ARY CROSBY, pudgy little guy loaded with talent and personality, was being interviewed over CBS way for another CBS radio show—and, at the same time, for this story. He had just finished doing his nimble chores on tape for the Tennessee Ernie show and was in rare good humor. He was also relaxing as only a Crosby can.

Bing's Influence

'Speaking of Crosby, Gary has had many people ask him, not too subtly, "Does being Bing's son make it easier for you in getting your own career launched?" Gary, not one for flowery words or subtle evasions, has one reply to that one:

"In a way, this throws a challenge at me," Gary remarked. "It puts me on the spot to an extent. Yet, it's an undeniable fact that being my Dad's son is an advantage too. I get better breaks, the start of a career isn't so tough, but people watch me a lot closer than they would some other fellow who started on his way without any outside help. I sure have to prove myself because if I laid a few eggs it wouldn't make any difference who I was—I'd be given the heave-ho.

"My Dad lets me alone as far as my career is concerned. He doesn't even give me any advice unless I ask for it—and when I do ask for his comments he is honest and constructive. Invariably, what he advises is good."

Gary is now determined to click in show business. He left college but only because he had made up his mind as to the career he wanted and he couldn't see how any further college training could help him with that profession.

All Out For Career

"I want to be able to do anything pertaining to show business from here on in. I got some very good training and experience last summer when I had my own show and I'm getting my feet wet more and more now with each new thing I try. I still have a lot to learn, but I'm all for learning!"

Gary has been the subject of much discussion in some circles. The moot point has been, as to be expected, marriage. Is he in a romantic mood yet? Is he marriage-minded?

"Not this old house!" Gary cracked. "I have no marriage plans at all. Oh, I haven't anything against marriage, but, believe me, I can wait. Tennessee Ernie has been pushing this a little on his show. In fact, the whole May 20, 1955

OME GUYS have all the luck. There's a young man, a musician, running around town these days looking very smug and contented. He ought to be. He's married to Peggy King, the pint-size bottle

of champagne who keeps a smile on

everyone's face. Knobby Lee, whose real name is Norbert, is the lucky man. While others may sigh and drool over Peggy, he's only married to her. And the girl who is also known as George Gobel's girl-friend singer couldn't be happier over the whole set-up. You see, she likes being Mrs. Lee.

"I wasn't sure at first that the Mrs. Lee would look too good." Peggy smiled happily. "The minute I saw Knobby I knew I was going to marry him. I admit—I chased him. And I remember thinking to myself, 'Peggy Lee?...Peggy Lee?...No, that won't do. there's another Peggy Lee who is a singer.' But I married him anyway.

"We've been married two years. I met Knobby when I joined the Ralph Flanagan band. Knobby was already with the organization — and he was the first person I saw when I reported for work the first night.

He Was It

"From the beginning he was what I wanted—and yet we fought all of the time. After all, though, I saw him about twenty-four hours a day and anyone could argue a lot being together that much. When we weren't working we were traveling on the bus with the band. so we were thrown together constantly, a situation I most heartily approved of.

"I guess we fought most about other girls. When we got to the West Coast about three girls called him up and I just went up in smoke. Then when we played at the Palladium here several girls came up to see him. I'd get so mad! I'd walk to the mike glaring at him. Well, I was young then and didn't know any better.

"I remember trying to make him jealous once. I sat with another fellow from the band on the bus one day instead of with Knobby. It was the first time I hadn't sat with Knobby in over a year. He got almost too jealous. Then, another time he got very mad and we were going to stop seeing one another. However, it did not take me long to know he was it and I had to face up to it. We agreed to get married — and we did, three years later.

"We had such a long wait for many reasons. At the time I had a job and Knobby was without one, so he wouldn't marry me. Then he went to New York and I came to Hollywood on an MGM contract. He arrived some months later with the Ray Anthony band. There were other problems too. Knobby wanted to work in Hollywood but he couldn't get a union card here until he had been in resi-

dence for six months so he got a job teaching people how to drive during the six months. As for me, I was still at MGM. All I did was put on and take off wigs. I was the official wig-tester, I think. Oh. I did get to sing one song in 'The Bad and the Beautiful.' I've since figured out my salary for that one song. I got around \$6000 for it since that was my pay while I was under contract to MGM. The studio was keeping me under wraps — what for, I don't know.

"I left MGM on February first and on February second Knobby and I were married. And still there were problems.

"I wasn't doing anything in 1953, the year we got married. And he had to be out of town a good deal. All I did was go to about one hundred auditions. Things were very rough for us. There wasn't much money and we were apart six months out of the the first year.

"It was during this period that I cut my hair. It had been long when I met Knobby. You know how women are—they get in a mood, so they buy a new hat. That's if they have money. When you don't have money you do what I did — cut your hair. When Knobby came home from being out of town and saw my short-cropped hair—he almost flipped. It took him about a week to get used to it. Now I'm going to let it grow a little because people seem to like it better long.

