
Warm greetings to everyone gathered for the thirtieth annual awards ceremony of the Academy of Country Music.






## CLINT BLACK

he first human to be in a commercial with Keebler's elf, Ernie, Clint Black didn't let it go to his head. He finished out 1994 with a tour he dubbed "Up Close ... In Concert," which featured him performing in 15 cities before audiences of around 3,000; definitely a change in size from the "Black & Wy" tour which had the two superstars performing in large auditoriums and amphitheaters. The Academy of Country Music's New Male Vocalist and Male Vocalist of 1989, Black has traveled many roads since his early RCA years. Among his upcoming projects is rumored to be a movie role with his wife, Lisa Hartman-Black.

- ♦ On One Emotion, Black fulfilled a lifelong dream, co-writing "Untanglin' My Mind" with legendary singer/songwriter Merle Haggard.
- ◆ Black continued his newfound career as director of videos with "Untanglin' My Mind," which he shot in Orlinda, a small town 50 minutes north of Nashville. He shot the footage in conjunction with Iwerks on 65-millimeter large-format film, the first time this big-screen format has been used for a music video.
- ♦ His upcoming video project, "Summer's Comin," was shot in Malibu, California, and features appearances by Howie Mandel, Charlie Chase, Dick Clark, Jose Eber, Lisa Hartman-Black, David Hasselhoff, George Kennedy, Jay Leno, Joey Lawrence and brothers Matt and Andy Lawrence, Gerald McRaney, Leland Sklar, Moose (the dog from the television show Frasier), and high-fashion photographer Firooz Zahadi.



- ◆ Keebler Wheatables signed on as the exclusive sponsor of Clint Black's 1995 National tour in 35 top markets. His photo appeared in millions of Keebler Wheatable boxes in the past six months.
- ◆ Black has sold eight million albums to date, and racked up 12 number-one singles.

No time to kill: Black takes an active part in just about every aspect of his career. Some people would be swept away by the details of such a demanding existence, but he thrives on it. It's the creative canvases that drive me to take on so much in order to enjoy every area available to me."


According to Merle Haggard, Clint first heard "Untanglin' My Mind" while the two were on tour together, but he wanted to add another verse to it. "I told him to go ahead, and we'd split writers' credit," Haggard says. "I think he sang it with a little different attitude—mine was flamboyant, his was more apologetic."

## JEFF FOXWORTHY

e gave up a \$30,000 job at IBM on the chance that people everywhere might like his sense of humor. The gamble paid off, and today Jeff Foxworthy tours across the country making people laugh. Though he's most remembered for one-liners about rednecks (You might be a redneck if your dad walks you to school because you're in the same grade"), but he's equally at home with one-liners like "My wife is the smartest person I know, but you give her a map, it's like Kryptonite to Superman." His wife, Pamela, doesn't mind being included in his list of things to joke about; in fact, she worked in public relations at a dairy while Foxworthy was building his career on the comedy circuit. And why have his redneck jokes caught on with so many people? "A redneck is anyone with a glorious lack of sophistication. It doesn't matter where you live or how much money you make."

Foxworthy has written six books, his latest being "Games Rednecks Play."


◆ In 1985 he won the Great Southeastern Laff-Off; a year later, he took home the prize from the Za-



- ◆ Jeff and Pamela, along with daughters Jordan and Juliane, live in Beverly Hills, California. "Sometimes we lie in bed and giggle about the things we've done," she told People.
- ◆ Foxworthy cites Bill Cosby as his number-one influence, because "he was able to do comedy clean."
- ◆ It was only his second visit to a comedy club, but that didn't deter Jeff Foxworthy from winning the contest the club was having that week!

Only four months after winning that initial contest, Foxworthy left the corporate world of computers. "Lookin' back, I knew so little about the comedy business, had I known more about it, I might not have done it. But ignorance is bliss... And next to meeting my wife, it's probably the best thing I ever did."



## TANYA TUCKER



er license plate once read "MS BAD ASS"-it now reads "MST"-and that's just one example of how Tanya Tucker has changed over the years. She's gone from being the "where's the party, I'm ready to boogie" superstar to the single mom with the same worries as other moms around the world. "I worry about the environment, schools, drugs . . . things every mom worries about," she told Redbook interviewer Vincent Coppola. What hasn't changed is the superstar status - Tucker continues to reap the rewards of her career through numerous awards and honors. Named the Academy's Best New Female Vocalist in 1972. Tucker's Two Sparrows In A Hurricane was awarded Best Video Of The Year in 1992.

- ◆ Her last four releases have been certified gold and/or platinum by the Recording Industry Association of America.
- ◆ Tanya is the youngest woman in any music genre to have a boxed set of her career recordings.
- She is one of country music's five top-charting female artists of all times.
- ◆ Her latest album, Fire To Fire, is the 28th album of her career.
- ◆ In addition to her solo projects, she's been involved in such award-winning industry projects as Common

Thread: The Songs Of The Eagles; Country & Blues (duet with Little Richard on "Something Else"), and A Tribute To The Beatles.

"What gives me the most happiness is my kids [Presley Tanita, 5, and Beau Grayson, 3]. They are the center of my life. My basic goal is to do all I can, while I can, so me and my kids in the future can have some quality times together." — People Magazine.

"I could not just quit performing. The applause keeps me going. You really don't know how much you enjoy it until people start going crazy, and you say, 'Wow. This is my redemption. This is my reward'." — People Magazine.

## ALABAMA

### TOP VOCAL GROUP

n just a decade, the group Alabama has sold 45 million albums. But to their fans, they're just "the boys in the band" - four young men who poured their heart and soul into their music, and won over 150 music awards along the way, including the Academy of Country Music's Artist Of The Decade in 1989. In the past year, the group has turned to their roots, playing in smaller, more intimate venues. "It takes us back to our club days in Myrtle Beach, when our relationship with our fans was a real personal thing with each performance," noted Randy Owens. In another move not to forget their roots, Alabama started June Jam in 1982, a one-day event that has grown into a 10day celebration of music, golf, softball, fishing, soccer, parade, car show, beauty pageant and talent search. To date, some \$3 million has been donated to local charities, with Randy, Teddy, Jeff and Mark taking an active role in many of the causes the Jam supports.

◆ The original name for Alabama, Wild Country, remains the corporate title for Alabama's business interests today.

◆ After dropping out of high school, Randy returned to school to get his high school diploma, then earned a college degree in English. One of Randy's teachers recalls thinking that the words to "Feels So Right" were just about the corniest thing she had ever read, but nevertheless she encouraged

him to follow his dream.

- ◆ It was Mark Herndon's mother who convinced him to audition for the job as drummer with Alabama.
- ◆ Jeff Cook owns his own radio station and has also branched into local cable television.
- ◆ Some local Fort Payne, Alabama residents still brag that the carpet in their house was laid by Teddy Gentry.

What's left to achieve? Alabama has accomplished just about everything there is to do in the music business, and they see in the future a time to fine-tune their craft and explore new horizons. They see the coming years as years of freedom to use their wisdom to carefully structure their career so that it brings new meaning to their art, new challenges to their skills, and new rewards for themselves and their loyal fans.

If it hadn't been for Teddy Gentry's hairdresser, the group might not have found the song "We Can't Love Like This Anymore." Seems he and songwriter John Jarrard share the same hairdresser, and when Teddy complained to her that they couldn't find a ballad for their next album, she played him "We Can't Love Like This Anymore," co-written by Jarrard and Wendell Mobley. Teddy immediately took it to the band. Only later did they discover that the song was written by Jarrard, who is a writer for their publishing company, Maypop Music.

he reigning Entertainer of the Year for the Academy of Country Music, Garth Brooks just released his first "greatest hits" package. As his bio notes, by now he's had too many hits to include them all in one package! Forbes magazine suggested that country had conquered rock when Brooks outdistanced top pop and rock artists such as Michael Jackson and Bruce Springsteen on the Billboard sales charts, and broke U. S. concert records set by artists including Paul McCartney. Even in Ireland, Brooks outsold such international acts as Springsteen, U2, and Bob Dylan. It's been said that Brooks has never underestimated his audience, and they love him for it.

- ◆ Brooks has the two biggest-selling albums in country music history, No Fences, which has sold more than 11 million copies, and Ropin' The Wind, which sold over 10 million. He is the only male solo artist in music history to have two albums top the 10
- ◆ Brooks returned from a world tour in 1994 that took him to Ireland, England, Holland, Scotland, Switzerland, Germany, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Spain, New Zealand and Australia. A headline from Australia's Courier-Mail noted "Brooks Talent Outstrips The Hype."


- ◆ His current total career album sales have reach 50 million copies, spanning seven albums in six years. Internationally, "Ain't Goin' Down (Till The Sun Comes Up)" and "The Red Strokes" hit 13 and 14, respectively, in the United Kingdom's pop singles charts in 1994.
- ◆ Brooks sold over four million CDs for the Ronald McDonald Children's Charities, raising over \$4 million for the organization. He also raised over \$1 million for "One Voice," the Los Angeles-based organization that assists low-income families with food, shelter, job training and scholarship opportunities.

Then: "I was scared to death (when recording his first album). When we first started, I had one thing in mind, and that was to make the folks back home proud... If I

had to pick one word to describe the recording process that first time, I guess I'd say innocence."

And Now: "In Pieces is the closest to the live show that we've done. Each of the other albums had a plan, but this one just came together. We were still writing songs while we were in the studio. It was a tremendous amount of fun, and in many ways a reflection of the way I try to live—full speed ahead and never slow down."

On his success: "I'm a small part of this 'thing' that happened," he says modestly. "But I see myself as a part just like Bobby Wood playing that great piano intro on 'The Dance,' or Stephanie Davis writing 'Wolves' or Allen Reynolds working in the studio. My band, management, the record label — we're talking about a lot of people involved."



ne of the top country touring acts in 1994, Brooks & Dunn continue their high-energy pace in 1995. The reigning Academy of Country Music Vocal Duet, Kix Brooks and Ronnie Dunn also pulled in Best Country Group in Playboy magazine's reader's music poll. All three of their albums have been certified multipleplatinum, and they've racked up eight number onesingles in their career. The triple-platinum Brand New Man album remains the most successful debut album ever released by a country duo or group. They also remain the only country duo or group to have four consecutive number-one singles from a debut offering. In June of 1994, they became the quickest sellout since Elvis Presley at Hulman Center in Terre Haute, Indiana. One month before, they became the only country act in the history of the Dane County Expo Center in Madison, Wisconsin, to sell out in advance.

- ◆ Kix Brooks says the songs on Waitin' On Sundown really fit together. Ronnie Dunn agrees. "We were comfortable with the styles we chose. I think it flows better than anything else we've done."
- ◆ Brooks and Dunn have designed the best-selling piece of clothing in western wear history their trademark flame shirt manufactured by Panhandle Slim.

- ◆ Brooks & Dunn were second only to Reba McEntire in tour grosses for 1994, according to Amusement Business magazine.
- ◆ On tour, expect lasers, smoke machines and other visual and auditory enhancements —but also expect tireless showmanship from the duo who take turns on lead vocals while thoroughly entertaining their audiences.
- ♦ The duo wrote or co-wrote nearly all ten cuts on Waitin' On Sundown, and it includes what Dunn says are a few songs that go deeper than the duos requisite two-steppin' honky-tonk sounds.

"As an artist and a songwriter I've always gravitated toward songs like our single "I'll Never Forgive My Heart," says Dunn. (Ronnie co-wrote the song with his wife, Janine, and Dean Dillon). "I gravitate toward songs with a little deeper message. But they're unfortunately a little harder to sell in today's climate of country music."

