Nursery school comes to television and it's finger paints and fun on Romper Room.

ELEVISION is creating a lot of apple polishers and Helen Beale on Romper Room deserves a big, red. shiny apple.

shiny apple. The KABC-TV nursery school program has caught the fancy of children and adults alike. It is a carefully planned and researched syndicated series that has been playing in key cities throughout the country. Before launching Romper Room, the packager conducted a comprehensive survey of nursery schools, their methods and achievements. and he also conferred with some of our top educators. The results of his careful study have paid off handsomely.

Each morning at 11:30 thousands of eager children sit before their television sets with eyes glued to the program designed just for them. As the nursery schoolroom comes to life, the image of freshly scrubbed faces is reflected on the picture tube. Presiding over the brood is the refreshingly wholesome and delightful Miss Helen.

The half-hour session gets under way in an atmosphere of clay, paints, blocks, crayons, dolls, trucks, tables, books and rhythm instruments. The children, both on camera and at home, join Miss Helen in singing songs, playing games and making simple things with their hands. There are story readings, teach-it subjects and make-it projects. The do's and don'ts of growing up are illustrated simply by two bumble bees, Mr. Do Bee and Mr. Don't Bee.

The program is so highly regarded that 100 registered nursery schools throughout the city request advance November 25, 1955 mailings of Romper Room's schedule so that they can parallel their activities with those on the television series.

Teacher

But it takes more than a scientifically planned schedule to put a program of this kind across. It fakes a warm, sincere personality who has a way with children. Miss Helen fits the prescription perfectly. She is not an actress, not a pitchwoman and not a glamour girl; she is, however, an attractive, married, fully credited and experienced teacher who specializes in children... young children.

The hazel-eyed Miss Helen literally fell into her television job by replying to an advertisement for a "Kindergarten Teacher for a Television Show to Start in Los Angeles." Helen found herself hired immediately because of her teaching background and personable manner. She went through an intensive training, learning the format that has made Romper Room a successful show in 20 other major cities. After mastering the myriad games, songs. stories and techniques used on the program Helen faced her first TV audience.

Her initiation was well received. In no time at all children were clamoring to attend her classes on Romper Room. The Romper Room children are personally selected by Miss Helen. She rotates her young "students" so that new faces and personalities are constantly before the cameras alongside children who are experienced Romper Room veterans of two or more weeks. The children respond to Miss Helen's instructions like little angels. Occasionally, though, an eager little beaver gets involved in a long monologue and Miss Helen with a mindful eve on the clock politely interrupts the youngster by telling him they can discuss the subject a little later

But it's the uninhibited actions and naturalness of the children that help to make the show. Usually children have vivid imaginations and participate in make-believe willingly. One day, however, a little girl refused to pretend that she was washing clothes on a scrubbing board. She steadfastly insisted that her mother had an automatic washer. Nothing Miss Helen said could make her change her mind.

Actually these little incidents present no problem to Miss Helen. Her only problem, she frankly admits, is selecting six youngsters for the show when she'd like to have 60 on camera.

"Modern e d u c a t o r s." says Miss Helen, "believe in exposing the children to the academic world early in life by introducing them to the nursery school where the staid. conservative ways of teaching have given way to a fun-while-learning method. Romper Room, like off-camera nursery schools, is especially good for teaching young children how to get along with others, the sharing of toys and the little courtesies of daily living."

It's quite obvious that the children like this sugar-coated learning. It's a sweet way to start getting an education.

ATTENDING ROMPER ROOM has become a sign of recognition among the pre-schoolers. The children thoroughly enjoy their TV nursery school and respond to Miss Helen's instructions like little angels.

. Gildersleeve Gilded Him

Willard Waterman has found that the role of Gildersleeve has rubbed off on him in many ways, but he's not sure that this is all to the good.

IS NAME is Willard Waterman, but most people knew him as the blustering, blundering Great Gildersleeve. For years he was a radio byword and now with his KRCA-TV show, he is walking right into the living room.

