# J. GWEN BAGNI By Jon Bruce



GWEN AND HER LATE HUSBAND, John, were television's most respected writing team. John died suddenly last February, just before he and Gwen won the Screen Writers Guild Award for the best teleplay of 1953.

> NE OF the most brilliant of all writing teams in Hollywood was the team of John and Gwen Bagni. They won the Screen Writers Guild Award this year

for the best written teleplay of 1953— "The Last Voyage," starring Charles Boyer.

On February 13, 1954, this team as a physical reality came to an end with the tragic death of John Bagni. But the team as a working force is not over because J. Gwen Bagni is carrying on.

It's not hard to understand why Gwen chose J. Gwen Bagni as her new professional name. The J. naturally stands for John, whose presence and undeniable talent are still being felt in all of the many scripts Gwen is doing these days for "Four Star Playhouse" over CBS and for other shows. Her most recent contribution was "The Man in the Cellar" starring Charles Boyer.

"At first I felt I couldn't ever go into the study where John and I worked, let alone write again." Gwen remarked with real emotion. "Life, to me, was over—except for doing what I could for my two sons, Ricky and Bruce. Then, gradually, I began to get assignments. I was forced into a position where I had to write. And when the day came that I could go into the study and sit down at that typewriter I knew that somehow John was still with me, teaching me to grow in this new and lonely life.

"The first scripts were terribly hard. I was frantic and lonely and lost. And then—almost as though John had said, 'Look, Old Girl, here's what's wrong with your story'—I would steady inside. And go on and write, calling upon his mind, his philosophies, his virility. And gradually I didn't feel I was working alone, but that he was still writing with me. So the team hasn't really ended for me ...."

John and Gwen had been married for fifteen years and theirs was one of those idyllic mariages you read about all too seldom. They suffered privation, poverty, discouragement for many years before they began to click, first on radio and then on TV.

#### Friendships

"When John died I found out how many friends we both had," Gwen went on. "David Niven, who suffered a similar tragedy in his own life. was quick to help and counsel me. Warren Lewis and Don Sharpe, of 'Four Star', gave me encouragement and friendship. And all the others—all the people back of the cameras these were John's friends, and they let me know they were my friends too. It would take pages to describe their acts of kindness.

"I'll never forget the first time I walked on the set without John to watch one of my scripts being filmed. John had always handled the business end and the studio was his second home. He especially loved attending rehearsals, and he had a little running gag with Charles Boyer about John's being a frustrated actor

and wanting to read all the parts in rehearsal. So when I attended the first reading of 'The Man in the Cellar,' Charles turned to me with a warm look of remembrance on his face and said, 'Well, Gwen, I guess now you'll have to read all the parts.' It was his wonderful way of letting me go on where John had left off.

### **Charles Boyer**

"John and I wrote many scripts for Charles Boyer and became as fond of him as a person as we were admiring of his ability, but it was not until I turned in my first solo scripts to him that I learned the depth of his sensitivity. I was waiting anxiously for his reaction, but when he telephoned I happened to be out. Many people would merely have left the message to have me call back. But not Charles Boyer. He knew what his approval meant to me at that moment, so he told my son, Bruce, who answered the telephone, "Tell your mother I am very happy with her script.

"There are long days ahead for me —and I want to make full use of them. I owe a wonderful man, my husband, a debt—I must prove to him that the hours we worked to gether to carve some kind of life for ourselves were not wasted. I must be worthy of the confidence he had in me as a woman and as a writer."

J. Gwen Bagni. then, is simply a new team—but one based on the old.

The Bagni study may be a quiet place now as Gwen works alone on her new scripts, yet there is a wonderful warmth and peace there—a hope in the future brought about through a love that knew the full meaning of unselfishness.

PAUL COATES HAS DONE more daring things on TV than any other single personality. His "Confidential File" has become increasingly popular because he won't settle for the commonplace.

> HERE'S one thing about Paul Coates — he doesn't scare easily.

