HAVE a reputation for being a wise guy—at times. As some people have expressed it. I'm the possessor of a "sarcastic sense of humor." For this reason, among others, I was assigned to do a story on "Mister Sarcastic Sense of Humor Himself"—Oscar Levant.

"Sorry," one of his press agents (who had the dubious honor of handling Oscar while he performed on Words About Music) informed me. "I'll try, but I don't think he's seeing anyone for an interview."

The press agent tried for two weeks —without any luck. So I decided to do what all eager reporters should do— see the man myself.

That happened on a Saturday night when I stopped by the TV studios at about 10:30 p.m. Show time was 11 p.m.

"Has Oscar Levant come in yet?" I asked the guard at the gate.

"Don't believe I know what he looks like." the puzzled guard replied.

"Hmmm." I thought to myself. "won't this be something to throw back at Oscar in case he should be in one of his not-so-rare insulting moods."

He Asked First

On the set itself, I met the press agent and stood there chatting with him.

Suddenly, after trying out a tune or two on the piano, Levant started walking in our direction.

"Who are you?" he asked directly, when he was about ten feet away.

I turned to the press agent and remarked, "Remember, pal, he asked me first."

"I happen to be a reporter. And if you have the time. I'd like to talk to you a few minutes." I said.

"How about after the show?" he asked, nervously. (Every gesture, ev-

ery move, every glance, every word he utters, everything that Levant does, is done nervously.)

. "After the show will be perfect," I replied.

Oscar then went about his business. At one point, as I stood smoking a cigarette in the corridor, I heard him yelling he was quitting the show (he quits every week) because he didn't want to be interviewed.

A Genius

I finished my cigarette and then sat in the audience and watched the hour long program. Not once did I take my eyes off Mr. Levant. To me, it was an absorbing study. It was like watching a human brain in a test tube. A truly great brain — and don't let anyone ever forget it.

I don't know if Mr. Levant is a genius. (I've only known one in my lifetime — a man named Dr. Leslie Fiedler, if you'd care to know.) But whether Mr. Levant is a genius or not. the most important thing is that you THINK he is a genius when you watch him. Perhaps his overt actions are caused by a deep inferiority complex—or maybe he is a genius. That is not for me to know, or decide.

I do know that after watching and listening to him for over an hour, I could not interview him. Why? I shall tell you why: because I was afraid to, and yes, ashamed too.

I was going to try to bring Mr. Oscar Levant down to my level. What an injustice! What a crime! To a man who is not in full control of himself, who deserves. not sarcasm. but sympathy, encouragement and friendship. I did not consider myself small enough, or big enough, for either task.

Mr. Levant, in public, delights in insulting people. That is not only his stock-in-trade, but his greatest defense mechanism. In private, it would lead not to entertainment (as it does in public) but only to bitterness.

Nevertheless, I couldn't be rude. After the program I lied to him and said, "I don't think an interview will be necessary, Mr. Levant, because I got enough material just watching the program."

"Do you think THEY liked it?" he asked, almost like a child. This from a man who had just finished insulting everything and everyone he could think of:

"I can't speak for others, but I enjoyed it very much," I said.

Not Proud

He smiled and took another cigarette. (During the program — you don't see this on the air — he lit up at least a dozen cigarettes.)

"I hope the people at MGM won't get sore at anything I said," he continued. "You know I just started to work out there."

"Of course not." I replied. "You didn't sav anything wrong and they love the free plugs."

He smiled again, nervously. And puffed again on his cigarette.

He started toward the exit, so I walked with him.

"You know." I said, trying to think of something, "I think I note the Levant touch in that script of yours."

"I just did it this afternoon," he smiled, obviously pleased. "And you know, I think a lot of other shows are catching on to our style. I still don't understand why they don't pick it up for a network show."

"I think they should." I white-lied. We were outside now. The night was clear and fresh; good to smell and beautiful to see. I thanked Mr. Levant again and exchanged "goodnights."

I watched his slouching figure walk to the car. And I was sorry, and not proud of being a "wise guv" and the possessor of a "sarcastic sense of humor."



How TV and Radio Will

The Democrats' and the Republicans' big show will get a wide play on both television and radio. It will be the most revealing analysis of both parties you'll ever see.

