#### Your Hosts For The Evening:

#### Barbara Mandrell

Born in Houston on Christmas Day, 1948. Barbara Mandrell learned to read music before she could read the English language. At age five her mother began teaching her to play the 24 bass accordion, and Barbara has not stopped singing and playing since. "The biggest problem", says Barbara's dad and personal manager Irby Mandrell, "was to get her not to practice. We had to force her to go outside and play with other kids".

Barbara's first job took her to Chicago and a musical instrument trade fair, Joe Maphis heard Barbara play and insisted she go with him to Las Vegas to perform on his show there. Since that time Barbara has been able to spend very little time off stage. She not only sings but plays steel guitar, banjo, saxaphone and electric bass in the course of a show.

A self-admitted extrovert, Barbara reveres the feeling of being on stage in front of audiences in any kind of arena, from fairgrounds to the Felt Forum. But merely being in front of audiences is not enough. She believes in giving her fans 100% of the entertainment they pay to see, and she is never satisfied in giving anything less.





#### Roy Clark

Country music superstar Roy Clark is a man of so many talents spanning so many mediums that a reviewer once said of him, "The only critical remark I can think of is that Roy's dancing could possibly improve".

The man is a master musician, relying predominately on guitar, 12 string acoustic, banjo and fiddle, although he can "get by" on five others. "Boy can he play." noted guitar designer Leo Fender has been quoted as saying, "If you listen to him play anything, then you can have some concept of what the guitar can do."

Roy records hit songs for the MCA Label; he composes string instrumentals; he is a much sought-after guest on major network and syndicated television shows and specials. Roy is also a pioneer, he was one of the first to establish country music as a popular and highly successful attraction along the Las Vegas strip, and now plays the main showroom of the Frontier Hotel 12 weeks each year. He is the first country music performer ever to be enshrined in the world famous Movieland Wax Museum in Buena Park, California, and is the first country music artist ever to headline his own show in the Soviet Union during an unprecedented three week concert tour there in 1976.

Things weren't always first class for Roy Clark, at least not career wise, like everyone else he paid his dues working small, smokey clubs, an opening act for more established artists, sideman for others. Winning the nations Country Music Banjo Championship at the age of 16, coming back the following year to win it again and a special guest appearance at Nashville's Grand

Ole Opry whetted Roy's appetite for a musical career.

His aspirations proved a winner, as awards and honors for his achievements have been lavish. Voted Entertainer of the Year in the same year by the Country Music Association and the Academy of Country Music (twice in succession from the ACM), he has held the title of Country Music Star from the American Guild of Variety Artists. In 1975 Roy joined other special personalities when a "star" was set on his behalf on Hollywood Boulevard's famous Walk of Fame.

Roy has been honored by the Tulsa, Oklahoma Board of Education having an elementary school named for him and has received the Spirit of Life Award from the City of Hope because of his various humanitarian endeavors, including support of the Childrens Medical Center of Tulsa which receives proceeds from the annual Roy Clark Celebrity Golf Classic.

Roy Clark is also a pilot, operating from the left front seat of his Mitsubishi prop jet that whisks him from one concert date to the next, 250 annually. He's a radio broadcaster, a photographer, a boat captain, a gentleman rancher, an outdoorsman, a horse racing enthusiast (particularly when it involves a winner from his stable), a businessman and even a President of Roy Clark's Dieter's Choice, the new line of weight control foods.

We of the Academy of Country Music are proud to have this "superstar" as one of our hosts for this evening's show.




#### **Dennis Weaver**

If one had to select a single word to describe Dennis Weaver, perhaps "commitment" would be the most appropriate.

Dennis Weaver is a man with strong beliefs; religious, social, political and moral. That is not to say that he considers himself to be a paragon of virtue. His undeniable success must partially be attributed to his inner strength and a sense of commitment he brings to every endeavor.

Weaver made two roles his own — the immortal and Emmy winning Chester, sidekick to James Arness' Matt Dillon, who



limped through the first nine years of "Gunsmoke", and the tall walking marshal from Taos, New Mexico, "McCloud". A work-aholic, Weaver wasted no time bemoaning the cancellation of "McCloud", after seven successful years. "Although it's interesting to note the show was the sixth most popular in the country the week it was cancelled", he recalls wonderingly. Dennis has just completed one of the busiest periods of his professional career totaling an incredible 23 hours of programing over all three major television networks during the 1978-79 season.

Weaver's versatility as an actor has been firmly established through the many diverse roles he's played and has given wing to his considerable singing, song writing and comedic abilities which he has demonstrated on such shows as "Hee Haw", "The Flip Wilson Show", "The Sonny and Cher Comedy Hour". And, he has appeared on several talk shows including multiple appearances on "The Tonight Show" and "Dinah".