No other single TV personality steps into more controversial and even dangerous subjects than does Paul. His KTTV "Confidential File" is loaded with topics that are packed with dynamite. The threat of libel must always be watched. And the people who appear on the show are sometimes not the most substantial with which to deal. It is, therefore, to Paul's everlasting credit that he refuses to compromise on any issue—that he insists on hitting a subject straight on.

Consider the people he's had on his show recently. There were a lady bouncer, a prostitute, a homosexual, a man who claimed to have been in a flying saucer. These are not exactly typical TV guests. You might assume from such a line-up that Paul is interested only in sensational expose, but such is not the case.

"We are not trying to be sensational," Paul, who also does "Flashbacks," commented. "But we are concerned with bringing certain conditions to public notice since few people unfortunately are willing to get their information by reading the newspapers."

The show dealing with the prostitutes stemmed from an incident at Malibu where several girls were allegedly entrapped by the deputy sheriffs. Paul took a stand against this and has had his hands full ever since. After the girls were arrested, Paul got a call from a waitress who worked in a shady restaurant in town. She said she hadn't been involved in the raid but that her friends had been—and they had a storv for him. These girls appeared on "Confidential File" and told their story. It seems that after they were arrested under what were considered unorthodox police methods, the police then bought them steak dinners. After Paul's show appeared there was reportedly quite a shake-up in the vice squad department.

"Before I did this program I notified Sheriff Biscailuz of my plans," Paul remarked. "I have the greatest respect for Biscailuz and know him to be an honest man, so I didn't want to hurt him.

"While the girls were telling their story on the show, a couple of policemen came to the set at KTTV to try to contact them. It was a touchy moment for a while since I feel an obligation to protect those who come on the program. After all, much of my information comes from the underworld and I can't afford to betray any confidences."

Paul got the police into the control booth and as soon as the girls finished the program they were whisked into a car and away before the "cops" could get to them.

On his July 25 show of this year. Paul was again scheduled to take up the same fight that was his initial telecast for "Confidential File"—the

B-girls. For TV-RADIO LIFE he gave us a rundown on how this program was being prepared.

"For a while, after our first show, the B-girl situation was cleaned up," Paul commented. "We decided to do it over again, though, when we learned that the problem had once more become acute. A girl came into The Mirror's offices and said she had

applied for a job as a waitress. Once she was hired she learned she was actually to be a B-girl. She was told how to 'water' drinks, how to fake drinks, and how to spot a 'cop' from a customer. Then Jim Peck, our producer, and others from the staff went down to the joints that play up the B-girls and acted as customers. They bought a few beers, got the treatment, and reported back to me about how the deal is set up.

"Before putting the girls on 'Confidential File,' we naturally had to get their confidence and to really try to help them. It is very important, we feel, to expose this very prevalent racket."

## Homosexual Problem

One of the trickiest shows Paul has done dealt with homosexuals.

"The man who appeared as a homosexual didn't want to be masked," Paul stated, "although I thought he should have been. At any rate, his appearance was quite a blow to his parents who hadn't known the truth about him—and he lost his job the next day, as he expected.

"The show did good, though, in

that it enlightened the public about homosexuals. After the program the publisher of one of these physique magazines and a couple of photographers who had submitted pictures to the magazine were arrested.

"The PTA was against my doing this show at first but afterwards we got only compliments from the organization. In fact, I worked right along during the preparation for the program with PTA head Mrs. Ralph Lewis, and incorporated many of the points about homosexuals she wanted included."

Naturaly, this type of show is not without its problems. Take the lady bouncer and the Italian immigrant who built a towering monument to the United States out of tin cans, bottles, and junk he collected.

"The day of the show on which the two were to appear," Paul went on, "I got a call saying the lady bouncer was indisposed and couldn't make it, so Jim Peck and I went to her hotel and talked her into coming on the program anyway. We were somewhat startled to see she had a real shiner—she said some man had hit her. Well, to ad a feminine touch.

and she was feminine—I got her a corsage of tea roses.