M AUGUST you may be missing several of your favorite television programs all of which will possibly cause you to see red.

This month will be devoted to the Democratic and Republican conventions—and TV and radio will be right on the bandwagon bringing you all the long speeches, the haranguing, and the excitement and the thrills.

It will also bring you the popular favorite of the commercial field— Miss Betty Furness—who will continue to extol the virtues of her sponsor's products as she did at the last convention. Betty's femininity and know-how will add at least some appeal and variety to the doings.



All the networks have long-range plans for covering the conventions. The Democrats kick off the deal with their convention in Chicago on August 13 while the Republicans open in San Francisco one week later.

ABC's Coverage

ABC is planning on inaugurating a training school for TV candidates for the convention and the campaign. ABC recognizes the fact that television has completely changed the approach for campaigners. It has made the whistle-stop campaign about as out-dated as the old traveling medicine men. Now-to get across an impact to the viewers-the men who are out seeking high offices not only have to be equipped for the job but they must also have personality in front of the camera, so ABC is going to train them so that the ham doesn't get out of control and that the desired sincerity and ease come forth.

To facilitate some of the complicated job of bringing all the details of the convention to the public. ABC is introducing a miniature receiving set called the "Audipage." It weighs only one ounce and enables the roving commentators to get instructions on the floor from the master control point without the necessity of direct wire contact.

John Daty will handle the major chores for ABC, along with the usual expert news staff from the network.

NBC Plans

NBC also has extensive plans---and will have a three-man anchor team

at both conventions to be sure that every facet of the doings is covered. The men in charge will be Chet Huntley. David Brinkley and Bill Henry. They will disseminate all news about the conventions in NBC-TV's "TV One" center. In the radio field, NBC will use Pauline Fredcricks and Ned Brooks. H. V. Kaltenborn will have a special assignment—that of analyzing the events for a particular audience, the voters of tomorrow, the kids from 12 to 16. Holding the key on the convention platforms will be Morgan Beatty and Ann Gillis. Over 400 people will cover for NBC.

There will be a gavel-to-gavel coverage of all activities, according to present plans. This can sound foreboding in view of the long-winded speeches et al. but Leonard Hall of the Republican Party insists that oratory will be cut to a minimum and he also hopes to shorten the time devoted to the tedious roll call.

NBC's "TV One" will be located in each of the specially constructed "Convention Centrals" at Chicago's International Amphitheater and at the Cow Palace in San Francisco.

In addition to the newsmen set to cover the conventions for NBC, many of the network's top stars intend to add their touch—people like Dave Garroway, Lawrence Spivak, Arlene Francis, Henry J. Taylor,

CBS Will Cover

CBS. of course. has its own detailed program. Sig Mickelson, CBS Vice-President in Charge of News and Public Affairs, is certainly not stinting on this deal.

"It is quite possible that some 120.000.000 persons will see or hear part of either or both conventions on home television receivers and radios —by far the most fantastic audience ever assembled to witness a single event." Mickelson stated.

Working with Mickelson will be Elmer Lower, John Day, Paul Levitan and Robert A. Skedgell. These men are covering for radio while Don Hewitt will direct the television coverage of the conventions.

Altogether, about 25 distinguished CBS newsmen will be on hand—including, in addition to Edward R. Murrow and Eric Sevareid, Griffing Bancroft, T. Wells Church, Blair Clark, Charles Collingwood, Walter Cronkite, Bill Downs, Douglas Edwards, German Herman, Allan Jackson, Larry Lesueur, Bill Shadel, Robert Trout, and others. Richard C. Hottelet returns from his post in Bonn, Germany, around July 1 to join the others. Trout will be the "main man" for CBS-Radio, while Walter Cronkite will provide continuity for TV. In addition to the newsmen, more than 300 additional personnel will lend their services.

Equipment-wise. CBS is undertaking a mammoth job. More than 22 tons of electronic equipment will be transported to the International Amphitheater in Chicago by means of three 35-foot trailer trucks, two 18foot mobile units, a two-ton van and a station wagon.