"Knobby and I are now on a pretty even keel in our marriage, but if the separations had continued I don't think our life together could have lasted. Being apart is too lonely an existence. I can't stand it at any rate. But now things are looking up. Knobby is working with Liberace, I have May 20, 1955 my TV show, and I also have made a test at Paramount Pictures."

Peggy did quite a test too! It was in color and was one of the longest ever made. The studio is more than high on its possibilities. However, Peggy was afraid to see it. In fact, when the studio called her to come give it a look, she got so nervous she was ill and had to go to bed. She finally did see it and she thought it was really fine.

Nervous

"Being so nervous is one of my troubles," Peggy admitted. "I'm terribly high strung. I'm so keyed up I can't even drive an automobile. I'm also very career conscious now which doesn't make me too easy to live with. Three people actually live in our place—Knobby, my career, and I. Plus two dogs and two birds.

"I'm also a problem to live with because I'm a worrier. I worry whether I've done a good show, about what may happen in a day or two, if I look right, anything and everything. I should stop being such a worry bug

too. That Paramount test was an example. I fussed and fumed and then I loved it and was proud of it. In fact, I'm thinking now more of acting than I am of singing."

Domestically speaking, Peggy is much less complicated.

"I'm terribly neat and clean — almost to the point of driving people crazy." Peggy laughed. "I'm a good cook too, but I put too much salt in everything. Knobby and I went to a movie not long ago and I got some popcorn. Naturally, I added salt. When he tasted it, he said, "This tastes just like the first dinner I had at your place.' But I can cook.

"Knobby is a good cook too. In fact, on several occasions I have arrived home late from work and have found that he has prepared dinner. But he's a good husband in every respect. He had to be out of town for three days last Easter — and early Easter morning he sent me some beautiful flowers.

"I'm fairly practical as a wife. At least, I don't have many extravagances. Oh, I'm always buying curtains but I can't sew at all. It took me six months to make an apron when I was in high school, and I'm not much better today.

"My only extravagances now are shoes and hats — and giving people presents. This is a throwback to the days when I was a little girl and went to parties and couldn't take any nice presents to my friends. I also like to give parties now because I couldn't afford to give any before.

"I'll buy anything that's pink, however — even a pink car. And I like Pinky Lee because his name is Pinky. I'm just having fun buying things I could never afford to buy before. But I'm still keeping myself under control — with my business manager's help."

And how are things at the Lee home now? Well, they still have arguments — just as does any couple.

"We don't argue much any more, though," Peggy smiled. "Our two dogs can't stand arguments. They carry on and whine terribly. I fly off the handle quickly and am over it just as fast, while Knobby stays hurt for days. Of course, I'm sensitive too. I cry at the drop of a hat. I'm so weepy I could even cry at menus."

But Peggy and Knobby are a happy combination these days. They are obviously deeply in love and both are pinching themselves to be sure that they're not dreaming. They deserve success. And it will rest easi'y on them.

When men are fighting and dying together, color and creed become relegated to their proper place of unimportance. A soldier lying wounded on a battlefield does not care whether the hands that lift him onto a stretcher and carry him to safety are black or white, nor in the hospital does he ask whether the life-saving blood he is getting came from a Catholic, a Protestant or a Jew. A bullet has no name on it. It merely says, to whom it may concern."

Benny was rightfully honored for "fostering good will and better understanding among all races and creeds."

AT RISK OF AROUSING THE IRE OF Liberace's countless admirers, I'd like to mention that several fans have said that it was a nice surprise to hear him include one new number ("Davy Crockett") in his "Comedy Hour" repertoire. Everyone fully realizes how busy Lee must be with all his musical activities, picture preparations, and new suit fittings, but many are also of the opinion

that some of his numbers are wearing rather threadbare and that "Warsaw Concerto," "Beer Barrel Polka," and similar offerings need to be replaced by some fresh ditties. What used to last for months, yea years, in nightclubs is now devoured in nothing flat, coast to coast, on television. It's the smart cookie who realizes this—we all hope "Smiley" does, all the way, every day, as he staggers to the bank.

ACCORDING TO KBIG'S BOB McAN-DREWS, local radio stations are swamped with orders for new car advertising and have been, ever since the latest models debuted. Auto commercials currently comprise the biggest wad of a station's "spot" income. Last year, according to McAndrews, the product was beer. The year before, TV sets. As Meredith Willson's talking people used to say, "Interesting, hmmm?"

A COUPLE OF WEEKS AGO. This Week in TV "viewed with alarm" a bit of business Marguerite Piazza had done on "Toast of the Town." She came onstage dressed like a medieval princess and finished her act doing a strip like a naughty queen, meanwhile shouting jazzily. I didn't see the act, but our reporter thought it much too sexy and berated her for her "lowbrow exhibitionism."