"Then the immigrant, Sam Rodilla, was brought to the station. As he got to the gate he suddenly exclaimed, 'I got to go, I can't be on the show.' We tried to get him into the studio anyway but he ran away. We chased him for several blocks, asking him to remain for the show but he just said, 'My dear child, I have to go, I can't be on your program.' We had to explain to the audience that night that one of our guests had disappeared.

"Incidentally, the other guest on that evening's program was a hair stylist who goes to Camarillo to fix the lady patients' hair. It's a sort of therapeutic treatment.

## Lie Detectors

"On 'Confidential File' we have used lie detectors twice—and both times the subjects were found to be lying. One was used on a spiritualist. We did extensive preparation for this show, even to having infrared film flown out from New York. We had cameras under and on the table we had selected ourselves for use. The darned thing actually moved. Then we asked the spiritualist to submit to a lie detector and she agreed. After four hours of testing she was found to be practicing deception. Much the same thing happened with the man who claimed to have been in a flying saucer.

"I hope to continue to take viewers to places where they'd never be and to bring them face to face with interesting people and provocative problems. One thing sure--there's never a dull moment in this business, thank heaven!" An Unusual Record Show Which Makes You Disbelieve Your Ears Is CBS's

"Hollywood Music Hall"

ID YOU know that it takes forty hours to prepare "Hollywood Music H a 1 l," a thirty-minute record show?

For those who haven't heard it, "Music Hall" consists of interesting anecdotes about personalities in the music world, songs associated with them. and musical excerpts from opera, musical comedy and the like.

The amount of research that goes into this program is fantastic. Les Farber, the show's triple threat man —he writes, produces and directs spends endless hours probing for interesting stories about famous personalities.

#### Research

Farber, a very affable person, has devised several methods for digging up little known facts about well known people. First. he employs the direct approach by interviewing his subjects. He spends more time backstage at the Philharmonic, Hollywood Bowl, and Greek Theater than he does in the audience. Whenever his subject tells him "nothing unusual ever happened to me" Farber ignores the statement. He believes that something different or unusual has happened to everyone, especially people in entertainment circles.

"These people have stories to tell but they are too close to the situation and don't realize it," he explains. "For example, Wilbur Evans, the musical comedy star, couldn't think of anything to tell me at first but he finally realized that only be-

cause he flunked in math did he decide to become a singer."

When the individuals are not available for interviews, Les talks to their friends and associates. Invariably they come up with interesting stories. Sooner or later show people migrate to Hollywood and Les can always locate someone who appeared with a "name" in a hit show and dig up an interesting fact or two.

Relatives are also of invaluable assistance when Les is on a research kick. They never fail him. Mrs. Igor Gorin gave him some wonderful stories about her famous husband. It seems that Gorin was discovered quite accidentally while singing with a group of fellow medical school graduates in a Viennese beer garden. Victor Fuchs, one of Vienna's leading musical impressarios, overheard him. Fuchs begged Gorin to give up medicine and study music; he even offered to pay for his tuition. Fuchs was so insistent that Gorin was finally persuaded to try a musical career. Today, Gorin is one of the leading baritones of the Metropolitan.

The most tedious method of research is looking for autobiographical material. Les has worn the pages of Reader's Guide thin thumbing through them for information.

## **Musical Editing**

Research and putting the anec-

dotes into narrative form for Hugh Douglas is only part of the job. Les must listen to entire record albums until he has a mental picture of the score. Fortunately he has had a musical education. Once Les has committed the score to memory he and his competent engineers, Bob Schradermeier, Jerry DeHaan and Vic Livoti, go to work. They can cut a song on a half-note and segue into another number so smoothly that professional musicians swear there's a background orchestra in the studio. It's a tough job to condense a musical score which normally runs one hour and twenty minutes into eight minutes. But Les and his staff do it so convincingly that they have people disbelieving their ears. Les considers it a great compliment when professionals insist that "Music Hall" is a live show and that it couldn't possibly be accomplished with records.

Despite the extensive research and preparation that go into "Hollywood Music Hall" the program has a comparatively low budget. Yet listeners get the feeling that the Alfred Drakes and the Celeste Holms are in the studio in person broadcasting when actually it's all done on records. Listeners may be fooled by the mechanics on "Music Hall" but a more pleasant and melodious way to be fooled would be difficult to find.

