedy, psychological drama, fantasy, romance and human interest interspersed. There are no limitations except those of interest and good taste. The series runs fifty-two weeks a year.

The Federal Trade Commission is an independent commission of the United States government. Its five members are appointed for seven-year terms by the President, subject to approval by the Senate.

One of its chief functions is the prevention of the dissemination of false and misleading advertising of goods, drugs, curative remedies and cosmetics.

Hearings are held to determine the validity of claims used in advertising and when it is ruled that the product or service advertised does not live up to the claims made for it, a "cease and desist" order is filed against the concern. The advertising agency responsible for the preparation of the advertisement is also cited, in many instances.

For example, recent cases under the scrutiny of the FTC include such as these:

An eastern concern is charged with selling automotive springs without revealing that they are partially made from old and previously used parts.

A well known national shoe company is charged with misrepresentation of the therapeutic properties of their line of children's shoes.

Another concern is questioned for their failure to disclose that their sewing machine heads are of foreign origin. In the future under the terms of a consent settlement agreed to by two Los Angeles firms, this practice will be stopped.

Use of the term "14 Kt. Gold Plated" must be discontinued by another firm in advertising and selling their fountain pen points, under the terms of a stipulation signed by them and the FTC.

Counterfeiting of automotive parts, packaging them and selling them as genuine factory parts, caused trouble for three eastern concerns.

The Federal Trade Commission has continued its tireless efforts to protect the public despite restrictive legislation designed to curb its power.

The FTC suffered still another cut in its 1954 appropriation at the hands of the House Committee. The Bureau of the Budget had cut \$1,000,000 from the \$5,500,000 recommended under the so-called Truman budget. The House Committee cut it to \$4,178,800, a reduction of \$1,321,200.

The Federal Trade Commission was set up for your protection. If you'd like to see the FTC continue its fine work in your behalf, may we suggest you write to your Congressman, asking that the FTC's powers NOT be curbed, and that its financial budget be increased rather than decreased. Send this editorial along with your letter if you wish.

GARDEN CHECK LIST

ONE: Clean up in front—with a pair of clippers. Trim back bushes that might screen a youngster from an oncoming car, and cut back dangling tree branches that scrape car tops. Street trees are wonderful, but since Los Angeles has no budget for planting or trimming, it's up to us.

TWO: Dahlias do best with two to three stalks per plant. Cut any others off young plants, and when stalks are eight inches tall, pinch them back. That forces them to bush out, gives you stronger plants. When they reach two feet, tie them loosely to stakes for support.

THREE: Know your fertilizers. Steer manure is not a source of large food value. It is excellent as a mulch for new lawns, gardens and trees, and adds valuable humus to flower and vegetable beds. For better foliage and fruit, depend on concentrated fertilizers—chemical or organic—dry or liquid. Every nursery has a good assortment.

LP CLASSICS: If you would experience one of the great-est thrills in the recording field, by all means listen to "Scheherazade" by Antal Dorati and the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, and also the "Firebird Ballet Suite" by the same organization. Both are stellar examples of Mercury's "living presence" record- ing technique, without doubt the most realistic yet developed to cap- ture the true sound of a symphonic organization. Covering more sound range and recorded by a single over- head microphone, the dimensional effect creates the illusion of actu- ally listening to the orchestra in person.



Just released on RCA-Victor 45 Ex- tended Play are six selections re- corded in the early forties by "Fats" Waller for V-Disc distribution to service men. Four of the songs are from a Waller musical and two are Hammond organ solos, but played and sung as only this great jazz figure could do them. They're informal . . . and great! . . . Glad to hear Helen Ward back with Benny Goodman on records and sounding better than ever on "What a Little Moonlight Can Do" and "I'll Never Say 'Never Again' Again" (Columbia). . . . TV-RADIO

Lifelines

WHAT'S THE TREND FOR TV AND RADIO, summer style, 1953?

IT'S TALENT, ACCORDING TO NBC's Program Head in Hollywood, Tom McCrae, Hoagy Carmichael's big ninety-minute production, which fills in for "Show of Shows," will be a talent TVer. Johnny Duggan's "Ladies' Choice," on TV five days weekly for a half hour, will rely on talent—mostly paid professional. This will not be a cheap show—budget will run more than \$10,000 weekly.