Different is Better: "Realistically, I think it helps that we're so different, personality-wise," says Dunn. "Surprisingly, it seems to make it a lot easier when we're dealing with these trying decisions that come along every day that are either gonna pull you closer together or split you up. Right down to things like which song should go on the album or which T-shirt design do we want to use."

♦ His road crew consists of his six-man band, The Strayhorns, and a road crew of 33. They travel in three buses with four tractor trailers hauling 39 tons of lighting, video and stage equipment.

◆ Jackson has always been a nut about cars. He guesses that he owns more than 30 autos, motorcycles, trucks and boats, including nine Harleys, a '57 Chevrolet convertible and a '55 Thunderbird, the car that he first bought when he was 15. His wife Denise found it for him and gave it back to him as a Christmas present a couple years ago.

◆ Though he loves his music, Jackson loves coming home to Denise and their daughters, Mattie and Ali. "I don't really get into the star part of the business," he told TV Guide. "I just go out and sing and ride the bus and come home and see my little girls. I don't work as much as a lot of people."

◆ One of the songs on Who I Am is called "Job Description," and it was written by Jackson for his daughter, Mattie. "The hardest part of this job is to try to explain to a three year old girl why I have to be gone for several days. This kind of explains what I do out there for her."

Honoring the songwriter: Who I Am contains 13 songs. In order for Jackson to put all 13 on it, he had to forfeit his royalties on three songs he wrote himself, so that the other songwriters on the album would receive their full royalty rate and the consumer would get more for their money. "I felt it was important enough for me to do that," he explains.

"Too many country stars today only pay lip service to legends like Hank Williams Sr. and George Jones. Jackson salutes the past by making a durable, pop-free country that's built to stand the test of time." — Chris Dickinson, Chicago Tribune

hile Alan Jackson sings ut foll who have "Gove Country," fans know that this Georgia native has never been anything but country, and he intends to stay right there. "I don't think I'll ever venture too far from what I've always done. It's just what I do. But I always try to mix it up as far as the content of the songs." Admittedly shy, the tall lanky father of two has a humility that endears others to him, yet also has a sense of humor that folks around him appreciate. His down-toearth manner isn't put-on - he really would rather be out in the country than sitting in front of a television camera, but he knows it comes with the music career that he has chosen. "Chattahoochee" was named the Academy of Country Music's Single Record of the Year, while A Lot About Livin' was named its Album of the Year, both in 1993. "Chattahoochee" was also named ASCAP's Country Song of the Year in 1994.

◆ AII four of Jackson's albums have achieved platinum or multi-platinum status, including his latest, Who I Am.



eba McEntire has come a long way from the young singer who producer Jerry Kennedy sent back to Oklahoma from a session because she was so homesick he knew she'd never get the songs right if she didn't get to see her family. By today's terms, she's an entrepreneur, in the midst of building a 25,000 square foot office complex on Nashville's Music Row. It will house Starstruck Entertainment, which encompasses management, booking, promotion and publishing companies. It will also house a recording studio and Starstruck Jet Service. There's also a 400-acre racehorse farm and a construction company, said to have been formed when Reba needed a barn built! All told, she is responsible for 75 employees, all of whom think the world of their "boss." "It may be my name on the marquee and it may be me singing up there behind the microphone, but for me to get where I am today, it's us," the Oklahoma native says of her loyal family at Starstruck Inc. At the Academy of Country Music, she's been a consistent winner of the Female Vocalist award, taking it home for the first time in 1985, then in 1986,'87-'88 and '91-92.

◆ Reba fronted \$40,000 for materials to build the first female-built and female-sponsored Habitat For Humanity house in Nashville. It was built in nine days by hundreds of female builders, contractors and plumbers who volunteered their services to complete the house, now home to Gayle Kinzer, a single mother of two.

◆ Instead of getting Christmas gifts from her fans, Reba urges them to contribute to Wrap A Little Love charity fund, established in 1989. The money received into the fund is channeled into help for needy families.

◆ Reba's secret dream is to win an Oscar for her acting skills. She wouldn't do a nude scene, or lose her accent, however, to help her achieve that dream.

◆ With 22 albums to her credit, Reba has sold more than 20 million copies of her recordings 12 are gold, eight are platinum and three are double platinum.

◆ The singer's stage show includes videos, props and more than eight costume changes.

Reba began flying to concerts each night after her son, Shelby, was born. She told Beverly Keel of New Country



magazine "I am not a workaholic but I enjoy what I do. But I don't crave it. I still make time for family. My family is first for me, but I don't think Shelby would say that."

"Shelby doesn't know I'm a famous mom. Just as long as I give him his Cheerios and his waffles and his peanut butter and his sprinkles, then he's fine. When he figures it out, he's gonna say, 'How come your mom doesn't go on stage? How come your mom doesn't have to sign autographs when you go out to eat?" — McCall's magazine

What she wants out of life: "I want to do so much more. I want my family life, my personal life, my public life. I want to have my cake and eat it, too. I like to take challenges and gambles. I don't care to play it safe." — Ladies Home Journal

#### REBA MCENTIRE

TOP FEMALE VOCALIST

ans of Mary Chapin Carpenter expect to hear heartfelt lyrics wrenched with emotion on her albums, and they are seldom disappointed. Whether it's "Something Of A Dreamer," "John Doe No. 24" or "Shut Up And Kiss Me," Chapin's songs are filled with life's emotions, running the gamut from deliriously happy to hauntingly sad. Whatever she does, she tries to make a positive contribution to the world around her. "I think it's not so

much about changing the world, but how your world changes. In the midst of chasing the golden ring, you get backslapped and you start to question your priorities. The further you go the more you see . . . and in the end, it all comes down to the basics: time for yourself, your family, honest relationships and giving to each other. The time you give is the most precious thing there is." Carpenter was named the Academy of Country Music's New Female Vocalist in 1989, and its 1992 Top Female Vocalist.

- ◆ Chapin's song "John Doe No. 24" was written after she saw an obituary in the New York Times about a person who was found wandering as a teen in Jacksonville, Ill. in 1945, and no one ever found out who he was or where he came from because he was both blind and deaf, and couldn't speak.
- ◆ Guest musicians on the Stones In The Road album include Branford Marsalis' sax solo on "John Doe No. 24" and Leroy Parnell's great slide guitar on "Shut Up

And Kiss Me."

- ◆ Firm in her beliefs, Chapin is active in numerous benefits, ranging from the National Literacy Council to a variety of AIDS charities and the House of Ruth women's social services.
- ◆ Chapin's album Come On Come On remained in the Top 100 Best-Selling Recordings in the U. S. for over two years, achieved sales of nearly 2.5 million (so far) and

launched seven hit singles, including two number ones.

♦ Though she continues to live in Virginia, Chapin has purchased a second home in Nashville because "I was going down so much and hotel stuffwas getting kind of old."

"Stones in the Road is a deeply felt album wrought from the enormous transformations Carpenter's life has undergone in the last three years . . . The new album movingly captures the futility of a relationship whose love is still in full bloom." — Interview Magazine

#### FAITH HILL

#### TOP FEMALE VOCALIST

'm from Star, Mississippi. I'm the youngest of thre infldren; I have two older brothers. My family is very close." Thus begins Faith Hill's record company biography, as simply stated as is country music's latest phenomena. She says Reba McEntire was her idol when she was in high school — "I remember coming home after school and playing her records in my room over and over until it was time for supper," Hill recalls. "She was a big influence, as was Patsy Cline, who I think was one of the greatest singers. Emmylou Harris and Amy Grant were two other fa-

vorites." Putting together her first band at 17, Hill decided two years later to make the move to Nashville. "Even though I had never been away from home before, I treated the move like I had no other choice ... I didn't worry about being safe or where I was going to get money. I just had faith that it was going to work."

◆ Faith's first job in Nashville was selling T-shirts at the Country Music Fan Fair, held each year in June at the Tennessee State Fairgrounds.

◆ Her mother would pay her 25 cents to sing for relatives at family reunions — 50 cents if it was a big reunion.

◆ Faith was only three years old when she joined in singing at Star Baptist church. "My mother said I held the hymnal upside-down and sang as loud as I could, pretending that I could read the words off of the book."


Faith assured interviewers at Gary Morris' publishing company that she was not a singer because she had already learned from previous turn-downs that telling your future employer that you were a singer guaranteed that you wouldn't get the job.

◆ The singer's debut single, "Wild One," reached the number one position on the Billboard country chart and stayed there for four weeks — something no debut single by a female country singer had done since Connie Smith's "One Day At A Time" in 1964.

"On the surface, newcomer Hill might seem a Reba McEntire clone without the histrionics. But though she often lapses into tonality and phrasing not unlike McEntire's, Hill lacks her contrivance and goes for a wider scope of material, from the intelligent spouse-abuse ballad 'I Would Be Stronger Than That' to the openhearted yearning and libidinal heat of 'Take Me As I Am'. —Alanna Nash, Entertainment Weekly

"The 26-year old petite blonde from Star, Mississippi, sprang onto the grandstand stage with more go-power than the Energizer Bunny, and belted out her spirited show-opener, 'Take Me As I am.' From then on Hill just kept going and going and going."

Songs like the one nominated for Song of the Year, "How Can I Help You Say Goodbye," are her mainstay, but don't discount those other feelings—happiness, joy and love. Patty can convey them, too, and make you wish you were the person she's singing about. One of the reasons she is able to wrench such emotion from her voice is the people she grew up on—legends like Loretta Lynn and Patsy Cline. "You listen to Loretta and she is so sassy,



you can't help but want to be that. Or Patsy Cline, who was so sultry. I'm not sure I understood what it was, but I knew her music made me feel something when I was little that was very powerful. Even Merle Haggard, he had that electricity. When you experience things like that, you can't help but want to embrace them."

- ◆ "How Can I Help You Say Goodbye," co-written by Burton Collins and Karen Taylor Good, was named SESAC's Most Performed Country Song of 1994.
- ◆ Patty built her mother, Naomi Ramey, a \$100,000 dream-house in a Louisville, Kentucky suburb.
- ◆ When Patty first came to Nashville, she says she

learned makeup tips from Dolly Parton, who she'd watch put on her makeup before an Opry performance at the Ryman Auditorium.

- ◆ As the singer in a rock 'n' roll band in the Carolinas, Patty found herself singing everything from Pat Benetar to Joan Jett and Journey.
- ◆ The Kentucky-born songstress credits her husband, Emory Gordy Jr., with having an ear for the type of material that is good for her voice. "He knows who I am and where I come from. He has a knack for picking up on people's backgrounds, and how to pick a really good song." "Although she's happily married to Emory Gordy Jr., Loveless still has a knack for stocking her albums with the kind of heartache-and-lament songs that give her voice full cry. I've been around so many people and heard so many heartbreaking stories that all I try to do is take those lyrics and give them edge," Loveless told Entertainment Weekly magazine.

On her last album: "The last album really allowed me to do a lot of soul-searching. There's a lot of me there. But as I'm traveling on the road and people come up to me and tell me their stories, it becomes obvious how much of what's inside us is the same."

When Fallen Angels Fly is commercial country at its best. Not only is it a terrific follow-up to Loveless' 1993 release, Only What I Feel ... but also is one of the finest albums she has ever recorded." — Mallay Charters, Country Guitar magazine.

veryone talks about the fact that it took Pam Tillis awhile to realize that she should be singing country music. What they forget is that no matter what she's done, she's been her own person, and she's always preferred to do it her way (even when her father, country legend Mel Tillis, kept urging her to forget the rock and disco and come home to Nashville). With her current album, Sweetheart's Dance, she purposely chose to record more songs that she didn't write in order to have fresh new sounds and lyrical perspectives. "I wanted to paint a landscape and not a self-portrait this time. In a lot of ways I've accomplished things on this album that I'd been trying to pull off on the last two."

