
Last, but not least, I sincerely thank our Board of Directors for their guidance and input throughout the year and for keeping the Academy on course.





Warm greetings to everyone gathered for the thirty-second annual awards ceremony of the Academy of Country Music.





The Western Original

n 1981 George Strait signed with MCA Records - sixteen years later, country music is better for the handsome
Texan's love of and dedication to country music. Songs like "Unwound," "The Fireman," "Baby Blue...... Amarillo By Morning," "The Chair," "Does Fort Worth Ever Cross Your Mind," "Check Yes Or No," "Blue Clear Sky" and "I Can Still Make Cheyenne" have become new country standards.

The former Academy of Country
Music's Male Vocalist of the Year has the
largest selling box set in country music
history, *George Strait, Strait Out Of The Box.*With sales of four million, it is tied with Led
Zeppelin and second only to Bruce Springsteen as the biggest selling box set of all time.
Sales for the soundtrack to his movie *Pure Country* have surpassed five million. His
total album sales of nearly 40 million would
exceed the diameter of the moon if they were
placed end to end!

There is no one reason that Strait has remained one of country music's superstars, but a combination of things. First and foremost, he has the ability to choose good songs, songs that not only fit his style but strike a chord with the listening public.

Secondly, George Strait entertains his fans. Without aid of tiered stage, special effects or multiple costume changes, Strait

presents a show that combines his hits and country standards to an enthralled crowd. He doesn't dance, his moves aren't choreographed, but as he roams from one side of the stage to the other, he is in complete control.

Another reason Strait is consistently popular is that he's a genuinely nice guy who absolutely loves what he's doing for a living. His music is very important to him, and he spends as much time as he needs to in order to make the best records he can for his fans. The fact that he's made great music is evidenced by those who claim him as their influence.

Garth Brooks makes no bones about Strait's influence on him. "I am doing what I am doing today because of the Good Lord, my family and George Strait,' he says. Randy Travis also admits to Strait's influence. "I've been a big George Strait fan since I heard "Unwound" on the radio in Charlotte, N. C.," he says. "I also sang a lot of his music in the clubs when I first started singing."

Strait says at first he was surprised by these kinds of comments. "At first I thought' how could that be?' Because I never set out to be an influence on anybody. Once I thought about it, and how I looked up to people in the business like Merle Haggard, George Jones and Bob Wills, and remembered how I felt about those people, then I felt real honored."





nfusing country music with different arenas of entertainment has long been a tradition of the Academy of Country Music so it seems especially fitting for Crystal Bernard to be the co-host of this year's awards program.

Bernard has been a popular star of television, first appearing on "Happy Days" and "It's a Living." She is perhaps best known for her role as Helen Hackett on NBC-TV's "Wings." Recently the public was exposed to her singing and songwriting talents via her debut album, "The Girl Next Door." This new release is a showcase of her musical talent that was apparent long before she had notions of becoming a television star.

Crystal started performing alongside her father and three sisters at churches, tent revivals and gospels jubilees and recorded twelve gospel albums in all. "We had a trio," says Bernard, whose River North CD has been well received by critics and fans. "I look back with so much appreciation. We had a strict upbringing but I didn't know any better at the time. I look back and thank God for the kind of parents I had."

Ironically, it was pop music that first gave Crystal the chance to use her musical abilities as a solo act. Several of her songs were recorded by pop artists like Paula Abdul, Lisa Stansfield, Tracie Spencer and The Winans. She met Peter Cetera after a friend heard one of her tapes and sent it to him. Cetera called Crystal and expressed interest in her voice as well as her songwriting. That song, "(I Wanna Take) Forever Tonight," became a hit for the duo and soon she was signed to the same label as Cetera.

Her producers wanted her to continue in the Adult Contemporary style but she insisted on going country. "Guys I'm country. I've got to do country," she told them. So she did. Her first single, "Have We Forgotten What Love Is," was co-written with Billy Dean. She has also collaborated with other notable tunesmiths including Skip Ewing and J. D. Souther.

