





For the winners, tonight does mean promises kept and expectations fulfilled. For the losers and non-contenders, we hope that the evening does inspire new pledges and fresh dreams.



MARTY LANDAU

Marty Landau started out, with few exceptions, as did most of us. That is, he dabbled in a few occupations until he decided that he'd like to try staging a show. From that point on, Marty Landau became synonymous with music. His first triumphs came during the B.B. era, with the presentation of Harry James, Glen Miller, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey, and many others.

At the peak of the big-band era, people began to talk of big stirrings in country and western music. A little-known group named Bob Wills and The Texas Playboys caught Marty's attention and he proceeded to set up a concert tour that proved to be successful and, quite possible, was the turning in the band's career.

Becoming increasingly enamored of country music, Marty purchased the Riverside Rancho Dancehall in 1946 and remodeled it into an exclusive Country and Western music hall complete with 10,000 square feet of dancing space and three bars. Unfortunately, the Rancho later burned down. Not one to stand still, Marty closed a deal with the Grand Ole Opry whereby he would book a California tour for one performer a month. This too, was very successful.

All of this combined experience gave Marty the opportunity to work with some of the biggest names in country music history: T. Texas Tyler, Spade Cooley, Billy Hills and Tex Williams.

But perhaps the artist most associated with Marty Landau is this year's master of ceremonies, Marty Robbins. Through some 15 years of strategic booking, Marty Landau was of great assistance to the career of Marty Robbins.

Marty Robbins, T. Texas Tyler, Tex Williams and many others are truly indebted to the memory of Marty Landau and what he did for them as individual performers and, especially, for the promotion of country music.

In loving appreciation of Marty Landau, the Academy of Country Music created the Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund. The fund resulted from the combined contributions of Chairman of the Board David Skepner, President Bill Boyd, past Chairman of the Board Rick Landy, and past President Cliffie Stone. The fund provides financial assistance to performers, song writers and others who, in time of need, can benefit from such assistance.

We are also pleased to again announce that all proceeds from the Academy of Country Music Celebrity Golf Tournament will directly benefit the Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund for the third year in a row.

THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL AWARDS SHOW

One year after the inception of the Academy of Country Music, it was decided that not only should the appreciation of country music be encouraged; its creators and interpreters should be similarly treated. Therefore, a program of annual awards was conceived.

The categories were created so as to acknowledge as many individuals as possible and thus to account for the diversity of roles in the promotion of country music, e.g., musicians, bookers, disc jockeys, radio and television personatlities, nightclub owners and many more.

The first awards ceremony was held in 1966 at the Hollywood Palladium to an SRO audience. During the next nine years, similar crowds jammed the Beverly Hilton Hotel, the Century Plaza Hotel and the John Wayne Theatre at Knott's Berry Farm. And now, as last year, the Awards Show holds forth at the Hollywood Palladium.

We are pleased that, for the third consecutive year, the Annual Awards Show is going to be video-taped and will air on ABC's Wide World of Entertainment on Monday, March 1.

The evening's activies will commence at 6:00 p.m. with cocktails, followed by dinner and the local awards at 6:30 p.m. and the show will begin at 8:00 p.m. We are proud to announce that Marty Robbins is our Master of Ceremonies for tonight's show. An impressive array of talent will entertain: Loretta Lynn, Conway Twitty, Tom T. Hall, Billy "Crash" Craddock, Jerry Clower, Crystal Gayle and Country Current, a seven-piece country group comprised of U.S. Navy personnel. Country Current will be featured as part of the Academy's Bicentennial salute.

Our guest star presenters include: Jimmy Wakely, Mickey Gilley, Mel Tillis, the host of the "Hollywood Squares," Peter Marshall, and the "Bionic Woman," Lindsay Wagner.

It is a deeply-felt honor that the Academy has been graced by the collective talent and creativeity of the fine artists showcased tonight and we wish to convey our extreme gratitude to these individuals. Not only will the Academy benefit; the Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund will also be greatly enhanced by this evening.





Marty Robbins

Marty Robbins



Columbia recording artist Marty Robbins is well known as a successful country singer and songwriter. He has also appeared in motion pictures and has shown himself to be an impressive actor. In addition, Marty is a noted stock car racer and he was, in his earlier days, an amateur boxer.

Robbins has commanded a large following in the country music field for over two decades. From a seemingly inexhaustible fund of creativity has come some 600 songs of his own composition, among them such standards as "El Paso," "A White Sport Coat And A Pink Carnation," "Devil Woman," "Begging To You," "Don't Worry" and "My Woman, My Woman, My Wife."

