"As American as apple pie, as loving as the Good Samaritan — that is PATSY MONTANA — a great lady, prolific songwriter, fine trouper, tremendous songstress, and one of the most famous of the girl yodelers. Along with Elton Britt, Patsy is usually considered to have made the yodel popular." These words are from the pen of the famous author and composer, Mae Boren Axton.

Award winning Patsy Montana was the first country and western girl singer to sell a million records. The song was her own composition, "I Want To Be A Cowboy Sweetheart."

The personable Patsy who, through three decades has made over 10,000 personal appearances, starred on the WLS National Barndance out of Chicago, done a stint at WOR in New York, guested on WSM Grand Ole Opry, a regular on the Louisiana Hayride, recorded for Columbia, RCA and Decca and now with LOOK Records of London, England. She is a perennial favorite at the fairs and night club circuit.

Patsy is considered a legend in her time and her career has taken her from six weeks in Alaska, Disneyland, every state in the union (not including Hawaii) and recently complated her third tour of England and Europe. She has written over 200 published and recorded songs and her earlier recordings made with the "Prairie Ramblers" are considered collector's items.

Patsy has received 10 awards within the last seven years including the Pioneer Award from the Academy of Country Music. Among her most valued memoirs are awards of merit from three presidents. She was among eight country entertainers chosen to represent country music at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. during our Bicentennial year.

During the last few years Patsy has appeared at many colleges and universities including Moreley College in London, England.

Among Patsy's souveniers are the four wonderful days that she rode shot-gun on a stage coach with Montie Montana across the beautiful plains of Montana in 1975 camping out under the stars with coyoties howling in the distance.

Patsy has appeared in movies with Gene Autry and recently completed a documentary film on country music for BFA Studios, Hollywood, California.

Patsy is married to Paul E. Rose and the mother of two daughters and resides in Long Beach, CA. Patsy is very proud of her daughter Judy Rose who is making a name for herself in the singing field.

"Deep Within My Heart Lies A Melody," goes the old Bob Wills song, and when set to twin fiddles, rhythm guitar and a pedal steel, the legendary sound of Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys was again "ON THE AIR!" at the Palomino Club when Asleep At The Wheel delivered a recent smash performance.

Active on the country circuit for several years now, Asleep takes the upbeat, happy spirit of the Texas Swing Band that revolutionized Country Music during the dark days of the Depression, mixes it with Country Standards, a little Boogie, a lot of Gospel, and has produced the award-winning sound that plays to packed houses all across the country.

The Lone Star Beer and Bob Wills' Music was just a side benefit for me, though, since I had come to see their lead female singer, Capitol Recording Artist Chris O'Connell. I had been absolutely captivated with Chris' style since first hearing her sing "Where No One Stands Alone" on one of their earliest albums and I then became determined to bring her individual status to the attention of our Academy members.

In this day of a tremendous amount of supurb country talent, it's still unusual to find, in one person, a combination of great song-writing ability, a near-perfect voice, with the drive to form a music company, get top musicians together, write the material, and produce a complete album, including writing the liner notes himself. But Denny Tymer did just that, and here's a young man who is destined to make a big impact on the world of country music very soon.

Denny is a native Kansan, and spent several years performing in clubs and lounges in Nebraska, The Dakotas, Minnesota, Michigan, and other areas of the Midwest. But the lure of California sunshine, coupled with the popularity of country music here, brought Denny to out midst about five years ago. He performs five nights a week, Tuesday through Saturday in the Flying Bridge Room at the Bridge Motor Inn at Oceanside, California. A few months ago, the Academy was fortunate enough to acquire Denny as a member, and Denny hopes to become acquainted with as many members as possible. He says he loves the country music business and the people that

make it all happen.