Willard is a quiet kind of guy, a fittle reserved, entirely unpretentious and unimpressed with himself. The more you talk to him the more you're convinced this guy has to be an actor to be convincing as Gildersleeve.

And yet, the character has had its impression on him. At home, for instance, his family often gets the idea he is Gildersleeve.

"I can't quite figure it out," Willard said softly, "but at times my wife. Mary Anna, and my daughters. 11 and 17 respectively, think I really am like Gildersleeve. Lynne, my oldest daughter, especially thinks this is so, but I try to comfort myself with the thought that all teen-agers regard their parents as a bit on the stuffy side. Now, I don't think I'm stuffy at all. I think I'm pretty openminded which, of course, makes me a typical father.

"Mary Anna sees a connection between Gildersleeve and me only on occasion. Most of the time she finds me not too difficult to live with. At least, she hasn't for 18 years. I think I'm a pretty good husbanc, but, naturally, this is only my own opinion and as such open to argument."

Quiet Person

At home Willard is anything but the blundering clown. He lives quiet-

ly, spending most of his time reading or playing golf. In fact, he and Mary Anna are pretty good at the game.

In this connection, Willard presented a trophy called the Willard Waterman trophy at a recent NBC golf tournament. The funny part of it was that he shot the best game and won the trophy himself.

"Naturally, I gave it to the next best score," Willard laughed.

Willard is unlike Gildersleeve in that he is not brash or pushy as an individual. He simply is not an extrovert. He's relaxed, he has no ulcers, he gets himself into few messes

"at least not ones I can't get out of," he adds with a laugh. And yet when his family see him on TV, they can't even believe he's the same man who lives at home with them

"Mary Anna saw the first two TV shows," Willard commented, "and she thought I mugged too much. Maybe it was just because she was used to seeing me so sedate at home.

"I've always thought, of course, that she should do some acting. I used to try to get her to do walk-ons when I was doing stock in Chicago, but I couldn't convince her. However, she recently directed and produced the Lakeside Women's Invitational Show—and she did a good job, Maybe the business is rubbing off on her after all." Willard is, on the whole, pretty happy about doing Gildersleeve, but he is somewhat worried about being typed too much.

Typed

"I'd like to have a chance to do something different, especially in pictures," he stated, "I've been up for a couple of parts but could never get entirely past the casting office before someone would say, "Oh, no, he's a comedian." And here I am—wanting to play a good tough heavy,

"It's not so surprising that I want to be a villain. I used to play nothing but heels on radio. And then I got involved in a comedy series called Those Websters and from that I did comedy roles with Joan Davis and Cass Daley—and all of a sudden I was Gildersleeve and a comedian.

"I was glad to see the show go on TV because it gave me a shot in the arm. It was a challenge just when I needed something to stir me up a little. I think any actor needs some kind of charge, of variety unless he wants to stagnate. Believe me, I'm not at all interested in stagnating."

Willard Waterman has, therefore, made one mistake in his life—he was so good as Gildersleeve that you have to think twice to remember his real name. Willard Waterman is missing and Gildersleeve would like to fund him again.

Dummies Are Smart

The famed quartet was shrewd enough to convince the ventriloquist to return to radio for his 20th year of broadcasting on KNX-CBS-Radio. And Charlie reluctantly admits that Bergen showed some intelligence by following their logical advice.

Acting as the spokesman for the quartet. Edgar cites some of the reasons these smartles preferred radio to television. "Take the case of our dear Effic Klinker." Bergen explains. "She knows she used to have a shape like a violin, but a string busted and she's not the same old gal she used to be. Effic has tried all the beauty treatments but her age shows up on television, Sometimes when Effic bats her blue eyes on camera, viewers see the bags under them instead of her orbs. After a radio broadcast fans always write to tell her how seductive her voice sounds. Guess Effic feels safer on radio and you can't blame the girl.

"Now take our Swedish fisherman. Lars Lindquist, one of the newer additions to the family—he's much happier in radio. Lars likes to talk about his Viking ancestors and their harrowing experiences seal-hunting up at the North Pole. Lars rightly philosophizes there's no visual limit to the size of fish he catches on radio and he sure likes to spin his tall yarns.