SINCE I HAD SEEN MISS PIAZZA recently when she appeared at the Cocoanut Grove, it may be assumed that what Marguerite did on the Ed Sullivan show was her nightclub routine. It is not my intention to take the stand on her behalf, but I'd like to point out a couple of things. Her nightclub act, obviously formatted to show most possible facets of Miss Piazza's voice and figure, did not seem offensive in a nightclub setting. Apparently it did to many who witnessed it on TV. Which accentuates the fact now and then overlooked by even the best of producers: television is an intimate, family-type medium. That That which seems innocuous or mildly exciting in the sophisticated atmosphere of a floor show may very well be disillusioning and perhaps even disgust-ing to parents and children gathered in the privacy of their own living rooms.

DON FEDDERSON'S PARTY AT ROMANOFF'S to preview an Edmund Gwenn TV teleshow in "The Millionaire" series was highlighted by a door prize: a sack of cash (approximately \$90, supposed to be one day's interest on \$1,000,000 at 3¹/₂ per cent). Chatted with Mr. Gwenn, who though enjoying his participation in the TV film, was of the opinion that television was

pretty rugged compared with motion pictures. Jim Morgan, formerly "Queen For A Day" producer now busy wrapping up new TV packages for the Fedderson operation, told me he thinks "Do his new Edward Arnold series, You Trust Your Wife," will be an interesting participation show. It will be shot and edited within three weeks. Then Jim starts on a daytime participationer. . . . Jane Wax, who used to warble so sweetly on Chef Milani's radio program, has one of the leads in the new MRA musical, "The Vanish-ing Island." She goes on tour soon, first to the East, then India and other important countries. Be-turbaned Korla Pandit stopped by the TV-Radio Life office last week while on a short visit from his Santa Cruz home (P.O. Box 817). He has a new booklet. "Universal Language of Music," which he is pushing. According to Mrs. Pandit, "People are still chasing him on the streets from San Francisco to Hollywood."

DON'T KNOW WHEN I'VE ENJOYED anything more than "Oh, Meni Oh, Women!" at the Carthay. Franchot Tone and Gig Young are fine, of of course, but for me the most interesting performance is that of Ann Jackson, who should be a big TV attraction.

DAVID SARNOFF, CHAIRMAN OF RCA, had some pretty interesting TV and radio comments sandwiched into his annual report to the stockholders a few days ago. Scanning his remarks, I discovered that television (manufacturing, servicing, telecasting) accounted for fifty-two per cent of the corporation's gross in 1954. To date, RCA has spent more than \$50,000,000 on color TV research and development and at this time there are almost 100 NBC-TV affiliates equipped to handle color programs.

MR. SARNOFF ALSO REVEALED something which the program heads hadn't mentioned much: Next autumn, NBC plans to expand its color schedules and the Maurice Evans dramatic series, featuring plays by Shakespeare and Shaw will receive the full treatment. Also, an afternoon color show for children is being blue-printed for the 5:00-6:00 p.m. period (this sounds like NBC's answer to ABC's "Mickey Mouse Club"). Color will be used on several football games which will employ the mobile unit to be stationed at the field.

GENERAL SARNOFF STATED THAT PRODUCTION is beginning on two newly-designed RCA 2-inch cofor receivers. These will use 26 tubes in a simplified set-up. Prices he quoted were still much too high for the aver-

If Disaster Strikes - Your Radio Dial Will Be Your Best Life Insurance

This story tells how radio will be vital to our community in case of an air raid or other emergency. What went wrong with "Conelrad" during the recent test? What is being done to correct the faults? It's all here-for your benefit, and maybe your life.

Next time, if the yellow or red alert is real, radio might save your life. A yellow alert, as most persons now know, indicates probable attack; a red alert means attack is really imminent.

It was called a false alarm a couple of weeks ago when the yellow alert flared, and radio schedules went haywire, but in accordance with Civil haywire, but in accordance with Civil Defense law, which requires the Air Force to alert the broadcasting indus-try immediately upon receipt of a flash, Norton Air Base did exactly the right thing in alerting the key station of Southern California's Conelrad sys-tem, KFI. Conelrad started to proceed according to schedule, but along the way it faltered in several instances. The subsequent confusion was mi-nutely and pointedly detailed in many nutely and pointedly detailed in many newspapers.

To help give its readers a clearer idea of what Conelrad is, how ex-tremely important radio is to our Civil Defense system, what listeners may expect of Conelrad and what steps the radio stations of Southern California have taken since the scare of recent days, TV-Radio Life enlisted the aid of Frank Crane, managing director of the Southern California Broadcasters' Association.