On the "There's No Business Like Show Business" set at 20th Century-Fox recently, Ethel Merman, who has made quite a dent in TV too, carried out the old adage of "The show must go on." She was suffering severe pains in her side and yet went through a rigorous dance with Johnnie Ray and Donald O'Connor. Not long after she collapsed with an appendicitis attack. Johnnie Ray, a newcomer to the movie business. was amazed at Ethel's determination not to let anyone in the cast down or to hold up production. Incidentally, this looked like a TV company at work. In addition to Ethel. Donald, and Johnnie, Mitzi Gaynor, who has appeared on several TV shows, is in the cast—as is **Hugh O'Brian**, who is now playing in some of the episodes in "The Loretta Young Show."

But after looking at the company work and after seeing the mammoth sets for this picture and for another one going here, "Desiree," the more convinced you become that productions like these could never be duplicated for TV-just as some things that are right for TV could never be given the same intimate impact in the movies. The two mediums offer their own spe-cial brands of entertainment. "Spectaculars" on TV cannot compete with "Show Business" or films like "The Egyptian." but the point is simply that if both mediums will use competition to better their products instead of trying to cut each other's throats, the public will really benefit. The "spectaculars" are a natural outcome of improved motion pictures. TV had to go into a bigger arena. It couldn't stay in a complacent rut. So the whole "Broken Lance" is a film heartily rec-ommended to all. It proves that no matter whether a show is presented on a twenty-one inch screen, on Cinema-Scope, or VistaVision, or what-haveyou, the only thing that really counts is a solid story and a hefty bit of en-tertainment on that screen. The entertainment field is seeing some changes -both in movies and in TV. And it's about time!

On July 28 on the Red Skelton Show you'll see an act that is completely unlike anything you've ever seen before. Los Chavales De Espana (The **Kids From Spain**) are now playing a long engagement at the **Cocoanut Grove and** they are really different. Eleven men from Spain perform instrumental, choral, and vocal selections with amazing effects. They've been so with amazing energy in this country a couple of years ago that they haven't had the time to do TV—so Red gets a scoop. Each member of the group has memorized over 400 intricate musical arrangements and almost all play at least two instruments. some even four. Three of the men will also appear on Mike Roy's program on the 26th, and will cook up a Spanish dinner. The group is also to do an Ed Sullivan "Toast of the Town" in the fall.

More vault originals are appearing on "X" label's jazz classics of yester. day now available on long playing records. Eddie Condon's Hot Shots and other groups with which he recorded in 1929 feature sidemen Jack Teagar. den. Glenn Miller. Coleman Hawkins, Pee Wee Russell and Red MacKenzie.

Jelly Roll Morton's Red Hot Peppers with Ory. Simeon, Bigard, Howard and Mitchell add a humorous touch to 1926 recordings of "Sidewalk Blues," "Dead Man Blues" "Steamboat Stomp" and other early classics. There's also a collection of blues and boogie by Chi-cago's pioneer of this school. Jimmy Yancey, whose unequalled rolling bass is heard in 1939 and 1940 discings.

Even the early "jug bands" are rep-Even the early "jug bands" are rep-resented on another LP edition of 1926-27-28 recordings by The Dixie-land Jug Blowers and the Mem-phis Jug Band. Where Do They Get Those CRAZY Ideas?

HEREVER Jess Oppenheimer, Madelyn Pugh, and Bob Carroll go, they're asked the same question: "Where do you get all the ideas for the scripts you do on 'I Love Lucy'?" To this. the trio just shrug their shoulders, toss forth a smile, and say, "Everywhere—and nowhere."

"We keep thinking that when plot day arrives—the day we work out the story line for the next script—that we'll run out of ideas," Bob Carroll commented, "but somehow we get them. I guess we just pick everybody's brains. Like the way we borrow experiences from people we know."