Usually there is resistance to television stars who want to become singing stars, but Crystal Bernard is a natural. "USA Today" said of the budding singer, "Bernard is more than a cut above the usual TV star who figures it's gotta be easy to break into country music."

The Academy is proud to have her on the show and wishes her continued success with her many talents and career opportunities.

t's no stretch for Jeff Foxworthy to tell you all about being a Southerner — he is one. He even has the relatives to prove it. He started in comedy with stories about his uncle Earl, who, as he says, "was dismissed as a cook at Waffle House because of his appearance," and cousin Rowena who, "was so fat her senior picture was an aerial photograph."

Jeff grew up in Hapeville, a south Atlanta suburb, attended Georgia Tech and planned to follow in his dad's cowboy boots at IBM. Jeff's friends convinced him to try out at a local comedy club that had an amateur night. "I'd probably never have gone back if they hadn't laughed at my jokes that first night," Foxworthy says. Soon he left IBM for the comedy road circuit, playing clubs like Zanies and Giggles.

The shortest distance between a comedian and his audience is a one-liner. Foxworthy consolidated his experiences with white trash humor into the clever fashion of "You Might Be a Redneck If . . ." after hanging at a comedy club in Detroit. It was there, after discovering there's a little redneck in all of us, that divine inspiration drove him to his hotel room, where he began a list of redneck references that now reaches 2,000.

Many have accused Foxworthy of being a one-trick pony, but that's how comedians get their start. Every comic at one time has a famous gag or routine that separates them from the crowd, just like a musician or actor has an inimitable voice or style. So why not rednecks?

When Jeff first met with the networks "They kept saying, 'You're not hip'," Foxworthy remembers. "But between New York and L. A. there are 200 million people that aren't hip." The network folks must have forgotten that television is the kingdom where the unhip rule. Remember "The Andy Griffith Show" or "The Beverly Hillbillies"? There is nothing more American than having, as Foxworthy says, "a glorious absence of sophistication."

"The Jeff Foxworthy Show" has been revamped and added to the NBC comedy lineup. His special brand of hillbilly humor will be on display tonight and in case you miss anything, here are some favorite tell-tale signs of a card-carrying redneck:

1996

Awards show held an April 24th at Universal Amphitheatre. hosted by Brooks & Dunn and Faith Hill...Brooks & Dunn voted Entertainer of the Year and Merle Haggard was honored with the prestigious Pioneer Award...Bob Romeo was re-elected Board chairman...ACM participated in Country Radio Seminar as sponsor of the Artists Showcases...The ACM Bill Boyd Celebrity Golf Classic was hold in October, Tracy Lawrence was our celebrity host Coors Light, Tracy's tour sponsor, came on board as our corporate sponsor and the tourney raised \$80,000 - \$40,000 went to the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children and \$40,000 to the T. J. Martel Foundation/ Neil Bogart, Memorial Laboratory... Christmas Party was once again held at the Castaway Restaurant (sold out) and featured the talents of James Bonamy, Thrasher Shiver and country's newest sensation LeAnn Rimes...The Academy staff still growing, hired on another employee - Lacey, a good ole country girl from Arkansas.

1995

February 7—Bill Boyd, Executive Director of the ACM, died at his home in Burbank, California of a massive heart attack...

ACM again participated in the Country Radio Seminar held in Nashville in March... 30th Academy of Country Music Awards Presentation was held in May at the Universal Amphitheater. In conjunction with the awards show, the Country Star Restaurant unveiled Bill Boyd's star... The ACM again sanctioned FanFest, this second fan driven event was held at the FairPlex in Pomona, CA... In May, Fran Boyd, Executive Administrator of ACM, was invited to and attended "Women In Country Music" a special taped at the White House and yes, President and Mrs. Clinton were in attendance... In June the ACM participated in the International

Entertainment Buyers Association (IEBA) Seminar and hosted the Sunday Brunch... In July, Scott Siman of Sony Music was elected President of ACM with Bob Romeo being re-elected Chairman of the Board, Gene Weed, re-elected Vice Chairman... In October the Golf Committee recommended and the Board of Directors approved the renaming of the tournament to Academy of Country Music Bill Boyd Golf Classic.