◆ "Til All The Lonely's Gone," which Pam co-wrote with husband Bob DiPiero and John Scott Sherrill, is a family affair: her dad joins her, along with siblings Carrie Tillis, Mel Jr., Cindy Westmoreland and Connie Howden. Bill Monroe even throws in a mandolin solo and Sam Bush plays fiddle.

◆ Tillis says that she was half the inspiration for the hit movie Thelma & Louise. Her best friend, Callie Khouri, wrote it, and "Personalitywise, it's loosely based on us," Tillis confides. "I'm Thelma, the Geena Davis character who packed too much. She's even got my middle name."

◆ "Mi Vida Loca," which Pam wrote, was inspired by a Geraldo episode which featured girl gang members. "One of the girls had those words tattooed on her wrist, and when Geraldo asked her what it meant, she said it was Spanish for 'My crazy life.' The songwriter bell went off!"

◆ Pam's songs have

been cut by a wide gamut of entertainers, including Highway 101 and Chaka Khan.

◆ While most guys who played music in high school say they did it to get the attention of the opposite sex, Pam lets out a secret: "To be honest, boys with guitars weren't the only ones doing it for the attention!"

"Tillis' tunes are pure country. She sings with greater conviction, coming off like a mistakes of the heart veteran on 'Spilled Perfume.' All other country divas should brace themselves — Pam Tillis now has the ammo to fight. "— Mario Tarradell, The Miami Herald.

"Forget modern-day cowboy's sweethearts. If you want to hear genuine heart and soul in the ever more fomulaic genre of country music, Pam Tillis is the real deal. 




songs we chose reflect a guy who's feeling very positive ... We had a lot of fun making this record."

- ◆ Joe cites "He Stopped Loving Her Today" as his favorite song of all time.
- ◆ A native of Duncan, Oklahoma, Diffie's family heritage is Irish and Indian.
- ◆ Diffie's "Pickup Man," a song about a guy who gets all his girls because he drives a pickup truck, remained at the number-one spot in Billboard magazine for four weeks.
- ◆ Third Rock From The Sun was certified platinum in January of this year, following in the groove of Honky

Tonk Attitude, certified platinum just one month before.

◆ Diffie says his high-energy concert performances come from his early love of road shows such as Boston and ZZ Top.

When writing songs, Diffie says there's just no way to know what might come out of a writing session. "Take, for instance,'The Cows Come Home,' a song he cowrote with Lee Bogan and Lonnie Wilson on his latest album, "Lee and Lonnie and I sat down, and Lee said T've got this stupid title . . . ' and of course Lonnie and I loved it right off. And since the song was already out there, when we went in the studio, we decided to add some sound effects. some moos on the front end!"

ill his golf swing ever replace swinging a guitar over his shoulder for an evening concert? Nah, probably not, but there was a time when Vince Gill contemplated between the two before choosing the more creative career goal. Ten million album and video sales later, (versus one hole in one), the Oklahoma native apparently made the right choice. The ACM's 1992–93 Top Male Vocalist of the Year continues to participate in both with equal fervor, playing in numerous charity tournaments across the country,

including his own The Vinny in Nashville, which supports Junior Golf in Tennessee. He also lent his vocal talents to album and concert projects that benefit Walden Pond, Second Harvest Food Bank and the National Coalition For The Homeless. His nice-guy image is no image at all; it's the real thing, with Gill describing himself as not a heartthrob type. "I'm more of a Tom Hanks than a Tom Cruise."

- ◆ In 1994 he was named Tennessean Of The Year by the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.
- ◆ The Country Radio Broadcasters Inc. presented Vince with their annual Humanitarian Award in March.
- ♦ His single "Which Bridge To Cross (Which Bridge To Burn)" was co-written with song-writing great Bill Anderson. "He's written some of the greatest country songs that have ever been," comments Vince of his new partner.
- ◆ A couple of years back, Vince turned down a job with Dire Straits as the group's guitarist. Mark Knopfler says

"Someone like Vince puts you in your place if you think you're hot stuff." Gill's reaction? "I'm an okay guitarist."

◆ Vince recently revealed to TV Guide that Forrest Gump replaced Old Yeller as his favorite movie of all time.


"I didn't doubt his talent, but frankly I didn't expect him to gain the success he has."—Stan Gill, Vince's father, a United States administrative law judge in Columbus, Ohio, who also happens to play guitar and banjo.


Daughter Jenny, 12, says her dad "blasts" his CDs. "I think

I'm the only man in captivity whose daughter screams at him, 'Turn that thing down!',' Vince laughingly told People magazine.

What the public doesn't see — "I have drive and ambition. There are things that I'm intense about. I get on the guys if they're not playing as good as they can and should. I want things to be the best. I'm a perfectionist. I want everyone else to be equally committed. I have a temper that shows up once in a while." — Los Angeles Times, September 25, 1994.

Favorite cut on current album: "Go Rest High On That Mountain" - "I sat down and started writing this song after Keith Whitley passed away. I never finished it ... then when my brother died in March of '93, I took the song back out. It sounds... like a funeral march, real bluegrassy and traditional. Ricky Skaggs and Patty Loveless had to sing on it ... they're both Kentuckians like Keith was and they're two special people that have been a big part of my life for a long, long time."

eorge Strait has been with MCA Records since his first single, "Unwound," hit the charts in 1981, so he figures why mess with a good thing? He recently re-signed with the label in an elaborate ceremony at the Country Club in Nashville. MCA, to show thanks to the man who has 16 gold albums, seven platinum and one double-platinum, presented Strait with a registered palomino for his riding pleasure. In 1993 the Texas-born singer was presented with the Academy of Country Music Tex Ritter Award for his movie

Pure Country. Prior to that, he had been the Academy's 1989 Entertainer of the Year and 1984–85 and 1988 Male Vocalist of the Year, as well as receiving their award for Album of the Year in 1985 for Does Ft. Worth Ever Cross Your Mind. He hosted the ACM show in the years 1989–1991 and in 1993.

- ◆ Among Strait's professional memberships is one with the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) fellow members are the cowboys who ride the rodeo circuit across the U. S. every year.
- ◆ Strait's home video, George Strait Live, has been certified gold and platinum in sales.
- ◆ The singer/actor's debut on the big screen, Pure Country, in October of 1992, stayed in the Top Ten Box Office gross for four consecutive weeks. He says if there is a next time, he'd like to do a Western.
- ◆ George Strait fans purchased 95,000 tickets in one day for two shows at the Houston Astrodome, breaking records set by Elvis Presley and Dolly Parton.
- ◆ President George Bush presented Strait with the American Vocation Success Award for his involvement in vocational-technical education and training.



ith backgrounds in classical, bluegrass, rock and country, members of Diamond Rio have a spectrum of musical influences from which to draw when planning a new album. Whatever they do works, because the group has been in the winner's circle more than once, having taken home the Academy's Top Vocal Group Award in 1991 and 1992, as well as having gold-certified album credits. Group members pride themselves on doing all the instrumental work both on the concert trail and in the studio. "This is our sound," says lead singer Marty Roe. "We don't do anything in the studio that we can't do on stage. These guys are some super pickers, and that is exactly what we stand for. I'm proud of this band and what it can do."

- ♦ Bassist Dana Williams is a nephew of bluegrass legends The Osborne Brothers; keyboardist Dan Truman is classically trained.
- ◆ The group is ready and willing to support charity and

benefit projects, among them Friendship Fast/FOCUS, AIDS, and victims of the Palm Sunday tornado in Alabama. They also have their own celebrity golf tournament in Nashville to raise funds for the American Lung Association.

- ◆ Though members of Diamond Rio are songwriters, when pitching songs they often get someone else to demo the new song so that other members do not know that it was written by a member of the group.
- ◆ Gene Johnson can always go back to his "day job" — for several years he made his living as a cabinetmaker. And Jimmy Olander could be a stunt man — hailed as the "adventuresome one" of the group, he likes to go skydiving and Bungee-Jumping.
- ◆ Drummer Brian Prout was at one time a member of the Heartbreak Mountain group, where Marty Raybon of Shenandoah was also a member.

Super Heroes: Diamond Rio was honored in Idaho for their

positive influence on American Culture. State Representative Bill Sali noted that "Diamond Rio's Lyrics contain favorable messages, emulate traditional values and point out the importance of artists in the position of role models."

Fan Time: Fans of the group aren't openly critical, but they will let you know what they like, Marty Roe told Bruce R. Miller of the **Sioux City Journal**. "They're lukewarm about things they don't like, but they react tremendously to the things they do like. They don't act ugly or anything like that. But if you listen, you can tell what works and what doesn't."

Applause: "For an opening band, Diamond Rio was spectacular, capturing the crowd of about 4,000 from the earliest notes of "This Romeo Ain't Got Julie Yet" and keeping the crowd clapping and stomping through the Eagles-laden double encore." — Arizona Daily Sun.



embers of Little Texas have taken more than their share of good-natured ribbing about their needing more hair spray than the female singers appearing on the same stage with them. But it didn't take long for fans to realize that the young group of players and singers were sincere in their love for the music they were performing, and had a hot stage show to back it up. "It's great that people appreciate what you do, and being a self-contained band makes it so much better, because we do write our own music, and we do play on the records, so what's being appreciated is ours in every sense." The group was named the Academy of Country Music's 1993 Top Vocal Group. They have gold and platinum albums (First Time For Everything and Big Time, respectively), and had three of the top 25 singles in 1994. Like their latest offering says, Little Texas is ready to Kick A Little.

- ◆ You might think the group is named Little Texas because the majority of their band members are from the Lone Star State. "Wrong!" They took their name from a community 35 miles south of Nashville where they rehearsed. It is called Little Texas because in the early 1 920s it was a lawless place where outlaws on the run could hide out.
- ◆ Little Texas had four different songs with three different lead vocalists with "God Blessed Texas" and "What Might Have Been" sung by Tim Rushlow; "My Love," with lead vocals by Brady Seals, and "Peaceful Easy Feeling," with vocals by Dwayne O'Brien, charting in three different for-

mats simultaneously: Billboard Country, Hot 100 Singles and Hot Adult Contemporary charts.

- ◆ When they recorded Kick A Little, it was the first time the band had recorded in Nashville. It was also the first time they co-produced their recording sessions.
- ◆ The band has performed for President and Mrs. Clinton and were named World Ambassadors of the Great State of Texas by then-Governor Ann Richards.
- ◆ Four members of Little Texas met while attending Belmont University in Nashville; they met the other two in Springfield, Mass. while traveling around the country performing. One of the original members, Brady Seals, has been replaced by Jeff Huskins; the current group consists of him along with Porter Howell, Del Gray, Dwayne O'Brien, Duane Propes, and Tim Rushlow.



t's only taken them ten years, but members of Sawyer Brown are finally being taken seriously. At least, that's the way band member Hobie Hubbard sees it. "It has felt really good to see that some of the people out there who didn't think they liked us finally gave us a second chance," he told Tune-In magazine. "A lot of our critics - in the media, in the business and at radio – finally gave a listen to the music and stopped thinking about all the other nonsense. Once they started concentrating just on the music, and not all the politics, I think they heard something that they really liked." The disrespect for the band in the beginning possibly came from ditties like "Step That Step" and "Betty's Being Bad," but as Mark Miller points out, you sing different kinds of songs when you're 22 than when you're 32. More recent offerings, "Cafe On The Corner," "The Walk," and "All These Years" have met with less criticism and the realization that, since the band's been around for a decade, it just might not be going away!