Among the new electronic equipment will be the "no-hands" telephone, high-speed electronic calculators and the new CBS-designed "walkie-talkie." The last, which weighs about five pounds, will literally make each CBS newsman a miniature, ambulatory, transmitting station and will add much to mobility on the floor. It is also hoped that the revolutionary new Ampex Videotape Recorder will be available for use at the convention.

CBS will be covering both conventions almost simultaneously, for while one team is in Chicago taking care of the Democrats another will be in San Francisco getting highlights on pre-convention activities for the Republicans. Malcolm R. Johnson and Sam Zellman of KNXT will take care of this phase.

As soon as the Democrats finish their activities the full CBS news team. plus all the electronic gear, will fly by specially chartered planes to San Francisco. They will be standing at Chicago's Midway Airport to transport between 10 and 12 tons of equipment. Technicians have been given a six-hour maximum schedule from the final gavel in Chicago to take off from the airport. In less than 24 hours after the Democratic convention ends, the staff will be ready to operate in San Francisco with the same equipment.

Probably the most difficult phase of the operation is the inter-communications set-up. For CBS, an 80position master telephone switchboard and two smaller boards connecting more than 150 telephones at 50 different locations in the Convention Hall and the party headquarters hotel will be used. Approximately 25 miles of communications wire will be needed in each city.

Everything seems planned in the most minute detail. But what happens if the Democratic convention runs into a second week, thus knocking all such plans into a cocked hat? The networks are sending up their fondest hopes that such will not be the case—but if it does happen, they'll probably have a few aces up their sleeves.

ACK BAILEY has had eleven years of working with the ladies on his KHJ radio and NBC TV Queen for a Day show. On the face of it, that would seem like a fairly pleasant chore.

It is. Yet, underneath all the surface appearances, Jack has done quite a remarkable job in keeping Queen from becoming a maudlin and sticky journey into human trials. Sure, women appear who do have tragedy and trouble, but by the time they have left the show and Jack they're not feeling down in the dumps.

Much of this business of alleviating the depressing is due to Jack's nimble way with a quip. If a woman starts to cry, he has a ready solution — but it's one that has had strange consequences.

Gifts

"Sometime back I made quite a mistake," Jack laughed. "A woman started to cry so I gave her my handkerchief and cracked, 'I use more of my handkerchiefs on this show. I'm going to have to register a complaint." The woman smiled, got over her tears, but then came the avalanche.

"Shortly after, handkerchiefs started pouring into me. Altogether, I've had over 1500 sent in. I'm now using tissues—so I hope no one sends me those."

Hankies are only one of the many gifts Jack's loyal and enthusiastic ladies bestow upon him. Food, of course, arrives almost constantly, even though he has asked the women not to send him any goodies, since he is not that heavy an eater.

"I got one particularly magnificent gift," Jack recalled as he was sitting backstage at the Moulin Rouge waiting to start his afternoon show. "It was a huge hand-crocheted tablecloth. The lady said it was for my wife since I was always giving things to other women.

"Another time a man from Mississippi sent me what is perhaps the most unusual gift. He had been collecting old roots of trees that had formed into recognizable shapes. Some looked like a fish, others like a tree, others like a woman's leg. He

had sanded these down, touched them up, and sent them along with a note saying, 'You'll probably never use these, but wanted you to have them anyway. I've been collecting them for 30 years.' I have news for him—they are the topic of conversation in my lanai at home."

Then there was the story of the lady who appeared on his show with obviously stained hands. Jack took a look at them and asked her if, by any chance, she had been doing any nutting. She was from Wisconsin so he figured this might be a reasonable question. She had. And thereupon Jack said, "You know, it's been years since I've had a butter nut."

The following week he got a whole box of them from a fan.

"I certainly have to be careful what I say," Jack went on. "I don't dare mention I like old-fashioned home baked bread. I did that once and I had home-made bread all over the place.

the place. "I've also had Bailey family trees sent to me, although I'm sure that the Baileys lurking around on those limbs have little or nothing to do with me. I have exactly two living cousins so you can see I'm not engulfed by relatives."

