The Most Daring Show In Town?

ANK WEAVER's KABC-TV Main Street to Malibu has done a show on nudism (with some bare parts of anatomies in evidence), it has done a

show on burlesque, on the Lonely Hearts racket, and others of equally controversial nature. Small wonder this late-evening production has begun to catch on.

Producers Bruce Lansbury and Bud Widom filmed the nudist sequence themselves – and had to do the disrobing bit while they worked. As Bruce remarked subtly, "It was an extraordinary experience." And indeed this particular show was for viewers who stayed up late enough to catch its revealing aspects.

"Our Lonely Hearts segment was perhaps the most interesting of all," Bud Widom remarked. "We had an interview with a pathetic little man who said he had spent \$12,000 in the last five years on his dates. He had only had three in that time. And yet he said he had made just \$10 a week. We couldn't get him to explain his particular mathematical deduction here, but he was a graphic picture of a man who was bilked by these Lonely Hearts Clubs." "We try to pick subjects that are adult and provocative," Bruce Lansbury added, "but we are not trying to be controversial. In contrast to some late night TV shows we do not believe in the 'Let's have the controversy bit.' We don't intend to knock down established names just to be knocking them down. We'll never sacrifice good taste for a rating. And we heartily believe that there is an audience for good taste at a late night hour."

Main Street to Malibu was no sudden afterthought because of the success of other late night TV shows. Hank Weaver had been wanting to do this type of program for some time, and when he replaced Tom Duggan for two weeks while Tom was back east, the response he got was so good that immediately afterwards the wheels began to turn for his own show. Incidentally, Hank still has never met Tom Duggan.

"Naturally, we have our share of problems with a show like this," Bud continued. "Our primary problem is getting five hours of varied entertainment a week. We are the only local show trying to present something different. As such, we're trying to avoid any stiff format.

"We have more guests wanting to get

on the show than we can use - and they're all big names, so getting the talent isn't a problem - it's finding places for them. Of course, we do have the situation where we set a talent for an appearance. Maybe even build a show around him - or her. And then at the last minute the star doesn't show. We had one Las Vegas comic set for an appearance and an hour before show time he called to say he wasn't feeling well and couldn't make it. We then had the awful problem of trying to fill in the suddenly vacated time.

"In addition to these guest names, we also have panel shows at times with well-known personalities who bat around such subjects as censorship of movies and obscenity. And we have discussed unsolved crimes at times. So you see how wide our field is."

It's this kind of look that makes local TV big time.

Not Filling Anybody's Shoes

HEN JUDGE YOUNG-ER had to take his leave of Traffic Court due to the prima-donnaish antics of some of his frustrated judicial cohorts,

KABC-TV was faced with no small problem, namely: who can ever take the Judge's spot on what is a popular local show.

Seven weeks later and after interviews with over 200 retired judges and lawyers living in Los Angeles, Edgar Allen Jones, Jr., Assistant Dean of the University of California at Los Angeles Law School, was named for the vacancy. Since he was no regular Judge, nobody could object to his being chosen.

"I had no desire at all to go on television," Dean Jones commented. "I had seen Traffic Court several times naturally, but not in my wildest dreams had I ever thought of becoming its Judge."

Dean Jones' name came up when the Dean of the Law School suggested to Pete Robinson, producer, that Jones might be a good possibility. Jones was then contacted to see if he would come in for an audition. He did – was handed a few test cases to judge to see how he'd react and how he would handle them – and then was given the nod.

"We wanted someone who was youthful, someone who had authority," Pete Robinson remarked. "We were not – and are not – trying to fill Judge Younger's shoes. We wanted a younger person because we felt that Traffic Court was not a stereotyped show – and we didn't want any grey-haired Judge. We also were looking for someone who could hold the audience we have already built because we feel that the show has kept hundreds of thousands of Californians apprised of changes in California driving and traffic laws. As such, it is educational in nature. We hope, of course, that we are also entertaining."

Now that Dean Jones is a TV star he is taking a good deal of chiding from his students at UCLA. When he, for instance, put an assignment for his class on the board one day, a student added the following: "Be sure to bring publicity and current ratings."

