ASEBALL is a sport. It is also a business; big business. The men who count the gate receipts are worried. Television, they say, is ruining the game.

"Who wants to travel to a ball park, sit in uncomfortable seats, and then ride home, when they see essentially the same thing—in greater comfort and for less money—in their own living room?"

KHJ-TV announcers Bill Brundige. Tom Harmon, and Lyle Bond want to see TV continue, naturally. But they also want to see fans come to the ball park. After all, if baseball dies because of lack of attendance, their jobs will be in jeopardy. Will TV kill baseball? Listen to what these three men have to say on the subject:



Tom Harmon

"The argument of 'Will TV Kill Easeball?' is one that probably will go on for a long time, but personally, I do not believe any top sport is hurt by television. Statistics have proved very little in the past. Baseball as a sport is our national pastime and through television coverage will, I believe, go on to even greater heights, the same as did baseball with radio.

"Folks who have never seen a baseball game are now being $ex\cdot$

posed to this exciting contest. Players who were known only to the fan are now well known by fans across the nation rather than in the immediate area in which they play. All of these things, in turn, can only help to build baseball fans of the future. No medium known to man is as potent as television when it comes to selling a product. This, in turn, to my mind, means that television is also selling baseball. I am still not convinced that television has ever hurt any first-rate sports event."

"Will TV kill baseball? I say NO. definitely. Television will help baseball.

"Every night we have fans stop us at the park saying they are there for the first time, having become interested through television. These fans, too, will be back, for we play exceptionally good baseball in the PCL.

"The migration of fans from the living room to the park won't come overnight, but we will certainly notice a gradual development of new patrons. As this cycle gains speed, attendance, figures will reflect the gains.

"I am, naturally, interested in fans in the stands. For, the more we have at the park the more we will have watching on other nights. I cannot be convinced that through a diligent application of salesmanship over TV attendance won't improve. The field of potential customers hasn't even been scratched, as proved by the small number of people among the vast populace who go to ball games anywhere. If we can interest the casual fan to the extent that he will come to the game, to see what a difference there is, then we are on the right track."



Lyle Bond

"I'm really too young to remember when radio entered the baseball scene but I've been told the opinion of many at the time was that the broadcasting of baseball games would reduce attendance to the point where baseball could not survive.

"You know quite the contrary is true. I'm convinced the telecasting of baseball will likewise make millions of new fans.

"Everywhere I go, baseball sooner or later becomes the topic of conversation. Every business enterprise has its lean years. Baseball has been no exception and never before has it had so much competition from so many forms of entertainment, but I contend that if it were not for television, this year would be an even more lean one at the box office. Baseball needs television to maintain the interect of old fans and create new ones.

"The question is not "TV or not TV?" It is "TV or not to be"."

made available for educational purposes. His own son has taken Miller's script to school to substantiate a disputed point with the teacher.

SOME DAY MARVIN WOULD like to do a show with his dark-haired wife, Elizabeth, Eight years ago the two of them auditioned a very informal but informative type of news program. Marvin feels that it would have been readily accepted, both with sponsor and listeners, had it not been for unfortunate timing-they cut the audition record a few days before Pearl Harbor. Then, of course, when a clamp was placed at once on news, the Millers' show was a utomatically shelved. An actor of considerable talent. Marvin enjoys playing several roles during the vignette portion of the show. There is one thing he won't do though. He says, "I won't try to imitate a woman's voice."

HIS LONG RECORD OF ANNOUNC-ING HAS had very few fluffs. One that's printable occurred in St. Louis when he had a line about rain and hail. It came out "hain and rail." Marvin's second attempt to sputter out the words was even more unsuccessful and he kicked the thing around so brutally that it wound up in complete collapse.

SEE WHERE THE MOVIE BOX office is thriving, now that summer is here. For the 'steenth time, I'd like to go on record saying it's sheer stupidity to build TV and radio shows

thirty-nine weeks of the year and wash 'em down the drain the other thirteen. most prominent personalities. Given her start by Bob Hope on the Comedy Hour, she has been very much in demand by practically every TV producer in town. Once you see her you won't forget her-not with that sexy chassis and ability.