was scared to death. When we first started I had one thing in mind and that was to make folks back home proud . . . If I had to pick one word to describe the recording process that first time, I guess I'd say 'innocence', says Garth Brooks of his first album for Capitol Records." With more than 54 million albums now in the hands of fans, Brooks is the fourth highest selling artist in RIAA history in domestic sales, behind only the Beatles, Billy Joel and the Eagles. He received the Academy's Jim Reeves Memorial Award for promoting and enhancing the image of country music internationally in 1994. His most recent accomplishment, the release of "If Tomorrow Never Comes," co-written with Kent Blazy, by R & B act Joos. So while Brooks continues to write and record for the country audience, his songs find their way into other markets with their straight-forward messages about the things that matter most to each of us.


■ EAVESDROPPING

The very first time I heard "The Change" was shortly after the bombing. From the first I heard the song I saw in my mind the footage all of us saw on TV. So, I guess it was my idea. I didn't see any other option. It was the same way on the video called "The Dance." As far as backlash from the video, I think that depends on how you use the video after it's created. Since the day of the release, this video has always been nothing more and nothing less than a tribute to the victims, the survivors, the family of people who came to help.



ne of the most fun-loving duets in country music, ix Brooks and Ronnie Dunn couldn't be more serious about their music. Onstage, they give the audience a show that will stand up against the best in any genre. On record, their songs, often self-penned, can be emotion-packed or tongue-in-cheek, but always they move you. Their sound precipitated a whole new feel in country music, one that has found itself a home in the dance clubs across America and in the hearts of Brooks & Dunn fans. Their Borderline album is a little different for the two, but as Dunn says "I felt like it was time for us to kind of veer off the most traveled path. It sure doesn't hurt, in today's climate, to step just a little bit over into what the traditionalist might call 'progressive'." Brooks adds. "Yet our music demands a certain earthiness, and that's the balance we went for. There's a rootsy writing thing going on but as far as recording goes, it's full-speed modern."

EAVESDROPPING

When I heard that Brooks & Dunn cut "My Maria" I was thrilled. Brooks & Dunn is one of the biggest acts in country music and I knew that this would be a tremendous shot in the arm for MCA Music Publishing to have a cut on their

album. I've enjoyed a great relationship with Kix and Ronnie for years, which made it even sweeter. When I first heard their version of the song I thought it was one of the best records of their career and might be the biggest record of the year.



lan Jackson can never be accused of being like one of the performers he sings about in "Gone Country" - he's country all the way, whether it be his Georgia upbringing or his

smooth country delivery. Somewhat shy around folks he doesn't know, Jackson says he had to overcome that shyness to perform before the thousands who come out to his shows. Apparently he's done well, as witnessed by Larry Nager's review of his show in the *Cincinnati Enquirer*: "If his production was strictly 1996, Mr. Jackson's music was classic country. A highlight was a new 15-minute 'unplugged' segment featuring abbreviated versions of some of his earlier hits, including "Wanted" and "Here In The Real World." The acoustic set closed with a powerful bluegrass version of "Seven Bridges Road," featuring the vocal trio of Mr. Jackson, fiddler Mark McClurg and drummer Bruce Rutherford."


EAVESDROPPING

The first song Alan Jackson played me was "Home," and I knew from that one song he could write, he could sing, and he must be a pretty good boy, he wrote a song about his mom and dad.

and singing was that there was real honesty there that moved me. I remember the one thing that stuck out the most about his songwriting was it wasn't crafted to death, which happens sometimes in the Nashville system of songwriting. I thought it was a strength for him because his songs had an imperfect honest quality. The songs did not seem contrived or manufactured, and I felt like the best thing I could do was stay out of his way and just guide the natural raw ability he had for songwriting. The reason I produced him was I had been involved early on with the demos that actually got him his record deal. Our relationship grew out of making demos together and naturally progressed to my becoming his producer. The reason I think he has such appeal to his fans is that he is not pretentious about what he is doing, which comes through clearly in his music. He is what he is and I think that is appealing. He also looks good which obviously helps in the marketing of his music. I just think that people sense the honesty in Alan and his music.