Jones' family is also quite thrilled about his being on TV. He didn't tell

his youngsters - all seven of them that he was going to be on TV. They just watched the first show and were stunned. The youngest ones couldn't believe he wasn't in the room with them - and started talking to him on the set.

Thirty-seven year old Dean Jones and his wife, Helen, who live in Santa Monica, have found that life is quite different these days. But they're enjoying the change immensely—as are Linda Marie, 11½; Anna Marie, 10; Carol Marie, 8; Terry, 7; Dennis, 5½; Bob, 4½ and David, 1. With a clan as sizable as this he has a built-in audience already.

LL OF US dream some day of returning home a hero, or heroine. Especially if home happens to be a small town. Debby Kay had this experience re-

cently. However, as it turned out she felt more embarrassed than triumphant. "Can you imagine!" she declares. "I

actually got lost in my own home town."

Debby, as Channel 7 viewers know, is the little girl with the big voice who is one of the featured performers on KABC-TV's hour-long musical show, Country America. Running back-toback with Lawrence Welk's program, this gives Channel 7 a solid two hours of topnotch entertainment on Saturday.

KABC-TV officials believe that Country America has the same network potential as Lawrence Welk. This was one of the reasons the whole Country America crew took off for Pebble Beach recently to entertain The Association of National Advertisers.

Merely by coincidence, Pebble Beach is only a stone's throw from Debby's home town of Salinas. Consequently, while she was entertaining the ANA, it was arranged for her to make a brief appearance on the local station in Salinas.

During her public and high school days in Salinas she performed quite often before hometown folks. As a featured vocalist with Horace Heidt, Frankie Carle and Ray Anthony's orchestra, the petite and pretty vocalist became a minor celebrity in Salinas. Also, during the years (she's only 21 now) she did return occasionally to visit her sister.

However, on this particular night, it was her first appearance before the local cameras since she became a featured performer on Country America.

"I'll have to admit I was giving the directions to Dick Emmons, my piano player, because I thought I knew the way. On one stretch of road, however, I became completely confused. After taking a few wrong turns, we finally arrived at the station. It was too late, though, because the program had been off the air five minutes

"Naturally I felt badly about it and apologized. We only had that one night in town and it would have been nice to say hello to all my friends via the TV set. The worst part of the story was when I tried to explain exactly why I was late. Getting lost in my own home town sounded like a flimsy excuse, but it was the truth."

Debby's experience was recalled by her in conjunction with the current TV-Radio Life "home town contest." As with the rest of the Country America crew, our pretty cover girl now makes Hollywood her home. Debby lives with her parents in a Hollywood apartment. She's single. Doesn't even have a steady boyfriend. And is concentrating strictly on her career.

In reverse, concentrating on diminutive Debby, either visually or vocally, is strictly a pleasure.

HERE'S been a good deal of confusion about Milton Berle since the Emmy Awards show which he neatly stole. Some have ribbed him about agreeing to do a series — which he will do for Kraft this fall — after allegedly saying he wouldn't do a regular show. Others have made remarks about his fouling up the timing on the Emmy program. So I went by to see Uncle Miltie for the facts.

"First of all I was really surprised by the wonderful ovation I got on the **Emmy** awards," Miltie said quietly. "Coming from an audience of show people, it was heart-warming. My gag about 'Where were you three years ago,' though, was strictly off the cuff. As for the time I used on the show, here are the facts. I was asked to make the appearance and I was told I'd do a stand-up monologue spot. That was all I could do since I wasn't giving any awards or getting any. William Kayden, the producer, asked me to do seven minutes.

I can only assume, from all the ruckus, that the west coast people didn't know I was to do this spot. Anyway, I was to go on at 10:16 but I didn't get on until 10:32 so I began 16 minutes later. 45 seconds were lost in the opening with the reception I received. I was told to take the cue from the floor manager as to when I should get off and I stayed on until he gave me the signal. I was actually on only about one minute and forty seconds more than I was supposed to be.