Crane's Job

Mr. Crane, whose job it is to maintain constant contact with the radio outlets of this area, reported on a meeting held last Tuesday at which managers and chief engineers of some thirty radio stations in Southern Cali-fornia were present. Purpose of the gathering was twofold: first, to determine what errors radio had made when the yellow alert had come through; and second, to uncover the misunderstandings which had led to these errors. Presiding at the session was Tom Baxter of KABC, Conelrad coordinator for the Los Angeles area.

Also present were Conelrad Liaison Officer James A. Holmsy, (the FCC representative at Norton Base) Major Shattuck, and Captain McKeever.

Procedure

Before reporting on the meeting, it might be opportune to tell again how Conelrad is supposed to work. Then we will explain what it did and did NOT do when the false alarm occurred.

If an alert is received at Norton, it Page Thirty

ļ

is required that broadcasters be noti-fied immediately. The importance of radio in such an emergency is so great that the FCC director at the base goes right into the control center with the commanding officers. Conelrad, or our radio defense system, takes its place in alert significance along with alerting of ground anti-aircraft, Civil Defense headquarters and commercial planes (which are required to land at once).

Radio Vital

Radio is vital as the vehicle for information; but even more so, when the alert is first received, radio is in an extremely critical situation in the opposite way. Nothing can be more helpful to an enemy plane in pointing out its target than to be able to ride in on a radio station's beam. Since locations of all of our transmitter towers is common knowledge, it is quickly seen how very desperate the need is to silence our radio transmit-ters as fast as possible. TV transmitters in this area, all huddled on Mount Wilson, would all have to shut down in case of alert and due to their proximity, would probably be worthless in assisting the populace.

Radio transmitters, however, scat-tered as they are over the entire Southland area, present a different story. Suppose Norton received a red alert. Immediately, through an open one-way line, Norton's FCC director in-forms our key Conelrad station, KFI. The message is carefully worded in advance and must be received, word for word, exactly the same as the pre-arranged message. There is also a code, frequently changed, which must come over exactly. If message and code check out accurately, KFI then goes through a procedure: it leaves the air at once and comes on with a carrier or tone signal. Then a previ-ously prepared recording makes the announcement that KFI is leaving the air at the request of Civil Defense and that listeners should tune to 640 or 1240

Meanwhile, all other radio stations, Meanwhile, all other radio stations, which monitor the key Conelrad sta-tion, have left the air. (In case any-thing has happened to KFI, it may be reassuring to you to know that there are four other local stations which are also named as Conelrad keys, but whose names we cannot divulge in the interests of security.) interests of security.)

Now the important part of confus-

ing the enemy begins. One by one, from their various transmitter loca-tions, the stations take turns broad-casting, staying on the air for only seconds so that their signal may not be used as a navigational aid. This be used as a navigational aid. This procedure continues until the white, or all-clear signal is given.

It is unnecessary to enter into the detail of post-attack broadcasting. Needless to say, radio, through its mobility, is essential here to dissemi-nation of public information as to damage, evacuation, warnings and other matters.

This is the way Conelrad is sup-posed to work. Now let's delve into the things which happened during the recent scare.

What Happened

According to Mr. Crane, Norton Base did exactly the right thing in alerting KFI. The Civil Defense law insists upon this procedure. KFI was alerted at 10:45. It took the five men on duty a little time to realize what was hap pening; then they started their pre-scribed procedure and went along un-til the prepared recording was to be broadcast. Something went wrong with the turntable and the men were readying another one when the allclear came at 10:55.

Meanwhile, KABC, KNX, KHJ and KMPC (for a short time) had left the air. There may have been others. Ad-mittedly there was much confusion (but no more in the broadcasting in-dustry than in Civil Defense) and subsequent criticism of radio.

Radio admits that it did not do the kind of job it wishes it had. There was some evidence of lack of train-ing, despite the fact that two Conelrad tests are made weekly—one sched-uled and one surprise. Radio also uled and one surprise. Radio also confesses that in some instances the human element entered into the picture to distract procedure.

Office of Southern California Broad-casters called six different switch-boards during the alert and there were boards during the alert and there were six different reasons handed out for the radio disruption. One switch-board said a B-47 was coming in from the west; another reported an un-identified plane flying over Los An-geles. Apparently no one knew. At one station the operator refused to answer the question unless the in-quirer's name and address were given.

At one station the regular engineer was on vacation and the relief man had not been adequately trained. At another outlet the man in charge was reported to have exhibited a "high emotional state." A junior engineer was on the job at another post.