don't want anybody to get bored with me . . . I don't want to be three albums down the road and everybody's heard all I can do." So says Tim McGraw, who's most recent album All I Want has spawned the new party anthem "I Like It, I Love It," which became a cut on the soundtrack of the Julia Roberts/Dennis Quaid movie "Something To Talk About". The album had orders of two million when it shipped, and the number is still climbing. Not too bad for a guy who only hit the country music scene three short years ago! The Louisiana native, who majored in pre-law and sports medicine before settling on music as a career, was signed to Curb two years after moving to Nashville. His rise to country music fame followed with his second album, Not A Moment Too Soon. The rest, as the cliche goes, is history.

EAVESDROPPING

Before we recorded (All I Want), we played most of the stuff live for a while. Just getting feedback from the audience on

the new songs is probably the biggest gauge we have. You can usually tell if you're losing them on something and boring them, especially if you feel you're losing energy when you're doing a song."



ith the biggest selling country box set of all times (George Strait: Strait Out Of The Box) and a movie soundtrack that has a jump in sales every time a movie channel airs Pure Country, George Strait continues to ride high in country music. Unlike Dusty, his character in Pure Country, Strait has found a comfortable place in his career, one that allows him to play just enough concert dates to keep him in contact with his fans, have enough time to find songs for his newest recording project, and most importantly, have time to spend at home in Texas. Nominated again for Single Record of the Year (last year he won for "Check Yes Or No") is testament to Strait's ability to pick great songs that continue his well-established tradition of great country music. He has told the story more than once about walking down the MCA Records hallways for the first time, looking at all the gold and platinum albums by many of his heroes and asking manager Erv Woolsey "Do you think I'll ever have any of these?" No doubt, George Strait has fulfilled his dreams.

EAVESDROPPING

I believe George Strait has had the longevity he's had because his music is honest. He never tries to follow any trends happening in country music, he just does what he does. George grew up with country music and he loves it ... Everyone talks about how great George's career is, how handsome he is, but not everyone realizes what a great vocalist he is. When he records, his vocals are phenomenal. I think sometimes people take for granted what a great singer he is ... His show clothes are not costumes, what you see is what George is — Wranglers just look a little better on George, and his hat just looks a little bit cooler when he wears it. He's a very charismatic person but he's very much a real person.



After all, "It was like LeAnn came into this world knowing what she wanted to do," her mother explains. By the age of eight, she was a favorite with the crowd at Johnnie High's Country Music Revue in Arlington, Texas. At age 11, she had recorded "Blue," a song her father and producer first dismissed because it was too "old" for her. The album eventually found its way to Mike Curb, who decided to take a chance on the young singer. "Blue" was what got his attention, and it was "Blue" that the label released. Charlie Dick, Patsy Cline's widower, had to pull over the first time he heard the song on the radio. "She's got a little bit of a lot of people in her voice," Dick told USA Today. "I hear Brenda Lee. I hear Patsy. I hear other people too." Fans hear something they like when they listen to LeAnn, who is happy with that. After all, she wants to be known as an "artist," not a "singing sensation."

he Golfer Formerly Known as Vince — new country act? No, just the MCA recording artist's sense of humor coming out when it came time to name his concert tour. Vince Gill's association with golf is well known, but the fact that he is a philanthropist supporting many causes is not as much in the spotlight. It's so like Vince to understand that giving back is as important as receiving. Not only does he host the annual Vinny Celebrity Golf Tournament, which supports Tennessee's Junior Golf youth program, he does an annual Celebrity Basketball Game and Concert at Belmont University to benefit the school's music and athletic departments. He has been recognized with the Minnie Pearl Award for his charity work, and as Outstanding Nashvillian of the Year and Tennessean of the Year. These awards are as important to the singer as his music awards, which include the ACM's Top Male Vocalist in 1992 and 1993.