◆ The band's current tour is being sponsored by 1-800-COLLECT

- ◆ Group members took part in the Silent Witness project, in which country stars talk about their faith and perform a Christian song. Their choice: "Carpenter's Son."
- ◆ Curb has just released their second greatest-hits package, aptly titled Greatest Hits 1990-1995.
- ◆ The group tours more than 200 days a year, carrying a \$3 million stage show.
- ◆ Their first studio album in two years is due out later this year. It's given them twice the time they had to pull together an album, both

for songwriting and recording. "I hope I'm not being too optimistic by saying that we hope we have six singles on this upcoming album," Miller says.

The state of country music: "Country music is sitting at the top. As artists, we feel that we are going to be personally responsible for it staying there or for it going down," Mark Miller told **Tune-In** magazine. "I think that every country artists needs to look at that right now, because in all of our ca-

reers, our next albums are the most important . . . I think that everybody needs to be careful that we don't flood the market with less than great material. We — Sawyer Brown — are going to focus and make sure that we come out of this thing on top."

Sawyer Brown fans are affectionately called Sawyer Brownies, and often show up at concerts with posters proclaiming the number of Sawyer Brown concerts they've been to. Often the figures are well into the double-digit range.

On their new-found popularity with the industry and media: "I think everything goes in cycles," Miller told Music City News. "When they start liking you, they'll hate you again. We are not the only artists it happens to. I see the media build you up, tear you down ... you really can't put too much weight into that. I think the only thing you can put weight into is your music. I think all of us as artists need to



rethink the passion that we have for our music."

Family Matters: Miller wants his kids to grow up normal and says he works hard at making sure that happens. As for them being in the music business, he'd rather they be bankers or school teachers. "I'll be honest — I do not want my kids to do this. It's too tough! But most importantly, I want them to know that it doesn't matter what it is you do when you grow up, just do your best and be a good person."

t was a hot night at the Exit/In in Nashville in more ways than one - the club's air conditioning was out, but more importantly, The Mavericks were showcasing for MCA Records, bringing their hot country sounds to Tennessee from their native Florida. The heat of the night worked its magic, and before the showcase was over, The Mavericks had a new label home. The recording deal was sweet to the group of youngsters who found that they were the only ones playing country music in Miami, where hard rock and dance music were thriving in the early 1990s. The Maverick's second album for MCA, What A Crying Shame, has garnered them platinum sales. For Raul Malo, Robert Reynolds, Paul Deakin and Nick Kane, things are falling into place. "We didn't want to do another record exactly like our first one," says Malo. "On this album we ... wanted to say what country music means to us, and demonstrate what we think it is."

- ◆ What A Crying Shame was named on many critics year-end "best of" lists, including the New York Times, Rolling Stone, National Public Radio, Spin Magazine and USA Today.
- ◆ The Mavericks are touring with Mary Chapin Carpenter in 1995, visiting 80-plus cities all across the U. S.

- ◆ The Mavericks formed specifically to play the country music individual members loved, despite the fact that they were advised by peers to follow them into the rock music field.
- ◆ One of The Mavericks favorite neighborhoods in Miami is Little Havana. "We go there to check out the restaurants, listen to people speak Spanish and talk about Fidel," says Malo.
- ◆ The Mavericks recorded with Carl Perkins and Duane Eddy on "Matchbox" for the Red Hot & Country album which benefits AIDS research, and had a track on the Skynyrd Frynds tribute album, "Call Me The Breeze."

On their own brand of country music: "Because we were in Miami, there was no one to tell us how country had to be played," Malo told **Request Magazine**. "When you open for a thrash band at a Miami rock club, you better play with a lot of energy!"

"The Mavericks represent an endangered species in '90s Nashville: taut, hard-edged country rock." — Tony Scherman, People.

"There's plenty of heartbreak on their second album, What A Crying Shame, and its hit title song, as well as in Malo's voice, which has an echo of Roy Orbison." — Rolling Stone

#### JOHN ANDERSON

e was "Swingin" in 1983, and he's "Swingin" in 1995, and not just because the chart-topping single appears on his latest album, Country 'Til I Die. John Anderson is one of country music's true stylists, and his career resurgence in 1990 with the Seminole Wind and Solid Ground albums garnered him the Academy of Country Music's 1994 Career Achievement Award. "I probably will be country 'til I die," Anderson says, referring to the title of his latest album. "It's cool to be country these days, but it's been pretty cool and hip for me for all these years. I was very fortunate to get an early start." Of his reason for including "Swingin" on his

latest album, Anderson says, "Some people have heard 'Swingin" and didn't realize we were the ones who sang it. Others heard it on the radio and thought it was a new tune and didn't know where to find it. So this album gives us a chance to offer it to them and kind of set the record straight. You might say it's charged up a little bit from the old version, but it's not like we got away from the old version."

◆ "Swingin" was the number 30 jukebox hit of all time, according to Amusement and Music Operators Assn.

◆ "Where Have The Children Gone," co-written with

Lionel Delmore for his latest album offering, was inspired by Anderson's two daughters, Brionna, 14, and Alexa, 3.

- ◆ Though he says he'll always be country, Anderson describes his cover of the Georgia Satellites hit, "Keep Your Hands To Yourself," also on the Country' Til I Die album, as "pretty rockin'."
- ♦ When BNA invited 250 quests to celebrate John Anderson's gold status on Solid Ground, 325 people replied, signifying the fans Anderson has within the music industry who are happy to see his career running full-steam ahead again.
- ◆ During the lean years, Anderson had to sell some of his farmland in Tennessee to keep his show on the road, but he never looked back. But he says those times weren't all bad—he got to spend time with his family, and together he and wife, Jamie, watched their girls grow and mature.
- "... things grow and change," Anderson told Bill Littleton of Performance Magazine last year. "In my case, the crowds have gotten larger, as a rule there are a lot more young people. I'm fortunate to say we've always had a good young following. We were playing straight ahead country music, but with a twist that we hoped would appeal to people our age (John was 17 when he first came to Nashville, 23 when he started having hits). And it did, but not to the proportion that it does today."

"Writing, singing and putting on shows are the three things I love to do the most. That's why I left my home at 17 and went to Nashville in the first place," Anderson told John Latte at Country Weekly.



racy Lawrence has taken charge of his life. Within the past couple years, he's become his own manager, publisher and occasional producer; he's gotten married, and he's had an album debut at the number three spot on Billboard's country charts. By his own admission, that's a far cry from the young man who came to town in a 1980 Toyota Corolla with 250,000 miles, expired tags, no insurance, less than \$1,000 to live on, and no clue how

to "make it" in the music business. The determination was there, however, and two years later, in 1992, he was named the Academy of Country Music's New Male Vocalist. Albums went gold and platinum, and the Arkansas native was soon country music's newest heartthrob. ♦ In February of 1993, Tracy was performing at the Denver Stock Show. and while signing autographs met the woman who would six months later become Mrs. Tracy Lawrence Frances Weatherford is a former junior rodeo champion.

◆ One constant in his life has been his bulldog, Truman, who goes on the road with Tracy. "He gives me unconditional love," Tracy says.

◆ "Hillbilly With A Heartache," the duet with John Anderson which garnered Tracy his ACM nomination, is one of the tracks the singer/songwriter produced himself. The first self-produced track, "Renegades, Rebels and Rogues," was on the

#### Maverick soundtrack.

◆ Lawrence is always willing to work for various charities, including literacy, hurricane relief, AIDS, hunger and cancer. The last is especially important to him because one of the first people in Nashville to support and believe in him, Terry Buttram, died of cancer in June of 1993.

His hometown of Foreman, Arkansas named a street after Lawrence. "The main strip through the middle of town,"

the singer notes. "Just go down to the E-Z Mart and take a left." Obviously, he hasn't lost his sense of humor!


Of rabbits' feet and horseshoes: "I don't believe in luck. A lot of people say that I've been very lucky, but I think there's no substitute for hard work and for a love of what you do. I think if you want to achieve anything in this country, there is nobody that can stop you. I believe in my heart that every-body's been given something that is their purpose in life. Music is mine. I'll never want to do anything else."


Music executive Tracy Lawrence? In an interview with Performance Magazine, Lawrence expressed an interest in management. "Ido enjoy the business side of the industry and like the challenge and competitiveness of it all. I am going in the studio with Kenny Beard, one of my band members . . . to do four or five masters on him and try to pitch him for a (record) deal."

#### GEORGE JONES

ho wouldn't want to sing with George Jones? That's why there was no problem in setting up The Bradley Barn Sessions which featured an array of country and rock talent, ranging from this nominated duet with Alan Jackson to collaborations with Mark Knopfler, Tammy Wynette and Keith Richards. Jones let each of his duet partners pick the song they wanted to do with him, which he says led to more than a few surprises! For instances, George thought Jackson would pick an uptempo song, but he chose "A Good Year For The Roses," while he looked forward to a ballad with Vince Gill, who chose "Love Bug." Others picked obscure album cuts, like Mark Chesnutt's choice, "Good Ones And Bad Ones." While Jones' heroes were Roy Acuff, Hank Williams and Lefty Frizzell.

many of today's country and rock stars idolize the country music legend. In another legendary duet album, In 1992, George was honored with The Pioneer Award from the Academy of Country Music, previously having been named Top Male Vocalist in 1980, the same year he received Single and Song Of The Year awards for "He Stopped Loving Her Today."

- ♦ It was so important to Keith Richards to sing with the country legend on The Bradley Barn Sessions that he left a Rolling Stones album half-mixed to travel to Nashville to duet on "Say It's Not You." Comments Jones, "His hoarse, breathy vocals might sound a little odd, especially to country fans, but it's so odd that it's really good. You could tell he was putting a lot of soul into it."
- ◆ The Bradley Barn Sessions was not the first time Jones had teamed with rock superstars; he's also recorded with newwave rocker Elvis Costello and pop star Gene Pitney.
- ◆ In the mid-50s, George Jones led a double life. On the

one hand, he was recording for Mercury Records under his real name, on the rockabilly side, he was recording as Thumper Jones!

- ♦ His license plates read IDOSHOW, and Jones still spends 100 days on the road each year. When not traveling, he and Nancy spend their time on a 90-acre farm outside of Nashville.
- ◆ Jones was a part of another duet album, the Rhythm, Country & Blues project on MCA Records, which paired two legends: Jones and bluesman B. B. King on a moving rendition of "Patches."


"I got a lot of my phrasing from Lefty (Frizzell). You know, you make a five-syllable word out of a one-syllable, then you add a little bit from Roy Acuff and a little bit from Hank

Williams. I sing with my voice and their phrasing, and I thank those three people every day."

On his duet partners: "I thought Alan (Jackson) sang better on "A Good Year For The Roses" than I'd ever heard him. I think Trisha Yearwood should do more stuff like that ("Bartender's Blues") because she really put some soul and some feeling into that song. I'll be listening to the tape going down the highway in a car, and I'll forget what lines Mark Chesnutt did and what I did."

"I love to record and I still love to perform. That's all I'm really interested in. That's a mighty big job right there!"

"If country artists will admit it, we got a lot from the soul ports. I think that if you put it all together, we are all in there with the same type of feelings that we put into a song," Jones says of his inclusion in the Rhythm, Country & Blues project. King agrees. "And most of us blues people found that country songs had the lyrics that were telling the stories that, in a lot of cases, we wanted to tell as well."

he best friend a song ever had" is the way Conway Twitty was brought on-stage for many years, and truer words were never spoken. In three decades he amassed 50 number-one hits, 35 of which are on The Conway Twitty Collection, a four-CD boxed set on MCA Records. He also amassed a huge fan following which attended concerts. bought his records and visited his home, in Twitty City in Nashville. He won the Academy of Country Music's Male Vocalist Award in 1975, and that same year took Album Of The Year honors with Loretta Lynn for Feelings. He also won Duet with Lynn in 1971, and 1974-1976. This year he's nominated for his duet with Sam Moore on "Rainy Night In Georgia," included on the Rhythm, Country & Blues project on MCA. The day the two recorded the song in a Nashville studio, it poured rain. "Sam ordered rain for us," Conway said as they prepared to record.