Dennis was born and brought up in Joplin, Mo. He was a top-flight athlete during his high school and college days and divided his time almost equally between his dramatic studies and sports. He set many football and track field records, some of which remain unbroken to this day. He was hailed as one of the Midwests top high school athletes. He spent a year at Joplin Junior College before he decided to interrupt his education and join the Naval Reserve. He was discharged as an ensign after 27 months in the Navy Air Force.


Dennis resumed his education by enrolling at Oklahoma University. It was the first time in seven years that this school had a man who could qualify in the decathlon and Weaver led his college squad to national championships and to first place honors in all competition with other Midwestern universities.

In 1948, Dennis represented his school at the New York tryouts for the Olympic games and placed sixth in the nation out of 36 entrants. While at Oklahoma University, Dennis managed to maintain an active participation in many of the dramatic productions in addition to his athletic endeavors and scholastic pursuits and won himself the title of "Most Versatile Man".

Weaver married the former Gerry Stowell, whom he met while in college. They now have three sons and live in a beautiful and spacious house in the West San Fernando Valley.

By nature, Dennis is not one to stay inactive. He and his wife, Gerry, devote much of their time to community activities, charitable groups and organizations in their community in Calabasas, where they were named "Family Of The Year" by their neighbors and cited for their "outstanding moral, social and civic leadership".







#### PRESIDENT/Ron Martin

Born in Knoxville, Tennessee, Ron grew up in High Point, North Carolina where he attended school including High Point College.

He began his career in radio while still a sophomore in high school; his radio career was interrupted by an 18 month stint in the Marine Corps as a rifle instructor.

Ron's radio credentials include program directorships at WPDQ, Jacksonville, Florida; WTIX, New Orleans, Louisiana, WHB Kansas City, Missouri, KLAC Los Angeles, California and his present position at KHTZ/KTNQ, Los Angeles.

Ron has been the on camera spokesman for such national advertisers as Eveready Batteries, Kraco, Chevrolet cars and trucks, Red Carpet Realtors and numerous regional advertisers. He is the present national spokesman for Western Auto.



#### VICE PRESIDENT/Steve Stone

Steve, a native Californian born in Santa Monica, began his career in the music industry in 1962. He was employed by Joe Allison as General Professional Manager of Central Songs which was then owned by his famous father Cliffie Stone.

He worked for Central Songs for seven years; it was then sold to Capitol Records Publishing arm, Beechwood Music, where Steve retained his position as General Professional Manager of the New York, Nashville, Canadian and Hollywood branches for four years.

#### CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD/Bill Boud

Bill first became a member of the Academy back in 1965 when he was a Country Music Disc Jockey with the Armed Forces Network headquartered in Frankfurt, Germany and interviewed Tex Williams, who had just been elected the first President of the Academy. Tex sponsored Bill's membership application and Bill spent three years as an absentee member. In late 1968, Bill settled in Los Angeles, attended his first Academy membership meeting, and was almost immediately asked to produce the Awards Show scheduled for March, 1969; he had less than three months to put the program together. Since that time he has been an integral part of the production of each year's show and was involved in the negotiations for network television broadcast.

In May, 1969 Bill was elected to serve on the Board of Directors, who selected him Chairman. In 1971 he was elected President of the Academy, served two consecutive terms, and then was elected to serve on the Board of Directors for another term. In 1974, he was again chosen Chairman of the Board, and in 1975 and 1976 he was once again selected by the entire membership of the Academy to be their President. Bill has served this past year as Chairman of the Board of Directors. As you can tell, Bill's life in Los Angeles has been actively devoted to the success of the Academy of Country Music.

Professionally, most of Bill's life has been deep in the heart of country . . . he was a Country Music Disc Jockey with the Armed Forces for nine-and-a-half years, he was Director of the Interna-



His hobbies include golf, tennis and swimming; he is married, lives in the Valley with wife Peggy and has three sons and two daughters.

Steve left Beechwood in August of 1972 assuming the post of Assistant to Ken Nelson, the then Vice President of Capitol Records Country Music Department. After three years Ken retired and Steve continued in his same position reporting to Frank Jones.

During his four year stay at Capitol, he was involved in the capacity as producer for Tennessee Ernie Ford, Glen Campbell, Freddy Hart, Brush Arbor, Dorsey Burnette and other Capitol artists. He also did some independent producing during this period in association with Jimmy Bowen, recording Kenny Rogers and the 1st Edition for Beechwood Music's Production Company.

Upon leaving Capitol, Steve assumed the responsibility of Production Assistant to Mike Curb in his country music production activities. During this time he produced various artists for Motown Records then newly formed country music label Melodyland which became known as Hitsville Records. During his association with Mike Curb and Motown, Steve also took responsibility as West Coast professional director of ATV Music Group.

Steve is presently still holding his position with ATV Music as well as producing various artists in an independent capacity for different record labels.

Steve lives with his wife, Ina in Canyon Country and has three lovely daughters Mandy, Amy and Melissa.