"Once, for example," Madelyn Pugh commented, "we heard a friend complaining about the types of presents her husband bought her. She said they hardly ever fit, they weren't the right size, and then she added, "But what do you do about it?" We'd heard this typical wifely complaint from several other people so it wound up as a story for 'I Love Lucy.'"

"But the funniest thing is that we have friends who are always insisting we got an idea from them—when we really didn't."

Whatever strikes the fancy of any of the three writers is put down in an idea book for a possible script. Then occasional magazine articles will bring forth a plot—such as a quiz called "Do You Know Your Wife?" which ran in a newspaper magazine section. And, recently, when Desi got all fired up about golf, a story was done on "Ricky" and his game.

"We get ideas at odd times, too," Madelyn said. "Sometimes I have a hard time sleeping and I'll start thinking of a plot line. Or I'll wake up suddenly with a gag in mind."

"I try to encourage her to eat rich foods before she goes to sleep." Bob remarked with a laugh, "so she'll stay up and get more ideas."

Bob and Madelyn, after the plot session with Jess, do a first draft of the script and then Jess makes final revisions. Lucy and Desi never see the script, as a rule, until the day before rehearsals begin. The two stars hardly ever suggest any changes. In fact, they can't say enough in praise about this talented trio.

#### Criticisms

Recently, critics have complained about there being too much slapstick in the "Lucy" shows. Others have ranted about too many happy endings. To such comments, Bob remarked, "We're using less slapstick now than we did in the first shows. And there are many who tell us our endings are too unhappy. Some people said we had too much of the baby in the shows, others said we didn't have enough. So we know it's impossible to please everyone. We just try to keep happy ourselves —and still let Lucy and Desi have something funny to say."

The biggest change in recent scripts has been the introduction of characters who appear in more than one show, such as "Mrs. Trumbull," so ably played by Elizabeth Patterson, and the clubwoman played by Doris Singleton. Tennessee Ernie will undoubtedly be in more scripts and there is talk of introducing a woman who will be "Ricky's" mother.

Bob and Madelyn, who incidentally are not married, began their writing careers at CBS as staff writers. They did every kind of show and even wrote station breaks. But they didn't begin writing together until they went to Harry Ackerman, CBS executive, and asked him to let them try a script for the then projected radio show, "My Favorite Husband," starring Lucille Ball. They did one script, sold it, and were assigned to do all the rest. It was a natural move, then, for them to join Lucy and Desi on "I Love Lucy."

If you were to ask Jess, Madelyn, and Bob how they feel about having done so many scripts for this longtime favorite CBS-TV show, they'd simply say, "Well, we still laugh at our own gags, so we're certainly never bored."

## How Harlow Wilcox made

# The Big Switch



FOR ALMOST A QUARTER OF A CENTURY Harlow Wilcox has been one of the biggest names in the radio world. But now he has joined the TV ranks on KNBH's "World Digest."

OR NEARLY a quarter of a century Harlow Wilcox became renowned in the magic land of radio. As announcer for such famed shows as "Fibber McGee and Molly," "Amos 'n Andy," "Suspense." "Blondie," and many others, the name and voice of Harlow Wilcox became familiar to millions of Americans.

One afternoon, just a few months ago, Wilcox made a phone call which climaxed that career and started a new one. He called his friend, Tom McCray, general manager of KNBH, Channel 4.

Up to that moment, it was strictly radio that made Wilcox a personality. With the exception of one very brief appearance on a local station, he had never appeared before a camera.

## Sense and Cents

"I've got kind of a crazy idea," Wilcox began. "I've waited a long, July 30, 1954 long time to do this, but I think the time has come.

"I've been kicking around the idea of going into TV news. I've never done any newscasting before, but I think I could handle it. Does it make any sense to you?"

It did make sense to McCray. As a matter of fact, he told Wilcox he had been planning to renew a show on KNBH called "World Digest." It was a half-hour program summarizing the week's news with the aid of the NBC news department and film service.

"Would you be interested in handling such a show?" McCray asked. "Yes, I think I would. I really believe I would."