"About the show for **Kraft** now. Ruth, my wife, and I discussed the possibility. And we agreed it would be a good idea. Frankly, only thing I know how to do is to entertain. I'd spent the last few years since I left TV working in cafes and clubs and doing very well at it. I hadn't missed not having my own TV program — and I had no commitment to any network. Nor did I need the money. So I am simply an actor with grease paint in his blood and laughter on his mind and a ham bone at heart. I know no other business. And, frankly, I'm glad to be back."

So are his many fans.

You hear a lot of talk from producers about their desire to get new faces. Few do anything about giving breaks to new talent. Alvin Cooperman, who has made an illustrious name for himself with his great productions on Shirley Temple Story Book, is one man who doesn't just talk about new people — he makes a sincere and conscientious effort to see that they get that first big break. He is the kind of man TV — and movies — need.

Speaking of new faces, Anne Helm and Gary Vinson, who were on "The McTaggart Succession" on Studio One, look like fine bets for future stardom. And speaking of this Studio One show, Ted Post, who directed (with such an effective mobility in use of camera) had his Steve Canyon pilot sold within 24 hours and at reportedly the biggest price ever paid for a TV film. Ted is really riding high.

See that O. L. Jaggers has been having his difficulties again. Well, readers of this tunnel will recall some facts we presented about this man several years ago... Don't miss the big Mental Health telethon on KCOP, May 25. Dore Schary is chairman, the Thalians are actively involved in the benefit, and Jack Rourke is producer. Talent signed so far includes Margaret Whiting, Art Linkletter, Spade Cooley and band, Paul Weston, Bill Burrud, Peter Potter, Tom Duggan, Baxter Ward, and Oscar Levant. See it — and give! ... The Cathy Crosby referred to in last week's tunnel was Bob's daughter — not Bing's wife.

T HE TV NETWOKKS ARE BEING very hush-hush about their summer programming, but from what I've been able to gather, this will be another year of "repeats" plus a few low budgeted (compared with winter fare) participation shows.

SUCH STANDBYS AS BURNS AND ALLEN, The Millionaire, Playhouse 90, Phil Silvers, Schlitz, Gale Storm Show, Have Gun, Will Travel, Loretta, Suspicion, Bob Cummings and so forth will go the re-run route. George Fenneman will emcee a quiz show starting July 6 on ABC-TV — and don't underestimate this chap who has been able to hold his own with Groucho all these years! \$10,000 prize money is the lure on George's program. There'll be Dorothy Kirsten, John Riott, Jane Powell and "rotating comedians" to fill Dinch Shore's pretty boots on the Chevy Show; The Brothers returns to CBS-TV for six Benny replacement programs; and a thing called Bid or Buy is being slotted (perhaps permanently) for \$64,000 Question, which itself began as a summer sub three years ago.

PERHAPS ONE OF THE BEST pieces of summer news is Bob Crosby to fill in for Perry Como. Bing's talented brother finally talked CBS into letting go of his contract so he could accept the NBC Saturday night spot. I know all of his fans who've been hollering for Bob's return will be tickled to see him again. He takes over for Perry June 14. Good news item number two. Young Jack Linkletter gets his own nighttime weekly show (Haggis-Baggis!?) on NBC Monday nights, starting June 30.

THERE ARE "STRONG RUMBLINGS" on the part of prospective sponsors interested in the pilot submitted by George Burns to replace the Burns and Allen Show in the fall. I was sorry George and Gracie's present sponsors did not buy the projected series, which, as you probably know, no longer has Gracie as a regular cast member but does retain George, Bea, Harry, Ronnie and others. In the pilot George plays it typically smart and steers away from guests and gimmicks. In a fast-paced stanza he has everybody bouncing jokes off himself. He even brings on a seal for a Flipper and Friend bit. Cute idea because in his very early show business days George Burns actually did do an act with a seal. Incidentally, it does not look as if the Western fever will subside in the fall. A series titled **Rowhide** goes into the Burns and Allen niche.