TALENT WILL TAKE A BIG WHIRL on NBC radio, too. On June 13 a two-hour production called "Talent, U.S.A." will debut, drawing its performers from four different centers around the U.S.A. Various NBC stations throughout the country will conduct auditions, screen their local talent and then rotate in contributing their section's best for one of the weekly shows. So far, eighty-four NBC outlets have signified their desire to cooperate. KERO, Bakersfield, will probably have one of the half hours on the very first broadcast.

ACCORDING TO MCCRAE, FRED ALLEN expects to be back on NBC in the fall, doing emcee duties on a talent show for TV which will also be taped for radio.

MEANWHILE, WHEELS ARE ALREADY in motion for the \$32,500 weekly Loretta Young show, coming on TV in late August, and for Celeste Holm's situation comedy. When I asked McCrae whether TV sponsors were balking at sky-high costs for talent and production, he said no. Citing the rapidity with which the tab on Miss Young's show was picked up by a sponsor and the signing of Milton Berle by Buick for fall (Texaco has dropped him), he pointed out that new markets are giving sponsors more coverage for their dollars than formerly. Many sponsors, especially radio, are keeping their shows on all summer, among these, "Father Knows Best," Roy Rogers, "Truth or Consequences," "Railroad Hour," "Great Gildersleeve." These smart bankrollers have probably found it's cheaper and easier to hold an audience year round than to build back a lost summer audience into a respectable rating in the autumn.

MEANWHILE, THOUGH OLD FAVORITES go on and some return like Allen and Hoagy, still others are being considered in entirely new show formats. I was surprised to learn that Gregory Ratoff was making a pilot film for an audience-participation show and that Bob Warren, personable announcer for "This Is Your Life," was being tested as emcee of another new program, "Be What You Like." These are but two of the new ideas cooking at NBC, which receives about twenty-five every week. Unfortunately, these twenty-five are the best of many more and if McCrae and his associates cull one decent idea out of a week's hopper, they're doing well. Let this information not keep YOU, however from submitting your brainstorm, if you think it's fresh and good.

ONE OF THE INTERESTING THINGS about my job is

the variety. Ten minutes after I'd left Mr. McCrae's swanky white and chrome-green office suite, I interviewed an eighteen-year-old lad in my own modest diggings. This boy, Johnny Albers, may interest you because you see him as one of the expert square dancers on KTLA's "Western Varieties." Some time ago, when he was just three months short of getting his diploma from L.A. High, Johnny had to quit school to help support his widowed mother, his small sister Connie, and younger brother Lee.

IT WAS PRETTY TOUGH MAKING ENDS MEET. About eight months ago, when Johnny was adamant about trying to make a go of it, he spotted his brother square-dancing on TV and Johnny's pride was sufficiently piqued that he decided to learn his left foot from his right. He joined one of the Bachelor and Bachelorette groups and now is so expert that he appears on many exhibition dances and is seen on TV four times every six weeks. In one night he earns on TV what he does during three workdays at Lockheed. "I'll be all caught up on the family's debts when I make a \$115 tax payment," he told me grinningly.

SQUARE DANCING SEEMS TO HAVE SOLVED MORE THAN A FINANCIAL PROBLEM FOR YOUNG MR. ALBERS. Six feet one, blond and blue-eyed, Johnny was shy before square dancing taught him to express himself. Now, he's not only head over heels crazy about show business, but quite a beau. "Square dancing," he confided, "shoved me into the predicament of having to talk to girls."

UNDERSTAND THAT CY HOWARD IS WORKING on a TV format for Ciro attractions Betty and Jane Kean, who were pushed into the spotlight via TV on Ed Sullivan's program. . . . Bill ("Open Road") Steen and wife Joy are circulating cute birth announcements titled "The Bundle Came C.O.D." The bundle is David Neal Steen, seven pounds, fourteen ounces. Musician Dick Aurandt taped an audition for a half-hour musical show the other night at CBS-KNX. It featured his superlative organ playing and his Stumpus Club and should be a click.

LOVE THE NEWEST STORY ABOUT HANS CONRIED. Hans, as you know, is almost a Hollywood legend. For years he was one of our greatest radio actors, then he gained fame on "Pantomime Quiz" on TV. Now he's a smash on Broadway in "Can Can."

I REMEMBER HIM TELLING ME the first part of the story several years ago, when, after years of acting, Hans finally consented to direct CBS's "Stars Over Hollywood." The cast, composed of his fellow actors and actresses, went through their paces during rehearsal and then sat onstage for the director to come outside the control booth and tell them what they had or hadn't done to suit him. Hans went down the line with his suggestions, but when he came to fellow-actor Jerry Hausner, he made no comment. Now Jerry is a slight-framed, dark-haired little actor who plays all kinds of roles and also does excellent baby cries. Fine sense of humor, but also a fine regard for Hans. So he didn't know what to make of being ignored.