If you happen to catch some of the new "theatre" programs on TV this summer, don't be surprised if the shows seem familiar. Three out of four of them are re-runs of telecasts seen last season—but with a different title. Is this playing cricket with the public or is it fashionable now to fool the people as much as possible? Here's a good lesson in how to lose an audience.

Since TV can run old movies there's no reason why movies can't run oldies too. MGM has put out "Trader Horn" and "Sequoia" without making much reference to the fact that while they were good they're real oldies. In fact, "Trader Horn" goes so far back you'd have to be a little ancient to remember it. TV puts on repeals of old shows and runs old movies and people go to the theatres to escape, so the movies run old antiques and the audiences run home to their twenty-four-inch set.

CBS Radio's "General Electric Playhouse" looks like a good bet—even though the stories will not be new. The idea here is to take some of the top hits in the years past and redo them with the original stars. Among those lined up are Ronald Colman in "Random Harvest" and Irene Dunne in the memorable "Penny Serenade."

Patachou, the remarkable French chanteuse who made her debut on TV on Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town," opens at the Coccanut Grove July 15. This woman is simply sensational. Even if you don't go to clubs, go to see her.

The Tragic Triangle

This is a story concerning the famous triangle. Only it's not a love story. It's a hate story.

Now in the usual triangle, three people are involved: a man and a woman, and then the third party. The triangle I am referring to involves (1) Major League baseball clubs, (2) Minor League baseball clubs, and (3) the television industry.



In the sterotyped love story, at least two of the people are fond of each other. The other guy or gal is just making a pest of himself.

In this baseball triangle there's a slight twist to the plot. Nobody don't like nobody. So for

like nobody. So far, it's each man (or business) for himself. It's the age-old Darwinian law of the "survival of the fittest."

The Major League clubs (namely Chicago, Cleveland and Philadelphia of the American League) proved this recently when they gave TV rights to ABC to telecast their Saturday games. The contract stated specifically that the telecasts were not to be carried in cities where major league games were being played that day. The big leagues didn't give a hoot about the minor league teams such as our local Stars and Angels.

ABC-TV is out to make money for ABC-TV. That's okay. Learned economists kick the same theory around with lots of fancy figures and formulas, but that's the simple, honestto-goodness way our free-enterprise system works.

It is known, however, that if Hollywood and Los Angeles did not agree to permit the telecasts, ABC-TV—very subtly mind you—could have put a lot of public pressure on the local clubs. "You're not giving the public what it wants," they would have screamed, and plenty loud, too.

In addition, KECA-TV lined up paid sponsors even before they notified the local clubs about their plans. Good business, granted; but poor sportsmanship, double-granted.

The Stars and Angels haven't been letting any daisies grow under their wings, either. They admit they are still waiting for two things: (1) for Congress to pass the Johnson law, which would outlaw major league telecasts in minor league communities and (2) for the baseball convention this winter when they hope some action will be taken to protect themselves.

On the surface, all is lovey-dovey at the moment. Channel 7 is plugging the local clubs during the Saturday Page Thirty-eight

THE TRUTH ABOUT THE WRESTLING "WAR"

Newspaper columnists and sports commentators are leading people to believe that there is a wrestling war on. This is **not** true. There is a legal dispute now going on but it is in no sense a so-called

"wrestling war." Wrestling matches. like boxing matches, are made by matchmakers or booking agents—not by promoters. There are three booking agents in Southern California, John J. Doyle, Pat O'Brian, and Nick Lutze.

A wrestling war develops when one booking agent tries to steal another's clubs or towns. In this case, I talked with both Doyle and O'Brian and they are on very friendly and amiable terms. Lutze is temporarily inactive and devotes full time to the operation of his garage and service station in Beverly Hills.

Actually this affair over the Wednesday night wrestling which has received so much publicity is a fight between promoters—not matchmakers and wrestlers. Promoters do not make matches. This entire dispute is based on a technicality as to whether or not the San Diego Coliseum could run on Wednesday night.

