WILL *You* BUY THIS ONE?

Twentieth Century is a direct challenge to those TV viewers who complain that their television fare is immature and in a rut. This is one show that should be the answer to their fondest TV desires.

CBS-KNXT has laid it on the line. It has practically said to the public, "You've been hollering for better TV fare. Okay, here's one for you — let's see how you receive it."

The show that is in a way a direct challenge to TV viewers is *Twentieth Century*, a compelling account of the notable figures of the century and the events that remain historically important.

Twentieth Century, narrated by Walter Cronkite, is a very real attempt to bring something intelligent and adult to audiences. It is a documentary with full use of film clips and, as such, it mirrors history in its most exciting manner. While no one is saying it in so many words, the reception this show receives could very well determine whether other equally adult fare will be introduced on your channels.

The first show dealt with the career of Sir Winston Churchill and was a graphic account of the highlights of this man's life. Other leading figures such as FDR, MacArthur, Mahatma Ghandi, and Dr. Jonas Salk will be subjects of other programs.

Then there is "Guided Missile," which has already been shown and which illustrated in dramatic terms how closely Hitler came to winning the war. In the wide range of subjects to be treated there is also a show which will deal with an examination of crime, criminals, and penal institutions. Another will cover the developing crisis in education in the United States.

Jets and space matters come in for attention on four shows, which will be done under the general heading of "The Air Age." The four will include: (1) The ill-fated flight and testing of the Air Force's Bell X-2, the first supersonic experimental aircraft designed to prove the thermal barrier; (2) The story of the so-called Mach Busters, the training of supersonic jet fighter pilots; (3) The story of the new and amazing vertijets; (4) The story of air traffic control and its future implications in the jet age.

Burton Benjamin, who is producing *Twentieth Century*, calls his job the real plum, a dream assignment.

"Who wouldn't find it exciting to be

allowed to produce the events of the past fifty years — and to delve into the prospects for the next fifty?" he asked. "It doesn't matter at all that in almost all cases the end of our story is known. There is still tremendous interest in not only recounting these events but getting a few hitherto hidden secrets at the same time."

As an example of the extra touches, in the show dealing with the landing of the Allied Forces on June 6, 1944, captured German films will also be run which will show how the German forces occupied themselves on that fateful day.

Walter Cronkite

Walter Cronkite more than shares Benjamin's enthusiasm for his job.

Most of the shows Walter Cronkite will narrate will have special meaning to him since in his capacity as CBS News Correspondent he actually covered the events. When *Twentieth Century* covers the Nuremberg Trials, for instance, Cronkite will have some vivid memories since he covered the trials for the United Press. He also knew well Churchill, FDR, and other notable personalities. He was a war correspondent who, on D-Day, flew three B-17 missions to report the progress of the Normandy Invasion and on D-Day plus three he went in with reinforcing Allied ground troops. He was also with the American troops during the crucial Battle of the Bulge.

Cronkite is, of course, a familiar figure to TV audiences because of his work on *You Are There*. He is again covering history, but with one significant difference — he is dealing with history as shown by film clips.

All in all, there is a vast degree of expert know-how going into *Twentieth Century*. It is a challenging show in that it believes that audiences are interested in something other than west-erns and singers.

It is fondly to be hoped that those same audiences will prove they are anxious for something like *Twentieth Century*, for if there is no interest in the age in which we live, what are we interested in?




THE DUKE AND DUCHESS of Windsor will be the subject of *Twentieth Century* on December 29.



On the Carpet With Coates



*KTTV's urbane master of
the art of probing has
good reason for that
usually impassive exterior*

"I'M NOT a crusader!" Paul Coates said firmly but quickly. "I don't consciously set out to do good. I'm interested in a good story—a timely story with human interest—the sort of thing I do in my column. Actually, the 10:15 show is a pictorial news column. When good is achieved by the show or my column it is an added satisfaction.

"Nor do I look solely for controversial subjects. While I like controversy because it helps build interest, it isn't necessary. One of the programs I got the most satisfaction out of wasn't in the least controversial. It resulted from a traffic ticket my boy got for riding his bicycle on the wrong side of the street. We were able to show what a good job the police department in one community were doing to help save the lives of children. Giving children traffic tickets for infringements of the law with regard to bicycles may strike some as rather petty, but if it saves one life it's important. I was glad my boy got the ticket... not only for his sake but because it made me aware of the law and gave me an opportunity to present it to our viewers."