◆ The 89-song, four-CD collection on MCA features the original 1958 version of "It's Only Make Believe," along with previously unreleased recordings from Conway's early years on Sun Records, his audition for Decca Records, and his recording of "Sweet Sweet Lord" that was played at his funeral.

◆ Early in his career, Conway starred in several movies, among them Platinum High School and Sex Kittens Go To College.

◆ Twitty has been quoted as saying that sometimes

he would go through as many as 1,500 songs before he narrowed it down to the final ten to be recorded for an album.

- ◆ "Don't Call Him A Cowboy," which reached number one in June of 1985, was the singer's 50th number-one single.
- ◆ Conway Twitty was 10 years old when he formed his first band, the Phillips County Ramblers, and was given his own radio show over KFFA in Helena, Arkansas.

"For longevity, consistency, universal appeal and, above all, dedication

to making great music, Conway Twitty had no equal. He was a prize for Decca when Owen Bradley signed him in 1965. During his MCA years he became a living legend, and through his music, his legacy lives on forever."—Katie Gillon, MCA vice-president of production and creative services, who oversaw The Conway Twitty Collection.

On becoming a major league baseball player: "I was offered a contract with the Philadelphia Phillies when I was 17, but I was drafted by the Army before I could accept. Although the offer was still good when I was discharged, I heard an Elvis Presley record and decided to make music my career."

"He took the Nashville sound, to paraphrase one of his best-known hits, about as far as it could go. Typically, he'd begin a song with a low, raspy growl, and then both voice and band would build into a crescendo, Conway always adding a few moans and sighs along the way." — John Morthland in The Best Of Country Music.

It all begins with the song: "I learned a long time ago it's the song, not the singer, that's the most important thing. There are a lot of great singers who are not having hit records anymore. I think it's because they are not picking the right songs. A lot of artists reach the point where they won't record songs they don't write or publish or both. They begin to think it's them. I know it's 99 percent the song, not what I do to it."

nown for being a duet partner, Sam Moore's all boration with the late Conway Twitty on "Rainy Night In a vegia" for the Rhythm, Country and Blues project should come as no surprise to those who know him. Perhaps best known for the music made as a part of Sam and Dave, Moore has also dueted with Annie Lennox,


Don Henley, Elvis Costello, Phil Collins, and Bruce Springsteen. As part of Sam and Dave, he gave the world such classics as "Hold On! I'm Comin'," "I Thank You" and "When Something Is Wrong With My Baby." He's performed before presidents (Jimmy Carter) and queens (Elizabeth), and been in several movies. In 1990-91, he was honored with the Rhythm & Blues Foundation's Pioneer Award, and in 1992 he was inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame.

- ◆ Moore plans his first solo album in 20 years, scheduled to be recorded sometime this summer.
- ◆ Sam and Dave were the inspiration for the parody by Belushi and Aykroyd of The Blues Brothers.
- ♦ Moore has been


back in the songwriting mode, and has been working with such Nashville songwriters as Marty Stuart.

- ◆ As a duo, Sam and Dave scored gold records with "Hold On, I'm Comin'," "Soul Man," "I Thank You," "When Something Is Wrong With My Baby," "Soothe Me," "You Don't Know Like I Know" and "Wrap It Up. "
- ◆ Sam and Dave were the first black artists to perform soul music in Japan.

Praise was high for the duet Moore recorded with Conway Twitty: "For laid-back warmth, the standout track is Brook Benton's 'Rainy Night In Georgia' . . . Producer Don Was wisely chose to leave in the seemingly impromptu conversation at the end of the song, capturing the two men's mutual admiration. The most inspired pairing combines Sam and




Dave's Sam Moore with Conway Twitty, at first glance an oil-and-water mix. But on Brook Benton's 'Rainy Night In Georgia,' Moore's edgy intensity finds its perfect foil in Twitty's syrupy mellowness." And finally, "Most moving of all is Twitty's duet with Sam Moore... As these two mature voices commune on Tony Joe White's beautifully sad tale, the thin line between country and R&B seems to fade into the peaceful sound of the dripping rain on a tin roof."

er marriage to Robert Reynolds of The Mavericks has had a positive effect on her recording career - "Thinkin' About You (her latest album) is more positive than the last album because I'm happily married." Trisha Yearwood explains. "I realize relationships can actually work. I can sing these songs with feeling." Fans would say she already was singing her songs with feelings, such as the "The Song Remembers When," a song that went number one across the board for the Georgia songstress. In 1991 she was named the Academy of Country Music's Best New Female Vocalist. On getting to see her husband, Yearwood acknowledges, "We've got enough frequent flyer miles from flying to see each other that we should own our own plane by now! "Despite their separate careers, she says they have managed to see a lot of each other in the year that they've been married.

- ◆ Trisha's dad, a retired banker, and her mother, a retired schoolteacher, run Trisha's fan club from her hometown of Monticello, Georgia.
- ◆ The song "XXXs and OOOs" was the theme for a television movie, and also became one of the biggest singles of 1994.

- ◆ Trisha and Robert live near Nashville in a six-year-old log home which was built from five pre-Civil War log homes. They inherited a nearly completely furnished house because the previous owner, an antique collector, didn't want to take the contents with her when she moved.
- ◆ An advocate of not recording her own songs, Yearwood has had cuts by Michelle Wright and Kenny Rogers.
- ◆ Her 1991 single, "She's In Love With A Boy," was the first number-one debut country single by a woman since Shelly West scored with "Jose Cuervo" in 1983.

Inside track: "I was answering telephones at MTM Records when Hugh Prestwood was a staff writer there," says Yearwood, "and "The Song Remembers When' was a song of his I knew about when I made Hearts In Armor in 1992. It gives me chills, because it's a reflection of how you change as a person, or how you're able to see things in a different light."

Harlan Howard's reaction to first hearing Trisha Yearwood: "Man, she's as good as Patsy Cline. She can sing five notes in place of one, but she chooses to keep it simple. There hasn't been a song written that girl can't sing."

hen Aaron Neville came out with the single "The Grand Tour," a few people raised their eye cours, at the thought that this New Orleans-raised R&B singer would even think he could sing a country song, especially one made famous by George Jones. Jones immediately took Neville under his wing and Neville himself was quick to set things straight. "When I was a kid, I used to sing Hank Williams, Roy Rogers, Gene Autry. I always wanted to do a country song. I grew up wanting to

be a cowboy. I even learned to yodel. Country music is a form of the blues, in a sense." Religious music is what Neville remembers hearing first in his life, followed by Sam Cooke and the Soul Stirrers. Another favorite was Bill Withers, who he pays tribute to on The Tattooed Heart when he recorded "Use Me." Neville and Trisha Yearwood did a fine rendition of Patsy Cline's "I Fall To Pieces" for the Rhythm, Country and Blues project on MCA Records, and received rave reviews for it. "They always call me an R&B singer in

write-ups. I've never known what that meant," Neville says. "I mean, I like all music. I like to sing everything from 'Ave Maria' to 'The Mickey Mouse Song."

◆ For his last album, The Tattooed Heart, Neville recorded three songs in Nashville with producer Keith Steagall: "For The Good Times," "In Your Eves" and "Why Should I Fall In Love."

◆ Neville's duets with Linda Ronstadt came after he invited her on-stage to sing with him at a couple of concerts in New Orleans, and she got up enough nerve to tell him she wanted to record with him.

♦ While "Tell It Like It Is" was riding high on the pop charts, Neville was supporting his family as a longshoreman on the banks of the Mississippi River.

♦ A clinic in England plays Neville's records to soothe addicts going through detoxification.

◆ As a teenager, Neville found the best place to practice the latest radio hits was in the boy's bathroom at the public school he attended — "the acoustics were better in there," he explains. Trisha Yearwood on Aaron Neville: "It seemed very easy to walk in the studio and sing with Aaron. It didn't seem like we had to say 'Okay, now I'm going to try to sing like this,' or 'I'm going to try to sing this way.' We just sang." Aaron Neville on George Jones: "My brother turned me on to George Jones a long time ago and I liked everything he did. It was like he had lived his songs."

People tell Neville his voice has helped them through tough times. "I know what they're talking about, because it helped me through my rough times too."

### DAYID BALL

#### TOP NEW MALE VOCALIST

hough "Thinkin' Problem" may be the Tirst song that hit nationally for David Ball, he actually had a record deal in the late 1980's in Nashville with RCA Records. It might not have made his name popular in households across the nation, but it put him through songwriting school, and helped him develop a relationship with producer Blake Chancey, who produced his first Warner Brothers album. The son of a Baptist preacher in Rock Hill, South


Carolina, Ball merged his folksy rots with Bob Wills' dance sounds after moving to Austin, Texas, in the mid '70s. "What that basically means," Ball quips, "is that I began putting jalapenos in my coleslaw!" Whatever he did, it worked, because the album has spawned several hit singles in addition to the title cut: "When The Thought Of You," "Honky-Tonk Healin" and "Look What Followed Me Home." If the trend continues, what might follow him home is the Acad-

emy of Country Music's Top New Male Vocalist

- ◆ Ball's first concert was when he was five years old and his parents took him to see Fred Kirby. "I can still see him in his cowboy suit singing 'Big Rock Candy Mountain.' This was the first time I heard somebody in concert and it left quite an impression on me."
- ♦ When he was seven years old, David asked Santa Claus for a guitar. "Santa almost came through I wound up with a ukelele! But by the time my birthday came around in July, the folks relented and I got a Stella guitar."
- ◆ As a part of Uncle Walt's Band, Ball moved to Austin, Texas in 1976 with the trio because there was so much work in the Lone Star State.
- ◆ During hisearly days in Nashville, Ball became known as "The Human Jukebox" because he could play so many different songs.
- ◆ Though Ball wrote his first song before he was in his teens, he says he honed his songwriting talents in Nashville, working with such songwriters as Frank Dycus to learn his craft. He wrote nine of the 10 songs on his debut album.

Thoughts On Thinkin' Problem: "Dance halls ... those big places that are all over Texas and our West where people dance and they love music. Split rails, big old Quonset sheds, low ceilings—that's what I like, and I wanted this to be a good dance record, because I love playing those places."

"He's a honky-tonk man and the album twangs steady. Haunted, in a thoroughly entertaining way, David Ball makes real country music sound real fun again. His engaging title track announces the arrival of a loud and proud talent... Mixing swing and swagger, he delivers one of the best albums of the year."—The Ottawa Citizen.

t took people 10 years to quit asking him about his near-fatal motorcycle accident, so John Berry figures it 11 be at least that long before they put aside his 1994 surgery for removal of a brain cyst. On the positive side, however, the surgery and his speedy recovery did generate a lot of publicity for him, and "The only bad publicity is no publicity; and this has brought a lot of good publicity."

Though Berry has been accepted in country music circles, he doesn't claim to have grown up listening to country music. The Aiken, South Carolina native, who grew up in Atlanta, says his favorite music was from Philadelphia groups like the Chi-Lites and the Stylistics. "I didn't even know what country was for a long time," he admitted to Jack Hurst of the Chicago Tribune. "I wasn't brought up around it." But after he heard John Denver, he began to play acoustic guitar and learn more about country music and its heritage.