For the past six months, KECA-TV, Channel 7, has been televising the wrestling matches from the Olympic Auditorium. For some reason, Olympic officials decided that they did not want to continue televising from the huge 18th and Grand plant via the American Broadcasting Company network. I do not know their reasons, but there are many arguments pro and con on the advantages of televising wrestling.

Consequently ABC, wishing to continue their wrestling programs, looked around for a good suitable club. They

games. The Angels and Stars, despite a one o'clock starting time, have waived the half-hour rule which could have ruined the telecasts.

In conclusion, if the three parties concerned want to make this triangle a right one, it will only occur when and if the square of the TV hypotenuse (undoubtedly the largest and ever-expanding factor) equals the sum of the former gate receipts of the two legs of major and minor league baseball.

How and when will this happen? What's the solution to this baseball problem, which in essence applies to all human evils? Brother, I wish I knew. I'd be wiser than the author of Ecclesiastes; richer than Rockefeller; and would waste the rest of my days writing the Great American Novel. began negotiations with San Diego Coliseum officials, because it is one of the top-ranking clubs in the State and has a new name and location.

In order to complete the deal, San Diego had to change its running night from Tuesday to Wednesday night, in order to conform with ABC programming.

San Diego asked the permission of the State Athletic Commission and stated that it intended to televise wrestling matches. The Commission cast a vote 100 per cent in favor of allowing such a change to San Diego for televising purposes.

It was at this point that the public was led to believe a wrestling war was shaping up. Cal Eaton, long-time promoter of the Olympic Auditorium. entered a protest requesting a reversal on the San Diego case on the grounds that it would be detrimental and harmful to his promotion in Los Angeles. Also he questioned the legality of the Commission's telephonic vote.

The Commission now consists of four men—two in Northern California, Commissioner Philips of San Francisco, the chairman of the board, and Archie Clauson of Lodi; and Everett Saunders and Norman Houston of Southern California.

Jake Erlich of San Francisco represented the Olympic and Jules Covey of Los Angeles represented San Diego.

Erlich, trying desperately to block the San Diego deal even temporarily, hinged his protest on the legality of a telephonic vote by the Commissioners.

Covey, the Coliseum's representative, stated that telephonic votes had been the policy of the Commission for the past 25 years when the issue of changing an arena's night of operation was concerned. Covey, a former chairman of the State Athletic Commission, is well versed in parliamentary procedure.

So you can see that the gossip of a wrestling war is merely a smoke screen to hide a technical dispute between promoters of the Olympic Auditorium and San Diego Coliseum.

That moment, however, has paid off handsomely for Jack. He has long since traded in his '41 Ford for a spanking new Cadillac and a Hillman Minx. Home was once a modest triplex apartment. Today it's a lovely house in Encino complete with a pool.

Fortunately, Jack's success hasn't gone to his head. Even if he is one of the busiest free-lancers in town his heart belongs to his alma mater, KLAC-TV, where he shared the mike with charming Betty White. When Wally Imes left Channel 13 to start his own TV show in Phoenix, Jack jumped into the vacated soot much to everyone's delight. Pretty Betty claims: "He's completely capable and fun at the same time. His sense of humor enhances the program. The day he made his debut on my show was my birthday, and what a wonderful birthday present he turned out to be!"

Jack's dramatic-club and debatingsociety experience at school sold him on the life of appearing before the public. After the Kentuckian's discharge from the service. he enrolled in Don Martin's Radio-TV School in Hollywood, where incidentally he met his lovely wife Mary Lou.

Starts Career

After completion of his course, novice Jack headed for El Centro and bluffed his way into a job at KXO. With three months of "experience"

AN YOU imagine a guy liking a midnight-to-5-a.m. shift? Well, Mel Baldwin, the 'official owl for KNX, loves it and even manages to live a normal life.

Mel hails from Portland, Oregon, where he held a series of radio jobs that included writing, producing, acting and announcing. After writing and directing seventeen shows a week. Mel takes his midnight-todawn schedule right in his stride.

If it weren't for Mel's admiration for Steve Allen, he might still be up in the timber country. Mel listened faithfully to Steve's KNX midnight broadcast when he was a station manager of KTIL, Tillamcok, Oregon. He sent Steve some Tillamook cheese at various times, with appropriate remarks, and later, in August 1950, looked him up during a visit to Los Angeles.