Born September 26 in Arizona to Polish-born Jack Robinson and the former Emma Heckle (whose own mother was a full-blooded Piute Indian), Marty was first exposed to music through his father who sang and played the harmonica. But it was Marty's discovery of Gene Autry that really shaped Marty's future. Gene Autry and his singing westerns sparked an early desire in Robbins to ride that same movie range and sing around the campfire. To earn money for admission to local theatres, Marty would rise before dawn, walk ten miles to pick cotton, then walk back the

same distance to plunk down his silver at the boxoffice. When there wasn't cotton to pick, Marty earned money by shining shoes, mowing lawns and working in grocery stores.

While still in high school, Marty began boxing. He continued after enlisting in the Navy in 1943 and in all he participated in about 70 amateur fights. It was in the Marty started singing.

Marty saw action in the Pacific Theatre of War for three years. Boredom was rampant aboard ship and Marty performed for his shipmates. When he had exhausted his repertoire of standard country songs, he made up his own.

When he returned to civilian status, Marty abandoned earlier ideas of a professional boxing career in favor of music. He went through no fewer than eight singing jobs in six months. It was only when he was engaged as a guitar player in a Phoenix night club that he showed any staying power. When a featured singer failed to show up one night, Marty was pressed into service and was something of a sensation. Word about Marty spread and soon he had a radio program of his own. He also did a 15-minute television show.

Marty's recording activity began in 1952 when Little Jimmy Dickens, a "Grand Ole Opry" star, appeared on Robbins' television show and then recommended Robbins to Columbia Records. Marty's first single, "Love Me Or Leave Me Alone," was soon on the market. Marty went to Nashville to perform at the Grand Ole Opry and, after one guest shot, became a regular in 1953. His late show appearances have packed that auditorium ever since.

In 1957 Robbins' first album, "The Song of Robbins," brought him national fame. Unwilling to play it safe, he chose to record "Song Of The Islands" as a follow-up album and astonished his fans with an authentic Polynesian sound. Marty's hit singles were then issued as "Marty's Greatest Hits." Recently, "Marty's Greatest Hits, Volume III" was released. No fewer than 14 of his singels have been number one on the country and western charts. Among his many honors are gold records, Golden Guitars, 25 BMI Citations of Achievement and awards from Billboard, Cashbox and Record World, among them the Triple Crown Award.

In 1961 Marty began attedning stock car races at a dirt track north of Nashville. As his enthusiasm mounted, he decided to try his skill as a speedster himself. A local garage built a race car for him and after six weeks, Robbins, to his own amazement, broke all existing speed records on the dirt track. In 1968 Robbins drove in the National 500 at the Charlotte Motor Speedway, finishing 12th with a speed of 144 mph. In 1972, he qualified on the High Speed Grand National Circuit and was named Rookie of the Southern 500. Other races in which Robbins has shown his mettle are the Lone Star 500 at College Station, Texas, the Firecracker 400 at the Daytona Speedway, the Alabama 500 at Talladega, the 1971 Southern 500 at Darlington, South Carolina (in which he finished 7th) and the Miller 500 at Ontario Speedway, California (where he came in 8th). Marty terms as the "highlight of my career" a 50 lap race against Bobby and Donnie Allison and Red

Farmer in Nashville. Running a big 426 engine without weight restrictions, Marty led the field until a hot tire slowed him down.

Of his racing, Robbins says, "If I'm in the top 25, I consider myself real lucky. I just want to make the race. That's what I love, driving against these fellows. Nobody likes the idea of my racing except me. My wife, my doctor, my agent and all my friends think I'm crazy but I just can't resist the urge to race. If I were afraid of something happening to me, I'd get in a closet and forget about life."

The singer-composer has no intention of letting his racing fever get the upper hand. Priority is still assigned to his career as an artist.

Marty spends what little spare time he has with his wife, Marizona Baldwin, at their ranch in Franklin, Tennessee. Marty, with the help of a tenant, takes care of a herd of black Angus cattle, grows corn and bales hay. Marty and Marizona have two children, Ronny and Janet. Ronny Robbins, who elected to follow in his father's footsteps, has embarked on a singing career of his own. Janet is an accomplished pianist, but has given no indication of any show business inclinations.



THE PIONEER AND JIM REEVES MEMORIAL AWARDS

The Board of Directors of the Academy of Country Music have designated two special honors for those individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the state of country music.

The Pioneer Award is given to the outstanding pioneer in the field of country music. The award, which is not necessarily bestowed on an annual basis, is given to an individual who has participated in the history of country music.

Past recipients include: "Uncle Art" Satherly, Bob Wills. Tex Ritter, Patsy Montana, Bob Nolan, Stuart Hamlin, Cliffie Stone, Gene Autry and Hank Williams.