"The whole incident was probably a good thing," observed Frank Crane. Now we have corrected the errors. In the future, all personnel is to be trained. All stations will use as much automatic equipment as possible, thus eliminating the human element. A (Continued on Next Page)

public campaign is being set up to inform the public of how Conelrad • works and why. There will be closer cooperation between stations on Conelrad and we are tackling the prob-lem of what to do about going on the air after a real attack. According to present rules, any station may start broadcasting as score as the all clear broadcasting as soon as the all-clear sounds. This might not be feasible.

"Southern California Broadcasters are also investigating the possibility of using a device such as Sigalert, created by KMPC's Loyd Sigmon, to eliminate the necessity of repeated phone calls and checking between Conelrad stations."

That's the story to date on radio and its significance in the A-H-bomb era. Every person in Southern California should know what to expect from his radio in case "the real thing" hapradio in case "the real thing" hap-pens. Radio, having had an opportu-nity to check and repair its proced-ures, is now in better position than ever to be, should eventuality arise, your comfort, your guide and perhaps even your savior.

TV Commercial Submitted As Evidence For First Time In Legal History In Case Against Used-Car Dealer

Case Against "Farmer Jack" still unsettled. Channel 13 cancels used-car dealer's contract. Petrtinent quotes from TV-Radio Life story two years ago warns against misleading used-car advertising.

TV Commercials jumped out of the living room into the law court last week for the first time in the history of American legal procedure.

It happened on Tuesday when a member of the Los Angeles Police Department crime lab wheeled a motion picture projector and a tape recorder into the Municipal Courtroom of Judge Byron J. Walters.

The projector and recorder were synof Farmer Jack's Used Car Sales Cor-poration seen on KCOP, Channiel 13, on January 30 and February 6.

The Better Business Bureau charged the used car dealer with false advertising. The BBB maintained that the dealer had offered the TV audience an automobile for \$999. BBB investigators claim that when they went to the lot to buy the automobile the price had been increased to \$1495 and they finally made the purchase for \$1300.

The TV commercial was shown in court to try to prove that the commer-cial was used as "bait" to attract customers.

The equipment for reproducing the TV commercial was developed by Ser-geant D. N. Phillips, Supervisor of the Traffic Photo Section of the Los An-geles Police Department, and his staff.

License Number

The charge of fraudulent advertising was submitted by the BBB against the head of the used car firm, Jack Tankersley, and a salesman, Gene King.

Ernest B. Baldwin and E. Kirkbridge, investigators for the Bureau, testified that they took down the li-cense number of the car offered for sale on KCOP and then tried to make the purchase at the Lynwood lot lo-cated at 10749 Long Beach Blvd.

Mr. Tankersley denies that it was the same car shown on KCOP.

KCOP Cancels

When KCOP learned of the suit, in order to protect itself, it took immediate action. According to a KCOP executive, "When this happened, the station did not renew the sponsor's contract."

As TV-Radio Life goes to press, a verdict on whether or not the car dealer is guilty of "untrue and misleading advertising" has not been reached.

However, this entire case recalls a Radio Life over two years ago warn-ing our readers about incidents with used cars. The story ran on page twenty-two of our April 3, 1953, issue, and was titled: "USED CAR TRICKS EXPOSED!"

At the time, it caused a great deal of excitement. For the benefit of those who do not remember it, here are some excerpts:

"We all know there are some used-car businesses which are legitimate. This article does not apply to them. It applies to those trying to cheat the public.

Sly Salesmen

"Hundreds of 'takers' make their headquarters on acres of used-car lots in Southern California. Employing showmanship technique, using ban-ners, pennants, bright-hued paint and firms try to outdo their competitors and undo their customers. Salesmen slyly await the arrival of victims lured by cleverly contrived, smooth-sound-ing advertising claims"

"Before making any deal, shop around. Then, if you find a car you want, check with the Better Business Bureau and the Los Angeles Police Commission. Ask them how reliable the firm is that you intend doing business with. Find out how many com-plaints, if any, have been entered against the firm . . ."

"Los Angeles is the biggest used-car market in the world, due mainly to its spread-out geographical position and the longer distances traveled. Competition is fierce and the whole bag of tricks is used to get the pub-lic's dollar.

Drive Shyster Out

"Purchase of used cars is a neces-sary part of our daily business life. TV-Radio Life wishes those honest business men in the automotive trade would police their industry and drive the churster out of business. the shyster out of business.

"TV-Radio Life further hopes its readers will take the advice, so as not to fall prey to false advertising, and to remain out of the Barnum 'sucker' list."

The type on that original story may be pretty old, but the ideas behind it are just as strong as ever.

Old Arch isn't 38 to the extent that Jack Benny isn't 39 but there is good reason to believe that Mr. Moore has turned time backward in its flight to the extent of 4 or 5 years.

Former triple champion Henry Armstrong, for ex-ample, told me

that Arch was either Armstrong's age or a year older when the two started in the proboscis pum.neling pastime Hammering Hank admits to 42.