◆ When John Berry first heard "Your Love Amazes Me," Tanya Tucker was supposed to be cutting it. "Isaid, 'Boy, if anything happens, if it doesn't make it to her record, let me know." For some reason, the song didn't make the cut for Tucker's album, and the rest is country music history.

◆ One night in Athens, Georgia, police counted 425 people in a nightclub where Berry was playing. It had a listed capacity for 98, so they immediately shut the place down.


◆ Berry travels down the road in one bus which houses four band members, two crew members, the T-shirt salesman, Berry's wife, his mother-in-law, his two children and him.

◆ He met his wife, Robin, in Athens, and asked her out for three years before she accepted his offer of a date. She began singing with him after they were married. He says she sounds "like a sweet songbird."

◆ John performs two free concerts each year for the 1,000-member Green Acres Baptist Church in Athens as a thank you for his appreciation of the church in which Robin grew up.

"John Berry is a good candidate to stand out from his competition on the current Nashville scene... he brings an extraordinary amount of emotion to well-chosen material." — The Chicago Tribune.

he kid came to Nashville with a dream, and the determination to make it come true. Six years after his arrival in Nashville, the Louisiana native has two multi-platinum albums, several hit singles and has toured with the likes of Joe Diffie, Sawyer Brown, Dwight Yoakam, Wynonna and the Unbeatable Wheatable tour with Little Texas and BlackHawk. "I honestly never thought something like this would happen," says McGraw. "I just hoped. You think you might have some success, because otherwise you wouldn't try to get into the business.

But when you're from a small town and you hear those guys on the radio, it seems like that is just a whole 'nother world.' It was a world he decided to pursue, so he dropped out of college at Northeast Louisiana University, sold everything he had, including his car, shotguns and water-skis, and moved to Nashville. "I sold everything I couldn't carry to move to Nashville. I rode in on a Greyhound bus."


- ◆ McGraw's first job in Nashville was singing at Skull's Rainbow Room in Printer's Alley. "If I wasn't there, I was out playing somewhere else," he recalls.
- ♦ To this day, McGraw thinks Curb Records signed him because Joe Diffie was singing harmonies on the demo tape he brought them in 1990.
- ◆ Keith Whitley is Tim's favorite singer; McGraw moved to Nashville on May 9, 1989, the day Whitley died of an alcohol overdose.

♦ McGraw discovered that his real dad was baseball great Tug McGraw at the age of 11, when he found his birth certificate. "My last name had 'McGraw' scratched out, and the occupation of father was 'baseball player'," he told Tom McNichol for USA Weekend. "Right away I got a flood of all these clues along the way — little things that people had said — and I started putting the whole thing together. I went to my mom, and we spent the whole day just riding around. She told me the whole story."

◆ He is the only country act of his generation to have two gold singles from an album, "Indian Outlaw" and "Don't Take The Girl," from his Not A Moment Too Soon offering.

"It was awesome," Tug McGraw says of seeing his son perform "Don't Take The Girl" in front of a live audience. "There was a lady holding a baby near the front of the stage and about halfway through the song, she lost it. She went over to her husband and hugged him, and you could see tears streaming down her face. It was unbelievable. It almost made me cry."

"McGraw, who was the hottest newcomer of '94 for charted singles and sales has a better handle on what country music is ... it's brought to the listener by production crews who just as easily could have brought us Van Halen or Rod Stewart or, more recently, Garth Brooks." — Peter North, Edmonton Journal.

t the ripe ole age of seven, Lisa Brokop was performing with her family's band, by 11, she was sitting in with other local groups in Vancouver, near her hometown of Surrey, British Columbia. At age 15, she joined the Marty Gillan and Sweetwater Band as a singer, rhythm guitarist and keyboard player. A year later, she formed her own band. A quick glance at that history lets you know that Lisa has never wavered in her quest of pursuing a career in country music. "Nashville has been the big place for me since I was four years old," says Brokop. "I didn't know what it was — I just knew it was a place where everybody went." Citing Dottie West and Kenny Rogers as early influences, Brokop now ranks Billy Dean and Wynonna among her favorites.

- ◆ In 1993, Lisa landed a role in the movie Harmony Cats, about a country music band that hires a violin player from the Vancouver Symphony who hates country music.
- ◆ Brokop's producer, Jerry Crutchfield, is no stranger to Canadian sirens he has also produced Anne Murray.

- ◆ When she was 17, she won radio station CKWX's Nashville Songwriting Contest, which earned herthe privilege of co-writing with Nashville tunesmith Peter McCann.

ictoria Shaw could fit the de-

scription of the people who have "gone country" in Alan Jackson's song by the same name. New York born and California raised, she always knew she wanted to be singer — except for the two weeks that she thought maybe she'd be an astronomer! Her destiny was set as a singer/songwriter when, at the age of 12, she wrote her first song. At the time, she and her band would work in a local outdoor mall for free, with her sister handing out cards while the band played. The free gig led to them playing weddings, birthday parties and other social occasions, and Victoria began her long jour-

ney toward a career in country music. Though she wanted to be a recording artist, her first fame came as a songwriter: "The River" for Garth Brooks, "Too Busy Being In Love" for Doug Stone, "I Love The Way You Love Me" for John Michael Montgomery and "We Don't Have To Do This" for Tanva Tucker. It wasn't long before Warner/Reprise saw the light, and Victoria's debut album is due out this fall. In the meantime, fans can enjoy her single, "Forgiveness," described as a "power ballad" which she, of course, wrote.

- ◆ Victoria's parents were both singers; her father, Ray, gave up his career to manage her mother, Carol.
- ◆ Influences include Linda Rondstadt, The Eagles and J. D. Souther, artists who defined the California sound when Victoria was a resident of the West Coast.
- ◆ One particularly inspirational moment for Victoria came when, as a child, she watched her mother perform on the Ed Sullivan Show. "I thought she looked absolutely beautiful," the songstress remembers.
- ◆ Compared to K. T. Oslin as a songwriter who writes songs with frankness and intelligence, Shaw also says her songs adhere to the promise of romance and

redemption.

◆ Among her songwriting partners: Desmond Child, Jon Vezner, Gary Burr, Jess Leary and Lari White

"I personalize a lot of things that I write about. I put a lot of humor into what I write, even if it's a serious song. Real life is like that, there's a lot of comedy in life, especially at the strangest times. Look at 'I Love The Way You Love Me' — that song couldn't be more sincere, but some of the lines are just hilarious."



t was the essence of what dreams are made of - Harlan Howard telling a newcomer to country music, "Thank you for cutting my songs." But it happened to Chely Wright when she cut "He's A Good Ole Boy," her debut single. The Kansas-born daughter of musical parents, Wright cut her teeth on the likes of Wanda Jackson, Connie Smith, Loretta Lynn, Buck Owens, Bill Anderson and Porter Wagoner, so it's no wonder that she was thrilled when Harlan told her he liked her version of his song! From performing locally, Wright went to the Ozark Jubilee in Branson, Missouri, then on to perform at Opryland, USA theme park in Nashville for five seasons. She's also traveled with Porter Wagoner and other folks she grew up idolizing. "I grew up wanting to meet so many of them, so to work with them and now be such good friends, have them call me and say 'Hey Chely! Just checking up on you'... that's really a dream come true."

◆ Chely says her career was a family project. Her father was her bus driver when she formed her band, County Line, and family reunions consisted of a poker game in one room and music in the other.

- ◆ Wright's parents now own and operate the Flint Hills Opry, the longest-running music show in the state of Kansas.
- ◆ Determined to work with producer Harold Shedd, Wright finally got an appointment with him for "10 minutes." An hour and a half later, the two were still talking. He eventually coproduced her first Polydor project, Woman In The Moon.
- ◆ Five of Chely's tunes appear on her debut album alongside the songs of legendary tunesmiths like Harlan Howard and Bill Anderson.
- ◆ The ultimate goal of this 23-year old is to be a member of the Grand Ole Opry "you gotta give me a couple of years for that," she says.

"With an earthy country voice, Chely Wright is doing everything with near perfection on her debut disc, Woman In The Moon. This country newcomer has a

sense of how to deliver a number with twang and honesty, making the most of the Nashville arrangements backing her. "— Dan Aquilante, New York Post.



◆ Oklahoma native Steve Ripley has worked with Leon Russell, J. J. Cale, produced Western swing legend Johnny

Lee Wills, served as lead guitarist for Bob Dylan, and built a guitar that's been played by everyone from Eddie Van Halen to Toto's Steve Lukather.

- ◆ Walt Richmond is steeped in New Orleans traditions, Western swing and out-and-out blues, having cut his road teeth performing with Bonnie Raitt.
- ◆ Ron Getman plays anything with strings and has proved his provess on electric and slide guitar, steel guitar, dobro and mandolin with the likes of Janis Ian and Leonard Cohen.

- ◆ Jamie Oldaker keeps all the guys in rhythm, much as he did when he was playing with Eric Clapton.



hough they're giving 200 percent when it comes to their musical success, it has come with a taste of bittersweet — John and Audrey Wiggins' father, John Wiggins, was killed in an auto accident just before the brother/sister duo's first album was released on Mercury Records. "One great thing was getting to call daddy and say Daddy! We got the deal, the full-blown deal with Mercury Records," says John. "And he was really excited. But he never got to hear the last sessions." Nevertheless, the love for music he instilled in his children lives on in the Wiggins' self-titled debut album, which runs rampant with

Appalachian melodies and sibling harmonies. "Mama said that when we first started talking, we started singing too," says Audrey. "They saw something in us from the time we were little-bitty and nurtured that."

- ◆ John and Audrey's father, John, became the first touring bus driver/mechanic in the country music business when he was hired by Ernest Tubb in the early 1960s. He began opening Tubb's concerts as "The Singing Bus Driver"
- ◆ John made his debut singing "Honky Tonk Man" with the Texas Troubadours when he was only four, and formed his own bluegrass band when he was in the sixth grade.
- ◆ Ernest Tubb brought
  Audrey to the Grand Ole Opry when she was 12. She thrilled the audience with "Lovesick Blues."
- ◆ The brother/sister duo was the house band at The Stompin' Ground music barn in Maggie Valley, N.C. for six years.
- ◆ Among their first jobs in Nashville, John worked at the Music Valley Car Museum and Audrey at the Music

Valley Wax Museum. Later, John followed in his father's footsteps as a bus driver, touring with rock guitarist Henry Lee Summer. Audrey later was a tour guide at the Country Music Hall of Fame, following in the footsteps of Kathy Mattea.

he only new artist to be a million-seller in 1993. John Michael Montgomery has managed to keep that early established tradition going strong. He took home the Academy of Country Music's New Male Vocalist Award that year, and a few more honors as he traveled the road to country music success. Now, with his second album, Kickin' It Up, Montgomery continues with the success —the album has already been certified platinum. "There's a lot more of my rowdy southern rock side on this

album," the singer says. "It's still got the traditional stuff and the kind of ballads that I love to sing, but it's also got a little more of an edge to it." Of his runaway hit, "I Swear," Montgomery says "I like that song just as much as 'I Love The Way You Love Me.' It's a real positive, true-love song ... it's the kind of song that people in love will identify with."


Montgomery took his father's place when the elder Montgomery retired from a band that includes his brother


Eddie as drummer and Tim Williams on bass. Williams continues to play with him today, and Eddie comes along to help out on the road.