CONGRATULATIONS TO KNX which received seven awards to make it top dog in the California Associated Press TV-Radio Association recognition. KNX also received the nod for overall general excellence in news presentation for the second year. KABC received ace honors in three categories involving five programs . . . It is sad to report the projected (June 26) demise of Climax! which will join Kroft, Studio One and Matinee Theater in the boneyard. I believe Studio One will continue through summer, then be replaced by the Westinghouse Desilu Theater. Oddly enough, that venerable dramatic series sponsored from TV's infancy by Kraft will have half of its time absorbed by Uncle Miltie, whose smash routine at the Emmy Awards made everybody sit up and ask, "Where's he been?"

I HEARTILY AGREE WITH THOSE of you who have registered a complaint about those radio commercials which Gussie Moran is pitching. Can't imagine why she consented to do anything in such miserable taste, or why such material is permitted on the airways!

WIDE WIDE WORLD HAD ONE of its good shows with New York's Fifth Avenue as theme. I'm sure the Bergdorf Goodman segment captured feminine attention, but left many ladies wondering how the store manages to lose money on its hats price-tagged at \$175.

Leave It To Beaver has survived for some time now. And with good reason. Basically it deals with the American boy theme explored by Booth Tarkington in "Penrod" and before him, Mark Twain with "Huckleberry Finn" and "Tom Sawyer."

Americans have always found such themes to their liking when well done. And Leave It To Beaver belongs in the "well done" category.

Youngsters can be pretty icky stuff and their antics only a tedious bore to the adult. That Beaver succeeds is due to general all around competence in writing, producing, and casting. A good deal of its success can be put down to the direction of Norman Tokar, who once not too many years ago was known to millions of Americans as Henry Aldrich.

Beaver presents all the difficulties a young man and his brother might get into, but without cloying cliches that often make one wince in viewing a representation of youngsters. Beaver comes through thanks to its natural simplicity and believability.

In discussing Beaver it comes to mind that the pattern of presenting American childhood and youth follows a more or less idealized pattern with a glossing over of many of the realities that deeply affect the child. One has the feeling that many presentations of this kind are written by the adult, who in looking backward, and contrasting youth with older years, finds youth a far happier state. Thus, the picture, no matter how delightful and charming, is often bathed in an aura of nostalgia. There is no doubt that childhood is a period which in retrospect becomes a separate part of existance if for no other reason that it was a world of imaginative creation on the part of the individual. However, it is not a realistic picture, haven of memory though it might be from the grievances, frustrations, and turmoil of the adult.

While childhood might be blessed with innocence and lack of worldy wisdom, it is a world of anxiety, doubt, and terror as a child blindly gropes his way through a jungle of confusion in an attempt to comprehend and grapple with the adult world towering above him. Realistic treatment of childhood has been done at times, but has always been far outweighed by the idealized versions. And perhaps with reason. For it might be just a bit terrifying for most adults to be reminded that childhood was a good deal more than the reverie of it they have created in adulthood.

WOMEN OF THE WORLD

IKE Gertrude Stein's famous rose, a woman is a woman infinitum. Clothing and customs may differ but the love of the female of the species husband and off-spring is universal.

Mrs. Halla Linker, who with her husband, Hal, and son, David, has traveled a quarter of a million miles and has visited thirty-seven countries, can be considered somewhat of an authority on the women of the world. At the offset she made it clearly understood that women the world over have much in common despite outward manifestations in training, tradition, costume and cosmetics.

After establishing this preachment as gospel, Mrs. Linker proceeded to point out the interesting differences in the realm of femininity discovered on her travels. She quickly asserted, as an aside, that perhaps the practices of the Western woman might seem interesting and different to a lady in Lapland or a belle of the Belgian Congo.

An effervescent blonde, Mrs. Linker spoke with an accent which seemed Swedish, an impression she speedily corrected. "I am from Iceland and the language spoken there is Icelandic which," she explained, "is to Swedish what Old English or Anglo-Saxon is to English. You see," she went on, "Iceland was settled by the Vikings and since it was isolated the language has remained much the same as it was when Eric the Red landed there."