Last summer, he went to Nashville and produced his own album, titled, "It's About Tymer" - and what an album this is. He also formed his own record company, WILWIN RECORDS (believe me, Denny will win), and the Tymer Music Company. He gathered the finest musicians Nashville has people such as "Pig" Robbins on piano, Bobby Thompson on rhythm guitar, Peter Drake on steel, Charlie McCoy on harmonica, among other top names,

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plus The Nashville Edition and The Lea Jane Singers as vocal accompaniment. Denny wrote all 10 numbers on the album, except one, which was co-written with Monte Marcoe, and produced the entire album. The back photo on the album jacket is even a self-portrait! Now you might think this gentleman is a "Jack of all trades and master of none," but you are very wrong. He's a master in all these endeavors, for this is one of the most beautiful albums I've ever heard. I'll give a brief review of it later. Denny is delighted that Chuck Sullivan is airing this fantastic work on KLAC, as well as other D.J.'s throughout the nation. Denny was Jay Lawrence's guest star on The Best In The West Show on March 19. He also appeared at the recent Radio/thon for Leukemia at the Palladium. Denny works whenever possible to help others, in benefits such as "Toys For Tots." He often sells his album at benefits and donates all the proceeds to a favorite charity. We are most fortunate to find this talented young man in our midst with a budding career, yet who takes time to help the less fortunate people along the way, and to make friends with his fans. ANDY AND THE SWINGERS

One would think that the Ottawa Valley would be a difficult market in which to make it in the country music field, situated as it is at the junction of English and French Canada. But for one area native, its been a rewarding experience. Andy Drouin or Orleans, a predominantly francophone community, has been singing and playing his fiddle and guitar on the valley circuit for 24 years now, since he was only 19 years of age.

He's been something of a hit on both sides of the Ontario-Quebec border, especially with his new group, "Andy And The Swingers," a quartet formed about two years ago, which also includes local boys Joe Paquette, 27, on lead and bass; Leo Nelson, 30, rhythm and vocals and Ray Laverne, also 27, on drums.

Andy is the lead singer, performing in both English and French, although he admits, he leans to the traditional American country songs. "English Canadians" he noted "don't take to French country music as well as Quebeckers take to English songs. Too much French," he says wistfully, "kills the audience."

He says he likes the old tunes — his heroes are Ray Price and Hank Williams — but he prefers the new beat, describing the Swingers' rhythms as "country rock."

"The old stuff is too sad," he says, "a hotel crowd likes to stamp its feet." Another indication that Andy and the Swingers move with the times is Andy's use of comedy in his sets.

Andy has thought on occasion about making records . . . he even wrote a number once that he was sure could have been a hit single with the right promotion, entitled "Canadian Skidooers," but a salesman by profession, he says his music is mostly a hobby and he's content doing gigs close to home .

Saturday in Oceanside and catch his act. You'll be glad you did.

"It's About Tymer" WLWn 20001 Stereo

(also available in stereo 8 track or cassette)

In my humble opinion, every song in this album is excellent.

Side A contains: (cover me with your) BLANKET OF LOVE. This could very well become a hit, with terrific lyrics, set to beautiful background music and sung with clarity and meaning.

ALONE is nice, easy listening.

WE'RE LIVING IN HARMONY is a bouncy tune, very pretty, and I like the good enunciation. D.J.'s should like this one, too.

KEEP POLISHING ME, BABY is another one I would pick to hit. Charlie McCoy's harmonica stands out delightfully here.

I'D DO ANYTHING FOR YOU is simply a beautiful pure country ballad that sounds much like Marty Robbins. The take-off is especially nice. As I see it, Denny's voice is a cross between Marty Robbins and Jim Reeves, which puts him in very heavy company.

Side B: EASY TO SAY GOODBYE is o.k. — I think people appreciate simple

lyrics that tell a story.

SUNSHINE GIRL is one that Denny is excellent on, and fans of Charlie Rich would like this, since it's definitely in the "easy listening" class.

(you prove them wrong) TIME AND TIME AGAIN. Heavy lyrics, great — pure country at it's best, and could become a big hit.