Approximately one year later, Mel sent an audition record to KNX that won him a contract immediately. His all-night "Music Till Dawn" show features light music for the nocturnal interlude, interspersed with news on the hour, weather reports and general information. The sponsor, American Airlines, signed six CBS radio stations for this unique program.

According to Mel's mail pull, a cross-section of people in all kinds of occupations listen to the sweet and low notes on to the wee hours. Page Forty-two Their letters also comment on his casual, easy-going commercials. One doctor writes: "My thanks for the fine program you are presenting... on behalf of my patients and self." An artist states: "... I am an artist and I paint mostly at night so I can remain up and listen to your music." Another listener sets his radio-clock alarm so that he can be awakened by the soft, sweet music. All-night service-station attendants find company in "Music Till Dawn's" offerings.

He Does Sleep

Mel's composure is refreshing. Normally you'd expect a man who's been up all night to be irritable and cross. But Mel arranges his upsidedown routine so that he gets his required sleep. He retires at 7:00 a.m. and sleeps until two in the afternoon. No matter how much noise his youngsters (Carol, seven, and Curt, five) make he's oblivious to their shou's and yells. A lovely pair of ear plugs enables him to blissfully slumber. Even the noise from the school play-yard area, which is directly across the street from the Baldwins' valley home, doesn't penetrate these impervious plugs.

Despite Mel's all-night show, he now has more time to spend with his family than ever before. After awakening from his noise-defying slumber, he has the remainder of the afternoon and early evening hours to spend with his wife and little Baldwins.

OD IS IN this church! If you've looked for Him in fashionable churches . . . in today's sermons on politics and the world situation . . . or in the faces of your fellow man and found Him not, do not be discouraged, for God is the motivating force behind this great church and its equally great choir.

Ten years ago Victory Baptist Church was little more than a dream in the heart of young Dr. Arthur A. Peters. The message that burned within him was filled with the joy of living and a promised hope for the future, and the fire of his convictions has spread to his congregation and choir. This is the secret of the "different" quality that pours from KTTV, Sundays at 8:30 p.m. It also accounts for the beautiful new church building and the Victory Baptist Nursery School in which more than one hundred pre-school youngsters are given daily Christian care and training by seven professionally trained teachers. Members of the church know that God is responsible for their prosperity and, not being reluctant to return part of it for His work, have provided \$100,-000 for a building fund.

Mr. Thurston Frazier, a very wonderful and talented young man, has over two hundred volunteer voices to choose from as Choir Director. He

not only leads, arranges, and writes music for this organization but works with the soloists and smaller vocal groups as well. As he leads the choir, a hymn that is intended to last three minutes may build in joy, momentum and volume till at the end of ten or fifteen minutes it will have become such an exquisite expression of happiness and faith that the tears and emotions of the congregation are wholly understandable. It is because of the lack of time that this part of the service is lost to television viewers.

Dr. Peters, or the Shepherd, as he is known to the members, has a beautiful singing voice himself and weaves music and song into his sermon as he implores the choir to "sing until you make heaven happy." He, along with the choir, may "rewrite" a number as they begin to feel the music. If someone's heart becomes so full that he must express himself, he takes the lead in the singing and the others go along with him as though it had been practiced in this manner for hours. Robbie Lee Peston, the pianist, and Helen Perkins have at least a sixth sense and accompany these changes as expertly and beautifully as they do the prepared passages.

Other church choirs were tape-recorded by producer William Johnson but the Victory Baptist Choir was



considered the best, and after many years of radio programs, KTTV presented them last Easter Sunday in their television debut. The presentation met with such instantaneous approval that they were retained on a sustaining basis. They are now sponsored.

These people sing and worship from the heart. Robert Breckner, Program Director, is to be commended for the manner in which they are presented, but the real tribute should be paid Dr. Peters, who took a dream, a small frame building, and a deep and abiding faith and built them into a church so large that a special detail of police is needed to handle the crowds who surge to hear his happy triumphant message. Truly this church is well named—The VIC-TORY Baptist Church.