Fan Mail

In addition to gifts, Jack gets so much fan mail that it takes three girls to handle it all. Naturally, a great majority of the letters consists of stories and why the ladies want to be on his show. Some contain criticism. For instance, Jack doesn't dare say "Y'all" instead of "You all" or make cracks like "Oh, do they have running water down there?" Any remark about the South is sure to bring in the response, some letters kidding him but others berating him.

He still gets mail from the Volunteer Fire Department in a town in New York. The men wrote him once bawling him out for not giving the prize to a certain lady. Jack. in a kidding way, answered with. "Why aren't you men out working instead of watching the show?" The letters have gone back and forth ever since.

"On one show I happened to mention that the ladies should write in

for tickets, but some assumed that I meant we'd pay their fare here to be on Queen," Jack said. "I got letters from people saying they'd wait for their railroad tickets and that they wanted to spend a couple of weeks here to see some relatives. Another said, 'Could my ticket take me to San Francisco first so I can see my sisters?' We had an awful time straightening that one out.

"Naturally, I get requests from Sunday Schools and churches and other organizations asking me to contribute something I own or wear to be auctioned off at a charity bazaar. I finally had some hand towels made up with a caricature of me wearing a jeweled crown on them. At the bottom I had written, 'Stolen from Jack Bailey.'

"There is one problem I do have that I wish I could correct, but so far I haven't been able to. I keep getting prized pictures from people who have taken them out of their family albums, hoping that this will help them to get on the show. Even though I repeatedly state they shouldn't send such photos and that we cannot be responsible for them. I still get them. They invariably get lost; then the ladies want them back, and around and around we go. No one is picked by sending us a picture, but this doesn't seem to register."

Jack was called out for his warmup. As I walked backstage I saw countless prizes that were to be awarded to whatever lady became Queen. Contrary to some ideas that this show is "fixed." no one knows who will win out. So how come all the prizes are handy then, you say? Well, the men whose duty it is to line up the gifts have a fairly good idea after eleven years of what articles are likely to be in demand, so they have everything possible ready.

As Jack walked onstage there was a loud squeal from the ladies and much applause.

much applause. Corn? Hokum? Not this one. Just plain human interest which is always a good commodity, especially when it's in the hands of a man with the know-how and general good humor of Jack Bailey.

MINIATURE CAMERA

Experimental use of a radical new transistorized miniature TV camera and portable transmitter in covering the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, August 13, was announced by RCA.

The camera, weighing only four pounds, is only 2½ inches high, 3 inches wide, and 8¼ inches long, ex-clusive of the view-finder. Controls in the unit feed directly into the backpack transmitter housing a synchronizing generator, transmitter and power supply. Weight of the back-pack transmitter is 15 pounds.

And while on the latest technical developments—colorcasting on the Pa-clfic Coast, which until now has lagged behind the rest of the nation due to technical difficulties, will come into its own this fall when NBC introduces a newly perfected color proc-ess called lenticular film which will enable telecasting of "kinescoped" programs in color. Coast viewers have hitherto had to be content with black and white "kines" of shows seen in color by the rest of the country.

Radio station KLAC has scored another impressive "first," in its long series of promotions, with the announcement, concurrent with its Tenth Anniversary, of a public warranty pledging the airing of only the "thirty top tunes and memories too."

Programming of "thirty top tunes and memories too," came into being as the result of a year survey undertaken by station prexy Mortimer Hall, which determined, according to Hall, "that the majority of listeners wanted to hear only the best selling records and an occasional standard of yesteryear. So from now on, KLAC will present ONLY these top records around the clock. In this manner every listener will know what he can expect in the way of programming, from our station."

A leader in radio promotion since the inception of its music-news-sports format, the "Big Five" deejays, singing station breaks, and star-name breaks, KLAC has been instrumental in setting the pattern nationally for independent radio.

Hall anticipates some expression of displeasure from a minority listening group that favors rhythm and blues, country music. and western songs. "But." he adds, "if any of these records reach the top thirty in popularity, they will be strongly programmed, regardless of the element of music they represent."

The Sound and Mr. Koury

"This is an age of economy in music."

So says Rex Koury, director of music for ABC's Western Division and com-poser of "Old Trail," the vivid theme used on both the radio and TV ver-sions of Gunsmoke on CBS-KNX and KNXT.