Paul has five people working with him on the 10:15 show. Since the format calls for timely stories there is a deadline each day, and sometimes Paul doesn't

know until 6:00 P.M. what his show is going to be. His staff may be checking as many as three stories and these may fall apart at the last minute because of failure to get the right people or confirmation of the facts.

Besides checking all the newspapers and wire services, Paul has another source of newsworthy stories—people call him on the phone or stop him on the street. Some of these tips develop into good presentations.

One of the most successful of the 10:15 shows was the story of conditions at General Hospital. Paul presented both sides of the story; that of the uncared-for patients and that of the overworked R.N.s and their aides, many of whom had no proper training and were more dedicated to collecting their pay checks than to caring for the sick. Since then steps have been taken to correct the unsatisfactory care which patients in some wards were receiving.

Paul has a reputation as "the great stone face" so his answer to that tag was amusing. "I guess it is some sort of embarrassment that keeps me from smiling on camera. I don't try to keep a sober face, but I do try to be objective and not let my personal feelings show. Very often this is difficult to do and I'm not sure that I'm always successful. I suppose my intentness on this

objectivity makes me appear rather sober."

Paul is particularly pleased with what has been accomplished on his show for Billy Rupp. "TV and the newspapers have done a lot of good in this case," he said. "If it hadn't been for them, Billy Rupp, who I am convinced is not responsible for his actions, would have been dead long ago. We proved by a poll of the original jury on our program, that if they had known at the time of the trial that Billy could have been put away so that he would never be eligible for parole, they would not have voted for a verdict which carried the death penalty. Naturally, there are many people in favor of capital punishment who have violently criticized me for my stand in this case."

While he doesn't particularly like criticism, Paul won't sidestep an issue because he's afraid of it. For instance, the subject of drug addiction. "I believe in the English system." Paul volunteered. "They legalize the sale of narcotics to registered addicts, thus eliminating underworld traffic in drugs. Statistics show that only 1% of those hooked can be cured. Therefore 99% have to get the drugs somewhere for the rest of their lives. If they can't get it legally they'll pay any amount to those who traffic in dope. I think we should stress again and again—only 1% of those who become addicts will ever be cured. If you know you have practically no chance of breaking the habit you'll think a long time before you start."

Besides the timely topics which Paul will use from day to day he is investigating many injustices, many frauds and many crackpots with personal prejudices to which they attempt to convert anyone who will fall for their line of hate.

"You have to know when to take up a subject. The time may not be right for it. With people, you have to be careful. If someone comparatively unknown is trying to gain converts to what you feel is a wrong cause, and you publicize him, you may unwittingly attract other unstable minds to him. If you keep still he may never enlarge his little circle of hate."

When asked if he had plans for any other type of show he grinned, "My ulcers are starting to manifest themselves now, and after all this 10:15 show and Confidential File are only extensions of my column—the thing I'm trained for. Other than Bachelor's Haven it's the only type of TV I've ever done."

Recalling Bachelor's Haven brought to mind Zsa Zsa Gabor and we asked him if he had any intention of bringing her on his 10:15 show. "No," he replied, "I don't think Zsa Zsa has anything interesting about her that everyone doesn't already know." Paul may not be looking for controversy, but he isn't sidestepping it!

No Apologies for George Putnam



"This is only one more indication," George seethed, "of the thievery, dishonesty here in Los Angeles, and breakdown of the moral fibre in this country!"

The matter that had so bothered George no doubt would be the subject of a later editorial on his KTTV news show since he is not one to skirt a hot issue.

George has burned a few people and he has stuck his neck out to here, but he is not in the least sorry for any of the campaigns he has waged. He'd do them all over again.

Crusades

He was even criticized for his youth work — especially by those whose prejudice prevented them from understanding his efforts in behalf of Mexican and Negro youths.

"I have always championed and will continue to champion people and issues I believe in — and I will always judge a man by the size of his heart and not by the color of his skin.

"I make no apology at all for the things I have tried to do for today's youth," George said flatly. "I've found that about 97 percent of them are fine people. And that they're tomorrow's leaders. The only thing is — can we wait for them to take over?"

"My interest in youth was also responsible for a campaign I waged a few months ago for the Los Angeles County Probation Department. Because of a tight budget situation, it was thought it would be necessary to eliminate a Community Guidance Program, a program primarily headed by 10 to 12 specially trained young men and women who worked with so-called gangs. They moved into trouble areas and rather than breaking up the gangs they tried to give them a reason for being. In short, they tried to make clubs out of them. I put in an appearance before the Supervisors and also campaigned on the air against the elimination of this program. I called attention to the great work these people were doing too. As a result of pressure, not only from me but from other directions, the program was saved."