- ◆ In 1993, "I Love The Way You Love Me" was CMT's eighth-most-popular video of the year.
- ◆ As a teenager, Montgomery told People Weekly he would look in the mirror and wonder "why he had these two holes (dimples) in my face."
- ◆ Of the 10,000 fan letters he gets a month, a good number are proposals of marriage to the Kentucky-born singer. Here's a hint for those aspiring to be Mrs. J. M. Montgomery: he likes Sharon Stone and Heather Locklear.
- ◆ Montgomery is quick to acknowledge that the Eagles were an influence on his music, but goes on to say that Lionel Richie is his chief influence.

Commenting on the idea that sex is selling country music today, Montgomery told Earl Dittman of Tune-In, "I believe that those people need to realize that just because there are some looks there, that doesn't necessarily mean that is the only thing selling the album, and that those people can't sing. The public is not ignorant. They are not going to buy an album of a guy who can't sing just because he's good looking. He's got to have the total package."

"His records fit neatly into Nashville's commercial, radio-ready mold, but in his seemingly quick rise to stardom, he and Atlantic have challenged some time-honored Music Row traditions."—Peter Cronin, Billboard.





ndependence Day" might be an apt decription of Martina McBride's second album. While her first release was very traditional country, the second one has allowed her to stretch a little bit, and utilize other influences outside of the country realm. "When I was making this album, I felt a lot more confident. I knew what to expect. I wasn't so naive. The first time out, I was really concerned with being taken seriously as an artist. I looked for songs that had a lot to say. I'm not sure that I didn't go over the line with the first album. Maybe it was too serious. This album has a better balance. There are songs on here that are just fun. Then there are some serious songs too. "Martina says the album is also a good portrayal of where she is at this point in her career, and marks a real growth for her, "maybe even more than usual for a singer's sophomore effort."

◆ Martina says that since she doesn't write songs, all of her creative energies go into making her records.

♦ Gretchen Peters tried to write a different ending for the song "Independence Day," but she kept coming back to the one we've heard. Says McBride, "My hope is that I can educate young people, so that maybe a girl who's 15 and getting verbally abused, in the back of her mind, she ... might turn around and walk away."


"Heart Trouble" is a song Martina didn't see herself singing, but producer Paul Worley encouraged her to give it a try and it ended up on her second album The Way That I Am.

◆ McBride says she loves to record songs that paint a picture, like "Independence Day" and "She Ain't Seen Nothing Vet"


♦ Martina says that, even though she feels comfortable on stage, the first six or seven shows of her tour with Garth Brooks were really hard for her. "I had never been responsible for putting together my own show before," she admits. "But I like a challenge, so I worked at building the show. And then I started connecting with the audience, which is the most important thing to me."



After celebrating its 30th anniversary in 1994, the Academy of Country Music continues to move forward in leading Country Music into the 21 st Century. The continuation of Fan Fest, established in 1994, along with participation in the Country Radio Seminar in Nashville, the annual Celebrity Golf Classic and numerous seminars, workshops and industry panels keep Academy members both informed and involved in all aspects of the Country Music community.

Most importantly, however, the Academy continues to follow the original reason for the establishment of the organization in 1964 — the enhancement and promotion of Country Music. Panel discussions involve mem-

bers of different aspects of the music community, from video to radio and record companies, bringing them together to discuss changes in the industry and how they can all work together to forge a better spot in the marketplace for everyone. Showcases introduce newcomers to radio, television and print media, as well as to those within the industry who need to know about them: concert promoters, talent buyers and club owners. They also help the new artists to network within the industry to help them build their careers. Guest speakers at special luncheons address hot topics within the Country Music industry, bringing attention to them so that those within the industry are not left behind when it comes to videos, new promotions, increases in talent fees and other important elements which need to be recognized.

The Academy's involvement at the Country Radio Seminar in Nashville has raised the profile of Academy activities. From sponsoring luncheons to hosting hospitality suites during the evening hours, the Academy has broadened its scope, and its membership, by being a part of that gathering. The presentation of the survey, "What's This Country All About?" met with much applause a few years ago, and the Super Faces Show, which in various years featured Brooks & Dunn, Hank Williams, Jr., The Judds, Alabama, George Strait, Garth Brooks and Reba McEntire, was a rousing success.

Realizing that the Academy cannot always ask without giving back, the organization began sponsoring a Celebrity Golf Classic in 1983. The tournament not only brings together the various elements of the music industry for a time when they can relax and enjoy each other's company, it brings in people from other businesses in the Los Angeles community who find that interacting with the music community enhances their own business, and vice versa. In addition, the Celebrity Golf Classic has raised over \$450,000 for charities including the American Heart Association, M.D. Anderson Cancer Hospital in Houston, Texas, and the TJ. Martell Foundation/Neil Bogart Memorial Laboratory for cancer, leukemia and AIDS research.

Membership in the Academy, open to any and all country music industry-related professionals, continues to grow. The membership fee, set by the Academy's Board of Directors, includes a subscription to the monthly newsletter, Country Focus, which keeps members informed on personnel changes within the industry, up-and-coming country acts, information about the Academy itself, and other interesting tidbits of news from all aspects of Country Music. The member also receives voting privileges for the annual awards and the opportunity to vote in the election of

officers and members of the Board of Directors.

The Academy of Country Music Awards Show, which began in 1965, has not always been televised, but it has always endeavored to honor those who have achieved the most success in the previous year. From its beginning until 1971, the show was held locally and not televised. In 1972the show was televised via syndication; ABC picked up the show in 1974. In 1979, the Academy associated itself with dick clark productions inc., which included a move to NBC and prime time status for the awards show.

Understanding the need for updating and expansion, the Academy now recognizes not only the achievements of the recording artists, but those by songwriters, publishers, producers, record companies, radio stations, disc jockeys, night clubs, talent promoters and other individuals within the industry who have made exceptional contributions to the Country Music industry within the past year. In 1993, the Academy expanded its awards show to three hours, making it the first country music awards presentation to give the industry 120 minutes of exposure on prime time television.

The Board of Directors are not the only industry representatives who give of their time to the Academy. Numerous individual members, dedicated and hardworking, volunteer for various tasks throughout the year, knowing that their contribution will help to expand the industry and make it more visible to the rest of the business community, and to the fans. Each of the volunteers work hard to represent this American art form of Country Music in its best light. They realize that the more attention they can garner for the industry, the more the industry will grow and prosper.

The Academy thanks those of you in attendance at the Awards Show tonight who have joined us for previous presentations. It appreciates your support and your continued allegiance. To those of you who are here for the first time, welcome. The Academy hopes you enjoy the presentation and will return next year to what has become known as a family reunion for those who work within the Academy of Country Music.

President

uthor of *Life Is A Contact Sport: Ten Great Career Strategies That Work*, Kragen has spent more than 30 years in the entertainment business, reaching the top of his profession. He has guided the careers of many important entertainers, including country's Trisha Yearwood, Travis Tritt and Kenny Rogers. His association with Mr. Rogers has lasted more than 23 years. He has produced many highly successful and innovative television programs, including the original "Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour" (1967–1968), their successful return to CBS Television (1988 and 1989), three mini-series and four television movies starring Kenny Rogers, and several dozen network and cable television specials.

Ken was creator and organizer of the "We Are The World" South African relief effort. He put together the 45 artists who performed the song and then he created the organization which supervised the raising and distribution of the funds. Because of the problems of hunger and homelessness here in the United States, he developed a project known as "Hands Across America," rallying some 7 million Americans to stand hand-in-hand from the Atlantic to the Pacific. These two projects raised \$101 million; Ken has two rooms of awards and plaques including the highly coveted United Nations Peace Medal as a result of his efforts for the disadvantaged.

Kragen has taught a weekly course in persoal management at UCLA Extension for several years and is a sought-after speaker for corporate meetings and conventions. Ken has served on both the ACM and CMA boards and is currently serving as President of the Academy of Country Music.

Ken and his wife reside in California and are the parents of a 5-year-old daughter.

rained as an accountant in his native Oklahoma, DuBois made his first tentative steps into the music industry when he moved to Texas. He had received his Masters and his CPA certificate from Oklahoma State University and went to work for Arthur Anderson & Co., and subsequently as a senior financial analyst at the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

While in Texas DuBois became enthralled with the wide range of musical styles he heard. In 1977, DuBois relocated to Nashville and DuBois began managing Restless Heart. To gain some extra leverage for the act, he convinced Los Angeles based Fitzgerald-Hartley to open a Nashville office and then became a partner with the company in managing the group; subsequently, they added Vince Gill to the roster. Gill and DuBois began writing songs together and in 1992 the two won Song of the Year awards from the Academy of Country Music and the Country Music Association for composing Gill's career-boosting hit "When I Call Your Name." DuBois was overseeing Fitzgerald-Hartley's Nashville office when Arista came calling for his services in 1989.

Tim's duties at Arista/Nashville forced him to cut back considerably on songwriting and producing but he found time to produce critically acclaimed albums for Exile, Diamond Rio, Steve Warnier and Blackhawk. In 1991, DuBois demonstrated he had a real talent for finding individual performers and blending them into artistically and commercially appealing acts when he took two singer-songwriters who had been grasping for the brass ring separately for years and welded them into the multiple-platinum-selling team of Brooks & Dunn.

With the success of Alan Jackson, Brooks & Dunn, Diamond Rio, Pam Tillis, Black-Hawk, Steve Wariner, and others as his "collateral," DuBois got the go-ahead in 1993 to set up Arista/Texas.

ck Clark is one of the most recognized and popular personalities in America. He is also one of the entertainment industry's most successful and well-regarded business executives as Chairman and CEO of the publicly owned dick clark productions, inc.

Clark has hosted many special broadcasts, including "American Bandstand's #1 Hits" "Will You Marry Me," "American Bandstand's Teen Idol," the Annual "Dick Clark's New Year's Rockin' Eve" specials — the highest rated of all New Year's specials — and the "Bloopers" series.

Among Clark's many on-air credits are the "Pyramid" game series and numerous game shows. He has been master of ceremonies for many beauty pageants, including "Miss Universe," "Miss USA," and "Miss Teen USA." He has co-hosted historic, worldwide broadcasts such as "The Olympic Flag Jam '94," "World Cup: The Final Draw," and "Live Aid." He is the only personality to host top-rated series on all three networks and in syndication at the same time.

As a spokesperson, Dick Clark has achieved a level of credibility and broad appeal sought after by advertising agencies and major corporations and sponsors for product endorsements.

Clark's accomplishments have been recognized by many organizations over the years. Recent honors include his induction into the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame and the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences Hall of Fame. He has received the Distinguished Service award from the National Association of Broadcasters. In addition, he has won several other awards, including six Emmys, a Grammy and an MTV award.

As talent, as host, as spokesman - Dick Clark has few peers in American entertainment today.

s Senior Vice President of Television at dick clark productions, inc., Gene Weed develops, produces and directs major television series, specials and annual events. Each year, he produces and directs the "Golden Globes," "the Academy of Country Music Awards, " "The Sea World/Busch Gardens Pledge & Promise Awards" and "The Soap Opera Digest Awards." Under Weed's supervision, "The Academy of Country Music Awards" has won its time slot every year since it was first televised in 1974.

In 1992, Weed headed the production team selected by the Olympic Organizing Committee to welcome the Flag to Atlanta, producing and directing a two-hour star-studded event at the Georgia Dome. He also headed the team selected to launch World Cup '94 in the United States, producing and directing a live 90 minute special, airing on international satellite television and viewed by more than 750 million people around the world.

The highly acclaimed "Hot Country Nights" series on NBC was produced and directed by Weed in 1991-1992. That series is still airing weekly, in reruns, on The Nashville Network.

Other specials produced and directed by Weed include, "Farm Aid IV," "My Home's In Alabama," "Ernest Tubb, An American Original," "Golden Globes 50th Anniversary," "Going Home With Loretta & Crystal" and the "Academy of Country Music's Greatest Hits" just to name a few.