Gunsmoke also remains one of the few radio programs that retain "live" music in the format. All the bridges and mood settings are composed and conducted by Koury with a crew of but six men.

"Last year when the Boston Pops Orchestra was in Los Angeles for a concert, some of their musicians told me they always listened to Gunsmoke," Koury recalls. "They were fascinated by the orchestral effects we achieve with such a small group.

"When I am composing for the pro-gram, I actually write for a full or-chestra, then condense the score down to what we can handle. If I were a writer, I'd probably be working for Reader's Digest," the trim-looking musician smiles.

"We have established a definite sound pattern for Gunsmoke, and each week after a conference with the di-rector, Norman MacDonnell, I digest the script and then try to project myself into the story."

He composes first "out of his head," without a plano, feeling that the basic theme or idea for a piece of music must first be visualized and put on paper before a single note is sounded. Only then does he go to a plano to plot the harmonic structure.

Gunsmoke is only one part of his activities. He supervises all live mu-sic for ABC in the West, including the experiments that KABC has been making in stereophonic sound broadcasting.

"But I like the Gunsmoke assign-ment," he declares. "It is a challenge. We use a guitar and accordion because they are popularly western in-struments. We added a French horn to them because it has an open sound. Its tone brings to mind the wide and unfettered spaces of the old West, And finally, of course, we use the percus-sive sounds for dramatic effect and punctuation."

Some time ago in moving Jerry Friedman's kettle drums from one studio to another, one of them ended up with a huge dent in the side. Fried-man was understandably upset, but someone playfully experimented on the dent with a pair of drumsticks. It gave out a weird and unearthly sound that fascinated Koury—and ever since he has included it in the score,

On the subject of music as a career, Koury is somewhat pessimistic. There are now 16,000 professional musicians in Los Angeles, he points out, and only 3500 of them are working steadily.

"Unless you have an unusual combination of traits," he advises, "don't plan on making a living from music."

These he lists as "creative ability, outstanding playing ability, a happily aggressive personality—and exceptionally good contacts in high places."

Koury himself was a professional musician at the age of 15 when he played the pipe organ in a movie house in Elizabeth, N. J. His English parents had brought him to America when he was three years old from his birthplace in Khartoum, Egypt, where his father was a British circuit judge.

Handsome enough to work before the cameras rather than behind them. Koury was married in 1938 to Georgia Leath, a fine radio vocalist, and they now have a six-month-old daughter, Georgette Laurice, nicknamed "Gigi."

"Music is one of the greatest pleas-ures of mankind—it's the universal language, the 'Esperanto' of the world," he says. "When you're tired, if you can sit down, turn on your hi-fi and under-stand the structure of a great compo-sition, you will find it one of the most

sition, you will find it one of the most refreshing experiences in the world. "That, I think, is the key to the

richest possible life-the understand-ing of fine music."

TV's Latest Craze: "Portable TV"

"Portable TV" is not like "portable radio." There are a lot of differences. Here are facts and figures, the advantages and disadvantages on this latest buying boom in the TV world. Before you buy one, read this article.

T WAS inevitable. It took time. But it's finally here: the big craze for "portable TV" has finally hit the buying public.

Starting about four months ago, all major companies had portable sets on the market. Each week newer and better models are coming out.

In order to clear up a lot of misunderstanding about this latest buying vogue, and to help our readers who may be contemplating the purchase of such a set, here are some pertinent facts and suggestions on "portable TV" sets:

Contrary to what a lot of people believe, a "portable TV" set does not have the same maneuverability as a "portable radio." TV beams follow a straight line. Radio waves bend with the surface of the earth. For this, as well as other reasons, TV stations cannot cover as great an area as radio.

A portable radio is great for the beach, for a picnic, for any out-ofthe-way place. A portable TV set is not. The word "portable" for television refers mainly to the size and weight of the machine. It is portable to the extent that it can be carried from one room to another in the same house, or from one house to another. It can even be taken on business trips. However, no matter where the set is taken, certain essentials are required in order to get proper reception.

"Portable" Requirements

First, the current. All sets, except for one model put out by the Emerson company, require an AC electrical outlet. As yet, portable TV sets can not be operated on batteries, such as portable radios are.