Everyone knows about the awards George gives to youth organizations who do outstanding work each year. Last year between 50 and 75 groups qualified out of over 200 who were nominated.

George has also campaigned vigorously for clean Los Angeles County Government.

"We did manage to set a few precedents in the selection of the present District Attorney," George said. "Candidates for the office were allowed to appear in public hearings and give their views. This did much towards clarifying issues and policies."


One of the most controversial of all of George's campaigns is his fight against capital punishment. He has always believed that this solves no problem and does not help to rid the country of criminals.

"I think the day will come when thoughtful people will rule out such punishment," he said. "After all, the emphasis should be on bringing people back as decent citizens. I know this is a hot issue, but I like heat."

"I feel as strongly too about our present school system — and for my stand here I've been called a few names. But I believe that we need in the schools about 25 recognized psychiatrists — or authorities — who have the knowledge to help those youngsters who are mixed up and confused and who do not get guidance from home. If these boys and girls can be helped, we'll already be on our way towards helping the crime problem."

George has also campaigned for drag strips where hot-rodgers can do their speeding but under properly supervised and organized conditions. He has stirred up a hornet's nest here too. But once again he has a point. It's better to have properly supervised strips than to turn the kids loose on the highways.

George Putnam is a man of controversy. He always will be. That's why he's a valuable man to have not only on TV but in our town.



A NEW ADVENTURE IN SPACE





This looks like a TV must for the week.



KRHM-FM's Policy of Progressive Programming Promises to Improve THE SOUND OF FM RADIO

IN the world of radio, FM broadcasters, in the past, have been either neglected or relegated to the unrewarding position of broadcasting background music. Currently, however, the adaptation of knowledgeable programming has resulted in growth and popularity for the relatively new medium.

Contributing much to this upsurge in Southern California and setting the pace for first rate programming is KRHM, owned by Harry Maizlish, who for many years was associated with Warner Bros., first with their theatres and then with KFVB-AM-FM of which he was manager and then owner. When the veteran station operator sold the AM operation last year, he retained the FM, changing the call letters to KRHM.


Thus was set in motion Mr. Maizlish's goal to make FM Radio—and KRHM, in particular—radio at its very best.

"Over-commercializing on AM Radio, forced on it by the music-news-sports format and saturation purchases of spot advertising leading to double and triple spots interspersed by one of the top 25 records of the day or an occasional standard, has put FM Radio in the happy position of at last realizing its vast potential," so believes Mr. Maizlish.

"FM is a natural music medium—but music of a scope and variety hitherto pretty much ignored by the majority of both AM and FM stations—because FM is unlimited as to fidelity. AM, which was established before the advent of any interest in the precision reproduction of sound, is limited by FCC regulations and includes only about half of the frequencies in the audio spectrum. AM stations are allocated at every 10 kc or 10,000 cycles while FM stations are 200 kc or 200,000 cycles apart."

With these physical facts working for him, Mr. Maizlish—with chief engineer Paul Wieman, whose responsibility is the continuing improvement and development of KRHM's technical operation, a small staff and the dream of building some of the finest programs heard anywhere in the country—put KRHM on the air November 20, 1956.

Bob Devine joined the staff in December. Jim Ameche and Les Claypool, Jr. were added to the station in January. In April, Skip Weshner, Jr. was signed

and Don Beck debuted on KRHM in July, as did Dr. Charles E. Fuller.

But it was during the month of September, 1957 that the station programming policy reached a new high.

Leading the way was the biggest name ever to be signed by FM—nationally renowned dean of music commentators Milton Cross, who started a six times weekly three-hour evening program of master classics, including a full-length opera each Sunday. Other features followed. The eminent astrologian-lecturer Carroll Righter; the *Mirror-News* financial editor David Rees with New York Market Closing; *Media Agencies Clients* trade weekly editor-publisher Marvin Saltzman and associate Dick Freed with *The Advertising World*. Benson Curtis, long an AM favorite, with *Strictly From Dixie*; and Frank Evans, who continues to rack up the mail as proof of his FM popularity, with *Frankly Jazz* and *Around The World In Hifi*.

In November, Mr. Maizlish signed two well-known AM personalities and features. Dr. Ernest C. Wilson, minister of Christ Church Unity and author of such inspirational books as "The Other Half of the Rainbow," "Every Good Desire" and "The Great Physician," now does a five-minute Monday-through-Saturday for a quarter-hour each morning.