That ended the phone conversation and that began a new TV career for the fifty-four-year-old announcer. (Naturally, Wilcox is still continuing his radio announcing, but he is not confining himself to

that field as he has done in the past.)

## A TV Milestone

Getting Wilcox into the TV fold was a significant event in many ways. He was one of the last of radio's "great" announcers to enter TV. He was one of the last of the "old radio guard." TV could now claim almost a complete roster with its older sister.

Why did Wilcox make the big switch?

"The reasons are very simple," Harlow explained. "As long as radio was paying me a good living, I saw no purpose in going into television. I stayed exclusively in radio just as long as I felt I could. I knew that TV was much harder work. I've always felt that every dollar I made on radio I figuratively stole.

"But TV has gotten too big these days for anyone to ignore completely. I didn't particularly want to make the switch but I needed the money and it was inevitable."

## TV Tough

Beginning early in June, viewers had a chance actually to see what the famed Harlow Wilcox looked like on "World Digest."

The stocky, gray-haired announcer likes his new assignment but finds it tough, much tougher than radio.

"Many times for a radio show, I wouldn't see the script until a few minutes before air time. Now, for this half-hour program, I spend all day at the KNBH studios going over the copy, watching the films, and going through endless details until we have a compact half-hour of news and films," he explained.

One difficulty he had to overcome was to get the habit of looking up from his copy, which he half reads and half memorizes. "I don't like to use a teleprompter, where you have to keep staring at the same spot all the time. To me, it looks artificial."

After twenty-five years of radio experience, how did veteran Wilcox feel when he did his very first TV show?

"Absolutely petrified!"

# **Other Life**

'The Cisco Kid's' Without any fanfare, Duncan Renaldo is waging a one-man fight for better lives for children. He raises some potent questions with his comments on the "lost generation" we're creating.

AM GRATEFUL to my TV show, 'The Cisco Kid,' for many reasons but mainly because it has given me a chance I would not have had otherwise to fight for the better life for today's youngsters."

Duncan Renaldo spoke earnestly and with deep conviction. For several years now, Duncan, who por-trays "The Cisco Kid" on KABC-TV, has gone quietly ahead helping orphans, teaching safety to thou-sands of children, giving valuable help to boys and girls lying in hospitals, and working conscientiously to help stem the tide of juvenile delinquency. He has been given awards by the dozens by civic leaders and by organizations working to help today's children. He is doing a job the importance of which cannot be measured by mere words.

"When I was a boy I used to pas-ture sheep for a living," Duncan began. "I had to take care of as many as six hundred sheep. Somehow, the underdog and I always worked to-And always I had to come gether. face to face with a practical way of living. I've tried, with my three children — Stephanie, Jeremy, and Richard—to see that they face the same practical values. They work for their weekly allowance so they will learn how to hang on to money without squandering it. But, even more important, they are learning what is important in life. They are learning a sense of responsibility and recognizing an obligation to each other.

"It seems to me that too many children are allowed to skip conve-niently through life. They are not being given a good grounding. And yet all authorities agree that the

span from four and a half to sixteen years old is the most important time of any child's life. Without good training during those formative years they are lost souls. They never catch up. Much of today's delinquency can be attributed to indifferent training in early life. Too many parents, it seems to me, have the idea that they can take care of their children's problems after they've taken care of their own-but somehow their own problems never seem to be settled.

"I have talked to many delinquent children in my visits to cities in this country. I have talked to sheriffs and police and have found that delinguency is directly traceable to the early years in a child's life. Mother and daddy had to work and the boy or girl had to do the best possible under the circumstances. Schools are now-and have been for some time-overcrowded, so teachers had to rely on the parents to help the children. As a result, the boys and girls grew up without any real family background and without any basic education. This lack of train-ing isn't representative of the poorer class of families. Much of it came from rich homes where the parents, socially speaking, left their children at home with the maids.