During his fifteen years as a D.J., he became the highest-rated air personality in every market he worked, including Omaha, Dallas, Miami and Los Angeles. Gene also hosted a nationally syndicated television series, "Shivaree" a half-hour music show seen in more than 150 markets in the U.S. and 7 countries overseas.

Weed lives in the San Fernando Valley with his wife, Toni, and their three children, Tyler, Chelsea and Kendall. Weed's children from his first marriage include Kent, a television director in L.A., Kymberli, a graphics artist in L.A., Julie, a hair dresser living in Evansville, Indiana and Adam, a highly acclaimed video editor living and working in Nashville.












ONIGHT WE CONTINUE A TRADITION WHICH BEGAN in 1965 when the very first awards for country music were given. The "Hat" awards being presented tonight are for excellence during the calendar year 1993 as voted by the members enrolled in the Academy of Country Music.

Balloting procedures for our awards must be conducted in compliance with the organization's by-laws and rules of the network for a television special. In December, a Selections Committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board begins the long and tedious task of selecting the preliminary nominees. Utilizing trade

publications, Billboard, Radio & Records, Gavin Report, Performance, Amusement Business, RIAA and other research materials, the committee determines those most qualified for eligibility in the preceding year. In January, the recommendations of the committee are presented to the board of directors. Each category is presented and the board either approves the committee's recommendations or they discuss and vote on any motions regarding a change.

Changes are voted on via a machine which tabulates the vote and insures each board member a confidential vote.

Once the slate of nominees is approved, ten (10) in each category (with the exception of New Male and Female Vocalist and New Vocal Duet or Group which have five [5] nominees each) the ballot is prepared and given to the accounting firm of Call and Call. Under the supervision of Dwight V. Call, ballots are mailed to all professional members whose membership is in good standing ninety (90) days prior to the show. In accordance with the organizations by-laws, "no company or organization is allowed to enroll, sponsor or have in its employ a number of members which exceeds ten (10) percent of the total membership of the Academy."

Each member is furnished with voting instructions, a nominee listing, return envelopes and voting instructions, and is allowed to mark one (l) nominee in each category on the Scantron ballot. If the nominee of their choice is not listed, the member may utilize the write-in page which is enclosed with the Scantron ballot. In either case, each member is entitled to cast only one (l) vote per category.

Ballots and write-ins must be returned to the accounting firm by a specified date. Once verified the ballots are removed from the ballot envelope to ensure a confidential vote. The scantron ballots and write-ins are tabulated and the top five (5) nominees (three [3] in the newcomer categories) receiving the highest number of votes appear on the final ballot. Members are then asked to cast one (1) vote in each category and return this second and final ballot to the accounting firm prior to the deadline date specified. The returns are counted in secrecy and the results are delivered to the awards telecast by Dwight V. Call. The results are made known for the first time when the envelopes are opened and the winners announced.

INSTRUMENTALIST award winners are selected under the same voting guidelines Call and Call uses for the telecast awards with one exception. The ballot is mailed to members of the Academy who are enrolled in the Artist and Musician categories, as the board feels these members are more knowledgeable and better qualified to nominate and cast votes that determine the winners of these awards. This initial ballot is blank and each eligible voting member is asked to make one (1) nomination for each of the



following instruments: Bass, Fiddle, Guitar, Steel Guitar, Drums, Keyboard and Specialty Instrument.

These nomination ballots must be received by the accounting firm prior to a specified date and are tabulated. The individuals receiving the greatest number of nominations (top three [3] and ties) appear on the final ballot. Each eligible member is mailed a final ballot and allowed to vote for one individual in each of the instrument categories. Upon return, the ballots are counted by the accounting firm and the results are given to the Academy of Country Music, who notifies the winners and issues a press release approximately two (2) weeks prior to the telecast.

BALLOTING FOR RADIO STATION/DISC JOCKEY/NIGHT CLUB AND TALENT BUYER/PROMOTER OF THE YEAR is an entirely different process. The board of directors of the academy calls upon the expertise of artists/entertainers, managers and talent agents. These individuals will be asked to submit to the Board of Directors on the First Ballot, one (1) nominee who has been most influential in the field of country music. The ballots will then be tabulated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of The Board, and the three (3) nominees receiving the highest number of votes will appear on the Final Ballot, from which the winner will be determined. The recipients of these awards are notified, a press release is issued and the winners are announced to the industry.

VIDFO AWARD is a board of directors award and is voted upon by ONLY the officers and members of the board. The board chairman appoints a committee which begins the selection process by viewing all videos submitted for consideration. The committee selects twenty-five videos to present to the board of directors. At the March board of directors meeting, the board votes for the top five (5) videos of the previous year. These ballots are tabulated by a committee appointed by the chairman; the results of this balloting is not made known until the winner is announced during the awards telecast.

Bob's involvement in entertainment organizations includes being past president of the International Entertainment Buyers Association. He is currently on the board of directors of the CMA and is serving his second term as Chairman of the Board of the Academy of Country Music.

Bob resides in Omaha with his significant other, Amy. He has four children, Dominic, R.J., Michelle and Michael. When not on the road he spends as much time as possible on his 1,000 acre game preserve just outside of Omaha.

teve Tolin, President and CEO of Entertainment Media Corp., created the company to develop and publish trade magazines and sourcebooks for the music, video and consumer electronics industries.

In 1970, Tolin undertook the challenge of publishing the Academy of Country Music Awards Program. Under his direction, the publication has grown from a modest 48-page black-and-white program to the four color, 200-page book you have received this evening, becoming an annual keepsake for members of the Academy and its guests. "Working with Fran Boyd to produce a publication that reflects the standards the Academy of Country Music puts forth is a 25-year challenge that has been very rewarding for me both personally and professionally," states Tolin.

In the late '60s, Steve moved from San Francisco to Los Angeles, bringing with him a wealth of information gained as a radio-personality, publicist, advertising director, and personal manager. In the following 30 years as a publisher, Tolin has created more than 45 national trade magazines, most notable was the Official Talent and Booking Directory, published from 1970—1981, an international directory dealing with all facets of the music industry.

In 1993, Tolin created the Official Country Music Directory, a publication which has become the leading reference sourcebook in the country music industry. In addition to the Official Country Music Directory Tolin also publishes; Talent & Booking, The Country Music Sponsor Guide, The Country Music Radio Guide, The International Official Country Music Directory, The Official Country Music Directory-Travel Guide, and Country Business Calender.

In 1995, Entertainment Media Corp. will introduce two new publications to the music industry: Country Business Fairs & Festivals Fax and Sponsor Marketing News.

Moving to Philadelphia and working with RCA's third largest distributor, promotion involved the bigger named singers.

Then on to New York City in the mid '50s, she continued working with RCA as secretary to the National Advertising Manager. In 1960, she transferred to Hollywood as administrative assistant to West Coast Record Division Head, responsible for all facets of conception to final release of product. She has also worked with film studios, independent production companies and composers. Over her career, she has been associated with Famous Music, Liberty and Dot Records, also working for IFA variety department, Reprise Records (Chuck Sagle & Jimmy Bowen), Helen Noga, Al Kasha and Fred DeMann. For almost 25 years, she was operations manager for Chuck Blore, producer of radio and television commercials.

She is now retired but has been actively involved with the Academy of Country Music since 1974 when she was elected Treasurer, a position she has held to the present time.

orn in Jamaica, New York, on March 23, 1930, Marge is the second eldest of four children, with an older brother and two younger sisters. Graduating from Woodrow Wilson High School as a member of The Leaders' Club (85+ average), she was given the Daniel B. Joseph Rotary Award for general excellence. She entered the workplace with the International Nickel Co. on Wall Street directly from school.

In 1952, she obtained a secretarial position at RCA Records, having responsibilities in the Popular and Classical side of music. Rising through the ranks, Marge came West In 1970, as Executive Secretary, Vice President of A&R West Coast. Promoted to Manager, West Coast A&R Administration, she was also directly involved with recording projects of such artists as Kenny Rogers, Hall & Oates, Nilsson, Pure Prairie League, to name a few; also handling A&R administration for Planet, 20th Century Fox and Soul Train Records; The Pointer Sisters, Stephanie Mills and The Whispers, respectively.

On her 25th Anniversary with RCA, Col. Parker presented her with a painting of Elvis (inscribed on the sleeve) and a "Hound Dog"— treasured memorabilia, along with her gold- and platinum-framed records. Not ready to retire, she joined the Academy of Country Music in 1987 and was elected to the office of Secretary on the 1987-88 slate for board elections, a position she still holds.





# TAPLANATION OF AWARDS

#### TOP NEW MALE VOCALIST

A newcomer award for the male country vocalist who gained initial fame and mass recognition in country music during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership. (Finalist of previous years are not eligible.)

#### TOP NEW FEMALE VOCALIST

Same as Top New Male Vocalist.

#### TOP NEW VOCAL GROUP OR DUET

Same as for Top New Male Vocalist and Top New Female Vocalist.

#### TOP MALE VOCALIST

The outstanding country male vocalist selected for radio, records, television and stage performances for the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership.

#### TOP FEMALE VOCALIST

Same as Male Vocalist.

#### TOP VOCAL DUET

The outstanding country vocal duet composed of two members selected for radio, records, television and stage performances for the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership.

#### TOP VOCAL GROUP

The outstanding country vocal group composed of three or more members selected for radio, records, television and stage performances for the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership.

#### ALBUM OF THE YEAR

Most popular country album of preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership. Re-released or reconstructed albums are ineligible i.e. "Greatest Hits." Award goes to artist/producer and record label.

#### SONG OF THE YEAR

The best country song receiving initial fame and mass recognition during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership. Award goes to composer/publisher/artist.

#### SINGLE RECORD OF THE YEAR

Most popular country single record of the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership. Award goes to artist/producer and record label.

#### ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR

To the individual, duet or group who performs together regularly on television, stage, recordings, films, etc., and contributed to the growth, acceptance and popularity of country music during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership.

#### CAREER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

To an individual artist who has had fame in prior years and has made a substantial come-back during the preceding calendar year. Voted by the Board of Directors. This award is not necessarily given each year, but at the discretion of the Board.

#### PIONEER AWARD

Outstanding individual who has enhanced country music and contributed to its growth. A pioneer in presenting country and/or western music. Voted on by the Board of Directors, the nominee receiving the greatest number of votes on a single ballot is honored.

#### JIM REEVES AWARD

To an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, for outstanding contributions to the acceptance of country music throughout the world during the preceding calendar year. Voted upon by the Board of Directors. (This award does not have to be given every year.)

#### INSTRUMENT AWARDS

Individuals selected by their peers to be the very best at a particular instrument and would comprise the ultimate band - bass, drums, fiddle, guitar, steel guitar, keyboard, specialty instrument. Voted on by members of the Academy enrolled in the Artist/Entertainer and Musician categories.

#### RADIO STATION, DISC JOCKEY, NIGHT CLUB AND TALENT BUYERS PROMOTER OF THE YEAR

is an entirely different process. The Board of Directors of the Academy calls upon the expertise of Artists/Entertainers, Managers and Talent agents. These individuals will be asked to submit to the Board of Directors on the First Ballot, one (I) nominee who has been most influential in the field of country music. The ballots will then be tabulated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of The Board and the three (3) nominees receiving the highest number of votes will appear on the Final Ballot, from which the winner will be determined. The recipients of these awards are notified, a press release is issued and the winners are announced to the industry prior to tonight's telecast.

#### VIDEO OF THE YEAR

The best video of the year, giving some consideration to production and performance. Voted on by the Board of Directors.