The Jim Reeves Memorial Award is given to an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, for outstanding contribution to the worldwide acceptance of country music during the preceding calendar year. Past winners include: Joe Allison, Bill Boyd, Roy Rogers, Thurston Moore and Sam Louvello.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ACADEMY OF COUNTRY MUSIC

The individuals that comprise the Board of Directors of the Academy of Country Music represent a wide crosssection of professionals in the country music field, but they share a definite unanimity of purpose when it comes to the promotion and appreciation of country music.

The officers of the Academy are as follows: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. The Academy meets the first Monday of each month and members with business are always welcome."

Individuals from the following occupational categories are represented on the Board of Directors: Advertising/Radio and TV sales, Artist/Entertainer, Club Operator. Composer, Disc Jockey, Manager/Booker, Musician/Band Leader/Instrumentalist, Radio/TV/Motion Picture, Promotion, Record Company, Publications, and Music Publisher.

The President of the Academy is Bill Boyd with David Skepner as Chairman of the Board. Ben Sussman is legal counsel and executive secretary to the Board is Fran Boyd, who also heads the Academy office.

Of the 24 awards presented at the show, three are voted on by country music promotion people and by the major music trade publications. They are: Country Music Nightclub of the Year, Radio Station of the Year, and Radio Disc Jockey of the year. The musicians that comprise the Academy All-star Band are selected by the respective categories of musician/band leader/instrumentalist and artists. The remaining honors are voted by the general membership of the Academy of Country Music.



TIPS ON PLAYING THE VALENCIA GOLF COURSE

The Valencia Golf Course was designed by Robert Trent Jones and opened in 1965. One of Mr. Jones' architectural traits is large undulating greens which are surrounded by sand traps and water hazards. He did not deviate from this pattern when designing the Valencia Golf Course as there are 108 sand traps and 8 holes in which water comes into play. Consequently, accuracy is a prime ingredient for scoring well. Following is my analysis of playing "Big Valencia"

No. 1. 496 yards. The first hole is one of the shorter par-5's on the golf course. It requires a straight tee shot, then a 3 wood or a long iron for the second. If not on the green in two, you are just a short pitch away. I enjoy playing a course where the player has an opportunity to

score well on the first hole.

No. 2. 357 yards. A good par-4. Don't let the yards fool you. A good tee shot leaves you with an 8 or 9 iron for the second shot. But, this green is well bunkered to the right and back with a large lake to the left and left-front of green.

No. 3. 363 yards, par-4, dog-legs right. You must hit the tee shot down the middle of the fairway. A large fairway bunker on the right side can penalize the player who tries to cut-off the dog-leg. This leaves an 8 or 9 iron second shot

to a very well trapped and undulating green.

No. 4. 382 yard, par-4. Slight dog-leg right. You must try to hit your tee shot in the right center of the fairway, trying again to stay away from the fairway bunker on the right. This will help to open the green for your second shot with a seven or eight iron.

No. 5. 204 yards. One of the first of four great par threes requires a fairway wood or long iron. It is guarded

by a trap left, two to right and one in the back.

No. 6. 513 yard, par-5. Dog-leg right. No percentage in trying to cut any yards off the dog-leg. A good tee shot in the center of the fairway, then a 4 or 5 iron for your second laying up short of the lake, then an easy wedge shot. Long hitters may gamble on carrying the lake or threading the ball between the lake and bunkers with their 2nd shot.

No. 7. 183 yards. This par-3 requires a good 3 or 4 iron. It is 175 yard carry across water, with a narrow green and two huge sand traps in the back. One must be careful on

this one!

No. 8. 450 yards. A challenging par-4, possibly the toughest on the golf course. You must hit a good drive in the left center of the fairway in order to get your second shot to the green using a 3 wood or long iron. This hole generally plays into prevailing wind. The green is guarded

by three traps on the left and one on the right.

No. 9. 546 yards. The best of the par-5's. The hole plays into the wind and uphill with out-of-bounds right. With your tee shot you will be approximately half-way up the hill, which now leaves a 2nd shot with a 3 wood AND an uphill lie. You are trying to carry over a valley. Normally, it requires an outstanding second shot to accomplish this. Usually a 5 or 6 iron is hit to the green.

You have just finished nine holes. Time for refreshment

and the chance to purchase more golf balls.

No. 10. 513 yards. Somewhat of a "breather" par-5 with out-of-bounds right but it plays downwind. With a good drive, your second shot with a 3 wood should be slightly to the right of the green. This will enable you to hit your 3rd shot with a pitching wedge to the green, being very careful to stay away from the bunkers on the right and left of the green.