Vince is my buddy — on and off the golf course. He's the brother I never had. If I had to use only one word to describe him as a golfer, I would say he's passionate.



Vince shows all these emotions on the golf course, just as he does with his music. Vince Gill the golfer is the same as Vince Gill the musician. He is passionate about his music and the game of golf . . . which makes him excel in both.

ollin Raye has insight into why he has to record songs that are honest for him. "People's voices change when they lie. I know mine does - and that's what makes it so important for me to have songs I really believe in." Apparently the Texas-native has hit on the right philosophy. It also helps that he isn't afraid to take a chance on a song. "Little Rock" wasn't exactly an up-tempo radio record. "What If Jesus Comes Back Like That" was a bit deeper than some records on the chart at the time. "When I'm looking for songs for my records, I'm looking for songs that are about things I've felt or seen. But I also want songs to be the kind of songs that people will feel are their own. When you get out on the road and people start telling you all these stories about what the songs have meant to them, that's when those songs really take on a deeper meaning."







lackHawk's second Arista album, Strong Enough, entered Billboard's charts at the number four position, making it the highest debuting album of any country group since May of 1991, when SoundScan began tracking country record sales. Their first two albums have been certified platinum and gold, respectively. Considering their previous track record BlackHawk's next project, due out in June, is a sure bet for success. The group's sound reflects its pop and rock background, but it must be remembered that Henry Paul left The Outlaws because he couldn't convince them to explore their country roots. "To me country and rock music are very very similar, especially in style." Paul says. "And I love the idea that we're different in that regard. I don't want to push that button too hard in any one direction. I think we just try to be ourselves, both stylistically and in our choice of material."

he idea that a movie might be made about the life of this 25-year-old singer might seem strange until you know the basis for the story: An 18-year-old with cancer who isn't given much hope of survival until his 25th birthday. Never mind that he would be celebrating that birthday with a country hit, "Nobody Knows." Originally an R&B hit for the Tony Rich Project, Sharp says he knew the minute he heard the song it could be a country hit. "And to tell the truth, I've always loved to sing covers and make them my own." With original goals of going to college on a football scholarship and starring on the musical stage, the Californian who grew up in Idaho was diagnosed with cancer within months after graduating from high school. When the Make-A-Wish Foundation asked him for his heart's desire, he requested a meeting with producer/composer/performer David Foster. into remission. "Music has made a difference every day of my life. Whenever I needed strength, there was always a song. I want to do that for someone else. I want to heal the world, I guess."





indy McCready says she had no idea how to break into the music business and forge a career as a recording artist and entertainer. That didn't stop the then 18-year-old from heading for Nashville with a few karaoke tapes in hand and a promise to her mother that if something didn't happen within a year, she would come home and go to college. Fifty-one weeks later, the Floridaborn beauty signed with BNA Records. The dynamite single and title cut. "Ten Thousand Angels" was followed by "Guys Do It All The Time" and "Maybe He'll Notice Her Now." A little over a year later, she was being presented a gold album and a platinum naval ring by her record company. Yes, she's aware that many of her fans are young girls, and she accepts the fact that she's a role model for them. "I've been thinking about it and about what I'll do for my second record. I figure I can take responsibility for what's happening with my younger fans or I can just do what I want to do. I've decided to be responsible. Besides, I have

a 17-year-old brother who lives with me that keeps me conscious of what's going on in that area."







more importantly, according to Beeson, "We just feel like this is the real deal."





is current album was Tracy Lawrence's first in two years, and he says it's his best in terms of depth as well as vocals. "There were a lot of things I wanted to express. I've finally learned how to shuck the distractions and let the music feed the soul. And the more I learn as a producer, the better it makes me as a vocalist. And going to Miami to record the vocals was great - I was able to relax and sing better." Mario Tarradell of the Dallas Morning News agrees with Lawrence's assessment of the album. "There's a new Tracy Lawrence living inside Time Marches On," Tarradell writes. "As a singer, songwriter and producer, Mr. Lawrence is no longer a popular hat act with a string of hits - he's now an artist, with a distinctive sound." Recently married to Dallas Cowboys cheerleader Stacie Drew, Lawrence has his career and his personal life on the right track, and he says his faith will carry him through. 