"Charlie is another great advocate

for radio. It's terribly frustrating for him not to be able to kid my chin strap and receding hairline on television. TV kills some of his best gags and this makes him most unhappy. Then, too, he claims that I, his close associate for lo these many years, become difficult to work with when we're on camera. Frankly, I think it's just his deflated ego that bothers him. He's not as photogenic as he'd like to be, you know.

"Mortimer claims he preters radio because his buck teeth aren't so noticeable. But aside from this selfconscious observation, Mortimer is pretty much at home in either medium. I hope you won't think I'm bragging when I tell you that both Charlie and Mortimer have received honorary degrees for their special talents and keen intelligence.

Degrees

"Actually, Mortimer has never been the same since talking to Dr. Paxter who conferred an honorary degree on him for being a well adjusted person one without a single neutosis or trustration. Sometimes Mortimer gets a little out of hand but you can hardly blame him since no one else holds this unique degree. Not to be outdone by his country cousin. I DIDN'T KNOW THAT A LEMON was more fragile than an orange and that they used to blow the temperature forecasts on the fire sirens—didn't, that is, until I chatted some time ago with Floyd D. Young. At that time the frost warning broadcaster explained that a ripe orange might take a 27-degree temperature all night and not suffer damage, but that a lemon could be ruined at 30 degrees for as little as half an bour

THESE AND OTHER BITS OF IN-FORMATION flashed back to me the other day when I learned that Mr. Young was planning to retire next March 1.

HE HAS CERTAINLY EARNED every minute of his projected roundthe-world jaunt. Back in the smudgy plast, before Young started broadcasting his frost warnings, the growers had no reliable source of weather data to guide them in their nightly orchard vigils. When a big freeze was expected, the fire sirens in vari-



ous communities used to toot out a certain number of sounds to indicate the temperature-to-come. Then, a friendly phone relay was built, but the chilly spell of 1922 put such a drain on this system that it bogged down.

SHORTLY AFTER. YOUNG START-ED to broadcast his frost warnings on KHJ, later moved to KNX (1930-37) and settled finally on KFI, where his 8:00 o'clock intonations of the cold outlook have taken precedence over all kinds of fancy commercial programs.

WITH YOUNG AT THE HELM. the Fruit Frost Service has saved millions of dollars in crops. That the service will go on is certain, but much of the credit for past, present and future must go to the man who has tied himself down to that wintery 8:00 p.m. spot for so many years. His daily calculations have required coordination of data from more than a dozen sources and making of a weather map of this continent west of the Mississippi and over to Hawaii every afternoon. And because of the delicacy of the oranges, lemons and all the other products grown in this wonderfully fertile area of ours, the calculations have had to be nail-onthe-head. Young once told me that he allowed himself only two degrees leeway in his forecasts, these two degrees being his cushion should an unforeseen wind or cloud crop up.

ONE OF THE FUNNIEST LUCY SHOWS happened the other night when they did a Person to Person take-off. Lucy herself was a riot with her mouth clenched speechless by chewy candy, but topping her, for a rare bit, was a chap named Elliott Reid who impersonated Edward R. Murrow.

SEEMS THAT JESS OPPENHEIMER approached Murrow and asked him to play himself on the show, but the clipped-speaking, clgaret-posing Murrow found he was too busy. Then Jess remembered Reid doing a takeoff on the Kefauver Committee on a New York show and when he called the actor, he found that Reid, by delightful coincidence, had made several tapes of Murrow with the idea of studying them and incorporating them into a night club act. Reaction to Reid's impersonation on the Lucy show was so favorable that Oppenheimer now thinks he'll send Edward R. a print of the show (he was probably too busy to catch it).