Getting back to her subject matter after an interesting but divergent discourse on Icelandic history, Halla described a rather gruesome tradition found in Pakistan. "In the Khyber Pass region a social-religious system called Purdah is practiced. Under this system, women must wear a flowing veil called a Burkah, which covers them from head to toe with only a small slit for the eyes. Under this system, a woman suspected of infidelity (no proof is necessary – suspicion is enough) suffers drastic punishment. Her nose is cut off and she is cast out. I saw many of these cases at the Lahore Hospital in Pakistan." Reporting on a less awesome custom, Mrs. Linker described light-heartedly the household of the N'yimi (King) of the Kakuba tribe in the Belgian Congo. "He has," she said, "400 wives. He chose only 50 of them himself. He inherited 200 from his father and the remaining 150 wives were gifts of the villages in his domain – for it is of great prestige for a village to have one of their local girls become a wife of the King. All of these wives live in a special village where they are guarded," she added with a smile, "by elderly men." From the Belgian Congo, Mrs. Link-

From the Belgian Congo, Mrs. Linker's thoughts wandered to the South Pacific. "Speaking of prestige," she inserted, "in the islands of Polynesia a man's prestige is judged by the weight of his wife. I was very little prestige to Hal when we were there because the natives naturally thought that he was poor and could not afford to feed his wife properly. The chief's wife was very fat indeed – and why not? She was the FIJI ISLAND BEAUTIES were visited by Mrs. Linker on one of her many trips. Mrs. Linker feels that the concept of beauty depends entirely on your viewpoint.

wife of the chief and was a great beauty and a great joy to him.

"Because of the different standards of beauty the world over," Mrs. Linker stated, "international beauty contests are somewhat unfair when judged from a Western point of view. As one example: if the Japanese enter their most beautiful girl, her chances of winning are slim because here a large bust is considered desirable while in Japan the opposite is true. Of course, it would also be unfair for an American girl to be judged by Eastern standards. Beauty, it seems, depends more on your point of view than on cut and dried statistics."

Manners, morals and social demeanor vary with every clime, according to Mrs. Linker, and she proved it by telling of a natural phenomena which exists in Copenhagen, Denmark, that might be frowned on in Southern California. "It is the only place we have found," she said, "where women smoke cigars – publicly."

"I had a certain amount of fan mail, and had been more than a little interested in letters from one particular girl. One night another d.j. with whom I shared an apartment said he'd like me to meet the friend of a girl he was dating. He remarked that his girl was a nurse, and so was her friend Pat. I was immediately intrigued because my fan

mail friend was a nurse by the name of Pat. I went along and the girl *was* my fan. We fell in love and a month later we were married."

After a two-year stay in North Carolina, Sam decided to take a crack at TV, so the Buffingtons moved to New York. Through the slim months while Sam was making the break into TV he developed another artistic talent and became a very good portrait painter. In fact he could have made three times as much money painting portraits as he did acting. He managed, though, to get featured roles on Robert Montgomery Fresents, Armstrong Circle Theatre, Studio One and Kraft Theatre. However, because of the comparatively few shows originating in New York these parts didn't come with sufficient regularity to make it a paying career, so Sam knew he'd either have to concentrate on painting or pull up stakes and move to California where there were more opportunities for actors. The Buffingtons decided to take a gamble and move West.

"We arrived here with \$90 in our pockets," Sam remarked. "For six months I couldn't even get inside a casting office. If it hadn't been for Pat I'd have given up, but she went back to work as an operating room technician and supported me until I got a break."

With Pat's encouragement Sam took the lead in a little theater production, "The Man Who Stopped the City." The play wasn't a success but Sam was. Rave notices brought recognition from some of the top agents. He signed with agent Jessie Wadsworth, which led to character parts in Cheyenne, Maverick, Sugarfoot, Conflict, Alfred Hitchcock, Tombstone Territory, Wells Fargo, G. E. Theater, Studio 57, Wire Service, Matinee Theater and other top TV shows. Soon his Teddy Roosevelt-type mustache became a familiar sight to television viewers and eventually to movie fans. Currently Sam is being seen in character parts in three motion pictures, "Damned Citizen," "Rawhide Trail," and Walt Disney's" Light in the Forest."