There's Fire in "Gunsmoke"

Radio will always be alive and kicking with shows as good as this knockout Western

By Jon Bruce

RANKLY, it's amazing that "Gunsmoke" ever got on radio.

This CBS show which airs Saturdays at 6:30 p.m. is so lacking in formula stuff and cliches that it's a miracle it wasn't dismissed in the beginning with the typical reaction, "It'll never go---it's too different."

And it certainly is original. Its Western hero, Matt Dillon, is not the All-American-boy type—in fact, at times he sounds like a heavy; he doesn't win all of his fights; he doesn't barge into a saloon, take on six or seven guys and knock them all out cold; he isn't in love with some poor little lassie whose father owns a ranch on which the mortgage is past due; he is friendly with a dance-hall girl of questionable reputation; the dialogue in the show is literate and has none of the tired old lines like "How'rya podner?" or the "he went that-a-way" drivel.

No Conventional Hero

In almost every instance, the stories of "Gunsmoke," all of which center around the exploits of Marshal Matt Dillon of Dodge City in the 1870's, defy convention. Matt is no stock heroic but a human being with his own particular emotional problems. In one script he was faced with the decision of whether or not to amputate a man's leg. The man was dying of blood poisoning, no dector was available, so Matt was asked to do the operation. After debating the matter, he decided to try the amputation. So you think Matt saved the man's life. He did not. The man died,

Another time Matt met two men who looked familiar to him. All during the half-hour show he made references to the fact that he knew those men but couldn't remember their names. At the end he remembered. They were the James brothers. Can you imagine a Western with a marshal who wouldn't recognize such noted outlaws?

How Show Was Born

June 12, 1953

Norman Macdonnell, producer-di-

rector, and Johnny Maston conceived the idea of "Gunsmoke." They had long wanted to do a Western that would appeal to adults. One script was tried out on "Escape." a show Norman was directing, and later another was done on "Romance."

Both were so successful that the two men tried to sell the idea to CBS, but with no luck. It was too diametrically opposed to all conceptions of Western shows on radio. Also, at about the same time CBS was working up a rather typical formula Western to be called "Gunsmoke."

"I guess we used subtle and sundry means," Norman remarked, "but the first thing we knew our scripts went on as 'Gunsmoke' instead of the ones originally set by the station. I think we had such a difficult time selling the show at first because radio was in such a state of flux that no one wanted to try anything different. That's why we're ro gratified to see how fast the program has caught on.

"Selling the show was one problem. The other was convincing those in charge that William Conrad was the perfect Matt Dillon. Bill had been playing a lot of heavies on radio and no one could see him as the hero type— simply because he didn't sound like the young Western guy. Those who objected to him on those grounds are now praising him for the same reasons."

As for Bill Conrad, he thinks "Gunsmoke" is the greatest thing that could happen to an actor as do regulars Parley Baer, Howard Mc-Near and Georgia Ellis.

Mail Pull

The mail that comes into Norman's office is excellent testimony to the show's realism.

Several amusing letters have come in. One was from some people in Dodge City who wrote that they knew Matt Dillon was a real character who had come from Dodge City but they couldn't place the exact years in which he was Marshal.

As a matter of fact. Matt is a purely fictitious character.

Then there was the Governor of Kansas, who appeared on a broadcast of "Gunsmoke" and thanked CES for such an authentic picturization of Dodge City as it used to be. But he hastily assured listeners that the city had become quite civilized since then.

Apparently a couple of boys in Montreal, Canada, didn't hear the Governor because they wrote about their plans to tour the United States and mentioned they had thought of passing through Dodge City. However, since hearing the show they decided they should skip a visit to this wild and dangerous city. Norman Macdonnell, of course, assured then that the place was perfectly okay now.

Don't look for "Gunsmoke" to hit your TV screens, At least, Norman and his co-workers are against the idea.

"Our show is the perfect one for the medium of radio," he said, "Besides, we couldn't be as accurate as we are now in details. For example, marshals in Dodge City at that time wore derby hats, watch charms, button shoes, and other such fancy trimmings. Can you see a Western hero dressed like that on TV?"