But whether Moore is 38, 43, or even 93-and born on a mountain top in Tennessee in the bargain-there appear to be very few sound arguments to contradict the fact that he is the number one contender for the heavyweight championship of the world.

This gives rise to the question of why the well qualified Mr. Moore isn't given a chance to win that title . and the answer is found in three wellchosen words... International Boxing Club... and, oh, yes... three oth-ers, plus an initial, James D. Norris, President.

The IBC, you see, has a contract with heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano that specifies in not too fine print that the IBC shall tell Rocky whom to fight, when to fight and where to fight.

Naturally, with the heavyweight championship b ing just about the most valuable asset a promoter can have, the aforementioned IBC isn't about to take any chances on losing this priceless chattel . . . and its matches are made accordingly.

Boxing's experts say that the man who whips Marciano will have to be a good boxer who can avoid the Rock's bullish rushes and also a hard hitter who can hurt the champ.

This description hardly fits such Marciano opponents as Jersey Joe Roland LaStarza, Walcott, Ezzard

the Don Charles and upcoming Cockell.

Of course, Moore doesn't exactly fit the description perfectly, either, but he comes close and the few of us who have blasted the balderdash about Archie's aorta have never guaranteed he could beat Marciano.

We just think he's entitled to a chance to try.

And the way the IBC is avoiding him strengthens the conviction that Archie must be fairly well qualified for the assignment.

Even Truman Gibson, the IBC's executive secretary, admitted that Moore's win over Nino Valdes, a lady in waiting in the IBC court who was standing next in line for Marciano before the explosion of the Archonic Bomb in Las Vegas, was "impressive" enough to make it imperative for the Rock to meet him.

However, while Archie's waiting, the IBC has arranged for Moore to pick up the champion's share of the loot in risking his light-heavyweight title against middleweight champion Bobo Olson.

Arch can't very well refuse, since he still numbers himself among the few who can use money.

But since Moore has to take off 211/2 pounds for his fight with Olson, there's a good chance he'll lose not only his title, but also the prestige he has built up so carefully to gain his present stature.

And even if he wins, it's going to take a while for him to Jain back the weight it would be necessary for him to carry into the ring with the Rock,

Meanwhile, the IBC and Marciano will roll on, past Don Cockell and anybody else the fertile mind of an in-spired press agent can build into what appears on paper-and it will appear in plenty of papers, almost verbatim -to be a worthy contender for the crown.

At the same time, Moore will be getting older and wiser.

But there isn't much satisfaction in getting smarter when you know the answer before you started.

And the answer is-the IBC controls big-time boxing for better or for worse, and for richer, 'til death or somebody like Governor George M. Leader of Pennsylvania do them part with an edict like that 90-day suspension of the sport in the Quaker State.

Maybe a fellow named Eisenhower will have to take the same kind of action on a slightly broader scale.

If you're a person like Jimmy Durante you know what friendship means. At any rate, Eddie "Struttin'" Jackson thinks Jimmy is the best friend any man could have.

HAT KIND of a friend are you?

Do you possess all the qualities that seem to go hand in hand with real friendship? Are you loyal, un-selfish, do you make demands, are you happy to see a friend get a break you'd like to have, do you honestly do all you can to be of assistance when your friend is in need? when your friend is in need?

Well, you can call yourself a good friend if you have the characteristics Jimmy Durante has.

Eddie Jackson has been a friend of the NBC-TV star for thirty-nine years and he sums up his feelings for Jim-my in this way—"Jimmy? Oh, I love that man.

"Jimmy never lies to me," Eddie said. "He's completely honest. I think if you're honest with a friend you really love each other. At times it's hard to be honest. You feel like flattering someone instead of saying the

truth when the truth is needed. But Jimmy isn't like that. He advises me about my work on the show and if he thinks I'm doing something wrong he'll tell me in a minute. I do the same with him. But Jimmy never gives me any personal advice unless I ask him for it. That's another good trait of his-his honesty doesn't make him feel he has the right to run anyone else's life.

"Jimmy is completely loyal. I'd rather work for him than for anyone else at five times my present salary. I have a sneaking hunch that one of the big reasons Jimmy goes on work-ing instead of taking life easy is his concern over what would happen to his 'gang' who work with him on the shows. I've heard him say, 'What'd happen to them if I quit?' Of course, I have to admit that Jimmy couldn't stand being idle. He's like a race horse. He has to keep running. I'm the same way. I'm never happy when I'm not working.

"Along with Jimmy's loyalty is his complete lack of any jea'ousy. He loves to hear me get laughs on the show. In fact, he often builds scenes around me and has even done some entire shows centering on me. When

he's playing piano for me, I've seen his face. It really lights up—he's so happy for me. When he introduces me as 'my partner' I feel like seven-teen. Jimmy takes care of me as though he were managing me.