His musical influences range from Vern Gosdin and Gene Watson to Jimmy Buffett, but his stage show is more reminiscent of the latter. "There's a definite chemistry and sincerity between myself and my band that translates to the audience," Supernaw says. "It's something that we've worked hard on, and it's very exciting on stage."





When Academy of Country Music

was first established in 1964, its founding members were driven to share the music they loved with others in both the business community and to other music fans around the world. Thirty-three years later, the thousands of members of the Academy continue to promote country music around the globe.

Original members of the Academy knew that country music and its celebrities had broad enough appeal for the singers and their music to be integral in promoting products to the people other businesses were trying to reach. We continue to find new ways to educate people about country music's viability in the marketplace. One of our past endeavors was "What's This Country All About?" an overview of country music and it's status in a rapidly changing business world.

Academy members realize that well informed people within the industry are vital to country music's continued expansion, so our organization works to educate the performers and the business men and women about the trade. Members are kept abreast of changes in legislation that might affect them and are made aware of new opportunities for country music in radio, television, motion pictures and

touring. The Academy helps newcomers become better known to their peers and the general public. Showcases featuring new talent introduces performers to the industry as well as to the media.

The Academy continues to be involved with Country Radio Seminar in Nashville. This helps us to keep you informed about what's going on at country radio today. The Academy presents live music performances through its involvement with the Super Faces Show. Past performances have included appearances by Brooks & Dunn, Hank

Williams, Jr., Alabama, The Judds, George Strait, Garth Brooks, Reba McEntire, Bryan White and Patty Loveless.

One of the important parts of having a successful organization like our Academy of Country Music is to give something back to the community that supports our efforts. In 1983 the Celebrity Golf Classic was created to raise money for charity and to allow business men and women in the Los Angeles area to meet and mingle with folks from the country music community. Charities benefiting from the tournament

included the American Heart Association and the M. D. Anderson Cancer Hospital in Houston, Texas. In 1996 the tournament's name was changed to the Bill Boyd Celebrity Golf Classic and raised \$80,000 for the T. J. Martell Foundation/Neil Bogart Memorial Laboratory for cancer, leukemia and AIDS research and the Shriners Children's Hospital.

The Academy's first presentation of music awards was in 1965. Broadcasts went out locally until 1972, when the show was put into national television syndication. The telecast was then picked up by ABC-TV until 1979 when the Academy became associated with dick clark productions inc. This prompted a move to NBC where the show was given prime time status and became one of the most watched shows in its time-slot.

The awards show offers an opportunity for all of us in the music industry to mingle with personalities in different areas of the entertainment field. Many of the presenters at our Awards Show include Hollywood celebrities and television personalities.

To be an Academy member means the privilege of voting for awards as well as the election of board members, and the chance to network within an exciting industry that continues to evolve and expand. Members also receive a subscription to the Academy's monthly newsletter,

"Country Focus," which keeps you informed of personal changes in the industry, news on up-and-coming acts, information about the industry and the Academy.



embers of the Academy of
Country Music began a
tradition in 1965 when they
presented the very first Hat awards for
country music achievement. That tradition
continues with tonight's awards, which
are being presented for excellence in
country music during the calendar year
1996 as voted by the members enrolled in
the Academy of Country Music.

The balloting procedures for these awards are conducted in strict compliance with the ACM's by-laws and rules of the network for a television special. In December, a Selections Committee was appointed by the Chairman of the Board and began the long and exhausting task of choosing the preliminary nominees. Utilizing trade publications Billboard, Radio & Records, The Gavin Report, Performance and Amusement Business, along with information from the Recording Industry Association of America, Sound Scan and other research materials, the committee determines those

most qualified for eligibility in the calendar year for which the awards are given.