"The prevalent attitude is that tomorrow will take care of itself. That just doesn't work. One of the main causes of delinquency is the lack of any religious training. We have lost the sense of divinity, of order, of constructive thinking. Taking chilconstructive thinking. Taking chil-dren to church every Sunday has become an inconvenience to many parents and so consequently there is no church. There is, therefore, much damage done to the children. How can they have respect for their parents if they don't believe in God? Without faith there can be no bulwark. Without faith children will turn to any false thing for excitement, an outlet.

"As for education, it seems terrible to me that teachers are so poorly paid. I drive along highways and notice all kinds of improvements in roads and decorations added to beautify the scenery, but I can't help thinking how much good all the money spent in this way could do if it were given to pay teachers a de-cent salary. I had a letter from the chief of police in Washington, D. C., decrying this same condition.

"When I do a show in any cityand Leo Carrillo and I have often played to as many as 30,000 boys and girls in one place-I always stop in the middle to make a little talk to the children. I may point up the danger of playing with daddy's guns, I talk a great deal about kindness and courtesy since they are the most elemental things to learn, I talk about tolerance, about respect for parents. And I only pray that whatever is said helps in some way to give children a better way of life."

Duncan also donates regularly to children's hospitals and to orphanages. Not long ago he gave sixty lambs to the Boys Harbor Association for the boys to raise-thus giving them a sense of responsibility. To another organization he gave calves.

But Duncan gives more than cash and gifts-he gives of himself. His life is dedicated to children.

Isn't it about time that all of us give as much to our own children?

# MARGEE PHILLIPS: KBIG's Wonder Woman

Versatile Fem News Writer Invades A Man's World With Much Success.



VERSATILE MARGEE PHILLIPS can write society news or the agricultural history of mushrooms with equal knowhow. Incidentally, she comes by the farm angle naturally. She grew up on a Colorado ranch and earned her money for college by showing registered Holstein cattle in Western show rings.

T WOULD appear as though vivacious Margee Phillips is out to prove that anything a man can do she can do better.

Margee is KBIG's assistant news editor and staff writer. She has a tremendous capacity for work and seems to thrive on meeting her almost hourly deadlines.

Margee handles the off-beat news items for the station. Following KBIG's policy of presenting capsule news, she can condense more information in a five minute newscast than anyone else in the industry save veteran reporter Bill Henry.

In the "Homemaker's Edition of the News," she has taken a prosaic subject like fruits and vegetables July 30, 1954 and glamorized it for listeners. The history of an artichoke or rhubarb sounds pretty dull until you listen to one of her scripts read by a dulcet-toned announcer.

On occasion. Margee will arise at two a.m. to visit the wholesale produce market in downtown Los Angeles with the produce buyer for Von's Market, her sponsor. She says she's completely fascinated by the gibberish she overhears at the market. "It sounds like the highly publicized tobacco auctioneer and before I can interpret a single word a transaction has taken place. Usually fifteen carloads of lettuce have been bought for \$15,000 in nothing flat," she explains.

But not all of Margee's sacrifices in the line of duty require such early risings. Recently she visited Soquel, California, near Santa Cruz. to see mushrooms "flush." That's right flush. Soquel raises choice mushrooms in caves and Margee had to descend into the depths of the dark cave wearing a carbide light on her hat in order to see the mushrooms popping up.

Margee is not only well informed

about the lowly fruit or vegetable but she is also well fed on her job. Growers send her delicacies by the case to tempt her epicurean tastes.

## Fishing Copy

On the "Maritime Edition of the News" Margee compiles latest news of ocean fishing catches. She talks to about fifteen skippers of sportsfishing boats from Ensenada to Santa Barbara. Although she translates the jargon like a veteran, she hasn't been fishing in fifteen years and plans to keep it that way. The skippers don't seem to mind, though, for they point out that the best writers on fishing never go near the water.

Writing a public service show for the Los Angeles Police Department is another one of her duties. Margee added spice to routine police bulletins by having Friday on mike—Policewoman Lorraine H. Friday, that is.

Her creative work won recognition when she was cited by the Women's Advertising Club of St. Louis. There's no denying it—Margee Phillips is a versatile news writer and KBIG can truly call her their woman wonder.