I'D WANT TO BE A PART OF THE SAME is such a pretty love song. If this doesn't get the girl — nothing will!

I HOPE I HIT THE TRAFFIC LIGHTS ALL GREEN. This is my favorite of all. Disc jockeys, take note — if you like "country," you'll love this one. I's pure country, with a message, and a bouncy country beat that could easily establish Denny as a nationally known artist.

I listen to literally hundreds of singles and albums, but this one has some especially excellent material, sung by Denny, who's voice is, in my opinion, one of the best anyplace. There's not a dirty song or suggestive lyrics in this album.

Eddie was a great songwriter and a gentleman, he was one of the original members of the Academy of Country Music, he will be missed by all those who had the privilege of knowing him.

SONNY JAMES IN PRISON IN PERSON



NASHVILLE — Columbia Records has announced that Sonny James' forthcoming album was recently recorded at The Tennessee State Prison. With this special album project, James will participate in a recording industry first: the album's session musicians are exclusively inmates of a prison. James will be the only non-inmate musician appearing on his album. To be entitled, "Sonny James In Prison In Person," James and his "Tennessee State Prison Band recorded the entire Ip within the walls of that institution. The album project was conceptulized during one of the Columbia artist's visits to the prison. Through Warden Vinson Thompson, James discovered numerous inmates who had musical abilities. He agreed to perform at the prison if a group of the inmates would join him as musicians during that appearance. Rehearsals followed. James believed the concept album was feasible. Commenting upon this industry first James stated: "I've rarely enjoyed myself more than during the rehearsals we've had with these musicians once they knew we were planning to make this album. The genuine feeling and locale should be involving for the participants and listeners alike." "Sonny James In Prison In Person" is scheduled for release in May.

zine article on a so-called Country/Pop "Superstar." I soon found that there are, indeed, two kinds of talent - some are manufactured by expensive promotional campaigns and the resulting entertainers are, therefore, very fragile, unapproachable, bionic and, in a word, professional phonies. Then there are the "natural talents," and these are the people who can stand up against any situation, who can sing in a club on short notice, without the necessity of over dubbing, canned applause tracks and other mechanical gimmicks. Chris is one of these - a natural talent. She's had no formal vocal training and delivers her message from her heart - every timbre in her voice and every movement on stage shows that she is a classic professional because she involves her total self in her words and

Despite six years of whirlwind touring, estimated at in excess of 1/2 million road miles, Chris has managed to retain not only her stamina but also her enthusiasm and her down home congeniality. Originally from Arlington, Virginia, a hardly countrified suburb of the Nation's Capital, Chris and another girl formed a group and played local shows while still in high school. After graduation, she spent a few restless months doing ordinary kinds of things and then stumbled upon an ad in the Washington paper — a country group was looking for a female lead singer. This seemed to be a Godsend. Her hopes were shattered, however, when she found that they had already begun negotiations with a wandering, wispy Alabama girl named Emmylou Harris but she auditioned anyway, just to make the trip worthwhile. In true story book fashion, Chris and her \$13 guitar were hired on the spot. The group soon adopted the name Asleep At The Wheel, moved on to "an old shack in West Virginia" then to Northern California, and finally settled down in Austin. Austin was not only a central Country-circuit location for them but was, I think, the unwitting birthplace of their now famous blend of Uptown Country Music.

Chris picks a little banjo but she is

primarily featured on rhythm guitar and shares the vocal lead spot with Ray Benson, a true showman and musical genius. Although she is a talented writer, she prefers to spend her free time interpreting music, so, as she told me, "when I sing it I want it to sound different than ever before." And so, she places herself in her songs, she lives her music. And, in this most intimate style, she captures your heart and mind she shares with you, her awe of the place "Where No One Stands Alone." and you encounter, with her, the feeling that underlies "Last Letter." These and other classics are Chris', now and forever, because, with her soulful interpretation, she has captivated their feeling. And, as she had hoped, she has delivered them like they had never been sung before.