Once selections are made, each category is presented

to the academy board, which can approve the committee's recommendations or discuss and vote on any motions regarding a change. Changes are voted on via a machine which tabulates the vote and insures each board member confidentiality.

and insures each board member confidentiality.

The slate of nominees will have ten (10) in each category with the exception of Top New Male, Top New Female and New Vocal Duet or Group, which have five (5) nominees each. Once the nominees are approved, the ballot is prepared and given to the accounting firm of Call and Call. Dwight V. Call supervises the ballots, which are mailed to professional members of the academy whose membership is in good stand-





In accordance with the organization's by-laws, no company or organization is allowed to enroll, sponsor or have in its employ a number of members which exceeds ten (10) percent of the total membership of the Academy.


Record companies, depending on their status (gold or silver), are allowed either thirty (30) or ten (10) members per label.

Each member is provided complete voting instructions, a nominee listing and return envelope, and is allowed to mark one (1) nominee in each category on the scantron ballot. If the nominee of their choice is not listed, the member may indicate his/her vote on the write-in page which is enclosed with the scantron ballot. In either case, each member is entitled to cast only one (1) vote per category.

Ballots and write-ins must be returned to the accounting firm by a specified date. Once verified, the ballots are removed from the ballot envelope to ensure a confidential vote. The scantron

ballots and write-ins are tabulated and the top five (5) nominees, three (3) in the newcomer categories, receiving the highest number of votes appear on the final ballot. Members

are then asked to cast one (1) vote in each category and return this second and final ballot to the accounting firm prior to the deadline date specified. The returns are counted in secrecy and the results are delivered to the


ing ninety (90) days prior to the show.

awards with no exception. The initial ballot is mailed to members of the Academy who are enrolled in the Artist and Musician categories as the board feels those members are more knowledgeable and better qualified to nominate and cast votes that determine the winners of these awards. The initial ballots are blank and each eligible voting member is asked to make one (1) nomination for each of the following instruments: Bass, Fiddle, Guitar, Steel Guitar, Drums, Keyboard and Specialty Instrument.

These nomination ballots must be received by the accounting firm prior to a specified date and are tabulated. The individuals receiving the greatest number of nominations (top three [3] and ties) appear on the final ballot. Each eligible member is mailed a final ballot and allowed to vote for one individual in each of the instrument categories. Upon return, the ballots are counted by the accounting firm and the results are given to the Academy of Country Music, who notifies the winners and issues a press release approximately two (2) weeks prior to the telecast.

Balloting for the Radio Station/Disc Jockey/Night Club and Talent Buyer/Promoter of the Year is an entirely different process. The Board of Directors of the Academy calls upon the expertise of Artists/Entertainers, Managers and Talent Agents. These individuals will be asked to submit to the Board of Directors, on a First Ballot, one (1) nominee in each category who has been most influential in the field of country music. The ballots will then be tabulated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board and the three (3) nominees receiving the highest number of votes will appear on the Final Ballot, from which the winner will be determined. The recipients of these awards are notified, a press release is issued and the winners are announced to the industry.

The Video Award is a Board of Directors award and is voted upon by only the officers and members of the board. The Board Chairman appoints a committee which begins the selection process by viewing all videos submitted for consideration. The committee selects what they believe to be the top videos. A compilation tape is made and sent to all members of the board along with a ballot. The directors vote for five (5) videos, the votes are tabulated and at the March board meeting, a final vote is cast. The video receiving the largest number of votes is announced during the awards telecast.

THE JIM REEVES EMORIAL AWARD

he Jim Reeves Memorial Award was established in 1969 and has been presented to an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, who has made substantial contributions toward furthering international acceptance of country music during the preceding calendar year. This is a special award whose recipie nts are determined by the board of directors and does not have to be given each year.

he Academy of Country Music honored Bob Saporiti of Warner Bros. Records with the Jim Reeves Memorial Award on Wednesday, March 5, 1997, during Country Radio Seminar in Nashville.