HAD YOU NOTICED THAT WE ARE in for a cycle of mental illness TV shows? These must be done with exactly the right touch or they be-

come maudlin or depressingly terrify-

ON MY RECENT TRIP TO NEW YORK I spent one of my pleasantest evenings at the Bijou Theater where Joyce Grenfell was captivating audiences with her one-woman repertoire. When she appeared on Ed Sullivan's show the other night she didn't come across nearly as well as she did in person. Of all her theater numbers the Nursery School wasn't her best, I hope she comes back soon to do The Understanding Mother and Running Commentary. . . . Also must mention J. Carroll Naish, our ex-Luigi, who is "A View From the Bridge" and "A Memory of Two Mondays." In the latter he's in the role of a rough, dirty little old guy who reminds one of a baboon but occasionally reveals spots of a tender man.

GODFREY'S EIGHT-PART STORY in The Post is attracting much attention. . . Betty White has a new NBC pilot and tells me she's "at the fingers-crossed stage." John Wayne is coming up on the December 7 Screen Directors' Playhouse series. And speaking of SDP, Buster Keaton, who has a part in the December 14 Playhouse show, says that Stage 3 at the Hal Roach lot where they've been shooting the TV film is the very same one where he did his first movie in 1919 just after he got out of the Army.

remarked, "You know, I have been told I fuss too much, but I'm glad that I can look at any eventuality. You can sort of plan then on what you're going to do if the picture changes. In the meantime, I just want to go on doing the best I can. I don't want to let anyone down, especially those who have done so much for me. I owe them a big debt. And I like to pay my debts."

I could remember talking to George before he ever started his TV show. He was being practical then. He was no idealist. It's a healthy thing that he isn't closing his eyes now and gazing into fleecy clouds. However, talent is hard to be minimized. And with all the talent he has, he should let himself have a few fancy illusions and rosy ideals.

David Niven is a British RAF pilot who falls in love with American WAC Kim Hunter, and while under ether after a flight injury is forced to undergo an inquisition by various racial and political despots of the past (they're all in limbo, you see and the decision is whether David shall be allowed to marry Kim or shall be forced to go to heaven) who might have some objection to a Britisher marrying an American or vice versa. There is lots of spectacle with masses of dead actors and lots of stairways in the mist but I think much too much ado was made about not very much so without further ado, I shall pass on.

Here is a 1947 Launder-Gilliat production that stars Deborah Kerr in the role of a little Irish girl who has been brought up on such a diet of British hatred that she falls easy prey to Nazi blandishments during the war and becomes their dupe in a campaign to capture the Isle of Man. Mike-Conscious Community

Palm Springs may have a reputation for being a wealthy, sophisticated resort town. But radio station KCMJ gives the people in the community that good "home town" feeling.

If you want to hear the voice of the people, ultra modern style, just jump into your car and breeze out to Palm Springs, where lively little radio station KCMJ specializes in broadcasting the community's views in its own varied voices.

Programs feature first-hand interviews with just about every kind of person in the community.

A six-year-old boy will explain why he likes second grade better than kindergarten. A 91-year-old resident, celebrating his 60th wedding anniversary, will reminisce about fighting days with the U. S. Cavalry on the bloody Cherokee strip.

A housewife will announce details of a forthcoming P.T.A. barbecue. A retail merchant will outline his plans for business expansion.

And the golfer who made a hole-inone or the local course that morning will tell how he did it—and how it felt.

All this, and a great deal more, is entered on the station's Federal Communications Commission log schedules as "public service time"—but in the town itself it adds up to a high level of listener interest and a very human inclination to get in on the act.

Most everybody in town does just that. Each week an average 75 townsfolk, old and young, get to speak their plece on topics of their choice, serious or trivial, over the microphones of their home town station.

Statistically speaking, that's around 340 a month and some 4000 a yearalmost half the town's entire population.

A common compliment when businessmen gather at the drug counters for morning coffee is "I heard you on the air last night"—and a nine-yearold girl, isked when she got a radio sentence tangled, regained confidence a little later to assure her invisible audience, "I'll be better next time I broadcast."

"Radio Oasis"

Little KCMJ operates on only 250 watts of power, the lowest possible unit in commercial broadcasting, and can be heard for little more than 10 miles in any direction. Yet it is literally a "radio oasis" since the 10.800foot height of majestic Mt. San Jacinto immediately west cuts off Los Angeles' 50.000-watt stations just as effectively as it protects Palm Springs from the rains, winds and fog which at times afflict the nearby Pacific coast.