Why did Harry Maizlish sell the comfortable security of AM Radio and invade the heretofore money-losing field of FM? A Pulse survey of January, 1957 gives part of the answer. The FM listeners are a going group with approximately 14,400,000 FM sets in Los Angeles and Orange Counties. The average FM listener, according to FM surveys, is about 38 years old and greatly interested in music and high fidelity. Thus, he is a programming challenge to any progressive FM broadcaster.

THE OTHER EVENING I SAT in a jam-packed Shrine Auditorium where fans from all point in Southern California had assembled to enjoy a concert by Nat King Cole. As I scanned the rows of people from orchestra to high up in the towering balcony, I couldn't help but say, "And this is in tribute to a performer whose show is going off the air because a national sponsor and a good time couldn't be found for him!"

I TALKED WITH NAT AND here is what he said: NBC has been very kind in trying to work something out for me until they can line up a national sponsor at a good time, but I feel it would be a mistake for me to go ahead under the cooperative set-up at a Saturday night time of 7 o'clock. While this is not considered a good time under any circumstances, the fact that the show would be seen at 7 only in Los Angeles and Chicago makes it worse. In some cities it would be seen as early as 5 o'clock.

"I FEEL," HE CONTINUED, "that it would be like starting all over again, because it takes quite a while to build an audience in a new time spot. With a national sponsor, so that the show would be seen at 7 all over the country, I would have taken a chance on building that audience. . . I might even be on the end of the gangplank and if something happened it might be worse than to leave now when the show has good acceptance."

NBC STILL HAS A 13-WEEK option on Nat's services. He doesn't know what will be done with him—maybe guest shots. He plans to go to New York after New Year's for night club commitments, then to Havana and Miami.

"I'VE SACRIFICED A LOT financially to do my show," he

admitted. "I think we've had some pretty fair programs in spite of what we had to work with." Nat had nothing but praise for his producer, Bob Henry, and others who tried to aid his cause. But these helpful attitudes still don't alleviate the sad reality that an inimitable talent is going off the air. Incidentally, Nat, an Episcopalian, turned over all the Shrine proceeds (I heard the take was about \$22,000) to his church's Youth project, Camp Stevens. Before the concert ended, he was given an honorary plaque and his wife, who looked most attractive in a short, pink formal, was recipient of an armful of red roses.

THINKING OF NAT REMINDED me of his Person to Person stint recently and this jogged me into reminding you that Edward R. Murrow has stars in your eyes on December 6 when he will visit Mr. and Mrs. Leo Durocher (Laraine Day) and their two children, Michele, 11, and Chris, 9, in Beverly Hills and Mr. and Mrs. Fernando Lamas (Arlene Dahl) at their town house in Manhattan. And speaking of Murrow, I'm enjoying his and Fred Friendly's marvelous albums of *I Can Hear It Now*, sent me by CBS. There are three of them—from 1918 to the depression, from 1933 to the close of World War II, and from 1945 to 1949. Album from 1950 to '57 will be forthcoming early next year. As you may imagine, some of the radio excerpts are priceless. What a splendid way to teach history this set of recordings will be!







THERE have been many complaints coming in about the cutting of the Mickey Mouse Club to a half hour—and also because so many of the Mouseketeers have been left hanging with nothing to do. While Disney's problem of not enough studio space for filming the show is understandable, thus necessitating the half hour spot, the dissatisfaction as far as the fans are concerned can't be ignored. This program was one of the kids' favorites. It had a loyal, devoted audience. It is to be hoped that this same audience will hang around long enough to give the new format a chance. If the complaints still continue, then it does look as though Disney will have to do something about it fast—or write off the entire venture. The point here is that the youngsters who watch this program have all acquired their own special favorites and they're not going to stand still to see any of those favorites neglected. It looks very much as though Disney isn't hanging on to a mouse now—but to a wild cat.

Dick Boone had a narrow one that somehow escaped publicity. He was doing a scene in *Have Gun, Will Travel* when another actor shot him with a blank that was supposed to be a ¼ charge but was, by mistake, a full load. Some 20 pieces of blue powder embedded in Dick's face and 25 in his hand. A doctor was called to dig the powder out, but he may still have small tattoo-like blue marks left. For some reason, Dick just happened to put his hand over his eyes before the shot—otherwise he could have lost his eyesight.