After leaving Capitol, he established the William Boyd Agency to handle booking of Country Artists on the West Coast and throughout the Western United States. As a Lifetime member of the Academy, Bill has continuously served the organization, and in 1970 was presented the Jim Reeves Memorial Award for outstanding contribution to the international acceptance of America's music.

Bill and his wife, Fran, live in Burbank with their two children, Sharon and Bill, Jr., and the entire family takes pride in the fact that they can actively participate in the making of the music they love best.

#### SECRETARY/Toi Moritomo

Toi was born in Whittier, California and raised in Arkansas and northern California. She began her career in the Record Music Industry as a Talent Payroll clerk with UNI Records in 1968. While at UNI she assisted in many areas, Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable, copyright and royalty department and filled in for secretaries in the Dept. of Sales, Promotion and Artist Repertoire.

In 1970 UNI Records became part of MCA and Toi stayed on as Secretary and Assistant to the manager of Artist and Publishers Royalties. In 1972 she was promoted to Supervisor of Copyright and then in mid-June 1972 she was again promoted, this time to Product Co-Ordinator.

Toi's current position carries the responsibility of co-ordinating the master tapes and label and liner information, obtaining clearances needed for product, along with copyright notices, production credits and many other details too numerous to mention all having to do with pre-production.

Toi, the mother of two, Gregory John and Kim Lizbeth resides in Burbank; she became a member of the Academy in 1973 and has been a very active participant. She has served on the Board of Directors in the Record Company category and is currently serving as Secretary.

She continued at the main office in New York and culminated with A & R "Behind The Scenes" work in Hollywood as an administrator assistant to the head of the office. During her career in the music field, her responsibilities found her associated with RCA, Famous Music Corporation, Liberty and Dot Records.

In slack intervals, Selma worked for IFA Variety Department, Reprise Records, Helen Noga and National General Records with Al Kasha

At the present time, Selma is operations manager for Chuck Blore and Don Richman, Inc. who create and produce radio and television commercials. In this capacity she acts as liaison between creative department and the business department.

Selma has been an active member of the Academy since 1974 and is serving her third term as Treasurer.

#### **EXECUTIVE SECRETARY/Fran Boyd**

If anyone was ever "made for a job" . . . Fran was made for hers as Executive Secretary of the Academy of Country Music. Born in Montgomery, Alabama and raised in the south, her involvement with country music began there and has grown through the years.

Married and with a family, Fran was not content to sit around and waste "free time" so in 1968 when Tex Williams drafted her for the job with the Academy, she took it. Since that time she has devoted most of her time to the affairs of the Academy and to country music.

The Academy's Board of Directors makes the decisions regarding the Academy's business affairs and most of those decisions are put into action by Fran, along with editing and preparing the monthly newsletter, handling all correspondence, preparing all promotional materials, attending all Board meetings, organizing the monthly membership meetings and taking myriad telephone calls daily.

If you think that sounds like a full time job, you should see her at Awards Show time; the days seem to run together as she coordinates activities between the office, the show's producers and the awards book publishers. With the help of her Secretary she handles all of the notification letters to all nominees, their seating arrangements and when she gets through with all of that . . . there


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#### THE ACADEMY

The Academy of Country Music, a non-profit organization chartered in accordance with the laws of California, was organized in 1964. Four people, Eddie Miller, Tommy Wiggins, and Mickey and Chris Christiansen got together with the dream of promoting country music. That dream has grown and so has country music. That was the beginning of the Country and Western Music Academy now known as the Academy of Country Music.

When it all began, their plan was "to get together" as many other performers and participants in country music as possible and try to find ways of promoting not only country music but the fine talented country artists whom they felt had not received the kind of recognition they deserved.

In 1965 the first Board of Directors was elected to govern the activities of the Academy, Dick Schofield was Chairman and this elected board was to decide which direction should be taken in accordance with their dream of promoting the acceptance of country music. They felt one way to expose the talented artists and promote country music was to hold an awards show, this first show took place in 1965 at the Red Barn. In 1966, they elected their first President, Mr. Tex Williams.

As the years went by, the Academy membership grew, its activities were expanding; this called for the organization to open its first home base. An office was established at the Crossroads of the World and the Board of Directors asked Fran Boyd to accept the duties and responsibilities of Executive Secretary. This was the year in which Tex Williams hosted a show which was sponsored by the Academy and aired over the Armed Forces Radio Net-


work, and a Country Caravan was held between three night clubs in the area.

ountry Music was expanding. The Academy was continuing in its endeavors to promote and support country music. More records were being bought and listened to, more country music was being played on more radio stations than ever before. Part of the dream was being realized.

No one can begin a dream and then stop dreaming, especially when they see parts of it coming true . . . as country music grew, so did the dream. In 1969 the Academy took a "giant step": the decision by the Board of Directors, after much consideration, to become an international organization. 1970 saw another move: the Academy membership, growing and becoming more and more actively involved in country music, had to obtain larger office space. The office was relocated at the Hollywood Plaza Hotel and the awards show was held at the Palladium, located in Hollywood . . . and another Country Caravan was held . . . In 1971 they were beginning to dream of televising the Awards Show, and this dream was fulfilled in 1974 when the first show was taped for television at the John Wayne Theatre at Knotts Berry Farm in Buena Park.