Mt. San Jacinto, too, is the natural barrier which makes television reception impossible around Palm Springs, except by an elaborate booster system combined with telephone lines which "pipe" the video images into homes for a monthly service fee—another justification for KCMJ's proud claim on promotion material that "We have it all to ourselves."

No matter how high-powered your expensive set, if you want to listen to radio at Palm Springs, you listen to KCMJ—which probably explains why this little station founded eight years ago was until recently the only 250-watter of the approximately 200 stations throughout the nation affiliated with the CBS Radio Network.

Celebrities

Five mornings a week, a 15-minute "Palm Springs Today" show features a brief roundup of the local overnight news and a 10-minute interview with some interesting local personality or notable visitor.

In the afternoons, a similar "Our Town" welcomes a local businessman as guest, giving him the chance to talk about himself, his business, his views of civic affairs, or play and comment on his favorite records.

At a later time afternoons, it's time for "In the Sportlite" where a similar pattern operates with a local sports celebrity as guest.

This latter is a show on which such national celebrities as Nancy and Ralph Kiner, Gussie Moran, Pancho Segura, Gene Littler, and Ben Hogan have been heard, but generally speaking there's an informal ruling against celebrated part-time residents who might throw the local talent too far in the shade.

in the shade. Lily Pons, Ginger Rogers, Alice Faye, Phil Harris, Desi Arnaz, Walt Disney, Bing Crosby, Jack Benny, Bob Hope and Eddie Cantor—all enthusiastic Palm Springs winter residents and willing KCMJ mike guests—are invited mostly for special programs boosting the Community Chest or Red Cross campaigns or Palm Springs' own annual charity drive, the glamorous Desert Circus.

Election Time

Each Sunday the pastor of one of Palm Springs' 20 religious congregations conducts a 15-minute radio service, and each Easter Sunday a KCMJ staff announcer lugs microphone and line up Mt. San Jacinto's rugged foothill slopes to broadcast the open air sunrise service.

And at election time, the voices of precinct officials telephoning complete unofficial returns are phone-taped and broadcast in a matter of minutes.

Las Vegas, Yuma and Tucson may question whether Palm Springs is really "America's foremost desert resort." But nobody can doubt that it's America's most mike-conscious community,

Examples on this demonstration twelve-incher spotlight the nation's top jazz men of the '40s and '50s in sterling samples of New Orleans, Chicago, Kansas City, Ellingtonia, Swing, Bop and Progressive styles—and for less than a buck, you can't miss.

According to Ging Lollobrigida, "Minucci's music muses, dances, makes love!"—and that's a pretty fair description of Coral's "Music By Minucci." Here is some of the best mood or quiet music, composed by and featuring the piano artistry of Ulpio Minucci against the lush full orchestral background. It's original, it's beautiful, it's Minucci!

A thank you to MGM for reissues of Jimmy Durante singing his own original material as only The Schnoz can do, for Durante is still Mr. Show Business to this reviewer and millions of fans from ocean to ocean. Here are a round dozen examples of great special material that no one can do like "Durante In Person."

I've always thought there could be only one Fats Waller—but that was before I listened to **Benny Payne's** "Sunny Side Up" (Kapp). It isn't an imitation of **The Big Boy**, but Benny's piano style and vocal, coupled with a small combo, will certainly remind you of Waller... and, come to think of it, we could use another entertainer whose happy songs and effervescent plano stylings might just spread happiness the way Fats used to do.

Death of Radio Greatly Exaggerated

Robert Bailey, KNX-CBS Radio's freelance insurance investigator, "Johnny Dollar." says that the reports of the death of radio are greatly exaggerated.

"This corpse," says John, "will outlive its pallbearers.

"Radio's handicap, some think, is the fact that it can be heard but not seen. But it can be seen — with the mind's eye. And the mind's eye devises its own scenery and costumes. Radio's scope is limited only by the creator's ingenuity and the listener's imagination — not by the sponsor's available cash. Infinite riches in a little budget, you might say.