No. 11. 392 yard, par-4. A dog-leg left, out-of bounds left and lake to the right. Approx. 75 yds from the tee is a huge eucalyptus tree. Thus, you must hit the ball with a slight hook around the tree. This leaves a second shot with a

6 or 7 iron to an elevated green.

No. 12. 226 yd., par-3 hole to remember! Rated as one of the Southland's toughest. A large lake in front that parallels the entire right side of the green. Your carry must be 180 yards. Two giant traps guard the left side of the green. What should you use? A driver or a three wood and good luck!

No. 13. 390 yd., par-4. A slight dog-leg right. A good tee shot down the center of the fairway staying away from several fairway traps on the right side leaves a 6 or 7 iron

to the green.

No. 14. 354 yd., par-4. Sounds short? Not so! Dog-leg right, out-of-bounds left. Must hit the driver down the middle of the fairway staying away from fairway bunkers on the right-hand side. Your second shot leaves you with an 8 or 9 iron to a narrow elevated green that is protected by several big sand traps.

No. 15. 414 yd., par-4. Good dog-leg right with a large trap to the left and lake to the right. The tee shot must favor the left side of the fairway. Be careful: You can reach both the bunker and the lake off the tee. The second shot into the prevailing wind is with a 3 or 4 iron, avoiding the water on the right which extends up to the front of the green that is also well trapped on the left.

No. 16. 172 yds. Probably the easiest of the par-3's. Water extends along the right side of the green and there are 2 giant traps to the left. This hole is slightly downwind

and requires either a 3, 4 or 5 iron.

No. 17. 352 yd., par-4. Dog-leg right with lake on right, trapped on left, and out-of-bounds left. Caution to the player: You should hit a long iron or 4 wood off the tee. A faded shot can reach the lake on right. 7 or 8 iron to the green.

No. 18. 490 yds. Short par-5. Hitting the driver in the center of the fairway avoiding bunkers left and right. Your 3 wood second shot will now leave you just short pitch

away from the green.

Hitting shots on the line and distance I've described above should enable you to record a 73 - par at "Big V". Oops! Forgot an important part of the game: reading and putting the big undulating greens. But that's another (unwritten) chapter.

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The Academy Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow

In 1964, formal organizational papers were drawn to form the Academy of Country Music—an international organization whose primary goal is to promote the continuing growth and appreciation of country music. Headquartered in Hollywood, California, the Academy of Country Music provides an avenue whereby the ever-increasing number of country-oriented artists in the West can meet on a regular basis to discuss matters of common interest.

Since its conception, the Academy membership has evolved and expanded to its present make-up, including a broad cross-section of representatives of the country music field: artists and entertainers, club operators, composers, disc jockeys, managers, musicians, publishers, record company executives, and others in allied areas.

The Academy of Country Music maintains excellent relationships with the other organizations throughout the world who support country music. For example, there is no competition between the Academy and the Country Music Association in Nashville—many members of the Academy are also members of the CMA.

Membership fees for the Academy are \$5 per year for general members, \$15 per year for professional members, \$100 per year for corporate memberships and \$150 for life-time memberships.


General Membership meetings are held in Los Angeles and are called by the president on a monthly basis. A brief business meeting is followed by entertainment, featuring one or more of the performers who belong to the Academy. The Board of Directors meet on the first Monday of each month. Members with business to bring before the Board are always welcome.

Dues, and any other funds raised by the Academy, are used to support the organization's activities. Since the Academy is chartered as a non-profit organization by the laws of the State of California, the monthly newsletter, membership cards and the annual trophies, plaques and awards, which are purchased, are made possible through the membership fees.

Another purpose of the Academy of Country Music, in addition to promoting the appreciation of country music, is to have specific goals that they deemed important to realize. One of the first goals was to establish The Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund—a fund created to provide financial assistance to Academy members in time of need. Now in its third year of existence, The Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund is growing from the funds received from last year's Celebrity Golf Tournament and Awards Show, and will continue to grow from the funds received from the third Annual Celebrity Golf Tournament at Valencia and the Eleventh Annual Awards Show, as well as other specified concerts.

The Academy's goals for the future include plans to increase the activities of the Academy and to expand the membership, thereby ensuring that the Academy becomes an even stronger international organization for the promotion of country music. In 1976, the Academy is planning another Country Music Day at Dodger Stadium. For 1977, the Academy is planning a Country Music Week centered around the Awards show, featuring seminars, some of which will be led by the current Academy President, Bill Boyd. 1977 will also see a general membership drive, with the general public as the focal point.

All proceeds from the tournament will go to the Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund, which provides assistance to Academy members.


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