Year after year the members were becoming more and more interested in their organization and their show, and their elected officials were continually looking for a bigger and better way of accomplishing this. With this in mind they went to the Shrine Auditorium in 1977 to be able to offer the show to a larger audience.

The balloting for the Awards Show each year is done by a Certified Public Accountant. This year (for the second consecutive year) the Academy hired the services of Dr. Dwight V. Call to handle the tabulation of the ballots. The first step was handled by a committee selected by the Board of Directors, this nominating committee, using all major trade publications, researched to find the artists who had the top records, albums, appearances, televi-



sion, etc. for the preceding year. There were mailed out to the membership with a blank space for a write-in vote in each category. The second ballot was sent out with the top five finalists of the first ballot tabulation except in the case of ties where the number increased. The final ballot results will be announced here tonight. In the selection of the Night Club, Radio Station and Disc Jockey of the Year, the balloting was handled by the Academy's Board of Directors. These ballots were mailed to the promotion persons of the record labels involved with country music and all the major trade publications. This selection was made on a one ballot basis.

When the Academy was formed it was comprised of representatives from Artist/Entertainers, club owners, composers, publishers, promoters, disc jockeys, musicians, record companies, and other allied fields pertaining to the country music industry. Late in 1975, continuing the expansion and public involvement policies, the membership was opened to the general public . . . without whose support there would be "no stars".

Due to the non-profit status of the organization, its many activities are supported by the annual membership dues of \$15.00 per year for general membership and \$20.00 per year for professional membership, there is a Corporate membership for \$500.00 per year and Lifetime membership is \$100.00.

Membership meetings are held in the southern California area monthly. Entertainment at these meetings is provided by Academy members. The Board of Directors meet on the second Tuesday of each month and always welcome any business a member would like to present to them for consideration.

Some of the activities of the Academy which took place in 1977 were a concert at the Starlight Bowl in Burbank, California; the Academy elected its first woman to hold the office of Vice-President, Ms. Eula Thompson; and one of the prime concerns of the Academy, exposing its talented members, began. The Academy instituted "Showcases" where members of the

Academy performed before an audience of recording company representatives, t.v. scouts, media persons, bookers and managers. They plan to continue this approach and additional showcases were held in 1978. April of 1978 the Academy celebrated its 13th year and the Awards Show was held again at the Shrine Auditorium and aired over late night television as it had for the past four years over ABC T.V. September of 1978 saw the Academy sponsor its first country show, starring Mickey Gilley, at the Palomino Club. The Academy plans to move forth with these shows and offer more of them in the future.

1978 is now past history, but the dream goes on and on and on. One of the most important parts of the dream is coming true here tonight, and those of you who are in attendance to share it with us, believe me we are proud . . . Network Television . . . Prime Time . . . NBC . . . it marks a first and we are so happy for our organization and the effort, perseverance (headaches included) of Gene Weed and those who assisted him, who are instrumental in giving you the very best in entertainment; we are so proud (even tho it seemed like forever in coming) that we have Prime time television, and we are sure there are only bigger and better things in store for the Academy of Country Music.

he Academy owes a great deal to the dedication and support of its membership and to its Board of Directors and elected Officials for striving to continue on and on even though there have been times when it all seemed like "nothing" was happening. It is happening and we would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their support of country music . . . for being a part of the true music of America.

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
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## DICK CLARK,

#### **Executive Producer**



Dick Clark is probably best known as "America's oldest teenager", in constant touch with the youth market, but many are perhaps unaware that Dick's roots are solidly in Country Music. His broadcasting career literally began with his first on-air job as staff announcer at WRUN-Utica, New York in 1948. In 1950, Dick moved to WOLF-Syracuse, where he performed dual duties; as disc jockey and as host of the WOLF Buckeroos Show. After a while, he was tabbed by WKTV-Utica to host a television show with the Santa Fe Raiders where he billed himself as "Cac-

tus Dick". While Dick was in Philadelphia hosting a teenage dance show, the ABC-TV Network chose him to host a nationwide version that immediately skyrocketed to success. "The American Bandstand" has had tremendous impact on the musical tastes and habits of millions of Americans and celebrated, in 1977, its 25th Anniversary . . . making it one of the longest-lived continuous programs in broadcast history. Dick, ever mindful of his beginnings, frequently presented country acts like Conway Twitty, Johnny Cash, Don Gibson, Gentleman Jim Reeves, the Everly Brothers, Susan Raye, and Jerry Reed.