HANS FINISHED HIS REMARKS AND TURNED to go back in the booth. Suddenly he wheeled around, and facetiously tossing away his lines said, "And you, Jerry, do better!"

AS I SAID, HANS TOLD ME THIS STORY many years ago, but last week I heard the payoff. The night Hans opened on Broadway, Jerry sent him a wire. It said, "Do better."

Wrestling

Is My Business

Now that I have lost so much weight with Tafon, at present eighty pounds in eighty days, people keep asking me if I'm trimming down for a comeback. The answer is "No."

I quit wrestling at what I considered the peak of my career and have no intentions of trying to wrest the crown from Lou Thesz's head. I am taking off the excess baggage in order to be able to stay around here a few years longer.

Another question often asked is "What was your most thrilling experience in wrestling?" That's easily answered. The highlight of my twenty-year career was winning the Indian heavyweight championship—a title which I retired with.

A huge international wrestling tournament was held in Los Angeles at the Olympic Auditorium some years ago in which wrestlers from all over the world competed. Four titles were at stake, the American, European, Indian and world's championships. Vincent Lopez won the world's title. StrongBow went to the semi-finals in that class.

In the Indian division I competed against such great athletes as Tiny Roebuck, Sun Jennings, Chief Little Wolf, Mayes McClain, Tommy Marvin and Jim Clinstock.

I defeated Tiny Roebuck to win the Indian championship. The next week Tiny and I came back and wrestled a match Indian style—the only time an Indian style match was wrestled in a professional arena in Los Angeles.

My competitors in this class were fascinating men. Newspapers and magazines devoted much space to the giant Indian athletes from Oklahoma. Of the seven of us, only Chief Little Wolf, a Navajo, did not come from Oklahoma.

They were big men. Roebuck's wrestling weight was 260; Jennings, 240; McClain, 240 to 250; Marvin, 230; Clinstock, 250; StrongBow, 275. With the exception of Marvin, who was nearly six feet tall, all of us stood well over six feet.

Many of the fans remember and ask about these colorful men. Sun Jennings was probably the best all-around athlete. He could shoot par golf, was All-American in football, great in track and wrestling. And yet he lacked that spark of desire to get ahead and to claim all the credit due him. At present he is in the manufacturing business in Toledo.

Tiny Roebuck, who became a popular referee, retired from wrestling and entered the ministry. He is now in Arizona preaching and ministering to the Indians.

Mayes McClain held the distinction, as I remember, of being the only football player to make All-American from two different schools in a four-year period. He played for the University of Iowa and later for Haskell University. The last I heard from Mayes he was wrestling in the Toronto area.

I'm proud of Chief Little Wolf. At last an Indian has his own medicine show with genuine Indian remedies. Always before the white man reaped the harvest of Indian snake oil and herbs, but Little Wolf is capitalizing now on the knowledge of his forefathers. He is in Australia, wrestles part-time and travels with his show.

Jim Clinstock was killed by accident and I haven't heard from Tommy Marvin in years.

After knowing a little more about these giant Indian athletes, you can see why winning the Indian world's championship was my greatest thrill.

Why Aren't They

CAPITULATION to TV is big news this season—movie stars are flocking to television principally via filmed series—and radio stalwarts are braving the inevitable plunge. But in the midst of the splash and splatter of the stars getting into the swim, one can see many favorite performers standing on the TV sidelines. Why no TV for them?

This is the question for which TV-Radio Life sought an answer. So it popped the query to a number of popular personalities and came up with answers as varied as the talents represented.

First consider the replies of two CBS singing stars, Doris Day and Jo Stafford. Doris said, "I'm interested in doing television, but not yet. I hope before I'm ready to try it that it's mostly on film. I'd rather make pictures for television use. The way it is now when you watch TV, because of the lines, you only see half a person."

Jo Stafford viewed TV from a slightly different angle. When we asked her why no TV? she replied: "Television is a bad medium to test

in. I think an artist has to be very certain of what is right for him in TV—in his own opinion and in the opinion of those whose judgment he most respects—before he makes the experimental jump. You can fail so much quicker in TV. You don't get a long enough chance to prove yourself. It is particularly hard for a singer to find the right picture frame, so to speak—the visual gimmick for what is primarily an audio talent. After all, you don't build a reputation over a period of some fifteen years only to have it ruined in something like three weeks."