"To belittle radio because it is not 'visual' in the literal sense is like razing the Venus de Milo because it had no sound track, like panning 'War and Peace' because it is a novel and not a square dance.

"I own to some prejudice because, of course, radio is a performer's dream. Compared to it, acting in all other media is peonage.

"Just think — no rising in the cold, grey dawn, no make-up to stain your collar, no hot lights to melt the makeup, no preview audience to write on hundreds of cards: 'He stinks. Why don't you drop dead. Oh, boy, what a lousy picture.'

"No, none of that in radio — you arrive at the studio, wearing a sweat shirt and a dirndl, you open your mouth and point it at the nearest microphone and a few hours later you wash up, get your money and get out of there. No blood, sweat, toil, nor tears. Of course, I do shake quite a bit during the show, but I find this is good for my circulation. Helps to get my heart started.

"And then, of course, type casting is not so rigid as in other forms of entertainment. You may have a face like a catcher's mit, but on radio — when the heroine says, 'Oh, here comes Oscar now. Doesn't he look like a Greek god?' even the Greeks won't object. If she said this on the screen or on the stage, with your kisser plainly exposed, you'd spend the next six weeks taking the tar and feathers off. "Ah, yes, when you speak of radio, speak low, for you're speaking of the medium I love. And to those actors who, for sundry reasons, have shied away from the mike medium—to them I say, 'Come in, the ether's fine.'"

Russians Look-See

Ruth Ashton, KNX - CP, RN newscaster, covered the recent Russian delegation when they toured a housing development in Southern Californid. Reporter Ashton gives us her candid opinions on this assignment.

The occasion for my brief observations was during the tour of the delegation around the Foothill - Park development in Azusa-Covina. The homes are typical California bungalows—a type which never would be found in Russia. But the delegation did seem impressed with the methods of prefabricating the plumbing and electrical installations; and they displayed great interest in some of the tools —particularly a Remington product called a "Ramset" which fastens boards to concrete by means of powder charges.

Of course, one of the difficulties with an assignment like this one was how to tell a Russian from a reporter, photographer or public relations expert. The visitors were outnumbered by approximately five to one. But when I did sort them out, primarily by looking at their shoes, which had square toes, I managed to direct a few questions for the edification of our KNX-CBS listeners.

Through an interpreter, I was told for one thing that there are a great many women in Russia connected with the housing field—as architects and consultants. And also, after lengthy three-way consultation back and forth, I gathered the impression that ... wives are not too different whether in this country or Russia when it comes to choosing the family home.

But there is a difference in the conveniences available to women in the two countries. The Russians didn't actually say that they have fewer or less advanced appliances. In fact, the Russians said as little as possible. But one of them, in an unguarded moment was heard to ask while viewing a modern kitchen in this country: "What do American women do in the kitchen . . . sleep?"

In general, the members of the Russian housing delegation seemed to be friendly, quiet and careful... and observant in more than one way. When asked if anything in this country had surprised him, Mr. P. A. Spushnof who has the impressive title... Chief of the Division of Sahitary Technical Construction of the State Committee of Construction of the Council of Ministers of the U.S.S.R., answered: "The most interesting and most unexpected thing for me was the beautiful figure of the American woman."

Following are just a few sample letters which we have picked out to show you what your fellow TV viewers are "griping" about. (The winners of our contest—receiving a year's subscription to TV-Radio Life—were published in a previous issue.)

I think someone "dropped the ball" when "hey commenced to crowd certain classics, full-length three-act plays and other legitimate revivals into one-hour time slots. Even with short commercials, a lot of the dialogue pertinent to the entire enjoyment of the play has to be necessarily cut to conform to program standards.

If a play is presented—such as a three-act vehicle—why not delay those commercials at least until the end of the number?

Too, if a play is well-known, popular or happens to be one that has formerly run on Broadway. I'm sure the audience response would be tremendously greater if the cast were composed of top-flight actors and actresses.