I believe that an entertainer, a good one like my friend Chris, is a very sensitive person, inspired by all she has

seen, all she has touched, all she has heard, and all she has felt. Chris says that she was inspired most of all by Patsy Cline, one of the most sensitive Country singers of all, and by the early works of Loretta Lynn, Connie Smith, Dinah Washington, and Helen Humes, Count Basie's replacement for Billie Holliday. Oh Yes, I can perhaps detect some part of all these greats when I study Chris carefully. But there is no one like Chris. For Chris is inspired by all she has touched and she has touched the soul of everyone she has met. And, if I dare say, as she offers the inspirational "Where No One Stands Alone" she seems to reach out to touch the very outstretched hand of God himself.

I learned a lot from Chris that evening - about our music, about the supposedly glamorous but hectic life inside a private coach during a long tour of one night stands. I'd met a totally unaffected young girl who has dedicated her life to Country Music. A girl who can beat me silly at pinball. A girl who I hope I talked out of taking "just one or two singing lessons." A "down-home" girl who blushed when she told me that her once skeptical parents are "so proud" of her. A girl who asked me to ask you to help us "Keep it Country" -Please, let's not ever lose it." A humble, down to earth, down-home superstar who brought the house down that night this is what I experienced and this is Chris O'Connell.

PRIDE, DAVE & SUGAR PROMOTION TOUR HUGE SUCCESS

RCA Record artists Charley Pride and Dave & Sugar have just completed a three-day, three-city promotion tour. The tour to Chicago, Cleveland and Atlanta, was made to acquaint radio station personnel, from all formats, and retail and press representatives with Charley Pride and Dave & Sugar's music. Charley also took this opportunity to present selections from his latest RCA lp, "She's Just An Old Love Turned Memory," that includes the chart-soaring title song (which shot to the #1 spot in the billboard country charts the week the tour was in progress), as well as Charley's last #1 hit, "A Whole Lotta Things To Sing About." Coincidentally, Dave & Sugar's latest single, "Don't Throw It All Away," reached the #8 spot on Billboard's country charts the same week, and has also entered Billboard's "easy listening" charts.

The three-city tour began in Chicago where Charley appeared on ABC-TV's "AM Chicago." He later visited radio stations WJJD and WMAQ with Dave & Sugar. WVON, Chicago's r&b station, after seeing Charley on "AM Chicago," requested Charley visit their station. The result was a half-hour on-the-air interview and the playing of two cuts,

("The Hunger" and "Get Up Off Your Good Intentions") from Charley's latest album, on the air. Later that evening a cocktail reception was held at the Starlight Inn, where Charley and Dave & Sugar met and entertained representatives of various radio stations, retail accounts and members of the press.

The second and third days of the promotion were spent in Cleveland and Atlanta, where Charley and Dave & Sugar spent the daylight hours visiting radio stations and doing interviews, and the evenings performing in the miniconcerts. Representatives from radio stations, retail record accounts and the press, were present at Cleveland's mini-concert, which was held in the main ballroom of the Marriott Inn.

Atlanta's mini-concert at Le Fevre Studios was video taped by WSB-TV for a 1-hour documentary on Charley and Dave & Sugar. Present in Atlanta were representatives of the national press, local and regional radio stations, and local and regional record accounts.

Following the Atlanta concert, the complete Pride show left Le Fevre's Studios in police escorted limos to perform before 2,000 people at a birthday party for Georgia's Lt. Gov. Zell Miller, at the Silver Saddle Club.

Charley was so pleased with the success of the promotion tour, he decided to accompany Dave & Sugar to Denver, where they were scheduled to appear at the 4th annual Cinderella City-KERE Radio Country Fair. Over 10,000 people at the Cinderella Shopping Center were treated to an unscheduled surprise appearance by Charley. The overwhelming reception Charley and Dave & Sugar received in Chicago, Cleveland and Atlanta, was repeated in Denver, giving a fitting ending to a most successful 4 days.