SAM AND PAT BUFFINGTON and member of the family, Marlena, their dachshund. Recently acquired to keep Marlena company, is a Siamese cat named Boris, but he refused to pose. Sam and Pat's gamble in coming to Hollywood paid off. Strangely enough, the thing which has made Sam happiest is his return to radio. And the man who says so is Marvin Miller — who gives away a million dollars every week.

ONEY can solve a lot of problems, but by itself it rarely brings true happiness," declared Marvin Miller. In his role as Michael An-

thony, executive secretary to John Beresford Tipton, eccentric philanthropist of CBS-TV's The Millionaire, Marvin has distributed hundreds of million dollar checks over the past three years.

"I would never deny that money can do much good," admitted Marvin. "But I do believe that it is far more important to be an educated person than to be a wealthy one You may possess wealth and not know how to enjoy it well, but if you possess an education your enjoyment comes from within you and you can enrich the lives of other people, though you may have comparitively little money."

While an education should bring greater financial rewards, it is admitted that in our society today some of the professions which do most to improve mankind do not pay as well as some of the semi-skilled trades. Despite lower salaries, however, teachers, scientists, architects, artists and writers are usually happier than the people who gave up the struggle for an education. They have the will to escape mediocrity, the bane of our generation.

"Some years ago my wife, Elizabeth, and I joined a study group based on the 100 greatest books," Marvin said. "We were both college graduates and I thought my reading had been pretty comprehensive, but Elizabeth had concentrated on art and wanted to know more about philosophy and literature. We were amazed at the new directions opened to us, enriching our lives. As a group we tore apart the different works in an attempt to analyze what brings happiness to the individual. We found it was attained in many ways, but the conclusion was that happiness could best be gained by a man or woman who did the thing he most liked to do well. And - most important - received recognition for that job.

"Recognition may come to the inventor or business man in the form of money; to the scientist in honors for having discovered something of benefit to mankind, and to the good homemaker in the warm approval of her husband and her family," Marvin concluded.

and her family," Marvin concluded. As editor of the year book at Grover Cleveland High School in St. Louis years ago, Marvin never dreamed of the recognition he would one day receive. It happened a couple of years ago when he was emceeing a convention of music educators in St. Louis and was invited to visit his old school. He was astonished to be received as if he were Vice President, returning to Whittier! The whole school assembled in the auditorium to greet him, and the climax came when he was presented with the autographed copy of the Beacon Year Book which he had lost during the last semester of his senior year. He doesn't know where they found it, but he was touched by its return and the admonition to be more careful where he left it in the future.

Marvin believes that incentive is the greatest way to convince students of the value of education, and after his return from St. Louis he wanted to do something for the students of his alma mater. Not being a millionaire "for real" he could not afford scholarships, so he decided on three awards a year for outstanding ability in forensics — two for public speaking and one for dramatics. Each student receives a plaque, which appeals to the parents, and a savings bond which is a tangible reward for the student.

Marvin is aware of the struggle for many students to obtain an education because he was able to go on only as the result of a scholarship he won. However, the donor of the scholarship lost his money when Marvin was in his sophomore year, and he had to rely on an alumni loan for his last two years. He accepted the loan, and then got a job as a radio announcer during his spare time in order to repay it. Working and studying hard to keep his grades up, Marvin missed a few social functions but only missed Phi Beta Kappa by a decimal point.

by a decimal point. "Money can get you into college," Marvin commented, "but it can't keep you there if you haven't the desire to learn. Or you can just get by and get a college diploma and still come out without an education

"Education makes everything better because it enables people to understand themselves and other peeople. Through education you can understand your fellow man, and by giving of yourself you can get true fellowship and friends. Education enables you to learn to live well. Even without money we can observe all of the little amenities that make life better. We can surround ourselves with great books, even though they are paper bound editions; we can have pictures on the wall which bring pleasure to us, whether they are origi-nals or copies. In cooking we need not buy the most expensive food, but what we buy can be cooked and served with imagination. The educated person surrounds himself with the things that makes him feel good - little things which to him are luxuries but not necessarily the things which impress other people.