Another singing star, NBC's "Railroad Hour" host Gordon MacRae, was practically voiceless when it came to discussing his place on TV. Reason: his contract with Warner Bros. Pictures prohibits Gordon's appearing on television, either for his own show or as a guest. Period.

Good Reason

No such restrictions are keeping Alice Faye and Phil Harris from converting their NBC comedy to TV. They frankly admitted, "We're happy the way we are so why should we take on a seven-day-a-week job—and that's what TV is. We're not on television simply because we don't feel the pressing need to hit the channel circuit. Maybe we're just lazy." (If we had their money, we'd be lazy, too!)

Forty Plus Forty!

Another KHJ personality who views TV dimly because he wants to stick around for many more years is Jack

Kirkwood. "I haven't gone into television as yet for a number of reasons," he stated.

"I suppose the biggest reason is that I haven't stolen all of the money out of radio—yet. And with five half-hour shows a week over KHJ, Don Lee, Mutual and Armed Forces Radio Service, I keep myself pretty busy.

"They tell me that as many as 90,000,000 people listen to my radio program in all parts of the world and I get a great deal of satisfaction reading the fan mail I receive from remote corners of the world. This, of course, would not be possible if I confined my efforts to television.

"The second reason I'm planning to stay in radio for the time being is that I'm lazy. My wife Lillian Leigh, who works with me on my radio show, says so and I heartily agree. In radio we can still read scripts, and as this is my fortieth year in show business, it's just too much work to be memorizing lines.

"I have had over twenty firm offers from producers of TV programs to make the leap from radio to the electronic-tube business—but I expect to be around in show business for another forty years and I'm in no hurry to jump."

Still another reason for shying away from TV to date is given by Jean Hersholt, star of CBS's "Dr. Christian." "There are many reasons I haven't yet gone into television," he said. "For one thing, I would certainly want to do a show only so

many times a year, not once a week as I do radio. I firmly believe people don't want to look at anybody as many as fifty-two times a year. Television, I think, is the fastest and easiest way to kill yourself mentally, physically and professionally. I would certainly not want to do live television, unless it were only a one-shot show. I believe so many adjustments will yet be made in this new medium that there is time enough to consider going into it."

have sorely missed their "Halls of Ivy" during the past season and have repeatedly asked this magazine what to expect from the talented "Ronnie" and Benita. They are not averse to television, it seems, but they are waiting for the right arrangement and the right conditions. When "Ivy" is done for TV, it will go on film. Incidentally, dickeringings are now in progress and some sort of announcement should be forthcoming in time for fall.

Hopes for "Ivy"

When Robert Young started to give TV-Radio Life his answer to the "\$128 question," he labeled himself a Man With a Dilemma. This was not the first time personable Mr. Young had been quizzed about TV. So he began by saying that he usually countered a question like ours with this little story:

"Bing Crosby was once asked if he watched television, and he is supposed to have answered 'Like a snake-charmer watches a cobra.' So I'm not being very original now when I say that I spend a lot of spare time cobra-watching.

"Actually I'm a man with a dilemma. I feel myself being drawn to TV—like I'm in a canoe headed for Niagara Falls, but I just don't know. It keeps bothering me that maybe on TV I'd wear out my welcome."

Bob has always felt that radio's greatest pull stemmed from the idea that it allowed the audience a chance to use their imaginations.

"Father Knows Best," continues Bob. "started out four years ago as one of about twenty shows, all with a similar format. We kept our audience, and as proof 5,000,000 teenagers have joined the 'Bob Young Good Drivers Club,' mentioned continuously on the show as part of a National Safety Council campaign. We didn't offer prizes, autographs or anything. Just a membership card.

A guy like me starts thinking—could you run another four years on TV? What keeps a show going is realistic and human angles like in Groucho's show. Ah, but there I go, TV again. I am a man with a dilemma."

TV-Radio Life thinks Robert Young will work out his dilemma. After all, Father knows best!

To gain a newsman's idea about going into TV, we asked KHJ's Frank Hemingway, who countered:

Assorted Reasons

"I have four very good reasons why I'm not in television, and if you'll bear with me for a few lines, I'll give them to you.

"1. To be a television newscaster you have to be reasonably pretty. I am not. In fact, I have the nicest head of skin in radio.

"2. You have to be reasonably intelligent. I am not.

"3. You have to know something about the news business. I do not. Even though I've been in it for twenty years, I still feel like an apprentice.