Arthur Hamilton is a real success story in this town. Not too many years ago he was an ambitious guy trying to get someone to listen to his music—mostly of the off-beat variety.

It looked as though the breaks would never come. Finally, he hit with "Cry Me A River" which Julie London made into a smash hit. Since then, Arthur has turned out other such hits as "Any Questions?" and "Bouquet of Blues." "He Needs Me" is another as is "About the Blues" which happens to be the title of Julie London's new album. Recently, he did the music for the first Lucy-Desi Show. It's good to see that talent is occasionally recognized in this town even though you have to bludgeon the so-called "important" people into giving any young person a listen or a look.

Back to Disney again, he has a sure winner for the kids in his picture, "Old Yeller." You can look for a heavy play on this on Disneyland but it's worth the plugs. It has heart, humor, about anything a movie for general appeal should have. Two other pictures that are good reasons for waltzing out of your home some evening are "Sayonara" with Red Buttons doing a superlative job in a dramatic role and "Witness for the Prosecution." Also good is "Paths of Glory." With all the talk about TV killing off movies, I don't think TV is doing half the damage that the high admission prices in theatres are.

Dorothy Shay arrived back in town "Feudin' and Fussin'" with "Uncle Fud" and landed at the Coconut Grove. She sang most of her old hillbilly favorites (with the ermine touch) and a few saucy new ones. There's no one on the night club beat quite like Miss Shay and while I felt she did a little too much talking she was entertaining. Yet, still think the captivating young lady should work a room not as large as the Grove. Hers is the intimate approach. Next at the spot is Bob Crosby and the Modernaires.

Here's an interesting look at the TV line-up for the British Broadcasting Corporation. The breakdown of program line-up for the present year is: Light entertainment and entertainment films, 18%; Drama, opera, ballet and music, 14%; Sporting

"You Belong To Me." (5) Dec. 8, 7:30. 1941. Henry Fonda is a wealthy playboy who injures himself in a skiing mishap and winds up marrying the doctor, Barbara Stanwyck. From then on, it's one obvious gag after another as Henry suffers the tortures of watching his wife go out on night calls, treat handsome patients and become medically involved with a former boy friend. The two leads know how to play this kind of thing, however, and there are a few laughs.

"Strange Cargo." (11) Dec. 13, 8:00. 1940. A strange movie that bulges with good things . . . fine performances, lots of action, a provocative theme . . . "Strange Cargo" pro-



"On Camera"

The Court of Last Resort,

The Court of Last Resort brings to television the work of a group of men who have become nationally noted through their efforts in behalf of criminals wrongfully imprisoned through miscarriage of justice, and in aiding rehabilitated prisoners to obtain release or parole.

As such The Court of Last Resort may help to break ground in developing a new type of criminal vs society story, a reverse angle on the usual age-old procedure of cops and robbers. This type of story involving the return and rehabilitation of a criminal has had tough going as it runs counter to the accepted story pattern to which audiences have become acclimated. It poses, too, the thought as to whether the dramatic conflict in rehabilitation of a criminal is as exciting as pursuing one on the lam.

With the present psychological techniques employed in returning the criminal offender to society, certainly the raw substance of dramatic material is here. What it may lack in aspects of hell-bent-for-leather physical pursuit that is the mainstay of the run of the mill cops and robbers drama, should be more than compensated for with deeper psychological conflict involved. This is a healthy

sign for drama portraying the criminal as it eliminates any possibility of falling back on the old chase cliché. As with any other reputable play, the job in putting this over calls for individual hand-tooling, so to speak.

Bucking the well-established popular trend in cops and robber drama, The Court of Last Resort merits applause in challenging the old order and striking out in new directions.

However, this also imposes the additional requirement not only of sharp, taut, dramatic writing, but also skillful handling of expository material in getting over much technical information that is little known to the general public.

There is another problem. Granting that the essence of any drama is struggle or conflict, the basic premise of this series in portraying the efforts of a group attempting to return a human to society, more or less places the human in question in the position of a pawn who is a non-participant in the efforts to release him.

Lack of sharp definition of dramatic elements in some of this series gives a diffuse effect, due no doubt to the fact that the producers are probably feeling their way towards new techniques in a new and difficult job. Extraneous and irrelevant scenes, plus too little development at times of the antagonistic forces weaken the intended driving force and impact.

However, the germ of something new is brewing in this show, and viewers will find it well worthwhile to watch the development.