A portable TV set also requires an antenna, the same as any average set. In the order of feasibility (and inversely, in the order of "strength of reception"), three types of antennas are used: (1) a built-in antenna; (2) "rabbit ears" or an indoor antenna; (3) the standard outdoor antenna.

Depending on the reception in a certain area, the built-in antenna might work. If not, then the next strongest should be tried: the "rabbit ears." So far, for portable purposes, this type of indoor antenna has been found to be adequate and certainly

the best and easiest to carry from room to room, or house to house. If an outdoor antenna is required for adequate reception, the owner can attach a "coupler" to the antenna he has for his regular set, or else set up an entirely new antenna. The main point is: that some sort of antenna must be used to get any kind of reception. And only one kind of the three antennas mentioned can be used. A combination of two or three will not give any added strength to the signal.

Other Facts, Figures

The main reason for name "portable" on TV sets relates to the size and weight. The average sets vary from 26 to 43 pounds (average about 30 pounds) and are about 10 inches high, complete with handles that are very easy to carry from place to place. Thus the name "portable."

They can cost from \$110 to \$160. Average price: \$130. (Without tax.)

Starting in July, when companies such as RCA come out with their latest models, almost every color is available. No color, however, as far as the picture itself is concerned. So far, only "black and white" sets are on the market.

The size of the picture (diagonally) runs from 8½ to 14 inches. UHF can be received, but at an extra charge.

People who own portables say once the proper antenna has been acquired, the picture "is as perfect as on the larger sets." Portable TV is proving to be a blessing for members of the family who don't want to watch what's on the main set. They simply and literally "pick up their portable" and head for another room. Many businessmen take them on business trips and "carry their entertainment" with them, so to speak.

However, if anyone has the idea he would like a "portable TV" to take to the beach or a picnic, or some other place where there's no AC electrical outlet (or where TV reception is utterly impossible in the first place) then he had better take his trusty portable radio along too. Without it, he'll have to provide his own entertainment.

Despite its limitations, "portable TV" will be as common in the average American household as the larger living room set.

Penny actually got her break when she appeared first on KCOP's Star Rating program and won a contest. Later, she was signed by the same station to appear on Waltz Varieties. That's when Klaus Landsberg of KTLA first spotted her.

He signed her to do Western Varieties for a short time on KTLA. And then when Roberta Linn left Orrin Tucker. Penny became her perma-nent replacement.

Vocally, Penny (her real name is Joan Cowan) has one problem. She's a little girl with a powerful voice. Specializing in light opera, she has to restrain herself when singing strictly "pop" numbers.

Keep an eye on this girl (now that shouldn't be any strain whatsoever). She has the potentiality in every way to become a real big star in the musical world. She just needs the right breaks and the right handling.

So far, with her appearance on KTLA, she's started in the right direction: UP.

Matinee Theater THE GREENER PASTURE

Canny Albert McCleery is finding many musical stars anxious to appear on his dramatic shows. Here Dorothy Kirsten tells why she made the switch — and why she wants to do more of them.

WMAN NATURE being what it is, the other pasture always looks a bit more enticing than the one we are in.

there is a whole category of jokes about the comedian who longs to play "Hamlet," the tragedian who yearns to do slapstick.

Albert McCleery, executive producer of NBC-KRCA's five a-week Matinee Theater, is just shrewd enough to take advantage of this human quirk. He has been able to feature some of the most glamorous names in the business on his show, at comparatively low fees, because an ar'ist's ambition is a many-sided thing.

He has been most successful in luring these names from the world of music, with Dorothy Kirsten, Helen O'Connell, Dorothy Shay and Ray Anthony all making their dramatic debuts on Matinee Theater—and all asking for more.

Miss Kirsten, in an exclusive TV-Radio Life interview, quite candidly tabled her starring role in "The Legend of Jenny Lind" as "ambition."

New Experience

"It was a new experience. It was a challenge," she said. "In every medium, the performer must adjust to different action. In opera, you must use wide gestures, for you are actually playing to the balcony. In TV. I realized a wide gesture would sweep clear across the screen. It's difficult to know what to do with your hands.

"You see, I'm the worrying kind," "You see, I'm the worrying kind," she laughed. "I was just positive that sometime during the show I would look directly into the camera. I'm relieved to be able to say I didn't.