Since 1964, Dick's base of operations has been in Hollywood, and his TV production company and concert production company have been prominent in the entertainment industry from that time. During the 1978 fall TV season he produced and hosted "Dick Clark's Live Wednesday" on the NBC-TV Network, and early in 1979 the ABC Television Network devoted its entire prime-time three-hour schedule to Clark's production of "Elvis!". He has authored three books, including "Rock, Roll, and Remember" published by T.Y. Crowell Company.

Dick and his wife, the former Kari Wigton, live in Malibu where his non-business activities include watching movies, reading, swimming, and listening to his enormous collection of records. Dick is the father of two sons and a daughter by a previous marriage. He's 5'9" tall, has brown hair and brown eyes, and weighs 155 lbs. (just about what he weighed twenty years ago). In addition to producing motion pictures, he has starred in three and also appeared in serious acting roles on Television.

Dick Clark's contributions to the Academy of Country Music reach back a decade to 1969 when he was one of the few Hollywood Celebrities willing to donate their time to our Awards Show. Dick served as Master of Ceremonies for our Awards Show in 1969, 1971, 1972, and 1973. The unselfish efforts of Dick Clark are a very big reason why we are here tonight on prime-time television. Dick was one of the first people to receive a Gold Lifetime membership card from the Academy and we are deeply grateful to Dick for his early and continuing work on our behalf.

Howdy! Welcome to the 14th Annual. For many of us who have been deeply involved with country music and the Academy, this is a very special year. It is the year that our dream has come to reality . . . we are presenting our awards on live prime-time television.




#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

# PAT BOONE: A PROFILE



Descendant of American folk hero Daniel Boone, this year's co-host, Pat Boone, has more than fulfilled his direct claim to America's heritage. As a recording artist, he has sold in excess of 41 million records. As an actor, he has starred in some 15 motion pictures, including "Journey to the Center of the Earth," "April Love" and "All Hands on Deck." And as the author of nine books, Pat has donated the royalties from "Twixt Twelve and Twenty," a guide for teenagers, to the Northeastern Institute for Christian Education. "A New Song," which has passed the one million mark in sales, has been published in five languages and has established him as an author of international repute.

The man who claims these remarkable achievements was born in Jacksonville, Florida, in 1934. One of four children, Pat

started his career in local amateur shows and as master of ceremonies for a high school talent revue; these tentative activities eventually led to honors on the Ted Mack Amateur Hour and the Arthur Godfrey Talent Scout Show. Pat left Florida and attended high school in Nashville, Tennessee, where he served as President of the Student Body, captain of the baseball team, reporter and cartoonist for the school newspaper, and still found time to court Shirley Foley, daughter of recording artist Red Foley.

Pat and Shirley were married during his first year at Nashville's David Lipscomb College, and shortly thereafter they moved to Denton, Texas, where Pat attended North Texas State College. To support his growing family—the Boones' first daughter, Cheryl Lynn, was born in

Denton—Pat started singing at Fort Worth's WBAP-TV for a meager \$44.50 weekly. Randy Wood, president and founder of Dot records, substantially augmented Pat's income, however, and determined the initial course of his career when he signed Boone to an exclusive recording contract in 1954. Within six months Pat was in Chicago recording "Two Hearts, Two Kisses," followed almost immediately by his first millionseller, "Ain't That a Shame."

Compounding his burgeoning success as a vocalist with a million-dollar contract to 20th Century Fox in 1956, Pat promptly embarked on his career as an actor and television personality—ABC-TV signed him to do "The Pat Boone Chevy Showroom" the same year. At 22, Pat was the youngest performer to have his own program on network television, and he subsequently hosted an NBC morning interview show.

Undeterred by this remarkable succession of achievements, Pat Boone went on to graduate Magna Cum Laude from Columbia University in 1958, majoring in Speech and English. By this time the Boones were the parents of four young girls, and Pat still considers completion of his education one of his most significant accomplishments.

Artist, author, actor—Pat Boone has managed to maintain all the various facets of his prodigious career, as well as dedicating his time and talents towards the raising of his family. In 1971, the six Boones recorded their first family album on the Word label; it was subsequently nominated for a Grammy, and as a family the Boones have continued to perform on the international concert circuit.

Nor has Pat neglected his early love of sports. In addition to participating in numerous tennis, golf, baseball and basketball charity exhibitions, he recently hosted his own tennis tournament in Santa Barbara for the Cancer Foundation. He is also National Entertainment Chairman for the March of Dimes and augments his already busy road schedule with appearances across the country on behalf of the March of Dimes.

Heir to a legend, creator of his own kind of legend, Pat Boone returned to his own kind of music when he signed with Motown's Melodyland Records (now Hitsville Records) and headed up the country charts with three hit singles and an album, "Texas Woman." An honorary advisor and long-time supporter of the Academy of Country Music, Pat is making his third appearance on an Academy Show, and it is a pleasure to welcome this remarkable gentlemen as the co-host of the 12th Annual Awards Show.