The board of directors of the Academy determines the recipient of this award, which does not have to be presented


every year. The award recognizes contributions made by an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, toward furthering international acceptance of country music during the preceding calendar year.

Bob Saporiti started the first Nashville Country International Department for Warner/Reprise Nashville. Since then, his leadership, creativity and vision have aided in the dynamic growth of country music overseas.

Bob forged a relationship with affiliates, bringing Warner artists to various parts of the world including Europe, Japan, Brazil and Australia. He revived country music at the Montreaux Jazz Festival, one of the world's most prestigious music festivals, and served as chairman of the Nashville Goes to Ireland committee that took Nashville music industry leaders to Ireland. The foreign media and press recognize him as an undisputed leader in bringing country music to the world.

Bob Saporiti's international achievements make this recognition of his efforts worthy of the Academy of Country Music's Jim Reeves Memorial Award.

Top New Male Vocalist

This award goes to the new male country vocalist who has gained initial fame and mass recognition in country music during the preceding calendar year. The award is voted on by the membership of the Academy. (Finalists from previous years are not eligible).

Top New Female Vocalist

Same as Top New Male Vocalist.

Top New Vocal Group or Duet

Same as Top New Male or Female Vocalist.

Top Male Vocalist

This award is presented to country music's outstanding male vocalist who has achieved success and recognition via radio, records, television and stage performances for the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership of the Academy.

Top Female Vocalist

Same as Male Vocalist.

Top Vocal Duet

This award goes to the country vocal duet composed of two members who have achieved success and recognition via radio, records, television and stage performances for the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership of the Academy.

Top Vocal Group

This award goes to the country vocal group composed of three or more members who have achieved success and recognition via radio, records, television and stage performances for the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership of the Academy.

Album of the Year

This award goes to the most popular country album of the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership of the Academy. Re-released or reconstructed albums (such as "Greatest Hits") are ineligible. The award is given to the artist, producer and record label.

Song of the Year

This award goes to the country song receiving initial fame and mass recognition during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the membership of the Academy. The award is given to the composer(s), publisher(s), and artist.

Single Record of the Year

This award goes to the most popular single record of the preceding calendar year. Voted on by membership of the Academy. The award is given to the artist, producer and record label.

Entertainer of the Year

This award goes to the individual, duet or group who performs together regularly on television, stage, recordings, films, etc., and has contributed to the growth, acceptance and popularity of country music during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by membership of the Academy.

Special Achievement Award

This award is presented for unprecedented, unique and outstanding individual achievement in the field of country music during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the board of directors. This award does not have to be given every year.

Pioneer Award

This award goes to an outstanding individual who has enhanced country music and contributed to its growth. The person receiving the award would be a pioneer in country and/or western music. Voted on by the Board of Directors of the Academy, the nominee receiving the greatest number of votes on a single ballot is honored.

Jim Reeves Award

This award goes to an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, for outstanding contributions to the acceptance of country music throughout the world during the preceding calendar year. Voted on by the Board of Directors. This award does not have to be given every year.

Instrumental Awards

This award goes to individuals, selected by their peers, to be the very best at a particular instrument. The collective group of members — bass, drums, fiddle, guitar, steel guitar, keyboard and specialty instrument — would comprise the ultimate band. Voted on by members of the Academy enrolled in the Artist/Entertainer and Musician categories.

Radio Station, Disc Jockey, Night Club

and Talent Buyer/Promoter of the Year

Winners of these awards are chosen by an entirely different process than the other awards given by the Academy. The Board of Directors of the Academy calls upon the expertise of Artists/Entertainers, Managers and Talent Agents, who are asked to submit to the Board of Directors on the first ballot one (1) nominee in each category who have been most influential in the field of country music. The ballots are then tabulated by a committee appointed by the Chairman of the Board. The three (3) nominees receiving the highest number of votes will appear on the final ballot, from which the winner will be determined.

Video Of The Year

This award is a Board of Directors award and is voted upon only by the officers and members of the board. It goes to the best video of the year with consideration given to production and performance.