"And I'm fussy about details. In the Matinee Theater costume changes, I insisted on having different jewelry for each change. I would have been happier if we had been able to change hair dos, too, but there just wasn't time between scenes, so I finally gave up worrying about that."

Systematic

Despite being a worrier. Miss Kirsten claims to be a rational rather than an emotional individual. She likes things "systematic and fixed ahead." The day of the interview, she interrupted her moving into a new home in Palos Verdes before taking off for concert appearances in Puerto Rico. The entire operation had been planned in detail. "If it weren't," she declared, "I couldn't go. I simply couldn't!"

This trait of thoroughly planning a course of action, whether it's moving to a new house or preparing for a new role, seems to be ingrained in the lovely blonde star's make-up. Whenever she essays a new character, she studies the person she is playing, not just her lincs. Matinee Theater was no exception. It is likely she did as much research on the Swedish nightingale as the staff assigned to that department.

She is scheduled to open the San Francisco Opera season in September as "Manon Lescaut," and to premiere the Los Angeles season also in Puccini's opera in October. But, she says, "I am beginning to feel an unrest in opera. With Matinee I had a taste of something wonderful. It was a new experience, and I liked it, in spite of the pressure. You know, live television is nicknamed 'pressure.' but I work best then. I think, too, that a person's real character comes out under pressure.

"I find now that I am watching TV more critically, because I am frankly quite anxious to do more of it. I should like to play a great strong woman-good or bad. Someone like Madame Butterfly or Violette in "Manon." That sort of a character. without the music. I want to do a role that is strictly dramatic.

"If I were given my choice in any part. I think I should like to do 'Camille.' She is a glamorous person, one who goes through a great big change of character. She would be a real challenge."

Miss Kirsten was thoughtful a moment.

"Come to think of it." she mused. "that would be a wonderful story for Matinee Theater, Don't you think so?"

Yes, we think so.

But you'll have to ask Mr. Mc-

Whittinghill. They are aware now as never before of his humor-his talent for doing crazy things, his frankness, boyish manner and wholesome charm.

One of his claims to fame is his honesty—he's a deejay without a record collection—a paid-up dues member kind of a joiner—he says he's lazy — hates pomposity — and loves to have a good time.

Dick has always been a personality kid. Invariably, he was president of his class and active in the dramatics clubs at school. It was his insatiable desire to have fun that flunked him out of college one term. Don't misunderstand, "Whit" was never a juvenile delinquent but he loved to spend more time with his orchestra (he plays a mean trumpet) than with his studies.

"Whit's" predilection for humor makes him a bit of a practical joker. He'll place long-distance calls anywhere and at any hour. Once he phoned Moosejaw, Saskatchewan, just to be able to say that he spoke o someone in that remote region. He prefers pursuing this to becoming a "ham" operator. "It takes too much learning to be a 'ham,' " he says in self-defense.

The New Yorker is scrutinized each week by witty "Whit." His favorites are S. J. Perelman, cartoonist Charles Addams and Virgil Partch. The offmike and off-camera voices Dick uses on his KMPC and KTTV programs reflect his love for the nonsensical and whimsy.

Blue-eyed, curly-haired Whittinghill is a happy-go-easy kind of a guy who "claims" he's the boss at home. "I met my wife Wilamet at college and before she could launch her career as a dancer I convinced her that being Mrs. Whittinghill was far more important.

"In a way I suppose I played a dirty trick on "Willy.' She loves to dance and I can't even do a simple waltz. 'Willy' is more than my greatest critic. She knows my limitations —it's certainly difficult to be objective about ourselves — and advises me accordingly. As a matter of fact, her judgmen, about performers and programs is very astute.

"After many years of marriage, our family came along rather late and I'm not the least bit hesitant to say that I'm a doting father to our two youngsters, Nora and Willy. Getting up at 4:30 in the morning for my KMPC show isn't painful at all when I look about the house and see what a wonderful family I have. It makes me wake up on the sunny side."

The reaction to my performance was overwhelming and I have some promising opportunities for other dramatic roles. And all because I sent a thank you note. How lucky can a guy get!"