## PATTI PAGE: A PROFILE



In the same year that the USA celebrated its Bicentennial, Patti Page celebrated her 30th anniversary in show business. Roughly equated, that means that Ms. Page has played a significant role in 15% of her country's entertainment history, an occasion that is further marked by her first appearance as co-host of the 12th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show.

Although Patti is a legend in the popular music arena, having first emerged to prominence during the Big Band era, her story is the same as that of many a country music superstar. Born Clara Ann Fowler in Claremore, Oklahoma, the second youngest of 11 children, her father was a railroad foreman and her mother picked cotton to help maintain the family. As Patti recalls, "I guess we were poor in money, but not in love. I do remember that if you ever saw me in shoes, you knew it was a Sunday — that's the only day I could wear mine."

Talent and ambition brought Clara Ann

an art scholarship in Tulsa, Oklahoma, but necessity took her to the art department of a Tulsa radio station. There, in true show business tradition, she got her first break: the regular vocalist for the 15-minute Page Milk Company program failed to appear, and the slender young girl from the behind-the-scenes art department took her place.

Jack Rael, band manager and musician, was in Tulsa that day with the Jimmy Joy Orchestra, and he just happened to turn on the radio in his hotel room and hear the Page Milk Hour. Thus started an artist/manager relationship that continues today; Rael sought out the remarkable vocalist he had heard on the radio, signed her up, changed her name, and . . . the rest is history.

Initially, however, Patti's career hit a stalemate; after 12 unsuccessful releases, she and Jack found themselves unable to hire a chorus for back-up on a novelty number called "Confess." Patti promptly went ahead and sang a duet with herself,

the song was a hit, and "over-dubbing" became an integral part of the contemporary recording process. Her record company, delighted with the process, decided that if two Patti's were a success, four Patti's would be even better — "With My Eyes Wide Open I'm Dreaming" was a recording landmark and the first of her 13 individual million-selling records.

Patti Page's recording of "The Tennessee Waltz" has sold some seven million singles, and the song was subsequently adopted by Tennessee as its official state song. Her release of "How Much Is That Doggie in the Window?" set the critics to screaming and the public to buying; Patti was recently surprised to learn from the wife of the Russian Ambassador to the U.S. that it is still one of the most popular Western songs in Russia. Ms. Page's cumulative career sales exceed 70 million records.


As the medium of television grew, Patti Page's career expanded, and she was the star of "The Oldsmobile Patti Page Hour," "The Big Record" and "The Patti Page Show," which aired over an unprecedented 324 stations. She was also a frequent guest on shows hosted by personalities such as Ed Sullivan, Bob Hope, Garry Moore, Andy Williams, Perry Como, Dinah Shore and Johnny Cash, and the cameras introduced a new element to Patti's performance. "When I made records, I just stood there and sang, no one saw me outside of the studio; but television was different. You had to move around, you had to be a performer . . . . "

Patti performed so well that she was signed to appear with Burt Lancaster in the Academy Award-winning film "Elmer Gantry," which led to other roles in "Dondi" and "Boys Night Out."

"Movies are fun to do, but I'm primarily a singer, and that's how I want people to think of me. In fact, that's what they expect of me, and I'm not a girl who will argue with her fans." Hardly — Patti Page has made a career of pleasing her fans, in clubs and concerts throughout Europe and the U.S. She is currently concentrating on country music, an up-tempo kind of country that is a part of the Patti Page styling. "I don't get down to the nitty-gritty numbers — I don't think anyone would accept me singing about what a terrible state the world is in! It wouldn't ring true... it wouldn't be Patti Page."

Divorced and living in Rancho Santa Fe with her two children, Patti has few hobbies other than bridge. Entertaining is both vocation and avocation, and like a few other very special singers — Peggy Lee, Ella Fitzgerald, Doris Day — Patti Page is a lady whose elegance and talent are forever contemporary.

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
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### BILL BOYD

When Bill Boyd first became a member of the Academy of Country Music, back in November of 1965, he was serving as a country music disc jockey with the American Forces Network in Frankfurt, Germany. Tex Williams, who had just been elected the first President of the Academy, was in Europe and did Bill's radio show; it was Tex who introduced him to the Academy and sponsored his first membership.

In late 1968, after three years as an absentee member, Bill attended his first Academy meeting upon his return to the States. Having settled in Los Angeles, Bill was asked to produce the Academy Awards Show scheduled for March 1969; he had less than three months to put the program together. Since that time, however, Bill has been an integral part of the production of each year's show, and he was also involved in the negotiations for network television broadcast.

In May 1969, Bill was elected to the Board of Directors and served his first two terms as Chairman of the Board. In 1971 he was first elected to the Presidency of the Academy; after two years as President, he served an additional two years as a member of the Board. In the 1974 elections, Bill was again voted Chairman of the Board, and in 1975 he was elected to the first of his current two terms as President.