"But that's Jimmy. There's nothing selfish about him. He only thinks of others— seldom of himself. And yet, because he is so sensitive of the feelings of others, he is also easily hurt himself. But no one ever really tries to hurt Jimmy. Everybody likes him too much.

"If you are a good friend, you're like Jimmy in that you're generous with your time and with your money. No matter how many problems Jimmy has he always has time to help you with yours. He has said to me over and over, 'Don't keep your troubles to yourself. Make your troubles my troubles.' He gets mad if I don't tell him when anything is bothering me is bothering me.

"As for the money side, he's too generous. He's always a good bet for a soft touch. He doesn't mind handing out money but he doesn't like to be taken advantage of-or to be used. Once we were doing a benefit in Milwaukee and a couple of

guys came up to Jimmy. He thought guys came up to Jimmy. He thought they were the stage hands and he tipped them about twenty dollars each. They thanked him and left. Later a couple of fellows said to Jimmy, 'Hope your show is good, Jimmy. If we can do anything, let us know.' They were the real stage hands as Jimmy found out He was hands, as Jimmy found out. He was really mad about the other guys. Not because he had given them the money but because they had taken it under false pretenses.

"Jimmy knows when a friend needs money. And he doesn't wait for that friend to ask him for help. He just gives it to him, without any fanfare at all.

"Everyone knows what a soft touch Jimmy is. People from all over the country even write him and ask him for money for mortgage payments, teeth, and what-not. Naturally, he can't fill these requests."

Eddie pulled out a cigarette and rolled it around with his finger. Then he put it, unlit, into his mouth for a few moments. He doesn't smoke but has to have a cigarette in his hands. After a moment he said intensely, "Everybody should have Jimmy Durante for a friend.

LORIAN ZaBACH, KCOP's personable and talented violinist, wasn't exactly an inexperienced and unknown musician before he went on TV. In fact, he had a good deal of fame stacked up on his side. But since his show went on KCOP and has been syndicated to over ninety stations across the country, his whole life has changed.

Florian is getting the same fan treatment, a bit on the hysterical side, that Liberace has been getting. Fan clubs have been formed for him, women storm him when he goes on concerts and now he is planning a series of concerts across the country.

All this acclaim and success have not come just because Florian hap-

pens to be a good looking guy who can make a fiddle talk. It's because he also worked hard at his job.

The Breaks

"It's kind of hard to believe all this has happened." Florian commented recently. "When my name was first suggested as a possible artist for a TV show, the producers said, 'Za-Bach? What's that — a new kind of cheese?' When they were told I was a violinist they thought my agent was crazy. 'A violinist! We got 'em — in the orchestra!' "All this was an old story to me.

Even before I went on Arthur God-frey's 'Talent Scouts' show in 1951, which was the beginning for me, I've had a battle convincing people that a man can play the fiddle—alone— and still be a hit. At first everyone wanted me to lead an orchestra, which I did for several years. Then I decided to go out on my own. It was tough. Real tough. My wife and I hocked everything we owned to make ends meet, but I wouldn't back down on my determination to be a single. I can still remember the time I was offered a two-week deal at the Strand Theatre in New York at a good price. And I needed the money. But the manager wanted me to lead the orchestra. I refused. He finally called me back and let me emcee and do some solo work. I learned later why he did call me back-his wife had seen me on TV and wanted him to hire me. Well. I was signed for two weeks and stayed for thirty-three, which is still a record for the Strand."

Florian has recently had a couple of albums released by Decca too and everything is looking up for him. All of which means he has to work harder.

"It takes me about five days to put

together a show," Florian remarked. "When I decide to do certain numbers I can't do them just because they're pretty—they have to be the kind which will be effective on the violin. For example, a viewer wanted me to play 'Listen to the Mocking Bird.' It took me five hours to find a way to do that number right," Florian laughed heartily, and added. "but the funniest request I ever got was from a wrestler who wanted 'The Swan.' He got it.

Music Alone?

"A musician has to do more than just play an instrument if he's a solo attraction on TV. He has to resort to gimmicks to an extent. For instance, on one show I played all parts of a string quartet. It was a real hard one to film. In order to hear what I was playing on the screen on one instrument so I could come in on another instrument on time I wore a hearing aid. However, I couldn't turn my profile because the wire from the aid wou'd show, so the camera had to stop to allow me to turn my head, and then the aid would be transferred to the other ear while I was photographed from a profile shot.

"Another time I did 'Ida, Sweet As Apple Cider'—and played eleven fiddles. That one took two months to do. It's one reason why I don't like apple cider."

There was a time when Florian thought if he could make fifty dollars a week he'd be very happy. He now has a violin insured for \$75,000 and Guild Fi'ms, for whom he is making the films of his show, insured his life for \$1,000,000. He also has his hands insured for \$100 000. No wonder Florian has such a broad smile these days.