Marvin Miller is sometimes accused of working too hard with all his interests; The Millionaire, his daily CBS-Radio program, The Storyteller, his recording of the Bible, and his public appearances, but he does these things not only to make a living but because he enjoys them. "The point to me is," Marvin emphasized, "that you have to work for all of the things you do in life, whether you get paid for them or not. If you don't count the money, but count the value of your work, more money drops into your lap."

OBBY TROUP is a grateful guy. But he also has his share of gripes about music, musicians, and "all that jazz." "Jazz," according to

"Jazz," according to Webster, is "a type of American music, characterized by melodious themes, subtly syncopated dance rhythms and varied orchestral coloring." However, there's a modern definition of jazz, strictly slang, which has come into use lately. "Jazz," in the vernacular, can mean "almost anything."

Whenever people get stuck for the right word, they throw in "jazz," and solve their verbal problems. Remember during World War II when "gizmo" became popular for explaining anything that was mechanically complicated? Well, "jazz" today fits the same pattern, except it has a broader connotation.

It's not by coincidence, either, that Bobby Troup happens to be an expert in the specific field of American music called jazz. As most local fans know, Bobby has been the host and narrator

on KABC-TV's award-winning program, Stars of Jazz, ever since the show began two years ago.

"One of the big things our program has accomplished, as far as I'm concerned," Bobby comments, "is to show people what musicians are really like. Most of the people on our show have degrees from every major music school and university in the country. And yet the public still thinks musicians are one step above a moron.

"I'll have to admit I get annoyed myself when someone comes up to me and starts giving me the 'groovey' 'daddy-o,' 'I-dig-you-man' routine.

An Example

"I recall just a short time ago when we had Dave Brubeck, one of the finest pianists in the jazz field, on our show. I had a nice chat with Dave on the air – a real learned guy – and at no time did I talk down to him. Then I went home and snapped on my TV set. Oscar Peterson, another terrific jazz pianist, was playing on a network show. Now Oscar is in about the same category as Dave Brubeck. A serious, intelligent musician. Well, you should have heard the way the emcee on this network program talked to Oscar. The emcee kept pouring on that corny, jive talk. I'm quite sure it was unintentional, but it made Oscar look a little silk."

Now don't get the idea from this that Troup himself is a snob and getting a little stuffy and over-sensitive. He isn't. Actually, as most of his close friends know, one of Bobby's greatest shortcomings (at least it was) is his owu inferiority complex. A first class composer, pianist, and with a style of singing all his own, Bobby is a lot better than he really thinks he is.

In addition to his own Channel 7 show, and his faith in the now proven ability of singer Julie London, the most encouraging and remunerative things that have happened to Bobby have been his motion picture work. During the past two years he has written the title songs and several other numbers for the following pictures: "Rock, Pretty Baby;" "The Girl Can't Help It;" "Will Success Spoil Rock Hunter;" "The River's Edge;" "Voice in the Mirror;" "My Strange Affair" (called "A Question of Adultery" in England, which was banned in the United States because the picture deals with artificial insemination); and Bobby's latest, "Man of the West" which stars Gary Cooper.

Turns Thespian

"You know, I even made a picture myself. Jose Ferrer called me. I had met him when Julie played in "The Great Man.' Jose said he had a part which was a natural for me. He's noted for taking non-Hollywood types and giving them good roles. Look what he did with Ed Wynn and dozens of others. I've got the second lead in the picture, which is called "The High Cost of Living.' I'm keeping my fingers crossed and I hope people like it."

Despite his many activities (he's now a business partner with busy Julie London), Bobby's first love (professionally speaking) is playing and talking about music, particularly jazz.

"I made some remarks once on Juke Box Jury, that people still remember. I told them what I really thought about Lawrence Welk. And Jerry Lewis as a singer, too.

"But that's one of my biggest problems. I always tell people exactly what's on my mind. Come to think of it," Bobby reflects, "maybe that's not so bad after all. I'm 40 years old now, you know. My two kids, Cynthia and Ronnie are getting quite grown up. But I've never felt younger or happier in my life. And I don't have any ulcers, either. Maybe it's because I do say what's on my mind, instead of keeping it all inside myself."