Card tricks are always fun when performed with speed and dash. Here is a quickie that will baffle your gang and it is very simple to perform.

First arrange the top four cards of any pack as follows: The seven of clubs—the eight of spades—the seven of spades and the eight of clubs. Hand your victim the deck of cards and request them to secretly note the two top cards of the deck and place them into any portion of the pack. He then hands you the pack and you place the pack behind your back and immediately produce the selected cards which just a moment ago were so hopelessly mixed into the deck.

TOP SECRET: You will recall that you had four cards on the top of the deck. When the spectator took the two cards from the top of the deck he took the seven of clubs and the eight of spades and put them somewhere into the deck. The two cards which you immediately produce were not these two cards, but the next two which he knows nothing about—these being THE SEVEN OF SPADES AND THE EIGHT OF CLUBS. For some unknown reason the person choosing the cards never notices the change . . . all their memory retains is the fact that they chose the seven and eight, and they believed the two cards you show them are the ones they just returned to the pack.

Remember, this is a one-time only trick. Never . . . but never repeat this trick for the same group.



SHE FEEDS WHALES. She milks goats. She rides lions. She prescribes recipes. She interviews famous authors and presidential aspirants. She's pleasing to look at for the men; pleasant to listen to for the women; and easy-to-take for the kids.

Her name is Helen Parrish. And she does all this in the wee-wee hours of the morning on KNXT's highly successful Panorama Pacific.

In addition to this, Helen is the wife of producer John Guedel, who has handled Art Linkletter and Groucho Marx's programs for over a decade. She is also a fulltime mother to her two children, Charles, 10 and Molly, 7, and John's two youngsters (by a previous marriage) Hedi, 9, and John, 12.

How does she do it all—and still look as glamorous as a page out of *Cosmopolitan* at 7 o'clock in the morning? And why does she do it all? Ordinarily, there would seem to be a tremendous conflict here between the ago-old Hollywood bugaboo of career vs. marriage. But not for this Helen of TV.

Helps Her Private Life

"When I'm doing Panorama Pacific, I get up at 5 o'clock and arrive at the studio about a half-hour before airtime," she explains. "Except for the

commercial, we don't have any rehearsals on the program. By eight o'clock, when most people are beginning work, I'm all through!"

As a result, the thirtyish, trim-looking brunette actress can devote a full day to the real-life role of being a mother. She takes a full part in the lives of her children, being a "den mother" with the Cub scouts, and an active member of the P.T.A.

Rather than hinder her private life as a wife and mother, Helen emphatically declares her job as a hostess on Panorama Pacific has helped her considerably.

"When I talk to other people now, I find myself talking about *them* rather than myself. Most actresses, being self-centered enjoy talking about themselves—since it is the way they are making their living. I guess I was no different—until I started on Panorama Pacific several years ago. A part of my job—especially when interviewing such people as Estes Kefauver, Adail Stevenson, Norman Vincent Peale or Ivy Baker Priest—is to focus all the attention on the guest. I find this habit, thankfully, carries over into my private life."

Cookies Unlimited, Inc.

For many years, acting-minded Helen never bothered to learn how to cook. The KNXT show has also helped her in this all-important wifely function.

"Although I will admit," she laughs, "that my first effort was not too successful. It was a recipe for cookies. Quite seriously, while on the air, I began to mix a little milk with a little flour. The more flour I needed, the more milk I poured. It turned out to be more than a vicious circle. By the end of the program, I had more milk, more flour, more of everything than I needed. It was all so comical that we started the next day's program, with me still working on the recipe."

"This incident is just typical of the one big lesson we have learned on Panorama Pacific. We seldom extend any of the sections of the program to more than 10 or 12 minutes. And we never know exactly what we are going to do.

"Oh, one more thing that Panorama Pacific has done for me," Helen concludes. "I always get stiff on Saturday, you know."

This statement came as a bit of a surprise from the wide-eyed, healthy-looking, early-morning riser. Was the weekly program so strenuous that she had to relax on weekends via the alcoholic route?

"No, don't get the wrong idea," she smiles. "Every Friday morning, as part of the show, I do some physical exercises. The following Saturday morning, I'm just as stiff as can be."

I got on his show first when he and Paul Henning, producer-writer of the program, were looking for a girl to play a French maid. My agent took me over for an audition — and both Bob and Mr. Henning seemed to like me. However, I was a blonde then so they asked me to dye my hair black. This was fine with me since I'm a brunette anyway. I did the show and wasn't back on again until a year later. Since then I've appeared frequently."