Whether it's food or TV fanfare: "57" Means Variety

R D I N ARILY, "Studio 57" would sound like a pretty silly name for a TV show, especially if it didn't come from Studio 57. In this particular case, the program does not come from Studio 57, but there are many good reasons, fiftyseven of them, in fact, why the title was selected for the half-hour syndicated series.

Besides the fact that it lies between the relatively insignificant numbers of 56 and 58, the number 57 (along with Fred Allen) would probably have followed the "treadmill to oblivion" if it hadn't been for the men and women of the Heinz company. They produced not one, and not fiftyeight, but fifty-seven different varieties of food.

Besides pleasing the public's appetite, over a period of years the company filled its own pocketbook. Consequently, like so many other advertisers, they soon turned to TV and Revue Productions, Inc., which specializes in half-hour film anthologies.

Surprise, Surprise

The Heinz company decided to Page Forty-six call the series (surprise. surprise!) "Studio 57." It would have been full poetic justice but poor business and impossible arithmetic to show fiftyseven first-runs. In TV, contracts are usually set up on a thirteen-week basis, or multiples thereof.

At the time we talked with Vice-President Mr. George Stern, of Revue, thirty-three of the contracted thirty-nine shows were completed.

Mr. Stern, a candid and outspoken gentleman who, unlike many executives does not hedge on certain "verboten" subjects, brought out some very interesting facts about half-hour shows such as "Studio 57":

The initial cost of producing one program averages around \$15,000 to \$17,000. It is impossible to make a profit on first-runs. If you can recover thirty or forty per cent of the total cost you are fortunate, and you usually cannot get even until the third run. In brief: the profit on TV films can only be gauged by the number of re-runs.

Saved Movie Industry

Whereas it has been commonly claimed that TV has killed the mo-

tion picture industry. actually the reverse is true; it has saved the motion picture business. "I wou'd judge," Mr. Stern commented, "that about fifty per cent of the people who were formerly employed by the movie studios are now working at the same jobs—only they are doing it for filmed television shows.

"For an anthology series, without any doubt, the toughest program to do is a good comedy. It takes too much time to establish the new and different characters and situations in each play.

"There is a definite need for good scripts. Once you have that, and add to it a good cast and direction, then you can make an excellent show. But you need the script first."

Mr. Stern should certainly know what he's talking about. To date, Revue has produced over 600 halfhour programs, about half of which have been anthologies.

Finally, concerning "Studio 57," with a new script and a new cast each week, "57"—in food or TV fanfare—still spells "variety" for the hungry public.

OONER OR LATER it had to happen: "Sherlock Holmes" has come to TV!

Ordinarily, except for the die-hard Holmes' fans, this news would cause nothing but a few hohums, goody-goodies, and so-whats.

But leave it to TV—and especially KTTV—to come up with a few new angles.

First, there's the show itself. It was filmed in London and Paris to provide authentic atmosphere. Producer She'don Reynolds reasoned that since the background and characterizations were to be European, why shouldn't he go to Europe to film the series? During the past three years, for "Holmes" and other TV programs, he has crossed the Atlantic fifty times.

All of the setting, costumes and props of the Victorian period used at 221b Baker Street in London have been duplicated as accurately as possible.

Comedy Yet

Probably the most astounding aspect of Reynold's "new" approach to the greatest fictional detective who ever lived is his concept of "Holmes" and his sidekick, "Dr. Watson."

"Sir Conan Doyle, the original author, didn't make Watson a buffoon," Reynolds explains. "Dr. Watson was an intelligent man, and Holmes a brilliant eccentric. They worked as a team. One never would have functioned without the other.

"I portray them that way, and believe it or not, I emphasize the comedy."

After watching a number of these Channel 11 films, the viewer will be amazed at just how much comedy —and very good comedy—Reynolds has included.

The next innovation revolves around the two central characters: Donald Howard as "Sherlock Holmes" and H. Marion Crawford as "Dr. Watson." While retaining much of "Dr. Watson's" humor, Mr. Crawford has a much more honest approach in portraying the role of the indispensable sidekick. He makes mistakes, but he seldom makes a fool of himself.

For many reasons, the toughest job of all was left to Ronald Howard. Ronald is the son of the late and great Leslie Howard. Because he bears such a striking resemblance to his father, Ronald has had a tough time convincing people that he is a fine actor in his own right. "Sherlock" has proven his talent once and for all.

Each Night, New Show

With a subtle sense of humor and a twinkling smile, his performance of "Holmes" has been described as a "clean departure from the saturnine, beady-eyed tradition of William Gillette, John Barrymore, Clive Brooke and Basil Rathbone."

In addition to these things, when KTTV bought the first-run films, they