As a lifetime member of the Academy, Bill has continually served the organization — and country music itself. He has received the Jim Reeves Award for his contributions to the international acceptance of America's music. He and his wife, Fran, who is Executive Secretary to the Board of Directors and runs the Academy offices, live in Burbank, California, with their two children, Sharon and Bill, Jr., and the entire family takes pride in the fact that they can actively participate in the making of the music they love best.

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
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# BEHIND THE SCENES...

(Gene Weed, former Chairman of the Board of Directors and former Vice-President of the Academy, produces the annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show in conjunction with Gene Weed Productions and The Film Factory; since 1975 he has shared production responsibilities with current Chairman of the Board Ron Weed.)

The 12th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show will be seen Thursday, February 24th, by a multinational audience of millions of Americans, Canadians and country music fans around the world through the network facilities of ABC-TV and Filmways International Syndication. This will be the fourth consecutive year that the ACM Awards are televised and, again, the show is loaded with the superstars of country music and of Hollywood . . . but it was not an easy production to get on the tube!

For some reason, known only to the upper echelons of the television industry, country music holds, at best, a second-class citzenship in the magic media of television. In the rare cases where country music programs have been allowed on prime-time TV, they have been, for the most part, so distorted by Hollywood or New York interpretation—even on those shows done in Nashville—that the last thing to come off well is the music or the musician.

In 1973, with this thought in mind, I first approached ABC-TV in New York about the possibility of airing the Academy's annual tribute to country music and its entertainers. The ABC


programmers didn't stage a ticker-tape parade down Avenue of the Americas at the prospect of another "country & western" show, but they did listen. The powers-that-be were a bit concerned that all country music fans retire immediately following the 6 o'clock news and that, consequently, there wouldn't be much of an audience for the "Wide World of Entertainment" slot that starts at 11:30 p.m. on the East and West Coasts and at 10:30 p.m. in Mid-America.

However, due either to the fact that I'm one hell of a salesman or that I agreed to produce a \$100,000 show for a fee of \$65,000, traditional thinking was swayed, thanks greatly to the efforts of ABC's then late-night programming chief Bob Shanks... but it took a full year to happen.

In March of 1974 the Awards Show was presented before 2,000 people in the John Wayne Theater at Knott's Berry Farm and subsequently aired on ABC-TV. It captured one of the highest ratings of any show ever aired in that time slot, despite the fact that a highly publicized "streaker" made a flash appearance on the Carson Show that same night. ABC was delighted, the in-house audience had a ball, and the television audience was introduced to the Academy of Country Music.


The annual blend of Hollywood's television and film stars with the superstars of country music is a mix that has not only brought success to the show, but makes for a great evening of fun for everyone, whether in the auditorium or under the quilts at home. My brother Ron, who co-produces the shows with me, and I are both confident that next year's Awards will be moved to prime time, allowing more people than ever to share in the festivities.

As for this year . . . well, the Shrine Auditorium holds 6,479 people (take away a few to make room for the six cameras), the largest concert audience ever able to attend an Academy Show. So watch out for the booms and the dollies, and start grinning—you're on ABC-TV, courtesy of country music!




## 12th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show

Shortly after the Academy of Country Music was founded in 1964, its membership determined that the best way to recognize the music was to recognize the people who made it possible—the singers, the pickers, the writers—and to salute their outstanding achievement during any given year. Thus, in 1965, as an SRO audience at the Hollywood Palladium applauded the selection of Roger Miller as "Man of the Year" and a young entertainer named Merle Haggard as "Most Promising Male Vocalist," a star was born—the annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show.

The shows have been held at the Hollywood Palladium, the Beverly Hilton Hotel, the Century Plaza Hotel and the John Wayne Theater in Knott's Berry Farm. But this year, in keeping with the Academy's continued efforts to involve the public in the music, the ceremonies are being staged at the Shrine Auditorium, a venerable Los Angeles theater that opened in 1926 and claimed—at the time—the world's largest stage.

That same stage, upon which tonight's ceremonies are (Continued on page 44)



The Academy of Country Music was founded in Los Angeles in 1964 as an international professional organization dedicated to the continued growth and recognition of country music, America's own music. In the 12 years that have passed since its inception, both the Academy and country music have grown.

When it began, the Academy was called the Academy of Country and Western Music, and there was still a tendency to keep country music out in the country. The foothills of Hollywood, however, are a long way from the hillbillies, and the Academy offered a convenient means of bringing together the rapidly increasing country community located in the West to discuss common concerns and ambitions.

Initially, then, Academy membership was comprised of professionals, with a diversified representation of artists and entertainers, club owners and operators, composers, publishers, promoters, disc jockeys, musicians and record company executives. In late 1975, however, and in keeping with the Academy's policy of continued expansion and increased public involvement, it was decided to open the Academy to general, non-affiliated members as well. This is the second year that the nominees and winners reflect the combined votes of the professional and general membership.