Lisa lives in a very modern but modest apartment in Hollywood with her husband of two years, Ben Ware. Ben is vitally interested in her career, although he has his own business. He's one man who doesn't gasp with horror at the idea of a career wife. As he says, "I'm proud of her talent and I think it should be seen."

They met about three years ago when Ben was doing a kind of Pioneer Day in Culver City. Lisa appeared to lend

a hand in the festivities and Ben put her to work selling chances on a car. She did so well that he couldn't put her out of his mind. And it wasn't her salesmanship tactics he was thinking of. However, when he asked for a date he didn't show at once how he felt. He played it cagily — trying to find out if she were temperamental or if, as he said, "she was as sweet as she seemed."

Lisa is the kind of a career girl all career girls should be — but, unfortunately, so few are like this. She's no walking self-centered grease paint ad or a phony glamour doll. She is first and foremost a wife and a truly feminine woman. You couldn't want much more provocative femininity than she has!

Man of Action!

Michael Hinn isn't bothered in the least by anything that happens to him on *Boots and Saddles*. Not after all he's gone through.

IT'S HARD to imagine Michael Hinn as anything but what television casting has made him—a lean, wiry frontier scout for the 5th Cavalry in “Boots and Saddles—the Story of the 5th Cavalry,” television film series being shown on NBC-KRCA.

Mike's keen, blue eyes and bearded face, his soiled buckskins and campfire voice seem to belong to another generation; this walking, drawling anachronism is merely something the sunlight and dry, desert air have preserved for the world of the television camera.

Mike Hinn is many men; now a youngster helping his engineer father as a rod and chain man on a surveying crew, now a college actor, a barnstorming pilot, a newspaperman, a radio journalist, a frontier scout named “Luke” and now a frightened fighter pilot making a pact with God during a night run on a Japanese cruiser.

In spite of western ways and the sagebrush in his voice, Mike was not born in the West. He came to life September 10, 1913, in Virginia, Minnesota, a son of William and Marjorie (O'Hair) Hinn. He attended one-room schools to the seventh grade, then the family moved to Ashville, N. C., St. Paul, Minn. and finally to Madison, Wis., where Mike finished high school.

Mike's acting began in high school. At the University of Wisconsin in Madison, he added journalism to his interests and, for a time, worked on the campus daily.

But there were stronger lures than books for the tall youngster and he left school to work a gold mine claim in North Carolina.

A mishap provided a turning point in his career. When his right arm was badly mangled by the mining machinery, Mike fell back on journalism as an alternate to physical labor. He began work as a reporter for the Ashville (N.C.) Citizen-Times but soon switched to a writing-news-casting job on the paper's radio station. In 1938, continuing as a radio journalist, he moved over to WLW, Cincinnati, as the station's first writer-news-caster and his daily proximity to reports on the European war stirred the adventure spirit in him again.

Back in Ashville, in 1936, Mike learned to fly. He barnstormed at county fairs in an old Waco 10. By 1941, he had a commercial license and he tried

to enlist as a flier in the Army Air Force. But American requirements were too high. Mike had to enlist in the Royal Air Force which was then recruiting pilots in the United States.

He was given a capsule flying course by the RAF in Tulsa, then shipped to England in June, 1942, to fly Mustangs and Hurricanes in low-level fighting.

By the fall of 1942, the Americans had a revised opinion of Michael Hinn and offered him the opportunity to transfer to an American unit. Mike chose the Navy and in a short time was flying Hellcats against the Japanese in the Pacific. He flew against them at Hollandia, at Truk and in the Battle of the Philippine Sea. During the latter action, he made seven passes at Jap carriers, “and I had only 40 gallons of gas when I started.”

Mike made his pact with God that night. “I was never so scared in my life.”

But gas or no gas and scared or not scared, he stuck it out, finally scoring with a 500-pounder on heavy cruiser. When he broke off the action, he picked the nearest carrier, the Hornet, and landed with hardly enough fuel for a cigarette lighter. He received the Distinguished Flying Cross for the night's work.

After the Philippine Sea battle, he spent the remainder of the war ferrying planes across the United States, from East to West, and, in the process, decided to make California his home—sometime.

Hanging up his uniform, Mike headed back to Madison. With a new radio station about to go on the air, he stepped in to head the news depart-

ment. This lasted until he received an offer to replace a West Coast commentator in Hollywood. Mike arrived in the film capital only to find the job had blown up while he was en route.