As long as shows like "Gunsmoke" stay on radio, the medium will never have to count itself out. TV should, as a matter of fact, immediately onlist the services of Norman Macdonnell and Bill Conrad. Maybe they could bring some life to an often ailing youngster.

ing independent Hollywood publicist, has a unique slant on the Problems of a Press Agent, for Hal started with NBC in San Francisco in 1933 and during the past twenty years has noted a change of emphasis. "Over a period of years," he commented, "it's interesting to see a gradual and definite change of talent from just entertainers. troubadours or buffoons to solid and important business corporations. The trend in our national living has made it necessary for them to do this, rather than be itinerant artists." Bock points out that expectancy of a "career life" is extremely short, especially in regard to TV, which he

Accordingly, the networks, agencies and sponsors now deal with "talent" as they would with any other business concern. This practical attitude has brought about a change in publicity, which has turned from the fantastic milk-bath, guinea-hen-under - glass-for - breakfast type stories to more realistic publicity. In other words, as Bock puts it, "the days of the out-and-out baloney are gone. Today's publicist with a client feels he has a piece of merchandise—and so you have to figure out how to sell it. It's like selling a can of beans. First you determine what kind of beans you have and then what kind of market for them."

Temperament

In line with the more realistic approach to publicity, the problems of the publicist have changed. Temperament is seldom displayed, though Bock claims he has never found anybody big ("with a capital B") with temperament. He has had ample opportunity to witness any outbursts, for he successfully headed up NBC's Western Division Press

Department for many years (and was the first Westerner to win the annual Billboard Award for exploitation in the radio business—in fact he was a two-time recipient, both in 1940 and 1941).

Gone, then, are the days of the actress "with ninety per cent tem-per and ten per cent mental." Though Bock seldom had to deal with such persons, he does recall a couple of incidents. One involved a bit of hoity toity on the part of a famous movie star appearing weekly on a big radio dramatic series. It was the duty of Bock's department to get publicity photos of this star, but the actor continually refused to pose. Finally he magnanimously consented to stand still for "just two pic-tures." On the appointed day, Bock sauntered into the studio and got his two pictures-two apiece that is, from eight photographers he assembled for the great occasion! "I never had any trouble with the star again," Bock remarked.

A well-known singing star who repeatedly gave trouble by refusing to pose because she didn't have on make-up was also handled neatly. One day Bock appeared in the studio to make his tired bid for pictures. Just as the diva started voicing her customary dodge, one of Bock's assistants produced a complete makeup kit. All the star could do was to take the kit and capitulate to the camera.

One of Bock's rules is always to straighten out misunderstandings with the people with whom he is dealing. "I've always felt that if you don't understand or have a misunderstanding, you can work it out by talking for a minute," he stated.

For stars whose hat size becomes enlarged his stock remedy is the silent treatment. It has never failed.

One of the smartest publicity men in town is KTLA's Howard Wormser. Howard came to the station with an extensive background which included publicizing such famous names as Red Skelton, Benny Goodman, Kay Kyser, and many more.

Other Press Agents

"Oddly enough, one of the biggest problems a publicity man in a motion-picture studio or TV station faces is other press agents," Howard commented. "The independent publicist gets in our hair more than a little by his happy habit of doubleplanting stories. I know of one press agent who makes a habit of sending the same idea for an article to as many as three magazines. Then when the identical story appears in two books—or maybe even three he concocts all kinds of excuses to explain away the mishap. Usually he places the blame on the station, which had nothing to do with the whole thing."

Nursemaid to Stars

"Most publicity men, however, get their man-sized headaches from playing nursemaid to stars. A few of the satellites can get into come royal messes. One big name I once handled got into a sordid affair in-volving a soldier. The outcome of the deal was that the soldier robbed the star. I was given an emergency call by the performer, who had foolishly called the police to report the theft. He suddenly realized he would be at a loss to explain the whole situation without putting himself in an awkward light. I managed to turn the story around enough to take any embarrassment off the star. In short, he emerged as something of a heroic character.