"4. Having been in television for a short while, some years ago, I am of the opinion that to see someone read the news adds little to its interest. My KHJ and Don Lee listeners say they would much rather listen to radio for news reports and not be distracted by having to watch and listen at the same time.

"Some day, in the not too distant future, I would like to try TV news again. But this time with an entirely new and different approach. This time I should like to do it standing on my head in a barrel of rain water."

(This is worth sticking around to see. It could conceivably start a new trend in TV.)

ON TV?

ABC's Edward Arnold seems closer to TV than perhaps many of us realized. When he was asked why he was not on television now, he replied: "It won't be long before I am on TV—and maybe on two different shows. At the present a pilot film made by ABC of 'Mr. President' is in New York, and there seems a good chance that this show will hit the channels in the near future. But regardless of that, my wife and I are preparing our own program for a daytime spot. It will be a sort of 'At Home' idea. I'm a pretty good amateur chef and my wife has many creative talents, so we plan to combine my cooking with 'how to' tips on various household items from my wife. This were really looking forward to!" (So are we!)

One of radio's most popular comedy couples, Jim and Marian Jordan, hope to bring their "Fibber McGee and Molly" to TV, but there is nothing as definite with them as with the Arnolds. For some time Jim and Marian have wanted to do TV, but one thing or another has blocked them, most recently Mrs. Jordan's illness.

What about another top acting pair, the Ronald Colmans? Fans

What Faith Means to Me

This is the second in our series on faith and its significance to the lives of famous television personalities

WHAT DOES faith mean to me? Everything! It's been the key to my whole life. And this may sound odd, coming from a Hollywood actor who has done comedy all his life.

But first of all, what is faith? To me, it's a belief in the goodness of life based on God's love for all of us—and our love for Him. It is the desire to lead a life with God as your ever-present influence and companion.

From childhood I was always aware of a spiritual life—although, I admit, I embraced it reluctantly. You see, I was one of a family of eight. My mother was a very religious person and was active in all church affairs. She was also something of an evangelist when it came to getting her family to church. The angles

and the tricks she tried to get my brothers and me to go to Sunday school! She'd remind us first of the annual Sunday school picnic, knowing all boys loved to eat. Then she helped organize church basketball teams as an inducement. But probably her most inspired trick was pointing out to us how attractive the pastor's daughter was.

His Spiritual Awakening

It wasn't until I was about eleven or twelve, though, that I got the real feeling and desire for a spiritual life. I shamefacedly confess that this came about first because I fell madly in love with the pastor's daughter—but this was mainly a seasonal thing since love seized me only in the spring.

However, even with this human desire I began to grow spiritually. Suddenly I could see the value in sermons I had heard in the past but had not listened to carefully. By the time I was fifteen I wanted to go to church. It was like a transformation.

Looking back, I realize much of my growth was due to our pastor, Rev. Cramer, who was the most devout person I've ever met. He had gone through many periods of anguish and had faced problems without ever losing faith. To me, that is the test of a spiritual person—how well he holds onto his faith in time of stress and trouble. Rev. Cramer was also a truly religious person because he never lost his humility. When you lose humility you lose contact with God—the Spirit in life.

By the time I was sixteen I was spending four nights a week in church and its various activities—the basketball teams, the young people's meetings, which always included food, the choir of which I was a member. I even was part of a gospel team that went around small towns in an effort to bring to people something of the truth in life.

Near Death

However, from 1937 to 1939 I lost some of the feeling I had. It wasn't until I went to the hospital during Christmas week in 1939 that I woke up again. I was operated on for five ulcers, gangrenous infected gall bladder, and a burst appendix. Little

hope was held for my recovery. While I was in the hospital for three months I had time to think—and to pray. For a while I felt alone and then suddenly one day I could feel God was with me—and I knew He had worked a miracle on me. From this time on I never walked alone.

Religion—or faith—means to me now a happy life. Ever see the faces of those who really believe? They're not long and sour. They're radiant with happiness. I have found my greatest joy in doing for others. It took me a while to realize that not thinking of self strengthens you in your faith—and in your capacity to serve those who need you.

At present my family and I go to the Village Church in Westwood, a non-denominational church but an inspirational one because of the pastor, Rev. A. J. Soldan, who was once the chaplain at Fort Leavenworth Penitentiary. My wife, Marion, and our four children—Penny, ten, David, seven, Dawn, five, and Ronnie, two and a half—all attend regularly. Penny and David sing in the choir.