But he stayed in Hollywood, going to work for Radio Station KFI as a news commentator. That lasted eight months and he was off again, this time to Dallas, Texas, where he was a news commentator on WFAA-TV, a Dallas Morning News station.

Two years later, Mike was back in Hollywood on KABC-TV as a newsman. But he wanted other things and with help from Willard Waterman (The Great Gildersleeve), a fellow Wisconsin U. man, he began getting television roles. The Westerner in him began to show and he landed two leads in the “Gunsmoke” series in six weeks.

In a short time, he began making feature pictures. His first was “Black Patch” for George Montgomery. It was followed by “The Bitter Ride” for Mark Stevens and “The Halliday Brand.”

Mike is married to the former Helen Diller, “The Canadian Cowgirl.” They met when both were working at WLW in Cincinnati, she on the Boone County Jamboree and he as a newscaster. Helen gave up her singing career after the marriage. They have two children—Grace, 12, and John, 6, and live in Reseda.

In his present role, Mike has to wear a long beard and moustache. “I can't shave till we finish shooting the series sometime in December,” but, he's had his close shaves already.

That's Mike Hinn—“Luke,” the Cavalry scout, and Lt.-Col. Michael Hinn, USAF.

FIGHT HOLIDAY TRAFFIC HAZARDS

FIFTY PER CENT of the people on the freeway are not able to drive! This is the opinion of Municipal Judge Evelle J. Younger who presides over KABC-TV's Traffic Court.

"We have a problem here in Los Angeles," Judge Younger continued. "The problem is lack of rapid mass transportation. Consequently we face the problem of letting people drive who are not physically or emotionally able. The tests are too easy. People should train for them like pilots for airplane licenses. The tests should be more comprehensive. Judges should be given more authority.

"It's an uphill battle. We're losing it to the auto. But TV is a new weapon in fighting the battle."

Traffic, in Judge Younger's reasoning, is a matter of bread and butter, of life and death. That the TV series, Traffic Court, has struck such a responsive chord among viewers (latest was a 14 Nielsen rating) has come as a pleasant surprise to the Judge and everyone else connected with the program. Beyond that, it has given them deep satisfaction because the presentation is a genuine public service. Apparently viewers have discovered that there can be entertainment value in something that's good for them.

One of the smartest moves by those planning the series has been adherence to "playing it straight." Judge Younger insisted on this from the start. Neither he nor others associated with the program want any of the dialogue or action "hoked up" from the original traffic cases on which episodes are based. During the pre-program run-through, Judge Younger does not hesitate, if occasion demands, to say "This doesn't happen


1. Stay alert and keep your mind on your driving or walking.
2. Don't walk or drive in traffic after drinking.

this way in real traffic court." Or, "that was not a normal reaction."

Judge Younger, whose distinguished background includes service with the FBI, counter intelligence with the Army, deputy city attorney of Los Angeles, Pasadena City Prosecutor and other high responsibilities has been especially active with traffic problems. He is a former member of the President's Highway Safety Conference and former chairman of Traffic and Magistrate Courts Committee of the American Bar Association.

Personal Poser

He realized, when approached to preside over a TV Traffic Court, that he was opening himself to criticism. There are those, he felt, who might claim he was using his television prestige to

further personal ambitions, but the traffic cause was so worthwhile he decided to accede to the invitation. With the reservation, however, that he would terminate the association should the TV presentation not be honest.

Modestly he states that there are at least fifteen other judges who could fill the TV bill just as well, "but," he adds, "I'm human enough to be grateful that I have this opportunity." An example of Judge Younger's leaning over backward not to use the video stint for private advancement is his request that, if possible, all pictures taken on the program show only his back, not his face.

Viewers seem to enjoy writing the Traffic Court judge. One of the commonest comments is "I'm sure glad you did such-and-such to so-and-so," (when expressing opinions on a sentence Younger has passed). In discussing the influence of the program, the Judge emphasizes the care with which a variety of cases is presented to the public. "When a new traffic law is placed in effect we try to devote an episode to it as means of informing viewing drivers. At various times of the year we stress certain aspects which are timely — children's safety at opening of school, for example, and holiday safety at this time of the year."

Most people, according to Judge Younger, won't admit to being bad drivers. They'd rather admit something far worse. The Judge himself has always tried to be a careful driver. Now that he is literally in the public eye with his Channel 7 program, he confesses he is almost afraid to drive.

"Just imagine the headlines I'd get if I made even a tiny mistake," he muses.