"A press agent, like anyone else, can be fooled by a personality he is to plug. That's why I think it's better to forestall any future problems by knowing the star well before taking on the job. There is one TV name I once worked for---and it wasn't until I had been with him for a few F YOU think Fate doesn't work in amazing ways, take a listen to the story of Eliza.

months that I realized he was not the sweet guy I had thought he was. In fact, he was a no-good person. But I had a contract and I had to continue 'selling' him.

"It's easy to publicize someone whose talents you respect. I was never very fond of Benny Goodman as a person but I could 'sell' him because he had great talent. In the case of Sigmund Romberg, whom I also publicized, I had an easy job because he had talent and also a likeable personality."

Skelton a Top Guy

"My favorite, however, is Red Skelton. Red, to me, is the greatest comedian in the business and he's a regular guy. But I can never forget a boner I pulled once while I was with Red.

"He was doing one of his regular Sunday evening previews of his radio show and I had decided not to go that night to the studio. I told his wife to let me know, however, if I were needed for anything. I was sitting at home that evening when the phone rang. It was Red's wife telling me that the curtain in the studio had caught on fire. The fire had been put out but the room was full of smoke and Red had dragged out an overcome usher from the place. This was a story worth a couple of paragraphs so I called it in to the various papers. All but one city editor took it and he lambasted me for bothering him with such a silly story. I got mad and told him he was a fool for passing up this big yarn. Here I am standing in the studio with fire raging all around me,' I said. 'The beams are falling and Red has just pulled an usher from the flaming room-and you re-fuse to take this story? The guy bit and ran the item with banner head. June 12, 1953

lines on the next edition. His was the only paper that gave it such a spread—and he was promptly fired. Red was also a little unhappy because it had made him look silly. I don't know what got into me that time."

Klaus Landsberg

"Fortunately, I'm working now for Klaus Landsberg at KTLA and I'm glad I am. Klaus is, to me at least, the C. B. DeMille of TV. Before I got this job I had several other fine offfers from stations in town but I had a real respect for Klaus's talent and I wanted to work with him. It took me three months to see him and then I had to corner him at eleven o'clock one night. I talked to him for five minutes and got the job.

"My desk is not exactly free cf problems but at least I'm able to publicize KTLA and Klaus with honesty. It's no routine job."

Another sharp publicist is Pat Mc-Dermott, manager of press information of CBS-TV, who works for another master publicity man, Norman Siegel.

More Headaches

"One of our biggest problems," Pat began, "is supplying plentiful and new pictures every week for all the magazines that are now entering the TV field. To get the stars to take the time to pose for the art. to be sure that pictures are kept exclusive for the various publications—all this is a headache. It's even worse when so many times the magazines don't like what you've shot. Then they want a whole new set immediately.

"We press agents are very anxious to cooperate with magazines and newspapers because that's our job, but we do get a little irked when we're asked to write the stories for certain publications. We feel, perhap naively, that the magazine should be sufficiently staffed with writers to handle this chore themselves.

"Editors, too, give us headaches. They are, in some cases, a class of people who get easily upset. Most of them are cooperative but we do have those who get imagined hurts and dash to the network vice-president with a complaint. If we have failed to do our job, we deserve such complaints, but it is hard to please everyone all the time.

"Then there are some sponsors who give us a few trials. Sponsors may put the pressure on us if a show isn't doing so well—and then we have to start beating the drums. More than once we in the press department have kept a show on the channels."

Not Appreciated

"I don't want to sound as though we press agents are only an inch removed from being martyrs, but in all honesty I think that we haven't a well-appreciated job. We hear plenty when there are complaints but seldom do we hear anything about a chore well done. Talent is equally disinterested in admitting when a publicist has done rather well by them.

"But we stay in the business because it's always a challenge. We may get ulcers and nervous breakdowns but we're hams enough to get a glow when we see a story of ours hit the front pages or get a big layout in an important magazine. Maybe we're all just frustrated actors."

The Alvino Rey-King Sisters Show

KNBH seems to have a sure winner in "The Alvino Rey-King Sisters Show." This is an entertaining, well-produced program that should draw many viewers to Channel 4. It features no mammoth production but each number is thoughtfully presented. As for the music itself, it's the kind that local audiences seem to love.