Recently I helped put on a big fair as a benefit so that a Sunday school could be built at the church. The need for the school was made evident by the members of the Young Marrieds Club, to which I belong, at the church who had children and wanted a regular school for them. So we decided to raise money to build one. The fair was a huge success! I now hope to put on a show at Bakersfield to help rebuild the seven churches which were destroyed by the earthquake.


Faith Is My Guide

I think people are turning more and more to faith as a guide in their lives. I know it's hard to hold fast and not get weak, but if faith is strong enough you can be strong. Whenever I falter I turn not only to the Bible for help but to a speech from a play I almost did at one time. I think it says everything:

"What God wished was that all those o'ercome of pride, of self, and sloth and greed and lazy arrogance and love of ease should drunk with exaltation's purest wine, hurl themselves singing upon the foaming spears, moved by the spirit of self-sacrifice of which we all stand in such urgent need."

What You Can't See In Movies on TV

This article, the last in our series about movies on television, deals with the problems of censorship. You'll be surprised at the strict rules set up to safeguard moral standards



IF YOU'RE watching a movie on TV some night and suddenly notice a strange jump in continuity, don't worry. It's just the ever-alert censors at work hacking out a questionable scene.

The problems of censorship are fairly common with all TV stations. Some of the independents, however, aren't as strict about cutting a picture for moral or political reasons as are the network stations. As a result you may see a picture on a smaller station in its entirety while the same film will look vastly different on your larger chains.

TV Taboos

To get the network viewpoint, Pat Stinson, who cuts all the films shown at KECA-TV and who is assistant to the very efficient Dorothy Brown, head of Continuity Acceptance, was consulted.

"There are many things, such as excess violence and brutality to animals, we have to watch for in pictures we run," Pat commented. "Racial discrimination is another. For example, after the treaty was signed with Japan making her a friendly nation again, orders went out to all stations that no pictures were to be shown depicting Japanese as villains. We are also not allowed to show any movie which presents the Irish as flat-footed cops or Italians as gangsters. The same care has to be watched when it comes to the Negro race.

"There is also a definite taboo against any humorous or disparaging references to hunchbacks or cripples because such people are very naturally sensitive and may not take any implications as they were originally intended to be interpreted.

"Of course any dialogue or scenes that are in bad taste as far as treatment of sex is concerned must be cut. Sex has been handled differently by some stations. On some channels 'Paisan' and 'Open City,' two very frank foreign movies, were shown without deletions while on others they were cut terrifically." (In fact, KNBH, I understand, took out one entire sequence in "Paisan.")

Liberal Deletion Policy

"We have been liberal in some pictures when it comes to sex. In 'Street Scene,' an Italian film, one scene in which a girl obviously spent the night with a man was left intact because of its relation to the general mood. Then there is the case of 'Rain' which presented a problem because of its unsavory picturization of a missionary. However, we showed that without any big cuts because we felt it was an important enough movie.

"Whenever possible we run these rather questionable pictures after nine o'clock so there will be no small fry watching. We like to give adults a chance to see adult films. But always we have to be governed by one factor: a picture must be screened carefully because it goes right into the viewers' homes and not just in a theater.

"Our biggest headaches are the English and foreign movies since they're made more for an adult audience. In the British films some of the expressions are common talk to the English but have entirely different connotations to Americans. Editing such pictures is a double headache because the conversation is often so hard to understand that we have to run a scene over three

and four times to get every line."

In looking at a picture for censorship, and Miss Stinson sees as many as eighteen to twenty a week, every attempt is made to keep the continuity even if a scene has to be deleted. In several instances, however, so many deletions are necessary the entire film has to be rejected.

"We find we have to throw away many of the very old pictures," Pat commented, "because there was no censorship code in those days and almost anything was all right. How humor has changed through the years!

"About two out of every five pictures have to be cut. And each time we take something out we have a problem, particularly because the sound precedes a scene 26 frames and often that means cutting a scene before the one in question."

Last-Minute Changes in Pictures


Pat then brought up a very pertinent point—why pictures advertised in your logs are suddenly changed without any notice.

"Films are switched at the last minute usually for one of two reasons," she explained. "One is the late arrival of a picture which precludes our having time to see it for an okay. The other is when sponsored time bars the length of the feature scheduled. In that case, a shorter movie has to be substituted."

As for the censors themselves, their work isn't finished when they make their cuts. After the picture is run they have to put back all the deletions in the film! People like Pat Stinson may see a lot of free movies—but oh! the headaches they get.