Chartered as a nonprofit organization by the laws of the State of California, the Academy is dependent upon its annual membership dues to support its activities, including the monthly newsletter, the membership cards and the various trophies, plaques and awards given throughout the year. General membership fees are \$10 annually; professional membership is \$15; corporate membership is \$500, and lifetime memberships cost \$150.

The general membership meetings are held in the Los Angeles area and are called monthly by the Academy President. A brief business review is followed by entertainment featuring performers who belong to the Academy. The Board of Directors, which is elected by the professional membership, meets the first Monday of each month, and members with business to bring before the Board are always welcome.

In addition to the general promotion and enhancement of country music, the Academy has determined and established specific goals and projects. The Marty Landau Memorial Trust Fund, created in 1974, was conceived as a relief fund for Academy members and is maintained by proceeds received from the Annual Awards Show and the yearly Celebrity Golf Tournament, which will next be held in September of 1977 at Los Robles in Thousand Oaks, California.

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## **SPECIAL AWARDS**

The Academy of Country Music takes great pride in presenting two special awards, the recipients of which are determined by the Academy's Board of Directors rather than by formal vote.

The Jim Reeves Memorial Award, first given in 1969, is presented annually to an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, who has made substantial contributions towards furthering international acceptance of country music during the preceding calendar year. Past recipients of the Jim Reeves Memorial Award include Joe Allison, current President of the Academy Bill Boyd, Roy Rogers, "Hee-Haw" producer Sam Louvello, Thurston Moore, Merv Griffin and Dinah Shore.

In recognition of outstanding and unprecedented achievement in the field of country music, the Academy, in 1968, created the Pioneer Award, which is not necessarily bestowed on an annual basis and may have more than one recipient. "Pioneers" who have been thus honored include "Uncle Art" Satherly, Bob Wills, Tex Ritter, Patsy Montana, Bob Nolan, Stuart Hamlin, Tex Williams, Cliffie Stone, Gene Autry, Hank Williams, Merle Travis, Tennessee Ernie Ford and Johnny Bond.

## ACADEMY BOARD **OF DIRECTORS**

The 36 members of the Academy's Board of Directors are elected annually by the professional membership, and the individuals who serve on the Board represent the following occupational categories: Advertising/Radio & TV Sales: Artist/Entertainer; Club Operator; Composer; Disc Jockey; Manager/Booker; Musician/Band Leader/Instrumentalist; Radio/Television/Motion Picture; Promotion; Record Company; Publications, and Music Publisher.

There are, in addition, two members from a "nonaffiliated" category and six persons who are elected Directorsat-Large. The diversified backgrounds of the various members allow the Board of Directors to best represent the ultimate goal of the Academy-the international recognition and appreciation of country music.

The Officers of the Academy, who are also elected each year by the membership, are Bill Boyd, President; Ron Weed, Chairman of the Board; Gene Bear, Vice-President; Janice Smith, Recording Secretary, and Selma Williams, Treasurer. Mr. Ben Sussman is Legal Counsel to the Academy, and Fran Boyd, Executive Secretary to the Board of Directors, also runs the Academy offices.

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

being conducted, has been the site of USC basketball games and the Harlem Globe Trotters; the Shrine annually hosts a full-scale circus onstage, and the distinctive Moorish architecture may be familiar from the film "A Star Is Born" (the Judy Garland version). Most importantly, the Shrine seats nearly 6,500 people—the largest audience to ever attend an Academy of Country Music Awards Show. And for the fourth consecutive year, people across the country will be able to share in the excitement and anticipation of the evening when ABC-TV broadcasts the event nationally on Thursday, February 24th.

This year's pre-show ceremonies will commence at 7 p.m., hosted by Chris Lane of KGBS-FM radio. These ceremonies, which are not televised, feature entertainment by local celebrities and the presentation of awards for excellence by individual musicians. The winners in these categories—bass, drums, fiddle, lead guitar, piano, steel guitar and rhythm guitar—are nominated and chosen by their peers, the professional musicians membership.

Other awards, which will be reviewed on the national telecast if time allows, are given to the Radio Station of the Year, Disc Jockey of the Year and Country Music Nightclub of the Year. Then, at 8:30, the television cameras start to roll, and taping of the 12th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show begins.

The telecast this year is co-hosted by Pat Boone and Ms. Patti Page, who is making her first appearance on an Academy Show. The ceremonies feature entertainment by Freddy Fender, last year's Most Promising Male Vocalist, Donna Fargo, voted Top Female Vocalist in 1972, Ronnie Milsap, Don Williams and Mel Tillis, a guest performer in 1976. The guest star presenters include Marty Robbins, last year's Master of Ceremonies, and Loretta Lynn, last year's Entertainer of the Year, as well as T.G. Sheppard, actor Claude Akins and World Champion Cowboy Larry Mahan, who also has his first country album out this year.

It is with much gratitude that the Academy acknowledges the continued support of the country music community, and most particularly those artists and celebrities who have again contributed their services towards making the 12th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards Show an event worthy of America's own music.






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
